MESSAGE

Some exciting developments are happening in the Alberta Genealogical Society. The Tri-Group Committee, Peter Goutbeck (A.G.S. Chairman), along with Branch Presidents, have completed the proposed five-year plan for funding from the Alberta Historical Resources Foundation. The plan includes a proposal for a joint business office with the A.G.S., the Archaeological Society of Alberta, and the Historical Society of Alberta. On behalf of all the members of the A.G.S., we thank you for the many hours of work spent on your presentation. It looks good!

We'd like to welcome Frances Siemens as the new Chairman of the Ancestor Index. Please send submissions to her at the Society address. Thank you, Frances, for volunteering.

Speaking of volunteers.... The Society is still in need of a Publications Chairman. The publications departments are already in place, so that the job of the Chairman would be only to answer queries about A.G.S. publications, and to call and chair meetings. Another chairman is also required for the Genealogical Research Committee. The main duties are to answer letters of enquiry on Alberta research, mainly in the Edmonton area, and to direct enquiries to the relevant branches. The A.G.S. covers all expenses for these committees.

Another exciting event last month was that I was invited by Marcel Masse, Federal Minister of Communications, to take part in a conference in Edmonton, "Heritage in the 1990's: Towards a Government of Canada Strategy". The conference focus was on three fundamental questions:

What does Canada's heritage represent and encompass?

What are the responsibilities and role of the Government of Canada in terms of heritage?

What is the role of the general public, heritage or tourism associations, and the private sector?

Approximately 225 representatives from across Canada participated in the conference in all areas of heritage: oral, written, built, performed (i.e. the arts), and natural. The emphasis was on our strengths — education, partners and linkage, networking, security, and above all, what is truly a Canadian Heritage. The Chairman of the plenary session has invited submissions from participants, so please let me know if there is some area of genealogy that you feel has a place in our Canadian Heritage, and I will send in our submission.

The Canadian Federation of Genealogical and Family History Societies, Inc., has just launched the four-generation Canadian Federation Ancestral File. An index will be made containing the names, dates, and places of residence, which will show us the trails that our ancestors took. THE LOXTON ONE-NAME REUNION

A unique family reunion was held in Lethbridge on August 2nd and 3rd, 1990, when approximately 100 people gathered from six countries -- England, Wales, Australia, South Africa, the U.S.A., and Canada. Their common connection was the name "Loxton". The Domesday Book (made by order of William the Conqueror and completed just before 1090) recorded the name "Lockestone" in Somerset, England. Nine hundred years later, through family history research, Nelda Loxton Bullock was able to unite many Lockestone (now spelled "Loxton") families to relatives hereto unknown.

In 1980 Nelda and her husband Lee had attended a reunion in Loxton, Somerset, where she hoped to find her father's family. He was George Loxton of Priddy, Somerset, who had come to Canada in 1902 with a married brother John and family. He had lost contact with all of his relatives including his mother, sister, and brother, and had spent 78 years trying to find them. Nelda found a magazine ad from a woman living in Loxton, Australia, seeking pen pals. The answer to a letter that Nelda wrote to the Loxton Postmaster in 1976 led her to Sam Loxton, who was also doing research. He held a Loxton reunion in Loxton, England in 1980, where Nelda met 300 Loxtons from seven countries, but was unable to find her father's family.

In 1988 she travelled to Australia, where she visited Sam and his wife Phyl. Sam was in a wheelchair and spoke very little due to a stroke, but encouraged her to continue the research of the Loxton families throughout the world. Nelda spent many hours researching records and telephone directories, and travelling throughout Canada, the U.S.A., and Great Britain. For the last two years her time was devoted to preparing for the Loxton reunion. A month before the reunion, Nelda was able to make a family connection to Trevor and Amy Guppy of Queensland, Australia, who in turn were able to establish relationship to Mervyn, Sam's brother, and Rhonda Loxton of Victor Harbor, near Adelaide. These people met each other for the first time at the Lethbridge reunion. Their common ancestors were from the Wells area of Somerset in the year 1753.

Many family histories and traditions were shared at the reunion, and it was thrilling to learn about the lives of newly-discovered family members. Many of the stories were happy, but some were told of earlier relatives being taken from their families, because of some minor misdeed, and sent to America, Tasmania, and Australia in the early 1800's.

One of the highlights was that 85-year-old Susan Loxton Clines of San Antonio, Texas, came to the reunion. Her father, Joseph Loxton of Wells, ran away from home at the age of 14 years

and went to Texas, where he married Minerva Slaughter, niece of the famous John Slaughter, sheriff of Tombstone, Arizona. It was a momentous occasion when the cousins from Wales, England, and Canada met Susan, and Susan herself met members of her father's family for the first time. The cousins told stories about Uncle Joseph and of his mother keeping a light in the window in case her son returned.

Pedigree charts, certificates, family group sheets, personal family histories, pictures, and research books were displayed around the hall. To the surprise of many attending, they discovered relationship to each other, some living only a few states or provinces apart. One marriage certificate proved to John Loxton of Port Huron and Shirley Loxton Kennison of Arizona that they were related not only to each other, but to other cousins living in Powasson, Ontario.

Cynthia Loxton Pohlman of East London, South Africa, arrived in Lethbridge July 3rd to learn that Nelda had researched her family in England and South Africa. At the reunion Cynthia met John Loxton, his wife Claire, and grandson Duncan of Taunton, Somerset, who shared the same ancestor -- Samuel Loxton, who had gone to South Africa in 1825.

Nelda introduced the Aussies to a pancake breakfast, something they had never had before. An Australian pancake is much like a crepe and is used only as a snack for lunch and tea. All those present spoke English, but it was interesting to note that often information and instructions were misunderstood and led to many hilarious situations. Boots and bonnets are not always clothing. Trevor Guppy, who owns a 6000-acre "station" in Queensland and raises Brahma cattle, was interested to find that in Lethbridge Brahmas are for riding and not for eating as they are in Australia. Those attending fro the Southern Hemisphere were met with love and warmth, but were unprepared for the Canadian hot weather.

Much of the two-day reunion was spent going through films and records in the L.D.S. Family History Center seeking ancestors. Many were delighted in making new family connections and all have gone away with renewed enthusiasm to keep their families in closer contact. The reunion of this group of Loxtons proved to Nelda that "Families are Forever", and all are awaiting another reunion in 1995 to further expand their family trees.

SUCCESS IN EASTERN EUROPE

Reprinted from "Generations", Vol. No.2, June 1990.

One of the biggest obstacles to East European research is the lack of confidence that success can be had. Hopefully, the following stories will begin to break this barrier.

1985, Brian Lenius has had success from two Roman Catholic Diocese Archives in Poland. These archives are located in Lubaczow and Przemysl. The addresses and initial letters were kindly sent by the late Josef Wittman of Winnipeg. Although Brian's grandfather and Joe were both born in Muenchenthal (Muzylowice), Galizien (Galicia), Austria (now in the Ukraine), Brian and Joe had not met until 1985. Since then, Brian has written many times to these archives in English (replies have in Polish) and received literally hundreds of birth, marriage, and death records. Records from these church archives have been augmented with church records on microfilms at L.D.S. on these particular microfilms were not Most of the records available at the church archives in Poland. There are a couple of keys to success in dealing with Polish archives. First, be sure to write to the correct archive by knowing your facts. One must know the correct religion, geographic village / district place names, and church parish / diocese names. Secondly, ask for specific records and include money and I.R.C.'s in a double registered letter. Unexpected gifts sent at Christmas create feelings of good will.

Since April, 1989, Sandra Zuk has written five letters received five responses from the pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Radom, Poland. All the of the responses were successful, resulting in between five and eight birth, marriage, and death records in each package. The records received to date have been either typed transcripts from the church records or actual photocopies from the registers. From 1830 to 1868 the records are in Polish, and from 1868 to 1885 the records are in Russian Cyrillic. The Russian records are always photocopies rather than transcripts. The pastor of the church does not read or write English, so all communication must be in German Sandra attributes the success to asking for a small Polish. number of items and sending a money order (\$20.00 in U.S. funds might be recommended) in each letter. She has used the Polish letter-writing guide at L.D.S. as a basis of her letters, but has found it necessary to have someone fluent in the language to add and change them. Sandra also feels that sending greeting cards helps to develop a friendship.

It is hoped that researchers in East European genealogy will gain some encouragement from the two above accounts. If you have been successful in researching other Eastern European countries, why not write a short account telling the secrets of your success?

POLISH GENEALOGY AND HERALDRY SOCIETY

The following item was received from "Towarzystwo Genealogiczno-Heraldyczne Societas Genealogica ac Heraldica" of Poznan, Poland.

The Genealogical-Heraldic Society in Poznan, the first organization of this kind in Poland, was founded in 1987 by a group of scholars and amateurs interested in genealogy and heraldry. The time was not ripe yet for that kind of activity, as the Communist authorities still considered these areas of research to be "improper". Nevertheless we continued our work and gradually our membership grew, our monthly meetings became regular, and we established contacts with many foreign organizations of similar kind.

The aims of the Society include on one hand popularization of genealogical and heraldic knowledge among amateurs, so that their research is based on sound scholarly foundations; and on the other hand starting and coordinating research projects of more general importance, such as compiling inventories of archival sources and bibliographies, indexing vital registers, building up a library collection, etc. The Society does not offer any research services.

Poland has no tradition of amateur genealogy and therefore the work to be done is considerable. This obviously requires funds that are not available from the state, while the membership fees hardly cover the basic costs of copying and mailing information sheets to members. All the administrative work, lectures, and articles are contributed by members on a voluntary basis. We are, therefore, looking for sponsors who could help us raise funds for publishing. A private person has made it possible for to publish the first two issues of our quarterly, GENS, but more is needed for the work to continue.

We would also be grateful for any donations of genealogical or heraldic books and periodicals from other countries, so that our library collection might form a nucleus for a future centre of genealogical-heraldic research in Poland.

It is only now that we can accept foreign members. Members receive information sheets every 2-3 months about current events, new publications, etc., and copies of our "Genealogical Data Bank" which lists surnames researched by other members and is updated semi-annually. Both of these publications may be issued also in English versions for foreign members when there are enough of them. Each member can enter any number of surnames to be included in the "Genealogical Data Bank", the aim of which is to establish contacts between people researching the same families or areas.

Members can also subscribe to the quarterly magazine <u>GENS</u> and contribute articles. The articles are in Polish with short summaries in English. The quarterly is available for members only (or through publication exchange).

The following are examples of English summaries of articles appearing in the first two issues of <u>GENS</u>.

"Dr. Conrad Swan (Swiecicki) -- Polish Herald in the College of Arms"

The article is based on the genealogical and heraldic information supplied by Dr. Swan, the York Herald of Arms, who is an honorary member of the Genealogical-Heraldic Society. He comes from the Polish Swiecicki family of the arms Jastrzebiec. His great-grandmother emigrated from Lithuania to British Columbia, Canada, in 1884, as a widow with seven children. Dr. Swan has retained his hereditary coat of arms with addition of the bordure so that it conforms with the rules of British heraldry.

"Joint Work -- Joint Advantages" -- By Rafal T. Prinke (President)

The introductory article describes the advantages of organized work in genealogical societies and gives examples from other countries. Two long-term projects are announced: compilation of an inventory of vital records for Poland and of a bibliography of Polish genealogy. The former requires gathering information on those records which are still kept in parochial archives or were relocated to foreign archives (Germany and the USSR), or even found their way to private collections. The latter project needs especially the bibliographical data on the items which are not primarily genealogical but still contain pedigrees or source materials, as well as those remaining in manuscript or privately published in small editions. All members and other interested people are invited to send in such information which will then be input into a computer database.

"The So-called 'Dutch Settlers' in Greater Poland"
--By Zdzislaw Pentek

From the 16th century onwards, immigrants from the Netherlands settled in Poland. First they were Mennonite exiles, but soon the term "Dutch settlers" became generic for other groups, sometimes also Poles, who were free peasants that signed an agreement with the land owner. At the end of the 18th century they gradually merged with the Polish community.

The order form describes the publication as a "Surname Registry", so that prospective customers should be alert to the fact that it is not a family history. PROVINCIAL ARCHIVES HOURS OF OPERATION

--From a bulletin of Alberta Culture and Multiculturalism

The Provincial Archives of Alberta is making several changes to the hours it is open for public research. The changes come as a result of increased use of voluntary assistance to staff the reference areas, allowing the Archives to expand its extended-hours programme, while increased demands on the time of regular staff make it necessary to reduce regular hours of opening.

For some years, the Archives has been open on Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings, the latter with the assistance of a team of volunteers. Now, with the excellent co-operation of the Edmonton Chapter of the Alberta Genealogical Society and its members, the Archives has tripled its number of volunteers in order to remain open on Tuesday evenings and all day Saturdays. During these new hours of opening the Archives will provide limited service; all requests for material should be made prior to 3 p.m. on Tuesday or Friday, for use Tuesday evening or Saturday.

The increase in extended hours was implemented because staff constraints and increasing workloads were making the provision of regular reference services more and more difficult. In an effort to maintain a reasonable level of activity in all of the Archives' operation, the reference room will be closed to researchers on Mondays. Telephone requests will continue to be accepted. The Archives hopes that the addition of another evening and full day opening on Saturday will more than compensate for the reduction in regular hours.

New hours are therefore: Tuesday and Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

FOOTHILLS PIONEER INDEX

The Foothills Pioneer Index, begun in January 1990, is an attempt to gather as many references as possible to the pioneers of the Foothills area before 1920, and currently contains references to 3000 persons. Information is indexed from published sources, as well as census, cemetery, and vital records. The district involved extends north to Calgary, south to Nanton, west to the slopes of the Rocky Mountains, and east to Highway 23. The main communities were Midnapore, Fish Creek, Okotoks, DeWinton, Priddis, Blackie, Milarville, Black Diamond, Turner Valley, High River, Brant, Cayley, Longview, and Nanton.

The first white residents of the area were traders and In the 1870's, the High River area was home to trappers. numerous whiskey forts, whose occupants traded liquor with the With the arrival of the N.W.M.P. in 1874, these local Indians. whiskey forts disappeared, but the potential of the land had been discovered. By the early 1880's, enterprising individuals were bringing large herds of cattle north from the U.S. to the vast grasslands of the Foothills District. They established an industry which remains predominant in the area to this day. Coal mining and logging started in the 1890's, followed by the discovery of oil shortly after the turn of the century. leading to another well-known Alberta industry. The fertile land was ideal for grain farming. Homesteaders flooded into the area from the late 1890's and continued to arrive until after the First World War. The majority of pioneers came from Eastern Canada, Scotland, England, Ireland, and the Midwestern and Western United States.

The Federation of Family History Societies held a council meeting on 1 April 1990, and the minutes record several points of interest to family historians.

White Paper

In a White Paper, the British government has expressed the intention of relocating the certificate printing service from London to Southport in June 1991, while retaining the search room in London. As a result of the separation of ordering and printing facilites, the delay in issuing a certificate would rise from 48 hours to 4 working days. There is no intention of operating a collection facility in Southport.

The White Paper also proposes to privatize records which are over 75 years old, possibly by turning them over to commercial organizations. Another possibility is that a group of interested parties from a charitable consortium which would run the service. Genealogists are concerned about the escalation in costs that privatization could engender.

Charges by Record Offices

The practice of employing professional researchers by record offices and the consequent charges to family historians was discussed. Rates vary from about 7 pounds per hour in Suffolk to 23 pounds per hour in Kent, with an average of about 11 pounds per hour. The office at Maidstone, Kent, also charges overseas visitors ten pounds a day for access to the records. While this may deter frivolous requests, it may also deter people from depositing material if access charges are made.

Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill

The British government's Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill does not allow for indication on a birth certificate when genetic parentage was different from legal parentage, or for access to information. Lord Teviot tried to introduce amendments allowing children of different genetic and legal parentage and their descendants the same right to information as adopted children. Similarly, the Society of Genealogists attempted to introduce amendments that such children should be given access to full information about their genetic parentage and that there be an indication on the birth certificate that genetic parentage was different from legal parentage.

Vol.6 No.4 (December 1989) has numerous articles relating to children, schools, and immigration. He writes: "My interest stems from the fact that having, after retiring some years ago, traced lines from my one French Canadian grandparent back to a group of 1590-1650 immigrants--and in a few cases into France--I found the hobby interesting and did the same for some cousins and for as many of my French Canadian neighbours as have shown interest.

"Having relatively easy access to two good libraries and to the Montreal branch of the Quebec Archives I would enjoy helping those with less ready access to such sources."

He adds: "Based on experience I should emphasize one point. This is strictly a hobby which I enjoy, the cost of which is insignificant. I do not and will not accept money from anyone since to do so would detract from the enjoyment I derive from trying to help."

RESEARCH TIPS

Ruth Hanna-Fath, A.G.S. #536, reports that the Vesterheim Genealogical Center at 4909 Sherwood Road, Madison, Wisconsin 53711, has copies of all the available Hordaland Church records of Voss, Norway. It also has the Koshhonong Church records of Dane County, Wisconsin. The Hordaland Church records (Udflyttede Section) show some families leaving for America in 1844, and New York ships' passenger lists for 1844 record the landing of the ship "Kong Sverre" on 2 August 1844.

The staff of the Center provides good research work at \$12.00 per hour for non-members, and they are very good on early Norwegian emigrants. The State Historical Society of Wisconsin at 816 State Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53706 is also very helpful for Wisconsin research.

Lucille Griffiths, O.G.S. #7298, reports in the Kingston Branch O.G.S. "Newsletter" Vol.17 No.4 that the Allen County Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has the second-largest genealogical collection the the United States. The Library will hardcover family histories with the author's permission, give the donor one copy, and retain a copy for their genealogical library. Campers may stay at the nearby Johnny Appleseed Park while researching at the Library.

NEW ANGLICAN RECORD GUIDE

Generation Press has just published <u>Guide to the Holdings of the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario</u>. It outlines records held by the seven Anglican dioceses in Ontario -- Algoma, Huron, Moosonee, Niagara, Ontario, Ottawa, and Toronto -- and also details several special collections held in the General Synod Archives of the Church and in Trinity and Wycliffe Colleges in Toronto. The guide outlines accessible records, parish by parish; has maps illustrating diocesan boundaries; indexes place names, clerical and church staff; has two glossaries; and includes short biographies of individuals prominent in diocesan history for which significant collections of papers exist at each archives.

The book is designed to assist genealogists, diocesan and church archivists, staff members of the Anglican Church, academics, historians, reference and regional librarians, archivists, and the general public. It was published with aid of a grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, and is the second of a planned five-volume series. The first volume is <u>Guide to the Holdings of the Archives of Rupert's Land</u>, published in 1986, which covers most of Northern Canada. Additional volumes are planned to outline Anglican records in Eastern and Western Canada, and possibly a volume for General Synod Archive holding.

The current volume was a three-year project coordinated by the seven diocesan archivists and a representative from the General Synod Archives. Two project archivists travelled to each of the dioceses involved and spent from a week to several months, depending on the size of the diocese. The material was then entered into a computer, so that there is now a computer index of all Anglican archival records which will be kept up to date regularly.



REVIEWS

OF BOOKS DONATED TO THE A.G.S. LIBRARY





Births, Deaths, Marriages from Regina Newspapers, 1883-1889
Published by the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 1894, Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada S4P 3E1. Price \$15.00 plus \$2.00 postage.

The book compiled by Laura Hanowski and John Morley contains abstracts from the Regina Leader from 1 March 1883 and Regina Journal from 6 October 1886 to 25 December 1889. These newspapers are on microfilm at the Saskatchewan Archives in Regina and the Regina Public Library and are available through inter-library loan. The abstracts are arranged alphabetically by surname and cover communities from the Lakehead to British Columbia. Truly an important tool for early Western Canadian research.

Kinship

By Jackie Smith Arnold, 1990. Genealogical Publishing Company, Inc., 1001 N. Calvert Street, Baltimore, Maryland 21202. Price \$6.95.

<u>Kinship</u> explains why blood relationships are of great importance to your family, who is next-of-kin, and why some relatives are more distant. This small book effectively answers your questions of relationships in your family and includes charts and diagrams to aid in your research and record-keeping. It deserves a place on your reference shelf.

Scottish Family History

By David Moody, 1990. Genealogical Publishing Company, Inc. Price \$19.95.

David Moody suggests a broader search of Scottish families by examining the historical context at a local level, where it affected the daily lives of people. At the very beginning of the book he discusses the different sources to be searched for biography. The working lives of the Scottish people and demographic records are shown, as well as the development of "Kin Clan, and Community". Culture, beliefs, and development of church and state are related to social welfare, local politics, and law. There is a large section on notes and further reading which proves very helpful and an indispensable reference list.

Scottish researchers will appreciate the depth and scope of this book in their work.

Whyte, Donald. <u>Dictionary of Scottish Emigrants to Canada before Confederation</u>. Toronto, ON: O.G.S., 1989. 443pp., biblio. (971.0049 WHY)

This dictionary is a major contribution to the documentation of Canadian immigration before confederation. The Scots--Canada's third-largest ethnic group--were vigorous in every field of endeavour and contributed much to the making of a transcontinental nation. They ranged from explorers, fur traders, farmers, preachers, merchants, etc.

Founders and Patriots of America Index. Baltimore, MD: Gen. Pub. Co., 1975. 225 pp., indexed. (971.01 FOU)

The index of Founders and Patriots of America gives the birth, death, and marriage date of each Founder or Patriot, the name of his wife, and the state in which the area was located. A Founder arrived in one of the colonies between 13 May 1607 and 13 May 1687. A Patriot gave military or civil service in establishing the American Independence in the period of 1775 to 1784.

Holder, Jean M. <u>Baptisms</u>, <u>Marriages and Burials 1749-1768</u>, St. <u>Paul's Church</u>, <u>Halifax</u>, <u>Nova Scotia</u>. Nova Scotia: Royal Nova Scotia Historical Soc., 1983. 180pp., indexed. (971.6 HOL)

Barnes, Robert W. <u>Baltimore County Families</u>, 1659-1759. Baltimore, MD: Gen. Pub. Co., 1989. 924pp., indexed, biblio. (975.271 BAR)

This is the story of hundreds of families who settled along the banks of the Patapsco, Gunpowder, and Susquehanna rivers during the first hundred years of this county's existence. Originally the county embraced present-day Anne Arundel, Carroll, Harford, and Cecil counties. The earliest settlements were along the waterways, but as the 17th century gave way to the 18th, estates were sited farther inland.

- j) To encourage the establishment of Branches of the Society under such terms and conditions as the by-laws of the Society may from time to time provide;
- k) To achieve the foregoing objects, funds may be raised and donations, gifts, legacies and beguests accepted.
- 3 The operations of the Society are to be carried out chiefly in the Province of Alberta.
