

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The One-Page Challenge

As the president of Connecticut Ancestry Society, I have appealed to members and to readers of our journal, *Connecticut Ancestry*, to submit articles for publication. I have said that every ancestor's story is important in the compiled historical record of Fairfield County. I have also said that the best way to ensure that your research will be preserved is to publish it.

Now I am issuing **THE ONE-PAGE CHALLENGE**. I challenge you, members and readers alike, to pick one ancestor, male or female, young or old, and to write a one-page article about that ancestor. The only requirement is that you write about someone who lived in our focus area-Fairfield County or nearby New York—and that the story you write has a connection to that area.

I have thrown down the gauntlet by writing two myself. First, I chose an African-American and son of former slaves, born in South Carolina in 1869, who became a doctor and practiced medicine in Bridgeport for most of the first half of the 20th century. Second, I wrote a piece exemplifying the importance of research our ancestors' siblings.

There is no requirement to keep to a single page, but one page will suffice. Write what you know, write what you can document, write from your heart. Isn't there someone in your lineage that we should all know about, someone with an interesting episode in her life? Or someone with a dull but typical life that will teach us something about history?

We would like you to include genealogical details about your subject. Where and when was he born? Whom did she marry? What was the cause of death and where did it occur? Which censuses show the presence of this person in Fairfield County? Land records? City directories? Tombstone inscriptions?

Documentation is important, but don't worry about precise formatting of footnotes. Our editor Harlan Jessup will help to get those details straightened out. What we need from you is the story and where you got the details. Family Bible? (Where is it now?) US census? (what year and town?) Vital records? (What town?, also volume and page if possible)

Here are some ideas:

- We are in the sesquicentennial period for the Civil War. Do you know of anyone who served?
- The bicentennial of the War of 1812 begins next year. Were your family members affected by this conflict?
- Did an ancestor go to the Gold Rush?
- Did an ancestor immigrate here in the 20th century?
- Did an ancestor settle here in the 17th century?

Sharpen your pencils!! One page is not very long!!

The Family of Reuben Rockwell, Born ca 1778 at Ridgefield, Connecticut Kenneth W. Rockwell

Soon after the founding, in 1708, of Ridgefield, Connecticut, its nascent government began to record vital records. The actual reporting was largely the responsibility of the families themselves, and the early settlers sometimes entered the birth dates of children that had been born in other towns. The quality of recordkeeping varied over time, however, and by the time of the Revolutionary War, numerous important events went unrecorded. A family might have several children's births registered, but no record of either their early deaths or their marriages might be found in the official records. As I have been demonstrating in this series, the land records sometimes prove that a marriage did occur and that subsequent children were born of that union. In this article, I will highlight one of these children of Ridgefield.

The birth of Reuben Rockwell, the son of Ebenezer and Abigail Rockwell, was recorded in the vital records; the date was 11 October, but damage to the original leaves has obscured the year. However, it may have been in 1778, as he is likely the child of this name who was baptized at the Ridgebury Congregational Church on 3 January 1779. It was common to baptize infants during their first year of life. Nearly a century later, an informant of David Williams Patterson, the genealogist who researched the Whitney family for Stephen Whitney Phoenix, stated that Reuben married a Stebbins and settled in western New York. This is all that Boughton reported in his Rockwell-Keeler genealogy—which indicates that he, like Patterson, did not find the Ridgefield land record that begins a paper trail ultimately leading to the "western New York" place of settlement: Enfield, in Tompkins County.

On 13 April 1804, Reuben and Urania Rockwell of Ridgefield, for \$125, quit-claimed to Benjamin Barberry all right, title, etc. that they might have in a piece of land "that our honored grandfather Benjamin Stebbins of Ridgefield gave to our mother Elizabeth by deed of gift to her... and also to one certain tract of land which our said mother by the name of Elizabeth Barberry obtained of Nathaniel Keeler of North Salem..." This deed, in conjunction with other records, clears up the identity of Reuben Rockwell's wife: she was not a Stebbins at birth; rather, her mother was. Other vital dates that apply here are the birth of Elizabeth Stebbins, daughter of Benjamin and Elizabeth, on 10 August 1746;⁴ her marriage to Josiah Keeler (unrecorded); the birth of their daughter Urania on 7 April 1772;⁵ Josiah Keeler's death prior 17 February 1786, when the Danbury Probate Court granted administration of the estate to widow Elizabeth and

Benjamin Smith;⁶ Elizabeth's remarriage to Benjamin Barberry on 3 September 1786;⁷ and the death of Elizabeth (Stebbins) (Keeler) Barberry on 28 October 1799.⁸ After her death, her children, as heirs-at-law, quitclaimed to her widower.

The last two land records at Ridgefield concerning this Reuben Rockwell identify him as being "of Ridgefield" on 17 October 1807, but "late of Ridgefield, now of North Salem" on 6 April 1808. This indicates the approximate time of his family's first migration, but not their ultimate destination. A pair of mortgage records from Westchester County, New York, provides the next step along Reuben's paper trail. On 19 April 1808, Reuben Smith of North Salem mortgaged a two-acre farm to Reuben Rockwell, also of North Salem. Smith apparently defaulted on the mortgage, as Reuben Rockwell on 7 September 1812 authorized John Titus, Jr., to sell the 2-acre farm at North Salem. Now, however, he was of "Galloway," in Saratoga County, New York.

The 1810 U.S. Census shows the family of Reuben Rockwell at Galway, consisting of 1 male 26–44, 1 female 26–44, 3 males under 10, and 1 female under 10. Another resident of Galway that year was Josiah Keeler, Urania's brother. The Rockwells are gone by 1820, but I believe this family is the one recorded in Tompkins County, headed by Reuben Rockwell; the household then had 1 male 45 or older, 1 female 26–44, 1 male 16–18, 2 males 10–15, and 1 female 10–16. The children match quite well for the family in Galway, though Reuben is probably in the wrong age category. The piece of evidence that substantiates this identification is a headstone in Enfield's Rolfe Cemetery that reads, "In memory of Urania, wife of Reuben Rockwell, died July 28, 1829, aged 56 yrs."

In the census of 1830, the household has one male in his 50s (Reuben), 1 male in his 20s, and 1 female 15–19. ¹⁵ Reuben apparently married again, for in deeds with Reuben of Enfield as a

grantor in 1833 through 1840, his wife is called Mary. In 1840, he was in his 60s, Mary was in her 50s, and another female 10–14 is in the household—probably a daughter of Mary's from a previous marriage. No record of Mary's death has been found, but it occurred before 1850, when the census shows Reuben, at the age of 73, in the household of son Ebenezer (mistakenly called "Eleazer"). In 1860, Reuben Rockwell was living in the household of Ephraim Rolfe, Jr., whose wife Elizabeth (age 54) was likely Reuben's daughter. (Reuben's birth state is given as "R.I." [Rhode Island], but investigation in that state's records has not shown any evidence for a Rockwell family in the 18th century.) Neither probate records nor a headstone have been found for him, so the date of his death is unknown, though it probably came before 1870, as he does not appear in the 1870 census.

Genealogical summary:

- Reuben Rockwell, born 11 Oct. 1778, son of Ebenezer and Abigail (Worden) (Smith)
 Rockwell; married (1) before 1804, Urania Keeler, who was born ca 1773, daughter of
 Josiah and Elizabeth (Stebbins) Keeler. She died in Enfield, Tompkins Co., N.Y., on 28
 July 1829. He married (2) before 1833, Mary ______, born say 1775, died before 1850.
 Births of children to Reuben and Urania were not recorded at Ridgefield or elsewhere,
 but the following reconstruction is possible from Tompkins County records:
 - a. Hiram Rockwell, b. ca August 1801, according to his headstone. (2.)
 - b. Ebenezer Rockwell, b. born 13 June 1804, according to his headstone. (3.)
 - c. Elizabeth Rockwell, born ca August 1806, if my assumption about her marriage is correct. (4.)
 - d. A third son, indicated by the census as having been born by 1810, and in his 20s by 1830. Given the birth dates of the other children, he was probably born ca 1808. He has not yet been identified with certainty, but one candidate is William Rockwell, found in Newfield, Tompkins County, New York, in 1840. He was in his 30s, and the household included a female in her 20s, 2 males 5–9, and 1 male under 5. ¹⁹ I did not find him in the county in 1850.
- 2. **Hiram Rockwell**. He is buried in Rolfe Cemetery, with headstone saying he died 24 February 1889, "age 87 yrs, 6 mo.," thus born ca August 1801. Wife Mary died 26 February 1872, "age 69 yrs." Mary was the daughter of Jonathan **Rolfe** of Enfield, as the latter's will, dated 17 June 1846 and probated 12 September 1851, names his daughter Mary Rockwell. In 1880, Hiram was a 78-year-old widower living in Enfield with

daughter Susan, 54, and her husband William Drake.²² On 9 April 1878, Hiram, the Drakes, and Charles Rockwell sold a 36-acre parcel in Enfield, which suggests that Susan and Charles were then the only surviving children of Hiram and Mary.²³ Known children:²⁴

- a. Charles Rockwell, b. ca 1824.
- b. Susan Rockwell, b. ca 1826, m. William Drake.
- c. Jonathan Rockwell, b. ca 1834, d. bef 1878.
- 3. **Ebenezer Rockwell**. He was a neighbor of Reuben's in Enfield, New York, in the 1830 and 1840 census. In the 1830 census his household includes 1 male in his 20s, 1 female in her 20s, and 1 male under 5. In 1840, it had 1 male in his 30s, 1 female in her 30s, 1 male in his 20s, 1 female 10–14, 1 male 5–9, 1 female 5–9, and 1 male under 5. (Possibly the lone child of 1830 should have been marked female, but I suspect that it was correct and the 1840 census should have called the oldest child male.) The land records show no purchases but several sales of land: one in 1840 and several in 1844. One of these was a quit-claim to about 8 acres, to Reuben Rockwell. This deed refers to Ebenezer's wife as Hannah, and in one instance she signed her name with the middle initial "P." Therefore, I am confident that Ebenezer is the one called "Eleazer Rockwell" in the 1850 census, as his wife was **Hannah P.** Rockwell, then 41. His occupation was "shoemaker." Children were "Umphry D.," age 18, and "Philancy," a 12-year-old daughter.

Ebenezer died in Enfield, for his grave is at the Presbyterian Cemetery at Enfield Center, with his headstone giving his vital dates: "Eben Rockwell, b. June 13, 1804, d. May 25, 1857." Next to him is "Humphrey, son of Eben & Hannah, d. Feb. 10, 1852, ae 20 yr." ²⁹

Hannah continued to live in Enfield for several years. She is probably the "Anna Rockwell" in the Charles Fountain household in Ovid, Seneca County, New York in the 1870 census. His wife was "Philansi," likely the daughter in the 1850 household. On 1

May 1873, "Hannah P. Rockwell of Enfield" purchased an acre of land in Ovid from John J. and Abigail Covert for \$300.³¹ On 1 April 1876, "Hannah Rockwell of Ovid" sold the same parcel to John L. Bloomer for \$2,000.³² Assuming the rate of inflation was not as steep as these deeds make it appear, perhaps the Coverts gave Hannah a bargain on account of a close relationship. I have not found record of Hannah's death. One further child of Ebenezer and Hannah was likely Reuben D. Rockwell, who was also buried in the Rolfe Cemetery. He died on 5 Nov 1875, aged 47 years, 7 months, 10 days.³³ His connection to the others is indicated by the fact that Charles Fountain named Reuben as an executor of his will, signed on 15 Oct 1870 and probated on 20 Feb 1871.³⁴

Probable children of Ebenezer and Hannah:

- a. Reuben D. Rockwell, b. 26 Mar 1828, d. 5 Nov 1875, æ 47y, 7m, 10d.
- b. Humphrey D. Rockwell, b. ca 1832, d. 10 Feb 1852, æ 20 yrs.
- c. Philancy Rockwell, b. ca 1838, m. Charles Fountain.
- 4. **Elizabeth Rockwell**, born ca August 1806 in N.Y., who married **Ephraim Rolfe**, **Jr.** In the 1860 census, Reuben was in their household. Her headstone in Rolfe Cemetery gives her date of death as 10 April 1875, aged 68 yrs, 8 mo., days uncertain (inscription damaged at time of transcription). Ephraim Rolfe died on 11 Feb. 1880, aged 76 years. Their children, known from nearby headstones and the 1860 census, included:
 - a. Urania Rolfe, b. ca 1827. She married a Manning and was apparently widowed by 1860 when she and son Eugene were in the Ephraim Rolfe household.
 - b. Margareta Rolfe, b. ca 1829, died 23 Oct. 1830.
 - c. Jonathan Rolfe, b. ca 1835, as he was 25 in 1860.
 - d. Reuben Rolfe, d. 25 March 1841, aged 3 years 4 months.
 - e. Minor T. Rolfe, b. ca 1839, as he was 21 in 1860.
 - f. Cloa (Chloe?) M. Rolfe, b. ca 1842, as she was 18 in 1860.
 - g. Henry C. Rolfe, b. ca 1844, as he was 16 in 1860.
 - h. Owen L. Rolfe, b. ca 1852, as he was 8 in 1860.

Also near their graves were Nancy and Prudence Rolfe, perhaps also daughters, although damage to these stones obscures any other information.

The Family of Benjamin Wilson of Ridgefield, Connecticut

Benjamin Wilson, of all the original Proprietors of Ridgefield, is the one whose ancestry has not been proven and traced. Some online trees provide two possible birth records, neither of which can be proven to apply to the Ridgefield settler. One of these places his birth in Roxbury, Massachusetts, in 1678. While the original record exists, there is no evidence that this person relocated to Connecticut. The other proposed birth is recorded at Milford, Connecticut, where a Benjamin Wilson, son of Thomas Wilson, was born on 8 July 1673. This solution is attractive in that several Ridgefield settlers had roots in Milford; also, Benjamin named a son Thomas. A search of Milford's land records shows no Wilsons buying or selling land there during this period. Nor does the statewide probate index show any probate records for this Thomas. Land records appear in the deeds of the Town of Fairfield for several Wilsons, including a Thomas. If this was the man whose unidentified wife gave birth in Milford, the son might also be the Benjamin Wilson who married Martha Perry on 16 October 1694 at the Fairfield Congregational Church. Unless this Martha soon died, it is unlikely that her husband was the one who was soon having children in Norwalk, supposedly by a different wife.

The first confirmed record we have of our Benjamin Wilson is the birth of a daughter, Sarah, on 24 September 1698, soon to be followed by Nathan (30 Sep 1701) and Thomas (9 Oct 1703). The wife's name is not given, and it is possible that the mother of Sarah was Martha, but more likely she was **Jane Olmstead** (Olmsted), who is known to be Benjamin's wife by 1700. The first land record involving Benjamin is dated 12 February 1700, in which John Olmsted of Norwalk, "in consideration of the love good will and respects that I have and bare to my sonn in law, Benjamin Willson, and Jane his wife my Daughter," his whole share in the "Hungry Spring" division, which "is where the habitation of sayd Willson now is, and is in Quantity one acre and half of land..." John Olmsted died at Norwalk in 1704, and the Norwalk deeds record Benjamin Wilson's receipt of land from the distributors of "his father" John Olmsted's estate on 28 December 1708.

Benjamin Wilson, then of Norwalk, was one of 24 men who purchased the tract of land that became Ridgefield from local Indians in 1708. These first Proprietors drew lots for homesteads on 25 November 1708, and Wilson drew lot number 16, located northwest of the site of the first meeting house/church (on the site of the present Methodist Church in central

Ridgefield).⁷ Settlement soon followed, and the Wilson family moved there and continued to grow. Benjamin and Jane Wilson sold their Norwalk home lot on 27 June 1709,⁸ an act that might indicate their imminent move to Ridgefield. Another sale of land on 28 December 1709 still called Benjamin "of Norwalk," but by 2 January 1710/11, Benjamin was of Ridgefield. Benjamin continued to receive grants of common land in Norwalk for some years. On 20 January 1710/11, Benjamin and Jane Wilson and Samuel and Rebeckah Saint John, all of Ridgefield, sold their right and interest in the home lot of John Olmsted.¹⁰

Land records continue to attest to Benjamin Wilson's presence in Ridgefield for many years. His death and that of his wife were not recorded, though they are assumed to have been buried in the old burying ground at the south end of the village. The area is now entirely overgrown, reclaimed by nature, but a modern monument names Wilsons together with other early settlers. No probate records for them are to be found, either in the Fairfield or the Danbury probate district, nor any land records that show a distribution to heirs of land in the possession of Benjamin Wilson at the time of his death. This may be because he distributed some (perhaps all) of his land as gifts to his heirs before his death. Examples of these gifts are found in the following deeds:

- 1. Benjamin Wilson, on 28 Nov. 1729, "in consideration of that love and fatherly affection I have unto my son Nathan Willson," conveyed to Nathan a parcel about 15 acres as well as a third of his "Six acre division" and one third of "my whole right of commons or undivided lands in the Township of Ridgefield.¹¹
- 2. On 7 February 1737/38, Wilson conveyed to son Thomas Wilson as a gift two allotments of land in the "New Patent" (the future Ridgebury area) along with 16 acres he had bought from his son Nathan.¹²
- 3. Benjamin Wilson on 10 March 1738, "in consideration of that fatherly love and affection I have for & do bear unto my son in law Benjamin Rockwell" gave him 2 acres under the West Mountain.¹³
- 4. On 6 December 1739, Benjamin gave to son Benjamin the home lot of 7½ acres that he had bought from Joseph Osborn, and all of his land in the Ten-acre Division, and a third

part of all his right within the Township.14

- 5. On 25 January 1741/42, Benjamin gave to son Nathan his 18-acre home lot and house, an acre of boggy meadow under Copp's Mountain, and 15 acres at Chestnut Ridge. 15
- 6. The divisions of land made by the proprietors included the Fourth 20-acre Division in 1741 and the Fifth 20-acre Division in 1744, both conveying land to Benjamin Wilson; but on 30 December 1745, the Sixth 20-acre Division "laid out to the right originally Benj. Willson's" 27 acres, being the 21st lot, lying well of the Cedar Mountains Road. This wording might suggest that Benjamin had died ca. 1745, between these divisions. However, with the Seventh 20-acre Division on 23 November 1748, the Proprietors granted Lot 28 "to Benjamin Willson & to his heirs and assigns forever."

Further deeds involving grants of common land shed further light on the family of Benjamin Wilson:

- 7. On 23 February 1750/51, the Proprietors laid out "on account of the Fifteen acre Division" separate lots to Thomas Wilson and to Nathan Wilson. No allotment was laid out to Benjamin Wilson, son of the founder, but this is accounted for in a deed dated 17 April 1750 (possibly a clerical error that should have said "1751") in which he sold to Samuel Bennett "all my right title & interest in the last granted Fifteen acre Division, which is one third part of a whole right…" The "whole right" to which he referred was that of his father, Benjamin Wilson, whom these deeds clearly indicate had died by then. Interestingly, Benjamin the son was still styled "Junr." in two subsequent deeds dated 26 April and 20 May 1751. Again, this may have been the wording of the registrar, Stephen Smith. In the next round of grants, termed the Sixteen-acre Division, the Proprietors on 26 June 1753 granted land to the three brothers, including "Benjamin Wilson, Junr., 21 demonstrating that not every use of term is proof that the "senior" man of the same name was still living.
- 8. On 4 July 1761, the Registrar recorded a grant by the Proprietors "laid out to the right originally Benjamin Wilson's Decd. on account of the 4th ten acre grant, 100 rods of land lying of the south side of the land of the heirs of Jabesh Morehouse decd. ... bounded

northerly by the land of said Morehouse's heirs, southerly and easterly by highway, coming to a point at the west end; also 14 rods of land lying at the norwest part of the land belonging to said Morehouse's heirs, bounded east & north by the land of said heirs, west & south by highway or common land..."22 Also, the Proprietors laid out two other small parcels to Caleb Lobdell "by virtue of a deed of sale obtained of Nathan Wilson of the 4th ten acre grant."23 A similar grant went to widow Mary Morehouse "by virtue of a Deed of sale obtained of Nathan Wilson two acres and 44 pole upon the 4th ten acre division.²⁴ Two more grants "laid out upon account of the 4th ten acre division & on the right that originally belonged to Benjamin Wilson Dec'd" were 1 acre and 1 rood of land north of Samuel Bennett's house and 4 acres 1 rood south of Gershom Bennett's house, both recorded on 4 November 1761.²⁵ By this time two Benjamin Wilsons, father and son, had died, but one assumes these deeds referred to the father. After this there appear several deeds by heirs conveying their share in these small parcels, as mentioned below. Interestingly, they include not only the sons such as Nathan (mentioned above) but some of the daughters—indicating that they were still considered heirs to their father, even though previous grants had only mentioned land laid out to the three sons.

Children of Benjamin Wilson, probably all by wife Jane (Olmsted):

- Sarah Wilson, born Norwalk, 24 September 1698. A single record suggests that she married, in her 30s, Samuel Gates Sr., who had settled in Ridgefield in 1729 and had lost his first wife. Samuel and Sarah had four children, and then after several years moved to Dutchess County, New York. One land record has Samuel Gates of the Oblong in Dutchess County, selling a parcel of land in Ridgefield; then on 24 April 1765, Samuel Gates and Sarah his wife sold their share in a grant of land from Ridgefield's "fourth 10-acre division," land that had been allotted to Benjamin Wilson. Other children of Benjamin made similar deeds around this time. Children of Samuel and Sarah (Wilson) Gates:

- Thomas Wilson, born Norwalk, 9 October 1703. (3)
- Rebecca, born Norwalk, ca. 1706 at. She married, on 15 April 1731, Benjamin Rockwell, son of Jonathan and Abigail (Canfield) Rockwell of Ridgefield. They lived in Ridgefield until after 1745, then moved a short distance west, to Salem, New York. On 1 May 1761, they sold to Ezekiel Wilson their interest in the fourth 10-acre division. The children of Benjamin and Rebecca (Wilson) Rockwell:
 - o Benjamin Rockwell, b. Ridgefield, 13 August 1733.
 - o Jane Rockwell, b. Ridgefield, 13 September 1735.
 - o Nathan Rockwell, b. Ridgefield, 22 November 1737.
 - o Stephen Rockwell, b. Ridgefield, 14 January 1739/40.
 - o Job Rockwell, b. possibly at Salem, NY, 21 June 1746.
 - o Rebecca Rockwell, b. probably at Salem, 10 January 1749.
- Benjamin Wilson, born prob. at Norwalk, ca 1708. (4)
- Mary Wilson, born Ridgefield, 3 July 1712, according to Jacobus, though not recorded in the vital records.³⁰ Some online trees claim that she is the Mary (no surname given) who married Jabez Morehouse on 9 Nov. 1738. Two land records might serve as evidence for this: On 24 April 1761, Nathan Wilson sold to Mary Morehouse an acre to be taken up from the 4th ten-acre division; and on 4 November 1761, the Proprietors laid out "to widow Mary Morehouse by virtue of a deed of sale obtained of Nathan Wilson, 2 acres 44 pole of land upon the 4th 10-acre division granted to Benjamin Wilson dec'd. ..."³¹ If this is Mary Wilson, however, why did she not obtain a share of that division herself as other Wilson daughters did?
- Jane Wilson, born Ridgefield, 28 December 1714, according to Jacobus, though not recorded there. She married on 26 February 1735/6, Joseph Keeler.³² On 8 May 1761, Joseph and Jane Keeler, along with Thomas Wilson, "for the consideration of that love & respect that we have & do bear unto our sister Rebeckah Rockwell of Salem" gave her all their right and interest in the Fourth 10-acre division ... granted by the Proprietors ... unto our father Benjamin Wilson of said Ridgefield dec'd."³³ Their children, born in

Vital Records of 1847-1848, School District Returns from Brookfield, Easton, and New Canaan, CT

As noted in the May 2011 issue of this journal, the vitals records returns by school district for the years 1847 to 1852 appear to be lost for these three towns plus Ridgefield and Sherman (which will be published in a later issue). But for the first year of these returns, August 1847 to August 1848, copies were submitted to the state and are now found in the State Archives, Record Group 6. These transcriptions omit the designation of the school district which was reported in the original returns, now lost.

Monroe's vital records as reported by school district committeemen from August 1847 until August 1851, are bound in a volume labeled Births, Marriages, Deaths, 1847-1864. Some districts appear to be missing for some of these years. Using the same form and bound in the same volume, though not included here, are records from October 1852 to December 1864. This latter group omits the designation of school district. There is no index for this volume, but the latter group is in chronological order for the town as a whole. It is more easily searchable and is not included in this transcription. No vital records for Monroe are found from August 1851 to October 1852.

Three Cheers for the One-Page Challenge

The invitation to all Connecticut Ancestry Society members to participate in a one-page genealogy and family history writing challenge is an outstanding opportunity for all of us. Thanks to our president and other members of the governing board for inventing it! I would like to offer three cheers and thoughts about how it should help all members to take part.

Cheer #1 Writing should not be a problem -- it solves problems instead. In her book, Producing a Quality Family History, Pat Hatcher pointed out that, "It is often the writing process that triggers our analytical skills. Questions almost invariably come to mind as we write up research we did years ago. In fact, it is rare if questions do not come to mind as we write up research we did merely hours ago! Writing (and the associated mental activity) is the most valuable research tool you can use." [1] (emphasis added) Also, remember that the present Genealogical Proof Standard includes a requirement for a "soundly reasoned, coherently written conclusion." [2] (emphasis again added) Our work is not really finished until it has been put into sentences and paragraphs. This challenge gives us all a great way to get started.

Cheer #2 The challenge recognizes that we all need to be efficient as well as accurate in our writing. In his book, *On Writing Well*, William Zinsser said, "If you give me an article that runs to eight pages and I tell you to cut it to four, you'll howl and say it can't be done. Then you will go home and do it…" (he was speaking to professional writers here) "…and it will be infinitely better. After that comes the hard part: cutting it to three." One national genealogical journal has a feature series that has a goal for authors of 2 pages, with a maximum length of 2 ½ pages (including all citations!). We should all be able to find countless little chapters of our genealogy that can fit into this one-page format. Not only that, we will be able to (1) get *something* completed, and (2) share our interesting and helpful results with others who have the same interests. What could be better for our progress?

<u>Cheer #3</u> My third point has to do with citations and footnotes. Here's an excellent opportunity to get into that issue at last, and on very a manageable scale. Maybe your one-pager will have only one or two or a few footnotes, but they will serve a very useful purpose -- giving your readers leverage to go further into the subject matter on their own if they want. Reference notes are supposed to assist the reader (not to terrorize the writer), so plan to make those reference notes an integral part of your story.

With these three cheers for the project, I urge all Connecticut Ancestry Society members to take up this challenge, at least once, and maybe on a regular basis thereafter! Please get started now, and Happy Writing.

Deodate Davenport (1730-1808) of Stamford and New Canaan

My mother, Eleanor Frances (Davenport) Hart (1907-2007), decided in 1988 that she wanted to join the DAR, and so we put together an application based upon the patriotic service of her ancestor Deodate Davenport. It was approved, establishing Deodate as a DAR patriot ancestor, and she became NSDAR member #718405, joining the Drum Hill Chapter in Wilton. I don't have a list of favorite ancestors, but if I did, Deodate would certainly be included.

DEODATE⁵ **DAVENPORT** (*John*⁴, *Rev. John*³, *John*², *Rev. John*¹) was born in Stamford 5 January 1729/30,^[2] and died there 10 March 1808.^[3] He married (1) at Stamford 16 June 1757 **Lydia** (**Reed**) **Raymond**,^[4] born in Norwalk 15 February 1734 [1734/35?],^[5] died in New Canaan 19 March 1773,^[6] daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth (Kellogg) Reed and widow of John Raymond,^[7] married (2) at Stamford 28 September 1774 **ELIZABETH** (**DAUCHY**) **JONES**,^[8] born ca. 1740, died 2 May 1818 "age 78 yrs,",^[9] daughter of Vivas and (prob.) Rachel (Wallace) Dauchy of Ridgefield, and widow of James Jones.^[10] His ancestors and his 12 children are well documented elsewhere,^[11] and will not be covered here in any further detail.

Because of his age, he did not serve in uniform during the Revolutionary War, but he was consistently listed among Stamford's political leaders in support of Independence. His younger brother, Lt. Hezekiah Davenport, was killed at the Battle of Ridgefield on 27 April 1777, and Hezekiah's son William applied for bounty land in 1838. Deodate's son Deodate Jr. was only 11 years old in 1777, but provided clear testimony supporting that 1838 application, saying that he had lived with Hezekiah for a short time before his death, "and had the small pox at Hezekiah's house, which was also made an hospital for the soldiers." He also reported that his father personally went to Ridgefield to recover Hezekiah's clothes after the battle. [13]

Deodate (Sr.) operated a fulling mill on the Stamford Mill River, near the crossing of Cascade Road. He was still alive when New Canaan was established as a town in 1801, with its formal boundaries described by the Connecticut General Assembly. His mill site became one of the turning points of those boundaries, and therefore the name of Deodate Davenport is honored today as the only personal name that appears in that official boundary description. [14]

Stories and Keepsakes of the Reuben Wood Family

Great grandfather Reuben Wood, of all my recent ancestors, left more mementos of his employment and hobbies than any of my other recent ancestors. He was a direct descendant of Samuel Wood, MD, who arrived in Norwalk, Fairfield County, Connecticut, from Manchester, England and settled in Danbury, CT. By 1822 when Reuben was born, his branch of the family had moved to Greenbush, Rensselaer County, NY. But it was just over the state line in Pittsfield, Berkshire County, MA where Reuben and Sylvia Elizabeth Jordan were married in 1848. And it was in Syracuse, New York where Reuben established his catering and pastry shop on the sidewalk level below their second floor apartment. Some of our keepsakes are the platters and plates with "Wood" in large green and gold lettering on the raised edges. These were clearly used when he catered a banquet or luncheon. The ground floor shop sold candies and pastry as well as being the headquarters for the catering business.

Reuben had a hobby, in which he had considerable skill, and which resulted in his receiving national and international recognition. That hobby was flycasting for fish. Our other mementos are two gold medals. One was presented to Reuben in April 1883 by his Syracuse friends and the other was awarded to Reuben at the International Anglers' Tournament held in Great Britain on 11 June 1883 less than a year before his death on 16 February 1884. There is also a large carved rock at the edge of Cranberry Lake, one of the Adirondac lakes, commemorating his American competition wins.

Reuben, like many outdoors people, was bothered by mosquitoes, gnats and other biting insects. So he tested a number of chemicals with strong odors which could be mixed with a salve that could be rubbed on the skin. When he found a satisfactory mix, he sold it in small tins as "Wood's Improved Lollacapop".

Reuben, his family of several generations, and unmarried sister, Olive Wood, traveled eastward from Syracuse by train across New York State each summer so that Reuben could fly cast for fish at Lake George. Olive could and did also paint Lake scenes in oils, and all of the family could avoid the summer heat in Syracuse. We have several of Olive Wood's oil paintings of Lake George including one with a steam paddle wheel boat in the distance. The detail in her paintings reminds me of small pieces of the huge Hudson River area paintings usually associated with the Hudson River school.

Are all the stories true? Reuben's youngest daughter, Mabel, of Pittsfield, MA, and one of her brothers in Syracuse researched the Wood family line. The rest of the stories are based on "family tradition" and the mementos we have. So keepsakes and mementos have an important place in any family history.

Bridget (Donahue) Lynch and Ellen (Donahue) Egan of Bridgeport, Conn: Parents Identified through Sibling Research

Some family historians say they are not interested in researching their ancestors' brothers and sisters. But siblings may have left a more complete set of records. Here is a case in point.

Family stories reported that Mary Agnes (Lynch) Conley was born February, 1874, in New York City and died April, 1921, in Bridgeport. Her parents were John Lynch, born in Ireland, and Bridget (___?___), born about 1848 in Carthage, New York. But who was Bridget (___?___)?

No birth record was found for Mary Agnes Lynch at the Municipal Archives in New York City. A second child, Robert F., was born to John and Bridget Lynch in Bridgeport 14 October 1875. No maiden name was given for Bridget in this record. John Lynch was not identified in Bridgeport city directories from the 1870s. Mrs. Bridget Lynch appeared in the Bridgeport city directory beginning 1878. Widow Bridget Lynch and her children Mary and Robert were enumerated on the United States census in Bridgeport in 1880.

Bridget Lynch was enumerated with her daughter Mary Agnes (Lynch) Conley and family on the US censuses 1900-1930. Her birthplace was consistently reported as New York, and that of her parents as Ireland.⁴ Mary Agnes (Lynch) Conley died 06 April 1921. Her mother's name was given as Bridget Donahue.⁵ Bridget Lynch died 08 April 1934. Her death record contained no information about her parents, though her birthplace was given as Carthage, New York,⁶ which agreed with the family's story. An obituary named a sister: Mrs. Ellen Egan of Bridgeport.⁷

Ellen Egan was found on the US census in Bridgeport, 1880-1930.⁸ She had married Daniel Egan 22 May 1880, but no parent's names were given in the record.⁹ Ellen Egan died Christmas Eve, 1936. Her death record stated she had been born in Carthage, New York, and it named her parents as Daniel Donahue and Mary Sullivan, both born in Ireland.¹⁰

Researching siblings pays off. Without the information from Ellen's death record, Bridget's parents would still be unknown.

Allen C. Bradley, M. D.: An African-American Physician in Bridgeport, CT, in the Early Twentieth Century

The birth records of two African-American babies, one born in Bridgeport and the other born in Stratford, but delivered by the same doctor, brought about the discovery of an African-American physician who practiced medicine in Bridgeport from 1903 until his death in 1945.

Allen Christopher Bradley was born in Beaufort, Beaufort County, South Carolina, to Samuel Bradley and Hannah Means.¹ Conflicting information places his birth year between 1869 and 1879.²

The Bradley family was found on the United States census in Beaufort in 1870 and 1880. In 1870 Samuel, 30, and Hannah, 19, Bradley, both born in South Carolina, were enumerated with three little girls aged 2-5, and Allen, 4 months. The appearance of Allen on this census leads to the conclusion that he was born no later than 1870, possibly in November, 1869, since November was consistently given as his birth month in later years. Although no documentation was sought, given their race and ages, Samuel and Hannah likely were former slaves. The family apparently lived in a rural area since Samuel's occupation was "farming," and the other men on the page, all African-American, had either "farming" or "laborer" as occupations. No one on the page had real or personal estates, and no one was able to write, though a few children were able to read.³

Samuel Bradley was not enumerated with the family in 1880, and Hannah Bradley was recorded as a widow living on Church Street in Beaufort. Five daughters and son Allen, 11, were living with her. Hannah was employed as a laundress, one daughter as a child's nurse, and another as a house servant. Allen had attended school in the census year. He was able to read, but not able to write, according to this record.⁴

Allen C. Bradley of South Carolina was enrolled in the Preparatory Department of Lincoln University in the 1888-1889 school year. This department fulfilled the same purpose that prep schools do today: it prepared students for college. Courses of study included Bible, spelling, reading, writing, geography, arithmetic, grammar, history, Latin and Greek.⁵ Allen Bradley was a

member of the freshman class at Lincoln the following year⁶ and of the senior class in 1892-1893.⁷ Other pages in these Lincoln University catalogs provide context for Allen Bradley's educational experience. Costs, curricula and guidelines for students are detailed.

Allen Bradley has not been identified on the 1900 U. S. census. He graduated from the New York Homeopathic College, forerunner of New York Medical College, in 1901 when the campus was in Manhattan, and was accepted as a practitioner on 14 July 1903 after approval by the Homeopathic Medical Examination Board.⁸ He married Bertha Carraway 29 April 1902 in Brooklyn, New York. She had been born in Wilmington, North Carolina, about 1882.⁹

Dr. Bradley first appeared in the Bridgeport City Directory in 1904. His home and office were at 61 Elm Street, ¹⁰ a block south of the current city hall. In 1910, Samuel Talbird, nephew, age 22, born in South Carolina, was living with the Bradleys at 107 Fulton Street and working for Dr. Bradley as a chauffeur. ¹¹ No Fulton Street exists in Bridgeport today; it ran between Main St. and Harrison in the same general area as Elm Street. ¹²

Ten years later Allen and Bertha Bradley were living at 55 Highland Avenue. The original house is no longer at this site which is near the intersection of Washington Street. Houses next to this address are Queen Anne Victorian-style homes. The Bradleys stayed at this address, which was both a home and an office for Dr. Bradley, for the next 25 years.¹³

The 1920 census also revealed that Samuel Talbird continued to drive for Dr. Bradley, and that Edna Martin, 14, and Frank Martin, 7, were living with the family. The youngsters' relationships were "niece" and "nephew," and since their parents had been born in North Carolina, they were likely related to Bertha Bradley. The Bradleys' neighbors were mainly Russian Jews with children born in the United States or people from other states. There was one family with Connecticut roots, and only one other family on the page was black.¹⁴

In 1930 Allen Bradley had two employees living in his home. His niece Edna Martin was a chiropodist in his office; he also employed a live-in maid. The neighborhood around the Bradley home was occupied mostly by Italian immigrants at that time.¹⁵

Dr. Bradley was a member of the Selective Service Appeals board during World War II. Local children liked him because he handed out candy to them. ¹⁶ He died 11 April 1945 and was buried in Mountain Grove Cemetery, survived by his wife, a sister and some nieces and nephews. ¹⁷

This short biography of Allen Bradley leaves a number of questions unanswered. What was his early life like in Beaufort? How had he gotten himself to Lincoln University? What made him move to Bridgeport to practice medicine? How did his race affect his medical practice? Though he lived in mixed-race neighborhoods, was his practice restricted to African-Americans? No matter what the answers may be, he had travelled a long way from his South Carolina roots, away from the likely slavery and poverty of his ancestors and into the twentieth century as a pioneering professional man.

Three Ancestors and the Smallpox Scourge

Today the disease of smallpox has been eradicated. We no longer have to fear its terrible effects, as our ancestors did. Three of my husband's maternal direct ancestors from Connecticut, all of whom were serving either in the Colonial Wars or in the Revolutionary War, were infected with smallpox. One died, one sustained permanent disability, and one recovered.

Lt. John Hubbell was born ca 1652 in West Haven, CT and died in 1690 at Wood Creek [near Albany], NY. At the time of his death, he was a resident of Stratford, CT. John served in King Phillip's War 1675-1676, where he was wounded losing a finger. In 1678, he received a colonial grant of 100 acres, probably in the White Hills section of Stratford, as compensation. In 1690, following the Schenectady massacre during the French and Indian War, John received his commission for the Albany expedition from Governor Robert Treat of CT. The army was returning to Albany, when John died of smallpox and was buried at Wood Creek in full uniform. A stone with the year of his death was placed on his grave. An enemy Indian tribe dug up his body and took his uniform for their use. This resulted in about half the tribe dying of smallpox. A great-great grandson, Hezekiah Hubbell, narrated as follows: "The clergy made good use of the horrible catastrophe and many sermons are said to have been preached based on his untimely death."

Captain Ethel Keeney was born 17 March 1755, the first white child born at the "Landing" in Derby, CT. He died 4 October 1837 and was buried in the Old Episcopal Grave-Yard in Derby. He was a sea captain and, in later years, kept Kinney's Tavern. His Revolutionary War pension papers document his serving from 1776 to 1779 in the militia, as a Quartermaster Sergeant, and as a sea captain transporting troops. In March 1777, he was detached from his Company at Saw Pits to proceed to Milford to take possession of a Privateer down to Saw Pits. He contracted smallpox, was left behind, and in May returned home to Derby. He appears to have made a full recovery, as he later served as a guard for arrested traitors and marched to New Haven and Fairfield to guard the coast in July 1779.

Doctor Silas Baldwin was born 4 April 1729 in Waterbury, CT. He died 19 November 1813 and is buried in the Old Derby-Uptown Burying Ground. He had a medical practice as a surgeon in Ridgefield and Derby, CT. By tradition, he was a surgeon of celebrity. He served as a Surgeon's Mate in Col. Lyman's Regiment in the French and Indian Wars 1757-1758. He enlisted in the Revolutionary War in June 1776 under Gen. Humphrey serving in the 1776 New York campaign, and in the battles of Long Island, New York, White Plains, and Stony Point. Connecticut Archives says Silas was sent to the hospital March 1778 to treat smallpox, which settled in one eye causing great pain and loss of the eye. He was discharged at Stony Point as unfit for duty 22 November 1779 and awarded 40 pounds by the State Assembly in May 1785. A list of pension claimants, submitted to the House of Representatives by the Secretary of War 25 in April 1794, says Silas fell ill with smallpox by which he lost one of his eyes, after he was inoculated by general orders.



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

Editorial Notes

If your journal is a little bit late, you can blame the weather! The editor's house was without lights, heat and water for seven days beginning October 30, and the treasurer, who helps with final formatting of the journal, was in the dark for a similar period. Nevertheless, we hope you will be pleased with this issue.

We begin with a continuation of Kenneth Rockwell's article on the Benjamin Wilson family of Ridgefield, this time with several notable corrections to part 1 of the past issue. This is followed by an exploration by Patricia Reed of the possible parentage of Josiah Canfield of South Salem, NY, building on (and correcting) an article of mine published two years ago in this journal.

We then continue our transcriptions of vital records by school districts for the years 1847 to 1852, first the records from Weston, CT. This is followed by records for just the first year of this period from Redding, Sherman, and Ridgefield, and now found in the State Archives.

Our request for short articles has brought three "good ones" from our readers, Two Benjamin Beldings by Betty Lou Malesky, Hezekiah and Charity Mills by John Drobnicki, and Richard Partrick of Norwalk by Patricia Haslam. If you have early New England immigrants you will certainly have interest in this series and Nora's article will give you some clues on where to start.

It has been some time since this journal has reprinted something from another publication, but we thought Lynn Betlock's article on writing genealogical articles might help in prompting some more of you to develop your skills in this area. And finally in this issue is a query on the Osborn family of Ridgefield and Salem (now Lewisboro), New York. Please let us know if you have any clues to offer on this family.

The Family of Benjamin Wilson of Ridgefield, Connecticut

Kenneth W. Rockwell –continued–

This continuation of the family of Benjamin Wilson begins with several additions and corrections to part one published in the August issue of this journal. These were pointed out by Barbara Dempsey, currently secretary of this Society, whose contribution is gratefully acknowledged.

Amendments to Part 1

- 1. Several children of the daughters of Benjamin and Jane Wilson were omitted from the previous article:
- Rebecca and Benjamin Rockwell had an additional child: Jeremiah, born 12 Nov 1742;1
- Jane and Joseph Keeler had the following additional children: Phebe b. 24 Dec. 1737;
 Ezra, b. 16 July 1748; and Jane b. 24 July 1750;²
- Abigail and Eli Northrup had the following additional children: Jane, b. 21 October 1747; Esther, b. 18 January 1749/50; Benajah, b. 27 March 1752; Wilson [misspelled in *Barbour Collection* 36:233 as "Wilton"], b. 7 April 1754; Dorcas, b. 22 June 1758; Anne, b. 21 May 1760; and Thaddeus, b. 27 February 1763.³ In addition, the vital records record the death of another Anne, daughter of Eli and Abigail, on 18 July 1758,⁴ apparently an earlier daughter, birth year and order uncertain, for whom the child born in 1760 was named.
- 2. Sarah Gates, daughter of Samuel Sr. and Sarah (Wilson) was born 10 Sep 1733, rather than 1743.⁵ The footnote for the Gates children's births referred to "Ridgefield vital records, vol. 1, p. 218, 219, 223, 226," but there is nothing on page 218 related to this family.
- 3. The births of three of the children of Benjamin and Jane Wilson, namely Benjamin, Mary, and Jane, were omitted from the Wilson section of the Barbour Collection volume 36, and placed under "Williams." Looking at the original, in the vital records volume 1, p. 201, one can understand the mistake; for one thing Willson was spelled with two "L"s. This is a good example of why one should refer to the original whenever possible, and cite it instead of a secondary work. That practice is followed in the remainder of this article.

Part II, Second Generation

2. Nathan Wilson, son of Benjamin and Jane (Olmsted) Wilson, born 30 September 1701 at Norwalk. He married, on 5 June 1727, Phebe Hobart. Her ancestry is uncertain, but this was soon after the arrival from Long Island of Joseph Hobart, who soon had a daughter named Phebe, born in February of 1729. Perhaps he was a brother of the elder Phebe, and she arrived with him.

They settled in Ridgefield. Phebe probably died in the early 1750s, as Nathan is likely the one who, with a wife named Naomi, had two children in 1755 and 1756. This marriage was not recorded, nor is there further record of Naomi. Nathan Wilson died on 8 March 1785. No probate records have been found for him. Phebe's death was not recorded in the official VRs, nor is there any surviving headstone for her.

Among the interesting deeds involving Nathan Wilson is the one dated 15 November 1762, in which he sold to Benjamin Rockwell of Salem [his brother-in-law] his 9.5-acre home lot in the central village. This was the original home of Benjamin Wilson the founder, and Rebecca Rockwell's childhood home. On 27 July 1767, Benjamin Rockwell, for 100 pounds of New York money, quit-claimed to Nathan Wilson his right and title to the same property.

Children of Nathan and Phebe (Hobart) Wilson, all born at Ridgefield:10

- 1. Nathan Wilson, born 21 May 1729. No further record was found of him.
- 2. Phebe Wilson, born 26 June 1731. No further record was found of her.
- 3. Ezekiel Wilson, born 19 November 1733. (5)
- 4. John Wilson, born 27 January 1735/36. (6)
- 5. Jeremiah Wilson, born 2 June 1738; died 9 March 1816. His marriage is not on record, but his wife was Hannah, as is evidenced by several deeds. One of them, which concerns money rather than land, proves she was Hannah Couch. In this deed dated 4 May 1787, Benjamin Smith, executor of the estate of Sarah Keeler, stated that, whereas Sarah Keeler had two mortgage deeds from her "children," Jeremiah and Hannah Wilson and Stephen and Sarah Smith of Ridgefield, and whereas the amount that they owed her had been deducted from the legacies given to them in her will, they were now clear of the mortgage obligation. Stephen Smith married Sarah Couch; therefore, Sarah Keeler, the

mother of Hannah Wilson and Sarah Smith was the widow of Timothy Keeler, whom she married on 10 Nov. 1736. That record states that she was the widow of Thomas Couch of Fairfield's West Parish [Greens Farms in present-day Westport]; ¹³ and the Fairfield vital records state that Thomas Couch married Sarah Allen on 7 Dec. 1721. ¹⁴ Sarah (Allen) (Couch) Keeler died at Ridgefield on 10 March 1787, in her 90th year. ¹⁵ Her daughter Hannah's birth was not recorded there, nor was her death recorded at Ridgefield. She and Jeremiah apparently had no children. In his will, signed 21 Feb 1794, Jeremiah left all of his property to his wife, Hannah, and named her his executrix. He also provided that a servant named Lydia, if still living after he and his wife died, should be emancipated. Hannah was still living when this will was probated in 1817, and declined to serve as executor of the estate. ¹⁶

6. Ezra Wilson, b. 14 February 1744/45. No further record was found of him.

Children of Nathan and Naomi (-----) Wilson, born at Ridgefield:¹⁷

- 7. Stephen Wilson, b. 28 February 1755.
- 8. Jared Wilson, b. 17 December 1756.
- 3. Thomas Wilson, son of Benjamin and Jane (Olmsted) Wilson, born 9 October 1703 at Norwalk. He married, on 30 January 1729, Elizabeth Brooks. ¹⁸ She was probably the sister of Ebenezer Brooks, who married Jane Saint John in 1730, and daughter of the senior Ebenezer Brooks. (No probate records for Ebenezer exist from which we could confirm this identification.) Elizabeth died on 17 December 1767; Thomas died on 20 August 1775. At a Danbury probate court session on 6 April 1781, Lemuel Abbott and Daniel Coley were appointed to distribute his estate, and the result was recorded on 31 December 1781, in which land was set out to sons Abner and Daniel Wilson. ²⁰ This suggests that the rest of Thomas's children died without issue before this.

Children of Thomas and Elizabeth (Brooks) Wilson, all born at Ridgefield:21

- a. Thomas Wilson, born 2 February 1729/30; d. 10 June 1757.
- b. Elizabeth Wilson, born 8 July 1731. She was probably the Elizabeth Wilson who died on 5 Sept. 1768.
- c. Anne Wilson, born 20 April 1734. No further record has been found of her.
- d. Mary Wilson, b. 6 October 1735. No further record has been found of her.
- e. Daniel Wilson, b. 21 January 1737/38. (7)
- f. Sarah Wilson, b. 13 August 1742. No further record has been found of her.
- g. Abner Wilson, b. 5 June 1744. (8)
- h. Jane Wilson, b. 17 March 1746. No further record has been found of her.

4. Benjamin Wilson, son of Benjamin and Jane (Olmsted) Wilson, born Ridgefield, 17 June 1709.²² He married, on 2 June 1737, Deborah Bennett.²³ She was the daughter of James Bennett, who moved from Fairfield around 1721 and settled a tract of land known in the land records as "Bennett's Farms," near the border of Danbury and Ridgefield.²⁴ Among the land records concerning Benjamin Wilson Jr. is one in which Ephraim Bennett [a brother of Deborah], "in consideration of the homestead of Benjamin Wilson Junr. ... made over to me by a bill of exchange," conveyed to Benjamin his own home lot of 30 acres on 6 March 1743/44.²⁵

The death of Benjamin is not found in Ridgefield Vital Records, but he died ca. June of 1757, before the birth of his last child. A distribution of his estate, made on 1 June 1759, makes the following provisions (most of the children being minors at the time of the distribution, Thomas only 2 years old:²⁶

- To widow Deborah, "now wife of Joseph Miles," the dwelling house and 5 acres; also 4.5 acres 30 rods on north end of hill lot set out to Thomas;
- To daughter Deborah "one sixth part of a 20 acre division lying at Cedar Mountain" and a 16.5 acre parcel at north end of home lot;
- To daughter Abiah "one sixth part of a 20 acre division lying at Cedar Mountain" and a parcel 14 acres 60 rods south of Deborah's;
- To son Benjamin 15 acres 60 rods south of Abiah's, and 1/3 of a common right;
- To daughter Sarah, 15 acres south of Benjamin's;
- To son Samuel 41 acres 3 roods south of Sarah's, and 1/3 of a common right;
- To daughter Jane 8 acres north of Abigail's
- To Abigail 7 acres 55 rods north of Lydia's

- To daughter Lydia 6 acres 3 roods, 15 rods north of Rebecka's
- To dau Rebecca 6 acres 3 roods
- To son Thomas 3 acres of a hill lot with orchard, 4 acres 3 roods at north end of house lot, north of Jane's land; also 1/3 of a common right

Widow Deborah (Bennett) Wilson married, second, Joseph Miles, who apparently died by 1772, and, third, John Stuart (or Stewart), as evidenced by a deed dated 19 October 1772. in which John Stuart of Ridgefield, for £53, quit-claimed to Nathaniel Selleck of Ridgefield "my claim in & unto the house & six acres of land adjoined to said house that was distributed to my wife Deborah as her dower in her late husband Benjamin Wilson's estate ... said land is bounded north by land set out to Rebeckah Wilson & all other ways by common land & highway; also one other piece of land in quantity three acres, bounded east by land of Jonathan Whitlock, west by highway, north by land of Joseph Mead and south by land of Thomas Wilson."27 This John Stuart is the "John Stewart Junr." of Norwalk" to whom Benjamin Wilson [son of Benjamin and Deborah] quit-claimed [also for £53] all interest in the same two properties on 26 March 1770. In two other deeds of that date, Benjamin conveyed to "John Stewart Junr" one-third interest in a 3acre parcel at Bennett's Farm lying undivided between Benjamin, Samuel, and Thomas Wilson: one-sixth part of a right in the common land of Ridgefield; and a 16.5-acre parcel on the Ridgefield-Danbury border, bounded east by David Osborn and Samuel Wilson, West by common land, north by John Trobridge and common land, and south by Samuel Wilson and Gabriel Bennett, together with one-third part of a sawmill on this land.²⁸

Deborah (Bennett) (Miles) (Wilson) Stuart died on 10 June 1795, at the age of 78.²⁹ In two deeds from 1796, we learn the whereabouts of several of her heirs: On 10 February 1796, David Osborn and wife Abiah; Lydia Platt; Daniel Dikeman, and Benjamin Dikeman, all of Danbury; Benjamin Wilson of Fairfield; David Northrup and wife Abigail of Salem, New York; and James Lacy and wife Laurania of Saratoga County, New York, for 16 pounds quit-claimed to Thomas Wilson of Ridgefield all their right and intrest in the real estate of Deborah Stuart late of Ridgefield, "and also of all the right we and each of us have in and unto the real estate of Benjamin Wilson formerly of said Ridgefield decd that was set out to his Widow (afterwards said Deborah Stuart) for her improvement out of said dec'd Benjamin Wilson's estate, for her dower and improvement during her natural life." In a similar deed dated 3 September 1796, Reuben and Rebeckah Sherwood; Gabriel and Deborah Bennett; William and Jane Pullen; Phillip and Huldah Kellogg; and Levi Dykeman, all of Saratoga County, New York, quit-claimed to Thomas Wilson of Ridgefield all title and interest in the lands of "our honored Mother Deborah Stewart" and her dower from the estate of Benjamin Wilson.

Most of the people in these two deeds can be identified as children of Benjamin and Deborah Wilson, but a few are evidently grandchildren. As the vital records show two children, "Lurania" and Benjamin, born to a Benjamin Wilson and wife "Sophira,"³¹ these were clearly

Laurania Lacy of Saratoga County and Benjamin Wilson of Fairfield, in the place of their father, who had died by 1786. [See under his record.] A Kellogg genealogy states that Philip Kellogg's wife Huldah was a Dikeman,³² so she and the men named Dykeman had some common connection to Deborah Stuart. A solution presents itself in a deed dated 19 April 1773, wherein Daniel Dikeman and Sarah his wife sold a 20-acre parcel of land in Bennett's Farm to Elnathan Sturges. The same day, Samuel Wilson sold an adjacent parcel to Sturges.³³ Sarah Dykeman was likely the daughter of Benjamin and Deborah Wilson, who had received 15 acres in the 1759 distribution. She evidently married Daniel Dykeman, had at least three children, and died before 1796. Another deed Daniel Dykeman of Danbury purchasing 15 acres at Bennett's Farm from Samuel and Thomas Wilson on 14 November 1788.³⁴ It is possible that Daniel Dykeman who was party to the 1796 deed may have been her widower rather than a fourth child.

Children of Benjamin and Deborah (Bennett) Wilson, all born at Ridgefield:35

- a. Deborah Wilson, b. 4 April 1738. According to the September 1796 deed relating to her mother's real estate, she married Gabriel Bennett and was living in Saratoga County, New York, by 1796. The 1790 U.S. Census shows a Gabriel Bennett family in Ridgefield, containing 2 males over 16; 2 males under 16; and 3 females. It is possible that this is the Deborah Wilson who married Justus Purdy on 6 August 1771 at the Salem Church, if he died before 1790.³⁶
- b. Samuel, b. 24 July 1739. He obtained land from some of his siblings. He was not a party to either of the 1796 deeds, but in a separate deed dated 6 April 1796, "for the consideration of many services, assistances, and benefits done by and received of my loving brother Thomas Wilson of Ridgfield, and also for the affection, love & good will that I have for and do bear unto him," he quit-claimed to Thomas all interest in the land and real estate that descended to him from the estate of their father Benjamin Wilson and mother Deborah Stuart.³⁷ He apparently never married, and is likely the Samuel Wilson who died on 11 February 1822.³⁸ No probate records exist for him.
- c. Abiah Wilson, b. 4 March 1740/41. She married, first, Nathaniel Selleck, and, second, as his second wife, David Osborn.³⁹ In a deed dated 18 November 1774, Nathaniel Selleck quit-claimed to Samuel Wilson "all my right, title, and claim belonging to me,

and my Mother Stuart's thirds, except my wife's right on the estate of Benjamin Wilson of Ridgfield Decd..."⁴⁰ According to the February 1786 deed relating to her mother's real estate, the Osborns lived in Danbury in 1796. The 1790 U.S. Census shows a David Osborn family in Danbury that contained 1 male over 16 and 3 females. If this is them, the other females are daughters of his first marriage, to Hannah Mead.⁴¹ David Osborn died in 1807; his widow, Abiah, died 14 Feb. 1832, "aged 94," though actually about 91.⁴²

- d. Benjamin Wilson, b. 25 November 1743. (9)
- e. Sarah Wilson, b. 14 June 1746. She evidently married Daniel Dykeman and died before 1796, leaving children Huldah (who married Philip Kellogg), Benjamin, and Levi. The Daniel Dykeman who signed the February 1796 deed was either her widower or a fourth child. A Philip Kellogg household is found at Ballston, Saratoga Co., N.Y., in the 1800 U.S. Census.
- f. Jane Wilson, b. 4 December 1748. According to the September 1796 deed relating to her mother's real estate, she married William Pullen [or Pulling] and was living in Saratoga County, New York. A William Pullen household (probably this family) was in Providence, Saratoga Co., N.Y., in 1800, with 1 male over 45; 1 female over 45; 1 male 10-15; 1 female 10-15; 1 male under 10; and 1 female under 10.
- g. Abigail Wilson, b. 10 November 1750. According to the February 1796 deed relating to her mother's real estate, she married David Northrup and lived at South Salem, N.Y., in 1796. The Salem Presbyterian Church records include their marriage, on 1 Feb. 1770.⁴³ Online trees suggest several children, but the family is not readily found in the U.S. Census of 1790 or later. Another deed concerning this couple: On 2 Nov. 1783, David and Abigail Northrup of Salem, N.Y., sold to Ezekiel Wilson a parcel measuring 7 acres, 50 rods, lying at Bennett's Farm in Ridgefield.⁴⁴
- h. Lydia Wilson, b. 12 August 175[?]. The birth record is damaged, but, given that she was listed in the distribution between Abigail and Rebeckah, it is likely that she was born between them; and a death notice for her in 1832 at the age of 97 suggest 1754, though possibly the age was off by a year or two. According to the February 1796 deed relating to her mother's real estate, she married a Platt and lived in Danbury. As she was signing the deed apart from any mention of her husband, he had probably died by then. He was probably Joseph Platt, whose headstone the Hale Cemetery Project recorded in the 1930s at Lower Starr's Plain Cemetery in Danbury; his birth year was unreadable, but he died in 1792. Lydia Platt, widow of Joseph, died on 6

Feb. 1832 at the age of 97, according to an announcement in the *Connecticut Mirror*, issue of 11 Feb. 1832. By 1934, the Hale survey recorded the grave in the North Main Street Cemetery as giving her death date as "Feb. 15, 1832," again at the age of 97, and they called her the wife of "Josiah" Platt, probably a misreading of an eroded inscription. Fossibly, her husband was related to David Platt, to whom Nathan and Thomas Wilson sold an 18-acre parcel on 17 September 1771. And on 28 January 1772, David Platt and Josiah Stebbins sold to James Conklin "a Twenty acre division lying in the township of Ridgefield at the Cedar Mountain, which was laid out to the right that was originally Benjamin Wilson's—suggesting some connection to the family, unless this was the land the Wilson brothers had sold him.

- i. Rebeckah, b. 13 September 1755. She married at Ridgefield, 8 April 1778, Reuben Sherwood. On 3 March 1783, Samuel Wilson sold to "my brother Reuben Sherwood & Rebeckah his wife" a parcel of land 7 acres, 55 rods of land in Ridgefield. On the same date, Reuben and Rebeckah sold another parcel, 6 acres and 3 roods of land, to Samuel Wilson. The 1790 U.S. Census shows the Reuben Sherwood household in Ridgefield, containing 2 males over 16, 3 males under 16, and 3 females. By 1796, they were living in Saratoga County, according the September 1796 deed. The 1800 census shows a Reuben Sherwood as head of a household in Ballston, Saratoga Co., containing 1 male and 2 females over 45; 1 female 26-44; 2 males 16-25; 1 female 10-15; 2 males under 10; and 1 female under 10. Children born to Rebeckah and Reuben Sherwood in Ridgefield: Sarah Graves b. 4 Nov 1778, James b. 16 Feb 1781, Anna b. 9 Feb 1783.

The Never-Ending Mystery of Josiah? Canfield's Ancestry

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In "Timothy⁴ Canfield of South Salem, NY: Fragments of a Family Line" (*Connecticut Ancestry* 52[Nov 2009]:59-61), author Harlan Jessup incorporated information that was given to me many years ago by my mother, a descendant of Timothy's reputed son Josiah. Some of my mother's information came from notes made by her great-uncle, Oliver Adolphus Canfield, but much of it came from the Canfield Family Association. Her papers state that Josiah Canfield was one of three sons (Josiah, David & Joseph) of Timothy⁴ Canfield (*Ebenezer*³, *Samuel*², *Matthew*¹) and an unnamed wife; and that he was born in the early 1720's, married about 1741 to Elizabeth⁵ Gregory (*Jonathan*⁴, *John*³, *John*², *Henry*¹), and died in Schenectady, New York 10 Oct 1760. Josiah and Elizabeth⁵ are traditionally credited with eight children, and most Canfield family histories follow this tradition:

- i. **Elizabeth**, born about 1741
- ii. **Jonathan**, born about 1742
- iii. Phebe, born about 1744
- iv. **Samuel**, born about 1745
- v. **Ichabod**, born about 1746
- vi. Jabez, born about 1748
- vii. Josiah, born about 1750
- viii. **Ezekiel**, born about 1752

About a year after the article's publication, Harlan Jessup was contacted by Marilyn Bobseine, who is also a Josiah Canfield descendant. She questioned the article's stated genealogical connection between Timothy⁴ and Josiah. Through Harlan I was able to establish a correspondence with the delightful Ms. Bobseine, who provided documentary evidence that justified her challenge. I like to think I am not prone to accepting information at face value, but when it came to Josiah Canfield I certainly failed to live up to my own standard. After reviewing Marilyn's argument I realized she was right. Chastened, but with a renewed sense of purpose, I have begun a new investigation of this family. I offer this summary of what the evidence currently tells us about Josiah Canfield and what remains unresolved.

There are no records of Josiah's birth, marriage or death, and no birth records for his children. Such dates as are found in Canfield family histories may have been manufactured to make Josiah's descent from Timothy⁴ Canfield a feasible proposition. The only known marriage for Timothy⁴ is to Keziah Ferris in Greenwich, Connecticut on 19 Nov 1729;² though Timothy⁴ was old enough to have had children from an earlier marriage in the 1720's, Marilyn informed me that records from the Wilton Congregational Church indicate Josiah Canfield was born far earlier. This makes his descent from Timothy⁴ Canfield problematic, if not impossible.

Two critical entries in the Wilton church records show that on 22 Dec 1757, "widow E. Canfield" married James Lyon of Norfield, and on 20 Sep 1757 Josiah Canfield, age 21, married

Deborah Stuart.³ This is almost certainly the son of Josiah and Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) Canfield; he is not referred to as "Jr.", probably because his father was already deceased. The "widow E. Canfield" is almost certainly Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) Canfield, and the most likely candidate for her second husband is James³ Lyon (*Samuel*², *Richard*¹), born Fairfield, Connecticut 21 Mar 1704/05, who married Abigail⁴ Rowland (*Joseph*³, *Joseph*², *Henry*¹) in Fairfield, Connecticut 14 Dec 1732. Abigail⁴ (Rowland) Lyon died in Fairfield 26 Mar 1752 "ae upwards of 40."

If, as stated in the Wilton church record, Josiah Canfield Jr. was born in 1736 rather than 1750, and married in 1757, then his parents Josiah and Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) Canfield must have been born before 1715. Further evidence in support of this can be found in the estate settlement of Elizabeth's father, Jonathan⁴ Gregory. On 11 Nov 1724 Nehemiah Smith was appointed guardian for Jonathan⁴ Gregory's children Elizabeth⁵ and Samuel⁵; his brother John⁴ Gregory was appointed guardian for children Jonathan⁵ and Phebe⁵, and his widow Elizabeth (______) Gregory was guardian for son David⁵. On 05 Dec 1732 Elizabeth⁵ Gregory and her brother Samuel⁵ released Nehemiah Smith from his guardianship⁵; assuming Elizabeth⁵ was at least eighteen on the date of the last record, she would have been born no later than 1714. Author Grant Gregory also gave Elizabeth⁵ a birth date before 1715 in his genealogy of the Gregory family.⁶

Since Timothy⁴ Canfield was still a minor when his father's inventory was taken 20 Jan 1715/16 ("æ 14 yrs. 16th last Sept"),⁷ it is improbable that he was Josiah's father. Even in the unlikely event that an underage Josiah married an older Elizabeth he must have been born no later than 1720, which would have made Timothy⁴ Canfield a father at the age of eighteen or nineteen. The probability is even smaller that both Timothy⁴ and then his son married and fathered children at such tender ages.

It also seems clear that Josiah Canfield Sr. was deceased several years before his traditionally stated death of 10 Oct 1760 in Schenectady, New York. The Wilton church records ascribe the 1760 death record to Josiah Canfield Jr. and in *Wilton, Connecticut: Three Centuries of People, Places, and Progress*, author Robert H. Russell lists a Josiah Canfield among a group of Wilton men in Captain Thaddeus Mead's company who died in "upper New York from

disease and harsh conditions during the final months of the [French and Indian] war." ⁸ As the others were young men, it is likely that the Josiah who died was also young.

Josiah Canfield Jr.'s marriage record and his brother Jonathan's gravestone contain the only known evidence of birth dates for the children of Josiah and Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) Canfield. Josiah Jr.'s marriage record and possible 1760 death in Schenectady represent the sum of what is presently known about him. Most Canfield family histories list no information beyond birth for any of the remaining seven children, except Jonathan and Samuel. My present attempts to sketch them are so rudimentary that they do not lend themselves to a Register-style outline, but the following information is what I have learned or conjectured about them:

- **Jonathan Canfield** is the best documented of all the children. He was born about 12 Jun 1742 and died in Mayfield, New York 12 Jan 1829. He lived in Salisbury, Connecticut when he married there on 22 Dec 1764¹⁰ Sarah Woodworth (*Caleb*³, *Benjamin*², *Walter*¹), born Salisbury, Connecticut 02 Aug 1743, died Mayfield, New York 09 May 1826. Jonathan and Sarah removed to Mayfield at an unknown date, where his name and those of his sons often appear alongside the names of his Woodworth brothers-in-law. Jonathan and Sarah (Woodworth) Canfield are buried in Mayfield's Riceville Cemetery. I have located several of his descendants in state and federal census records, but not Jonathan himself.
- **Samuel Canfield** married Mary (_____) Waller in Amenia, New York 02 Jul 1776.¹³ He is said to have died in Middlefield, New York in 1815, though no record of them has been found. Some of his putative descendants appear in the mid-19th century census records for Erie County, New York.
- The Wilton church records also list a marriage for **Jabez Canfield** to Mary Dikeman on 14 Jun 1756. ¹⁴ *If* (and it is a big *if*) the Jabez Canfield of this record was Josiah Jr.'s brother, then he must have been born far earlier than 1748 and was quite likely the firstborn child of Josiah

and Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) Canfield. This would lend further support to the argument that the parents were born before 1715, but would complicate attempts to use naming patterns as an aid in untangling the children's birth order. If this Jabez is not Josiah and Elizabeth's son then he should be added to the list of unplaced Canfields, as there seems to be no other likely candidate. The only other known Canfield of that name in Fairfield County was Ebenezer³ Canfield's son, Jabez⁴, who died before 24 Mar 1726/27.¹⁵

• Jacobus' *History and Genealogy of the Families of Old Fairfield* may help us account for the remaining four children as well. He lists the following "Unplaced Canfields" taken from church records. He will be remained to the conjecture whether or not these are children of Josiah and Elizabeth (Gregory) Canfield, the marriage dates are not incompatible with their supposed birth dates:

Elizabeth Canfield married Jonathan Robinson in Greenfield Church 14 Apr 1763 **Ezekiel Canfield** married Ann Jacocks in Greens Farm Church 20 Oct 1773 **Phebe Canfield** married Samuel Lyon in Weston Church 14 Oct 1774 **Ichabod Canfield** married Mary Batterson in Greens Farms Church 18 Aug 1774

Elizabeth⁵ (Gregory) (Canfield) Lyon must have died in 1761. On 06 May of that year Jonathan Canfield chose Benjamin Gilbert of Fairfield to be his guardian (probably his uncle Samuel Gregory's father-in-law). On 21 Sep 1761 Samuel and Ezekiel Canfield chose James Lyon of Fairfield to be their guardian.¹⁷ There are no records of guardians appointed for Phebe or Ichabod, though they were allegedly still minors; possibly those records have been lost or perhaps, as with Josiah and Jabez, their birth dates have been misstated.

There appears to be no hard evidence confirming the existence of Josiah Canfield Sr.'s brothers, David and Joseph. Family tradition states that all three lived in the Danbury area and their records were lost in the Revolutionary War. Such a notion certainly seems possible: in a transcription of the previously mentioned Wilton church records made about 1920, David H. Van Hoosear made the annotation, "prob. Wd. E. Canfield of N.P," *i.e.*, New Patent, which was bounded on the east by Danbury. As Jack Sanders states on his Ridgefield History website, "It is believed the proprietors obtained the right to this land [*i.e.*, New Patent] in exchange for the land that Ridgefield lost to New York Colony in that same year [1731] when Connecticut ceded the Oblong." Based on the date of the cession, the New Patent lands may have opened up for settlement around the time Josiah Canfield Sr. reached his majority, and it is conceivable that he and his brothers settled there. However, barring further discoveries, we should also accept the possibility that Josiah's two brothers may be mythical.

An investigation of the evidentiary record makes a compelling case that Josiah Canfield could not have been the son of Timothy⁴ Canfield by an unnamed first wife. Unfortunately, nothing has been discovered in the records to tell us whose son he might have been. According to Canfield historian Frederick A. Canfield, there were three immigrant ancestors of the name in colonial Connecticut: Thomas¹ of Milford, Nathaniel¹ of Norwalk, and Matthew¹ of New Haven and Norwalk, who later removed to Newark, New Jersey.²⁰ Recognizing that there have been various spellings of the surname, I use "Canfield" throughout this article for simplicity's sake.

- **Thomas¹ Canfield's** family resided in New Haven and Litchfield counties, whereas there is no evidence that Josiah lived anywhere but Fairfield County. Therefore, it would seem we can safely rule out Josiah's descent from Thomas¹ Canfield.
- Nathaniel¹ Canfield appears in only one source: in *The Ancient Historical Records of Norwalk, Connecticut*, author Edwin Hall lists Nathaniel¹ as the 1670 owner of five acres "Bounded east by Common, west by Town's Highway, north by Matthias Sention's home-lot, south by Richard Olmsted's, that was Thomas Hale's homelot," the same land which Samuel² Canfield sold to Thomas Fitch on 20 May 1671.²¹ Author Frederick A. Canfield claimed that Nathaniel¹ and Matthew¹ were brothers, but the will of Matthew's father Gregory lists no son by that name.²²

In discussing this article with Marilyn Bobseine prior to publication, she mentioned she had once seen Nathaniel's existence questioned and posited that perhaps "Math" was mistakenly transcribed as "Nath"; a logical possibility, but without access to the original land records I was unable to investigate it. For assistance I turned to Harlan Jessup, who searched a manuscript copy of the (undated) proprietors' records. Harlan confirmed that Matthew¹ Canfield was the owner listed for the land Hall claimed was Nathaniel's. From a photocopy Harlan sent to me, it is readily apparent that the first four letters of the name are "math," though the last superscripted letter may be an s or an o or something else entirely. This entry is followed by no less than twelve others of land recorded to "math¹ campheild" or "math campheild," and a thirteenth that appears to be "matho campheild." Since the evidence for Nathaniel¹ Canfield's existence seems to rest entirely on Hall's transcription and since there is no record to explain how land belonging to a "Nathaniel" came to be in the possession of Samuel² Canfield a year later, it would seem that Nathaniel¹ Canfield was a figment of Hall's imagination. To paraphrase Mr. Jessup, this is once again a warning to look at original records wherever possible and not to rely on secondary works, especially those of "zealous 19th century local historians"!

• **Matthew¹** Canfield could still be Josiah's immigrant ancestor through someone other than Timothy⁴. Samuel² Canfield was the only one of Matthew's sons who settled in Fairfield County after the family removed to New Jersey in the late 1660s. Of Samuel's three known sons,

we can immediately eliminate the oldest, Ebenezer³; Josiah must have been born before Ebenezer³ died, yet he is not mentioned among the children in Ebenezer's 1715/16 inventory. Nor could Josiah have been Ebenezer's grandson by someone other than Timothy⁴; just as Timothy⁴ was not old enough to have been Josiah's father neither were his brothers, as confirmed by their father's inventory²⁴:

Ebenezer⁴, "æ 16 yrs. 24th last Aug," or born 24 Aug 1699 Jabez⁴, "æ 11 yrs. 20th last Oct," or born 20 Oct 1704 Matthew⁴, "7 rs. 12 last Oct," or born 12 Oct 1708 Ezekiel⁴, "æ 5 yrs. 16th last Nov," or born 16 Nov 1710 David⁴, "æ 3 yrs 14th last Apl," or born 14 Apr 1712

We can also eliminate Samuel² Canfield's second son, Samuel³; when he died in 1712 only one child was mentioned in his inventory, his namesake.²⁵

Few facts are known with certainty about Samuel² Canfield's youngest son, Jedediah³. He was born in Norwalk, August 1681 (listed as "@ 9 yrs 14th last Aug." in his father's inventory); on 18 Dec 1700 he chose Zerubbabel Hoyt as his guardian. In October 1712 he was appointed co-administrator of his brother Samuel³ Canfield's estate and guardian of Samuel's two-year old son, Samuel⁴ Canfield. In February 1715/16 he was appointed guardian to Reuben Dibble, the seven-year old son of Sarah (Clements) (Dibble) Canfield, his brother Ebenezer's widow. In April 1716 he was appointed co-administrator of Ebenezer's estate and guardian of Ebenezer's seven-year old son, Matthew⁴ Canfield. ²⁶ Most Canfield family histories state that Jedediah³ married Lydia Kellum in Norwalk, Connecticut in 1719, by which time he would have been thirty-eight, and died May 1761 in Bedford, New York. No sources are cited for these dates. Could Jedediah³ Canfield have been Josiah Canfield's father by a previous marriage? Josiah's estimated birth before 1715 would not have precluded Jedediah's subsequent marriage in 1719; furthermore it is almost certain Jedediah³ would have been married when the court appointed him guardian to his young nephews in 1712 and 1716. Both his brother Samuel's and his brother Ebenezer's surviving spouses were second wives and not the mothers of the children in question. so it is unlikely that either of the boys resided with their stepmothers. Another item of note is that Jedediah³ is credited with a son named Joseph, born in 1724, which corresponds to the longstanding family story that Josiah Canfield had a brother named Joseph who was born in the early 1720's; this Joseph⁴ is himself credited with a son named Josiah⁵ Canfield. I believe Jedediah³ must be considered as a possible father to the unplaced Josiah.

There seem to be no answers at present to the question of Josiah Canfield's parentage, but I hope this article provides reasonable suggestions for future research. I believe Jedediah³ Canfield is the most likely candidate; however other possibilities may exist which I have overlooked, including an illegitimate birth to a Canfield daughter. A fresh approach and a thorough re-investigation will be required if we are ever to solve the mystery of Josiah² Canfield's ancestry.

The vital records for this period in Weston are in a book marked *Births*, *Marriages*, *and Deaths*, *1848-1867*. The records by school district begin in August 1847 and continue for only three years, ending in July 1850. There are no records from this date until 1858 when vital records are continued in the same volume and using the same form, but with no school district designated. For the first of these school years each district is named, but for the second and third year it is given only a number.

While most other state copies of the vital records for this year omit the name of the school district, the transcript of Ridgefield records for the year include the school district identified by number. In the Beers Atlas of 1868, the numbered districts are given these names: 1 – Scotts Ridge, 2 – Bennetts Farms, 3 – Limestone, 4 – Titicus, 5 – West Mountain, 6 – not named, but central Ridgefield, 7 – West Lane, 8 – Whipstick, 9- Flat Rock, 10 – not named, but Ridgefield Station, 11 – Florida, 12 – Farmingville, 13 – perhaps the unnamed and unnumbered district shown in northeast Ridgefield, 14 and 15 not named, but in Ridgebury district.

Two Benjamin Beldings Linked by a Saw Pit

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The name Belding is found in Connecticut as far back as the 1630s, spelled variously Baildon, Belden and Belding. A definitive genealogy of the family seems never to have been attempted likely due to confusion with the early lineage and sparse colonial records to help distinguish between various families.¹

Benjamin Belden of Rye, Westchester County, New York, undoubtedly came out of Connecticut but facts as to when and where he originated remain elusive. He may be found first in the 1790 Federal census of Bedford Township, Westchester County, with an entry for a male over 16, a male 26 to 45 and five females, a total of 7 persons.²

No land records are found in Westchester County for him, but by 1800 the family appears to have moved to Rye, Westchester County. Here he is reported with a male under 16, one under 26, one under 45, and two females under 10, one under 16 and one under 45, for a total of 7 persons.³

The only absolute record found for Benjamin Belden of Rye is his will dated 5 Mar 1802 and admitted to Probate 10 Mar 1802. ⁴ He left "... to wife Abigail, all money and income due him for her support and children [unnamed] unable to support themselves...to son Henry Belding all wearing apparel...." His inventory totaled £371.18.8 and included, "... 25 tand Calveskins, 1 lot of leather, a man's sadel & bridel, 57 pair of shus, 1 pair of boots & 1 pair of shues, 1 lot of leather & lining, towls & lasts in shop, shuthread, 3 pair of small shus, 1 pair of mens shus, 1 small skin,..." indicating that he was probably a shoemaker. No further records exist for Benjamin's wife Abigail, supposed mother of all of his children.

Discarding the 1790 census entry as possibly for a different man, we can assume that Benjamin and Abigail had a son born 1784 to 1790, a son born 1774 to 1784, and two daughters one born 1790 to 1800, one born 1786 to 1790. He and his wife were both born by 1755. Benjamin's will accounts for Henry, a son who is apparently of age, i.e., self-supporting, but mentions no other children by name.

Three Belden marriages were recorded in Christ Church, Rye, as follows: 14 May 1804, Mr. Daniel Davis to Miss Priscilla Belden, both of Saw Pitt; 21 Sep 1805, John Brundage of King Street to Miss Sally Belden of Sawpit; and 26 Apr 1815, Henry Belden to Anne Sniffin.⁵

Henry Belden appears to have spent the rest of his life in Rye where he is found in every census, 1810 through 1850. In 1850 Henry, age 66 therefore born 1784, is a shoemaker with

wife, Nancy, 65, and their apparent son William H., 32, also a shoemaker, and perhaps two daughters, Levina, 27 and Mary, 26.⁶ Henry's wife Nancy at 73 is evidently a widow in 1860 when she lives in Stephen Raymond's household, next door to her son William H. Belden.⁷

Another Benjamin Belden in Saw Pit

In 1660 three settlers from Greenwidge (now Greenwich, Connecticut), Thomas Studwell, John Coe, and Peter Disbrow, arranged to buy Manursing Island and land near the Byram River from the Mohegan Indians. In 1665, this land was claimed by both New York and Connecticut, but relinquished to the New York Colony by Connecticut in 1683. The land became known as Saw Pit by 1732 due to the saw pits, holes in the ground in which logs were cut to be used by shipbuilders. The struggle over its ownership continued for almost 105 years until 1788 when the New York Legislature ruled Sawpit was part of the Town of Rye. It eventually outgrew its name and became Port Chester by incorporating in 1868 as a village within Rye.⁸

Two sources state that a Benjamin Belding came to Ohio from Westchester County, New York. The first written in 1864 and published by the local historical society when he was still alive, stated Benjamin "came in 1829 from Sawpits, West Chester County, New York. He located on the center road in section 2. He sold out some years since, and now resides in New London." A history of Huron County written in 1879 states he came in 1829, "... the same time as Marshall" from Westchester County. Two named "Marshel," an Isaac and a Henry, appear in the 1830 Huron County census but neither is found in the 1820 Westchester census.

On 31 Dec 1827 Cyrus Mead purchased 117 acres in [Greenwich,] Huron County, range 21, township 1, section 2 from the county auditor for back taxes. He sold 24 acres to Benjamin B. Belding the same day. Benjamin presented his receipt for the sale to the auditor on 20 Nov 1833 and requested a deed, the first deed filed for him. He later purchased additional acreage in Greenwich.

Benjamin was born around 1800 in New York according to census records. ¹² He was probably married about 1818 in New York to Jane [—?—], also born there 1802/03. No marriage record has been located but she appears in deeds, censuses and his will as his wife. They had 15 children born between 1818 and 1845.

He appears in the 1830 census as Benjamin Baily, 13 1840 as Benjamin Beldin, 14 1850 as

Benjamin Belding with \$2000 real property,¹⁵ and 1860 as Benjamin Belden.¹⁶ In June 1851 Benjamin Belding, a farmer in Greenwich, was indicted in Common Pleas Court and charged with placing an obstruction across the railroad tracks. He was found not guilty by a jury of his peers.¹⁷ Evidently the railroad had appropriated some of his acreage for right-of-way without paying him. Shortly after his acquittal the railroad purchased his land and he moved to nearby New London.

Benjamin died in New London, Ohio, before 24 July 1665 when the administrator of his estate filed for settlement. He was survived by his wife Jane and children: Abby J. Buffington, Henry B. Belding, Mary Coalbaugh, Charles M. Belding, William Belding, Olive Merifield, Francis Read, Henrietta Wolcott, Sandford W. Belding, and Theodore Belding; also grandchildren Albert R. Hazard and Eava Hazard [children of daughter Priscilla, deceased. Not listed were sons Benjamin Belding, Lewis Belding, and Samuel Belding, all deceased without children].

Jane Belding last appears in the 1880 census at age 77 living in Grafton, Lorain County, Ohio, with her son Sanford and his wife. ¹⁹ A search of Lorain County death records for her name was unsuccessful. The 1880 census states she was born in New York to parents who were natives of Connecticut.

Conclusion

Benjamin Belding of Huron County, Ohio, born around 1800, is presumed to be a son of Benjamin Belden of Rye, Westchester County, New York. The main reasons for this conclusion are the absence of any other Belden/Belding families in Westchester County and the similarity of names in the two families.

The Ohio Benjamin's eldest daughter is Abby Jane. Abigail is the Westchester Benjamin's wife and Jane the Ohio's Benjamin's wife. The eldest son of the Ohio Benjamin was also named Benjamin. His 2nd son was named Henry B., the same name as the Westchester Benjamin's only proven son. Both Benjamins have a son William and a daughter Priscilla.

Finally, Westchester Benjamin was a shoemaker. Ohio Benjamin's son Samuel was a shoemaker. Skilled trades often passed from father to son. While the elder Benjamin is called "farmer" he may have learned the shoemaking trade from his brother Henry while growing up.

Belden/Belding DNA Project

In an effort to find a solution to this Belding enigma, I have created a Belden/Belding DNA Project at Family Tree DNA, http://www.familytreedna.com. My uncle contributed his DNA to the project as the last male Belding in our line, well documented back to my third great grandfather, Benjamin B. Belding of Huron County. I am hoping for additional descendants of the Connecticut family to join the project and perhaps together we can make strides toward creating a comprehensive genealogy of this long neglected family.

Hezekiah and Charity Mills of Westport, Connecticut

Hezekiah Mills (*Daniel*⁴, *William*³, *John*²⁻¹) was born in Westport, on Nov. 7, 1792, and was baptized on May 15, 1794, the youngest of nine children of Daniel Mills and Abigail Roberts.¹ Charity Mills (*John*⁵, *Ebenezer*⁴, *Robert*³, *John*²⁻¹) was baptized on June 23, 1793 in Green's Farms, the third of eleven children of John Mills and Eunice Frasier.² Hezekiah and Charity – this author's great-great-great-great grandparents – were married on Jan. 22, 1810, in Westport, by David Judah, a justice of the peace.³ They were second cousins once-removed, since Hezekiah's grandfather (William) was the younger brother of Charity's great-grandfather (Robert), making them both descendents of shipwright John Mills¹ of Stamford.

Although Hezekiah's father Daniel had once had Loyalist sympathies,⁴ Hezekiah enlisted in Nov. 1814 for service during the War of 1812 and was a Private in Lt. John W. Hanford's Company of Infantry, 4th Regiment, Burr's Connecticut Militia. He served as a shore guard at Black Rock in Fairfield, and was present during an attack by a British ship upon Capt. Hart's schooner, during which the British were repulsed. He was discharged on Mar. 5, 1815.⁵ At some point, he received land warrants of 40 acres and 120 acres for his service.⁶ No occupation was listed for Hezekiah Mills on the 1850 Census, but both the 1860 and 1870 Censuses listed him as a blacksmith in Westport.

On Mar. 15, 1871, 78-year-old Hezekiah Mills applied for a War of 1812 pension under a law that had been passed one month earlier, and his application was approved for \$8 per month. He died on Nov. 30, 1875 at age 83 in Westport. Six months later, Charity Mills applied for a War of 1812 widow's pension, and was also granted \$8 per month. She died in Westport on Jan. 6, 1884 of old age. For their children and further generations, see Helen Schatvet Ullmann's book, *Descendants of John Mills of Stamford, Connecticut*. Richard Patrick/Partrick (c.1698–1765 +) of Norwalk, CT, and North Salem, NY

After 44 years of trying to prove or disprove the written, handed-down tradition that my seventh great-grandfather Richard Patrick or Partrick was a descendant of Capt. Daniel Patrick, an evaluation of the evidence by Harry Macy, Jr. FGBS, FASG, in early 2011 suggests that there cannot be any connection. So it is back to square one. Finding the origins of Richard before 19 Dec. 1718 when he was married at Swansea, Bristol County, MA, to Mary³ Munrow/Monroe of Bristol, Bristol Co., RI, seems to have hit a brick wall.

The christenings of the first two children of this couple, **John** born c. 1719, and **Catherine**, born c. 1721, have not yet been found. But by 30 May 1724 Richard's cattle mark is registered at Norwalk, CT, and christenings of later children are recorded in Stratford, CT, Christ Church [Anglican] Records 1722-1826. Congregational church records in area towns do not record any earlier entries for baptisms of this family.

One solid clue to the previous place of residence for Richard Patrick was discovered after checking the second recorded deed for him of 7 Feb. 1731/2.² Richard is grantee and pays a consideration of £30 to John Bears/Beers, grantor, of Norwalk for "2 acres precise measure lying in Norwalk near or about the lower end of Chestnut Hill near Smith's Hills with a fraim of a house upon part of ye same." An investigation of this John Bears reveals that the first deed for him as grantee³ dated 1 Dec 1720 states that he is most recently from Bristol, Bristol County, Province of Massachusetts Bay, and that his wife is Martha Munroe/Manroe, a cousin of Mary Munrow who married Richard Patricke. The father and a brother of Mary Munrow Patrick had already migrated to Norwalk, CT. This is the migration trail of another extended family.

Another clue is the christening of a John *Partridge* at Fairfield, CT, as an adult, 30 Nov 1722 by Rev. Samuel Johnson, missionary, in the Stratford Episcopal Church Records 1722-1826. No further data discovered about him.

Between January 1750/1 and 1757 Richard removed to North Salem, Westchester Co., NY, then known as the Upper District of Salem, Cortlandt Manor.⁴ Rent-rolls for Great Lots 9 and 10 North exist, and the latest one for him is dated 5 Jan 1765 after which he may have died there.⁵

The children of Richard and Mary Patrick/Partrick are well documented: **John** b. c. 1719, m. (1) Bethia Fillow 1740 at Norwalk; m.. (2) Deborah Wright c. 1772 at Norwalk; **Catherine**

m. David Olmsted (1725-1759);⁶ **Mehitable** bp. 14 Nov 1727 Christ Ch, Stratford, CT, m. Moses Mead; **Mary** bp. as an infant 14 Mar 1725 at Fairfield,⁷ m. Joseph Randall 23 May 1745 at Norwalk;⁸ **Sarah** m. Hezekiah Dickson 29 Mar 1758;⁹ **?Peter** m. Elizabeth Dickens 17 Jan 1760,¹⁰ age 21 in 1758 when he enlisted in the militia of Capt. Jos. Lobdell's Co., "born Norwalk;" **?Lydia** m. Richard Newton 4 Aug 1765;¹¹ **Thomas** bp. 11 Mar 1744/5 at Norwalk, "son of Richard and Mary," ¹² m. Where did Richard reside before his marriage 19 Dec 1718 at Swansea, Bristol Co., MA? Primary and secondary records for eastern Rhode Island and southeastern Massachusetts have been combed. Where were the first two children christened? Or was he the immigrant? Searches of early passenger lists and immigration materials show men of this name, but without an age or birth date or port of entry, it difficult to sort them out. No connection can be found to other Patrick or Partrick families early to Western, MA/Voluntown, CT, the William Patrick family 1644 at Hartford, CT, nor the Partridge families of Duxbury or Marblehead, MA. Any suggestions for further research would be appreciated.

"The goal of the Great Migration Study Project is to create comprehensive biographical and genealogical accounts of all immigrants to New England from 1620 to 1643, from the arrival of the Mayflower to the decline of immigration resulting from the beginning of the Civil War in England." Robert Charles Anderson has been researching and writing this series since 1988 when the New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) agreed to sponsor the work. This review, prompted by publication of the final volume in the 1634-1635 series, gives an overview of the massive project which includes sketches of over 2,400 immigrants to date.

1. The Great Migration Begins, Immigrants to New England 1620-1633 comprises three volumes and covers over 900 migrants who arrived in the years 1620 to 1633. The first resource used in compiling this series was previously published materials about the individuals or families living in New England.² (See footnote for the major sources consulted in this phase.) Anderson then combed through original source material, i.e., vital, church and probate records, deeds, court records, and much more, collecting other bits of information. He then correlated all of the data and attempted to resolve or explain discrepancies. The information about each person was assembled into a sketch organized by the following topics: Origin, Migration, First Residence, Removes, Return Trips, Occupation, Church Membership, Freeman, Education, Office Holding, Estate, Birth, Marriage, Death, Children, Associations, Comments, Bibliographic Note.

As readers might expect, some people have barely a mention, while others have several pages of data. The "Comments" might include mentions of the individual in correspondence between two other people; might discuss a discrepancy or present an analysis of data; or might provide some details that do not fit neatly into another category. "Bibliographic Note" tells about journal articles or books that include the individual. Regardless of whether one has colonial ancestors, the sketches provide myriad details of daily 17th-century life and reveal the true depth of our historical record. There is, of course, plenty of documentation and a name and place index.

- 2. *The Pilgrim Migration: Immigrants to Plymouth Colony, 1620-1633* highlights 200 or so of the earliest residents of Plymouth (1620-1633). All of these people or families were included in the first series. This volume includes additional material about these 200 and about life in early Plymouth, plus some corrections and revisions from the earlier series. Complete genealogical accounts, including marriages and children of the immigrants, are found here as well.
- 3. After 1633 migration increased exponentially, so the second series, *The Great Migration, Immigrants to New England 1634-1635*, comprising seven volumes, covers only two years. There are approximately 200 sketches in each volume, so the series includes about 1,400 people. The same methodology was used in compiling information and writing the sketches as was used in the first series, and the format is the same.

The first five volumes of this series are searchable at www.americanancestors.org.

4. Throughout most of the time that these books have been in the works, project personnel have been publishing a quarterly newsletter, *Great Migration Newsletter*. Each issue of this publication discusses a focus topic, typically a town in early New England, or sometimes a particular record type. The focus topic takes up half of the 8-page newsletter with the remaining pages dedicated to listing recently published books or journal articles that pertain to the time period. In addition there is a short article about some aspect of research or about insights that have been gained from immersion in the ancient records. Some articles explored by this reviewer were "Household Goods," "Establishing Birth Order," "Focus on Ipswich," "Disciplining Servants," "Focus on Milford." The focus articles are useful and interesting in-depth reviews or histories. The smaller articles are also wonderful pieces that contribute to methodology and general knowledge rather than specifically applying to individuals and are very interesting in terms of history, as well.

Individual newsletters are not indexed. Volumes 11-20 (2002-2011) are available online with a \$10 membership (http://greatmigration.org/newsletter.html) and access to them is well worth the meager cost. They can be downloaded as pdf files. Volumes 1-15 are not available in a digital format. They have been published as a book, which is fully indexed by subject, place and name. Volumes 11-15 have been published in a separate book.

All of the books are available from the New England Historic Genealogical Society in Boston or online (www.americanancestors.org). There are various pricing schedules for individual books or for entire series.

While it refers to articles submitted to that online newsletter, we would encourage submissions to this journal (or indeed to any other reputable genealogical journal) to follow similar guidelines.

Since becoming the editor of New England Ancestors (now American Ancestors) magazine in 2003, I've read many article submissions and thought a great deal about what makes a good story. In this column, I want to encourage you to write down some of your family history in article form. Whether or not you are interested in publication, genealogical research is fun. Genealogical writing can seem like more of a chore, but I urge you to capture some of the stories you've uncovered for yourself, your family, and perhaps for a wider audience. Contemplating a publication that would cover all your ancestors can seem overwhelming and intimidating, but I think that writing up article-length summaries and case studies is more manageable — and it can be beneficial. Some of the rewards of writing down the results of your research are obvious having a clear summary that can be consulted and shared. But there can be some additional benefits. Assigning yourself a fairly limited topic motivates you to make sure you've done all the research you can do. Writing an article almost always increases your knowledge of the family in question. When writing, you are forced to be rigourous, to recheck sources, and make sure your claims can be verified. If your article is selected for publication, you also get input from editors and proofreaders who may question your assumptions or ask questions and draw conclusions that hadn't occurred to you. For American Ancestors [or for Connecticut Ancestry], a successful article:

- Tells a good story that engages readers
- Is focused on a particular topic and doesn't attempt to include all known information on an individual or family
- Often includes an unexpected twist, the solution to a mystery, or some sort of "eureka moment"
- Provides reliable documentation.

If you are writing only for yourself or family members, you may be producing summaries of ancestral lives — useful and necessary material that would not be of sufficient interest for a genealogical publication. But that doesn't mean you can't write up particular ancestors or episodes as if you were writing for a broader audience — family members may well be receptive to a more lively presentation and you can practice a wider range of writing styles. Sometimes I receive article submissions that simply provide a biographical sketch of an ancestor. The documentation may be exemplary but the story isn't likely to catch the interest of a general audience. I often suggest that these writers go through their family lines and select a few people and incidents that have captured their imaginations. When the story is exciting to you, you can make the story exciting for others. Here are some examples of article themes featured in *American Ancestors* [or in *Connecticut Ancestry*]:

- Discovering the truth behind a long-standing family tradition
- Solving a brick wall, especially by using an interesting method or source.
- Using DNA to prove (or disprove) family stories
- Examining the life of an ancestor through a diary or letters
- Documenting a family migration
- Sharing information about an unusual record or set of records
- Relating unusual or unexpected information about ancestors; for instance, a previously unknown criminal background or a hidden marriage
- Telling the story of an ancestor who participated in a significant historical event, like the California gold rush or the Civil War.

113 DICKSON, BISHOP — Looking for the maiden name of Ruth, widow of Gabriel Dickson and second wife of Joseph Bishop, born 30 August 1719 in Stamford, Connecticut. There is a record of Ruth Dickson marrying Joseph Bishop on 29 December 1760 at the South Salem Presbyterian Church (formerly the First Church of Christ in Salem).

A will for Gabriel Dickson of the nearby "Manor of Courtlandt," proved 21 December 1758, names children Rebecca, Lydia, Gabriel, and Hannah. These children, identified in the Salem church records as the children of "widow" Ruth Dickson, were baptized at the Salem church in 1760, several months before their mother married Joseph Bishop in the same church. Since Joseph Bishop and many of the other early members of the South Salem community had previously lived in Connecticut, perhaps Gabriel and Ruth Dickson were also from there, but I've been unable to find anything on them.

The One-Page Challenge

(reprint from August 2011)

As the president of Connecticut Ancestry Society, I have appealed to members and to readers of our journal, *Connecticut Ancestry*, to submit articles for publication. I have said that every ancestor's story is important in the compiled historical record of Fairfield County. I have also said that the best way to ensure that your research will be preserved is to publish it.

Now I am issuing **THE ONE-PAGE CHALLENGE**. I challenge you, members and readers alike, to pick one ancestor, male or female, young or old, and to write a one-page article about that ancestor. The only requirement is that you write about someone who lived in our focus area-Fairfield County or nearby New York—and that the story you write has a connection to that area.

I have thrown down the gauntlet by writing two myself. First, I chose an African-American and son of former slaves, born in South Carolina in 1869, who became a doctor and practiced medicine in Bridgeport for most of the first half of the 20th century. Second, I wrote a piece exemplifying the importance of research our ancestors' siblings.

There is no requirement to keep to a single page, but one page will suffice. Write what you know, write what you can document, write from your heart. Isn't there someone in your lineage that we should all know about, someone with an interesting episode in her life? Or someone with a dull but typical life that will teach us something about history?

We would like you to include genealogical details about your subject. Where and when was he born? Whom did she marry? What was the cause of death and where did it occur? Which censuses show the presence of this person in Fairfield County? Land records? City directories? Tombstone inscriptions?

Documentation is important, but don't worry about precise formatting of footnotes. Our editor Harlan Jessup will help to get those details straightened out. What we need from you is the story and where you got the details. Family Bible? (Where is it now?) US census? (what year and town?) Vital records? (What town?, also volume and page if possible)

Here are some ideas:

- We are in the sesquicentennial period for the Civil War. Do you know of anyone who served?
- The bicentennial of the War of 1812 begins next year. Were your family members affected by this conflict?
- Did an ancestor go to the Gold Rush?
- Did an ancestor immigrate here in the 20th century?
- Did an ancestor settle here in the 17th century?

Sharpen your pencils!! One page is not very long!!
