SHIELD: The tree has long been symbolic of genealogical activity. Using the provincial tree combines this general notion with the geographic focus of the Society's work. The eight ears of wheat symbolize the eight branches of AGS (at the time of the request). They might also symbolize the gathering in of the family and, the eight great grandparents of each Albertan.

CREST: The York Boat symbolizes the notions of immigration and exploration, and, therefore, major themes in the individual and family heritage of members. It would be the first time this beautiful symbol has been used in Canadian heraldry. The square sail featuring the arms of the Society is a new version of an old idea, where the "spirit" of a community is placed at the heart of a vessel. Here it gives the second meaning to the crest, that is the well-being of the Society being transported into the

SUPPORTERS: The grassy mound represents all the lands where Albertans are settled. The female horse and maled buffalo represent all the men and women who have created and been part of Alberta families. They also symbolize the natural riches of the Alberta landscape. The teepee ring medallions honour the provinces First Peoples and families, while repeating the symbolism of eight.

MOTTO: The motto QUAERERE INVENIRE PERSCRIBERE is a fine expression of the genealogical approach AGS encourages. Translated into English, the motto means "Seek Research Record".

Canadian reader on trail of Leper House leads

In her letter below, Betty Thompson, of Alberta, Canada, asks for any further information readers may have which links her ancestor - Isabella Allen - with The Leper House, near Codsall (pictured above).

Our own past research into this curious antiquity reveals a reference, in the Parish Registers, as far back as 1596 - to 'Ye Lepre House', at Codsall.

Local sulphurous water was supposed to have had great healing qualities (as noted by the historian Plot in 1686) - and those seeking its benefits were apparently 'put up' at The Leper House...

Dear Sir

I got such an overwhelming and favourable response when you printed a picture of John Allen, the butcher, of Tettenhall, in the February issue of 1991, that I just had to write with another problem in my research.

I have a death certificate might look for this (1840, 4th July) for Isabella information would certainly be most appreciated. I do not old spinster. The place of this death was the Leper House at that might have any

Brewood. I have made contact with a Tettenhall historian, G. Hancock, who informs me it is located not far from Codsall. I would like to hear from anyone who might tell me if my relative was likely to have had leprosy, or if she might have been employed there. Any leads as to where I might look for this information would certainly be most appreciated. I do not have ready access to books that might have any

information in them on the Leper House or Leper Farm. I understand it is an ancient site dating back to at least 1716.

I trust your helpful readers will be as responsive as they were to my last letter. May you and your staff enjoy a wonderful 1993. Please keep 'The Bugle' coming to Canada! Thanks a lot!

THE STRAYS CLEARING HOUSE AND THE NATIONAL STRAYS INDEX

WHAT IS A STRAY?

A Stray is a recorded event in which a person is described in the record as being from, or connected with a place outside the area in which they normally lived. The National Index and most family history societies interpret this as "out-of-county", but some give a narrower interpretation for their own indexes, particularly if they cover a city or a large industrial area. However, in the case of "out-of-parish strays, one should be aware that a lot of this ground may be covered already by the IGI, Boyd, and county marriage indexes.

Census strays are different as they normally show people resident outside their country of birth, but they are collected as a valuable source for the study of family movement. The National Index contains no entries for the 1881 Census, nor any entries which do not give the full PRO reference for each family.

The most frequent types of strays are marriage and census records reflecting the systematic work within societies, but the service distributes and indexes material from poor law records, death and burial records, monumental inscriptions and baptisms. Some of the most interesting are the burials in coastal parishes of drowned seamen washed up from wrecks, where the name of the ship is often given: baptisms of gypsy children with fascinating names; militia men marrying girls from the parishes in which they were stationed during Napoleonic Wars; the list is endless, and browsing can become addictive!

COLLECTING STRAYS IN THE UK

The first person to suggest a national "out-of-area" index was Mrs. M.J. Lodey in a letter to the "Genealogists' Magazine", 18 (2) June 1975, p99. She undertook to index any contributions sent to her, and continued to do so for almost seven years. During this time, she indexed four collections of strays, one of which she also typed up herself, and these have now been made available on microfiche by the Federation of Family History Societies.

By the end of 1981 many strays or out-of-area indexes were run by family history societies for the benefit of their members. These indexers frequently passed on to their colleagues in other countries strays found in their own county. This was on an informal basis, usually at FFHS meetings to save the cost of postage. It was suggested that some type of clearing house system could extend this informal exchange to those indexers who were unable to attend FFHS meetings regularly.

The FFHS Strays Clearing House was set up by Mrs. P.M. Pattinson at the same time as Mr. M.J. Gandy volunteered to take over the task of compiling the National Strays Index, and from that time the two have worked together.

Since then, Michael Gandy has compiled two enormous collections and has handed on the burden to Mrs. June Thomas. The Clearing House is now used by almost all UK Societies and is receiving an increasing number of contributions from overseas.

THE NATIONAL STRAYS INDEX

The National Strays Index is not open to individual inquiries. Each collection is arranged alphabetically by surname, typed up by volunteers and reproduced on microfiche.

One copy is provided free of charge to any FFHS member society in return for a self-addressed label (not envelope) and return postage (30p). The offer is also open to overseas societies, but they are asked to send L1.20 sterling towards the cost of airmail postage.

Individuals may purchase a set of all 4 Collections for L6 sterling, now inc.ofVAT. Please add 50p toward UK postage and L1 overseas. All remittances should be payable to "FFHS".

THE STRAYS CLEARING HOUSE

The society strays co-ordinators process strays found by their members, and maintain an index to those returned to the county by other co-ordinators via the Strays Clearing House. Every half-year, a month or two before the FFHS meeting, each co-ordinator sends a parcel of strays to the Strays Clearing House. Over the previous 6 months, co-ordinators have copied the material found onto 5" x 3" slips, making duplicate slips for the National Index where appropriate; one set of slips is sorted by pre-1974 counties for passing on to other societies, and the second set alphabetically for the National Index.

The parcels containing these two sequences reach the Clearing House around March 1st and August 1st every year.; usually 40+ arrive, along with smaller individual contributions, from both the UK and overseas. Over the following weeks, each parcel is re-sorted; the alphabetical sequence being sent to the National Indexer, and the county sequence being split up into envelopes for individual counties. The sorted strays are then distributed to societies, usually via the 'post-boxes' at FFHS conferences.

Whenever possible, all contributions to the Strays Clearing House should be sent via a society strays co-ordinator. However, individuals may send to the Clearing House direct, using the sample slips (p.122) as guides. Two copies on scrap paper should be provided (except in the case of 1881 Census strays, when only one copy is required), and all surnames and placenames given in capital letters. Do not forget to include the county of origin and the county of source, as well as giving a full reference to the record transcribed. Avoid abbreviations except for the most obvious e.g. bap, bur, mar. We regret that we are unable to acknowledge individual contributions unless they are accompanied by a sae. SEARCHING FOR A STRAY

Most family history societies have a copy of the 4 collections of the National Strays Index on microfiche, which are normally kept either by the Strays Co-ordinator, or with other fiche indexes held by the society.

However, the society strays indexes should also be searched, as they include material not used by the National Index; post 1914 strays, census entries without a full PRO reference, newspaper cuttings and other bulky items. An enquiry to the society co-ordinator (with sae) should produce details of the search service. If you cannot find the address of the strays co-ordinator, address your letter to the society secretary and mark it for the attention of the Strays Co-ordinator. Some societies have typed up and published their strays indexes, and details of these are given in "Current Publications by Member Societies", published by the Federation of Family Hiistory Societies.

Bear in mind that these indexes are a refined form of serendipity. A stray is only identifiable as such if the parish of origin is mentioned, and you cannot normally expect to find entries for a family before they make a move! Although the strays indexes do contain some settlement material, which could help with migration problems, they are by no means exhaustive.

Apart from the IGI there are many other indexes to sources which should be considered first (see "Marriage, Census and Other Indexes by Jeremy Gibson, also published by the FFHS). However, strays indexes contain all those odd entries which have been collected by other family historians, because they were sure someone must be looking for them in another county miles away. They include a mass of material from other counties and countries which could provide that one vital clue which solves the problem of a lifetime. They are greatly under-used.

PETER FIDLER RE-DISCOVERED by Charles D. Denney

In spite of James G. MacGregor's excellent book <u>PETER FIDLER</u>, <u>CANADA'S FORGOTTEN SURVEYOR</u>, the subject of the book remains largely unknown to people of Western Canada. And that is a shame, for here in Western Canada, for thirty-four years, from 1788 to 1822, his activities as a fur trader and surveyor were significant from Great Slave Lake to the Crow's Nest Pass in the west to Hudson's Bay on the east.

What is even more distressing is that hundreds of his descendants, even some who bear the FIDLER or FIDDLER name, have no idea of their ancestry. Worse, some have no interest.

There are even thousands of people in the Winnipeg area who are not aware that he made the first land survey there for Lord Selkirk's Settlement.

However, once the Province started to build an excellent Interpretive Center near Elk Point for the Fort George and Buckingham House fur trade posts that were built nearby on the Saskatchewan River in 1793, interest in Peter Fidler was re-kindled. Peter Fidler not only helped to build Buckingham House, but he also served a time as Master there. That was enough for Ms Billie Milholland, local historian at Elk Point, to start writing stories about Peter, as well as to tell school children about him, and about the history of the forts.

Significantly, out there at Elk Point, about five years ago, there arrived a chemical engineer named Louis Verhagen. Though his work is at the Lindenberg Salt plant out east of town, his energies far exceed the demands of his job. Maybe Billie Milholland inspired him. Maybe it was Steve Andrishak's considerable collection of Fort George-Buckingham House artifacts that caught his attention. Maybe it was Peter Fidler's association with the building of Buckingham House that intrigued him. Or there maybe other maybe's. In any event, Louis Verhagen decided that the genealogy and the history of Peter Fidler and his descendants would henceforth be the driving force of his life.

And that is rather wonderful; for not only has he convinced the Town authorities of the importance of Peter Fidler in their history, but he has also, by some necromancy, already had correspondence with hundreds of Peter's descendants, and his volume of Fidler information is already astounding. Naturally, his desires are insatiable. Sooo! If you are a Fidler descendant, or even if you think you may be, or you know people that bear the name Fidler or Fiddler, Louis Verhagen, Box 765, Elk Point, TOA 1AO, wants to hear from you. Or THEM.

What has to be remarkable also is that, working on their own, as well as co-operating with Louis, are Heather Hallett of 3356 South Ridge Drive, Castlegar, BC V1N 461, and Ed Bourque of 30 South Murphy Street, Campbell River, BC V9W 1Y4. Both of these people are descendants of Peter. And both would be delighted to hear from other kin.

Louis Verhagen's ambition is to write and to publish a complete history and genealogy of Peter Fidler and his descendants. It is a huge undertaking. I beg support for him.

A TRIBUTE TO CLARENCE KIPLING by Charles D. Denney

Long before there was an A.G.G. or a S.G.S. or a M.G.S. there was Clarence KIPLING. Really, before that was his mother., Mary, who inspired him. She was a daughter of Cuthbert McGILLIS, of a very famous fur trade family. Her pride in her ancestry made her want to have it recorded. Better than that, she wanted the stories of all the connected families recorded. Though it was a formidable job, Clarence was willing, and able.

For those who don't know, most of the fur traders, whether from Britain or from Quebec, acquired Indian maidens as wives. In most instances they made good wives, and the men made good husbands. From many such unions came large families. And, in many instances, the off-spring also achieved status in the fur trade fraternity. A good number even became quite famous as diplomats, politicians, policemen, lawyers, judges, nurses, teachers, ministers of the Gospel, and businessmen.

If I had time and energy, I could tell you about some of them. But my story is about Clarence Kipling. If you haven't heard of him, maybe it is because he is a retiring sort of person, a home body. One reason for that is that for many years, even as a young man, he was housekeeper, maid, and nurse for his ailing mother and father at their home at 1741-46th Avenue, S.W., Calgary. That is where his father, James, a descendant of another famous fur trade family, purchased the home site when it was away out in the country, and convenient for raising a large family. That Clarence was a meticulous housekeeper I can assure you. And he still is.

In his earlier years, Clarence didn't like his given name. So, to hundreds of people to whom he wrote hundreds of letters, he was simply C. Kipling. I may, or may not, have convinced him that many other men have been happy to have the name Clarence, and that he should be proud of it. However, it is by C. Kipling that he is known in the National Archives in Ottawa where is housed his extensive assembly of index cards. They were his 1967 Centennial project. Only the staff there, and those who have consulted them, know of them.

That was the year when I became involved in my genealogical studies. Like so many others, I had no knowledge of Clarence. But, to my great surprise, he quickly learned of me. He wrote. I wrote! That 36 year old bundle of generous energy and information really kept me busy, as well as amazed and happy.

And I want to testify now to the very considerable help I received from him in developing my genealogical records of the Selkirk Settlers and of the fur trade families into which they married. Though he didn't travel at all, he had great ability to gather information from numerous sources and to assemble it into authentic families. I profited from that, and from the several hundreds of index cards he made for me.

Clarence is no longer 36. At the age of 60, he doesn't have the zest he had when I first knew him. Too much intensive work with his eyes, and too little appreciation, financial, and otherwise, from those he so generously tried to help, have had a deteriorating effect on his health. While he retains his interest, treasures his

records, and still cheerfully helps some people, he has mostly turned his attention to other activities less demanding, like visiting the sick or the shutins.

I applaud him. I wish more people could know him and appreciate him. Calgarians, Albertans, and many other people, should be proud of him. Certainly, all genealogists should.

Editors Note: The following excerpt is taken from Edmonton Branch AGS publication <u>GENEALOGICAL RESOURCES IN THE EDMONTON AREA</u>, a manual that may be purchased from Edmonton Branch. It is also available in some libraries. This excerpt explains some of Mr. Denneys work mentioned in the above article.

"Mr. Charles Denney spent many years researching and developing accounts of the Selkirk Settlers of Manitoba. Because these people married into the fur trade families, research into these families followed naturally. Since many of the fur traders had native wives, a great many of the families are now Metis or Half-Breed. It is possible that it is in this latter area that Mr. Denney's research is most important."

The Edmonton Branch publication named above contains an index to The Charles D. Denney Papers (pp 203-233).

The Charles D. Denney Papers were sold to the Glenbow-Alberta Institute in Calgary in 1981, and the binders in the library of the Edmonton Branch AGS are copies. Anyone publishing any information from this material, or obtaining benefit from it must credit "Glenbow -Alberta Institute-Charles D. Denney Papers."

SHOULDICE was the site of Calgary's first public cemetery. The area was found to be too rocky and a decision was made to purchase land adjacent to Spiller Road and transfer the remains of those buried in the earlier cemetery to the new one. Single plots cost \$5.00 and the cost of digging the grave was \$2.00. If the family could not afford the \$2.00 fee, a family member or friend of the deceased could dig the grave.

This summer while searching for lost relatives we visited a cemetery which might be of interest. The cemetery is called Beaverhill Lake Cemetery. There is no sign and it is off the road. It is located north of Ryley, the exact directions can be obtained from Ryley Village Office, we found them very helpful. The cemetery is on private land and permission is needed. We walked some distance across a hay field. The gravesites are scattered over a fairly large area. The grass and weeds are tall, so protective clothing and foot wear is needed. Some of the headstones are very old and difficult to read. There is a fence around the cemetery, but also signs of animals having passed through it.

We hope this might help others to locate lost relatives, although we didn't find ours, we did enjoy the trip.

For years rumors have circulated about an abandoned cemetery in the Crowfoot area, fourty five miles East of Calgary. It had not been registered with the County or the Provincial Government. At this time I am unaware of any plans to do so. Over the years the exact location and how many were buried there was lost and forgotten.

I first became interested in the cemetery, when I read the history book put out by the Makepeace History Society "Echoes from the Past." At this time I contacted people from the area as well as some of those that moved away.

The cemetery is located on NE-26-21-20-W4 approximately a quarter of a mile from the road. The Mennonites first settled in this area in the early 1920's, and by the end of the late 1930's they had all moved away except one family.

The depression years as well as years of little or no crop including vegetables, was the major factor for them leaving the area. In total there were 19 Mennonite families that lived in the Crowfoot area. There were three colonies in this area of which the cemetery plot and church were located on the Center Farm. From locals and others who lived in the Crowfoot area, I concluded between 18 and 20 people had been buried. When the cemetery was first used it was surrounded by ceder posts and four barb wire strands. The only markers were wooden crosses none of which have survived to this day. The family who now farms the land, the Clark's and Frank Kroeker, grandson of the Pastor of the original congregation, have erected a Cairn.

WHAT, NO TOMBSTONE?

Anne Baines # 229

Many of us have used tombstone inscriptions to find information about our ancestors. Some of the information can be found nowhere else. With the increasing popularity of cremation one might wonder where genealogists of the future are going to find information.

Laverne Galeener-Moore in her book "Further Undertakings of a Dead Relative Collector" addresses the problem. She talks about a member of a genealogical society in California who comes to the meetings each month with an update on her search for her grandmother's ashes. The members of the society give her ideas each month on where to search for these long-lost ashes. If her grandmother's name was Stella, she should search for the ashes in the vault of a Lethbridge law firm.

Stella wanted to be cremated and have her ashes spread from a boat over her husband's favorite fishing lake. Unfortunately she chose a lawyer to be the executor of her will. When she died and was cremated, the lawyer went to those in authority to get permission to spread the ashes over the lake. However, those in authority have ruled that under the health code, spreading ashes over lakes is not allowed. For many years Stella's ashes have sat in a box in the vault of the law firm waiting for a solution to the problem. Each December someone threatens to use the ashes as a white elephant gift at the Christmas party. Stella should have chosen an executor who didn't know about getting permits to spread ashes, or who didn't worry about getting permits.

Hopefully, those who are cremated will have the ashes buried in the new sections of the cemeteries where they can have tombstones on their little plots. This will aid genealogists of the future.

The Irish Shewfelts Anne Baines #229

At the 1993 AGS conference in Red Deer the entertainment at the closing banquet was provided by a delightful group of Irish dancers dressed in beautifully hand embroidered outfits. The lady who announced the dances, presumably a mother or a teacher, was a Ms. Shewfelt. Anyone who is familiar with the name Shewfelt knows that it is German in origin. How did the Shewfelts become Irish?

It is likely that anyone in North America with the surname Shewfelt (Zufelt, Schufelt, etc) is a descendent of Johann Georg Zufelt who, at age 50 with his wife and children, emigrated from Germany to New York with the Palatinates in 1709. He was born at Hasselbach, Hessen, Germany in 1659. His wife was Anna Catherine Zaam. Some of their descendants ended up in Ontario.

About 1850 in Kincardine Township, Bruce County, Ontario some of the Shewfelts married Irish girls who came to Canada in the 1840's. On the 1871 census it is interesting to note that several of the Shewfelts were listed as German, their wives Irish and all their children Irish. Following are extracts of some of these families taken from the 1871 Ontario Census, Kincardine Twp., Bruce County District 27, Sub District E:

There are other examples, such as the James Shewfelt family on page fifty-six that illustrate this point. There are also examples where the children follow the father's German origin.

Grandfather, Peter Thomas Shewfelt, is the Peter Thom. listed on page 32. He was one of the Shewfelts that celebrated St. Patrick's day faithfully. A letter written by Grandfather on the 20th March 1939 begins:

I received your card on St. Patrick's Day and many thanks for. Remember me of St. Patrick day and Old Ireland forever.

Mom, a daughter of Peter Thomas, grew up thinking she was Irish. It wasn't until she was in her twenties that someone confused her by telling her she wasn't Irish, but Pensylvannia Dutch. After that when she was asked about her origins she said she was either Irish or Dutch, but wasn't sure which.

So it was that the Shewfelts changed from being German to Irish!
