MORE FOR IRISH RESEARCHERS - The Genealogy Centre of Derry, a major participant in the Irish Genealogical Project (IGP) have indexed all pre-1900 Catholic registers (eight parishes) of the Inishowen Peninsula, County Donegal, the 1831 census (40 769 entries) for County Derry, the mid-19th Century Griffith's Valuation (55 016 entries) and the early 19th century Tithe records (41 606 entries) for the County and Diocese of Derry. They also have access to the 1901 census for County Derry and the Inishowen Peninsula, County Donegal (200 000 entries); to pre-1922 civil birth, marriage and death records for County Derry and to passenger lists through the port of Derry for the years 1800-1819, 1833-1835 and 1847-1871. The local paper often will photocopy an obituary. It provides further family information.

The local history book for an area may have the family story. Check with your library to obtain the desired history book by inter-library loan.

MASTER DATA BANK UPDATE

It appears not everyone is as yet informed about the AGS Master Data Bank Index on microfiche, printed in 1992. This 133 000 name microfiche is available at all AGS Branches as they appear on the back cover of this publication. Also this microfiche is available at the Provincial Archives in Edmonton, and the Glenbow Museum in Calgary as well as the Family Histories Society in Calgary.

While most of the names on this microfiche are from cemetery burials, it does contain names from eleven other sources such as newspaper obituaries, birth, death, and marriage records. A few local history books that have been indexed are also included in the microfiche.

Many more names have been added to the Master Data Bank since the publishing of this microfiche. Anybody wishing to contribute a list of names, be it from a cemetery or some other type of record, is asked to write to the Master Data Bank of the AGS.

FONS FAMILY ORIGIN NAME SURVEY

FOR THE FIRST TIME - COMPUTERIZED ACCESS TO THE RICH RECORDS OF THE MIDDLE AGES

FONS is a non-profit organization aimed at making accessible to family historians the vast mediaeval record archives of the British Isles. To this end we have embarked on a programme which would ultimately produce aa computerized database containing all surviving record material from the period before 1600 (with the exception of parish register baptisms and marriages 1538-1600, which should eventually be covered by the International Genealogical Index).

Information from the database will be made available to individuals or groups registering with us at a small basic fee for each entry. Registration and life membership costs L5, and is permanent. Each registered user may then choose to receive a specified, limited, number of entries from the database as material comes in, at their own discretion. When this limit has been reached, each user can choose to continue membership to a new limit of their own choosing. Funds raised in this way will be devoted to the enlargement of the database.

We have already assembled a large amount of mediaeval material, which is constantly being added into the database. The material is diverse, including direct transcripts from manuscripts, printed material (including copies of originals now lost) and record calendars.

This service is particularly suitable to One-Name Studies and for family historians interested in relatively unusual surnames. Where an entry gives only an abstract or a calendar entry, we can advise as to how to obtain copies, transcripts and translations of the original document.

THIS SERVICE ALLOWS THE SURNAME-COLLECTOR, ONE-NAME STUDY ORGANIZATION OR FAMILY HISTORIAN THE UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY TO PLUG IN TO AN ONGOING MAJOR RESEARCH PROGRAMME, INTO RECORDS WHICH ARE NORMALLY QUITE INACCESSIBLE (IN THAT THEY ARE MOSTLY WRITTEN IN ABBREVIATED LATIN OR NORMAN-FRENCH IN VERY DIFFICULT HANDS) AT A NOMINAL COST.

Non-Register Archives 1600-1858

We also have exclusive access to the archives of a major genealogical research organization, including will abstracts, will lists and other name lists (poll books, land tax assessments, muster rolls etc) from the period 1600 to 1858. This database is being enlarged continuously, and computerized. To help raise the finance for the main FONS project, a similar service is being made available from this "later records" database: again, registration and lifetime membership costs just L5, and entries for your surname of interest are provided at a small cost per item.

FONS cont

When FONS first advertised this service, just over a year ago, we anticipated that the greatest demand would be for the pre-1600 sources: in fact, the miscellaneous material covered from 1600 to 1858 has proved very useful to many researchers, and we have found our indexes, unexpectedly, being used as a main research tool.

THE BARRETT REGISTER

"The Barrett Register" is a collection of Barrett ancestral lines submitted by persons from Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, The United States, England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and Canada, who have Barrett ancestors. Some submissions show one Barrett ancestor but others indicate successful research back ten or twelve gaenerations. The Register was started in 1980 and presently there are 732 ancestral lines included in the collection. Each ancestral line, printed on a special form in order to provide continuity in the collection, gives pertinent details of each ancestor, information about their spouses as well as a listing of their siblings.

When an ancestral line is received it is indexed by geographical place names. The place names are recorded in an index along with the name and address of the contributor. The new line is then cross-referenced with all other lines in the file which have ancestors living in the same geographical places. The contributor is then advised as to the names and addresses of others registered with ancestors in the same locations. Copies of similar ancestral lines are sent to both parties so that they can compare their records and make contact with each other for further research.

Many times a new registrant will receive several generations of information by simply registering their own Barrett ancestors. One outstanding case was when a lady from Australia asked for information about her ancestors only to receive four generations of information as well as the name of a distant cousin in England and a distant cousin in the State of Washington, USA, that she had never know of before.

To augment "The Barrett Register" a collection of Barrett records is maintained which are an aid in answering queries. Over 1100 names and addresses of correspondents, listed alphabetically and numerically are included in the index for the Barrett register. The register lists 2477 place names where Barrett ancestors have been found and a total of 3409 references for the place names listed. There is no cost involved to registering one's ancestral line. LOOK, THERE'S A GRAVEYARD!

Although being a genealogist may mean burning the midnight oil, it doesn't usually mean working the graveyard shift, but it does mean working many shifts in the graveyard and, in addition, spending vacation time visiting cemeteries. Picture the face of your non-genealogist friend upon hearing how you spent your summer touring graveyards. He probably doesn't realize the excitement there is in packing the whole family in the car and driving over county roads in search of that special place and spending the day in the open air at one with nature, etc. Over the years the Baines family has participated in recording graveyards both here in Southern Alberta for the A.G.S. and in searching for ancestors' names in graveyards in Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia.

The Bradwell, Saskatchewan cemetery brings backs some of the most vivid memories of cemetery recording. Mum, Dad, Grandma and four children aged nine years down to three years participated in this memorable experience. Somehow "Oldest Son" managed to evade the vacation.

After spending the night in Saskatoon the family was packed in the car and travelled out to Bradwell to search for the graveyard. As it wasn't readily apparent which clump of trees concealed the target, a stop was made at the only place in town that looked like it had any movement at all - the local bar - where the bartender gave directions in a matter of fact manner as if it were an everyday occurrence to give directions rather than serve drinks.

The family descended on the cemetery and the mosquitoes descended on the family, especially the three-year old who ended up with huge welts all over his body. Fortunately nine-year-old had his lucky rabbit's foot with him or it could have been worse. Maybe the cemetery would have been infested with bears rather than mosquitoes. With haste we copied down the inscriptions we needed and hustled to the car.

Because it was relatives' tombstone inscriptions we were copying it was easy to be quick. Did you ever notice that the inscriptions of non-relatives tend to be much longer than those of relatives. Sometimes in transcribing a cemetery, a tombstone is found that has huge amounts of data including all the children's names. Why would all the children's names be listed? Possibly it is because parents often have to list all the children's names before seizing upon the correct one so this listing of names is heard so often the children think this is important information and add it to the tombstone. No such luck in this family. Did you ever find your great-grandmother's grave and find only a footstone with the word "Mother" on it? Anyone entering information from tombstones of this family into the computer will appreciate the briefness of the inscriptions. There is no need to even use the remarks column.

This wasn't the end to the Bradwell cemetery story. On reaching Saskatoon it was found that the lucky rabbit's foot was missing and no amount of consolation, bribery, or promises of another rabbit's foot would bring calmness to the family. No other lucky rabbit's foot

would do. The next morning found the family back in the Bradwell cemetery looking for the lucky rabbit's foot and ignoring all the tombstones with their information about those gone on before. This expedition was a success and the lucky rabbit's foot was reunited with its happy owner.

Grandma was horrified on one occasion when a young grandson took her to a tombstone and explained that this was the kind of tombstone he wanted when he died. Children always know who to ask when they want something. Grandma hoped she wouldn't be around when he needed his tombstone.

One of the members of the Lethbridge Branch has a big bus converted to a camper and this has accompanied the Lethbridge Branch members on many of their cemetery recording excursions. For some reason not many cemeteries come equipped with a bathroom and the biffy at the back of the camper often comes in handy.

In the summer of 1991 several branch members took off in the bus and spent several days recording cemeteries in Southern Alberta. If you don't count the mosquitoes, the sunburns, the dusty roads and the roads that were not joined by a bridge across the river it was actually a very relaxing interlude. Several cemeteries were completed in the daytime and the evenings were spent in campgrounds as well as movie theatres.

One small cemetery that was recorded on this occasion was in the middle of a field surrounded by a barb-wire fence with no gate. It was overgrown with bushes, trees and underbrush. Two of our members crawled through the fence and pushed through the foliage and copied the inscriptions. When the task was nearly completed one of the recorders noticed bear sign. Luckily the bear didn't return before the group retreated. One wonders what would have happened had the bear been there at the time. Perhaps there would have been two less members of A.G.S. - one swallowed by the bear and the other tangled in the barb wire while frantically trying to get out. Luckily both lived to record another cemetery.

When the children were little they could spy a cemetery wherever they went.

"Look, there's a graveyard. Shouldn't we stop?"

They didn't realize that we were only interested in Southern Alberta cemeteries or cemeteries that held the remains of our own relatives.

Somewhere along the way this youthful zeal for graveyards has disappeared. Last summer when the branch was going out on the annual cemetery recording ordeal, I mean excursion, all five of the children (the youngest now sixteen) were invited to come and help.

The oldest flat-out declined. He had been in so many cemeteries when he was little that he never needed to go again. At first it sounded more hopeful with the second. He allowed he would go, but added, "only if there is free beer". Being he doesn't drink, and he knew his mother wouldn't be involved in serving beer, free or otherwise, I guess he felt pretty safe.

The next invitation was battled with great logic.

"As soon as you get the cemetery recorded someone else will die and be buried there and so the recording will be outdated. Wait until everybody dies so you can have a complete recording."

It was no use trying to out-think this boy.

One boy said he would come if he couldn't find anything better to do. Sleeping in on Saturday morning was definitely rated higher than cemetery recording.

Some day, perhaps, some of these children will become interested in their ancestors and get involved in the great search. They may even become enthused about graveyards again.

By next summer we, too, will have forgotten the mosquitoes, the sunburn, the rain whose beginning co-incides with the arrival of the branch members at a cemetery, and any other annoyances that have already been forgotten, and remember the great excitement that comes from looking in a cemetery recording done by some group in a faraway place and finding that bit of information that takes us back one more generation and keeps us involved in researching our family.

- Jun 15 Passed preliminary examination under Doctor Stewart and Mortlock in Blair.
 - 8-16 Drilled seven times
 - 16 Flag stolen Thursday evening. Was presented by citizens of Blair, Thursday June 16.
 - 17-19 Drilled seven times
 - 20 Stolen flag returned Sunday eve.
 - 20-23 Drilled seven times
 - 24 Special police in Blair during circus
 - 25 Drilled three times
 - 28 Went to fire at 2 AM in NE part of Blair (Earl was on fire dept)
 Left Blair at 2 AM for Florence.
 Marched from Florence to Fort Omaha in afternoon
 Went into quarters, received blankets. Company A surved dinner, had bread and water salt and potatoes.
 Had platoon drill in evening. Was Elected third corporal of first platoon. Went to Omaha in evening.
 - 29 Went to Omaha with Clarence Blakeney detailed to purchase infantry drill regulations. Passed final medical exam at Fort Omaha. Went on guard mount in evening. Weighed 136 1/2 lbs and height 5′ 9 1/2"
 - 30 Saw Edith Haller at Fort Omaha. Doctor Mortlock and W.F. Sanderson. Drilled twice in evening
- Jul 1 George deTemple Sr. visitor. Went on guard mount at 9 AM.
 Three releifs. Staid untill 10 AM July 2 nd. Clarence
 Blakeney, Tom Noble and Will the negro cook caught running
 the guard line. Company drill in eve. Will Haller, Arthur
 Grimm and Claude Van Dusen arrived from Chickamauga.
- Jun 30 Transfured from Company D, 2 nd. Reg. N.V.I. to company E, 3rd. Reg. N.V,I,
- Jul 2 Tom Noble caught running guard line in eve.
 - 3 First reading of the artickels of war Visitors were Mr. and Mrs. O'Hanlan, Mr. and Mrs. Culley, Mr. Harland Fawsett, James Fairchild, Miss Eunice Tracey, Blanch Hungate, Miss Weisse, Mr. McAuarie, Beils boys, Frank Tompson, F.W. Kenney.
 - 4 Went to Omaha and saw fireworks on Trans Mississippi grounds. Arrived at fort at 7 AM.
 - 6 Company took the oath and signed the muster roll. Heavy rain most of the afternoon. Company measured for first suit of clothes.

- Jul 9 C. Blakeney, S.B. Alloway and myself went to Omaha to have stripes sewed on clothing, Signed new muster roll. Old one was made out rong.
 - 10 Received guns, haversack and knapsacks. Gun no. 261602
 - 13 Took pictures of soldiers. Ran guard line in evening fell in ditch and got muddy. Fireworks in eve. Father, mother, sisters Edith and May were visitors.
 - 18 Left Omaha in afternoon, crossed Missouri river into Iowa, crossed Mississippi into Illinois at Rock Island.
 - Left Illinois, crossing the Ohio river into the state of Kentucky, passing through Fulton into Martin Tennessee then east to Nashville. Went south to Chickamaugua through Chattanooga into the State of Georgia. At Macon boys got off to get canteens filled with beer at brewery. Our train backed up and ran into a switch engine coming up the track with some soldiers that had got left. Broke caboose all to pieces, broke end sleeper some, broke smoke stack, head light and fender. No one hurt much. Laid up about 4 hours.
 - 22 Reached Jacksonville Florida about 9 AM and we went into camp.
 - 24 Will Haller, Arthur Grimm and myself went acrost the St. Johns river, stole three watermelons.
 - 25 Went fishing.
 - 26 Lewis, Haller, Stanfield, Grimm, Warwick and myself floored our tent.
 - 28 Heavy rains in late afternoon
 - 30 General inspection.
 - 31 Went fishing.
- Aug 3 Received payment of U.S. up to \$38.40
 - 4 Went on guard as corporal.
 - 6 Inspection of quarters.
 - 7 Washed underwear and wrote letters.
 - 9 Went to Jacksonville and bought camera. \$45.00
 - 16 Worked on darkroom, drilled in morning.
 - 18 Had heavey marching inspection. Took two pictures of Co. E
 - 20 Regimental parade.
 - 31 Seventh army corp left Panama park and marched to Jacksonville and back.
- Sep 1 Over 200 reported to 3 rd. regiment hospital, partially the effect of marching to Jacksonville.
 - 8 Tore up camp to be ready to moove to Pablo in morning.
 Rain most of the morning.
 - 9 Marched to Jacksonville, crossed river on steamboat and took narrowguage railroad to Pablo. Went into camp on the sea shore.
 - 11 Taken sick. Had cramps in my stomach. Will Haller stoped them with hot lemonade and hot, hot vinegar applied externally. Went to hospital and got medecine.
 - 13 Stomach very sore. Refused to have prescription filled that the major prescribed for me. Came nearly having charges prefured against me for same.

- SEP 16 Felt some better. Took two pictures of the ocean.
 - 17 Captain took an outing without permission, leaving the company without a comanding officer and had to put inspection off until Sunday.
 - 18 Received payment of U.S. up to Sept 1 st. \$18.00
 - 21 A good deal of police work in Co. E's street. Captain got a jacking up for not tending to his business and having such a dirty street.
- OCT 2 Heavy rain most of the day. Moved camp to Pablo. Got soaking wet. Slept in wet clothes rest of the noght.
 - 4 The old woman that owned the house that we had taken posession of, came around and raised cain and we had to move out into our tents.
 - 6 Rented small house at \$1.00 per week.
 - 7 Fixed room up to develope pictures in at night.
 - 10 Received payment of U.S. up to Oct 1 at \$18.00
 - 11 Took three pictures of the ocean.
 - 12 Acting sergeant of the provost guard.
 - 14 Moped around.
 - 16 Took pictures of the Pavillion Hospital.
 - 15 The doctor held a post mortem examination on the body of a sergeant that had died from the excess use of alcohol We let them use our room to operate in.
 - 16 During the night the guards had to take care of a soldier from the 1 sr. La. that had delerium tremens.
 - 22 Received my warrant as corporal. Packed baggage to moove. Left Savannah about 5:15
- Nov 4 Received payment of U.S. to Nov. 1 st. \$18.00. Went to town on a one mile pass and bought shoes and photo supplies.
 - 14 Co. E. organized a football team.
 - 18 Rain all day.
 - 30 Took a picture of a ragged little negroe boy that some of the soldiers caught and would not let him go. He was very much scared.
- Dec 2 Went on guard and during the night some soldiers tried to tear down a man's stand and partly succedded, then they tried to burn his tent by throwing gasoline on it and setting it on fire. The gaurd was called out and extras had to be posted to keep them quiet.
 - 10 Cold and chilly.
 - 11 Took picture of the transport Panama going down the river.
 - 23 Made some pictures for the captain.
 - 24 I had charges prefured against Stull for refusing to obey a non-commissioned officer. I was corporal of camp police.
 - 25 Merry Christmas. Co. E. made Lieut. Kenny a present of a Colt revolver. Lieut Kenny made each one in the Co. a present of a nice two bladed pocket knife.————Turkey, cookies, pies, apples, Banannas, pickels, etc. for dinner. Oyster soup for supper. Everyone took two quinine pills.
 - 29 Tomorrow bound for Cuba.

Dec 30 Anton Knutson and In went uptown and nearly got left. We got stuck two or three times in cuming down the river. Passed Palm Beach at night.

1899

- Jan 8 Sighted the lights of Morro Castle about 7 PM and entered the harbour, and cast anchor within about 125 yards of the wreck of the Maine.
 - 2 Camp about 8 or 9 miles west of Havana
 - 4 Restaked our tents and had a hard time trying to drive the stakes into the rock.
 - 8 Wrote letter home.
 - 13 Went to Havana cemetery and took pictures of the plot in which about 75 victims of a the wreck the Maine are buried. We saw the large monument erected in honor of a lot of firemen killed in Havana. This is one of the finest monuments in the world.
 - 18 Soles of my shoes came off at dress parade and had to fall out.
 - 21 Van Shoick and I started to make a dark room. I was corporal of camp police.
- Feb 3 Took two pictures of the firemans monument, and one of a large vat of human bones. The wall around the bones is about 60 feet square, and the pile of bones about 12 or 14 feet deep.
 - 5 Inspection of mens arms to see if they had been vaccinated and that it had taken.
 - 6 Co. drill and dress parade. Reading the sentence of Woerheide and playing the rogues march at dress parade. Sentenced to three months imprisonment at hard labour and forfeiture of all pay, and dishonourable discharge for violation of 62 nd. articles of war. He drew a gun on major Scharmann and the major had to throw him out of his tent and tie him.
 - 12 Heavy wind all night and all the tents that had floors in them were blown down.
 - 23 Will Haller and I went to Havana. We got a Cuban angry and he threw his money away. And over to Morro Castle. Went in when the guard was not looking and saw the interior. The walls are about 8 feet thick.
- Mar 4 Made over 60 pictures.
 - 26 Made ovaer 50 pictures.
 - 30 Col. Vilquaine reprimanded the men that hollored "embalmed beef" after the review by Alger. Received orders that we would be in the US in about two weeks.
- Apr 2 Received payment of US up to April 1 st. \$17.84.
 - 4 Took two pictures of Cuban boy with spotted skin and white hair on front of head.

 Nebraska Re. received orders about 8 PM to be ready to moove at 8 AM and go on board the transport Logan bound for Dry Tortugas.

- Apr 7 Left the harbour at about 5 PM withe the band playing Home Sweet Home, Auld Lang Sine and other popular airs.
 - 13 Boarded the boat and were taken to Danfauskie to go into quarentine for five days.

Balance of the diary covers the taking of many more pictures, the trip home and their arrival at Kansas City. G. Sutherland
