The GST consumer information office is reminding Canadians there is no GST on international mail over \$5. That includes parcels, letters or a combination of both. But you must affix the stamps in front of the clerk who is selling the stamps, whether it's a Canadian Post outlet or a franchise.

John Whitton, spokesman for the GST consumer information hotline personally discovered that some postal franchises don't understand the rule, when he bought stamps for an overseas mailing recently. He bought postage for 2 parcels worth \$4.85 each and was wrongly charged GST. Since all the mail was destined for international addresses, the postal outlet should have added all the postage together, and thus no GST charged.

SPEED THE MAIL

Typed envelopes will arrive at their destination one day earlier than hand written ones. Major post offices use an optical scanner to read the addresses. The scanner reads from the bottom to the top, reading the Zip Code first. An "Attn." at the bottom can kick out the letter until it is manually sorted. NUGGETS FROM PARADISE Vol 10 # 2

Sending money by mail. In sending requests for information by mail it is important to make it as easy and quick as possible for the recipient to send an answer. When a personal check is sent, it must usually clear the bank before a reply is sent. Consider sending money orders instead. Many places require it.

There are ways to speed answers to foreign country requests also. When you are simply inquiring about what information is available, go to the post office and buy International Reply Coupons, which people in a foreign country use to buy stamps of their own country.

If you know the town and state but not the street address, a letter addressed leaving room for street and number or box number, enclosed in an envelope addressed to the Post Master with a couple of dollars, will be delivered and you will be sent the address along with a receipt for the money. Dear Secretary,

I have enclosed, for the information of your members and as a reference aid for your library, a brief account of the major series of records of genealogical interest held by the institutions operating from Adler/Woburn House.

Some series of documents contain particulars superior to those on certificates issued by the civil authorities. For example, the (240,000+) marriage authorisations issued since February 1880 state the parties' places and/or country of birth; this is not recorded in the marriage registers issued by the Registrar General's office. The same detail has appeared on the burial authorisations (350,000+) issued since 1896, although it did not appear on English death certificates until April 1968.

The certificates of evidence are also an immensely valuable source since they refer for the most part to people who were never naturalised and thus provide evidence as to their place of origin and/or marriage abroad which is recorded nowhere else. Since the greater part of the community has always lived in the London area, it means that between them these different series of documents contain information about the great majority of past and present members of the Anglo-Jewish community.

The London Beth Din is universally recognised as the authority in England which supervises conversion to Judaism and religious divorces. It also investigates the backgrounds of those seeking to have their Jewish status confirmed, either for purely religious reasons, or as the legal preliminary to a marriage to be conducted under Orthodox auspices. A great part of our activities relate to these matters, during which investigations are made both in UK repositories and those overseas. Sometimes it is necessary to investigate an applicant's maternal line of descent for five to six generations before satisfactory evidence is uncovered.

Due to the Court's constant inspection of older communal records, it has been increasingly asked to undertake investigations of a genealogical nature, sent to it by other departments. A research unit has therefore been created to handle enquiries of this

nature, irrespective of whether the research involved is of a legal or purely genealogical nature. On many occasions it has been discovered that enquirers have mailed multiple copies of an identical letter and it is hoped that providing a centralised service will, in future prevent the duplication of research that has occurred in the past.

Please therefore inform your members that, if they require any searches to be made in UK sources, they are welcome to write directly to the Registrar at the above address and from whom full details as to the likely costs involved will be available by return. Should your society issue a journal, please feel free to publish in it the information contained both in this letter and that on the attached schedule.

Etienne and Catherine Paulo were married in Montreal in 1663, where they raised fourteen children. Two of their sons, Michel and Jacques, with their families, joined Cadillac in the extension of New France to the Detroit area in 1707/1708. At one time, these families were two of eight total non-Indian families in this area. Descendants of another son, Francois, followed later to what is now Michigan and Wisconsin. It is believed that all United States Campeau/Campaus are descended from these three brothers.

The United States Campeaus are having their first reunion Aug 29, 1992, in Detroit. Their Canadian cousins are invited to join them.

1920 CENSUS OPENING
by William Dollarhide

Beginning on March 2, 1992, a most comprehensive tool will be added to the reference materials available for U.S. genealogical research - the 1920 federal census. Federal census schedules are important research tools for genealogists, particularly when family names, birthplaces, ages, and relationships are listed. Public law dictates that the name lists from censuses are to be held in confidentiality for a period of 72 years, to protect the rights of privacy of individuals named in the census schedules. (The 72-year figure represents the average life-span of a person in America.)

Some Census Background

The format of the 1900, 1910, and 1920 census schedules were similar to each other, but each has a few unique questions that were asked on the forms. Differing from the 1910 census [the 1920 schedule form includes] questions about "mother tongue" of a person and parents of a person. But missing in 1920 are questions about a person's length of marriage, number of children born or living and veteran status.

The 14th Census of 1920 accounts for a total of 106 million residents of the United States, an increase of 13.8 million over the 1910 count. The U.S. was still experiencing a wave of European immigrants during the decade 1910-1920, hence the importance of the 1920 census to genealogists with immigrant ancestors during that period.

The 1920 "census day" was January 1, 1920. The enumerators were given instructions to count every person in a household who was living on that day. If a person had died after January 1, 1920, that person was to be included [even if the person died before the enumerator arrived to make the count]. If a child was born after January 1, 1920, the enumerator was not supposed to count the new infant.

The 1920 enumerators were given thirty days to complete the count, except that cities with 2,500 or more in population were due in only two weeks. Even with today's computer technology, it is difficult to imagine counting 106 million people in one month -- but the Census Bureau had the use of an ingenious punch card system developed by a small manufacturing company (which later became the IBM Corporation). This automation involved the use of "machine-readable" cards with holes punched in them to represent a letter of the alphabet or a number. The techniques developed for the Census Bureau became the basis for a later computer industry that used very similar punch-card methods clear into the 1970

The Population Schedules and subsequent statistical reports compiled are the only part of the 1920 census that survive. The schedules -- the name lists -- survive only as microfilm copies. The census schedules consist of 2,76 rolls of 35mm microfilm, organized by state, territories, and institutions.

In 1920 the Census Bureau also conducted an Agriculture Census and a Manufacturers Census, but neither of these special censuses were ever microfilmed and were both purposely destroyed years ago.

The Population Schedules were first microfilmed in the 1940s, and soon after the Census Bureau obtained permission from Congress to destroy the originals. Unfortunately, the microfilm technology of the 1940s was in its infancy, and there are many frames of film that are obscure and illegible due to poor camera lighting or poor exposure of the film. New masters of the original film have been made by the National Archives, and much effort has gone into enhancing the

microfilm image when evidence of poor copies has been found, in fact, a frame-by-frame review of each roll of microfilm was undertaken by the Special Media Preservation Branch of the National Archives, and frames not restorable noted.

Unlike censuses taken before 1890, only one official copy of the 1900-1920 Census Schedules was made by the field enumerators and sent to Washington, D.C. The possibility of other state-wide or county-wide copies does exist, because the Census Bureau allowed a state or county to purchase at cost a hand-written copy of a particular section of the census. It is not known if any county or state took advantage of the offer, however. (Genealogists should look for them anyway...it is interesting what treasures can be found in the attic or basement of a courthouse...).

The 1920 Soundex

Of prime importance to genealogists is that a complete index to every Head of Household that appears in the 1920 census schedules is now available to the public in addition to the population schedules. The 1920 index is complete for each state, plus the Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin Islands, Military/Naval facilities, and various institutions such as prisons.

The surnames are listed in the order of a "soundex" coding system. Like the 1880-1910 soundex indexes, the 1920 is organized by Heads of Households, and the soundex card includes the names of a spouse and children of the Head of Household. Any other individual within a family listed on the schedules (such as cousins, persons with different surnames, boarders, servants, etc.) is shown on a separate index card, along with the name of the Head of Household with whom they were enumerated.

The Soundex index is available as a separate set of microfilm which will be released simultaneous to the 1920 census schedules. The soundex consists of 8,585 rolls of 16mm microfilm and is much larger than earlier years.

The name "soundex" was a trademark of the Rand Corporation, which developed a coding system for surnames. The system assigns numbers for letters of the alphabet that sound alike, then by removing all vowels (and letters together with the same code), a person's name can be reduced to its basic sound. The purpose of the soundex system is to lessen the problem of finding names such as Johnson, Johnsen, Jonsin, Jonsen, Johansson, and so on. Most names with spelling variants can be assigned a soundex code that will group them together.

Soundex cards were compiled by the Works Progress Administration (WPA) in the 1930s as a federal project to assist government workers in locating a person in the censuses. When the cards were microfilmed, they were aligned in a vertical row in soundex code order, then by the first name of an individual.

As with the earlier soundex indexes, the important items to note for finding the same person in the full schedules are (1) the State or Territory, (2) the Enumeration District, and (3) the Sheet Number.

When Social Security began in the early 1930s, many people reaching retirement age did not have evidence of their birth, and the census became a place where a person's age could be verified. Genealogists should find the 1920 soundex the most complete and useful guide to locating residents of the U.S. that has ever been released for public use to date.

However, the 1920 soundex card entries should be considered secondary records, because they were compiled from the primary records - the census schedules themselves. Genealogists should expect occasional transcription errors on the soundex cards, or incorrect or out-of-order soundex cards. And finally, a good researcher should always read the census schedules for the original entry to confirm spelling and accuracy for a name, ages, places of birth, and so on. The soundex should be considered a starting point.

1920 Microfilm Catalog

A new microfilm catalog is available from the National Archives which is the place to locate either the soundex or census film. The catalog presents a listing of 1920 census and soundex microfilm by state and roll number. It also has an introduction with a wealth of information. For example, the catalog describes another National Archives microfilm series that can be very useful for genealogists. Rolls 41-60 of Descriptions of Census Enumeration Districts, 1910-1950, (T1224), identify the enumeration district number assigned with the state, county, and city for the 1920 census. These E.D. descriptions name the bounds of each district, described as streets within a city, for example. Used along with detailed maps of a city, the enumeration descriptions can help you locate the precise area of a city where your ancestors lived, and help in locating that same area today.

[A copy of the 1920 census catalog has been given to the Bellingham Public Library.] Genealogists will find it an indispensable guide to the 1920 census.

1920 CENSUS SCHEDULE DATA LAYOUT

The follow data categories and columns () are on 1920 census schedule forms:

PLACE OF ABODE: (1) Street, avenue, road, etc.; (2) House number or farm, etc.; (3) Number of dwelling house in order of visitation; and (4) Number of family in order of visitation.

NAME: (5) Name of each person whose place of abode on January 1, 1920, was in this family.

RELATION: (6) Relationship of this person to the head of the family.

TENURE: (7) Home owned or rented; and (8) If owned, free or mortgaged.

PERSONAL DESCRIPTION: (9) Sex; (10) Color or race; (11) Age at last birthday; and (12) Single, married, widowed, or divorced.

CITIZENSHIP: (13) Year of immigration to the United States; (14) Naturalized or alien; and (15) If naturalized, year of naturalization.

EDUCATION: (16) Attended school any time since Sept. 1, 1919; (17) Whether able to read; and (18) Whether able to write.

NATIVITY AND MOTHER TONGUE: Place of birth of each person and parents of each person enumerated. If born in the United States, give the state or territory. If of foreign birth, give the place of birth and, in addition, the mother tongue. (19) Place of birth of person; (20) Mother tongue of person; (21) Place of birth of father; (22) Mother tongue of father; (23) Place of birth of mother; and (24) Mother tongue of mother.

ENGLISH SPEAKING: (25) Whether able to speak English.

OCCUPATION: (26) Trade, profession, or particular kind of work done; (27) Industry, business, or establishment in which at work; and (28) Employer, salary or wage worker, or working on own account.

FARM SCHEDULE: (29) Number of farm schedule.
