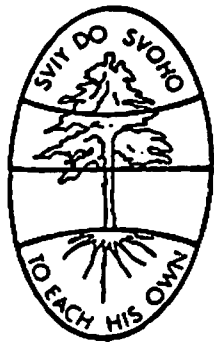
ATTENTION RESEARCHERS OF FAMILY HISTORY IN UKRAINE

Archives in Ukraine are now open to the public as never before. The two most important archives for Canadian researchers are The Central State Historical Archives in Lviv and The State Archives of Chernivsti Oblast. The archives in Lviv have materials relating to family history of Ukrainians originating from Galicia; the archives in Chernivsti concentrate on Bukovina. The holdings of these two archives are described in two books in English:

- 1) John-Paul Himka, Galicia and Bukovina: A Research Handbook About Western Ukraine, Late 19th and 20th Centuries (Edmonton Historic Sites Service, Occasional Paper No. 20, 1990).
- 2) Patricia Kennedy Grimsted, Archives and Manuscript Repositories in the USSR: Ukraine and Moldavia, Book 1: General Bibliography and Institutional Directory (Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1988).

Both books are available at public libraries through interlibrary loan.

At present, it is not possible to make use of the Ukrainian Archives through correspondence.

SEARCHING ALBERTA BEFORE 1905?

When researching in Edmonton recently, I was advised that some records pertaining to what is now the Province of Alberta may be kept by the Saskatchewan Archives Board. Upon contact with the Saskatchewan Archives Board, it has been explained that although they do not have records specifically pertaining to Alberta they do have in their collection records of the government of the North-West Territories. These records include orders of proclamations of territorial Lieutenant-Governors, correspondence of Lieutenant-Governors, territorial secretaries and other officials, and publications and other records of the territorial council. These records are not usually useful to genealogical researchers, although descendents of territorial officials would probably find them interesting.

A Summary Guide to Local Governmental Records in the Illinois Regional Archives, Springfield: Illinois State Archives, 1992, 239 pp. \$6.00 paperback. The Illinois State Archives released recently a new guide to its holdings of local governmental records which are housed in the Illinois Regional Archives Depository (IRAD) System. Depositories are located at Northern Illinois University, Western Illinois University, Illinois State University, Sangamon State University, Eastern Illinois University, and Northern University. Each depository serves a region of from one to twenty-three counties. Statewide local record holdings currently amount to 2,859 linear feet of bound volumes, 4,026 cubic feet of boxed files, and 7,458 rolls of microfilm. The SUMMARY GUIDE itemizes all 3,312 individual records series in the system. Holdings include records from the county, city, town, village, and township levels of government. Cook County had not been a part of IRAD prior to 1990 but in that year a depository was opened in Chicago and records from various Cook County and Chicago local governmental agencies are included in the SUMMARY GUIDE.

The guide is made up of two parts: one listing holdings by county and another by title. The county listing gives the county of origin in alphabetical order, the office that produced the record, the control number by which the record is located at a given depository, the record's title, its beginning and ending dates, and its physical volume. The title listing shows the control number, the record's title (arranged alphabetically), the county from which the record came and its date span. Send order to:

Genealogies Cataloged by the Library of Congress Since 1986 Divided into three sections, this book is organized for instant use. SECTION I - 11,769 Entries: this list gives you complete and accurate access to the genealogies received and cataloged since 1986. Each entry includes: authors name; the complete title of the work; the publisher's name; a physical description of the work; and more.

SECTION II - 10,170 Established Family Names and 22,614 Cross References: This unique list of established forms of surnames and cross references to variant spellings has never been available before. SECTION III - 3,564 Titles on Microfilm: This list of family histories converted to microfilm is available for the first time. Since the original volumes are now brittle, they are available in very few libraries today!

FEDERATION OF FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETIES NEWS

The FFHS, although based in England, has an Overseas Liason Officer in the person of Susan Lumas. Her job is to keep in touch with the member societies that are not based in the U.K. One of the suggestions made by our society was to keep us informed of speakers travelling overseas who might be able to give lectures when in our area. She is now setting up a clearing house for travelling speakers. Speakers in England who are travelling abroad will let her know where & when they are going & she will contact the societies in the area to let them know availability.

The FFHS has a computer subcommittee which has recently conducted a survey of member societies regarding their use of computers. This survey has resulted in some statistics on the types of computers & databases being used as well as some recommendations on things for a society to consider when choosing a computer. (Note this does not apply to individuals for genealogical purposes but for societies using the computer for such things as membership lists, journal publication, etc.) They welcome any suggestions as to how the subcommittee could help individual societies regarding computers. If anyone has questions or comments please contact me through the AGS mail.

The FFHS members' handbook is currently being revised & should be published shortly. Was a person, but nameless it seems.

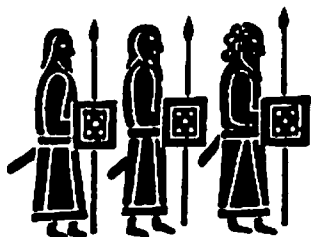

Due for publication by John Donald, Publishers, Edinburgh in the Spring of 1993, 'A Fighting Clan' describes the contribution to Scotland's (and later Britain's) naval and military history made by Clan Sutherland, over the period 1250 to 1850.

Sutherlandshire, the second most northerly county in Scotland, was largely inhabited by the members of two clans - Sutherland and Mackay. After years of skirmishing between themselves and with their neighbours, formal regiments were raised in the county during the civil wars in the seventeenth century. Later, William, 17th Earl of Sutherland raised men to help in containing the 1745 Jacobite uprising, and in 1759 the 17th Earl's son raised the 1st regiment of Sutherland Fencibles. Further regiments of Sutherland Fencibles were raised by William Wemyss, a grandson of the 17th Earl, in 1779 and again in 1793. In 1800, Wemyss raised the 93rd Sutherland Highlanders, later to become the 2nd Battalion, the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Many Sutherland officers served in these regiments.

'A Fighting Clan' outlines the history of Clan Sutherland from its early beginnings to the time of the highland clearances in the nineteenth century. During six centuries, some 290 members of the Clan held commissions in British regiments and a further 35 held commissions or warrants in the Royal Navy. Detailed research has been made into the careers and genealogy of all these men. There are numerous interesting characters amongst them: for example, Alexander Sutherland (1491-c.1519), a son of the 8th Earl, who tried to seize Dunrobin Castle - the seat of the Earls - from his half-sister, Elizabeth, and ended up by having his head chopped off and impaled on the castle tower; Kenneth Sutherland, 3rd Lord Duffus (1679-1732), who was a Captain in the Royal Navy, but took part in the first Jacobite uprising, lost his commission, title and lands and fled to Russia where he became an Admiral in Peter the Great's navy; and Kenneth's grandson, James Sutherland (1747-1829), who, when adjutant of his regiment, eloped with his colonel's young wife.

Sutherland officers fought in the Wars of Scottish Independence, the Anglo-Scottish Wars, the Thirty Years' War, the English Civil Wars, the American Revolutionary War and the Napoleonic Wars. They fought at Bannockburn (1314), Blenheim (1704), Culloden (1746), Minden (1759), Yorktown (1781) and La Coruña (1809), to name but a few major battles. Others fought in India, Burma, South Africa, West Africa and the West Indies.

'A Fighting Clan' will be of particular interest to members, or descendants of members of Clan Sutherland. But there is also much to interest the general student of military and naval history, and of Scottish genealogy. The book will be illustrated with numerous plans, diagrams and photographs of some of the prominent members of the Clan.

HOW TO DATE OLD PHOTOGRAPHS

Daguerreotype - 1839-1860. The oldest of the commercially made photographs. Produced on a silver or silver-covered copper plate and has a shiny mirror-like appearance. Sometimes appears positive, sometimes negative, depending on the angle by which it is held and viewed. Enclosed in a case for protection.

Ambrotype - 1854-1863. A negative image on glass which appears positive because it has a coating of red or black lacquer applied to the back, or because it is enclosed in a case with black paper or cloth behind it. Hold it up to a light to make sure. Usually enclosed in a fancy case and most often a studio portrait.

Tintype or Ferrotype - 1860-1915. A positive photograph on a very thin iron plate, which had been coated with a thin layer of tin to retard rust. Range in size from 3/4" to 8" x 10" or larger. Earlier tintypes were encased or pasted into paper frames, later ones were slipped into a paper frame. Early poses were formal, later poses were casual or of groups. Tintypes were taken in great numbers at fairs and at amusement parks. Look on the back for signs of paste or paper. Study the clothing fashions for an approximate date.

Carte de Visite - 1850's-1920. A small photograph mounted on a card approximately 2 1/2" x 4", the standard size of a calling card. Later ones are shinier, heavier, and thicker than earlier ones. Most popular during the 1880's. Many times a portrait, which could be sent through the mail. The card often contained the photographer's name and location. Discontinued around 1890 in the U.S. but made later in the British Isles and in Scandinavia.

Cabinet Card - 1875-1910. Found in albums, on walls, or in cabinet frames. Usually 4 1/2" x 6 1/2" with decorative edges and the photographer's name and city printed across one corner. If the photo is oval shaped or the subjects are surrounded by a dark or black background, and it is pasted on a card, it was probably taken after 1900.

Postcard Photo - 1905-1930. These were found in great profusion and were sometimes mailed.

If a revenue stamp is found on the back of a photograph, it means the picture was taken around the time of the Civil War (Sep 1864-Aug 1866), when photographs were taxed.

HOW TO PRESERVE YOUR FAMILY PHOTOGRAPHS

The following is reprinted from "The Newfoundland Ancestor" 8,2. It was written by Dianne Jackman from information given by guest speaker Ann Devlin-Fisher of the Provincial Archives of Newfoundland and Labrador.

There are black and white photographs which are made up of light-sensitive silver salts (silver halide) and there are colour photographs and slides which are made up of dyes. Black and white pictures last longer and preserve better than colour. Colour pictures will fade and/or change colour over time. But with the right care your colour pictures should last for decades.

WHAT CAUSES PHOTOGRAPHS TO DETERIORATE?

High temperature and humidity. Temperatures above 70F and humidity above 60% for long periods should be avoided. Do not store your photographs in an attic as they will be exposed to fluctuating temperature changes or in basements where they will be exposed to dampness.

Pollutants in the atmosphere. Paint and varnish fumes are harmful. If you paint a room with oil based paint remove your photographs for at least a month. Cleaning agents that use chlorine or ammonia will harm your photographs so don't store near these products. Some other pollutants include sulphur compounds, tobacco smoke, auto exhaust, dust and salt sea air.

Residual chemicals. You should always have your film processed by a reputable film professional. Someone inexperienced might leave damaging chemicals on your photographs. These chemicals can cause black and white photographs to turn yellowish brown and eventually fade the image. They will also increase the effect of heat and humidity.

Direct physical contact with harmful materials. Do not touch the front of the photograph and don't use ink to write on the back. Try not to bend, cut or scratch your photographs. Also do not use glue or tape and paper clips or staples.

Exposure to light. You should avoid direct exposure by sunlight or fluorescent light as they will both damage an image on a photograph. More so on colour photographs than black and white.

Physical damage. To avoid damage from fire, flood or any other natural disaster you could store your photographs in an enameled steel file cabinet or put them in a safe deposit box. It is also a good idea to have copies made of your photographs and give them to relatives for safe keeping.

Nitrate based film. This film was used in the early 1900's. It is unstable and flammable. As it is decomposing it gives off a gas and can become powdery or gel like. It can damage other photos or negatives stored near it. If at all possible you should have photographs on nitrate based film copied to safer film. A simple test to check for nitrate based negatives is to cut a very thin strip from the film and put a match to it in an ashtray. If it is nitrate based it will catch fire and burn, but if it is a safe negative it will shrivel up and not catch fire.

SOME DO'S AND DON'TS TO HELP YOU PRESERVE YOUR PHOTOGRAPHS

DO use special photographic paper, envelopes and mounting boards to store and mount your pictures. The paper products should be acid free.

DON'T use regular paper envelopes or construction paper to store or mount your pictures.

DO use archival linen tape, filmoplast tape, polyvinyl acetate gelatin adhesive, mounting boards with overlay sheets, or dry mounting tissue.

DON'T use scotch tape, rubber cement, glue, paste, paper clips or staples to secure your photographs to mounting materials.

DO store your photographs in acid-free Hollengen Boxes, stainless steel or enamel-coated steel cabinets and frames and porcelain frames. Use acid-free matting between your print and the glass to provide ventilation and to keep the print from sticking to the glass.

DON'T store photographs in contact with ordinary cardboard, styrofoam or wood, especially if varnished.

DO store prints in the coolest, driest area possible with a fairly constant temperature.

DON'T store prints in attics or basements. Temperature changes in these areas daily and can cause damage to prints.

DO use special envelopes, bags and sheets made of polyethylene, acrylic plastics or cellulose acetate.

DON'T use polyvinyl-chloride plastics (PVC's). These plastics are often found in ordinary photograph albums.

LENIS (SMITH) SINNOCK DIARY OF 1911

The following is submitted by Doreen Thomeus. It is the diary written by her aunt, Lenis (Smith) Sinnock who, with her parents, came to Alberta in the winter of 1911. Logan and Maggie Smith eventually homesteaded the NW 1/4 20-54-5-W5, in the Lake Isle district. Prior to that they lived on Donald MacDonald's place on the Sturgeon River between Darwell and Lake Isle stores. Logan died in 1937 at 80 years of age and Maggie in 1940 at the age of 69. Both are buried in the Stanger cemetery. Doreen's father was Charlie, but somehow is not mentioned in the introduction. The baby, Thelma, born on that trip died at nine years of age from the Spanish flu; the day after her mother. One would wonder why they left Montana in November with a baby and another one on the way.

This is a copy of a diary written by Lenis Margaret Smith, daughter of Maggie Huldah Page and Lycendus Logan Smith. Those going on this trip: Logan and Maggie Smith; Grace and Frenchie Brown and daughter, Annie, 11 months old. Lenis, Lorena, Chester, Ida Smith and a friend Gus Johnson. They made the trip in a covered wagon.

Sunday, 12 Nov, 1911 Started for Canada from Albert Brown's (Frenchie's brother) at 10 o'clock. Landed at Charlie Thoms first night. 22 degrees below zero.

Monday 13 Nov Left C Thoms at 8 a.m., arrived at Jack Holland's Ranch at 4:30 p.m. Cloudy all day, wind in the north, three mysterious lights in the west, supposed to be diamonds.

Tuesday 14 Nov Left Jack Holland's Ranch at 7:30 a.m. Arrived at Silesia at 2 p.m.

Wednesday 15 Nov Left Silesia at 7:30 a.m. Arrived 8 miles south of Billings at 5 p.m. Stopped in Laurel from 10:30 till 2:10 p.m. having horses shod. Chester and French went on to B.

Thursday 16 Nov Left at 7:50 a.m. Arrived at Billings at 11 a.m. Left at 3:40 p.m. Arrived 5 miles north of Billings at 5 p.m.

Friday 17 Nov Arrived at 20 mile Basin. An officer warned us against horse thieves and we had them to deal with. They fired amongst us about 12 shots...they stayed around us all night, the men had to sit up and watch.

Saturday 18 Nov Arrived at Buckley without much trouble. Horse thieves tried to get horses again.

Sunday 19 Nov Arrived at Roundup about 5 p.m. and took in the town and one show.

Monday 20 Nov Just got 10 miles north of Roundup at Lake Basin as we had to get horses shod at Roundup and we were late getting started.

Tuesday 21 Nov 30 miles from Roundup, everything all right. A very cold but thaughing wind blew all day.

Wednesday 22 Nov Within 7 miles of forest range. Chester and French went hunting, never came home until dark, then Papa went after them.

Thursday 23 Nov Arrived 9 miles south of Lewistown about 5 p.m.

Friday 24 Noov Left Hemen about 9 a.m. - got into Lewistown at noon, stayed in town 2 1/2 hours. Got 7 miles north of town.

Saturday 25 Nov Left at 7:30 a.m. Landed at Judith River. Cloudy and stormy all day. Deer Field Post Office.

Sunday 26 Nov Landed 2 miles south of Denton. 20 degrees below zero.

Monday 27 Nov Stormy and cold, just went about a mile.

Tuesday 28 Nov Came about 25 miles today, camped on Arrow River. Came over the bad lands. We all had to walk and doubled up the teams up one hill.

Wednesday 29 Nov Left Arrow River about 8 a.m. Landed about 30 miles from Fort Benton.

Thursday 30 Nov Thanksgiving Day and we are all very thankful that we are alive and going to ship after today. This is our last day out. We left about 6:30 a.m. and came 29 miles, got at Fort Benton at 4:40 p.m.

Friday 1 Dec Fort Benton, Montana. Rested the horses all day as one was sick. Went to a moving picture show.

Saturday 2 Dec It cost \$30 to get a rail car from Fort Benton, so we are leaving for Great Falls where we can get rates, are 25 miles from Great Falls tonight.

Sunday 3 Dec Have been on the road just 3 weeks today, are within 12 miles of Great Falls now at 3:30 p.m.

Monday 4 Dec Started from camp at 7:30 a.m. Landed at Great Falls at 11 a.m. 12 Miles.

Tuesday 5 Dec Moved out of town a ways on the bank of the Missouri about 2:30 p.m.

Wednesday 6 Dec Went to two moving pictures shows last night, also a street car ride up to the mines.

Thursday 7 Dec Was visiting all day at McClouds or McDonalds, meet the girls.

Friday 8 Dec Went to the smelter in the street car, went all through the copper smelter, came back to town, ate dinner at Mint Cafe, then went to the Black Eagle P.K. in the street car, came back home about 5 p.m. Mr and Mrs McClouds were here.

Saturday 9 Dec Are all invited to Jessie Weble dinner. Evening went to Jessies dinner then to 2 shows after through the court house and depot.

Sunday 10 Dec All went up to the spring and Rainbow Falls, Mr and Mrs Webb and family were here for supper. Had a big time.

Monday 11 Dec Went to 3 shows and also had a ride in the bus. A man was shot twice in the body, very close to our camp and about the time we came home.

Tuesday 12 Dec Went to Webb's in the evening, played games, had lots of fun, met Mr Ed Manning.

Wednesday 13 Dec Loaded the rail car. Grace took sick, took her to the hospital. Baby Thelma born this day.

Thursday 14 Dec Started from Great Falls at 10 a.m. for Canada. Arrived at Lethbridge at 7:15 p.m. (on train)

Friday 15 Dec Left Lethbridge at 3:30 at night. Arrived at Calgary at 11:30 a.m. Will leave here at 3 p.m. for Edmonton, get there at 10:10 p.m.

Saturday 16 Dec At Edmonton in Lodging house P.J. at 4 p.m. Came to settlers house. Everything fine.

Sunday 17 Dec Are at the Immigration Hall, got our dinner here, but took breakfast at the hotel.

Monday 18 Dec Saw 2 teams of oxen today. Never have heard from Grace or the car. (railroad car?)

Tuesday 19 Dec Scrubbed today and went to town to get some fresh air. Edmonton is 7 miles by 4 miles. Gus left for Edson.

Wednesday 20 Dec Heard from Grace and Jessie, everything all right. Met 2 men from Oles.

Friday 22 Dec Papa and car came last night at 2 o'clock, everything is all right.

Saturday 23 Dec Scrubbed and washed this morning, helped Mrs. Blair afternoon for 25 cents an hour.

Monday 25 Dec - Xmas Had a nice time, everything all right. Chester went to Wabamum and Lac St. Anne and back same night.

Tuesday 26 Dec Scrubbed and washed. Sent a message to Great Falls to French.

Wednesday 27 Dec Grace, French and baby came last night about 10:30 p.m.

Thursday 28 Dec It is 28 degrees below, in eve 30 degrees below.

Friday 29 Dec Chester is going with the rail car tonight. Lorena had a letter from Gus today.

Saturday 30 Dec Papa and French left this morning at 6:30 for Lac St. Anne. The rail car never went at all but the depot agent said it had, it was to leave tonight at 10 o'clock.

Sunday 31 Dec French came back last night to find out why the car never started out. Car started out at 10 Saturday night.

Monday 1 Jan 1912 French left this morning for Wabumum and Lac St. Anne.

Tuesday 2 Jan Got to Wabamum at 9 p.m. Unloaded the car and loaded the wagons.

Wednesday 3 Jan Will leave this morning for Lac St. Anne. Left Wabamum at 10:30 p.m. Landed at Lac St. Anne at 4 a.m.

Saturday 13 Jan The baby is one month old today.

Monday 15 Jan Went part way to Cam. McDonald was here this evening. Chester left today at noon to work for McDonald.

Wednesday 17 Jan A man was here hunting horses. Nice day - thawed all day.

March 15 Grace, Lorena, Papa and I went to St. Anne today.

March 16 Broke up camp.

March 17 Chester's birthday. Musgrave and McDonald was here.

March 18 All camp men stopped here.

THE ALBERTA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OBJECTS

WE, the undersigned, hereby declare that we desire to form a society under the Societies Act, R.S.A. 1970 and that:

1 The name of the Society is - Alberta Genealogical Society.

2 The objects of the Society are -

a) To promote the study of genealogy and genealogical research within the Province of Alberta;

b) To encourage adherence to accuracy and thoroughness in research;

c) To encourage and instruct members in the ethical principles, scientific methods and effective techniques of genealogical research and to defend the standards of genealogy from incompetent and disreputable persons;

d) To assemble a library of genealogical guides, handbooks, reference sources, family and local histories, and other books and materials which may assist the members, all of whom will be available to the members;

e) From time to time to publish such bulletins, booklets, books, pamphlets, or other documents as may be found desirable and expedient by the Executive of the Society and to make the same available to the members and others on such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Executive;

f) To establish friendly relations with other genealogical societies for exchange of ideas and information and the promotion of common interests;

g) To enter into arrangements with other genealogical societies for the publication of bulletins, booklets, books, pamphlets, or other documents, on such terms and conditions as may be found desirable and expedient by the Executive.

h) To promote seminars and workshops on genealogical research and methodology and such other studies as may seem helpful to the members;

i) To provide a centre and suitable meeting place for the various activities of the Society and its members by rent or purchase or otherwise.

j) To encourage the establishment of Branches of the Society under such terms and conditions as the by-laws of the Society may from time to time provide;

k) To achieve the foregoing objects, funds may be raised and donations, gifts, legacies and bequests accepted.

3 The operations of the Society are to be carried out chiefly in the Province of Alberta.
