PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Thank you for taking the time to fill out the information sheet in the May issue of Relatively Speaking. Working areas are: England, Ireland, Canada, United States, Scotland, Wales, Germany, Russia and Holland. Your needs will be handed over to Instructors who are experts in each Country.

For those compiling a written family history, Lila Spencer an Instructor in Lethbridge, suggested - first purchase a loose leaf binder with dividers, then divide you book into time periods, or events, i.e. Christmas, (you choose your own divisions). Information you recall or gather on an individual family member or family event, write it down and insert it into the proper division. It may be just a short sentence or a paragraph. Do not worry about correct spelling or punctaution at this point. The general idea is to gather as much material as you can from your own memory, family members or documented sources. When your information is to be printed, you will want to decide what to include or exclude, to make your history special to your own family. Remember, to make second copies of your research in case one is destroyed.

A special thank you to Jack and Enid Fitrzsimonds, who have been with the Society since it's inseption. Both have worked on all Committees and are still active. Jack is our By-laws Chairman and Enid is our Cemetery Recording Chairman. If you wish to submit new ideas on these topics, please feel free to do so.

At present the Executive is working in two areas. The first is compiling a Directory of the AGS people in Branches, Committees, and the Societies we are actively involved with. The second project is a policy and procedure manual. Suggestions welcome.



Dear Susan,

First of all, is your grandmother still alive? If so, would she write to the Adoption Disclosure Services in Troonto to obtain whatever they will give her? This would be the easiest way for you to obtain this information.

Have you been in touch with the Parent Finders Group here in Edmonton? They are the epople who are most familiar with the procedures for what you want and could offer suggestions as to how to go about it. Their address is P.O. Bos 12031, Edmonton, Alberta T5J 3L2.

Parent Finders have regular meetings whose announcements appear regularly in the paper. Their phone number is 466-3335. Your best bet would be to arrange to talk with someone personally and tell them your problem, as it is not the most common problem they have to deal with. But I am sure they could offer you some suggestions at least.

HAVE A NICE DAY

It was recently suggested that I share the rather unorthodox methods of research that I have stooped to. I feel that a person should use every means possible, so I made up a few of my own. My family refer to them as my "Have a nice day" efforts. My husband used to laugh, but not any more: I get replies; does he? Ha! Ha!

Well, to the nitty gritty. On the birth, marriage, and death certificates that you acquire, you will always find an address, be it the address of the informant on a death certificate, of a family on a birth entry, or of the bride and groom before they married (this is quite often the same for both).

One day, looking at a birth certificate of a relative on my mother's side, I began to wonder how I would ever find the records of any of them. London has some of the most unsociable Record Offices ever put together, no aid in genealogy; they do not attempt to help in any way. What to do? Well, I had an address, didn't I? So without further ado, pen to paper, I wrote my little ditty of how I was researching my family tree and the last known address I had was this one; could the good people of the house help me at all? I gave the name of the family and as much relevant information as was necessary. Of course, I always began the letter with those polite words, "I hope you will forgive this intrusion" -- and they usually do. Animal curiosity rears its head when a strange letter appears from overseas--I'm sure they feel they are about to hear they have inherited something--so as long as you include return postage, usually two I.R.C.s, the reply is almost guaranteed.

One of my attempts along these lines really gave my research a great lift. I sent my letter to an address in London, the last I had for my mom's grandmother (yes, some years had passed). As it happens, the house is now owned by a nice spinster lady. She knew nothing of the family as she had only lived in the house for ten years, but her friends, two sisters across the street, having lived there for fifty years, did know the family. The name was Payne; apparently the old lady had moved some years previously and since died, but they had the address of her grandson, a Dr. Frank Adam Green, and they passed on my letter and address. It took only about two weeks and hey presto, a letter from Dr. Green: yes, his grandmother was my mother's too. It would seem we have relatives in Portugal and New Zealand also.

Another such attempt, only on my father's side, in Somerset, turned up another relative, my father's cousin in his mother's family. Owing to a split in marriage many years ago, I had never learned of my paternal grandmother's sisters and brothers, but this cousin was most helpful and provided me with many new relatives and information on those now deceased.

I have also received many kind replies from people unable to help, but very supportive of my efforts, with information on the area and promises of assistance if they have the opportunity in the future. The time spent writing is therefore rarely wasted.

So if you feel as I felt, frustrated in your present course of research, find those old addresses, write your letters, and don't forget....



SHIPS' PASSENGER LISTS





The records of persons coming to the New World are a rich and widely-used source of family history information. However, the main difficulty for family researchers is that they are often hard to locate, and the usual filing system is first by port, then by date of arrival, then by name of ship, and lastly by the names of the passengers. I usually advise researchers to look for lists of ships' passengers rather than the actual ship's manifest, as this method is faster and is often more successful.

Some of the more common lists would be as follows:

- 1. Names of passengers on the ship's manifest leaving a port.
- 2. Names of passengers on a ship's manifest arriving at a port.
- 3. Published names of people who were noted because of a historical event in which ships played a part.
 - a. The colonization of America by the Pilgrim Fathers, particularly those who sailed on the "Mayflower". A Lineage Society has been formed to keep track of the descendants, and many books have been written about the families.
 - b. The "First Fleeters", made up of convicts and their families, and the soldiers assigned to the first colony in Australia. It is a matter of pride to have had an ancestor who was a criminal sent to the Australian Penal Colony, and as for their Pilgrim couterparts, documentation is readily available.
- 4. Names of people who were transported for various reasons.
 - a. The 100,000 children and youths sent to Canada at the turn of the century: Barnado Home children, waifs and strays from the streets of London, from the Marchmont, William Quarrier Home, Fairknow and Brockville Homes of Scotland, Mr. Fagan's Homes, as well as the Middlemore Home and the various societies in England that offered services to youths. The ship's manifests have been preserved, and at the National Archives a card index (soundex) is available which leads to files on each child or family of children.
 - b. The Hungarian juveniles who came to Canada in the years 1956-1964.
 - c. Boys sent to Canada from the Tiffield Reformatory in England 1895-1900.
 - d. Armenian orphans sent to Canada in 1922-1944.
 - e. Jewish children brought into Canada by the Federated Jewish Farmers of Ontario 1942-1944, 1946-1948.
 - f. Jewish children from unoccupied France 1942-1948.
- 5. Immigrants to the U.S.A. and Canada from the British Isles and Europe.
- 6. Immigrants of Chinese ethnic origin arriving in Canada 1885-1949.
- 7. Immigrants from India, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka 1951-1965.
- 8. Polish engineers and technicians to assist with the war effort.

Not all the above listings have survived as originals. Many of the early arrivals came to unofficial ports where customs and other documents were not kept, but the people who arrived were listed in local newspapers.

There were other listings kept in more obscure places. I found a list of people who had left for America noted in an Irish census record. At the end of the family listings there was a notation of persons under the heading "Persons who emigrated to the United States since the last census".

Another source of information would be the listing of people who emigrated under settlement schemes. Many Irish and Scottish groups can be traced using the records of the settlement group, the congregation, or the employer. For example, Peter Robinson, a noted eastern Canadian, arranged for 415 families (2000 persons) to emigrate to Upper Canada from County Cork, Ireland. On arrival, they were granted lands and supplies. A copy of the passenger list of this group is in the Peterborough Library in Ontario.

Father Thomas Hore, of Wexford in England, sailed with 462 of his flock and settled in New Orleans. This passenger list has been preserved in the Louisiana State Library.

In April 1903, 2000 persons left on the ship "Lake Manitoba" on a settlement scheme promoted by the Rev. Isaac Barr and the Rev. George E. Lloyd. The final destination was Lloydminster, and this group, known as the Barr Colonists, is well documented.

The Scottish crofters, forced out from their lands to make room for sheep, in what has been described as the "Highland Clearances", sailed from many ports to Ireland, Europe, and the United States. While the actual passenger manifests may not have been preserved, some records of these groups have been kept in other forms.

Two other groups of Scottish travellers would be those who travelled to Manitoba from the British Isles under the Lord Selkirk Settlement Scheme in 1812. We are indebted to Charles Denney for a great deal of family history information, and we are very fortunate to have this information available at the Glenbow Museum and also in the Edmonton Branch Library. These papers contain much more information than could be found on a ship's manifest.

One employer that kept excellent records is the Hudson's Bay Company, which brought a large number of young Scotsmen to seek fame and fortune in Canada's north. While the ship's manifests are not available, the records of the company have been released to family researchers and are at the National Archives. They are available through inter-library loan with permission from the Hudson's Bay Company.

While most countries completely lost interest in those who emigrated, there are some lists surviving of people who left Europe. For example, the Commissioner of the Copenhagen Police compiled lists of Danish persons who emigrated, giving the names of the parishes from which they left and the names of the ships that carried them. The originals of these lists are in the Provincial Archives of Sealand, and copies are at the Danes Worldwide Archives in Alborg, Sweden, and at the L.D.S. Main Library.

LAWS AFFECTING SHIPS' PASSENGER LISTS

In 1855 the British Parliament passed the Passenger Act, requiring a ship's captain to keep two lists of passengers that he transported. The first list was to be given to the officer of customs at the point of departure, and the second to be given to the office of customs at the port of arrival. The second list had to be updated to include details of any births, deaths, and marriages that occurred during the voyage. The list left behind most often ended up in file 13, and the one that was supposed to be given to the customs at the point of arrival was only of use if the ship docked at an official port.

In the United States, there was an act of 1819 requiring the master of a ship entering an American port from a foreign port to file a list of passengers with the district collector of customs. A later act dated 1882 basically contained the same requirements.

STEAMSHIP ROUTES FROM EUROPE TO THE NEW WORLD

There were no established and official steamship routes between Europe and Canada prior to the turn of the century. Immigrants from other countries were required to transfer to British ships in order to come to Canada to the official ports of Quebec and Halifax. Only at these two ports was there a requirement to file the passenger list with the authorities. It is important to remember that persons from Europe may have sailed to England prior to coming to Canada.

SEARCHING SHIPS' PASSENGER LISTINGS

I would recommend that family history researchers follow first two steps of good genealogical research.

- 1. Home sources. Do your best to seek out snippets of information from the family at large. Name of ship, date of arrival, stories about the landing. Was it in a lifeboat? Did they go to England first? Did they go to New York first? Who came with them (scheme)? Are there any photographs of a lot of people other than the family? Were they given land on arrival? Etc., etc. All these or even one of these pieces of information may give a clue as to date or ship or port of arrival.
- 2. Printed and other sources. Take a look at what other people have done before spending hours and dollars on doing it yourself.

There are many books that will give valuable clues, for example, Lancour's Bibliography of Ships' Passenger Lists of Ships Coming to North America 1607-1825, and Wolfe's Bibliography of Ships' Passenger Lists 1538-1878. These two books give the names of the ships and where the records are and in what form they have survived. Gale's Passenger and Immigration Lists is a nominal index of 300,000 passengers whose arrival records are scattered among many sources. It gives names, dependants or relatives, ages, the date of arrival, the name of the ship, and the port of arrival. From a number next to the entry, you can locate details of the source and the location, which can lead you to a microfilm source for more details. Virkus' Compendium of American Genealogy, while not directly associated with ships, does give the name of the ships in which colonial families sailed (check the index of all seven volumes).

The most popular port in Europe was, of course, Hamburg, and every genealogist knows of the Hamburg passenger lists. While these lists are not complete, they do contain tens of thousands of names of immigrants and others on their way to the New World. The listings cover the years 1850-1934 and are in two sections:

- 1. The direct listings, or those passengers that came from Europe directly to a New World port. Only 15 years have been indexed, but all years are on microfilm and can be borrowed through the L.D.S. libraries. The indexes cover the years 1845-1871, and are known to be incomplete. Remember, when searching, check every possible spelling of the name.
- The indirect listings, or those passengers that sailed to one or more ports before leaving for the New World, the last port being Hamburg. These have not been indexed. They have been microfilmed, and the L.D.S. has copies. (There were no listings for the war years of 1914-1919.)

A well-known book is entitled 30,000 Names of German, Dutch, French, and Other Immigrants to Pennsylvania. There is a list of Emigrants from Scotland to America 1774-1775, a Directory of Scottish Settlers in North America 1625-1825, a List of Emigrants 1852-1857, and a book entitled Highland Scots of North Carolina 1732-1776. Of interest to Nova Scotians is a passenger list of the ships "Dove" and "Sarah" which sailed to Nova Scotia in 1801. This list is in the Archives of Nova Scotia and the L.D.S. has a copy. Prince Edward Island Archives has passenger lists of settlers in the province for the years 1775-1848 and 1855. There is a copy at the L.D.S. Library. There is a microfilmed record of Swedish passengers leaving from Oslo to America from April 1886-May 1897. From Ireland, there is a microfilmed copy of famine immigrants arriving at the port of New York 1846-1851, and another listing of passengers from Ireland 1811-1817. The French Ministry of the Interior has an alphabetized card index of Europeans travelling through Alsace, Colmar, and Strasbourg en route to the United States; these are on 5 microfilms and cover the period 1817-1866. The Antwerp Index lists individuals and groups migrating out of Central Europe from Germany, France, Switzerland, Italy, the Netherlands, and Belgium. The PAL-Index is a surname index of 18th-century immigrants to America from Alsace-Lorraine, Switzerland, and southern Germany. From Finland and Sweden, there are emigrant lists of persons leaving from the port of Malmo. From Great Britain, a microfiche called "The Planters of the Commonwealth" lists persons who lived at the Bay Colony and Boston. There is also a Topographical Dictionary of 2885 English Emigrants to New England 1620-Another index worth exploring is the Emigration Card Index of the L.D.S. Church 1840-1925.

Microfilm numbers of all these and many more emigration and immigration records from many parts of the world can be accessed by consulting the Family History Catalog at the L.D.S. Library. In every case, first select the country and then find the records under "Emigration and Immigration". Note the numbers and, if there is not a microfilm, complete the "Request for Microfilming" form.

INDEXING PROJECTS

Indexes of both Canadian and United States passenger lists have been carried out under the auspices of the National Archives in both countries. These are not complete, however, and the U.S. indexes are largely restricted to individual ports and are limited to certain years. Some are strictly

alphabetical, and some use the soundex system. In most cases these indexes, where complete, have been microfilmed, and most are available through the L.D.S. Library. Examples are: Baltimore 1820-1897 soundex index; New York 1820-1846, 1897-1902 index by name of ship, date of arrival and name of passengers; Philadelphia 1820-1822 passenger nominal index.

SEARCHING CANADA'S RECORDS

The Canadian National Archives have been involved in a vigorous acquisition program to acquire all available lists from as many sources as possible. They have been able to locate some of the departure lists in England and have copies of those. But in spite of these great efforts, nominal lists of persons arriving in Canada prior to 1865 are very sparse. Even in settled Quebec, very few lists have been located.

Fortunately for those in Edmonton, the Alberta Archives have copies of the microfilms and a finding aid to help researchers through the maze. All you need is time. There is no fast way to search the lists, and as they have been filmed by port of entry and then by date, you have to know the name of the ship as well as the port of entry. If you do not have this information, you will have to look at every entry on every microfilm.

In searching for a passenger list, persistence and patience are the two most useful tools. Good luck.

A.G.S. MEMBER RECEIVES MEDAL


On May 17 in Calgary, Lucille Dougherty (A.G.S. #2242) received the Medal of Honor of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She is the first non-American to win the award, which is limited to people who can trace their ancestry back to someone who fought against the British during the American Revolution. It was an ancestor on her mother's side, George Wilderman, who fought for American independence.

The award was given in recognition of Mrs. Dougherty's extensive community service, such as her three terms as mayor of High River, her role in starting Marigold Library System, her work as a registered nurse and a head librarian, and her participation in several boards and committees. Former recipients include a mayor of San Francisco, a lieutenant-general in the U.S. Air Force, and the singer Kate Smith.

The Daughters of the American Revolution is a service club whose main interests are historical preservation, and assistance to war veterans and native Indians. There are 39 members in the Calgary chapter; past projects have included raising money for the Colonel Belcher Hospital and lunch programs at local schools.

NEW ENGLAND GENEALOGY

--By Phillip P. Thorpe, CG(C), A.G.S. #1016

The following notes were prepared for an introductory course to members of the Alberta Family Histories Society.

England includes Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island. New York isolates New England from all other continental American states, and Canada bounds New York and Vermont at the 45th parallel, although almost two-thirds of Maine lies north of it.


WHAT TO EXPECT IN NEW ENGLAND RESEARCH

Big surprises and disappointments are common during our genealogical research. Several things about New England help to reduce our disappointments.

- 1. Much has already been done. New England being the settlement place for many of our pioneer ancestors, we are not the first to research here. History, family history, and genealogy have been actively researched throughout New England. A great number of books and articles have been published, and other secondary sources created. I suspect very few early New England families are missing in the Salt Lake collection of Family Group Records. Likewise, published books on these families exist in abundance in libraries throughout New England and the entire United States, in family history libraries here and in Salt Lake, in most of the Calgary libraries, and even in my own library.
- We have local access to it. Besides the collection of "where and how to" references, our libraries now have many secondary sources--passenger lists, marriage record lists, genealogies, diaries, histories, and other vital records. Many of genealogies follow our immigrant ancestors back to the country, usually England. Even if they were not passengers from the famous Mayflower in 1620, their origins may still be well Their records have been preserved in many books microfilm copies. Primary records will often exist microfilms, which can be viewed at most L.D.S. Family History Libraries by ordering them from Salt Lake. A personal visit to the new Salt Lake Family History Library will often be rewarded by the discovery of genealogies, histories, and other books which may not exist here. The A.F.H.S. tours to Salt Lake City are great.
- 3. More is being done all the time. Many references in the lists, and indeed many of my books, were printed or reprinted since 1980. The reprinting of materials from the New England Historical Genealogical Register gave us access to research efforts conducted throughout the past century. Two series of three volumes each on English Origins of New England Families and on the Genealogies of Mayflower Families were very welcome. Scholars throughout North America are researching many historical events. Research into early family life and other social behaviours is almost like our genealogical research. The fact that many of the same resources are required leads to a demand for their preservation, availability, and distribution. We will all benefit when primary data and more thoroughly-researched

secondary resources are disseminated into available repositories. An example of scholarly research was presented in a series of maps on "The Making of America" in recent issues of the National Geographic. The 14th in a series of 17 maps was on New England, and appeared in Vol.171 No.2, February 1987. A one-sheet folded map is loaded with historical data. On the back, smaller maps feature six historical time periods, each with conflict areas, settlement and migrations, and political and industrial activities recorded.

We are part of the process. The demand for books resources and reproduction of the resources themselves encourages their dissemination. We fuel the demand and also contribute to their supply. Our membership in many historical and genealogical societies serves both ends. For example, belonging to the Connecticut Genealogical Society and other New England groups keeps us aware of the development of new resources and the reprinting of others. These societies also promote the writing of new genealogies and conference papers. Even the process of genealogical queries creates an exchange of data which satisfies specific supply-and-demand process. The publications of all societies provide opportunities to contribute genealogies. For this reason, we can also expect to find family data almost anywhere. Most of my Canadian ancestor families arrived from New England in 1760. They were New England Planters who obtained free land grants in Nova Scotia. In less than a generation;, they were followed by an even larger migration of New England and other Loyalists. It is almost impossible to research any Canadian Maritime family without tracing one or many lines back to New England. Hence, any research on a New England ancestor should include a review of our Maritime genealogies and other Canadian resources.

COMMUNITIES IN ALBERTA: GRIFFIN CREEK - BROWNVALE

--Submitted by Flora Stewart, A.G.S. #981
From <u>Brick's Hill</u>, <u>Berwyn</u>, <u>and Beyond</u>, <u>A History of Berwyn and District</u>, published by the Berwyn Centennial Committee, 1968.

Mr. T. Griffin and sons left Seattle for Alberta in 1903. The following spring they squatted on land near a little creek called Cold Springs. Later it was named Griffin Creek. The first postal service was provided by Dad Griffin until 1908, when Mrs. Bessie Eaton became postmistress of the new Griffin Creek Post Office. Surveying of homestead land began in 1908, and Mrs. Eaton was the first woman to file on land. When the Harris family came in 1912, there were enough children and the Griffin School District No. 2788 was formed.

The first Anglican Church service was held in 1914 in the hall, and in 1915 land for a church was purchased from Ed Laverington. The building was a community effort by all poeple, regardless of faith. The pioneers who helped with the building were: Hans Lind, Wes Hirtzel, Art Dixon, Charlie Gibbs, and Bill Evans. On September 15, 1915, All Saints Anglican Church at Griffin Creek was dedicated. The first recorded burial at Griffin Creek was Donald William McNab, who was found frozen to death January 20, 1919. In June 1919, Neil McNab donated land for a cemetery where many pioneers of the district are buried.

With the coming of the railroad and the establishment of towns, the small district post offices were no longer necessary. Griffin Creek Post Office closed in 1927.

The early history of Brownvale is the story of Griffin Creek, for here prior to 1926 much of the population was centred. John Brown came in 1913, following others: Bert Iverson, Tom Rowe, Dave Wilson, William Roberts, Tom Gilchrist, Ole Strathmoen, William Piper, and Eric Lindquist. In 1924 the railroad went as far west as Whitelaw, and Brownvale was created to satisfy an intermediate centre. John Brown was the owner of the homestead chosen as the site of the new hamlet, and the name "Brownvale" was chosen in honour of the former landowner.
