#### A SEARCH FOR A MCCLOY FAMILY IN IRELAND

A few years ago, I decided to record for my family and relatives what I knew of the McCloys in Ireland, for none of them knew much about their Irish background. In my father's later years I had questioned him about his father's brother and sisters, but his memory had so failed by that time that his information was often confused and unreliable. Later I began to realize that what I had written contained so many errors that I ought to do something better, and that more research was needed.

I was fortunate in that, although Grandfather Thomas McCloy had left Ireland over a hundred years ago, contact with it had never been completely lost, for I was still in touch with some of Grandmother McCloy's people, the Raineys. Father was nine when they left Ireland, but when he served in South Africa in the Boer War and was invalided out of active service, he was allowed to go to Ireland to recuperate. There he stayed with relatives, with some of whom he was still in touch when I went to Britain in World War II. He gave me names and addresses, and I was able to visit my relatives in Northern Ireland and to establish warm relations with them. At that time two of Father's cousins were still living and could have told me much, but unfortunately I was not interested in family history then, and now there is no one to whom I can go for information. Indeed, I thought the McCloy connection had vanished completely from Ireland, but I was wrong.

In 1985 my wife and I visited Britain and spent a few days in Ireland. We visited the only relatives of whom I then knew, who were younger members of the Rainey family and knew nothing of the McCloys in Ireland.

I went back in 1988, this time with the intention of spending a week on research. I went to the Public Record Office (PRO) in Belfast, and there they had a microfilm of the two earliest registers of the First Presbyterian Church of Kilrea, the McCloys' church. There I found that my great-grandfather, John McCloy, son of John McCloy and Martha Gilmore, had married Nancy Woods, daughter of Thomas Woods and Mary McMullan, in February 1843. The registers also record the birth and baptismal dates of most of their children. Unfortunately, Presbyterian churches of that period rarely recorded burials, and none were recorded here. The marriage of John's brother James is not recorded (he was probably married at his wife's church), but the baptisms of most of his children are. At this time I also found John's will, which gave the date of his death, 16 February 1895, and some valuable information about his family.

The information I had found enabled me to put Father's contribution into better perspective, and I could see several leads worth following up. I decided to make another trip in 1989, this time solely for research purposes. I went back to my excellent bed and breakfast (Pearl Court House, 11 Malone Road, Belfast) in a pleasant spot near Queen's University and half an hour's walk from the PRO.

Research in counties Londonderry and Antrim requires at least a little knowledge of the history of the area. Around 1600 the English Crown seized

most of the land held by the Irish chieftains and gave it out in grants to These were to bring the areas under English organizations and individuals. control by displacing most of the local Irish with settlers loyal to the English Crown. Most of the land around Kilrea was granted to the Worshipful Company of Mercers of London (the Mercers Company), which brought in Scottish settlers who became tenants of the Company. It is likely that the McCloys, who came from Arran, arrived at this time. The tenant system persisted until the 1880's, when the land was sold into private ownership. The PRO holds scattered records of the Company, and in them I found references to my great-The most important of these was a letter grandfather, John McCloy. recommending that "John McCloy the Builder" be awarded a contract to build schools at Swattragh, as his previous work had been very satisfactory. Other references show that he did repair and general maintenance work on the Company's buildings and properties. Father had told me that his grandfather These references had been a builder and contractor as well as a farmer. confirm that.

According to Father, Great-grandfather's farm had been on the west side of the River Bann, three or four miles north of Kilrea. This placed it in the townland of Tamlaght. I checked the Griffith's Valuation Map for that area and found the exact location, size, and shape of the farm. His brother James' farm is also shown.

The church registers had told me that James' daughter Martha had married Thomas Adams of Carnroe, the townland adjacent to Tamlaght to the north. I searched for and found Thomas Adams' will as well as several other Adams wills, and from these obtained useful family information, and learned that the farm was still in the hands of descendants. Another will that I found was that of a Florence McCloy, whom I knew to belong somewhere in the connection. She named as her executor James Pollock of Kilrea, who was married to a daughter of a cousin.

In Belfast I also visited the General Register Office, which holds the official records of births, marriages, and deaths. A few weeks before leaving Canada I had applied for permission to do research in these, and received a reply that demand is so great that they were booked up six months ahead, but that they had a cancelled time which they could offer me if I accepted I was able to do so. The local L.D.S. genealogical library immediately. holds microfilm copies of the indexes to the earlier records, and before leaving home I had checked these for names of possible interest to me. When I arrived, I was assigned a member of their staff to work with me, and I soon realized why. The indexes were compiled in Dublin and cover all Ireland. When the Northern Ireland records were moved to Belfast, they were organized somewhat differently, and the references are no longer completely valid though Moreover, for each registration district there are they are helpful. quarterly (in the earlier years, annual) volumes for each type of record (births, marriages, and deaths) -- that is, twelve volumes for each years, and the number of volumes must run into the thousands. Also, to complicate matters, registration districts do sometimes change. I really was not prepared for all this, but my assistant was patient and very helpful and I did get useful information.

My next step was to go to Kilrea to follow my leads there. By a fortunate chance I had arranged to stay in the Mercers Arms, which proved to have once been the headquarters of the Mercers Company in Ireland, a building

on which my great-grandfather had done maintenance work and probably alterations. The proprietor was Mr. Pat O'Neill, who could not have been more kind and helpful. The building itself is interesting and retains the old courtyard into which the coaches were driven and the stables which housed the horses.

I immediately got in touch with Mrs. James Pollock, and indeed she was related to Florence McCloy and both of them were descendants of James McCloy. Florence's father, Andrew McCloy, was the youngest brother of March McCloy Adams, who was Mrs. Pollock's grandmother. From the one will I had identified the Andrew McCloy family and found Martha McCloys' descendants. Later I visited the Adams farm at Carnroe. Only Mrs. James Adams, the widowed mother of the present farmer, was at home, but she was very helpful about that branch of Martha's descendants and later even went to the cemetery at Moneydig to copy tombstone inscriptions for me.

I had not previously known of the church at Moneydig and regret I was unable to visit it, for most of Martha's descendants are buried there. I think there may be other small cemeteries around Kilrea which I should look for. All the Andrew McCloy family are buried at Ahoghill, which is not nearby and which I could not visit. I did go to the First Presbyterian Church of Kilrea and there I found the grave of my great-great-grandfather, John McCloy, who died at Tamlaght on 5 January 1860, aged 83. Buried beside him is a granddaughter. Strangely, I could not find any other McCloy graves there, and the General Register Office records do not include places of burial.

I also visited the incumbent minister of the church. He kindly read to me McCloy entries from the church registers, giving me some useful dates, but he did not let me examine the registers myself, and I do not know what I may have missed.

Everything considered, I feel the trip was very successful. I found relatives where I thought I had none. I can now give my family a reliable picture of who our Irish ancestors were and who our Irish relatives are. But I still hope to learn more.

#### IRISH MARRIAGE RECORDS

The best source for a marriage record in Ireland prior to compulsory registration in 1845 is parish registers. The relevant registers, however, are difficult to locate, as brides were often married in their home parish, and most of the original registers deposited for safekeeping in the P.R.O. in Dublin were destroyed by fire in 1922. An estimated two-thirds of the Church of Ireland registers were lost.

Registers of the Catholic Church, Church of Ireland, and Society of Friends that had been kept in local custody still survive. Also, some manuscripts made prior to 1922, as well as wills, deeds, and newspaper notices are additional sources which help to replace the lost marriage records.

Marriage licence bonds which exist for Anglican marriages are another important source. More than one million marriage bonds from 1623 to the 1860's survive. However, an Irish Research Group (of the Ottawa Branch) member, studying a predominantly Protestant family, found the bonds contained only about three percent of the marriages which probably took place between 1660 and 1845.

Most of the bonds no longer exist, but indexes, arranged by diocese, not county, and some abstracts survive. The indexes give the names of each couple and years of marriage. Abstracts usually contain more detail.

The legal age of marriage in Ireland was 14 for the groom and 12 for the bride. It was not until 1844 that consent was needed from the parents or guardian. A person was not considered to be of full age, however, until 21.

#### Note

Be sure to check each diocese fully. In at least six instances, additional material was listed. For example, within the Diocese of Kildare records, there is the Methodist Register for County Down 1815-1849, which has interesting social notes; and within the Diocese of Armagh records, almost half the listings are death notices.

#### **Accessibility**

The indexes to marriage licence bonds are located in the P.R.O. Dublin. All existing marriage licence indexes and abstracts were microfilmed by the L.D.S. Genealogical Department.

#### THE PETWORTH EMIGRATION SCHEME

Under the patronage of Lord Egremont, the Petworth Emigration Committee sent some 1600 emigrants from Sussex and neighbouring counties in England to Upper Canada between 1832 and 1837. In each of these years, ships chartered by the committee sailed from Portsmouth loaded with emigrants. Most settled, at least initially, in the townships of western and southwestern Ontario being opened at the time; others went to Michigan and Ohio, and of course many may have later moved farther west.

Two researchers are preparing a history of the assisted emigration scheme, and are compiling a list of the people who sailed on the committee's ships. They are trying to contact descendants or relatives of the Petworth emigrants in the hope that they will have information not in record offices or archives. It is proposed that their working list of emigrants will be deposited and available for consultation at the branches of the Ontario Genealogical Society and in various archives and libraries in Canada and England. The A.G.S. library now has a copy of the preliminary list, on which there are no restrictions on copying for the purposes of private research.

### HOW TO HUNT IN NORTH DAKOTA --By Diane Michalek

The State Historical Society of North Dakota is housed in the Heritage Center building on the state capitol grounds in Bismarck. The library is open to the public Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Two researchers will assist by mail. Fortunately, interlibrary loan of the society's huge store of material is being expanded (within the United States). Newspapers are available on microfilm and they will provide a list of newspapers available for each county.

The North Dakota society owns a vast range of materials, some of which is easily accessed by letter. Available are all the federal censuses for North Dakota, plus the state census records for 1885, 1915 and 1925 -- the latter extending census research 15 years -- and these can be searched for \$1 per household per county and township. While the state censuses list little more than names and ages, they are useful for establishing location and family names. The 1915 and 1925 censuses recently have become available on interlibrary loan.

Assorted atlases and plat maps also are available, along with records of the first owners of land. These, too, can be borrowed via interlibrary loan. Naturalization records have been indexed by county, and there is an extensive card catalog of materials, cross-indexed for counties and towns.

A small but valuable portion of the collection is a direct result of work done by the WPA in the 1930's. Place names were researched and short histories written for counties, cities and townships. Other materials, such as council minutes and tax lists, were copied.

Pioneers were interviewed for the Historical Data Project Biography, and these are available on interlibrary loan by county. Even if your particular ancestor is not listed, others in the same area may mention him or her, or these reminiscences may provide a picture of the settlement experience in that area.

Letters to the State Archives and Historical Research Library, North Dakota Heritage Center, 612 E. Boulevard Ave., Bismark, N. D. 58505) should be concise and ask specific questions. With a name, location (county and township if possible) and time frame, the researchers will spend approximately 20 minutes per query searching logical sources. They also will provide current addresses for churches, cemeteries, and other sources upon request. There are charges for postage and copying ... very reasonable! Their work is very thorough, and the wait not long.

A trip to Bismarck is necessary if research into WPA documents or other archival materials is desired. The research room is a pleasant place to work and the staff is extremely helpful. The microfilm readers are in a separate, low-light area. Most of the materials are not in open stacks and must be requested, but service generally is swift. Arrangements also can be made to pull materials for another day. Lockers are available free of charge.

Each day, the staff will machine-copy 20 sheets and make six microfilm copies per researcher. Orders for copies also can be left for future service and mailed later for a fee. Some item, because of the danger of damage, may not be machine copied. There is also a photographic collection and orders for reprints are taken.

To adequately research at the center, all areas of the library need to be explored. Not all indexes are clearly labeled or set apart, although they are easily available. Being nosy can provide good dividends. The society is in the midst of indexing the naturalization records and producing brochures on individual collections. These additions will make their vast store of information more readily available for individual search.

..... Anyone with ancestors from North Dakota should seriously consider using the North Dakota State Historical Society, either in person or by mail. Because of an increase in requests, but not in staff, delays in response to correspondence may occur. But it will be worth the wait.

#### ORGANIZING A FAMILY REUNION

--By Nelda Bullock, as told to D. Smith Granger

Last summer, Nelda Bullock of Lethbridge held a successful reunion of about 100 Loxtons from 6 different countries. Following are some of her tips on organizing a family reunion.

First, Nelda determined the place, date, and time; decided to have a 2-day reunion in Lethbridge in the summer. chose Thursday and Friday so that guests would be able to travel on Saturday and go to church on Sunday. She sent out invitations partly by using phone books from England, Australia, New Zealand, The decorated invitations had attached and South Africa. application forms -- Nelda used her sewing machine to perforated lines for detaching the forms. The letters as many details as possible, including the total cost of the reunion, and requested a pre-registration fee to cover relevant The letters gave Nelda's name, address, and phone number, and a time limit for registration so that there would be The recipients were requested to give their name, time to plan. address, and phone number, and to say whether they would need assistance in finding accommodation. Nelda also had to know how many adults and children would attend, in order to organize the entertainment.

Since several guests needed help in arranging accommodation, Nelda reserved a motel for them. Some people had RV's and parked outside the Family History Centre, where the reunion took place. (Some people were thus able to do research and made some happy discoveries.)

On arrival, the family members filled out a guest book with their name, address, telephone number, and earliest known ancestor's name. Nelda also obtained name tags for the guests. She typed a daily program, which was decorated and put in an envelope with a selection of poems, cartoons, jokes, songs, and other items about families and reunions. The envelope also had an article on the origin of the surname, family group sheets, a map and family crest, and a "family tree climber" certificate. The guests could use the envelope for anything else that they accumulated. Since so much printing was involved, Nelda rented a copy machine.

Nelda arranged to have some free souvenirs for guests -pins from the province, as well as from her father's home town.
In addition, she gave away ribbons printed with the surname and
fastened with the city pin. She also ordered spoons, pins, and
key chains with the family crest for guests to buy.

Nelda organized sightseeing tours to nearby places of interest: Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump, a Hutterite Colony, and Logan Pass. The guests chose which site they preferred to visit

and paid for their own transportation. It was necessary to get a bigger bus because of the large number of people going to the Buffalo Jump. Permission was needed to visit the Hutterite Colony, and a passport was needed to visit Logan Pass.

There were children of all ages, so that it was necessary to provide some games, but most of them liked to play outside with balls and other simple equipment. The guests, and especially the children, were thrilled with when a picture-taking session was held with an R.C.M.P. officer, who had permission to wear his uniform.

The meals included drinks and buns or rolls in the morning, a heavier lunch, an afternoon drink, an evening banquet of cold meat (since it was summer and extremely hot), and a pancake breakfast. Nelda had to make arrangements for diabetic food, although some people brought their own food. She also made sure to provide dishes that most people like. She bought in bulk from wholesalers and was able to use coffee urns free with the purchase of coffee from one supplier. From another restaurant, she rented tubs and bought drink crystals for children. Paper cups and plastic dishes were used. Of course, a lot of help was needed to put on such a large function. Relatives helped in the kitchen, filled plates, or served lunch.

Before the banquet, there was a period of introductions and questions. Instead of the usual decorations, there was a bulletin board of family histories and tables for books and pictures. On the walls were pedigree charts and big map of the family's county of origin, with pegs in each place that an ancestor had come from. One marriage certificate that was displayed united three families that had not previously known of the connection. Awards were given to the youngest and oldest guests, to those who came the farthest, and so on. The awards were simply Olympic torch goblets with roses, which the guests very much appreciated. Nelda herself was presented with a bouquet, a dulcimer, and a calendar signed by all the guests.

Amid all the activities and entertainment, Nelda made sure to schedule some time just to talk. A lot of genealogical discoveries were made, but not all guests found connections, and work remains to be done in that respect. No doubt everyone is looking forward to the next reunion. Organizing it will be a once-in-a-lifetime experience for someone else!

The Archives of Ontario and the Registrar General's office of the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations are arranging for the transfer in 1991 to the Archives of the following records of genealogical, legal, and historical interest:

-- Original historical Ontario birth, marriage, and death registration records from 1869, now in possession of the Registrar General's Office in Toronto.

-- Certain related historical vital statistics records held by the Registrar General's Office, the transfer schedules of which are under discussion. These may include, for example, delayed birth, marriage, and death registrations; stillbirth records; registration of deaths of Ontario residents overseas in World War II.

In the initial transfer, the Archives will receive approximately 1400 volumes containing 3,000,000 registrations covering the years: births 1869-1895; marriages 1869-1910; deaths 1869-1920. Eventually, over a period of many years, all original vital statistics records from the Registrar General's Office will be transferred to the Archives, and retained on a permanent basis. After the records' arrival, the Archives will begin to prepare and microfilm the original records. After the first self-service copies are made available, further copies of the same film will be added to the Archives' inter-institutional loan service. They will also be available for purchase at the usual rates.

As of 3 July 1990, genealogy search fees at the Office of the Registrar General of Ontario have been increased to \$21.00.

The Board of the Canadian Federation of Genealogical and Family History Societies Inc. has agreed that subscribing members may submit an ancestral file for their spouses as well as their own. The names on the spouse's file will be indexed under the member's number. The directory of the names from the ancestral files should be ready in time for the May meeting in Kingston.

Beginning in 1991, the O.G.S. will no longer have "Branch Only" memberships. Members of all branches must now join the O.G.S. as either Associate Members (additional fee of \$5, which entitles the member to one copy of "Newsleaf") or fully-fledged members (fee of \$30, which entitles member to receive "Families" and "Newsleaf" four times a year and insert 2 queries a year).

California, Washington, and Oregon are the only three American states that have state-wide death indexes. The California index covers 1905-1985, with the initial period 1905-1939 in book form in the State Library at Sacramento. The librarians will do a free search in response to a written inquiry accompanied by a S.A.E. and sufficient postage. From 1940 onwards the records are in 10-year increments on microfiche in each county record office, where a personal visit is necessary.

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If you are missing an American ancestor in 1850, be sure to check the 1850 California Federal Census. There were 50,000 people who travelled overland to the gold fields, while another 50,000 came by ship. By 1855, 23,000 people had left California. (From "Westward into Nebraska" Vol.15 No.3, October 1990.)

The vast majority of registration districts for England and Wales have their own indexing system. In order to obtain a certificate from a Superintendent Registrar, one has to supply the name (one partner's name only needed for a marriage), and approximate year. The office will then search 2 years on either side of the given year and supply the certificate if possible. A very few, however, do not have their own index. This poses a problem in the case of marriages only, which were also church records and come from each separate parish register with the Superintendent Registrar's district.
