Editorial Notes and Society News

With this issue we begin the 54th year for our **Connecticut Ancestry** Society, formerly the Stamford Genealogical Society, and the 50th for this journal, first known as the *Bulletin* of that Society. We are justly proud of the contents of the journal, but first some news of our Society.

At the annual meeting in May, we elected Nora Galvin as our new Society treasurer and keeper of member records. Nora is a professional genealogist with an interest in New England families and especially those with Irish origins. She moved here from Middletown, CT, just two years ago, and she and her husband are renovating an older home in the Black Rock section of Bridgeport. Our past treasurer, Sven-Eric Selander, is taking a well-earned respite from official duties, though we expect he will remain an active member of our Board. Sven took over as treasurer from Bob Spiers in May 2004 and has done an exemplary job of maintaining member records with the help of a rather antiquated database. That database is now, thankfully, undergoing a transition and upgrade with the combined efforts of Sven, Nora, vice-president Rob Locke, and Jeaneen Buchanan.

As for this issue, we are most pleased to begin a new series authored by our genealogist, Fred Hart, and sponsored by Robyn G. Weed of Colorado. The ancestors of William Weed include many early settlers, and these nineteen primary families tie into many more early families of southwestern Connecticut. The series, to be published in the next four to six issues, will total some 150 pages.

Here also are transcriptions of several early records of Redding, Connecticut. Ministerial records of the Rev. Lemuel B. Hull were discovered in the manuscript collection of the New England Historic Genealogical Society in Boston, and this led to further discoveries of unpublished vital records from the town and more early records at Christ Church, Episcopal, on Redding Ridge. Marriages and burials from the church records will be published in our next issue. Rounding out this issue are an article built on the revelations of an 1867 letter of the Selleck family and two queries on early Stamford families.

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INTRODUCTION TO A NEW CONNECTICUT ANCESTRY SERIES

Almost 25 years ago now, when I first started looking into my own family history, I had some difficulty identifying my mother's great-grandfather, Noah Brown Weed of Darien. He must have been a member of the Jonas Weed family that left so many descendants in that area – but how? I didn't realize it then, but this was the first of many "brick wall" situations that lay ahead.

Mary Louise King, then librarian at the New Canaan Historical Society, suggested that I contact Paul W. Prindle, FASG, a former resident of Darien who had recently moved with his wife to Cape Cod in retirement. I did that, and the results were beyond my expectations. Not only did Mr. Prindle respond almost immediately with the names of Noah B. Weed's parents, he also introduced me to the wealth of Weed family information that he had collected from several predecessors and that was eventually – years later – deposited at the NCHS.

I will never forget that when I contacted Paul Prindle by phone that first time in 1983 he asked me immediately if I was "writing a Weed Genealogy?" Of course such a thing had never entered my beginner's head and I replied, "no – I just want to know about my own line." I would eventually broaden my interest, as we all do. I would also soon learn that the goal of a comprehensive genealogy of the descendants of Jonas¹ Weed of Stamford has never been reached – and even now is not yet on the horizon. When Prindle's Weed Family Collection was deposited at the NCHS after his death in 1992, I assisted Joyce S. Pendery, CG in organizing and creating some finding aids for the materials. Through this process I was more able to appreciate the amount of dedicated family history research that had already been done on the Weed family, especially by Prindle himself and by the earlier Edward Franklin Weed (1870 - 1951), yet another Weed family researcher from Darien. Many of these important source materials will be described more fully in the Weed portion of the following articles.

In 1997, after I had become a professional genealogist specializing in the families of southwestern Connecticut, Mr. Robyn G. Weed of Broomfield, Colorado contacted me to see if I could assist him with finding his own connection with the same Jonas Weed clan. I agreed, and the result has been a long and pleasant relationship. In the intervening years we have investigated and written down another Weed family line in a serious fashion, and documented several collateral lines as well. As with all such projects, some questions have not yet been answered. We do feel, however, that the results contain much new information and identify many new relationships that have never before appeared in print (and correct some others that already have). Mr. Weed has graciously offered to make the results available to *Connecticut Ancestry* readers at this time, resulting in the preparation of this series.

The Weed portion of this work will be published first, followed by 18 other collateral lines representing other Stamford area families. The order of each part or chapter will be chosen so that each successive chapter will have a definite connection with at least one portion that has already been presented, and the parts are therefore neither alphabetically nor chronologically arranged. The immigrant ancestors of the various lines that we will be presenting are expected to be the following, in approximately this order:"


ANCESTRY OF WILLIAM WEED OF STAMFORD AND DARIEN, CONNECTICUT

PART 1:

WEED

WEED

Westward migration from New England to the new lands in the interior of the United States began in earnest after the Revolutionary War. This movement, coupled with a more relaxed attitude toward recording vital statistics in the older communities (particularly in Connecticut in the early 1800's), created a situation in which people who are almost certain to have a connection with some of the early colonial families of New England sometimes find that the connection is difficult to identify. Such was the case for the descendants of William⁷ Weed of Stamford, Fairfield County, Connecticut.

Fortunately, the sheer quantity of Stamford's surviving land and probate records usually permits a reconstruction of families and relationships, in the absence of complete vital records in civic and church sources. In addition, this process often results in a much more satisfactory family history since it must, by nature, consider so many aspects of the subjects' lives: for example, records regarding their property, their taxes, their occupations, their estates, and so forth. Taken together, this data is always more interesting, and often more convincing, than vital statistics alone.

William⁷ Weed's descent from Jonas¹ Weed, one of the early settlers of Stamford, has been reconstructed in this fashion, from a variety of records. The work was aided greatly by the papers of Edward Franklin Weed (1870-1951), an early Weed family historian from Darien. These papers are now part of the Weed Family Genealogical Collection (GE24) at the New Canaan Historical Society, placed there by another skilled and dedicated Weed family researcher, Paul W. Prindle (1903-1992), also of Darien, and later of Orleans, Massachusetts, a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists. Whenever Prindle's own work on the Weed family is available, it can be generally be used with confidence in its thoroughness and accuracy. Likewise, E. F. Weed's earlier work has been found to be of the highest quality, and the conclusions he eventually placed in his "Notebook," one of the most important parts of his surviving collection, seem to have been the result of much critical analysis and a sincere desire for truth and accuracy. This present compilation owes much to the work of both of these earlier Weed family historians.

Credit is also due to the late Judge Penfield C. Mead of New Canaan, whose extensive Weed family research is preserved in manuscript form at the New Canaan Historical Society, as well as in articles published from time to time in *Connecticut Ancestry*.

Regrettably, several of the wives and mothers in the Weed families in this direct line must still remain unidentified in spite of extensive efforts to learn their identities. Speculation about some of them has been made by others and reported as such below — but the fact remains that proof is unfortunately still lacking for the wives in the first, second and fifth generation.

1. Jonas¹ Weed was born in England about 1598-1610,^[1] at a place not yet identified, and died at Stamford, Fairfield County, Connecticut before 5 June 1676, when the inventory of his estate was taken. The surname of his wife MARY _____ is not known.

The authoritative account of his life that appears in the book, Ancestry of Elizabeth Barrett Gillespie, by Paul W. Prindle, F.A.S.G., may be relied upon with confidence. As reported by Prindle and others, Jonas Weed was a passenger in the Winthrop Fleet that sailed to the Massachusetts Bay in 1630, although the exact name of the ship he sailed on within that fleet cannot be determined. His residences in the Massachusetts Bay Colony and Wethersfield, Connecticut prior to Stamford are already well documented by others including Paul W. Prindle and Robert C. Anderson and need not be duplicated here.

No birth records appear to have survived for any of his 10 children, but they are all evident from other surviving records, and they were almost certainly all born in Connecticut. The list given by Prindle has recently been updated by Anderson, and is used here in preference to the Prindle list. All except the first three were probably born at Stamford:

- i. MARY² WEED, b. say 1637, probably at Wethersfield, m. GEORGE ABBOTT of Norwalk.
- iii. DORCAS WEED, b. say 1641, probably at Wethersfield, d. at Wethersfield 24 Dec 1692, m. JAMES WRIGHT of Wethersfield on 20 Nov 1660.
- 2. iv. Daniel Weed, b. abt 1643, d. at Stamford 29 Nov 1697, m. RUTH_____.
 - v. Jonas Weed, b. say 1645 and d. 19 Nov 1704, both at Stamford, m. 16 Nov 167[0], Bethia Holly.
 - vi. ELIZABETH WEED, b. say 1647, m. JOHN ROCKWELL of Rye.
 - vii. SARAH WEED, b. say 1649, no information on marriage or death.
 - viii. HANNAH WEED, b. abt 1651, d. 9 Nov 1711 both at Stamford, m. 5 Jan 1670 BENJAMIN HOYT.
 - ix. SAMUEL WEED, b. say 1653, d. 1708 at Danbury, m. MARY ____.
 - x. unnamed child, d. 15 Jul 1656 at Stamford.
- 2. Daniel² Weed (Jonas¹), second son of the settler, was born about 1643, probably at Stamford, since his father was a resident there by 1641, and died at Stamford on 29 November 1697.^[5] His wife's name was RUTH, but researchers have thus far been unable to determine her

family name. She married (2) on 25 July 1705, Peter Ferris, [6] and (3) on 29 Jan 1707/08, John Clapp. [7]

As in the case of Jonas¹ Weed, the reader is referred to Paul Prindle's Gillespie Genealogy for a complete and reliable account of the life of Daniel² Weed.^[8]

The children of Daniel² and Ruth (____) Weed were listed in the Stamford Town Records after his death as the children of "Daniel Weed Sen^r," with their ages,^[9] from which their birth dates have been calculated as given below. Other information is from Gillespie Ancestry:

- i. SARAH³ WEED, b. 18 Nov 1675 (23 years old on 18 Nov 1698), d. 5 Jan 1715/16, m. (1) 11 Aug 1698 Lt. DAVID WATERBURY, [10] m. (2) 20 Nov 1706 BENJAMIN FERRIS, and m. (3) 20 Sep 1711 NATHANIEL POND. [11]
- ii. ABRAHAM WEED, b. 18 Aug 1680 (18 years old on 18 Aug 1698), d. 26 Dec 1711, m. 11 Apr 1706 SUSANNA BELL.
- 3. iii. Lt. Daniel Weed, b. 19 Mar 1685 (13 years old on 19 Mar 1698), m. Elizabeth Scofield.
 - iv. CAPT. EBENEZER WEED, 22 Oct 1692 (6 years old on 22 Oct 1698), d. 1765, m. 28 May 1713 MARY BELL.
 - v. CAPT. NATHANIEL WEED, 22 Oct 1696 (2 years old on 22 Oct 1698), d. 22 Jun 1750, m. MARY ____ (perhaps REED) about 1719.
- 3. LIEUTENANT DANIEL³ WEED (Daniel², Jonas¹) was born at Stamford on 19 March 1685, and died there before 5 August 1766 when his will was proved. He married probably about 1708, ELIZABETH SCOFIELD, daughter of Daniel² and granddaughter of Daniel¹ Scofield. [12]

In a few early records, notably in 1714 at the time he and his wife Elizabeth were parties to the agreement regarding her father's estate, [13] he was known as Daniel Weed Junior to distinguish him from the only other contemporary Daniel Weed in Stamford at the time. Soon afterward, however, the number of Daniel Weeds in town doubled to 4 heads of families, and the

nomenclature problem became more difficult. In later years this present Daniel Weed was sometimes identified with his militia officer's title in the Stamford records and sometimes not, causing some confusion in interpretation of those records for us today. Paul Prindle noted that there were several Daniel Weeds in the Stamford records and admitted with understatement that, "It is sometimes difficult to distinguish one Daniel from another in the public records," [14] so that whenever Lt. Daniel was identified with his militia title, it gave us a benchmark with which to place the other contemporary Daniels in their proper positions.

In one interesting case, the Stamford assessors chose to eliminate numerical titles altogether and named the four different Daniel Weeds on their 1738 tax list simply (and very effectively) as, "Lef Dan Weed," "Dan Weed Lef's son," "Dan Weed," and "Dan Weed Dan son." [15]

Part of the confusion with titles is due to the fact that Daniel's military offices were not held until rather late in his life. His commission as ensign of the Stamford 1st militia company or trainband was created by the Connecticut General Assembly in October 1733 when Daniel was already 48 years old. Four years later, on 13 October 1737, he received his commission as lieutenant of the same Stamford Company from the General Assembly, and this important title was used more frequently thereafter in the Stamford records.

Once again, the reader is referred to Paul Prindle's Gillespie book for a reliable and fairly thorough account of Lt. Daniel's career, [18] but with the caution that some errors in the Prindle account of this family have been discovered as noted below.

Lt. Daniel's real estate transactions, many of which shed important light on his family relationships, were not detailed in Prindle's treatment. Whenever he chose not to use the military title in his transaction, care must be taken to be sure of the identity of the "Daniel Weed" that was meant. For example, he was obviously the grantor in a sale of 8 May 1761 to "my loveing and dutifull sons Daniel Weed y^e 3^d and Nehemiah Weed both of Stamford," but was called (and signed as) simply Daniel Weed of Stamford. [19]

An earlier deed, dated 23 March 1757, "in consideration of the Love, Goodwill and affection which I have and do bear to my loveing and dutifull son Daniel Weed the 3d" conveyed two parcels of 9 and 5 acres at Pepper Ridge, with a note making sure that the value of "the house which my s^d son dwells in which is on y^e above described tract of land my s^d son built for himself" would not be included in any calculations of gifts received from the father during his lifetime.^[20]

In another deed (dated 18 February 1762), interesting because of the combination of grantors, Daniel Weed (clearly Lt. Daniel, but again not using his title), Elizabeth Weed (her X mark) and Daniel Weed y^e 3^d sold land at Bells Plain in the North Field of Stamford to Abraham Hait.^[21]

The will of Daniel Weed of Stamford was made on 11 September 1762, witnessed by Abraham Davenport, Anne Belding and "Elizabeth Davenport Jr.," and proved 5 August 1766. His inventory was taken by Abraham Hait (Hoyt) and Benjamin Weed on 24 September 1766. A distribution was made and accepted by the Court on 16 March 1767 in which his lands were distributed subject to the widow's right of dower to his daughter Elizabeth Seeley, 8 acres plus 2 roods; daughter Deborah Scofield, 4 acres plus 3 roods; a grandson Silvanus Hait, 3 acres plus 2 roods and 12 rods; and the remainder according to a complicated formula equally divided into four units, 3 to the surviving sons Daniel, Hezekiah and Nehemiah Weed, and the fourth to four grandchildren, all sons of Reuben Weed, deceased, namely Reuben (Jr.), John, Eliphalet and Elnathan Weed.

On 8 May 1767, the "Legatees of our Honoured Father and Grandfather Lieut. Daniel Weed Late of Stamford," being Daniel Weed Jr. and Hezekiah Weed (sons), and Reuben Weed, John Weed Jr. and Eliphalet Weed (grandsons) quit claimed land at Strawberry Hill to (their brother and uncle) Nehemiah Weed. [23] Zephaniah Weed, son of Daniel "Jr." witnessed his father's signature on this document.

Children of Lt. Daniel³ and Elizabeth (Scofield) Weed, all born at Stamford. Except as noted, all information (except for the name of Daniel⁴'s wife) is from Gillespie Ancestry: [24]

4. **DANIEL**⁴ **WEED** (*Lt. Daniel*³, *Daniel*², *Jonas*¹) was born at Stamford on 12 November 1709. The date and place of his death are not yet known, but he was still living in Philips Patent, Dutchess County, New York in 1774 when he sold Stamford land to his brother, Hezekiah. [33]

His wife was **Keziah Brush**, born about 1710, daughter of Jacob and Mary (Rogers) Brush of Huntington, Long Island. Her sister Rebecca, born say 1700, married John Slason Jr. of Stamford, highlighting a connection with the Slason family that would eventually prove central to the proper identification of this present (Weed) line of descent.

Daniel Weed 3rd and Keziah, wife of Daniel Weed 3rd, were already members of the Stamford Congregational Church in December, 1746 when a complete listing was made by the incoming minister, the Rev. Noah Welles.^[36]

This Daniel Weed is easily confused with his second cousin, another contemporary Daniel⁴ Weed (Daniel³, John², Jonas¹). In fact, responsible genealogists have reached differing conclusions over the years regarding their careers. Edward Franklin Weed, perhaps the most knowledgeable Weed researcher of all, reached the conclusion that this present Daniel Weed married Susannah Garnsey, without explaining his reasoning.^[37] This marriage was also reported

by William Applebie Daniel Eardeley, a contemporary of E. F. Weed's, whose work also survives entirely in manuscript. [38] Paul Prindle also followed this path in his outstanding essay on the Weed family for his Gillespie Ancestry, which is so useful for the earlier generations of this family. [39]

In the course of the present investigation, the conclusions of Messrs. Weed and Eardeley were given great weight because of the depth of their previous analysis. [40] Unfortunately, their conclusion that this present Daniel Weed, son of Lt. Daniel, had married Susannah Garnsey had to be abandoned in the light of many significant discrepancies that arose in trying to make the primary records fit this situation. For example, as already noted, it was this Daniel Weed who was generally known as Daniel "3rd" when paired with his wife Keziah in the Stamford Congregational Church records, and also known as Daniel "3rd" in the same time period when mentioned by his father Lt. Daniel. in the land records. [41] The Susannah Garnsey marriage must therefore instead be assigned to Daniel Weed (Daniel John Jonas), his second cousin.

Following an independent route, two present-day writers, Blair Scofield and Bob Spiers, have reached the same conclusion as presented herein, regarding the husband of Keziah Brush, but their explanation or interpretation of the records has not been published. This line is also given correctly in the published Bedford Genealogies, but again without documentation or explanation. [43]

The complete analysis of the choice of contemporary Daniel Weeds for the husbands of Keziah Brush and Susannah Garnsey involves many factors. The most compelling factor of all, however, was a Stamford probate record in which Nehemiah Weed was chosen guardian by Jacob Weed, son of Daniel Weed 3rd, late of Stamford, on 28 April 1783. Since this Jacob Weed (as will be shown later) must have been a son of Daniel Weed (individual #6 herein), and therefore a grandson of Daniel and Keziah, the only possible explanation for his choosing Nehemiah Weed guardian is that Nehemiah was his (Jacob's) great uncle (nearer to his father's age, however, than to his grandfather's.) No other relationship to Nehemiah Weed has been found, and therefore, in any scenario where Jacob is *not* part of the family of Lt. Daniel Weed, the choice of Nehemiah would have been very highly unlikely.

As we have already seen, Daniel⁴ Weed was residing at Pepper Ridge on land adjoining his father's, in 1757, [45] and his father gave him 24 more acres adjoining this property on 2 February 1761. [46] Then, in two deeds made on 8 May 1761, Daniel³ Weed (still not using the title of Lt., although there is no question of his identity) made additional gifts to his sons. In one of these deeds, Daniel 3rd and Nehemiah jointly received 50 acres at "Ponusses" (Ponus Ridge). [47] In another, Daniel 3rd received three parcels, namely 5 acres at Bell's Plain, "one half of a tract of swampy meadow land" the whole of which was 6 acres, and one half of a tract of salt meadow the whole of which was two acres, with the grantor reserving life use for himself and for his wife Elizabeth. [48]

The disposition of this gift land in Stamford has not been studied in detail. But in spite of all this property he had received at Stamford, Daniel⁴ Weed migrated West to Dutchess County, New York by 15 January 1773, when he, as "Daniel Weed of Philips Patent…late Daniel Weed Jun^r of Stanford…" gave two deeds in Stamford.^[49] The following year, on 11 May 1774, still of Philips Patent, he sold his right in two parcels of land in Stamford which "did belong to my sister Elizabeth Seeley Wife to Elijah Seeley late of Stamford Dec^d" to "my Brother Hezekiah Weed of Stamford."^[50] The E. F. Weed Notebook is silent on the careers of many of the children in this Daniel Weed family, perhaps because of this migration to Dutchess County, and the consequent lack of Stamford records for them after this time.

Children of Daniel⁴ and Keziah (Brush) Weed, four recorded at Stamford, six baptized at the Stamford Congregational Church (Daniel's names in the Church records are included to show the differences that occurred):^[51]

i. (probably) Keziah⁵ Weed, b. say 1737, m. 19 Mar 1767 at St. John's Church in Stamford, her first cousin Jacob Slason. [52] Jacob was the son of John and Rebecca (Brush) Slason, and half brother of Martha Slason who married Zephaniah Weed, see below. [53] Jacob's mother, Rebecca (Brush) Slason, b. abt 1700, was Keziah (Brush) Weed's sister. [54] The will of Jacob Slason, made on 28 Dec 1795 and probated 5 Dec 1796, names his wife Keziah, son Daniel (further reinforcing the premise that Keziah belongs in this family), and Jacob Little, a son of Rebecca, a deceased daughter. [55]

- ii. Brush Weed, b. 2 Apr 1739, bap. 18 Aug 1751, "son of Daniel 4th and Keziah," d. abt. 1776. On 13 Aug 1776, Zephaniah Weed was granted letters of administration on the estate of Brush Weed, late of Stamford. [56]
- 6. iii. Daniel Weed, b. 17 Feb 1741/42, m. Elizabeth ____
- 7. iv. Zephaniah Weed, b. 15 Feb 1744/45, m. __May 1775, Martha Slason.
 - v. MARY WEED, b. 20 May 1748, bap. 5 Jun 1748 "Mary & Ananias twins of Danll Jr. & Keziah,"
 - vi. Ananias Weed, b. 20 May 1748, bap. 5 Jun 1748, died "4 months after he was born."

- 5. Nehemiah⁴ Weed (Lt. Daniel³, Daniel², Jonas¹) is included here because of his important relationship to Jacob⁶ Weed, son of his nephew Daniel⁵. The youngest son of Lt. Daniel and Elizabeth Weed, he was born on 8 June 1728 at Stamford, and died there between 16 April 1785 and 6 Dec 1786, the dates of his will and its probate.

He married (1) SUSANNAH PETTIT on 5 April 1750, [57] and she was the mother of all of his children. She probably died about 1757, perhaps at or near the time of the birth of their last child, Sarah.

His second wife, married about 1758 although not recorded, was (2) MARTHA (BLATCHLEY) HOYT, daughter of Samuel Blatchley and widow of Samuel Hoyt who died at Stamford on 6 April 1756. She came to this marriage with three Hoyt children, Martha, Samuel, and Abigail, who were all baptized at the Stamford Congregational Church on 23 November 1760 as children of "Nehemiah Weed and Martha." The child Abigail was baptized with the surname Weed, while the other two retained the surname of Hoyt. After the death of Nehemiah Weed, Martha married (3) on 9 December 1788, Deacon Joshua Ambler. [60]

On 28 April, 1783, Jacob Weed, son of Daniel Weed 3rd deceased, chose Nehemiah Weed as his guardian.^[61] Unfortunately for all, Nehemiah only lived for a few years after this selection.

Nehemiah's will of 1785 mentioned his wife Martha, and children Ebenezer Pettit Weed, Prudence Scofield, Susannah Scofield, and named his only son as executor. The witnesses were

Silas Bishop and Frederick Weed. [62] This connection with a Frederick Weed is not yet understood, but because he was an adult in 1785, he is definitely not the same person who identified himself as a half brother of Jacob Weed and Keziah Waterbury at the time of his death in 1840, see below.

Children of Nehemiah⁴ and Susannah (Pettit) Weed, all born at Stamford and baptized at the Congregational Church:^[63]

- i. EBENEZER PETTIT⁵ WEED, b. say 1751, bap. 10 Dec 1752, d. 1804, m. 11 Dec 1773 MARY SMITH, [64] b. 24 May 1754 at Stamford, dau. of Ebenezer Smith and Mary Newman. [65]
- ii. PRUDENCE WEED, bap. 28 Jan 1753, d. 9 Dec 1812, m. her cousin ASAHEL SCOFIELD, b. 17 Mar 1759, d. 27 Dec 1839, son of Josiah Scofield Jr. and Deborah Weed. [66] They are both buried at the Pound Ridge Cemetery. [67]
- iii. JESSE WEED, bap. 19 Feb 1755 "to wife of Nehemiah privately," prob. d.y.
- iv. Susanna Weed, bap. 5 Sep 1756, living in 1786, m. Seth Scofield, bapt. 21 July 1754, d. 1797, son of Sylvanus Scofield and Hannah Seeley. [68]
- v. SARAH WEED, bap. 29 Aug 1760, prob. d.y.
- 6. Daniel⁵ Weed (Daniel⁴, Lt. Daniel³, Daniel², Jonas¹) was born at Stamford on 17 February 1741/42, and died there some time prior to 12 October 1774 when his brother Zephaniah Weed was appointed guardian of Esther, "daughter of Daniel Weed Jr." [69]

The only information we have on his wife is her first name, **ELIZABETH**. This comes from a single record, the baptism of their daughter Esther "to Dan^{ll} 3^d & Elizabeth" at the Stamford Congregational Church in 1767. Esther was probably their first child, and a marriage date of about 1765 may be assumed.

No records have been found that would explain Elizabeth's life after she was widowed in about 1774. It appears, however, that she married again and had at least one more child: a son, Frederick Weed, born about 1785. The personal statement of Frederick Weed of Darien in his will of 1840 identifies his half brother Jacob Weed and his half sister Keziah Waterbury, both of whom are children in this family. This Frederick Weed died on 19 November, 1840, [70] and was

buried the following day in the Noroton River Cemetery in Darien.^[71] Both his death record and his gravestone give his age as 55 years, indicating his birth year was about 1785. He married Keziah (Weed) Waterbury's daughter Phebe, as described further below.

Because of their importance to the identity of the various Daniel Weeds, mention must be made here of the suffixes that applied to this family of Daniels at this time. Specifically, in 1765, just prior to the death of Lt. Daniel³, the following Daniels had property enumerated adjacent to each other in the Stamford Grand List: Lieut. Daniel (value 6:00:00, indicating he had disposed of most of his property by this time); Daniel 3rd (value 74:08:00); and Daniel 4th (value 31:00:00). These three persons are Lt. Daniel³, his son Daniel⁴, and his grandson, the present Daniel⁵, respectively. The following year, in the list for 1766, the estate of "Lieut. Daniel Weed dec^d" is valued at 4:00:00; the property of Daniel Jr. at 62:16:9, and that of Daniel 3rd at 25:18:00. At the time of Lt. Daniel's death, therefore, his son "moved up" from 3rd to Jr., and his grandson moved up from 4th to 3rd. By 1767, therefore, when Daniel⁵ began having the children listed below, he had become Daniel 3rd – a title used by his father until Lt. Daniel's death. Then, when his father moved to New York State in about 1773, he became Daniel Jr. in Stamford (the titles were used in a town-specific manner), the title by which he was known at the time of his own death a year later.

The Congregational Church Records note that Daniel Weed 3rd owned the covenant (affirmed his faith) on 3 November 1767, two days after the baptism of his first child.^[73] Since there is no such record for his wife, Elizabeth, this may indicate that she was already a full member of the church, and this fact may eventually help in determining her identity.

Daniel⁵ Weed left no estate to probate. We know that two of his children required guardians, one by appointment (Esther) and one by choice (Jacob, when he reached the age of 14 years.) The other child, Keziah, was only 2 years old at the time of her father's death, and her mother probably acted as guardian in her case, since no other guardianship record is evident.

Children of Daniel⁵ and Elizabeth (____) Weed, born at Stamford:

- i. ESTHER⁶ WEED, bap. 1 Nov 1767 "to Dan^{ll} 3^d & Elizabeth."^[74] Except for the appointment of Zephaniah Weed as her guardian in 1774, we have no further information for her.
- 8. ii. JACOB WEED, b. about 1769, d. May 1842 at Stamford, m. SARAH SMITH.
- 9. iii. KEZIAH WEED, b. 19 Mar 1772, bap. 26 Oct 1772, d. 19 Feb 1867, m. 15 July 1793, Moses WATERBURY of Darien.
- 7. ZEPHANIAH⁵ WEED (Daniel⁴, Lt. Daniel³, Daniel², Jonas¹) was born at Stamford on 15 February 1744/45. He was called of Salem, Westchester County, New York in 1794-1796, and

may have died there after that time. His career is being included here because of his relationship with the Daniel⁵ Weed family, namely his assigned guardianship of Esther⁶ Weed, Daniel's oldest child.

On 12 October 1774 (and therefore before his marriage to Martha Slason) he was selected by the Stamford Probate Court to act as guardian of his niece, Esther Weed, daughter of "Daniel Weed Jr." This record, as well as his age at the time (about 30 years) suggests that he may have had an earlier marriage, but no indications of a wife's name, or any children by an earlier marriage have been found.

It is known that he married MARTHA SLASON on __ May, 1775 at the Middlesex (Darien) Congregational Church (some sources give the date as 21 May, but this is not reflected in the original record). [76] She was the daughter of John and Mercy (Youngs) Slason, born 11 June 1752 at Stamford, and therefore half sister of Jacob Slason who had married Zephaniah's sister, Keziah Weed, several years earlier in 1767. [77]

Zephaniah Weed served in the Revolutionary War in Captain Jesse Bell's Company at New York from 12 August to 11 September 1776. [78]

Then, sometime between 1793 and 1794, as indicated by deeds recorded at Stamford, he had relocated to Salem, Westchester County New York. ^[79] There are no probate or other later records regarding him as a Stamford resident, and he may have remained in New York State. ^[80]

Children of Zephaniah and Martha (Slason) Weed, all baptized at Middlesex (Darien): [81]

8. JACOB⁶ WEED (Daniel⁵, Daniel⁴, Lt. Daniel³, Daniel², Jonas¹) was born at Stamford about 1769, since he was able to choose a guardian in April 1783, [82] indicating that he was probably 14 years old at that time. His census records are consistent with this estimate of his birth year. He died at Stamford in May 1842. [83]

Jacob Weed's career was difficult to piece together because of the limited number of records that were available. For example, his birth was not recorded in either the municipal or church records, and neither were his own marriage nor the births of any of his five children; he left no will or significant estate; had only one simple land transaction as a buyer and one as a seller (for the same property); and he was buried at the Josiah Smith Cemetery in Stamford without a gravestone. [84]

Fortunately, his appearance in Edward Franklin Weed's Notebook^[85] provided a basic framework, around which other isolated facts could be attached, and a relatively complete outline of his life could eventually be created. That Notebook called attention to the fact that Jacob and Keziah Weed were brother and sister, and further that one Frederick Weed was their half-brother, statements later confirmed in the probate records. The Notebook does not mention anything about a Daniel Weed being their father, and it appears that E. F. Weed never carried his analysis far enough to reach any conclusion in that regard. At one point, Keziah is noted as "dau to Jacob Weed," but this statement is specifically attributed to "W. F. Waterbury" and appears to have been a misunderstanding. [86] Research was unable to find any candidate Jacob Weed that could conceivably have been these persons' father.

The E. F. Weed Notebook is the only source of information on the name of his wife, although the use of the given name "Smith" for the oldest boy, and for several grandchildren in this family, makes it very likely that this was indeed her family name. Further, the choice of the name of Sally for a female child suggests that her mother's name may have been Sarah, for which Sally is a nickname. According to E. F. Weed, she was SARAH SMITH, the daughter of Gold/Gould and Abigail (Smith) Smith, born 6 August 1776. [87] Also according to the E.F. Weed Notebook, she died on 11 May 1859, perhaps in another town, since no death of a Sarah Weed is recorded on that date in Stamford. Additional research has supported E. F. Weed's conclusions in this matter, although no primary record has yet been found that proves her identity.

Jacob and Sarah were not married prior to 1790, since he is not listed as a head of family in the census of that year. Only one Jacob Weed then appears consistently in the censuses of 1800 through 1830 in Stamford, and the listings agree quite well with this Jacob, with some minor discrepancies. In 1800, he was age 26-45 and his wife 16-26, one boy and one girl each under 10 years, and an older man, age 45+, probably a grandfather not yet identified. He is not listed in 1840, and must have been living with another family at that time. However, *both* the households of Stephen and Sally Lockwood and Betsey and Samuel Lounsbury have an older male (age 70-80) living with them in 1840, and it is probably impossible to say which of them (if either) was our Jacob.

It appears that this Jacob Weed only participated in two land transactions in Stamford - a remarkably low number for the time period. This may indicate that he was a tradesman of some

sort, and did not require acreage for farming; or, that he made use of land owned by others either as a renter or as a family member. It is also possible, but less likely, that he continued to live on land owned by his father and grandfather, without formalities. He does not appear as a grantee in any transactions at all until 25 February 1802, when he purchased a little over ten acres of land in Stamford from Ebenezer Jones for \$256.25. He deed was witnessed by Jeremiah Smith and John Blanchard, and this Smith connection helps to reinforce our placement of Sarah among the Smiths. The land consisted of a houselot near to Deacon Elijah Hawley's mill, bounded by a road on the West, and on all other sides by Hawley's land; and another piece "where the barn stands" across the road, and bounded by Thaddeus Hoyt, Capt. Nathaniel Webb, and James Ferris.

He later sold this same property to Lebbeus Dean of Stamford on 3 December 1811, for \$500.00.^[91] By this time, Dean himself owned the land surrounding the homelot (now specified as a half acre more or less), and one of the bounders on the West was now Gould Smith instead of James Ferris. The fact that the only property Jacob Weed certainly owned in Stamford was adjacent to that of Gold/Gould Smith helps to confirm that this Smith was indeed his wife's father.

On 8 June 1842, the Stamford Probate Court granted letters of administration on the estate of Jacob Weed late of Stamford deceased to Smith Weed of New York City, undoubtedly Jacob's eldest son. [92] Since the E. F. Weed notebook indicates that Smith Weed himself died in 1842, [93] it is very possible that an almost coincident death of father and son resulted in an incomplete probate proceeding, since there are no further probate documents in the Stamford records for our Jacob Weed.

Children of Jacob⁶ and Sarah (Smith) Weed, all born probably at Stamford, but none recorded:

Notebook, they were married on 30 Nov 1814, [96] but this may be in error since the Stamford Vital Records report a marriage of Betsey Weed and Jonathan B. Waterbury on that date, [97] which must refer to a different Betsey Weed.

She married Moses Waterbury at Stamford on 15 July 1793. [104] He was born 26 May 1770 and died 5 November 1853, the son of David and Jemima (Knapp) Waterbury. [105]

Probate Court. He mentioned property in New York City, and made bequests to his wife Phebe, Esther Conrey Waterbury [later the wife of Thaddeus P. Waring], Frederick Weed Waterbury, half sister Keziah Waterbury, half brother Jacob Weed, William Waterbury 3rd, and Alexander Studwell of New York City. [107] His death record in the Darien Congregational Church and his gravestone at the Noroton River Cemetery both give his age in 1840 as 55 years, indicating a birth year of 1785. The nature of his half-brother relationship to Keziah and Jacob (and presumably to their older sister Esther, who must have died before this time since she is not named) has not yet been discovered. In the absence of further information, we may propose that their mother, Elizabeth (____) Weed, remarried another person named Weed following the death of Daniel⁵ Weed, and that she had at least one more child, this Frederick Weed, born about 1785.

10. WILLIAM⁷ WEED (Jacob⁶, Daniel⁵, Daniel⁴, Lt. Daniel³, Daniel², Jonas¹), our subject, was born at Stamford on 22 May 1814, [108] and died in Darien on 21 December 1886, age 72. [109]

Fortunately, Edward Franklin Weed was able to obtain information directly from members of this branch of the Weed family. In particular, three letters to E. F. Weed from Alanson Lockwood Weed Sr. have survived, relating some of his direct knowledge of his father's career.[110]

Based on these letters and the E. F. Weed Notebook entries derived from them, we find that William Weed and his brother Ira went together to Illinois in the 1830's. While in Illinois, William married (1) MARGARET WINFIELD on 13 June 1839, and they had a single child, Alanson Lockwood Weed (Sr.) Margaret was the daughter of Silas and Nellie (____) Winfield, born 21 December 1819, and died 24 May 1842. [111] She died when Alanson was an infant, and the father went back East, leaving the child in the care of others in Illinois, where he grew up not knowing either of his parents. Alanson Weed said that his father returned to "New York," but he has not been clearly identified in any New York City Directories during this time period.

William married (2) on 20 December 1843 (place not yet evident), LYDIA JANSEN, daughter of Clyman Jansen, born on 17 November 1812, and died 23 October 1889.[112] They were living

in Darien at the time of the 1880 Census, where her place of birth, that of both of her parents, and of their daughter Margaret are all given as "New York." [113]



PART 2:

SCOFIELD

SCOFIELD

1. **DANIEL¹** SCOFIELD was in Stamford by December 1641, when his name appeared on a list to be granted a 2-acre homelot with 3 acres of woodland. His name did not appear among the lists of persons who migrated to Stamford with the Rev. Richard Denton from Wethersfield earlier that year, and he had therefore presumably come from some other place. His brother Richard¹ Scofield, a later settler of Stamford (in about 1655), is known to have come from Ipswich, Massachusetts, and it is possible that Daniel had also come from Ipswich, although no records have yet been found for Daniel prior to his appearance in Stamford.

Genealogists have pieced together several versions of a Scofield family genealogy, but although several competent researchers have tackled parts of the job, no definitive genealogy has yet appeared. The most comprehensive treatment yet for this family has appeared recently in the journal *Connecticut Ancestry*, in a series of articles by two members of Connecticut Ancestry, researched primarily by Blair C. Scofield of Orem, Utah, and prepared for publication by Bob Spiers. [2] Although these articles diligently attempt to identify places in the family for all descendants (and particularly to delineate the lines from the two settlers), they have relied heavily upon secondary sources, and have not contributed a substantial amount of original research except for their valiant attempt to resolve discrepancies among existing Scofield materials.

In his 1932 book commonly known as Washington Ancestry, Charles Arthur Hoppin provided a considerable amount of detail on the career of Richard Scofield (his client's ancestor), but also mentioned Daniel's career in Stamford as well. Hoppin found that the surname had its origin in Lancashire, England, first noted in Rochdale, Lancashire in the 13th Century. Variant spellings include: Schofield (the spelling used by Hoppin as a preferred spelling), Scholefield, Scholfield, Schofeld, Scholefeld, etc. The sometimes used meaning of "School field" is discounted by Hoppin as an over-simplification. Although Hoppin stated flatly that the two brothers of Stamford "came from the Lancashire Schofields," and provided some English data to confirm that this was likely, he was unable to provide conclusive proof of the actual descent (and, to his credit, did not guess at one either). Later writers have continued to claim lines to the Rochdale family, but they are not yet confirmed by any rigorous study of primary records, and must be considered possible, at best. The English line for Daniel Scofield given by the recent Connecticut Ancestry articles, is: Daniel Scofield (Alexander A, Cuthbert B, James C.) [4]

Several other partial genealogies of the family have appeared. "The Scofield Dictionary" and "The Scofields of Northfield, Minnesota," both by Robert LeRoy Scofield, is available on a Connecticut Ancestry Society microfilm. [5] Unfortunately, the second half of the Dictionary's alphabetical listings of Scofields has been lost. Nevertheless, this work provided the foundation for much of the later generations in the Blair Scofield compilation.

Another earlier compilation was prepared by Harriet Scofield of the Western Reserve Historical Society in Cleveland, and is known as "A Scofield Survey." This compilation was completed for publication in typescript form by Henry Burdette Whipple in 1972, following Miss Scofield's death on 21 June 1970. The compilation is in outline form and, although it was compiled by a responsible genealogist, is unfortunately not documented, at least in its published form. ^[6] Another (unrelated) Harriet E. Scofield of Minneapolis also prepared an outline version of a limited Scofield Genealogy. ^[7]

Once again, the work of Paul W. Prindle may be used with confidence regarding the early generations of the Scofield families of Stamford. [8] Prindle gives an especially good treatment of the real estate transactions and land holdings for Daniel Scofield, that will not be repeated here. [9] One of those land transactions, a gift of 10 acres from William Graves, deserves special mention since it may indicate a possible relationship to Graves (perhaps related to Scofield's wife, see further below).

The brotherhood of Richard¹ and Daniel¹ Scofield of Stamford is proven by a land record in which, "I Richard Scofield doe discharge my brother Daniel Scofield of a sertain parsell of the coman fence in the East Field.....etc.," dated 11th day, 1st month (March) 1666/67. It appears that Richard did not arrive in Stamford until about 14 years after Daniel, since the first record there for Richard is the recording of birth of his daughter Elizabeth on 27 November 1655. Clearly, the two brothers had traveled by different schedules, and perhaps different paths as well, prior to their coming together in Stamford. Richard's passage to the New World was well documented in a passenger list, and we therefore know that he was on board the Susan & Ellen in 1635. Unfortunately for this present story, Daniel's name did not appear on this same passenger list, and researchers have been unable to determine his time of immigration. Hoppin

claimed that Daniel¹ Scofield was in Massachusetts "for a brief period of months," and later in Wethersfield for three years before going to Stamford, but none of this is supported with documentation and appears to be a fabrication.^[12] To repeat, we simply do not have any records of Daniel¹ Scofield prior to his arrival in Stamford in 1641.

Scofield and Spiers give Daniel¹ Scofield's birth as "abt. 1616," but without specific reference. [13] Hoppin said that he was "between 50 and 60 years of age" when he died (before 10 February 1669/70), [14] which would give a birth year range of about 1610-1620. Other researchers has come up with a birth year of 1595 for Daniel¹ Scofield, apparently based on earlier work by William A. D. Eardeley. [15], [16] No marriage date has been found, and only his last child's birth was recorded in Stamford in 1657, so no good reasons for speculation on a birth year are found in these areas. About all we can say is that he was probably an adult (21 years of age or greater) in 1641 when he received his land distribution at Stamford, and was therefore born before about 1620, probably in England. [17]

His wife was SARAH ____, who, as "Sarrah Scofeeld," married secondly Miles Merwin at Stamford on 30 November 1670, [18] and died at Milford, Connecticut on 5 March 1697/98. [19] Miles Merwin, a tanner of Milford, had been married twice before: (1) to Elizabeth ____, who died 10 July 1664, with whom he had 7 children, including Abigail, born about 1652, who married Daniel² Scofield, and (2) to Sarah (Platt) Beach, daughter of Richard Platt and widow of Thomas Beach, who died 15 May 1670, with whom he had another 4 children, including a set of twins, all born between 1665 and 1670. Paul Prindle also covered the career of Miles Merwin in his Gillespie Genealogy. [20]

As pointed out by Prindle and others, there seems to be no basis for identifying Daniel¹ Scofield's wife as the daughter of Rev. John Youngs, as has been done by some authors.^[21] It is possible, though, that she was somehow related to William Graves since several Stamford

residents testified in June 1666 that William Graves had told them that he (Graves) had given Daniel Scofield 10 acres of land in his tobacco lot. [22] This testimony appears to have been recorded in order to document the gift in the absence of a regular deed.

The will of Daniel Scofield was made at Stamford 1 September 1669, and witnessed by George Slason and John Holly. He designated his wife to be executrix (no name stated) along with his two sons Daniel and John, executors, and gave legacies to his daughter Sarah and her two minor children, and to "my other four children" (that is, to Daniel, John Joseph and Mercy) the three sons to have the house and homelot (subject to the widow's thirds) and the residue of the estate equally except for the son Daniel who was to have "ten pounds over plus." [23] He died sometime during the following winter, since his inventory was taken on 10 February 1669/70 (10th day 12th month 1669) by Lt. Francis Bell and John Holly. [24] The will was signed with a mark, as was an earlier deed given to John Mead on 20 February 1659/60, [25] indicating that Daniel¹ Scofield was unable to sign his own name and was probably not an educated person.

October 1714.^[34] He married his stepsister, ABIGAIL MERWIN, born about 1652, daughter of Miles and Elizabeth (_____) Merwin of Milford.^[35]

Prindle gives an excellent and complete account of Daniel² Scofield's land transactions in Stamford, as well as his considerable public service. Over the years from the time he reached his majority about 1667-1668 until the time of his death in 1714 he served the town in countless ways, as selectman, on school and church committees, and in a variety of lesser elected and appointed positions. He was regularly called upon to take inventories and assist in administration of estates. His children married into the families of many of Stamford's other leading citizens. His selection for service to the town indicated an obvious measure of respect that culminated in the designation as "Mr." in some records of his later years.

Daniel² Scofield died intestate at Stamford on 10 October 1714, and his son Samuel Scofield and son-in-law Lt. Samuel Weed were designated to administer the estate.^[37] His inventory was taken on 22 November 1714 and presented in Court by Samuel Scofield and Samuel Weed, contersigned by Samuel Hait/Hoyt (the smith), Samuel Weed, Daniel Weed, Daniel Scofield (clearly the son Daniel³), Samuel Bates and "Serh Scofeld" (the latter not positively identified but appears to have been the son Samuel signing as 'sergeant' instead of using his given name). ^[38] The inventory listed the homestead of Daniel Scofield and several other parcels of land throughout Stamford, but interestingly also included "the homestead of Joseph Scofield" and "the homelot of Samuel Scofield," indicating that these two sons were still living on their father's lands.

On 29 November 1714, only a week after the inventory had been presented and approved, the heirs entered into an extensive agreement that was filed with the Fairfield Probate Court, dividing up Daniel's extensive holdings of real and personal estate, "for a full final amicable conclusion & settlement of all s^d Estate." The parties and signatories to that agreement were: the widow Abigail Scofield, Daniel, Joseph, and Samuel Scofield, Samuel Hait "Smith" and Mary his wife, Samuel Weed and Abigail his wife, Samuel Bates and Sarah his wife, and Daniel Weed Junior and Elizabeth his wife.

Considering that the complicated agreement was signed only a week after the inventory was taken, there must have been considerable discussion and planning beforehand about how the properties would be divided. The agreement was unique in its extent and detail (3 full pages of small handwriting both in the original document and the recorded transcription) and especially in the amount of internal cooperation that must have been a characteristic of this family. Some of the more important provisions of the agreement were as follows:

• The widow received the usual movables and her 1/3 right in the real estate for her lifetime, plus allotments of livestock, corn, wheat, flax and hay to be provided by the

children. The sons and sons-in-law all signed up for different specific amounts of provisions.

- The eldest son Daniel Scofield received his father's homestead and also "the homestead that was Samuel Scofields aforesaid with the buildings thereon," the Oxpasture land of 5 acres, half of the Toilsome Land being about 4 acres more or less, 1 acre of salt meadow, one other minor piece of 1 rood in size, ½ of 2 acres at Shippan "bounded east and west by the sea." (Several cash payments among the children in future years were also enumerated.)
- Joseph Scoffield received "his homelot whereon he now lives," plus several other smaller parcels, rights and considerations.
- Samuel Scofield received "his present homestead accounted five acres with all the buildings thereon," plus some land that was Daniel's (meaning Daniel³) and several other smaller parcels, rights and considerations. From these wordings it appears that Samuel Scofield had a former homestead (now being given to his brother Daniel) and a present homestead, which he would now own outright, both until now part of their father's lands.
- Samuel Hait received the other ½ of the Toilsome Land being about 4 acres, 1 acre in the horse pasture and other smaller parcels, rights and considerations.
- Samuel Weed received 4½ acres in the Tobacco Lot and other smaller parcels, rights and considerations.
- Samuel Bates received 1 acre of salt meadow and other smaller parcels, rights and considerations.
- Daniel Weed received 4½ acres in the Tobacco Lot, 1 acre of fresh meadow in the South Field, one acre of land that was (Mr.) Laurence's in the Horse Pasture, and several other smaller parcels, rights and considerations.

There were two first cousin Hannah Hoyts in Stamford who could have married Daniel³ Scofield. This one was selected by Blair Scofield ("Descendants of Daniel Scofield (1616-1669/70)" [note 2], 41: 47) and seems more feasible, based on their respective ages (she would have been about 20 years old at the time of this marriage, rather than 25 years as the other would have been.) The writer of the usually reliable Hoyt Genealogy (David W. Hoyt, A Genealogical History of the Hoyt, Haight, and Hight Families [Boston and Providence: the author, 1871], 319) was non-committal on the choice. The other Hannah was the daughter of Benjamin and Hannah (Weed) Hoyt, b. 3 Jun 1676. This latter Hannah Hoyt was selected as Daniel³'s wife by Prindle in his Gillespie Genealogy.

Genealogical Gleanings from a Selleck Family Letter

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My mother, Neva (Selleck) Pruitt had among many old family letters the following one that connected her grandfather James Selleck with the Sellecks in New Canaan and Norwalk, Connecticut, and Pound Ridge, New York. This letter was written by my mother's great aunt Mary (Selleck) Blakeslee, who in 1867 was living with her husband Barnett Blakeslee near Kinmundy, Illinois. The letter was addressed to Mary's brother James Selleck and his wife Eliza (Strawn) Selleck who were then residing on their farm in Western Iowa along Willow Creek about four miles west of the present town of Woodbine in Harrison County. Most of Mary's letter involves personal and family concerns. That in itself is interesting and important historically, but about half way through the letter Mary briefly wrote that she had recently received two letters from family members who, it turns out, lived in Connecticut. The following is an unedited transcription of her letter.

Kinmundy, Ill Sep 30th 1867

Bro. Jim & Sister Eliza:

We received your letter Saturday eve. were glad to hear from you & I do wish you would write often. Barnett would write now, but he has had what is called a catarrh on his right hand for the past three weeks & has at present but very little use of it. He hopes to be able to write you soon. He doesn't think it best on the whole to sell here & emigrate to western Iowa, though sometimes is tempted to do so. We would both like to live near you but in many respects he thinks this country preferable to live in to that. You are all mistaken about it's being unhealthy here. On the contrary I think it very healthy. I have been here over a year & haven't seen a funeral procession since I have been here, & this country is very thickly settled. There have, of course, been deaths in town. My health is never good, & you know how unused I was to work & care & how much I always rode around & went here & there, & of course it is all different. I have to stay at home & work we have no team & consequently I can go very little & it all wears upon my naturally delicate health Lucy [Mary's and James's other sister] was unnecessarily alarmed about me when she was here because I was so poor & seemed so feeble. But if I was free from so much care & hard work I think I should be as well here as ever I was in Ohio. We have plenty of fruit here I have dried over a bushel of peaches. I wish we could send you half of them. It has been very dry here this season & has been but little raised. I had a letter not long since from Uncle Ike & one from Katharine Benedict. Uncle I. says his boys were all at home last winter but Charlie had gone west again He didn't say where. He has sold his place in N_ and he & Aunt Lucy are boarding. How foolish I think. Uncle Noah has sold all his property in Brooklyn & gone to Staten Island to live. They are all changing around.

How well I would like to see you all — little Kate — the blue eyed beauty — I always shall think of her as the prettiest child I ever saw — I can see her shelling her Hazelnuts & to think that you have boys large enough to help stack hay — Well take good care of yourselves & and of them. Don't be too worldly but rest often & long, send Arthur & Walter [twin sons of James and Eliza] to Ohio to G. R. I. [Grand River Institute near Austinburg] when they get old enough.

Well I will write no more at present. B. will write soon. He wished me to write immediately so you wouldn't hold on to that land for him. It is not probable we shall ever go there to live. We wish we could prevail upon you to sell & come here, & why cannot vou both come here next season & visit us. Come to St Louis on a boat then on the cars [train] but a short distance here. It would be a delightful trip at this season of the year.

Please write soon & often to us, & let us all go to Ohio together visiting in a few

vears.

As Ever — Mary A. Blakeslee

Mary's letter to her brother James and sister-in-law Eliza (Strawn) Selleck, made reference to their unmarried sister Lucy Selleck who lived in Ashtabula County, Ohio, with her father, James Selleck, Sr. Mary, Lucy and James, Jr. were three of the five children of James Selleck, Sr. and his wife Polly Hoyt. The five children were Erastus (b. 1817), David (b. 1820), James, Jr. (b.1823), Lucy (b. 1826), and Mary A. (b. abt. 1836). A short announcement in one of the Ashtabula County newspapers said that James, Sr. and Polly along with Deacon Henry Webb and his family drove their teams from New Canaan, Connecticut, to Ashtabula County, Ohio, during the summer of 1815. By the twentieth century the great grandchildren of James and Polly Selleck did not know to whom among the many Sellecks in Connecticut and New York James was connected. Henry S. Gorham wrote in his "Bates-Selleck" book that Isaac⁶ Selleck (Abraham⁵, Nathaniel⁴, Nathaniel³, John², David¹)² had a son James⁷, but Gorham gave no hint that James was the James Selleck who married Polly Hoyt and removed to Ohio. Instead Gorham has James and Polly (Hoyt) Selleck "unplaced" in his book.³ It was Mary Blakeslee's letter that allowed the correct connection to be made.

Mary wrote in her letter about an Uncle Ike and Aunt Lucy who lived in N . She also referred to an Uncle Noah who sold his property in Brooklyn and moved to Staten Island. These three names are key to making the connection between James Selleck, Sr. in Ashtabula County, Ohio, and James⁷ in Gorham's book. Mary just used N for the name of the place where Ike and Lucy lived, but it suggests Norwalk, Connecticut. Indeed the U. S. Census Schedules for 1850 through 1880 show Isaac and Lucy Selleck living in Norwalk, Connecticut.4

Henry Gorham took much of his information about the family of Isaac⁶ Selleck from the Reverend Charles M. Selleck who wrote in his book Norwalk that Isaac had sons Noah, Isaac [G.] and James. 5 Rev. Selleck also wrote that Isaac G. Selleck married Lucy Brown who was a daughter of the Rev. James Brown and his wife Esther Seeley.⁶ As previously mentioned Isaac G. and Lucy Selleck had lived for years in Norwalk. Expressing her opinion, Mary thought it

was foolish for Isaac G. and Lucy to have sold their home and become boarders. Cousin Charlie in the letter was one of Isaac and Lucy's sons, Charles S. Selleck. Charles had traveled widely visiting California, Colorado, Utah, Montana and other western territories before coming to eastern Nebraska in 1856.⁷ There he married and eventually farmed for 25 years north of Blair, Nebraska, just outside of Herman. He then retired to Blair where he died in 1922.⁸

In her letter Mary added that Uncle Noah had sold his property in Brooklyn and had gone to Staten Island. Noah Selleck had been a merchant in Norwalk and New York City. In early 1841, Noah placed an advertisement in the Norwalk Gazette telling readers that he had purchased the interest of Munson Hoyt [of Norwalk], and would begin running the sloop "Citizen" from Hoyt's Landing to James Slip in New York. 10 Prior to early in 1843, Noah was in partnership with Asa Smith, a resident of Norwalk. 11 In NYC he sold Norwalk pottery designed by Asa Smith at their place of business known as "Selleck and Smith" at 38 James Slip. After dissolving the partnership with Smith, Noah ran steam powered packet sloops named the "Marv A Selleck" and the "Domestic" from his wharf near the Bridge in Norwalk to James Slip in NYC. 12 The "Mary A Selleck" was named for Noah's wife Mary Ann who was a daughter of Matthias Decker of Staten Island. Noah and Mary Ann never had children, but an interesting aside is that Mary Ann had a much younger half brother, 24 years her junior, who was named Noah Selleck Decker, surely so named in honor of her husband, Noah Selleck, In 1850 Noah and Mary Ann were once again living in Brooklyn were they lived until Noah retired. By the time of Noah's retirement, Mary Ann's parents were long deceased. She came from a large family plus she had other relatives on Staten Island. The decision made by Noah and Mary Ann in selecting that place for their retirement, as Mary Blakeslee wrote, is understandable.

Moreover Mary wrote that she had recently received a second letter. It seems obvious from the casual way that Mary wrote about recently receiving this letter from Katharine [sic] Benedict that James should also know Katharine. Genealogical sleuthing got even more interesting in seeking more about this person. According to the 1860 U. S. Census for Norwalk, living in the household of Thomas Benedict (35, farmer, b. Conn.), were his wife Cornelia (Weed) (27, b. NY), infant daughter Mary A. Benedict (b. Conn.), Catherine Benedict (55, b. Conn.), Mary A. Selleck (24, School Teacher, b. Ohio), and Thomas A. Bryen (26, Laborer, b. Ireland). It would seem from this that Thomas and Cornelia had a couple of boarders—an Irish immigrant and Mary, who was living and teaching in Norwalk seven years previous to her letter to her brother. Additional research showed that this Thomas Benedict was the grandson of

Thomas⁶ Benedict and his wife Mary (Waterbury). Thomas⁶ and his wife Mary Benedict had two sons, Thomas⁷ and Edwin and a daughter Catherine (b. 26 Dec. 1806) who was the author of the second letter. Thomas⁷ married Susan Betts and had several children including Thomas⁸. By 1860 both Thomas⁶ and his wife Mary were deceased. That year the census enumerator found Catherine living with her nephew Thomas⁸ and his wife Cornelia. As the infant daughter of Thomas and Cornelia was named Mary A., it is interesting to speculate that she was named after Mary A. Selleck. This bit of reasoning, however, might suggest that Mary Selleck had been living and teaching in Norwalk for several years. Regardless of her length of stay, it is clear from Mary's letter to her brother Jim and "sister" Elisa that even after moving back from Connecticut to Ohio, then marrying Barnett Blakeslee, and finally going with him to southern Illinois to live, she remained in communication with her relatives in Connecticut.

The Benedicts were more than just good friends of Mary Selleck. There was a family connection as well. Isaac⁶ Selleck and his wife Sarah Waterbury were married 1 July 1793 in the Congregational Church in Darien, Connecticut.¹⁷ Sarah (Waterbury) Selleck and Mary (Waterbury) Benedict were the daughters of Phineas Waterbury and his wife Elizabeth Lounsbury.¹⁸ The Benedict-Selleck connection through the sisters Mary Benedict and Sarah Selleck made Mary Selleck, the author of the above letter, a "cousin" of Catherine Benedict.

Combining information from U. S. Census data, Selleck's Norwalk¹⁹, Gorham's Bates-Selleck²⁰ and the will²¹ of Isaac⁶ Selleck yields the following information on his children: Polly (b. abt. 1790), Sanford (b. 1791), James (b. 1793), Noah (b. 1797), Elizabeth G. (b. 1800), Isaac G. (b. 1802), Harriet Mahetable (b. 1804) and Nancy (b. 1806). More precisely the birth of James was 14 January 1793, ²² and Isaac's marriage to Sarah Waterbury was 1 July 1793, which should cause any keen eyed reader to notice that three of the children were born before Isaac⁶ married Sarah. Assuming that Sarah Waterbury must have been the second wife of Isaac⁶ Selleck, then who was his first wife? It turns out that honor belongs to Mary Brown. She and Isaac⁶ were married 20 May 1790 in the Presbyterian Church of Poundridge, NY, by the Rev. Benjamin Judd.²³ Into this marriage were born Polly, Sanford and James⁷. Mary's death took place sometime after James was born and before 1 July 1793 when Isaac⁶ married Sarah Waterbury.

Evidence that Mary was a daughter of Benajah Brown (1749-1822) and his wife Sarah Weed is found in Benajah's will, which was probated on 17 July 1823 in Rensselaer County, New York. ²⁴ In the will Benajah bequeathed \$200 to his "grandson Sanford Selleck son of my deceased daughter Mary." Although Benajah's will was probated in Rensselaer County in New York state, there is a grave stone in the Brown Cemetery near Pound Ridge on Upper Trinity Lake road in New York state's Westchester County that reads, "In memory of Benajah Brown who died in May 1822 ae 73 yrs." ²⁵

Executor of the will was one of Benajah's sons, James, who was the brother of the previously discussed Mary (Brown) Selleck, the first wife of Isaac⁶ Selleck. It was mentioned earlier that James Brown, often described as the Rev. James Brown, married Esther Seeley. Their daughter Lucy Brown married Isaac⁷ G. Selleck. Isaac⁷ and his wife Lucy were the Uncle Ike and Aunt Lucy mentioned in the letter. This provides an additional connection between the Selleck and Brown families, yet there is another. A daughter of Isaac⁶ and Sarah Selleck was Harriet Mahetable Selleck. She married George W. Brown, one of the sons of the Rev. James and Esther Brown. George and Harriet removed to Onondaga County, New York in the 1820s along with several other Brown, Slauson and Seeley families from the Poundridge and New Canaan areas. It is not an unusual finding of the times that brother and sister married another sister and brother.

Mary's letter makes brief references to Catherine Benedict, Uncle Ike and Aunt Lucy, living in Norwalk, and Uncle Noah retiring from his business in Brooklyn and moving to Staten Island. Someone casually reading the letter might not suspect that these few comments in one letter could yield so much genealogical information as well as tie James Selleck in Ohio to his family in Connecticut and New York.

The author of this article wishes to acknowledge and thank both Holly Tooker who was able to provide much valuable information about the Deckers and Noah Selleck's marriage to Mary Ann Decker and also to Jeffrey Gray who has been extremely helpful over the years in his assistance with the connections between the Sellecks and the Browns.

Early Vital Records of Redding, CT, a Recent Discovery transcribed by Harlan R. Jessup

These few vital records are found in the first book of town minutes, labeled Redding Town Meetings 1767-1817, Town Tax Lists 1784-1815, Vital Records 1754-1772. The small collection of vital records is on reversed pages at the back of the volume with original page numbers 9-14, now numbered 434-439. These are not included in the Barbour Collection of Vital Records or in the town's index of early vital records. Several of the entries are noted as recorded by John Couch, Registh. Other than his signature, transcriptions are verbatim.

Baptisms of Christ Church, Episcopal, Redding, CT, 1814 to 1878 transcribed by Harlan R. Jessup

The Anglican Church of Redding was founded about 1732 by the Rev. John Beach who, for fifty years, served this church jointly with Trinity Church in Newtown. The earliest records of the church have apparently been lost, and none of the early records have been transcribed or microfilmed. The records here transcribed are from a volume labeled "Records of Christ Church Parish, Reading, Conn., Begun June 2d 1842 by Rev. William Atwill, Minister." In addition to regular entries of baptisms, marriages, and burials from 1842 to 1879, it includes these events as early as 1813 as transcribed from the records of earlier ministers. (As they pertain to Redding, these include the records of Rev. Samuel B. Hull, transcribed more completely in another article this issue.) It also includes confirmations from 1842 to 1872, lists of communicants, and some early financial records. Two other early volumes held by the church include Minutes 1833 to 1915 and the Parish Register of 1880 to 1928.

Baptisms only are transcribed in this article. Marriages and deaths will be published in later issues of *Connecticut Ancestry* as space permits.

Ministerial Records of the Rev. Lemuel B. HULL of Connecticut: Christ Church, Redding, and St. James Church, Danbury, 1822 to 1835

The Rev. Lemuel Beach Hull served the two parishes of Christ Church, Redding, and St. James Church, Danbury as their Episcopal rector from 1823 to 1835. He was a great-grandson of John Beach, the founding minister of the Anglican churches in Newtown and Redding in 1732 (who served both of those churches until his death in 1782). Hull was apparently serving in eastern Connecticut before 1823, and, beginning in 1836, he served at St. Paul's, Wallingford.

The original manuscript of his "Record of Marriages, Baptisms, Admission to the Communion, and Funerals" is now found in the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society in Boston, whose archivist has graciously permitted our publication of this transcription. The original small booklet (10 x 15 cm.) has records beginning in 1822, and several of the earliest entries are from the eastern Connecticut towns of Norwich, Pomfret, Plainfield, and Brooklyn. Though catalogued with dates 1822-1835, there are no records after 1828 except a handful of marriages in 1834 and 1835.

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

Society Rews

Fred Hart Elected as FASG

Connecticut Ancestry's Genealogist, Frederick C. Hart, Jr., was elected a Fellow of the Society of American Genealogists at the recent annual meeting of that society. This allows him to add FASG as a postnominal together with the CG (certified genealogist) which already follows his name. The American Society of Genealogists (ASG) was founded in 1940 by three distinguished academicians—Arthur Adams, John Insley Coddington and Meredith Colket, numbered 1, 2 and 3 in the membership list. Donald Lines Jacobus was added in 1941 as Fellow number 4. Membership in the Society is limited to fifty life-time members designated as fellows with additions made only when vacancies occur due to death or resignation. Fred Hart is number 156 of just 157 fellows elected since the inception of this prestigious society.

Fellows of the society are elected by the membership based on the quality of their published work. While our readers know of Fred's many contributions to this journal including the current series, they may not be familiar with his many fine articles in *The American Genealogist*, *The New England Historic and Genealogical Journal*, and *The New York Genealogical and Biographical Record*.

We in Connecticut Ancestry Society can be justly proud of such an honor to an active member of our Board. But Fred is not the only FASG with whom we have a relationship. Helen Schatvet Ullmann, FASG, is a member of our Society and has contributed a number of articles to Connecticut Ancestry based on her Mills family of Fairfield County. And articles have been written for our anniversary issue and subsequent issues by Fred and by Helen and by six additional FASGs: Robert C. Anderson, John Bradley Arthaud, Gale I. Harris, Henry B. Hoff, Myrtle S. Hyde, David Kendall Martin, and Gordon Lewis Remington. There certainly can be no claim that contributors to our journal are anything but first rate!

Two deceased members of Connecticut Ancestry Society deserve special mention. Paul Wesley Prindle was elected a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists in 1964 and died in 1991. He was a founding member of Stamford Genealogical Society (now Connecticut Ancestry Society) in 1954, served one term as its President, and contributed many articles to this journal. John Insley Coddington, a founding member of ASG, also died in 1981. He had lectured several times at early meetings of our Society. As a Society with a relatively limited geographical focus we can be proud to claim these distinguished genealogists, some as members and all as contributors.

Editorial Notes and Society News

At the Board of Directors meeting on October 21 Sven-Eric Selander was appointed Librarian/Historian of this Society. Sven has served as our treasurer and membership coordinator for three years until he turned over the books to Nora Galvin with her election at our annual meeting in May. In his new position, Sven will coordinate our outreach to libraries and historical societies, continuing our objective to be the clearing house for genealogical activities in our geographic area. He will also keep the Society's historical records. It is noted that our by-laws call for the position of Librarian to coordinate our holdings in what has become the Stamford Room at Ferguson Library plus other duties. The Society's first Librarian was Grace Walmsley whose term ended in 1980; Tom Kemp and one or two others served short terms in the next decade; but the position has been unfilled since about 1990.

Also, at a recent Board meeting the decision was made to raise the annual dues, our first increase since 1995. Beginning with the membership year 2008-2009, individual dues will be \$25 per year plus \$10 for each additional member in the household. Dues for libraries and societies will be \$35 per year. This reflects increased printing and postal costs (six postage rate increases since 1995) and the added costs of tracking individual memberships to comply with increased security concerns. Some of you will want to take advantage of our special one-time offer to upgrade to life members. Such memberships are priced at \$750 with a credit of \$15 for each past membership year.

In this issue we continue the series on the ancestors of William Weed by our genealogist, Fred Hart. This series, to continue for several future issues, connects to a great many families of southwestern Connecticut. Also, we conclude our review of the early records of Redding, including here the marriages and burials from the first record book of Christ Church, Episcopal, of Redding Ridge, plus a summary of the genealogical holdings of the Mark Twain Library. And as a tasty tidbit for our readers we offer Priscilla Chatfield's dismemberment of a Chatfield family legend with several interesting sidelights.


ANCESTRY OF WILLIAM WEED OF STAMFORD AND DARIEN, CONNECTICUT

PART 3:

BRUSH

BRUSH

Much of the following account has been taken from the authoritative treatment by Conklin Mann in his 1935 article for *The New York Genealogical and Biographical Record.* [1] A considerable amount of biographical information on the early generations will be found in this earlier article, and although primary source citations are not provided, it is still highly recommended.

1. Thomas¹ Brush was first noted in Southold, Long Island, New York in a record of 8 October 1655 when he was mentioned in an affidavit, but is thought to have been there earlier, perhaps about 1650 or 1651. His English origin has not yet been determined. He was born say about 1630, most likely in England, and died at Huntington, Suffolk County, Long Island, New York probably shortly after 26 April 1670 when a document shows his signature, and certainly before June 1677 when his estate was settled, see below. The person named Thomas Brush who appears as a party to Huntington records after 1670 was most likely his son by that name, no longer needing to use the suffix "Jr." to differentiate him from his father. [4]

Some researchers have claimed that he was a son of one John Brush of Southold, ^[5] but I have not been able to find any primary source documentation that would support this claim, and it is considered very speculative.

Probably about 1650/51 and possibly in Southold, he is presumed to have married REBECCA CONKLIN, daughter of John Conklin and Elizabeth Alseabrook. The Conklin (or Concklyne) family had come to Long Island from Salem, Massachusetts, but no records of Thomas Brush have been found in that earlier place. Richard Brush, possibly the brother of Thomas Brush and closely associated with his family on Long Island, is known to have been in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 1658, and later the two had adjoining lands in Huntington. It would not be unexpected to find the origins of Thomas Brush, Richard Brush, and John Conklin in the same community(ies) in England.

The Huntington Town Meeting of 15 October 1660 voted that "goodman [Thomas] Brush shall keepe the ordinary so long as hee do ... [etc.]." He therefore appears to have been Huntington's first innkeeper.

Thomas Brush returned briefly to Southold, where he purchased some land in 1661,^[8] and was made a freeman of the Connecticut Colony on 9 October 1662.^[9] On 11 April 1663, Thomas Brush and John Tucker, Gent., both of Southold, sold the property at Southold where Brush had been living to Thomas Mapes.^[10] Rebecca, wife of Thomas Brush, gave her approval to the sale, and this record is apparently the only mention of the given name of his wife. He had certainly returned to Huntington by 1 June 1663, when the town named him to a select committee of four men to survey and record the boundaries and owners of all of the existing land holdings in Huntington, and to distribute additional lands within the town boundaries at their discretion – a very important responsibility.^[11]

The estate of Thomas Brush was administered by his son Thomas and on 11 August (6th month) 1677 the daughter Rebecca Brush made receipt "of my brother Thomas administrator one oure fathers estate my full proportion of yt estate to Content(,) it being to ye value of fifty pounds & thirteen shillins & fower pence." Her brother John Brush received an identical amount and made a similar receipt on the same date. Rebecca signed with her X mark and John made his own signature. Jonas Wood and Joseph Whitman witnessed both receipts. [12]

There does not seem to be any further mention of a widow Rebecca (Conklin) Brush, and she may have died around the same time as her husband. One reference gives a date for her death of 9 April 1670, but without reference to any original source. [13] There is also no record of any second marriage for her, even though there were several minor children. At any rate, her father John Conklin was appointed overseer of those minor children, and they were taken back into their grandfather's home.

Children of Thomas and Rebecca (Conklin) Brush, no births recorded, but pieced together by Conklin Mann from a variety of other evidence:^[14]

- i. Thomas² Brush, b. abt. 1651/52, d. 16 Apr 1698, administered his father's estate in 1677, m. SARAH ____, perhaps Wickes or Ketcham, who m. (2) bef, 1711 Nathaniel Williams.
- ii. JOHN BRUSH, b. 1654, d. abt 1740, m. (1) by 1682 SARAH ADAMS, m. (2) ELIZABETH (PLATT) GRIFFIN, and m. (3) the widow JANE (_____) KETCHAM.
- iii. REBECCA BRUSH, b. abt. 1656, m. 8 Feb 1682/83 at Huntington JEREMIAH HUBBARD or Hobart of Jamaica, Long Island, perhaps a son of Benjamin Hubbard of Jamaica. [15]

- 2. JACOB² BRUSH (*Thomas*¹), weaver, was born probably at Huntington before 1667. He appears to have died sometime after 23 June 1724 when Henry Lloyd sold a canoe to him and his son, and before 30 April 1728 when the Huntington records referred to "the right formerly held by Jacob Brush, late deceased." [16] As noted below, he may have died closer to the earlier date.

His wife has been identified through the Huntington land records as MARY ROGERS, daughter of Jonathan Rogers and Rebecca Wickes. On 27 January 1701/02, in what appears to have been a wedding present, Jonathan Rogers Senior gave her several pieces of land in Huntington for "ye natrall Love & afection which I have & Doe beare unto my well beloved Dafter Mary Rogers." One of the pieces so conveyed was "Seventenn Acars of wood Land to be taken up by ye sd Mary Rogers or hur husband Jacob Brush upon my Right In ye next division Made by or stated by ye towne" (emphasis added). The other parcels were identified as 3 acres on the east side of Cold Spring Harbor and "also a third part of my Medow in ye east neck." Her father then went on to call her "Mary Rogers or Brush" two additional times later in the same deed. She was no longer called Mary Rogers when, on 24 October 1702, Jacob Brush and Mary his wife sold land in the little East Neck fields "which I the said Jacob had of my father [clearly meaning his wife's father] Jonathan Rogers senior" to Obadiah Rogers of Huntington, Mary's brother. [18]

They apparently needed to move to larger quarters in Huntington as their young family came along since on 24 February 1703/04, Jacob Brush with the "approbation and consent of Mary his wife," sold his homestead for an unspecified amount to Jeremiah Wood of Huntington including, "my hous orchard hom lott fences yards gardens belonging to ye same siteuate Lying & beeing In ye Town of Huntington Contayning by Estimation Six Acars be it More or Less being bounded on ye north by ye Lott of Jonathan Scuder(,) on ye South by ye highway Leading to

Oyester Bay(,) on ye East by ye street Leading to hors Neck(,) on ye west by an old hedg formerly mad by ye sd Jacob Brush which Standeth by ye path yt Leadeth to wigwam Swamp." [19]

Mary (Rogers) Brush married (2) at Stamford on "the evening following last day of February 1733/34" Lieutenant Jonathan Bell, one of Stamford's leading citizens. Jonathan Bell had been born at Stamford 14 February 1663 and died there in September 1745. He was married twice previously, first to one Grace Kitchell of New Jersey, and second on 14 Jan 1701/02 to Deborah Ferris, having a total of 7 children with these first two wives. [21] Deborah (Ferris) Bell had died at Stamford on 30 July 1724. [22] Lt. Jonathan Bell was 70 years old at the time of his third marriage.

The will of Mrs. Mary Bell of Stamford, widow of Lt. Jonathan Bell, was signed (with her + mark) on 23 September 1745 (probably shortly after her husband's death, and certainly shortly after the death of her daughter Rebecca), and proved 5 November 1745, naming her children Jonathan Brush; Ruth wife of Nathan Brown; Ann, wife of Nathaniel Brown; Keziah, wife of Daniel Weed; and grandchildren Jacob Brush son of Jonathan Brush; and the children of Rebecca Slason, a deceased daughter. [23]

Considering that all of her children married into Stamford families, and that some of the marriages were as early as 1725, it is possible that the widow Mary Rogers may have moved to Stamford quite a bit earlier than her marriage to Lt. Bell would indicate. A date of death for Jacob Brush might therefore have been as early as 1724, when we seem to have the last known record of him still alive. At this time, many of his children had just reached or were reaching marrying age.

Children of Jacob and Mary (Rogers) Brush, presumably all born at Huntington: [24]

- i. Rebecca³ Brush, b. say 1701, d. 1 Sep 1745 at Stamford, [25] m. say abt. 1720 as his first wife, John Slason Jr. of Stamford, b. 4 Oct 1695, son of John and Mary (Holmes) Slason. [26]
- ii. Ruth Brush, b. say 1702, m. say abt. 1726 NATHAN Brown of Stamford. Their marriage was not recorded but the births of the children of Nathan and Ruth Brown were recorded in Stamford beginning with Nathan Jr. on 13 May 1728. [27]

- iii. Ann/Anna Brush, b. say 1704, m. 20 Apr 1725 at Stamford, NATHANIEL Brown of Stamford. [28]
- iv. John Brush, b. say 1706, d. aft. 1770, m. at Huntington 4 Jan 1733/34 his first cousin Jane Rogers, daughter of David Rogers and Jane Ketcham. [29] On 5 Jan 1737/38, as a resident of Huntington, he quitclaimed all land in Huntington "that was my father's or mine" to his brother Jonathan Brush formerly of Huntington but now of Stamford. [30]
- v. Keziah Brush, b. say 1710, m. say about 1737 Daniel Weed of Stamford.
- vi. Jonathan Brush, b. 1712, still living in 1770, m. at Stamford on 26 Feb 1740/41, Hannah Holly, daughter of John and Abigail Holly. He apparently resided at Stamford (where he recorded his earmark in 1742) until about 1760 when he moved his family to Pound Ridge, Westchester County, New York. [31] Even with several young children, he enlisted in the Westchester County Militia in 1762, a blacksmith, age 50 and born on Long Island. [32]



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ROGERS

1. WILLIAM¹ ROGERS was born at Stratford-On-Avon, Warwickshire, England about 1612, and was baptized there on 7 February 1612/13,^[1] the son of one Thomas Rogers, whose identity has not been resolved by earlier researchers. He died at Huntington, Suffolk County, Long Island, New York "probably rather suddenly" on 13 July 1664.^[2]

It is important to note that William's father was not the Thomas Rogers who was among the passengers of the MAYFLOWER. One author describes the situation as follows:

"Thomas Rogers of Stratford-on-Avon, father of William¹ Rogers, was not Thomas Rogers of the 'Mayflower.' The Rogers family was numerous and prominent in Stratford-on-Avon. Thomas Rogers, bailiff and alderman, who was buried February 20, 1610/11, was of this family. This Thomas had at least 16 children, one becoming mother of the John Harvard of New England. The handsome Rogers House in Stratford-on-Avon which the alderman Thomas Rogers built in 1596 is believed to still be standing." [3]

Some authors have called him a member of the followers of the Rev. Richard Denton who settled in succession Wethersfield and Stamford, Connecticut, and Hempstead, on Long Island, but this appears to be an overstatement. William Rogers did in fact own property in Wethersfield by 1645, but he is not listed among the first settlers of that town who came from Watertown in 1635 and 1636. Although it is reasonable to presume that he spent some earlier time in Massachusetts, he is not mentioned in Savage's *Genealogical Dictionary* at all, and apparently did not leave any records elsewhere in New England prior to the land ownership in Wethersfield. Seversmith said he appeared "supposedly" in Boston in 1638, but gave no source for the statement. Seversmith also called him a "cousin" of Thomas Wickes / Wilkes of Wethersfield and Huntington (see below).

He married Anna or Anne Hall at Stratford-On-Avon on 2 February 1630/31.^[7] She survived her husband and died between 22 November 1669 and 21 February 1669/70, the dates of her will and its probate.^[8] The suggestion by Miner and Jacobus that she was possibly Anne Sherman, daughter of Edmund Sherman of Dedham, England and Wethersfield,^[9] is not mentioned at all by Seversmith, and appears to have been superseded by Seversmith's more detailed discoveries. In particular, Seversmith noticed in the parish registers that Anne was probably identical with that Anne Hall, illegitimate daughter of Grace Hall, who was baptized at Stratford-on-Avon on 16 February 1612/13, less than one week after the baptism there of William Rogers.^[10] Anne's mother appears to have been Grace, daughter of Robert "Hawle," who was baptized at Stratford-on-Avon on 18 June 1583.^[11]

William Rogers was in Southampton, Long Island at an early time, but the exact sequence of his residences is not clear. The Southampton historian Mr. Howell gave the following account:

"William Rogers is mentioned as a resident [of Southampton] from 1642, to, at least, March 1645-6. In 1645 the Gen. Court [of Connecticut] made him a grant of land. In 1649 he is made freeman. [12] He appears to have had a home in Hempstead, for a few years previous to 1649. From 1649 to 1655 we find him an inhabitant of Southampton, and after this he disappears altogether... Subsequent to 1655, Obadiah Rogers is mentioned as residing on the homestead that William had occupied... Now it is probable that William¹ gave the Southampton homestead to [his son] Obadiah about 1655, and with his wife and younger children removed to Huntington where he might have resided several years." [13]

We do know that on 30 July 1656, Jonas Wood, William Rogers and Thomas Wilkes purchased the major portion of what would become the Huntington lands from Asharoken Montinnicok, Sachem, and the other native Americans "for and in consideration of 2 coates, fore shertes, seven quarts of licker and aleven ounces of powther." This agrees very well with Mr. Howell's estimate of the time William Rogers moved to Huntington.

William Rogers did not leave a will (at least not one that has survived), but the will of Anne Rogers of Huntington mentioned her son Obadiah and his eldest son (not identified by name), her sons John, Noah and Samuel, and her daughters Mary and Hannah. [15] Miner and Jacobus found that "Although Jonathan was not named in the will, he was called brother by Noah in a conveyance and was certainly son of William, though possibly by a former wife." [16] Seversmith

presumed that Jonathan was left out because of a family disagreement, but a more plausible argument might be that Jonathan had already received his portion. At any rate, if Anne was indeed the person who married William Rogers in England in 1630, then Jonathan (baptized in 1636 and still living in 1669) must have been her son. Samuel is felt by most writers to have been not her own child but the husband of her daughter Mary, probably Samuel Titus.

Children of William and Anna (Hall) Rogers, first three baptized at Stratford-On-Avon: [17]

- i. Anna or Hannah² Rogers, bapt. as "Anna" 7 Mar 1631/32.
- ii. OBADIAH ROGERS, bapt. 29 Sept 1633, d. 1689 or 1690, m. MARY RUSSELL, and remained in Southampton.
- 2. iii. Jonathan Rogers, bapt. 4 Sep 1636, prob. m. Rebecca Wickes.
 - iv. JOHN ROGERS, b. 1640, probably in America, of Huntington in 1664, but d. without issue at Branford, CT, in 1676.
 - v. Noah Rogers, d. at Branford, CT, 8 Oct 1725, m. 8 Apr 1673 ELIZABETH TAINTOR, b. 22 Jun 1655, d. 9 Dec 1732. Conveyed land in Huntington to his brother Jonathan Rogers.
 - vi. MARY ROGERS, prob. m. SAMUEL TITUS.
- 2. **Jonathan² Rogers** (William¹) was born at Stratford-on-Avon probably in 1636, and baptized there on 4 September 1636, son of William Rogers. He died sometime after 4 April 1708 when he sold some remaining land in Huntington, but no will or administration or burial record has been found. [18]

His wife was named Rebecca, and he probably married REBECCA WICKES, daughter of Thomas Wickes (or Wilkes) of Stratford-on-Avon, Wethersfield and Huntington, although no marriage record is found. The Wilkes/Wickes and Rogers families were both from Stratford-on-Avon, and it would not be unusual for two children in these families to have married each other. Herbert F. Smith (the same person later known as Herbert F. Seversmith whose work has been so helpful for the Rogers and Brush families of Huntington) published a brief article clarifying various Wickes families, in which he demonstrated that Thomas Wickes of Huntington was actually named Thomas Wilkes, and that his name had been read incorrectly on many documents. There was another unrelated Thomas Weekes of Oyster Bay, and there has been much confusion related to the similarity of names. In describing our Thomas Wilkes or Wickes of Huntington, Seversmith said:

"Wickes, or to give him his proper name, Wilkes, is indicated by investigations now current to have been the son of Edward Wilkes of the suburb of Shottery in Stratford-on-Avon,

Warwickshire, by Katheren Rogers his wife, a relative of William Rogers also of Huntington, New York, and close friend of Thomas Wilkes or Wickes." [19], [20]

Rebecca Wickes' grandmother, therefore, was also a member of the Rogers family of Warwickshire. Specifically, Seversmith concluded in his later work that Catherine Rogers was the sister of Thomas Rogers, grandfather of Jonathan Rogers of Huntington, and therefore Jonathan Rogers and Rebecca Wickes were most likely second cousins.^[21]

Jonathan Rogers (along with his brother John Rogers and 19 other Huntington men) was made a freeman of the State of Connecticut on 12 May 1664, during Connecticut's brief jurisdiction over that Long Island town. [22] He held several positions of responsibility in Huntington, including rate gatherer, fence viewer, overseer, and constable. [23] He was a sawyer and at different times a miller of both lumber and grain. [24]

Jonathan Rogers "sener" and his wife Rebecca sold several parcels of land including 38 acres of upland bordering on the Huntington Harbor to their son John Rogers on 24 June 1699, reserving a portion to their own life use. [25]

On 12 May 1701 Jonathan and Rebecca Rogers sold their son Obadiah Rogers several parcels of lands and rights, reserving, as they had before with John, use of a portion of the lands during their lifetimes. [26]

On 27 January 1701/02, Jonathan Rogers (without Rebecca) gave his daughter Mary Rogers for love and affection and possibly as a wedding present 3 acres on the east side of Cold Spring Harbor and 17 acres of woodland "to be taken up by sd Mary Rogars or hur husband Jacob Brush upon my right in ye next division made by or stated by the towne." [27] Then, two days later on 29 January 1701/02, Jonathan and Rebecca Rogers sold or gave (the deed can be read both ways) their son Joseph several parcels and rights including 34 acres of upland, again reserving a portion for their lifetime use. [28]

The son David Rogers received the major portion of his father's remaining lands on 15 January 1705/06 when Jonathan and Rebecca Rogers sold him "... my house and grist Mill and homestead with all ye buildings that are now upon this sd land or hereafter Shall bee in my lifetime & twenty Acars of land this homestead Beeing Sum part of it a small part lying by ye mill pond another part lying at ye head of ye mill swampe in ye great hollow yt Cometh Down

from ye Cuntry Road & Seven Acars Joining to it which I bought of Mr Whitehead lying in ye same hollow allso another part lying Eastward from my house upon ye hilles betwen ye ould Mill path & ye Cuntry Road & two Acars of land on ye north side ye road on which my barn now stands & nintenn Acars of land lying in ye west neck on ye east side ye Cove Swampe betwen ye land of John Ketcham & ye land of John Sammis & fouer Acers not yet laid out & one hundren pound Right of land excepting seventeen Acers and all yt peece of Medow on ye north side ye Road by my house which I bought of Edward Ketcham amd halfe my Medow upon Santapague & a third part of my right of land upon ye sd necke together with all & singular ye hereditements & appurtenances thereunto belonging." [29]

Jonathan and Rebecca Rogers were both still living on 4 April 1708 when Jonathan Rogers "Senor... by & with ye Approbation & Consent of Rebeca his wife" sold to Captain Thomas Wickes a 4-acre homelot in Huntington. [30] The deed was witnessed by Jonathan Rogers Junior, Jeremiah Platt and John Ketcham. Since it appears there were no probate proceedings on his estate, Jonathan Rogers may simply have disposed of all of his real estate during his lifetime, and especially to the benefit of his children.

Children of Jonathan and Rebecca (Wickes) Rogers, probably all born at Huntington, list quite speculative and uncertain:^[31]

MERWIN

With the excitement that has attended the profusion of genealogical information on the Internet and on CD-ROM, it is easy to lose sight of the fact that much of it is simply a recycling of older and sometimes very inferior research conclusions. Because of the attraction of these technical advances, it is also easy to lose sight of the outstanding level of modern research that is being conducted and reported in the national journals.

The case of Miles Merwin is an example of why researchers need to monitor these national journals continually for something that may apply to one of their subject families. Douglas Richardson's brilliant recent article regarding Miles Merwin's English origin^[1] goes far beyond anything even hinted at by earlier researchers, including such experts as Donald L. Jacobus and Paul W. Prindle. Not only does Richardson set forth the exact lineage of Miles Merwin back as far as one John Merwin born before 1500, but he also explains for the first time the name of Merwin's first wife, and his exact relationship to Abigail Branker of Windsor – a relationship that was misunderstood by previous researchers for decades. Richardson's work on the English origin has been incorporated here with the detailed work of Paul Prindle concerning Merwin's American records, and with other sources as felt appropriate.

1. MILES¹ MERWIN (Walter^A, Nicholas^B, Thomas^C, John^D) was born at Clewer, Berkshire, England early in 1624 and baptized at the adjacent parish of New Windsor on 1 February 1623/24.^[2] Earlier suppositions that he was from Wales^[3] have been disproved. He died at Milford, Fairfield County, Connecticut on 23 April 1697,^[4] where his gravestone in the Milford Cemetery gives his age as "Aged 74 Years."^[5] He was tanner by occupation.^[6]



He was married three times. He first married about 1648 at Windsor, Connecticut, **ELIZABETH POWELL.** She had been baptized at All Hallows, Goldsmith Street, Exeter, Devonshire, England on 29 August 1630, the daughter of William and Dorothy (Searle)

Powell.^[7] She joined the Milford Church in 1661 and died at Milford on 10 July 1664.^[8] Paul Prindle discussed claims that she was Elizabeth (Baldwin) Canfield, widow of Theophilus Canfield, and showed that this was a confusion with the wife of John² Merwin, see below.

Although all previous researchers had assumed that the inclusion of Miles Merwin and his family in the estate of Abigail (Searle) (Branker) Warham of Windsor meant that he was her nephew, Richardson has demonstrated that it was actually Elizabeth (Powell) Merwin, Miles' first wife, who was a niece of Mrs. Warham, and Miles was only a nephew by marriage. [9]

His second wife, married probably about 1665, was SARAH (PLATT) BEACH, daughter of Deacon Richard Platt of Milford and widow of Thomas Beach who died in 1662.^[10] She was baptized in Ware, County Hertford, England on 11 September 1636, daughter of Richard and Mary (Wood) Platt.^[11] Sarah died at Milford on 15 May 1670,^[12] not long after giving birth to Deborah on 24 April.

Miles Merwin married (3) at Stamford on 30 November 1670, [13] SARAH (____) SCOFIELD, widow of Daniel Scofield, who had died early in 1669/70. She died at Milford on 5 March 1697/98. [14] As already discussed in the accompanying Scofield segment, there is no justification for calling her the daughter of the Rev. John Youngs as has been given wide publicity in several genealogies. [15] A 1998 article made a thorough analysis of all possible Youngs connections and concluded that, "her identity must be sought elsewhere." [16]

Although no specific passenger list has survived for the trip, many authorities have claimed that Miles Merwin came to America on board the ship Mary & John in its voyage of 20 March 1629/30 (which preceded the sailing of the Winthrop Fleet by about 2 weeks). [17] The claim was based on the fact that Abigail (Searle) Branker, widow of schoolmaster John Branker of Dorchester, Massachusetts and Windsor, Connecticut, and also of the Rev. John Warham of Windsor, was known to have been an aunt of Miles Merwin. [18] However, although Rev. Mr.

Warham was a member of the Mary & John party in 1630, it appears that the Brankers did not migrate until 1632. [19] Even if Miles Merwin did travel to America in 1632 in the company of his (presumed) aunt Abigail Branker, as may certainly be possible, or sometime later, he was apparently not a passenger on the Mary & John. Recent scholarship has accepted this view and does not include Miles Merwin among the settlers of New England through 1633. [20]

In 1635, when the Warham party left Dorchester, Massachusetts by overland trail to settle what became the town of Windsor, Connecticut, the young Miles Merwin (age about 12 years) was thought by earlier researchers to have been with them, traveling with the Brankers. Richardson believes, however, that Merwin may have come to New England on board the ship Susan and Ellen as late as 1640, in company with his uncle, John Tinker, [21] but this, too, is speculation.

Regardless of how or when he arrived here, the first record we have of Miles Merwin in America was of a land arrangement he made with a Mr. Whiting in Windsor in about 1644. Miles Merwin gave testimony in a court case of 1684 in which he "aged about 60 years" testified that he had obtained rights to work a parcel of land in Windsor from Mr. William Whiting of Hartford. [22] No date was given, but other testimony by John Dumbleton (who was a servant of Mr. Whiting) indicated that Dumbleton had obtained the same piece of land in 1639 and worked it himself for about 4 years. [23] If Merwin actually did follow Dumbleton on this land, then he would have taken it up in about 1644. The latest he could have obtained these rights was in 1648, since Mr. Whiting died in 1649.

About 1653, he moved to Milford. Connecticut at the invitation of the town and with some incentives provided, due to his skill as a tanner. [24] His moving to Milford was apparently to his advantage, considering the prosperity he enjoyed there and his receipt of several substantial grants and divisions of land from the town. It was apparently not, however, to the liking of his (first wife's) aunt Abigail Branker when he left Windsor with his young family. She had made a will in which she named him executor and principal legatee "for he and his children were her only relatives in the New World." On her death bed in 1684, she made a nuncupative will that named two of Miles' children to receive certain amounts, but declared that Miles himself was not to receive anything beyond what he had already received during her lifetime. Based on this nuncupative will, amounts were eventually distributed to all of Miles children but not to him. He contested the probate of the nuncupative will in 1685, but without success.^[25]

Although Miles Merwin apparently never lived in Stamford, his third wife received a considerable amount of land there through the settlement of Daniel Scofield's estate. These lands were described and entered into the Stamford Land Records on 29 Jun 1687, "Entre to goodwife

Murrin to her and hers forever being lands of her former husband Scofields collected from settlement by the court & agreement between her & her sons Danil & John Scofield and now entered in the records." [26]

A couple of days later, on 1 July 1687, John Scofield entered a deed in the Stamford Land Records by which "I Sarah Marin of Milford wife of Miles Marin" had sold to "my loveing son John Scofield of Stamford" her 1/3 part of Daniel Scofield's home lot on 13 November 1678. [27]

Miles Merwin provided well for all of his children during his lifetime, and additionally in his will, made on 5 May 1695 and probated in Milford in June 1697. After providing for his wife's ample support as long as she remained his widow (as it turned out, she died within the next year), he left £ 100 to each of 4 sons, with a double portion to John, the eldest son; £ 50 to each of his 6 daughters; £ 100 each to the eldest grandchild in each of the 10 families; and a Bible to each grandchild. He also left legacies to several stepchildren, and named his sons John and Miles as co-executors. [28]

Children of Miles and Elizabeth (Powell) Merwin, first 3 probably born in Windsor, other 4 born in Milford: [29]

- i. ELIZABETH² MERWIN, b. say 1648, m. abt. 1669 SAMUEL CAMFIELD (or CANFIELD)^[30] of Norwalk.^[31] Samuel Camfield did not marry Elizabeth Willoughby as has been and still is widely reported.^[32]



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WICKES

1. THOMAS¹ WICKES (or Wilkes) was born about 1615, perhaps in Shottery, a suburb of Stratford-on-Avon, Warwickshire, England, perhaps a son of Edward Wilkes and Katherine Rogers. [1] Katherine Rogers was a sister of Thomas Rogers and aunt of William Rogers, the immigrant to America who was closely associated with Thomas Wickes. Thomas Wickes died at Huntington, Suffolk County, Long Island, New York between 3 July 1670 and 19 March 1670/71 (see below). Care must be taken to distinguish him and his family from that of Thomas Weeks of Oyster Bay, Long Island. [2]

The name of his wife has not been determined, although Seversmith felt it was possible that she was related to Jonas Wood "Oram." Thomas Wicks and Jonas Wood "Oram" were certainly closely associated in the Huntington records and shared many boundaries with each other. [4]

There can be no question that his name was spelled both Wilks / Wilkes on the one hand and Wicks / Wickes on the other, even though we don't know the reasons. Joseph Bailey, the official recorder of the Town of Huntington (whose own name was often spelled Bayley or even Baiely), recorded Thomas Wickes' land holdings and those of his son and namesake in Huntington in 1669. A perfect transcription of those records demonstrates that in both cases, the recorder, while not being completely consistent, nevertheless make the clear effort to give spellings of the name both with and without the (l), namely, "The Records of the Lands and Meddows off Thomas Wilks (Wickes) Senr in the yeare 1669," and "The Record of the Lands and Medow off Thomas Wilks (Wicks) Junior in the yeare 1669." The spelling "Wickes" is used herein to reflect the most common usage of his descendants.

Thomas¹ Wickes appears to have made the same migrations as many other early Stamford families. He was in Watertown, Massachusetts in 1635,^[7] and shortly afterward in Wethersfield, Connecticut with the first settlers there.^[8] He was part of the Wethersfield group that agreed to

settle Stamford, Connecticut, and was in Stamford with the first group in 1641.^[9] Except for his original agreement to settle there, and some very early tax information, there are no further records of Thomas Wickes in Stamford.

Many Stamford settlers soon left with the Rev. Richard Denton to settle a community at Hempstead, Long Island in 1643-1644, and Thomas Wickes was part of this group, as well. A later (undated) summary of the rights of the original proprietors of Hempstead includes a section of considerable property "Laid Out to the Propriety Right and Blank of Thomas Wilks Ye Following Parcells of Land viz:" Since all the other rights so listed were to original Hempstead proprietors, we may conclude that he was among them. A reconstructed overall listing of those proprietors that appeared in the same published volume of Hempstead Records included the name of "Thomas Hicks," which has more recently been shown to be an error for the correct name, "Thomas Wilks." In 1724, his son Thomas Wickes of Huntington made a quit claim deed to Joseph Smith of Hempstead for "all Such Right Estate title Interest and Demand Whatsoever as he the said Thomas Wickes had or ought to have of in or to all those tracts of parcels of Land and Meadow Land With all those Rights of Land Within the Township of Hempstead that did formerly belong to Thomas Wickes of Hempstead formerly Deceased by any ways or Means Whatsoever."

Thomas Wickes made one more move during his lifetime, that being to another new settlement on Long Island at Huntington. On 30 July 1656, Jonas Wood, William Rogers and Thomas "Wilkes" purchased the major portion of what would become the Huntington lands from Asharoken Montinnicok, Sachem, and the other native Americans "for and inconsideration of 2 coates, fore shertes, seven quarts of licker and aleven ounces of powther." If he were indeed the son of Katherine Rogers of Stratford-on-Avon, then he and William Rogers would have been first cousins. Thomas Wickes was a significant landholder in Huntington. The 1699 listing made by Bailey for the town records described 9 separate parcels scattered throughout the town, the largest being about 8 acres "late in the tenor or ocupacon of Noah Rogers but since estrainged to thomas wilks." Noah Rogers was a brother of Jonathan Rogers who married Thomas Wickes' eldest daughter Rebecca.

A Huntington town meeting of 7 June 1662 decided to require that any new settlers desiring to purchase lands in that town be first reviewed and approved by a committee consisting of Mr. Leverge [the minister], Will[iam] Smith, Tho[ma]s Weekes [sic], John Lum, Goodman [Thomas] Jones, James Chichester and Jonas Wood."^[17]

Thomas Wickes made his will at Huntington on 3 July 1670, witnessed by Samuel Wood and Caleb Wood. [18] His wife (not named) was to receive the use of 1/3 of his "accommodations" for her life, then to son John. He also mentioned his son Thomas, daughters Rebecca and Martha and their children, and other children Elizabeth, Mary and Sarah. Isaac Platt and Thomas Powell were named executors. Unfortunately for us today, he did not give the married names of either of the two daughters who were married and had children by 1670. Letters of Administration were granted to "widow Wickes" on 19 March 1671.

Children of Thomas Wickes and his wife, her name still completely unknown, birth order and all other details as given by Seversmith except as otherwise noted: [19]

CONKLIN

Much of the following account has been taken from the authoritative treatment by Conklin Mann in his article for *The American Genealogist* in 1944 and 1945.^[1] A considerable amount of additional biographical information on the early generations will be found in this article, and although primary source citations are not provided, it is still highly recommended.

1. John¹ Conklin was born in England, probably in Nottinghamshire and probably before 1605, and died at Huntington, Suffolk County, Long Island, New York on 23 February 1683/84. The most common present spelling of his surname is used herein, except where a specific record is being cited, in which cases the actual spelling at the time is shown. Conklin Mann studied the glassmakers of England from the standpoint of trying to determine the origin of the surname and eventually concluded, "My guess is that Conckelyne or Concklyne is an English corruption of a Continental name; that Ananias and John Conckelyne were of the second generation in England; that their forebears came from Italy, Lorraine or Normandy, perhaps by way of Antwerp." [3]

A submission to the Pedigree Resource File of the Family History Library claims that he was born about 1600 in St. Peter's Parish, Nottingham, son of William Conklyne and Ruth Hedges, but this has not been confirmed with independent investigation.^[4]

He married **ELIZABETH** (?MYLNER) ALSEABROOK on 24 January 1624/25 at St. Peter's Church, Nottingham, Nottinghamshire, England. [5] His presumed brother Ananias Conklin, with whom he was associated at several locations in America, was also married at this same church in Nottingham to Mary Launder six years later on 23 February 1630/31. [6] Elizabeth died at Southold, Long Island on or before 26 Mar 1671. [7] Close associations both in Salem, Massachusetts and on Long Island suggest that she or her husband may have been related to the Scudder family. [8] Rattray reported that John Conklin was married a second time to Mary _____, [9]

but no citation was given for this statement and no second marriage was reported by either Conklin Mann or Lawrence H. Conklin in their thorough articles.

Ananias Conklin was granted 10 acres of land by the town of Salem, Essex County, Massachusetts, on 25 June 1638, apparently for the purpose of starting a glass works, and he had established a glass making business there before the end of that year. The following year, 1639, Obadiah Holmes and Laurence Southwick joined Ananias in glassmaking. On 14 September 1640 the town received John Conklin as an inhabitant and granted him 5 ½ acres near the "glass house." The proximity of ages of John and Ananias (as indicated by their marriage times) and their close relationship in Salem and later on Long Island have convinced researchers that they were brothers, although no specific statement of that relationship seems to have survived (at least in the American records). In spite of their apparently valiant efforts, the glass business didn't succeed. On 27 February 1642/43 "Ananias Conklin and other poor people" were loaned 8 pounds by the Massachusetts Bay Colony, upon the town of Salem's promise to repay at the next corn harvest. Then finally, on 1 October 1645 John and Ananias Conklin submitted a petition to the general court asking to be relieved of their obligations and allowed to seek "a better accommodation of themselves" elsewhere, and the relief was granted. [11]

Based on his extensive study of the career of these brothers, Conklin Mann has estimated that they left Salem in April 1650, along with Thomas Scudder and possibly others also bound for Long Island. John Conklin was certainly a landholder in Southold before January 1653, when he was mentioned as an adjoining landholder to Robert Ackerly. [12]

Mann cited several documents that recorded charitable acts by John Conklin and concluded that "John Conklin was a generous, kindly man. He became an important but not a leading man in both Southold and Huntington. He remained Goodman Conckelyne through life and such public services as are linked with his name lead to the conclusion that men who knew him had the greatest confidence in his sympathetic understanding and integrity." [13] Goodman "Conclin" and John "Conclin" Junr., both residents of Southold, were made freemen of the Connecticut Colony on 9 October 1662, during Connecticut's brief jurisdiction over that Long Island town. [14]

On 26 March 1671, John Conklin sold his homelot and lands in Hashamomuck (part of Southold) to his son Jacob, and although he continued to hold some parcels of land after this time, none of them appear to be residences. Mann's conclusion was that from this time until his death, John Conklin Sr. spent is time in both Southold and in Huntington, living with one or another of his children and their families. [15] Huntington recognized his abilities by appointing him to important committees in 1673 and 1676. grandchildren, and the Court approved the arrangement when John Conklin and Thomas Brush Jr. presented the inventory of Thomas Brush Sr. on 1 June 1675. [17]

The will of John Conklin of Huntington was signed by mark and not dated, but was presented at the Court at a session of 18, 19 and 20 March 1683/84, at which time the notation was added that the testator had "deceased February ve 23, 1683/84," [18] He mentioned my son John, my son Timothy, my son Jacob, he paying to Mr. Silvester 4 pounds and 10 shillings, Mr. Walter Noaks, my grand child Rebecca Hubert, Mr. Eliphalet Jones [the minister of Huntington]. and my daughter Elizabeth Wood, sole executrix. The will was witnessed by John Corey, Samuel Titus and Epenetus Platt. No further probate papers appear to have been filed for this estate, and since only personal property is mentioned in the will, it appears that John Conklin Sr. had been successful in portioning out all of his real estate to his children and grandchildren prior to his death.

Chatfield Family Lore: Fact or Fiction?

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Joel⁵ Chatfield (*Elnathan*⁴, *Ebenezer*³, *John*², *George*¹) was born in Milford, Connecticut near the Derby, Connecticut, later Seymour, town line 21 February 1757. Joel's great grandfather, John Chatfield, had removed from Killingworth, Connecticut, to Derby receiving a land grant 10 October 1684. Joel was baptized at St. James Episcopal Church in Derby 1 May 1757. He was buried in the Seymour Trinity Church cemetery on 15 June 1836. Joel built a house in Seymour on the south bank of Bladens Brook. He owned a grist mill located near the house. His imported French burr stones ground wheat, and he supplied Yale College with wheat flour.

Joel's great-great-grandson, John F. Chatfield, Jr., inherited a cutlass, which came from the Seymour Chatfield family. Family lore had indicated that this cutlass had belonged to Joel Chatfield, and that Joel carried it during his service in the War of 1812. A close examination of the cutlass led me to research its markings. Facts were developed, which appear to establish the date the cutlass was manufactured as much later than 1812; probably after 1852. And research into Joel's service record suggests that it was not Joel Chatfield of Derby who served in the War of 1812.

The cutlass is marked "Tiffany & Co. of New York." Research established that Tiffany's business was founded in 1837, therefore, the cutlass could not have been in existence at the time of the War of 1812. In addition, Tiffany, initially Tiffany & Young, was renamed Tiffany & Co. in 1853. This is the company name that is found on the cutlass. Tiffany was under contract to the Naval War department during the Civil War to make naval swords, cavalry sabers, and cutlasses. The cutlass also is marked with the initials "P. D. L." The initials stand for Peter D. Luneschloss, whose company was in the arms business in Solingen, Germany from 1810. Tiffany imported blades from Luneschloss to make their swords.

Biographical information concerning Joel Chatfield can be found in William C. Sharpe's "The Chatfield Family." Sharpe writes in 1896, "Joel Chatfield served in the War of 1812, under Col. Sill, in the latter part of 1813." Sharpe does not note this service in his books written about Seymour in 1869 and 1902, both of which referenced the Chatfield family. Xiii

The War of 1812 service records for Connecticut list only one Joel Chatfield. This Joel Chatfield served in the Connecticut Militia, 7th Regiment, from 3 November 1813 to 1 December 1813, as a private under Commander Benjamin Dowd. xiv Dowd, in turn, was under the command of Colonel Elisha Sill. Both Sill and Dowd were from Saybrook, Middlesex County, Connecticut. Also listed in Dowd's regiment was a Josiah Chatfield. xv No home was listed for either Joel or Josiah. A Josiah Chatfield family was located in Killingworth, Connecticut, near Saybook. This Josiah had a son Joel born 27 January 1788 and a son Josiah born 4 March 1790. xvi Both these sons would have been the right

age to serve in 1813 and are the logical candidates for service with Dowd. It is unlikely that the Seymour Joel would have enlisted at age 56. In addition, if Joel had enlisted, it would probably been in a New Haven County militia. It is possible that Sharpe saw the name Joel Chatfield listed in the War of 1812 records and assumed it was the Seymour Joel, or that Sharpe relied on erroneous information provided by the family. Another scenario is that the family, upon reading Sharpe's account and knowing the cutlass had belonged to Joel, connected the cutlass in their possession to Joel's supposed service.

On balance, based on the above research and until proven otherwise, the family lore is not accurate. The Seymour Joel Chatfield's service in the War of 1812 with said cutlass appears to be fiction and not fact.

The Margaret Wixted Collection at Mark Twain Library, Redding, CT

Harlan R. Jessup

Both the August issue and this current issue of Connecticut Ancestry contain transcriptions of Redding records which have been of limited access to researchers. In September members of the Society met at the town's Mark Twain Library to present a copy of the August issue to the first selectman of Redding and to the library director. Members then had an opportunity for research using the library's collection of published works and especially their Margaret Wixted Collection.

In addition to this special collection the library has a significant number of local histories of Connecticut and of Redding and surrounding towns. With these, of interest to genealogists for background information, there are a few with more specific genealogical information, including transcriptions of the Barbour Collection for Redding, the published early Records of the State of Connecticut, and Jacobus's Families of Old Fairfield.

Margaret McCollam Wixted served as Town Historian of Redding from 1982 to 2003. After her death in 2005 her files on more than 160 Redding families, 55 historic houses, and many subjects of historical interest were given to the library. For the convenience of our readers we here list the surnames from the family files:
