## FROM YOUR GUEST EDITOR



## TRIBUTE TO EARLY SCHOOLS

The Barrhead Museum Held its third annual Heritage Day on July 21 1991 with a large crowd in attendance. This year, the topic was 'Early Schools in the Barrhead Area'. The front of the room had an attractive 'early school' look with a chalk board, old teacher's and student's desk, the old Canada flag etc.

A skit was presented about the Paddle River School District in the year 1908. The school was temporarily held in a room which was built onto a homesteader's house. They had run out of cash and so could not keep the teacher on for more than a few months that year!

Several short talks were given on life in the one-room school. Those one-room school teachers present were honored. Some early schools mentioned in the Barrhead district were: Pembina, Craven, Manola, Brookland, Leighton, Glenreagh, Highridge and Fawn Lake. Many talented people came out of these small one-room schools. Others talked about the difficulties in completing High School. This was only offered in Barrhead. Out of town students had to board in town, some lived in a dorm while others took Grade 12 after school.

Christmas concerts were a popular event. Rehearsals usually started immediately after November 11 and all recesses were spent practicing. The afternoon concluded with the singing of "The Maple Leaf Forever" and "God Save The Queen". Numerous school records were available for browsing - a bonus for all genealogical researchers!

### HOW HOMESTEADERS QUALIFIED FOR A SCHOOL

A group of parents could petition the Government of Alberta for a school if:

1. There were 8 children between the ages of 5 and 16 in the area.
2. There were at least four parcels of land liable for taxation.
3. Along with the petition there should be:
  - a) a map of the proposed district (believed no larger than 5 miles X 5 miles)
  - b) a list of suggested names for the district.

If the Government approves the petition a meeting of the ratepayers must be held to elect three of them to form a Board of Trustees. Then the trustees:

1. Choose one of themselves to be a Chairman
2. Hire a Secretary/Treasurer
3. Select a site for the school
4. Get the school built and outfitted
5. Collect the taxes
6. Hire a Teacher

After the school opened, the School Board looked after the operations and usually held a Board Meeting once a month or more often if necessary. An Annual Meeting was held once a year for ratepayers to elect trustees.

## A TRIP TO SALT LAKE CITY

Noon, October 15th, 1991 and I was finally back in the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. It had already been a long day. Up at 4:45 AM and out on the street for my ride to the airport at 5:20; a long wait in the airport, a slow line through customs; the three hour flight which included a stop in Calgary and the drive from the airport. There were a few problems with our room reservations, but having got a key, I dropped my suitcase, grabbed my research material and headed over to the library, anxious to get started. It wasn't to be quite that easy though. The US/Canada floor was packed. There wasn't an empty seat anywhere (well, there were empty seats but they had papers and things on them so one had to assume they were being 'saved'. I took one of these seats, prepared to give it up if someone came back. No one did.)

For the first time visitor, the Family History Library can be a daunting experience - not so much the size of the building but the overwhelming amount of material contained within it. The four public floors of the library contain hundreds of thousands of books, and even more rolls of microfilm - and we only had five days. The only way to make effective use of all these resources is to know beforehand what films and books you want to read and this can be done by spending time in your local Family History Library going through the Library Catalogue.

The Library is conveniently divided up into geographical areas. On the first floor can be found card catalogues, information of the Mormon Church and general references. The second floor is limited to Canada and the U.S. material. The two basement floors contain European and British Isles/Commonwealth material. Each floor has a copy room for copying microfilm, microfiche and books (at the amazingly low cost of five cents for photocopies and 20 cents for film copies.) Change machines insure that you are never out of nickels and dimes. Each floor also has at least a dozen computers which can be booked for half hour sessions. An information desk is manned with the most friendly, helpful people. Each floor also has tables, study desks and microfilm/microfiche readers. Although readers are sometimes hard to get on the Canada/U.S. and British floors, you are able to take microfilm to the European floor for reading. Hours at the library provide ample accessibility. When the doors open at 7:30 AM people are waiting to enter. From Tuesday to Friday the library remains open until 10:00 PM. Monday and Saturday it closes at 6:00 and 5:00 PM respectively.

The library imposes few restrictions on its users. You are asked to take only five rolls of film at a time, relinquish your reader if you plan to be away for longer than 30 minutes, return films to their proper locations, limit copying to five copies if others are waiting and allow an inspection of your bags and/or briefcases when you leave. This last requirement has been put in place since our first visit two years ago and would indicate that the library has been losing material.

During any week, users of the library may take advantage of talks given by the trained staff on a wide range of subjects. On my second day, I attended one such session on "Tracing Your Ancestor Back to Ireland". In addition, a special orientation which explained the library and its many resources, was given to our group on our first day. One item of interest we learned at this session was that each floor has only two or three paid staff - the other 15 - 20 people are volunteers!

The Family History Library is planning some major changes in its operations over the next two years. The old Hotel Utah, one block away, has been taken over by the Church and is currently undergoing extensive renovations. (They have completely gutted the interior.) Plans are to have three floors of the facility serve as a computer centre - the first stop for the researcher at the library. An additional 150 film readers are to be put in the main library.

This was the second trip to Salt Lake City organized by the Edmonton Branch. We had 29 people this year, some veterans and some novices. Our lodging at the Howard Johnson Hotel, immediately adjacent to the library, meant we wasted no time in getting to and from the facility. Located in the very heart of the city and across the street from the Mormon Temple, the hotel also provided us easy access to two very large shopping complexes within a couple of blocks.

Salt Lake City is a beautiful metropolis. Its wide streets and broad sidewalks are bordered with huge concrete planters filled with a multi-colored array of flowers and plants. Trees line the streets and behind them the stately old buildings lend a sense of history which we do not see in Edmonton. Temple Square is a panorama of flowers, although the large beds in the middle of the Square had just recently been planted with hundreds of pansy plants, not yet in bloom. To add to the charm, the weather was terrific. On our second day, temperatures of 85 degrees F. broke the city's record. (The same day that Edmonton experienced its first snow of the season!)

Although our group worked independently, many of us met in the evening to discuss the day's achievements and/or problems. We spent Saturday evening together at a pre-arranged dinner in a nearby hotel where we took turns relating our successes or lack of same. Sunday was a free day: some took tours of the city, some explored the shopping centres and a couple took a trip into Nevada for a day of challenging the slot machines. Two years ago, the downtown shopping centres were closed but Sunday shopping has finally invaded Utah.

There were many success stories from our group: new lines established, lost grandparents found, births and marriages verified and lots of possibilities to be followed up. I spent much of my time with books - unfortunately checking books that I'd looked at before but had not recorded results adequately and so had to do over - just to make sure. I limited my work with microfilm for the most part, to those with indexes or short items which could read quickly. Films which will take time to go through can be done in Edmonton. However, even the most successful of us stood in awe when we were told of the woman who sat down at a computer and watched in amazement as the machine cranked out a family tree which went back to the year 99. We should all be so lucky!

Talk has already begun about a third trip to Salt Lake City, probably in two years time. If you are interested, start saving your loonies and keep October 1993 free.

## HOW WIDE IS YOUR RESEARCH TRACK?

Many times during our efforts to find our elusive ancestors we have heard that a good percentage of research may well have been done already, if only we could find the people who have done the work and then share our individual results. This little article will not really give you pointers to find these people but, in reverse, suggest how those people can find YOU when they look for lost cousin umpteen times removed who is in reality you. After the unbelievable luck I have had getting back to a small Pomeranian village, I firmly believe that the wider our own research tracks are the better our overall success will be. To show what I mean, I would like to share the whole episode with you the reader.

It started several years ago when the first copy of the Latter Day Saints' International Genealogical Index (IGI) came to the Edmonton LDS Branch Library. On it I found a Nuthack/Brueggemann marriage in 1809 in the very Pomeranian county where my father was born nearly a hundred years later. To assume that this Nuthack/Brueggemann marriage was my direct line would have been just as foolish as to assume that it wasn't. The information went into a file.

As the family group sheet IGI information had been gathered by the LDS, but was only available to me by visiting the Salt Lake City library in person, which at the time was impossible, I began looking for someone in Edmonton who might be going there. I found that person in Wyn Welton, who was able to bring back from Salt Lake a copy of the family group sheet from which the marriage entry had been gleaned. It gave me a family with six children, five daughters and one son. Could this son be my ancestor? My assumption theories still held. It would be nice to get back to the early 1800's, but two generations had to be connected, the son of the Nuthack/Brueggemann marriage and my great-grandfather, whose birth I had establish to be in 1849. The two men could well have been father and son.

This then is the background which made me look for people who may have done research on the family which eventually turned into the reverse when people were looking for me.

The particular parish records for which I was looking were to everyone's best knowledge destroyed during the last months of World War II when the Red Army poured west toward Berlin. My search concentrated on finding someone who may have researched the family before 1945. To get more background on Pomerania I had subscribed to the weekly newspaper, "Pommersche Zeitung" in the former West Germany, which amongst other things ran small ads where former Pomeranians were trying to find other lost Pomeranians even as late as thirty-five years after the war's end. I had nothing to lose in trying the same. Basically I asked whether anyone knew of the name Nuthack in the county of Stolp, Pomerania. Not expecting very much, I was surprised by two responses and also a little bit of luck. The newspaper had to re-run the ad because they had forgotten to give my name and address in the first run and one

respondent had been eager enough to write to the paper with a note to forward her response to me. It saved me the effort to raise the issue with the newspaper.

This first response was from a lady who had actually known my great grandfather and turned out to be a second cousin to my father. Unfortunately though she no information that pertained to my great-grandfather's ancestry.

The second response although at first not helpful at all, turned out to be a genealogical gold mine in the long run. The man, who, shortly after answering my ad, died of a heart condition, had the same Nuthack/Brueggemann information as the IGI plus most of their ancestry back to a birth in 1709. His first question was, whether I would be interested in this. Of course, I was.



In the meantime I had joined a German genealogical society specializing in Pomeranian research, listed my research names in a German equivalent of the AGS' Ancestor Index, helped with the translation into English of a German genealogical research book, in other words, inadvertently began a campaign of "Kilroy was here". The name Nuthack must have slowly begun to stick out like a sore thumb.

So time went by, in fact several years went by without putting to bed the mystery of whether the Nuthack/Brueggemann son was my second great-grandfather. Then, shortly before Christmas 1988 I received a letter from Munich, Germany from a person whose name I didn't recognize. It is a curious habit of mine, before opening I ask myself who it might be that contacts me now. Well, one could have knocked me over with a feather, when the name of the village where my grandfather was born jumped from the letter, in broken English she explained that she had found out that her cousin had left Germany for Canada after the war and whether I was his son. Obviously it didn't take long for me to answer the letter.

The family had assumed that she had perished, as many others had, in 1945, but here she was looking for her relatives.

My answering letter was a little coy, I must admit. Not knowing what her memory was like, after all she must be close to my father's age, I didn't want to put something into her recollection which may turn out to be only a plant from me. I asked questions of how she found me, whether she knew anything about her grandfather and great-grandfather, not even giving their names. Well, here was a lady in her eighties, after an active life and in sharp mental condition, but no longer so physically mobile who had decided to research her family. Having little on her mother Nuthack's side but wanting more, she looked for people who may be doing the same. She contacted genealogical societies, and guess what jumped out at her. You're right, my name and address. Along with the letter she sent a copy of her grandparents' marriage certificate which gives the son of the 1809 Nuthack/Brueggemann marriage as his father. Bingo! The connection for which I had been looking had been established, she also now had family information as far back as I.

The moral of this then is, make wide tracks, tracks of a variety the number of which cannot be counted. Think of it, the name Nuthack will appear at least twice in this periodical. In the table of contents and as the author of this article. It will say where the research is conducted and gives a couple of research names. The magazine will be in the hands of close to nine hundred

people by Christmas and all of this advertising I get for spending a few hours (at my typing speed) to put down these thoughts. Nine hundred people isn't enough because it goes to goes to the LDS, other genealogical societies and several public libraries. Why not write an article of your experience(s) and submit it to Relatively Speaking?

There are more ways: Submit your name(s) to the Ancestor Index. Submit your name(s) to the Genealogical Research Directory (this is worldwide). Join a genealogical society in your research area, or if this becomes too expensive, try to do something for them that in some way gets your name(s) printed in their publications, if you are married use your maiden name or use a hyphenated surname. You may well come up with other possibilities and when you do share them with others.

Make your tracks wide, let the man in the moon see them if he should be looking for you.

From a recent letter from former East Germany I hear that my name came to them via Argentina. Well, that's another story for another time.

## Probate Records in Alberta

Probate records can be a valuable tool for genealogical researchers. However, Probate or Estate Records are not available for every person who died in the province. If a deceased person had assets in the Province of Alberta that did not transfer automatically to the joint tenant on death, a grant of probate or letters of administration is often required by law.

Probate refers to the process of proving before a judicial authority, that a document such as a will outlining wishes for the disbursement of a deceased person's estate is valid. Probate, therefore, allows for the distribution and finalizing of a person's estate. Probate also refers to the certificate granted by the court to the effect that the will has been proved) found to be authentic in court and registered, and the estate finalized. This also indicates that the executors named in the will are entitled to administer the effects of the deceased person, which means seeing that the bequests are actually carried out.

Grants relating to probate are requested by the Surrogate Court of Alberta. A variety of grants can be given depending on a number of different factors. If an individual died "intestate" which means without leaving a will, then an application for Grant of Letters of Administration would be required. When there is a will, then there would be a Grant of Probate or one might find that the file includes Letters of Administration "with will annexed". Grants must be received before the deceased person's assets can be distributed and the estate finalized. In some cases, these procedures can take considerable time and some estates may not be probated for a number of years.

The office of the Surrogate Court of Alberta located in the Law Courts Building in each Judicial District maintain the estate records for their respective judicial districts. The application for a grant would be made in the Judicial District where the deceased lived or owned land. There is no "will registry" in Alberta. Surrogate Court will have files for estates for which a grant of probate or administration has been issued only.

The information found in the actual will may be disappointing for genealogy researchers since it is often written in general terms without identifying specific property or beneficiaries. Oftentimes, however, it can be packed with helpful relationship information. Because a witness to a will cannot be a beneficiary, the signatures of the witnesses are rarely family members. The application for the grant will contain a lot of information including an inventory of the estate with legal descriptions as well as showing the value of each item or property as well and a list of the beneficiaries giving their addresses and relationship to the deceased. In some instances, there may be specific information which is "not known", and this is indicated as well. The application will also include a copy of the will if there was one. In cases of where there is no will, there may be even more genealogical information because the applicant would have been required to establish that he was next-of-kin entitled to administer the estate. This process would provide more information about family relationships than found in cases where there is a will. Sometimes, other family members would have signed documents indicating their approval of a certain person being appointed as administrator.

If an ancestor lived in Edmonton, the Judicial District of Edmonton would probably have the estate file, if any records were in fact filed. One must go to the Surrogate Court office counter in the Law Courts Building in Edmonton to conduct a search, which is done by computer, to determine if a record exists for that person. There is a \$3.00 fee for each individual search. It is wise to remember that these files are kept chronologically according to the date of the grant application, not according to the date of death. Sometimes many years elapsed after a death before an estate was formally administered. If a file is found for your ancestor, then a request can be made to view the file. There is a \$1.00 fee to view each file. There is a waiting period to view individual files which may take up to a week since older files are stored off-site.

If you find information that you would like to have copied, this also can be done. Copies of the application for the grant of probate or letters of administration can be made for \$0.50 per page for the first ten pages, and \$0.25 per page thereafter. The fee for a Certified Copy of a Grant of Probate is \$5.00. It isn't necessary to obtain a certified copy for genealogical research. Payments by cash or money order should be payable to the Provincial Treasurer.

Correspondence should be directed to the Clerk of the Surrogate Court in the appropriate judicial registration district. If, however, the registration district of the deceased is not known, or if the estate file is not found where it is expected, one may contact the Succession Duties Department to determine in which district probate was granted, if in fact, there was probate granted in Alberta, and obtain the information needed to contact the appropriate office of the Surrogate Court to view or obtain a copy of the probate record.

Succession Duties Department, Office of the Public Trustee, 4th Floor, J.E. Brownlee Building, 10365 - 97th St. Edmonton, AB T5J 3Z8. This office has a master list of grants of probate and administration for the entire province. The older records in this department are arranged alphabetically on cards which can be searched on request. This office can advise in which judicial district or court house a particular estate was filed if in fact, there is a probate record registered in Alberta.

The information available through the Succession Duties Department is limited the name of the deceased, the approximate date of death, residence, the registration district and the approximate date of the grant application. In order to see the actual probate file, however, one must go to the appropriate Surrogate Court offices and make a request to view the documents.

A search should be requested at the Succession Duties Office only if the correct judicial district is not known, or the information isn't found where the researcher expected to find it.

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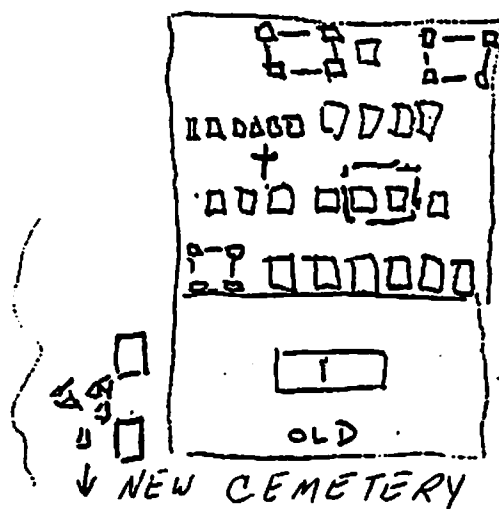

# Cemetery Recording CALDWELL CEMETERY

recorded by members of the Lethbridge Branch AGS



The Caldwell Cemetery is located on private land (NE36-002-28 W5), approx 5.7 km south of Mountainview, in southwestern Alberta. Located on private land, it is in the middle of a pasture, surrounded by a barb wire fence. There is no gateway to enter the cemetery enclosure.

The cemetery is overgrown with trees, bushes, thistles, high foliage and tall grass. The stones have been broken or are falling over. No plot plan has been discovered for this cemetery.

Names of five burials have been identified in this old cemetery:

There are apparently two other locations of graveyards in this area, but there are no records or stones. One site is located on a bench east of the Belly River, across from the former L. D. S. Church Ranch headquarters (SW35-002-28 W4). Some circles of rocks and slight depressions indicate what be a half dozen or more graves. Mabel Gilman, two years old, was the only name that could be provided by living witnesses as to who was buried there.

South of this site on higher and more inaccessible ground on coulee brakes leading to the Belly River is another possible cemetery. If any graves are here, they are unmarked, and could quite possibly predate those of the other two locations. Lorin Billingsley, a Cardston resident and member of a pioneer Caldwell family, claims that his sister is buried here.

This recording was done 11 July 1991 by Pat Hermann, Lynne Davis, Rena Derricott and Anne Baines.

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THE SCOTTISH CHURCH RECORDS MICROFICHE INDEXES by the Family History Library are listed as O.P.R. (Old Parochial Registers) and are now complete. The real value of these indexes is that there is now a complete index of all Church of Scotland birth, baptismal and marriage records before 1855.

# RESEARCHERS' GROUP LETTERS

INTRODUCING NEW, COMPOSITE INDEXES  
TO  
BIRTH AND MARRIAGE RECORDS  
IN THE  
OLD PAROCHIAL REGISTERS OF SCOTLAND

Now available for general public use are entirely new INDEXES to births and marriages in the Old Parochial Registers of the Established Church of Scotland (Presbyterian). These Indexes, commonly called Scottish OPR Indexes, comprise the most comprehensive collection of indexed Scottish births and marriages covering the 300 years prior to the commencement in 1855 of Scottish statutory Civil Registration.

The Indexes are available at both The General Register Office for Scotland, New Register House, Edinburgh EH1 3YT, Scotland, and at the Family History Library, Salt Lake City, Utah 84150; and, also, at Family History Centers and similar institutions world-wide. Produced by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with the very generous cooperation and assistance of the General Register Office for Scotland and Her Britannic Majesty's Stationery Office, the Indexes are presented on "nanofiche", a compact form of microfiche.

Created from a new filming of the original OPR's authorized by the Registrar General for Scotland, numerous previously "lost" entries in the registers have been recovered and appear in the new Indexes. NO death (burial) records, nor records of other religious denominations are included in the Indexes.

The new Indexes contain entries to over 6,000,000 births and more than 2,200,000 marriages from the OPR's; and, also, include Scottish "MR" records never before integrated into OPR Indexes. This composite indexing substantially enhances the value of these Indexes. ["MR's", by definition, are "Miscellaneous Records" of Church of Scotland births and marriages, often referred to as "blotter" and "scroll" records. Entries in these records that differ from those in the main OPR's are included in the Indexes].

Covering all Counties of Scotland, for all years prior to 1855 for which registers have survived, these comprehensive Indexes are an invaluable, easy-to-use research aid applicable to many disciplines. The earliest Index entry is dated 1553, though surviving register starting dates may be as late as the early 1800's.

Indexed names are arranged alphabetically according to *actual* spellings as given in the original records, or according to an "evaluated spelling", in which some part of the original record is altered, or modified to help ensure accuracy of identification (recognition) of the name, date, or place. The Greek letter, Beta; "β" is used to mark ALL "evaluated" Index entries requiring user comparison with the original record. NO Index entries occur for indecipherable source records.

Given and Surname Indexes to both births and marriages, plus an "Instructions" fiche, are provided for each county of Scotland. Index entries give: person's name; sex; parent or spouse name(s); event type (birth, christening, or marriage); date and place (parish) of the record entry; Batch/Serial Number (to identify source microfilms); and, for out-of-chronological-sequence entries in the registers, "FR" numbers are given (which correspond to frame numbers on source microfilms). Each frame on the new source microfilms is sequentially numbered at the top of the frame. Visibility of frame numbers varies due to differing light exposures required during filming.

Further, the Indexes group together all "Mac" equivalent names (M', Mc, Mac, Mk, etc.) under "MAC". Feminine forms of this prefix, namely "NIC" and "VIC", are listed under "N" and "V", respectively.

For entries not found initially by use of a Surname Index, and if the given name is known, ALWAYS



consult the Given Name Index. Virtually always, the desired record, if it exists in the Indexes, can be found by using the Given Name Index. Some events, of course, were never entered in the Registers, and some are lost due to illegibility or damaged or missing pages. Proper OPR Index use requires names be sought under all possible spelling variations.

The Indexes enable users to quickly locate names. However, no index is acceptable as a primary source, because its entries are abridged transcriptions. Indexes are only references to source data, to unfailingly be verified for accuracy, acceptability, and analysis in light of related sources. "Parish and Vital Records List", for example, show time coverages of related parish registers. Thus, the OPR Indexes may open many "doors" to complementary source records, e.g., Dissenter Registers, Deeds, Sasines, etc. leading to further useful family history information.

The OPR Index project, involving many dedicated staff and volunteer workers, from its inception has been directed and technically supervised by David E. Gardner, FSG, and George Jordan, M.A., BSEE. The broad expertise and experience represented by this entire team is well reflected in the quality, scope, and many user-friendly features of this rich research tool.

The Family History Library Catalog lists the Old Parochial Registers of Scotland under: "Scotland, [County Name] - Church Records, Indexes". Library Call Numbers for the Indexes are shown in the following Table.

A Quarterly newsletter, with up-to-date information about resources, repositories and research hints in all countries with substantial British heritage, are presented in the award winning ISBGFH Newsletter. Details on Conferences, British genealogical courses and the review of new publications can also be found in each quarterly issue. Members are invited to share research successes and frustrations in the Newsletter.

ISBGFH will assist anyone interested in forming a 'British Interest Group' either as an independent society or as part of an existing group.

To honor the distinguished U.S. Genealogist and founding member of ISBGFH, the Meredith B. Colket Jr. Memorial Lecture was established in 1985. The lecture, presented at the Annual Meeting by an outstanding authority on British genealogy, is printed in a subsequent Newsletter.

**TAXES! TAXES! TAXES!** - If you think you have a problem and are hard put, consider the following hardships your ancestors had to endure -**FOR THE TAXPAYERS OF GREAT BRITAIN!!**

**AMOBBER-** In Wales and the border counties a tax to waive the lord's right to have intercourse with the betrothed daughter before the wedding day!

**FURNAGE-** sum paid by tenants to use the lord's baking oven or, alternatively, a price paid for the privilege of owning their own equipment. (A no win situation!)

**GODBOTE-** Church fine for an offence against God.

**HAIR POWDER TAX-** from 1795 - 1798 it was required that people using hairpowder should pay duty and obtain a license.

**INCOME TAX-** first levied in 1799 to pay for the war against the French. Abolished in 1802 but revived in 1803.

**MALE SERVANTS TAX-** levied on households employing male servants from 1777 to 1852.

**REGISTRATION TAX-** in 1694 Parliament taxed births, marriages, burials as registered in the Parish Records, and also widowers without children and bachelors, in order to provide war revenue. Discontinued after 5 years. In 1783 a tax was placed on entries in the three parts of the Parish Register. This caused immediate reduction in the number of registrations. The Act was repealed in 1794. (Could that be why you are unable to locate that record?!)

Most of the records cover from 1898 to 1905, but some 1,500 (mostly late filing records) precede this group and extend back to 1854.

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**THE PENSION LIST OF 1820**

The Pension List 1820 - indexed by Murtie June Clark.  
Published by Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc.  
Repr. 1991 750 p. \$40.00

The Pension List 1820, compiled for an 1818 Act of Congress called "A Report of the Names, Rank and Line of every Person Placed on the Pension List". is the most complete list of Revolutionary war pensioners compiled up to 1820. The Act of 1818 was the first service pension law passed by the U.S.A. giving pensions to all who had served for nine months in the Revolutionary Army and were in indigent circumstances. There are 16,000 entries.

Arranged according to the State or territory of residence and in alphabetical order, pensioners are listed with the rank they held and line of service. The 25 separate State or Territory lists always proved an obstacle to research so Mrs. Murtie June Clark was commissioned to compile an index for the reprinting of this very scarce work. Now after 70 years, this valuable source is accessible and usable and takes its place among Revolutionary War source books.

Tracing your Scottish Ancestry - Kathleen B. Cory  
Publ. by Macmillan of Canada, 29 Birch  
Ave., Toronto, Ont. M4V 1E2 \$18.95 p.b.

This is a highly detailed guide to registers and records of Scotland and where they may be found in the Scottish Records office and New register House in Scotland. Other chapters describe the large amount of other records available and their locations. Included are Hearth tax records, Poll tax records, muster rolls and Guild records.

There is advice on tracing a family name, even an explanation of adding the family boaty name to the family name to distinguish close-knit families on the N.E.Coast. One chapter explains the rules and practices which govern heraldry, clans and tartans.

Kathleen Cory designed her book for new and experienced researchers with Scottish roots enabling them to pinpoint which Scottish records would be the most useful, especially if they had a limited amount of information.. .

Kathleen B. Cory F.S.A. Scot., is a recognized genealogist, living and working in Edinburgh. She served on the Council of the Scottish Genealogy Society for 10 years and on the Heraldry Society for five years. and has done searches for customers world-wide.

# Treasures of the Glenbow Museum

The Glenbow Museum launched this 200 page fully illustrated book TREASURES OF THE GLENBOW MUSEUM in September 1991. It contains stunning photographs and a text full of historical insight and personal anecdotes.

"For several months in 1966 we had been visiting Mrs. Lillian Graham, daughter of the Rev. John McDougall, a famous western missionary. She was living alone in the old McDougall house in east Calgary in an area slated for demolition....

Mrs. Graham had gradually been going through the house, passing along to Glenbow anything she thought might be of interest. There was .....a Methodist register of births and deaths that dated back to 1855.....and many photographs and artifacts.

....Poking around downstairs we came upon a cardboard box....when we opened it, we saw piles of curiously folded papers. These were recognized at once as "dockets" or files used by lawyers and nineteenth century businessmen.....As we examined them, we realized that these were the papers of Richard Hardisty.....covering the years 1861 to 1887.

....As we looked through the papers, we became more and more excited. There was a handwritten edict from William F. Butler in 1870, outlawing the sale of intoxicants at Edmonton; a census of Metis buffalo hunters at St. Laurent in 1871;...and the only letter we had ever seen from Fort Whoop-Up. There were numerous reports, letters, contracts, and other documents of the fur trade. It was a priceless record of early West."

The above are snippets from an excerpt by Hugh Dempsey and we thank our member Charles D. Denney, Amateur Historian and Genealogist, for submitting a copy of P.31 of "Glenbow" from which this information was extracted.

For those who would like to savour the full contents of "Treasures of the Glenbow Museum", the book is available in the Glenbow Museum Shop. Softcover edition: \$25 (until December 31, 1991). Just in time for Christmas!

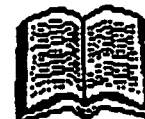

## THE ALBERTA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OBJECTS

WE, the undersigned, hereby declare that we desire to form a society under the Societies Act, R.S.A. 1970 and that:

1 The name of the Society is - Alberta Genealogical Society.

2 The objects of the Society are -

a) To promote the study of genealogy and genealogical research within the Province of Alberta;

b) To encourage adherence to accuracy and thoroughness in research;

c) To encourage and instruct members in the ethical principles, scientific methods and effective techniques of genealogical research and to defend the standards of genealogy from incompetent and disreputable persons;

d) To assemble a library of genealogical guides, handbooks, reference sources, family and local histories, and other books and materials which may assist the members, all of whom will be available to the members;

e) From time to time to publish such bulletins, booklets, books, pamphlets, or other documents as may be found desirable and expedient by the Executive of the Society and to make the same available to the members and others on such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Executive;

f) To establish friendly relations with other genealogical societies for exchange of ideas and information and the promotion of common interests;

g) To enter into arrangements with other genealogical societies for the publication of bulletins, booklets, books, pamphlets, or other documents, on such terms and conditions as may be found desirable and expedient by the Executive.

h) To promote seminars and workshops on genealogical research and methodology and such other studies as may seem helpful to the members;

i) To provide a centre and suitable meeting place for the various activities of the Society and its members by rent or purchase or otherwise.

j) To encourage the establishment of Branches of the Society under such terms and conditions as the by-laws of the Society may from time to time provide;

k) To achieve the foregoing objects, funds may be raised and donations, gifts, legacies and bequests accepted.
