NEW ENGLAND'S FRANCO-AMERICANS:

VIVE LA DIFFERENCE?

Some say the fight to preserve French identity in New England is being lost without a struggle. But that's only one side of the story

There is a French revolution underway in New England, but it's a revolution without a guillotine. More than a million Franco-Americans are inside, outside, or teetering on the rim of that colossal kettle, the American Melting Pot. Their ancestors explored these shores a century before the Pilgrims, yet, nearly four centuries after the first French settlements in the New World, their descendants are often looked upon as recent arrivals from Europe.

Today, Franco-Americans centered in a dozen New England colleges are fighting to preserve their French heritage as a proud tradition and a valuable national resource. They say cultural diversity adds strength to a society in danger of being homogenized into total blandness.

Many Francos are at odds among themselves on what their self-image should be. "Black is Beautiful" has become as controversial as the Boy Scout's "Be Prepared." "Frog is beautiful" got a Franco-American professor of linguistics almost literally thrown out of Lewiston, Maine.

Lewiston is 60 percent Franco-American, one of the largest concentrations in New England. Not at all coincidentally, it also has the lowest mill wages in New England. Professor Donald Dugas, now of the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, was trying to raise the self-esteem of the French community in Lewiston when he had some "Frog is Beautiful" posters printed up to amuse and get a point across to the younger generation. To older Francos, "Frog" is a term of contempt heard in barroom jokes or from a foreman in a textile mill. A "Frog is Beautiful" poster or bumper sticker revived bitter memories and seemed to be just another put-down.

The "Frog" episode mushroomed into criticism of Professor Dugas' whole federally-funded project to encourage bilingualism among young children in three Lewiston public schools; the project was scuttled a year early. Professor Dugas, from Woonsocket, Rhode Island, was called an "outside troublemaker." Looking back, Professor Dugas says today that he has linguistic theory as well as social psychology on his side. "You don't get rid of ethnic put-downs by keeping them buried. Bring them out in the open and turn them inside-out!"

In recent years, sociologists have joined leaders of ethnic groups in challenging the Melting Pot as one of the fictions of the American Dream, as spurious today as Mom's Apple Pie on a supermarket shelf. They oppose the idea that everyone must conform to a rigid Anglo-Saxon standard of values and beliefs to be a good "American."

For militant Franco-Americans, preservation of cultural identity comes at a particularly heart-wrenching time. The bulwarks of French tradition - the family, the community, the Catholic Church, and the parochial school - are being challenged on all sides. Many Francos feel the battle may be lost without a struggle, as it has been lost by many other ethnic groups in the past.

Most Franco-Americans in New England today are the descendants of thousands of impoverished farm families from the Province of Quebec that poured into the developing mill towns after the Civil War. Franco fathers and their sons and daughters buried themselves in steamy Yankee cotton mills while many "native" New Englanders sought their fortunes in the cities or left for adventure in the west.

Even as the migration from Canada was becoming a flood tide, and Francos and other ethnic groups were being looked upon with suspicion by those who had arrived a few generations earlier, poet Walt Whitman saw the promise they brought with their few material possessions. "These states are the amplest poem." Whitman cried out in his love song to America, "here is not merely a nation but a teeming nation of nations."

One of the major ethnic nations, the French community outnumbers all other racial groups in sections of every New England state. Yet almost nowhere in these communities do people of French heritage hold power in proportion to their numbers. Franco-American janitors outnumber Franco-American teachers in many school systems where children of French descent outnumber other ethnic groups.

In northern Maine, descendants of the Acadians and émigrés from Quebec number 90 percent of the population. Thousands of older residents speak only French. Until less than five years ago, virtually nobody handling state or federal social programs for older citizens was bilingual. A state-supported bookmobile touring the upper St. John valley was stocked with an average of two books for every English reader on the route and one book in French for every 40 Franco-Americans.

Until recently, children in the lower grades in Maine and other New England states were forbidden to speak in the school, or on the playground, the French they heard at home. Older children from Franco families were often the first to fail when they studied French as a "foreign" language in the upper grades or high school. Teachers, insisting upon "pure" Parisian French, conditioned Franco children to feel their background was inferior. Psychologists testing Franco children from Burlington, Vermont, to Biddeford, Maine, found their aspirations and their view of themselves significantly lower than for their Anglo playmates.

Activist Francos are impatient with what they consider the older generation's acceptance of second-class citizenship. "We are our own worst enemies;

when someone starts to rise above the others, we pull him down," says Dr. Michael Dupre, chairman of the sociology department at St. Anselm's College near Manchester, New Hampshire. Dr. Dupre made a study of the power structure of Manchester and found that despite the city's 32 percent Franco population, the banking and legal profession had very few representatives of the French heritage.

Because existing banks and insurance companies made little effort to penetrate the close-knit Franco communities, several French national societies were founded late in the nineteenth century to aid the émigrés from Canada. The Association Canado-Americaine was founded in Manchester in 1896 and L'Union Saint-Jean-Baptiste in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, in 1900. Both maintain extensive libraries. La Caisse Populaire Sainte-Marie, founded in 1905 on the French West Side of Manchester, is considered the oldest savings and loan association in the United States.

In Lewiston, the mayoralty has been in Franco hands for many years, but the real power structure rests with five-man commissions running the various city departments. Even though appointed by Franco mayors, the various commissions have often had few Franco members. Robert Coutourier, a recent mayor, explained to a critic that he could not find enough Franco-Americans qualified and interested in city government.

If there is a crisis in the French communities today - and there are those who see no crisis, just an inevitable loss of identity - it is largely due to the decline of the once powerful parochial school system. Hard economics have closed more than half the Catholic schools in New England. For the French-oriented schools, the once abundant supply of teaching nuns from Quebec, who taught for love of the Faith, has virtually ceased. Wages to lay teachers meant increased tuition to economically hard-pressed Franco families already paying taxes for public schools.

Josephat T. Benoit, nine times mayor of Manchester, recalls his school days early in the century in South Fitchburg, Massachusetts. "My family paid ten cents a week for the first child in St. Francis Parish school. The rate dropped with each additional brother or sister. There were no more charges after the fifth child. There were ten children in our family; it was small for those days. My mother said she wouldn't go on to a dozen."

Benoit, educated at the Sorbonne, had been editor of a French-language newspaper when he first ran for mayor in 1943. "Publishing a French-language newspaper has never been profitable in New England. There have been over 300 newspapers started in the past century, and some lasted only one issue. Franco-Americans don't support French newspapers; they just don't do much reading and, now with television, do even less."

Benoit says probably 75 percent of the Franco-Americans in New Hampshire read the Manchester newspapers published by the controversial William Loeb. Critics of Loeb say, however, that the popular notion that he sways the Franco vote at will with his vitriolic front page editorials is no longer true, if it ever was. They say there is increasing evidence that support from Loeb is a mixed blessing, especially for national offices. Loeb's choice, incumbent Louis Wyman, lost in the runoff U.S. Senatorial contest with John Durkin. In

the much publicized first-in-the nation primary last February, Ronald Reagan, supported by Loeb, lost to President Ford otherwise known as "Jerry the jerk" in the Loeb press. New Hampshire Francos say that the best evidence they no longer can be counted upon to respond as a bloc to ethnic appeals occurred in the Norman D'Amours-David Banks contest for U.S. Representative. Loeb's Union Leader ran an editorial in French appealing to the Franco voters to vote for Banks despite the French background of his opponent. The editorial had the opposite effect - Franco voters joined other citizens in electing D'Amours. A dozen Francos will give you a dozen different reasons why the editorial turned them off. Some criticized the condescending assumption that it was necessary to communicate with Franco voters in French. Even the ongoing debate over "good" or "bad" French, Quebec versus Paris, turned off some voters quite aside from the merits of the candidates.

One of the most eloquent voices for preservation of the French heritage in New England is Dr. Claire Quintal of Assumption College, Worcester, Massachusetts. An intense, dedicated young woman whose grandparents came from Quebec 80 years ago, Dr. Quintal pours energy and fervor into a variety of activities. She is Dean of the Graduate School, director of the Summer School, and associate professor of French at Assumption. Dr. Quintal is also president of the Federation Feminine Franco-Americaine which has branches in every New England state.

Dr. Quintal also heads a Franco-American Ethnic Heritage Studies Program under the Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act. As part of this program, Dr. Paul P. Chasse, a leader in Franco-American activities in Rhode Island, has written a series of studies on contributions of the French to America. These studies include the history and traditions of the French heritage and the role of the church. Dr. Chasse is an adviser on Franco-American affairs to Philip W. Noel, second-term governor of Rhode Island. Noel, chairman of the 1976 Democratic Platform Committee, is the son of a French-Canadian father and an Italian mother. A robust, outspoken type, Noel, 44, put himself through college and law school by digging quahaugs in Narragansett Bay. Francos are proud of the fact that Noel was chosen to head the platform committee. He is the first governor chosen in several decades; the post has usually gone to a Washington politician known for fence-straddling.

Funding for most Franco-American programs in New England comes in large part from the ethnic studies sections of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The program, which applies to a variety of ethnic groups, is defined in the law as an effort "to develop intercultural understanding within our culturally pluralistic society by enabling people to learn more about their own heritage and to study the contributions of the cultural heritages of other ethnic groups of the nation."

Sociologists, psychologists, candidates for advanced degrees in various colleges, nuns, priests, and puzzled or embittered Franco-Americans have long sought to explain the persistence of the Franco culture in New England despite the abrasion of the dominant Anglo-Saxon ethic. A quarter-century ago, John Gunther in his Inside U.S.A. called French-Canadians the "most parochial and unassimilable of all racial groups."

Nearly every study of Franco-Americans begins symbolically on the Plains

of Abraham. Napoleon had his Waterloo, but the French of the New World lost their dream of empire in a battle with the British that lasted only a few minutes in September 1759 on the cliff-top meadows west of Quebec city. The French lost through dissension and treachery in their own ranks. Seventy years of warfare over possession of the continent ended with the opposing generals, Montcalm and Wolfe, both mortally wounded and the French resistance shattered.

Within a decade, the British victors faced an upstart American colony. The vastly outnumbered British bought the submission of their French subjects by freeing them from the usual oath of loyalty to the King as opposed to the Pope, a loyalty enforced by penalty of death for treason against all other British subjects.

Catholic priests, unchallenged by temporal power, insured the continuation of the quiet village way of life that French farmers of the St. Lawrence valley had pursued for a century. Even Dr. Benjamin Franklin, the distinguished ornament of the French court, could not persuade the French of Canada to join the American rebellion. The French troops that fought alongside Washington's army at Yorktown were from France, not Canada. The Royal French Navy in the Chesapeake insured colonial victory by cutting off Cornwallis' escape by sea.

With the exception of an abortive rebellion in 1837, the French of Canada were lost to the history books for a century. English immigrants pursued commerce in the growing cities. The French farmers plowed their narrow river-front acres, the spire of the parish church looming in the distance, a guide to straight furrows and an almost medieval way of life.

Students of population statistics have always been puzzled and fascinated by the fertility of the French-Canadians; less than 10,000 peasants, mostly from the Atlantic coastal provinces of France, doubled their population nearly every generation in North America. An early inducement of 200 extra acres to householders with 18 children was paid off twice over several times, inevitably at the expense of several wives. The coureurs de bois of romantic legend, the runners of the forest, were required to pick a wife within 15 days if they tarried in the settlements between their furtrading forays into the wilderness.

After the British conquest, "Revanche des Berceaux" - the Revenge of the Cradle - kept the French population ahead of the tide of British immigration. Midway through the nineteenth century, the gloomy predictions of Parson Thomas Malthus bore bitter fruit. The farm population of Quebec began to outstrip the productivity of the soil. Younger sons, with little hope of an inheritance, left their villages for jobs in the New England mills. Working from dawn to dark and being paid in cash, however low the wages, was preferable to endless toil on the family farm.

Within a few years, whole families joined the exodus. Many planned to return to their home villages after they had earned enough to improve their farms or buy extra acres. With the passage of years, the dream of returning home grew dim. Mill owners found the French-Canadians willing to accept low pay, long hours and crowded living conditions. Recruiters toured remote Quebec villages earning \$5 for every family sent south to a mill in the promised land.

By the 1880's, whole trainloads of Francos were going south, the conductors often locking the doors lest bewildered villagers unable to speak English wander off during stops in Burlington or St. Johnsbury. The large families carried all their possessions with them. The father usually had a big burlap bag of clothes, mother a prized clock, and every child a bundle according to his or her size. When three families with 18 children each got off the evening train in Manville, Rhode Island, a century ago, the local population almost doubled.

The devout Francos found New England Catholic churches very much in the possession of the Irish. Many drifted away from the church when they were unable to understand the sermons. Eventually, priests from Quebec came down to head French parishes, but friction existed for years. In Canada, the parishes had been virtually free to handle their own funds. In New England, they were under the more rigid control of the bishop. Open defiance of Bishop Hendricken broke out in Fall River in 1885, against Bishop Walsh in Maine in 1911, and for several years in the 1920's against Bishop Hickey of Rhode Island. Leaders of the various rebellions were excommunicated, and some Franco clergy exiled. Maine only recently had its first Franco-American bishop, Amedee Proulx, although the Catholic population of Maine is about two-thirds Franco.

"La Survivance" was for years the rallying cry of those who sought to preserve the French identity in New England; this meant primarily the language. "The loss of language means the loss of Faith and the loss of Faith means the loss of Heaven" was preached to young and old alike. Surrounded by an alien culture, the Francos stayed within their familiar surroundings and, unlike the Irish, took little interest in politics.

Norman Sepenuk, a graduate student at Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government, checked voting lists for the City of Lowell, Massachusetts, for 1883 and found that less than 4 percent of an estimated 12,000 Franco-Americans, mostly mill workers, had registered to vote. There were no Franco lawyers in Lowell then, and only three some ten years later when the Franco population had nearly doubled.

Today, Franco-American parents in New England have a sentimental interest in "La Survivance" but, in the public schools, French, if taught at all, is taught in the upper grades as a foreign language. The children would rather eat in the nearest McDonald's than have a "tourtiere" (meat pie) cooked at home by a grandmother who learned the art on a coal stove as a girl.

Retired Mayor Benoit is one of the few older Francos who has sought to probe the Franco role in New England. "Centuries of rural life have conditioned Francos to be reluctant to enter political life where timidity gains no votes. Francos often show jealousy towards their own countrymen who push themselves forward. They are suspicious of other ethnic groups, and emotional rather than rational. Sir Wilfred Laurier, former governor-general of Canada, had a saying: "In Quebec there are no political opinions; there are only feelings."

Louis Martel, of Manchester, is one of the elder statesmen of Franco-American politics in New England. A veteran of 20 years in the state legislature, he served 16 years as a representative and four as a senator. During a debate on an anti-discrimination bill in the House, Martel told his fellow members, "I am considered a foreigner. I was born in Manchester. My ancestors have been on this continent three centuries. I have Indian blood in my veins and that of the Yankees who faced the British in 1775. I am just as proud of my Yankee blood as I am of Joan of Arc." Martel grins as he recalls that, a day or so later, he received an invitation to join the Sons of the American Revolution.

Martel is a former president of the Richelieu Club, an international French service club. While in France on presidential duties, Martel was chagrined to find it was assumed he was from Belgium because of his accent. "When I said Manchester, they assumed I must mean Manchester, England. The French are about as ignorant of our history as many Franco-Americans are of theirs."

Martel thinks the only hope for encouraging bilingualism among young Francos in New England is subsidized cable television from Quebec. In recent years, some public television stations in Maine, and near colleges in other New England areas, have carried programs in French originating in Quebec, but few have had the financial backing to last very long. Non-Franco radio listeners in northern New England say one happy feature of programs from Quebec is that the commercials are in French and hence less irritating. Martel often tells visitors: "What a beautiful language French is, like a song to the ears!"

Prof. Marron C. Fort of the University of New Hampshire has made a detailed study of the effects of a federally-financed bilingual program among young Franco-American school children in Greenville, a small southern New Hampshire mill town. Dr. Fort found that while the children of Francophone parents spoke French among themselves and at home with their parents and grandparents, the arrival of just one English-speaking child in a play group led everyone to shift to English, the language of a "good American."

"One cannot discount the 'milieu pressure' exerted by English, which is the language of work in Greenville," says Dr. Fort. "The Anglo world of jobs, stores, schools, and the media seems to have a greater reality than the Franco world of 'Memere' and 'Pepere.' French becomes the language of the playground, nursery, holidays and visits, but not the language of practical achievement and success. Launched into an entirely English-speaking environment, the Franco child's language difficulties seem so bizarre to his Anglophone teachers that they are never really understood."

Ridiculed for faulty English, the Franco child would tend to retreat into silence, resigned to being ignored. The child came to fit the stereotype of the docile, passive Franco-American youngster. "Most of his Anglophone teachers considered him another 'dumb Canuck' without ambition and were quite willing to leave him to the shoe shop and mill."

Professor Fort traced further developments in the growth of the Franco child. He tended to be both ashamed and protective of his parents. "Within the closeness of Franco-American family life, feelings of inferiority are compensated by lowering of career expectations; this makes the shock of failure less difficult to bear." In time, older Francos are reluctant to speak at length in public, lacking confidence in their mastery of English. Many even view the standard French of public schools "as an unattainable goal beyond their social status, a desirable but expendable luxury. In any discussion of the Francophone problem in New England, we are confronted with the problem of the quality of the French spoken in the region."

Bilingual teachers under the federal program were more understanding of the problems of the Franco children, and in time the parents were won over to the need for a new approach. By contrast, traditional pedagogy of New England public schools had been to "turn the Franco child into a willing little empty shell ready to be filled up with 'Americanism.' The whole procedure was about as effective as preparing for racial integration in a school by adding watermelon to the cafeteria lunch menu."

Looking beyond Greenville, Professor Fort says, "If the United States is to be a partner in the world, as well as a leader, it must exchange not just ideas but language with its neighbors. It is the worst kind of arrogance to assume everyone speaks English and is always perfectly happy to do so."

Nostalgia may be the strongest factor in the dream of La Survivance for older Franco-Americans, but in Maine, possibly because of proximity to the French renaissance in Quebec, younger Francos look upon their heritage as a philosophy and a way of life.

"French culture values the trip, not just the destination," says Yvon Labbe of the University of Maine at Orono. "'Getting there is half the fun' isn't just a travel poster slogan. Maybe it's time Americans took another look at their values in life, instead of running themselves ragged piling up material junk. If nothing else, ecology and conservation would benefit from more concern with living and less emphasis upon consumption."

Many younger Francos in Maine point out that perhaps the nation would not have embarked upon so many attempts to reform the world in their own image - of which Vietnam is the classic example - if there had been more appreciation of the richness and diversity of other cultures.

Labbe is director of the Franco-American Resource Opportunity Group which, among other activities, publishes a bilingual monthly F.A.R.O.G. Forum. The FAROG group has promoted Franco-American activities in every New England state, trained bilingual teachers, and devised bilingual curricula for various age groups.

Claire Bolduc, a FAROG member, has pioneered work among patients in the Bangor Mental Health Institute. Studies in Quebec and New England both indicate a higher percentage of Franco-American women are troubled and frustrated trying to cope with today's problems. Psychiatrists say Franco women, like

women in general, have fewer outlets for self-expression than men. Traditionally, French girls were better educated than their brothers, who left school early to work in the fields or woods. "Any education is good enough to be a farmer" was a common saying in rural Quebec. With better education, Franco women often had higher expectations, yet less opportunity to find expression. Claire, like many Francos, has Indian blood in her heritage. Articulate and energetic, she says many Franco women today are trapped "like a fly in amber, back in the eighteenth century."

The St. John Valley in northernmost Maine is the most French-oriented section of New England, with over 90 percent of the people of French heritage. Most of the population are descended from Acadians evicted from the Maritime Provinces by the British two centuries ago. Until the development of the recent Federal Ethnic Heritage programs, little effort was made in the public schools to communicate with beginning children in the language they learned in their homes. Taught to be ashamed of their backgrounds, Franco children had a dropout rate many times that of children from English-speaking homes. Under bilingual teaching programs using French as a learning tool, a "Pygmalion effect" develops. The child, responding to a better image of himself, becomes more responsive to learning in general. Educators often note that teachers who believe in the rich potential of a group of children will evoke that very potential in their classroom attitude and technique.

Roger Paradis, a linguistics professor, has raced against time in northern Maine to tape-record the folklore of the oldest inhabitants, Paradis says, "Folklore was the crabgrass of academia until recently, when several universities started to classify this abundance of oral knowledge." Paradis has recorded hundreds of fascinating tales, songs, and legends the old folks learned in childhood - the accumulated culture of a people almost illiterate for three centuries. Paradis has found many instances where tales told by elders helped to explain incidents in the early history of the Acadians.

Today, the French of northern Maine are breaking out of two centuries of cultural isolation. A young Franco says, "The old people say we are living in the forgotten end of New England. Even Route 1, which starts in Florida, ends in Fort Kent. We are trying to make the children proud of their valley. We say we are the beginning, not the end, of a 2500-mile highway from Maine to Florida."

The late Jack Kerouac was born of Franco-American parents in Lowell. His On the Road established him as the philosopher-poet of the "Beat Generation" of the fifties. Some younger Franco-Americans say the restless inner rage that eventually consumed Kerouac was a frustration born of his cultural duality, and the misdirected education he received from the good nuns of Saint Louis de France school on Boisvert Street. In Doctor Sax, Kerouac wrote of the mystery, joy, and terror of a hypersensitive adolescence in the tenements of Lowell. One character, Scotty Boldieu, symbolizes the Franco struggle to escape his ghetto. A sandlot pitcher with major league promise, Boldieu throws up a contract with the Boston Braves to return to Lowell to sit in a bleak kitchen with his wife and mother-in-law and stare at religious calendars on the wall. Critics have compared Kerouac to Walt Whitman and Thomas Wolfe

for the intensity of his talent and rejection of establishment values. The establishment, in turn, rejected Kerouac. A 1972 publication, sponsored by a Franco-American citizens committee extolling prominent Francos of Lowell, devoted one sentence to Kerouac under "French culture" but found room for a full page on a strong man and a contortionist.

Dr. Quintal is one of many younger Francos who see in Kerouac an almost spiritual vigor in the breadth and passion of his talent. "The very term 'beat' to describe his generation may well have come from the Biblical 'Beatitudes'. Kerouac had a mystical sense of his heritage."

Dr. Quintal was in Paris in May of 1968 during the revolt of university students and witnessed their explosive challenge to the national lethargy. "Bold graffiti expressed the students' fervor during those hectic, impassioned days. Sprayed in red ink on the walls of the Odeon-Theatre de France, where Beaumarchais' Mariage de Figaro had signalled the outbreak of the French Revolution, was 'La culture est en miettes.' (Culture has crumbled to dust). On the wall of the Sorbonne was 'Participez a l'agitation culturelle.'

"The students were convinced French society and its culture had reached a point of no return. We who are Franco-Americans must ask ourselves that self-same question. We must make a cultural turnaround with all the upheaval, excitement, stirrings, discussion, and general agitation of Paris in 1968. We are a proud and tenacious breed, but our 'pride' has been turned inward and fraught with misgivings. We must meet the challenge of preserving our culture, but not by dwelling in a self-made intellectual ghetto."

Young Francos and many of their elders say they can meet that challenge. The younger Francos in New England are tossing in an extra measure of the "joie de vivre" that sustained their ancestors in the long Canadian winters and the hard toil of the summers.

Perhaps Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, the French Jesuit priest, mystic, and paleontologist who died on Easter Sunday 1955, best expressed the longing within the French heart. In large letters on the wall of Yvon Labbe's office at the University of Maine in Orono is this quotation from Teilhard:

Some day - after mastering the winds, the waves, the tide and gravity - we shall harness for God the energies of love and then, for the second time in the history of the world, man will have discovered fire.

FRENCH CANADA AND THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Each ethnic group has good reason to be proud of its roots and of its unique contributions to our society. Americans of French-Canadian descent have had a special, but not favored, relationship with the United States, extending from colonial times through the Revolutionary War to the present day.

Perhaps the least well-known aspect of the Quebec-American relationship is the role of French Canada in our Revolutionary War. In pre-Revolution colonial America, French Canada and the English colonists to the south were economic competitors whose rivalry spilled over into the French and Indian Wars. Nevertheless, the French of New France played a pivotal role in defining the geographical limits of the United States.

As early as 1606, fourteen years before the Pilgrims arrived in Massachusetts, Samuel de Champlain mapped the New England coast, engaging in battle with the Nauset Indians on Cape Cod. The exploration of the Mississippi by Joliet and Marquette, LaSalle's explorations, the founding of New Orleans by the LeMoynes, and the establishment of Detroit by Cadillac placed a French mark on America which persists, in some degree, to this day.

Americans of French-Canadian descent who have engaged in genealogical research identify personally with these events. In my own case, Louis Hebert, who accompanied Champlain, is among my ancestors, as is the LeMoynes family. (The Schenectady, N.Y., massacre in 1690 by a French and Indian force, alas, was led by a LeMoynes.) For French-Canadians, American history and family history intertwine.

It must be acknowledged, however, that the French and English societies in North America were quite different. The French was Catholic; the English was marked by a pluralistic Protestantism. The French was centralized and militarily-oriented; the English was materialistic and decentralized to the point of disarray.

When the American Revolution began in 1775, differences between the English and French colonists and their long rivalry became obstacles to cooperation. By then, Canada was under British rule as the "14th colony," and rebellious American colonists were making strong propaganda efforts to enlist the French of Quebec—referring to them as "friends and fellow-subjects"—in their cause.

U.S. rebels were confronted by a major hurdle: Their Congress had vigorously opposed the Quebec Act, a law enacted by the British Parliament in 1774 which restored the Roman Catholic religion plus the French language and civil law to Quebec. A resolution by the Continental Congress had described the Act as "dangerous in an extreme degree to the Protestant religion and to civil rights." As a result, the Catholic hierarchy in Quebec, led by Bishop Briand, adamantly opposed the revolutionists' aims.

French Canada and the American Revolution (con't)

The bulk of the Canadian clergy—except for Jesuits—supported Bishop Briand. The Jesuits, as independent then as they are now, were heavily influenced by American Catholics, especially by Father John Carroll (who later founded Georgetown University, a Jesuit institution, in 1789) and his brother, Charles Carroll, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. The pro-American writings of the French philosopher Montesquieu also appealed to them. Among Quebec's general population, however, appeals for support of the Revolution by the Marquis de LaFayette and the King of France achieved little success.

The majority of French-Canadians remained neutral, but many were active supporters of either the revolutionists or the loyalists. Two American regiments were created from French-Canadian volunteers, one headed by Colonel James Livingston of Columbia County, N.Y., and the other by Colonel Moses Hazen of Massachusetts. Hazen's regiment, the more prominent of the two, opposed British troops near New York City and in Montreal during the 1775 invasion of Canada. When the Revolutionary War ended, the French-speaking soldiers (now outcasts in Quebec and excommunicated by the Catholic church as well) were granted large plots of land in Champlain County, N.Y.

Within Quebec itself, the Montreal and Trois-Rivieres areas were hotbeds of sympathy for the American Revolution. In June 1776, for example, the entire militia of Ste.-Genevieve-de-Batiscan (my family's hometown at that time) was disciplined for its American sympathies. All of the commissioned and noncommissioned officers were dismissed. (It should be noted that the pro-American Jesuits were the seigneurs of Ste.-Genevieve.)

It's interesting to speculate whether French-Canadians would have joined the American rebels en masse if the Quebec Act had been embraced by the American Congress instead of condemned. Prior to its passage by Parliament, the tiny English-Canadian minority in Quebec regularly attempted to subjugate the French-speaking majority, even proposing creation of an elective assembly from which Catholic Canadians would be excluded. London saved Quebec with its judiciously timed Act. Realizing this, English authorities later wrote the Canadian Governor-General Carleton, "It was the Catholic clergy who saved the Province of Quebec for the King" during the American Revolution.

WAR OF 1812 VETERANS OF MILITARY SERVICE WITH CANADIAN FORCES (Con't)

The June 1983 CML reproduced a 16-page listing, first published in the 1876 Dominion Sessional Papers at Ottawa, of applicants who applied for the \$20 government bonus belatedly authorized in 1875 for Canadian militia veterans of the War of 1812. Beginning on the next page is an additional listing of 1,098 individuals arranged in general alphabetical sequence by surname (Fontaine to McKercher). The remaining 15-page listing of bonus applicants will appear in the June 1984 CML.

Of 3,012 applicants named on the 1876 list, 2,554 were able to validate their wartime service. The cases of 127 applicants were disallowed for failure to provide adequate proof of their former militia status. The claims of 343 other individuals were rejected for: 1) Wartime service in British regular units; 2) Current residency in the United States, or; 3) Having the misfortune to die while their applications were being processed. The oldest applicant, incidentally, was 104; the youngest, 72 years of age.

A CAPSULE HISTORY OF THE FRENCH CATHOLIC PRESENCE IN CONNECTICUT

- 1524: John Verrazano, sailing for France in the frigate "Dauphin," reached the North American coast in early 1524. He landed at many points along the eastern shoreline and was the first known white man to enter New York harbor. Verrazano's journey took him along the present-day New England coast and the Italian explorer may even have landed on the shores of Connecticut (O'Donnell, p. 32).
- 1650: New England was designated an apostolic prefecture under the charge of the French Capuchin order (Catholic Almanac, p. 461, 1975 edition).
- 1651: The Reverend Gabriel Druillets, S.J., was probably the first Catholic priest to visit Connecticut. An ambassador of the governor-general of Canada, he participated in a New England Council held at New Haven (Catholic Almanac, p. 460, 1975 edition).
- 1653: In this year, a French physician named Dr. Chayes was residing in New Haven (O'Donnell, p. 50).
- 1662: A French family by the name of Modlin appears in the town records of Stratford, Ct. (O'Donnell, p. 50).
- 1755: Catholic Acadians expelled from Nova Scotia settled in Connecticut. Janet Jehn, in Acadian Exiles, lists 666 of them; six of the Acadian refugees were assigned to Waterbury. Who they were and what became of them are not known. The Reverend James H. O'Donnell mentions their presence in Connecticut (O'Donnell, pp. 63-76).
- Summer, 1778: The Marquis de Lafayette traveled frequently through Waterbury. In neighboring Middlebury, he was a guest at the home of Captain Isaac Bronson (O'Donnell, pp. 88-92, has more on Lafayette in Connecticut).
- 1780-82: The Marquis de Chastellux, a major-general in the army of Count Rochambeau, wrote his impressions of the colonies. Chastellux made his tour of the state in November of 1780 (O'Donnell, pp. 92-94).
- 1780-81: From 1 December 1780 thru 23 June 1781, the Legion of the Duke de Lauzon, numbering 1,100 infantrymen and 500 mounted Hussars, established winter quarters at Lebanon, Ct. It was doubtless there that Mass was first celebrated on a regular basis within Connecticut. On 26 June 1781, St. Peter's Church in Hartford observed the "centenary of the first Mass in Connecticut." The officiating priest at that first Mass was Père Robin. The site was "near where the Memorial Church of the Good Shepherd now stands" (Duggan, p. 13). A Duc de Lauzon Legion exists in Middlebury, Ct., near Waterbury.
- 1780: September 20. George Washington met with General Rochambeau, Admiral De Ternay, General Chastellux, Count de Fersen, and Rochambeau's son, the Viscount de Rochambeau. General Lafayette served as interpreter

for Washington, who could neither speak nor understand French. The meeting took place in front of Colonel Wadsworth's mansion, now the Athanaeum. The treason of Benedict Arnold frustrated the plans made at this conference (O'Donnell, p. 78).

- 1781: May 21. Rochambeau, Count de Barras, and the Chevalier de Chastellux met with George Washington, General Knox, and General Duportail (a French officer holding a Continental Army commission). They met at the Webb House in Wethersfield, Ct. It was agreed that French and American forces would unite on the Hudson River as soon as possible.
- 1781: Rochambeau's chaplain, Abbe Robin, undoubtedly said Mass daily, as did several other French chaplains during the French army's march through Connecticut—from 19 June thru 4 July 1781. Encampments took place at Waterman's Tavern in Coventry, June 18; Plainfield, June 19; Windham, June 20; Bolton, June 21; East Hartford, June 22; Farmington, June 25; Baron's (now Barnes' Tavern) in Southington, June 26 (Waterbury was on the march route between Southington and Middlebury); Breakneck Hill in Middlebury, June 27; Newton, June 28; Ridgefield (Danbury), July 1. The troops then marched into New York State. One thousand men from this contingent had been previously ordered by Rochambeau to remain at Newport, R.I. After spending the winter of 1781 in Lebanon, Ct., the Duke de Lauzon, with some 600 cavalrymen, took a southerly route to protect the main French army.
- Two French soldiers of Rochambeau died in Waterbury during the march and are buried in the East Farm Cemetery (behind 3656 West Main Street) along with 15 enlisted men of the Continental Army. A granite gravestone, erected in their honor in 1914, has been called "the largest and most handsome of the Rochambeau monuments in Connecticut." The Pierpont family has been caring for the cemetery for several generations (Bologna, Encore of a Grand March, p. 5).
- 1778-83: The aid rendered by Catholic France during the American Revolution also contributed to a greater toleration of Catholics in the primarily Protestant American colonies.
- 1785: New England was home for about 600 Catholics from among 44,500 members of that faith then living in the U.S. (O'Donnell, p. 9).
- 1791: A total of 120 Catholics was then residing in Connecticut (Duggan, pp. 14-15).
- 1790: April 6. The Catholic see of Baltimore was established and the Right Reverend John Carroll, D.D., consecrated as spiritual leader on August 15. Connecticut came under his jurisdiction. Father Carroll visited this state, after a brief stay in Boston, and arrived at New London on or before Sunday, June 19 (O'Donnell, p. 116).

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- 1793: Norwich, Ct., was first visited by a Catholic priest, the Reverend John Thayer, in November 1793. A native of Boston, he was a convert from Congregationalism. Father Thayer was ordained at the Seminary of St. Sulpice in Paris, France, in 1789. During his missionary tour of the U.S., he probably visited New London, Hartford, New Haven, and other towns where Catholics resided (O'Donnell, p. 117).
- 1796: January 24. Roman Catholics in the Nutmeg State were served by two French priests during the American Revolution. An advertisement in the Connecticut Journal of 28 January 1796, written in French and English, informed Catholics that "two priests are now in New Haven to serve them." (Les Francais sont advertis qu'il y a un Pretre Catholique en ville. On le demandera chez Monsieur Kimberly, rue de l. Chapelle, New Haven. Tr., The French are informed that there is a Catholic priest in town. He may be seen at the home of Mr. Kimberly, 1 Chapel Street, New Haven.) Were these Acadian priests? Their names aren't known. According to one reference source, "There were also many French refugees in New London at the end of the 18th century." (O'Donnell, pp. 258-262)
- 1797: Monsieur l'Abbe Souge became chaplain to the family of the Viscount De Sibert Cormellon near Hartford. It isn't known how long he stayed in that city. The abbot died at Mayenne, France, on 1 October 1823.
- 1808: The Boston Catholic diocese was established; Connecticut was included in its jurisdiction. Bishop John Lefebvre de Cheverus, ordained on 18 December 1790, served as Bishop of Boston from 1810-23. He returned to France and was made a cardinal in 1836 (Duggan, pp. 26-30).
- 1818: Religious freedom is established in Connecticut by a new Constitution. In practice, Congregationalism remained the preferred religion in this state (Catholic Almanac, p. 478, 1975 edition).
- 1829: The first Catholic Church was founded in Connecticut: Holy Trinity in Hartford (Duggan, p. 40).
- 1829: The Catholic press of Hartford was established.
- 1829: August 26. The Reverend Bernard Cavanaugh became the first resident priest of Connecticut with jurisdiction over the entire state. He was appointed by Bishop Fenwick of Boston (Catholic Almanac, p. 460, 1975 edition).
- 1831: There were Irish Catholics in Waterbury as early as 1831: Timothy Corcoran, Cornelius Donnelly, James Martin. Among other family names: Casey, Flynn, Connors, Neville, Griffin, Grier, Donahue, Reilly. From 1839 to 1841, the Delavan, Delaney, Kildugg, Whelan, and Claffrey families joined the growing community of Catholics. At first, these early parishioners went on foot to Mass at St. John the Evangelist Church (then known as Christ Church) in New Haven, some 20 miles

- away. The Church had stations at Bridgeport, Derby, and Waterbury (O'Donnell, p. 382).
- 1831: The first priest to visit Waterbury was the Reverend James Fitton who came from Hartford. It's possible that he said Mass in one of the homes he visited (O'Donnell, p. 382).
- 1832: In Waterbury, the Reverend James McDermott said Mass at the home of Cornelius Donnelly. This angered the Protestant owner of the house who forbade further worship there.
- 1834: Ludger Duvernay founded the Societe Saint-Jean-Baptiste in Montreal, Canada, to unite or federate existing French-background organizations. There is such a society in New Britain today. It shouldn't be confused with the Union Saint-Jean-Baptiste, started in 1898 at Woonsocket, R.I.
- 1835: The present-day American School for the Deaf in West Hartford was founded by Dr. Thomas Gallaudet (Duggan, p. 22).
- 1837: The Reverend James Smyth became pastor of Christ Church in New Haven. Father John Brady of Hartford and Reverend Smyth traveled on horseback to reach Catholic worshippers.
- 1837 thru 1845: Mass was said for Waterbury Catholics in the home of Michael Neville on East Main Street, located at the corner of Spring Street (O'Donnell, p. 382).
- 1839: David Mix led a group whose aim was to drive the Irish from Waterbury because they were taking jobs which would otherwise go to native-born Americans. The plot was foiled by another Protestant, a Mr. Elton. It was the only serious attempt to oust the community's Catholics.
- 1843: November 28. The Catholic diocese of Hartford is established.
- 1844: March 17. The first bishop of Hartford is consecrated, the Right Reverend William Tyler. He died on 18 June 1949.
- 1845: The Reverend and Mrs. Charles Fabrique came to Waterbury. The Reverend Fabrique (1817-89), a Southbury native of French Huguenot ancestry, arrived in Waterbury as a minister and principal of the Waterbury Academy, the community's first private school. It occupied a stone building on the town green.
- 1847: Catholics in Waterbury purchased a plot of land for burial purposes in the present Library Park area on Meadow Street. Tombstones can still be seen along the Meadow Street wall.
- 1847: October. The first Catholic resident pastor arrived in Waterbury: The Reverend Michael O'Neill, 1847-55. He's credited with founding

- the first Catholic Church in that community. Pastor O'Neill celebrated the first Mass at St. Peter's Church on 25 December 1847 (O'Donnell, p. 376). St. Peter's was later changed to Immaculate Conception Church (see also the 1857 entry).
- 1851: Bishop Bernard O'Reilly administered the sacrament of Confirmation for the first time in Waterbury to 200 children (O'Donnell, p. 384).
- 1853: August 21. The first Frenchman married in Waterbury was Ludovic Mil-laux, born in France, and Elisa Alvord, a Cornwall, Ct., native. The presiding clergyman was the Reverend B. Pilsbury (R.R. Bisailon re-search).
- 1853: St. Mary's Parish in Windsor Locks was founded. The church had 1,900 members by 1899—including 1,600 Irish persons and about 300 Italians and French. St. Mary's school was organized in 1868 by the Reverend Smyth; the Sisters of St. Joseph were in charge. This religious community of nuns was founded on 10 March 1651 by Monsignor de Maupas and Father Medaille, S.J., at LePuy, France. The sisters arrived in the diocese in August 1889 (O'Donnell, p. 257). St. Mary's, incidentally, was the parish of the late respected Governor Ella Grasso.
- 1855: St. Peter's Parish, Waterbury, received its second resident pastor, the Reverend Thomas F. Hendricken (1855-72) (O'Donnell, p. 385).
- 1856: St. Patrick's Parish in Collinsville was founded for Irish Catholics, as were many of the early parishes in this state. The church—with an initial congregation of 140 members—was dedicated on 22 August 1852. St. Patrick's officially became a parish on 10 December 1856. By the end of that year, there were 500 parishioners, mainly Irish and some French Canadians. By 1898 the congregation had risen to 1,100—comprising 500 Irish, 400 Canadians, 100 Germans, and 100 Poles (O'Donnell, p. 225).
- 1857: July 5. The cornerstone of Waterbury's Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God Church was laid. On 19 December 1857, the name of St. Peter's Parish was changed in honor of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception proclaimed on 8 December 1854. Bishop Francis P. McFarland officiated (O'Donnell, p. 385).
- 1857: December 1. The Reverend Hendricken purchased the old St. Joseph's Cemetery in Waterbury.
- 1859: February 15. The first French Catholic marriage took place in Waterbury: Xavier C. Weis, age 30, born in France, and Ann Loughman. Reverend Hendricken performed the ceremony (R.R. Bisailon research).
- 1859: Founding of All Hallow's Parish in Moosup. A small group of Irish settled in that area around 1833. About 1848 the first Mass in Moo-

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sup was offered by the Reverend William Logan, S.J., of Holy Cross College, Worcester, in the home of Michael Smith. From that time, Masses were celebrated in private homes every two or three months. A church was built in 1859-60 by the Reverend Philip Daly. The parish comprised the towns of Sterling, Plainfield, Griswold, Canterbury, Hampton, and part of Killingly. By 1900 there were 1,500 members, primarily Irish and French-Canadians (O'Donnell, pp. 437-438). In 1980 the Daughters of the Holy Spirit order was in charge of the parish school.

1860: According to the U.S. Census that year, there were 3,145 French Canadians in Connecticut, all natives of Canada.

1860: Founding of St. Joseph's Parish in Willimantic. French-Canadian Catholics attended St. Joseph's until they founded St. Mary's Parish in 1903.

1860: September 4. St. Peter's School was established in Waterbury as a public school qualified to teach religion to Catholic students. It remained open only for a short time.

1861-65: French-Canadian immigration to the U.S. increased during the Civil War years. Manufacturing industries attracted the Franco newcomers and they founded many church, social, and benevolent groups in Connecticut.

In 1865 a few delegates representing Connecticut participated in the Canadian Convention of Societe Saint-Jean-Baptiste at New York. Fourteen years later in 1879, Ferdinand Gagnon, editor of the French-language newspaper, Le Travailleur (The Worker), convoked a convention at Worcester, Mass. Dr. Omer Larue of Putnam cited the difficult situation then existing in Connecticut: There was not one French-Canadian priest in the entire state. Moreover, few Franco-American students were receiving French language instruction in local schools.

French-Canadian conventions began to attract leaders from Franco-phone communities. Banquets, concerts, eloquent oratory, theatrical presentations, folk songs, and folk dances brought out a stronger regard for France, Canada, and the U.S. among attendees at these conventions (archives of Union des Franco-Américains du Connecticut).

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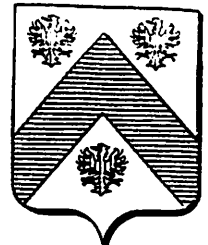

Judging from the surname listing that accompanies this article, a number of French-Canadian families are in the unique position of being related to some well-known royal lines of Europe. And they can thank a Quebec habitant named Jacques Miville (? -1688). He was the son of a master-carpenter from La Rochelle, France, called Pierre Miville dit Le Suisse, who died at Quebec in 1669. Jacques' mother was Charlotte (Maugis) Miville.

Cyprien Tanguay's Dictionnaire Généalogique Canadienne-Français describes the elder Miville as "Captain of the shoreline settlement at Lauzon," located just across the St. Lawrence River from modern-day Quebec City. Pierre was evidently a local leader in charge of military defenses. Miville's dit name itself points to his being of Swiss-French origin.

Pierre's son Jacques introduced the oldest pedigrees of European royalty into the bloodlines of many Canadian families through the children of his marriage at Quebec on 12 November 1669 to Catherine de Baillon (1645-), daughter of Alphonse de Baillon, Lord de Mascotterie, and Louise (de Marle) de Baillon.

The parents of Catherine never came near New France but remained residents of Montfort-la-Morille near Chartres, 48 miles southwest of Paris. They must certainly have been upset over their daughter's marriage to a commoner—considering the rigid class distinctions of that day and age.

Both the Baillon and Marle families were old nobility and occupied posts of importance under the French monarchy, particularly as Secretaries to the King. That information comes from Dictionnaire Nationale des Canadiens-Français, Volume II, published at Ottawa by Institut Généalogique Drouin in a revised edition of 1977.

The de Marle family appears historically in the person of Louis de Mâle (sic), Count of Flanders, grandson of a king of France, Philippe V. (ca. 1294-1322). Louis died in 1383 and, the following year, his Countship of Flanders was acquired by son-in-law Philippe the Bold, Duke of Burgundy, and husband of Margaret de Mâle (see the accompanying Table No. 9, entitled "The House of Burgundy").

Through this de Marle connection to the Capetian dynasty of King Philippe V., French-Canadian descendants can trace their roots to even earlier royal lines, beginning with the Merovingian dynasty of ancient Gaul (see also Tables 1 thru 9; Tables 10 thru 16 will appear in a subsequent issue of CML).

So in order to claim kinship to European royalty, you must link your own family to the Quebec offspring of Jacques Miville's 1669 marriage with

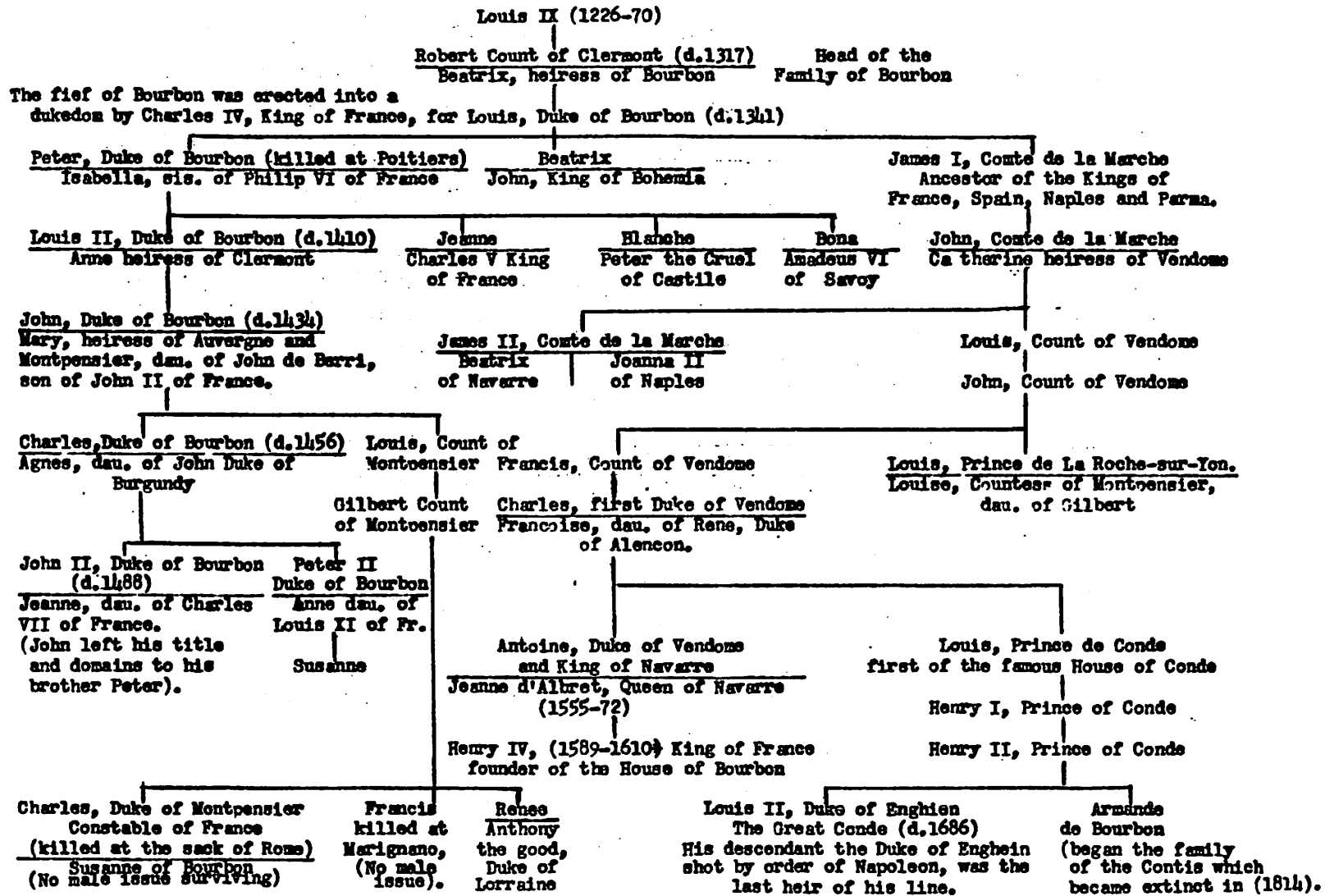

Catherine de Baillon. Three of their sons and one daughter left descendants via the 14 French-Canadian families into which they married: Autin, Berube, Delage, Duval, Lisotte or Lizot, Mignot, Morin, Ouellet, Richard, Roy, Saucier, Soucy, Thibaut, and Villiards.

From that point, other French-Canadian families began intermarrying with paternal-side grandchildren of Jacques Miville. Based on a study of those lines alone—as cited in Tanguay's Dictionnaire...—here is a listing of 82 early Quebec families related by blood to the Mivilles and, in turn, to crowned heads of Europe:

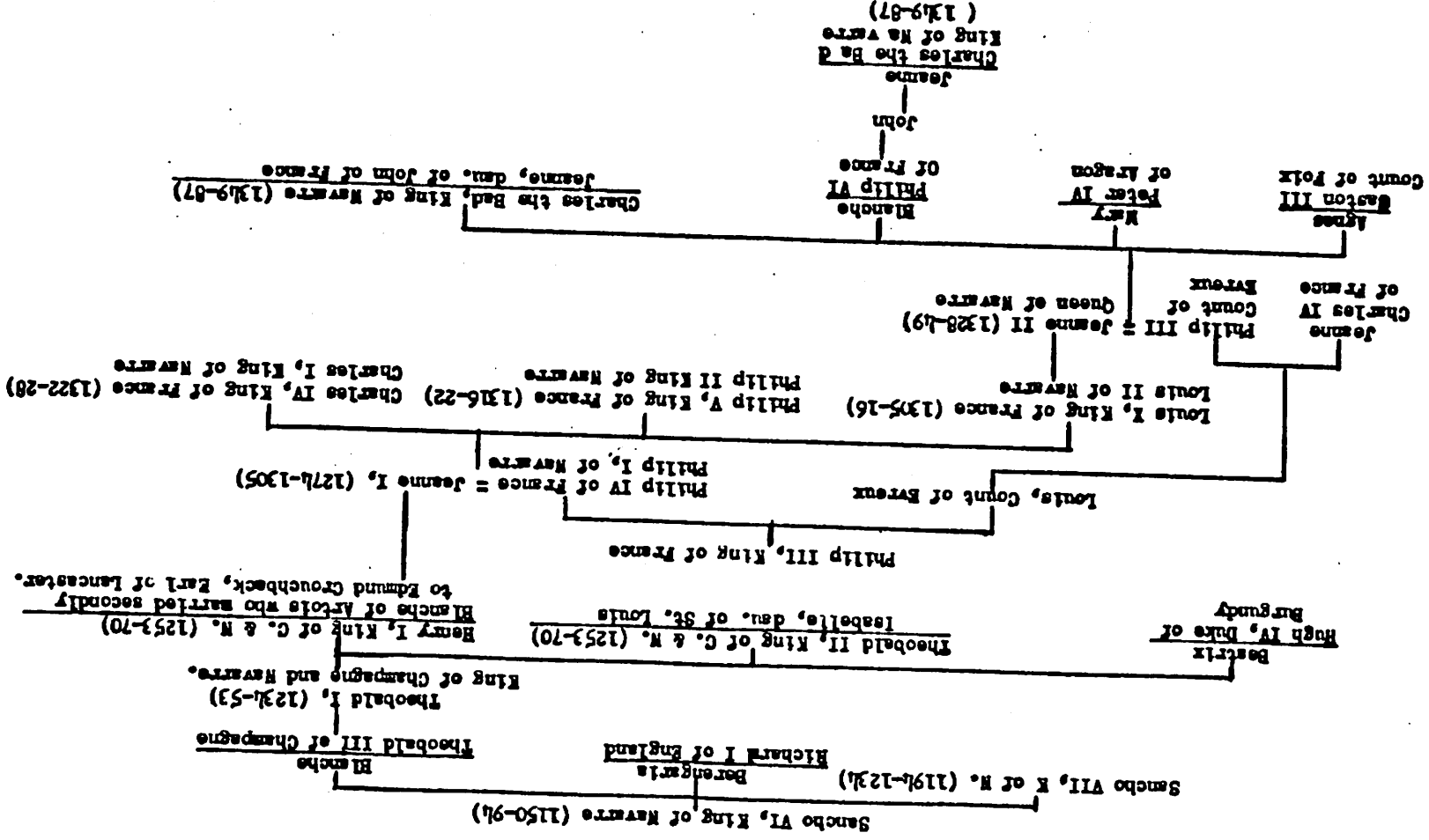
HOUSE OF BOURBON TO HENRY IV

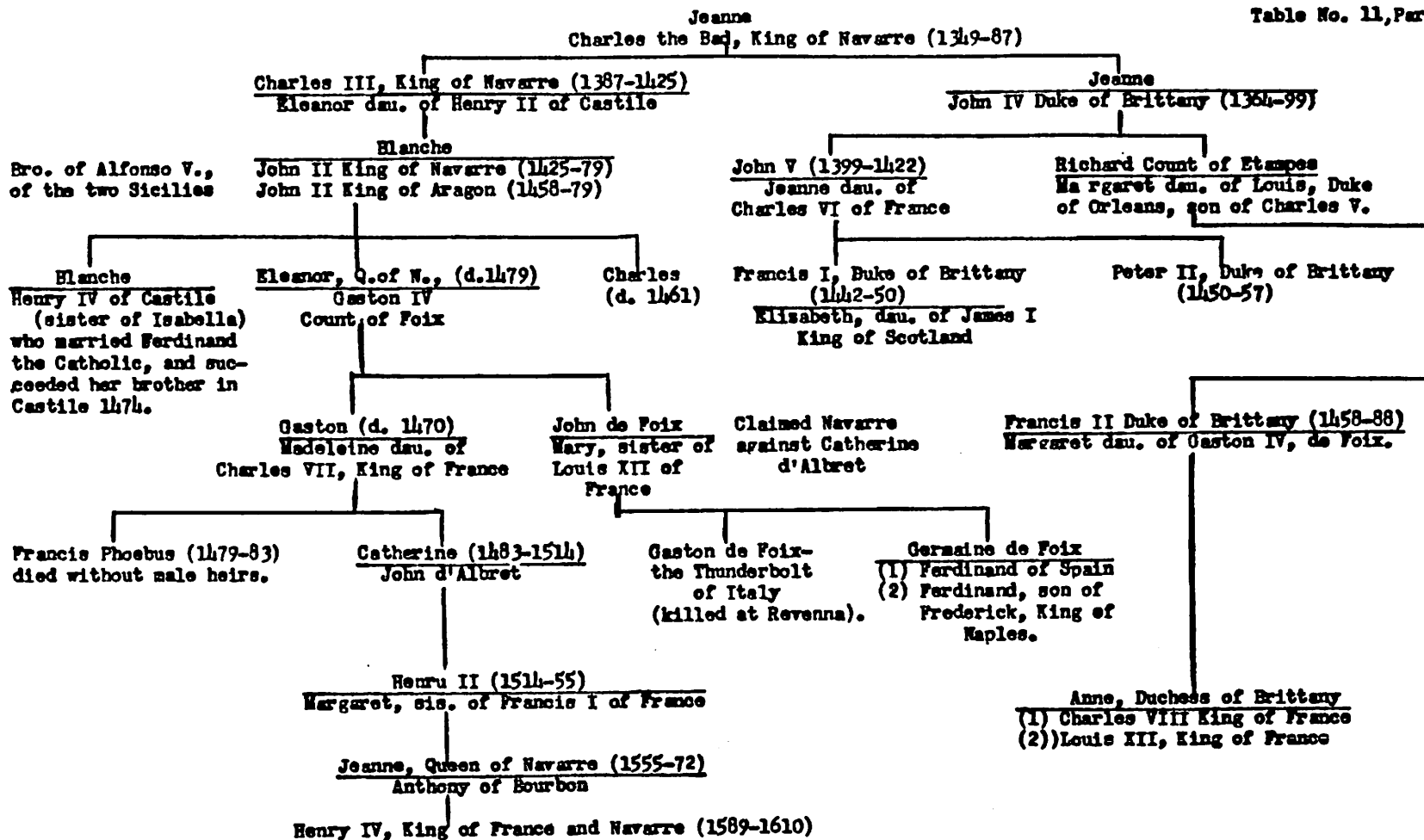


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KINGS OF CHAMPAGNE AND NAVARRE, FROM 1150,

THE REIGNING FAMILY OF AUSTRIA.

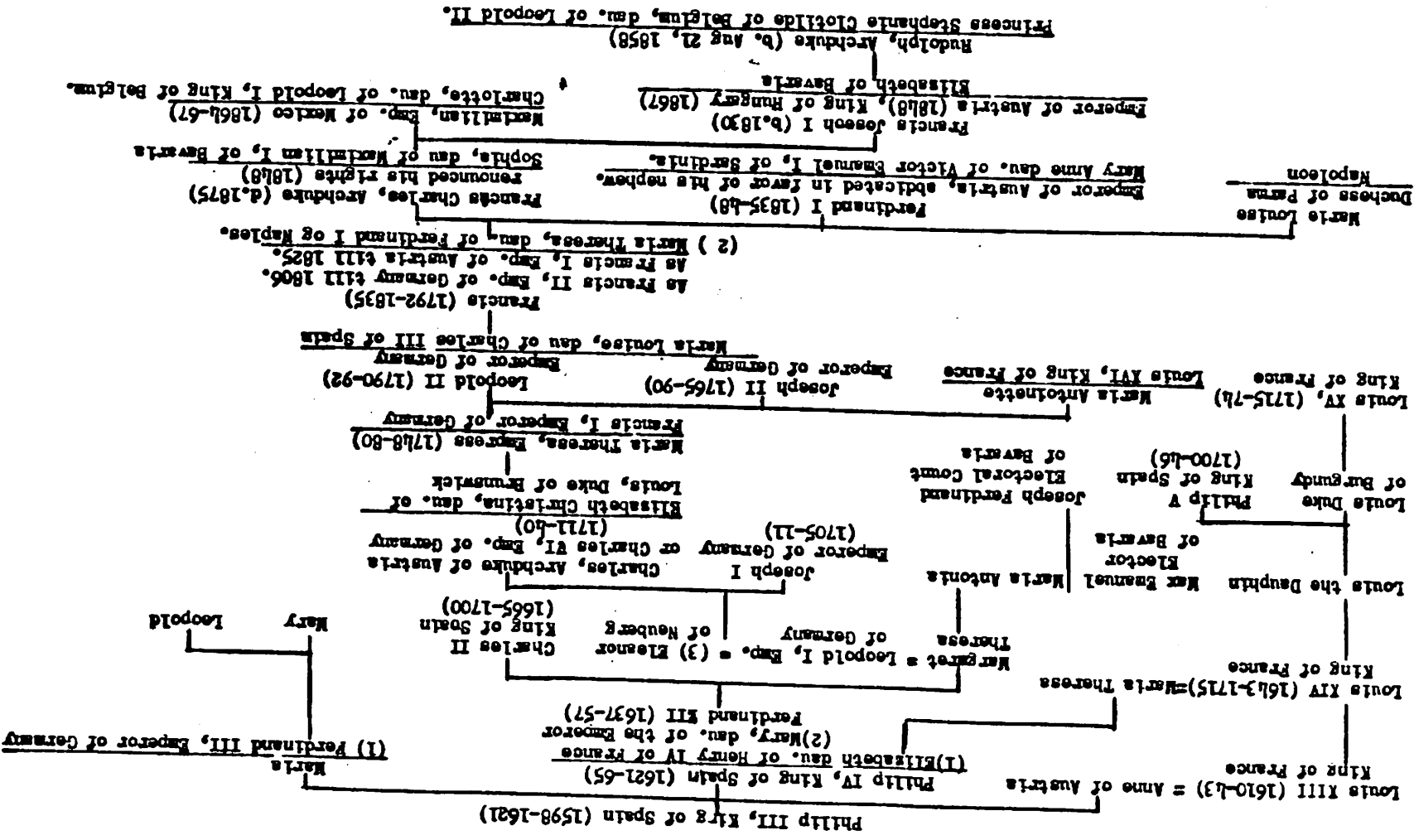

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1900 FEDERAL CENSUS OF CONNECTICUT (Con't)

By Lee DeRagon (#8)

Last June's CML contained the first installment of statistical data on resident French-Canadian heads of families enumerated in the 1900 federal census. Our current issue offers more of the same; specifically, additional information from that same census on Franco families then living in the eastern Connecticut county of Windham (within the communities of Brooklyn and Killingly), and in the capitol city of Hartford.

Again we remind you that surnames are not grouped in alphabetical sequence. It will become obvious, too, that Yankee census takers were skilled corrupters of French surname spellings.

For those members interested in researching the actual census itself, an explanation of the Soundex filing system used in the 1880 and 1900 federal censuses has been included. The 1900 census is on file at the State Library, located at 231 Capitol Avenue in Hartford, and at the Connecticut Historical Society, 1 Elizabeth Street, Hartford.

In addition, we've reproduced the biographies of four prominent Franco-American individuals from early 20th century Windham County—surnamed Blanchette, Dragon, Morin, and St. Onge. These vignettes were taken from "A Modern History of Windham County, Connecticut," edited by A.B. Lincoln, and printed at Chicago, Illinois, in 1920 by The S.J. Clarke Publishing Company. Although the biographer's stilted prose will appear almost Victorian to modern-day readers, it authentically reflects the flavor of a generation just emerged from World War I.

Accompanying the census extract is a map of Connecticut showing the eight counties plus those communities comprising each. There is also a census form containing the actual questions asked of every state resident back in 1900. The following basic information is supplied in our extract:

1. Community of residence.
2. Family surname.
3. Christian name of each family member.
4. Relationship of each person to the head of family (see "Abbreviations Used in the Census" on the next page).
5. Age of every person in the household ("1/12" = one month old, etc.).
6. Place of birth of each household member.

GUIDE TO SOUNDIX SYSTEM

The Soundex filing system for the 1880 and 1900 Federal Census groups together names of the same and similar sounds but of variant spellings on index cards. Each card gives the name, age and birth-place of all members in the household. There is a cross-reference card for each child or member whose surname is different from that of the head of the household.

To search for a particular name, the researcher must first determine the code number for the surname of the individual. This code number consists of the first letter of the surname followed by three numbers.

The first letter of the surname is not coded.

The letters A, E, I, O, U, Y, W, and H are not coded.

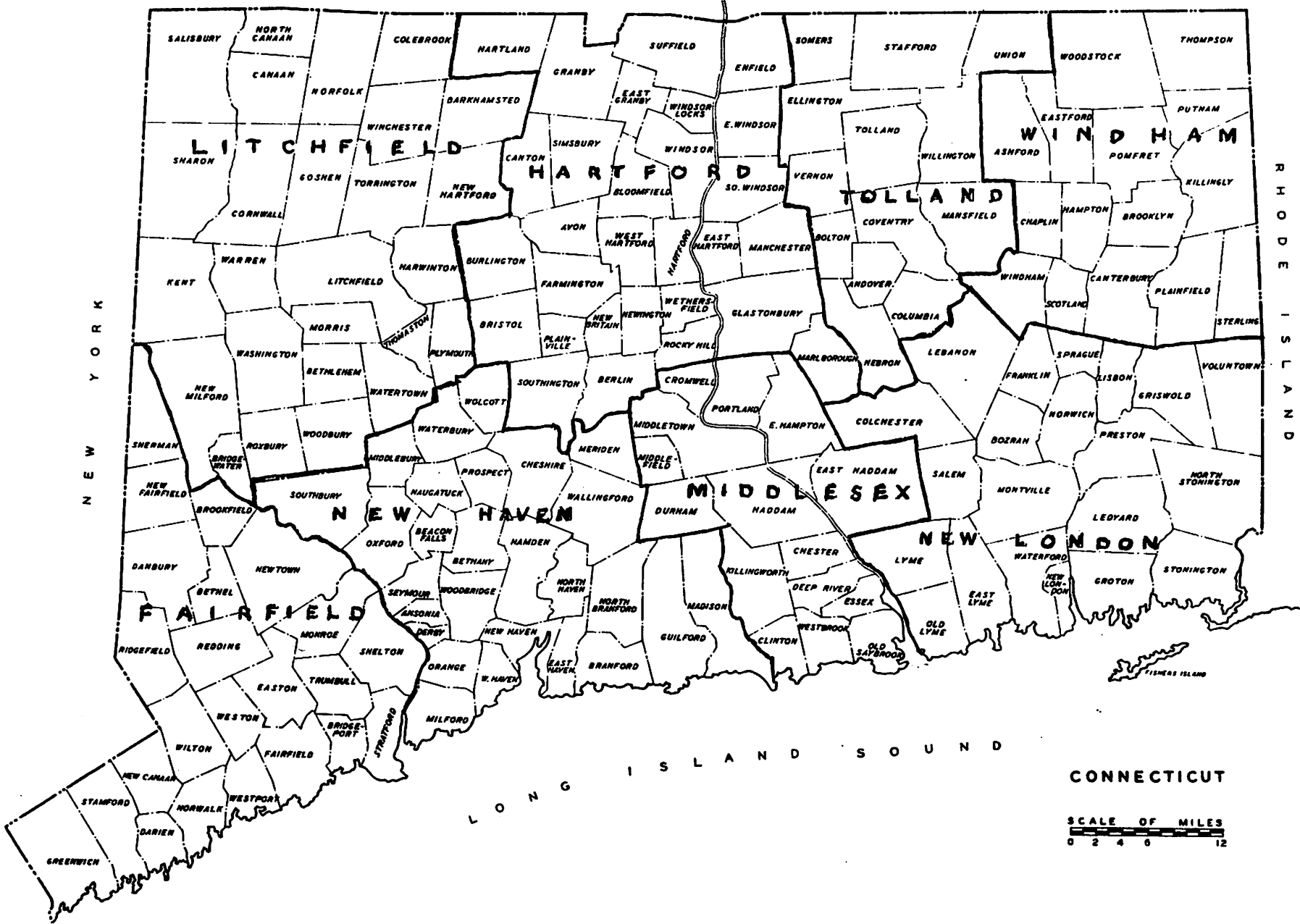
Every Soundex code must have the first letter of the surname plus a three-digit number. A name yielding no code letters, as LEE, would be L 000; a name yielding only one code number would have two zeros added, as KUHNE, coded K 500; one yielding two code numbers would have one zero added, as EBELL, coded E 140.

When two key letters or equivalents appear together, or one key letter immediately follows or precedes an equivalent, the two are coded as one letter, by a single number, as follows; KELLY coded as K 400.

As only three digits are needed, the remaining letters in a long name do not have to be coded. Prefixes to surnames such as "van, von, di, de, le, dela, and du" are disregarded in alphabetizing and in coding.

The code number is in the upper left-hand corner of the index card on the film. First names are alphabetical within each code group.

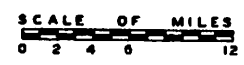

JOSEPH OCTAVE BLANCHETTE

Joseph Octave Blanchette has for forty years been engaged in business as a baker in Willimantic, and previous to the time when he became proprietor of the establishment which he still owns he was employed along that line by his brother-in-law, Frank Gilman. He was born in St. Charles, Canada, October 16, 1850, and is a son of Ansaibe and Felicet (Roberts) Blanchette. The father was a school teacher in Canada, where he resided until 1867, when he removed with his family to Connecticut, where he became a teacher of French in local schools.

His son, Joseph Octave Blanchette, left home to start out in the business world and took up the trade of harness making, at which he worked in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, and at Webster, Massachusetts. He thoroughly mastered the business and became a good workman but removed to Willimantic at the request of his brother-in-law, Frank Gilman, to take charge of the latter's bakery. He assumed control of the business and proved his adaptability by successfully conducting the enterprise, although he had had no previous experience in that direction. He found the business congenial and in 1878 purchased the bakery from Mr. Gilman and has since been proprietor of the establishment. He has always exercised the utmost care in maintaining cleanly and sanitary conditions and also in producing a product which by reason of its excellence will insure a ready sale on the market. That his output has been highly satisfactory finds incontrovertible proof in the fact that he has for forty years continued in the business in this city.

On the 2d of June, 1873, Mr. Blanchette was united in marriage to Miss Emily Gilman, who was born in Webster, Massachusetts, on the 29th of May, 1855, a daughter of Joseph and Emily Gilman. They are both widely and favorably known in Willimantic and enjoy the warm regard of an extensive circle of friends. The life record of Mr. Blanchette measures up to high standards in every private and public relation, and whatever he has undertaken in his business career he has accomplished, knowing that persistent and intelligently directed effort will overcome all obstacles and difficulties.

ILDEGE LOUIS DRAGON

Ildege Louis Dragon, conducting a merchant tailoring business at No. 16 Main Street in Putnam, where he has made his home since 1898, was born in St. Denis, in the province of Quebec, Canada, May 18, 1874, and is a son of Cleophas and Sophie Dragon, who were natives of St. Denis. The father there spent the period of his minority and after attaining adult age turned his attention to the occupation of farming, which he followed throughout his entire life. He was married twice and was the father of twenty-six children.

Ildege L. Dragon, a son of the first marriage, pursued his education in parochial schools of his native city and after his education was completed turned his attention to the men's tailoring business in Montreal, Canada. There he remained until twenty years of age, when he crossed the border into the United States and settled in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, where he completed his trade. He afterward removed to Williamstown, Massachusetts, where he was employed at tailoring for a short period, and in 1898 he came to Putnam, where he has since resided. Here he entered into partnership with J. B. Huard and they bought out the business of William Lamothe at No. 16 Main Street. There they conducted a men's tailoring business and some time afterward Mr. Dragon acquired the interest of his partner and has since been sole proprietor of the shop. He has a well equipped establishment and is doing a business of very substantial proportions; in fact, has the leading patronage in his life in the town.

On the 27th of January, 1898, Mr. Dragon was united in marriage to Miss Melvina Pelland, daughter of Adolph Pelland, and to this marriage have been born five children: Lionel, who died in infancy; Leonard, who passed away at the age of six years; and Edgar, Aldore and Viola, all at home.

The religious belief of the family is that of the Catholic church, and they are members of St. Mary's church. They have gained a wide acquaintance during the period of their residence in Putnam, Mr. Dragon having here made his home for twenty-two years. He has become widely recognized as a reliable and progressive business man and one whose sterling traits of character are manifest in very relation of life.

AMOS MORIN

No record in this volume indicates more clearly the possibilities for successful achievement on the part of the individual than does the history of Amos Morin, superintendent of the Connecticut Mills at Danielson. Starting out in life with absolutely no advantages, having never attended school for a day, he has steadily worked his way upward, developing his powers through the exercise of effort and utilizing every opportunity to gain knowledge and promote his efficiency. Today he occupies a position of large responsibility and importance, being superintendent of a mill that now furnishes employment to more than seven hundred people.

He was born at Redford, in Clinton county, New York, March 28, 1870, a son of Oliver and Mary (Kental) Morin. The father was a native of St. Gabriel, in the province of Quebec, Canada, and was there reared and educated to the age of sixteen years, when he removed to Clinton county, New York. While there he enlisted for service in the Civil war as a member of Company C, Forty-eighth New York Volunteer Infantry, with which he served for twenty-nine months in the Army of the Potomac, participating in a number of hotly contested engagements. He proved a brave and valorous soldier on the field of battle and after the close of the war he returned to Redford, New York, where he engaged in the business of handling native timber, cordwood, etc. While there he was married and afterward became a contractor on the building of a railroad in that section of the country. He contracted to supply the railroad with timber for ties and also took the contract to cut down the timber on the right of way. With the assistance of his wife, he likewise conducted the boarding house where the construction gang was furnished meals. In 1884 he removed with his family to Oakdale, Massachusetts, where for nineteen years he engaged in road construction work. He afterward became a resident of Leominster, Massachusetts, where for several years he was employed in the comb shops of the town that manufactured the rubber hair combs. After three years' residence in Leominster, he retired from active business life and removed to Montreal, Canada, where he likewise spent three years. On the expiration of that period, he returned to Leominster and subsequently removed to Danielson, Connecticut, making his home with his son Amos, and there passed away March 20, 1915. His wife was born at St. Romain, in the province of Quebec, and still makes her home with her families. His grandfather was Anthony Morin, a native of the province of Quebec, where he engaged in business as a laborer and lumberman. With his family he removed to Redford, New York, and afterward to Plattsburg, New York. In his later years he retired from active business and spent the evening of his days in the home of a daughter at St. Gabriel, in the province of Quebec, where his death occurred. In the family of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Morin were the following children, all but one of whom are living: Louis; Amos; Oliver, who has passed away; Mary, the wife of Edmund Girardin; Israel, boss weaver in the Connecticut Mills at Sherbrooke, Quebec, Canada; Margaret, the wife of Edward Hammond, a railroad man; John, a policeman of Danielson, Connecticut; Anthony, a teamster of

Danielson; Lucy, the wife of Henry Chartier, a weaver in the Connecticut Mills at Sherbrooke, Canada; Exias, of Danielson, Connecticut; Dora, the wife of William Vaillette; Mary Louise, the wife of Theodore Peloquin, a loom fixer in the Connecticut Mills at Danielson; and George, living at Leominster, Massachusetts.

Amos Morin resided at Redford, New York, the place of his birth, until he was fourteen years of age and then accompanied his parents on their removal to Oakdale, Massachusetts. He began to earn his living when very young. He never had the opportunity of attending school and it was after he had reached manhood that he learned to read and write. While at Redford he worked in the lumber camps and in other ways and following the removal to Oakdale, Massachusetts, he secured a position in the weaving department of the West Boylston cotton mills, owned by the J. H. Lane Company. He was continuously employed there for sixteen and a half years. The establishment was one of the pioneer mills in the making of tire duck fabric - the second mill in the industry to take up this line of weaving tire duck. It was there that Mr. Morin obtained his first experience in the manufacture of tire duck fabric and was one of the first weavers in the industry to receive instruction in that class of work. He served as second hand in the weaving room of this mill but afterward resigned his position to become loom fixer in the Brighton cotton mills at Passaic, New Jersey, mills that were devoted exclusively to the manufacture of tire fabric. There he was also promoted to the position of second hand and after five years he resigned and removed to St. Gabriel, Quebec, Canada, where he purchased a farm which he cultivated for a year and a half. He was then called on by the Passaic cotton mills to accept a position at Worcester, Massachusetts, and assist in starting the mills there - a plant being developed at that point for the manufacture of cotton tire fabric and developed under the name of the Worcester Duck Weaving Company. After six months experience in Worcester the company removed the business to Passaic, New Jersey, and changed the name to the Passaic Cotton Company. Mr. Morin went with them to Passaic as second hand of the weaving department and later was overseer of the tire fabric weaving department, remaining there for four years.

On the 27th of September, 1910, Mr. Morin removed from Passaic to Danielson to set up the machinery, looms and equipment for the Connecticut Mills, which had recently leased a building in the north part of the city for the manufacture of tire duck. After getting the machinery installed and in operation, the work of turning out the first sample piece of tire duck ever manufactured by the Connecticut Mills was begun. Mr. Morin's wife and son Amos wove the first piece of tire duck ever made in the plant, while Mr. Morin attended to the machinery. The three were the only employees of the mill at that time and something of the development of the business is indicated in the fact that employment is now furnished to more than seven hundred people. The first tire duck made was a five-yard piece and a half hour after it was completed it was taken to New York by special messenger. The quality of the fabric assured success from the start and more looms and other equipment were added and the output was gradually increased. With the demand for its goods, new

buildings were erected and the business soon became a flourishing manufacturing concern. Mr. Morin was appointed overseer of the mills, with William B. Fitts as the superintendent, and when the latter retired in October, 1915, Mr. Morin was made superintendent of the mills and continues to occupy this position at the present time. Familiar with every phase of the business, Mr. Morin has contributed in substantial measure to its development through his operation of the mills, the methods there employed in manufacture and the systemization of the work.

On the 17th of July, 1893, Mr. Morin was married at West Boylston, Massachusetts, to Miss Exima Pearreault, who was born at Roxton Falls, Quebec, Canada, a daughter of Meador and Exima (Bone) Pearreault, who were also natives of Quebec. Mr. and Mrs. Morin have become parents of five children, of whom four are yet living. Amos, Jr., born at St. Gabriel, Canada, is a medical student in the Pointe Aux Trembles Medical College of Montreal, Canada. He served in the medical detachment of the Twenty-first United States Engineers, A.E.F., and was in France and Germany for eighteen months, while his entire connection with the army covered twenty-three months. He was on active duty on many of the important battle fronts and saw some of the hardest fighting of the war. Exima, born in Oakdale, Massachusetts, is the wife of George Bizailon, a loom fixer in the Connecticut Mills, at Danielson, and they have one child, Gerald. Cora, born in Oakdale, Massachusetts, died in Danielson, Connecticut, at the age of sixteen years. Eva is a student in the Villa Maria convent in Montreal, Canada. Romeo is at home.

The religious faith of the family is that of the Roman Catholic church. Mr. Morin is also connected with the Catholic Foresters of America and with the Artisans Français and the Union St. John the Baptist. His political allegiance is given to the Republican party and he is a firm believer in its principles. He occupies a beautiful home in the Connecticut Mills village, where one of the thoroughfares has been named Morin avenue in his honor. The Connecticut Mills village is well termed "The Village Beautiful". The mill owners have developed a village which has adequately solved the housing problem. They have given to their employees the opportunity to live in beautiful homes amid attractive surroundings, erecting dwellings which they sell at cost to their employees. There are no two dwellings alike and everything has been built with an eye to beauty as well as convenience and comfort. Mr. Morin has ever been active in efforts to promote the welfare of the operatives of the mills and his influence is always on the side of progress and improvement. He is justly proud of the fact that he is the first and oldest employee of the Connecticut Mills and his advancement has come to him as the merited reward of his fidelity and capability. His record is a notable one of steady advancement and successful achievement and should serve to inspire and encourage others, showing what may be accomplished through individual effort.

JOSEPH ST. ONGE

Joseph St. Onge, who is engaged in the grocery business in Willimantic, was born in Bozrahville, Connecticut, April 26, 1873, a son of Peter and Mattie (Clementine) St. Onge, the former now deceased. He is a representative of one of the old French families that emigrated to Canada at an early period in the exodus of French settlers to that country.

Joseph St. Onge, of this review, was a little lad of but seven years when the family home was removed from Bozrahville, Connecticut, to Willimantic. He attended the parochial school in connection with St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church and thus acquired his education. Starting out in the business world, he was first employed by H. Leonard, proprietor of a meat market, and later he was connected with the meat market of Isaac Knowlton. His third employer was Charles Whittemore, a candy manufacturer and merchant, and later he again became connected with the meat business in the employ of J. M. Mullen, with whom he remained for ten years as an employe, at the end of which time he purchased an interest in the business, entering upon a partnership that continued until 1912. On the 16th of September, of that year, he became sole proprietor of his present business, and has a large and well appointed store which is one of the important trade centers of the city. He now has three employes and he utilizes auto delivery. His patronage is steadily growing, for he carries a very attractive line of staple and fancy groceries and puts forth his goods in a pleasing arrangement that cannot fail to attract attention. Moreover, he is always courteous and obliging to his patrons and demands that similar service shall be extended to them by the clerks in the establishment.

On the 4th of June, 1902, Mr. St. Onge was united in marriage to Miss Susan A. Britton of Willimantic. They are members of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic church and Mr. St. Onge votes with the democratic party, which he has supported since age conferred upon him the right of franchise. He has not been an office seeker, preferring to concentrate his time and attention upon business affairs. He has done with thoroughness whatever his hand has found to do and his conscientious purpose and his progressive methods have carried him forward until he now occupies a creditable position in the commercial circles of his adopted city.

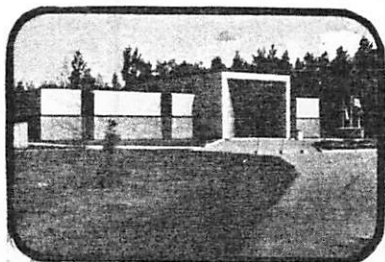
THE ACADIAN HISTORICAL VILLAGE

Visiting along the eastern shore of New Brunswick, Canada, during the summer of 1977, I was told about the newly-opened Acadian Historical Village on the outskirts of Caraquet, on the shores of Baie des Chaleurs. I had visited Sturbridge Village and Plymouth Plantation in Massachusetts and Virginia's Williamsburg during prior vacations and wondered what this reconstructed Acadian Village would be like, especially since all my roots are Acadian. My husband and I decided to leave rather early the next morning to allow ample time to visit the Village thoroughly.

The Acadian Historical Village is located on Rte 11, between Caraquet and Grande-Anse in Gloucester County, New Brunswick, Canada, and concentrates on re-creating the century between 1780 and 1880 in the life of the Acadians. The "levées" and "aboiteaux" nearby were a reason the site along the Riviere-du-Nord was chosen for the Village. The "aboiteaux" method of reclaiming the marshlands from the sea for the cultivation of rich farms earned the Acadians the name of "marshland settlers".



Upon our arrival at the Village, we viewed two short films at the Reception Center and armed ourselves with the free literature about the Village before taking off for a leisurely stroll through an earlier period of time. We would return at the end of our tour to browse through the gift shop and the bookstore. It was here I found two booklets containing articles about Thomas DUGAS, a great uncle, who had kept a journal, during fifty years, on the life of the people in the Caraquet area.

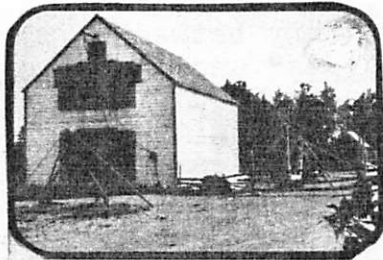


This house was originally built in 1842 at Mazerolle Settlement near Fredericton, New Brunswick. Pierre MAZEROLLE was first married to Catherine GODIN and they had three children. His second wife, Marie Ann GODIN, bore him seven children. In 1861 Pierre claimed to own 400 acres of land and was considered to be a fairly wealthy farmer. The techniques and materials used in building this house are significant of the economic situation of these Acadians.

Fisherman Edward GODIN owned his own boat, a symbol of certain wealth during the period of 1880, when this house was built at Maisonnette, New Brunswick. Married to Basile LANTEIGNE, they had eight children. Edward bought his uncle's land which had been seized for debts by the Robin Company. He sold his fishing catches to this same company. The fish thus sold was prepared and dried at home by his wife as it wasn't until the beginning of the twentieth century that the Robin Company obtained cod-drying equipment.

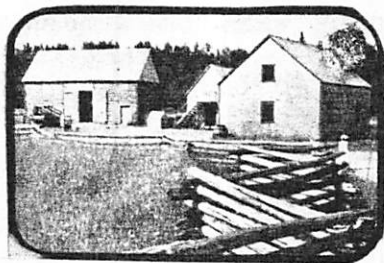


This building was constructed around 1855 at Caraquet, New Brunswick. It was one of many sheds for the Robin, Jones and Whitman Company. The inhabitants of this area referred to it as the "Rigging Loft".

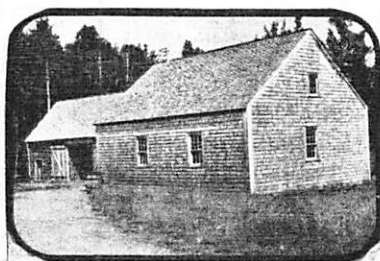
Because of the important role played by the Robin Company to the economic life of the Acadians during the mid-eighteenth century, this building was placed in the Acadian Historical Village. Beginning in 1766, the Robin Company installed fish agencies in several locations around the Baie des Chaleurs. Some of these agencies survived until 1955. Charles Robin of Jersey founded this import/export company. He was a man of exceptional business sense and rigid principles. The presence of the Robin Company along the northern coastline of New Brunswick served to transform the traditional Acadian farmers into fishermen, and more specifically in the Caraquet area, to fishermen in the service of the Robin Company.

From the time of its arrival, the company developed a system of barter which, through the years, plunged the fishermen into total dependence on the Robin Company itself. It consisted of no credit to the fishermen, very little liquid cash, and a strict minimum of tackle with which to fish. In return, the fishermen were obligated to sell the fish they caught to the company where they received exchange coupons valid only at the Robin Company.

Pierrot ROBICHAUD was very much like the many Acadians returning from exile. He was sometimes a farmer, sometimes a fisherman, but he soon established himself as a full-time farmer. He was the oldest of 12 children. His account book, which he kept until 1822, shows him to be a very active man who was not only a respectable farmer, but was also a carpenter and a cabinet-maker. In 1824, at age 24, he married Rosalie ARSENAULT. They had 12 children. He built this house in Inkerman, New Brunswick, some time between 1825 and 1830.



Romain DOUCET was born in 1818. In 1840 he married Marie DEGRACE. They had eight children. This house was built in 1840 at Ste-Anne de Bathurst, New Brunswick, and it is logical to believe that the finer finishing details of this house were completed sometime between the years 1850 and 1860. They seem to reflect the influence of the English population which surrounded the Doucet family.



This house was constructed in 1830 at St. Basile, Madawaska, by Laurent CYR. He married Angelique RAYMOND who bore him seven children. In all probability, this house was built the year they were married. It reflects construction details similar to those of Quebec and the United States due to its proximity to those areas. It boasts several windows containing twelve squares each, a design superior to other Acadian homes of the period.

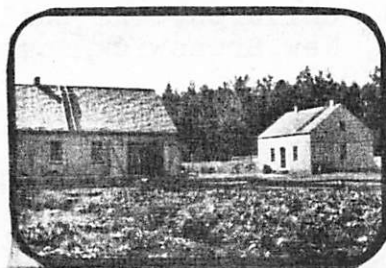


Constructed in 1889 by Charles GODIN, a carpenter, this store was utilized in part as a post office for a number of years at Haute Caraquet, New Brunswick. Typical of the general stores of this period, they sold items which the villagers could not themselves produce. Charles GODIN was born in 1850 and was married to Caroline POIRIER. His second wife was Marie-Olesine DOUCET, whom he married in 1883.

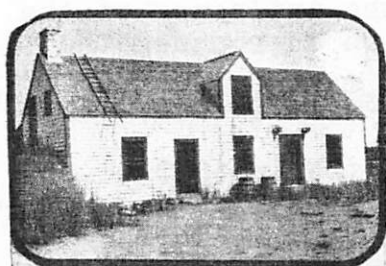

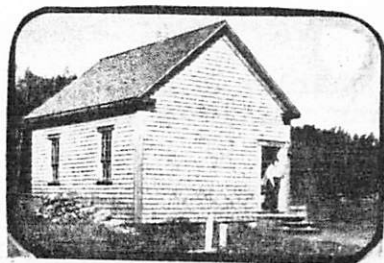
Louis POIRIER, born in 1846, constructed this tavern in Caraquet in 1875. The right-hand side of this building was sometimes used as a general store. If one drank on the premises, one could also buy liquor to take out. Wines and Jamaican Rum were popular items. It is interesting to note that the women had as much right as the men to frequent the tavern.



Gabriel LEGER built this house the year he was married to Felicite BOURGEOIS in 1836. They had nine children. The house was originally situated in Memramcook, New Brunswick. The forge which is an integral part of this farm was constructed by Marcellin LEGERE, father-in-law of Sylvain LEGER, who became the next proprietor.



Born in Scotland, James BLACKHALL emigrated to Halifax in 1812. Arriving at Baie des Chaleurs, Caraquet, New Brunswick, ten years later in 1822, he started construction on this house. Many Scottish architectural characteristics can be observed in this house, the only one of its kind in Caraquet. Upon entering this house, one can feel the life of ease of the well-to-do owner who performed many official duties in Caraquet. BLACKHALL served the community at different times as Justice of the Peace, Postmaster, and School Commissioner.

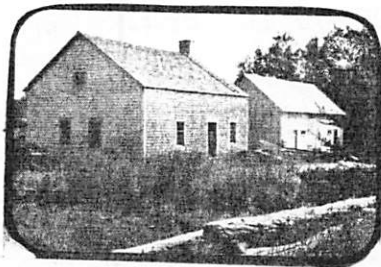


Arguments by the townspeople caused this schoolhouse to be moved twice before being settled in its final location in Chockpish, near Richibuctou Village, Kent County, New Brunswick, in 1879. In this same year, thirty-two students were enrolled. Memorization of subjects was the popular teaching method of the not-too-well-qualified teachers who were mostly female. A stove in the center of the room provided heat in the winter for the students who sat two to a bench. Students wrote on slates while studying geography, hygiene, arithmetic, French and English literature, the history of Canada, and the catechism.

Using a turn-of-the-century picture taken by Father Cortois, this chapel is a reproduction of the one built at Ste-Anne-du-Bocage in Caraquet from 1831 thru 1836. It is not representative of other mid-nineteen century village churches, but rather more like one built by earlier colonists. It seems the people of Ste-Anne-du-Bocage wanted to build a monument in memory of the early colonists and at the same time have a parish of their own.



This house was built in 1851 at Bedec, Kent County, New Brunswick, by Jean BABINEAU when he was about 50 years of age. Building a house this late in life was exceptional as most Acadians generally built their future home before marrying. Jean, a farmer, married Marie DAIGLE and they had ten children. Jean's age at the time of constructing his home could explain the care and attention given to details of construction. Also, he may have had help from his sons.



Vital SAVOIE built this house in two stages at Neguac, Northumberland County, New Brunswick, from 1855 to 1859. Today, the older section serves as a summer kitchen. Vital married Charlotte POIRIER around 1859 and they had nine children. Vital claimed to be a farmer, but he was also adept at several other occupations, such as, carpenter, fisherman, and trapper.



Following the deportation, Jean Baltazar MARTIN became within a short time a very prosperous farmer in French Village. It was here he built this house in 1783 which was an American-style "log cabin" and is the only house on the site of the Acadian Historical Village to have a dirt floor. The rustic architecture does not reflect the affluence of its owner, but an 1801 detailed will indicates the wealth of Jean Baltazar MARTIN. From his three successive marriages, he had three children. His sons emigrated to Madawaska.

But, the pièce-de-résistance for me was the DUGAS house which came from Caraquet and had just been set onto its Village location. Restoration would be made to the shell and floors only with a portion of each left open where the visitor could see the massive hand-hewn beams supporting the floor, and the mud and horsehair insulation in the outer walls. As I stood in the doorway of this house to have my picture taken, a sense of belonging swept over me. I thought of the family who had lived here -- that of my great-grandfather Germain DUGAS who married Veronique ROBICHAUD in 1854.

Within the Village are two Post Houses where visitors can find sandwiches, beverages, beer, film, and restrooms. When we stopped during our tour, the mood of the visitors was one of gaiety and pleasure as they chatted about the houses just visited, and the friendliness of the bilingual guides dressed in period costumes as they performed daily chores--from the baking of bread in an outdoor oven, to the upkeep of a vegetable-filled garden, to overseeing the care of the domestic animals which are to be found in the Village.

Great care and much research has gone into this re-creation of the period 1780-1880 as construction techniques and methods are maintained, such as squaring timber with an axe. Houses brought in from various areas of the Maritimes are representative of the architectural styles of Acadian homes and demonstrate the adaptability of the Acadian people.

The distance from the Reception Center to the last house in the Village covers a distance of 1.5 km and can be covered on foot, or visitors may avail themselves of the local "taxi" which is a horse-drawn wagon and which runs regularly throughout the day. We boarded one of these "taxis" for the return trip to the Reception Center where we browsed through the Gift Shop and found numerous books and pamphlets covering Acadian history and culture. I had not realized so many existed. We purchased a few souvenirs and went on our way vowing to return again.

SOLVING THE ACADIAN PLACE-NAME PUZZLE

Members engaged in Acadian genealogical research often encounter a baffling obstacle when tracking their family roots to centuries-old communities. They discover that, in the transition from French to British rule, many of the ancient place-names—where ancestors were born, married, and died—have disappeared from today's maps. To help surmount that geographical barrier, Rod Wilscam (#44) recently compiled a listing of Acadian localities together with their modern-day names and, as known, locations.

WE SALUTE A REMARKABLE FRANCO-AMERICAN OCTOGENARIAN!

Leo P. Flamion, 85 years young, was singled out for special recognition last June 8 at the State Capitol in Hartford. State Representative Arthur Brouillette, 3rd District Democrat, addressed a session in the House of Representatives to cite the achievements of longtime Hartford resident Leo P. Flamion. The lawmakers subsequently named him Governor-for-a-Day and presented him with a certificate of appreciation in gratitude for outstanding service to the community.

A native of Central Falls, R.I., and the son of Belgian immigrants, Leo moved to Hartford in 1918. Back in 1926 he became one of the original founders of the city's French Social Club (present site of FCGSC's Research Center).

Mr. Flamion is also the only living founder of St. Anne's Parish Conference Society of St. Vincent de Paul (established in 1922), serving as secretary of that group for 59 years, in addition to being president for two years. In 1958 he was elected president emeritus of St. Vincent de Paul's Particular Council. A life member of the St. Anne Parish Holy Name Society, Leo served as its secretary for 55 years and as president for six years.

Leo's military career was equally noteworthy. Enlisting in the Connecticut National Guard in 1919, he never missed a drill during his initial three-year hitch—also a "first"! Transferring to the Army Reserve's 76th Infantry Division in 1925, Mr. Flamion was commissioned a second lieutenant two years later. A captain by 1938, his unit was federalized in January of 1942 at the start of World War II. He later served in the West Indies with the 6th U.S. Air Force as an administrative officer.

Discharged in 1946, the brand-new civilian lost no time in becoming a founding member in 1947 of Hartford's Post 16 of the Franco-American War Veterans and elected the first commander of that post. Not long afterward, he was appointed Connecticut Department commander and, in 1955, chosen national commander of FAWV. For the past eight years, Leo has served as assistant national chaplain. He remained in the U.S. Army Reserve after World War II and retired as a captain in 1958.

Mr. Flamion in 1922 established his own general insurance agency in Hartford and retired 50 years later. He was appointed a House Messenger for the 1983 session of the State House of Representatives. Married at St. Anne's Church in 1924 to the former Aldora Corriveau, the couple will celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary next June 9.

BOOK REVIEWS

Recently, I had the opportunity to read two interesting books that provide historical material about the Acadians. I'd like to recommend these informative works to anyone doing genealogical research in that area. Both books were obtained from the New Britain (Ct.) Public Library. If they're not presently on the shelves of your own public library, you can borrow them from the New Britain facility via an Interlibrary Loan. Just ask your librarian to make the necessary arrangements.

917.1-G7 are the call letters identifying "Through Evangeline's Country," a delightful book of 100 pages written by Jeannette A. Grant. The first of many illustrations is a scene of the Old Magazine at Annapolis as Chapter One introduces us to a "Bit of Acadian History."

The author then takes us along as she travels from Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, along St. Mary's Bay to Annapolis Royal, which was the old Port Royal of the Acadians, and then into the Annapolis Valley. Her observations of the people she meets and the places visited come alive as the tour proceeds to the Cornwallis Valley and ends at Grand Pré where, she states, "this fair corner of earth will always be — The Land of Evangeline."

976.3-R89 is the number assigned to "The Cajuns, From Acadia To Louisiana," by William Faulkner Rushton. The writer brings out the acute similarities between Acadian descendants in these widely separated regions—showing the continuity of a people while also defining their essential Gallic spirit. He also describes Acadian culture and customs, such as laissez les bons temps rouler (let the good times roll), their strong religious faith, and close family structure—hardy character traits that have been preserved to this day in the maritime provinces of eastern Canada and the bayous of Louisiana.

FCGSC LIBRARY & RESEARCH CENTER

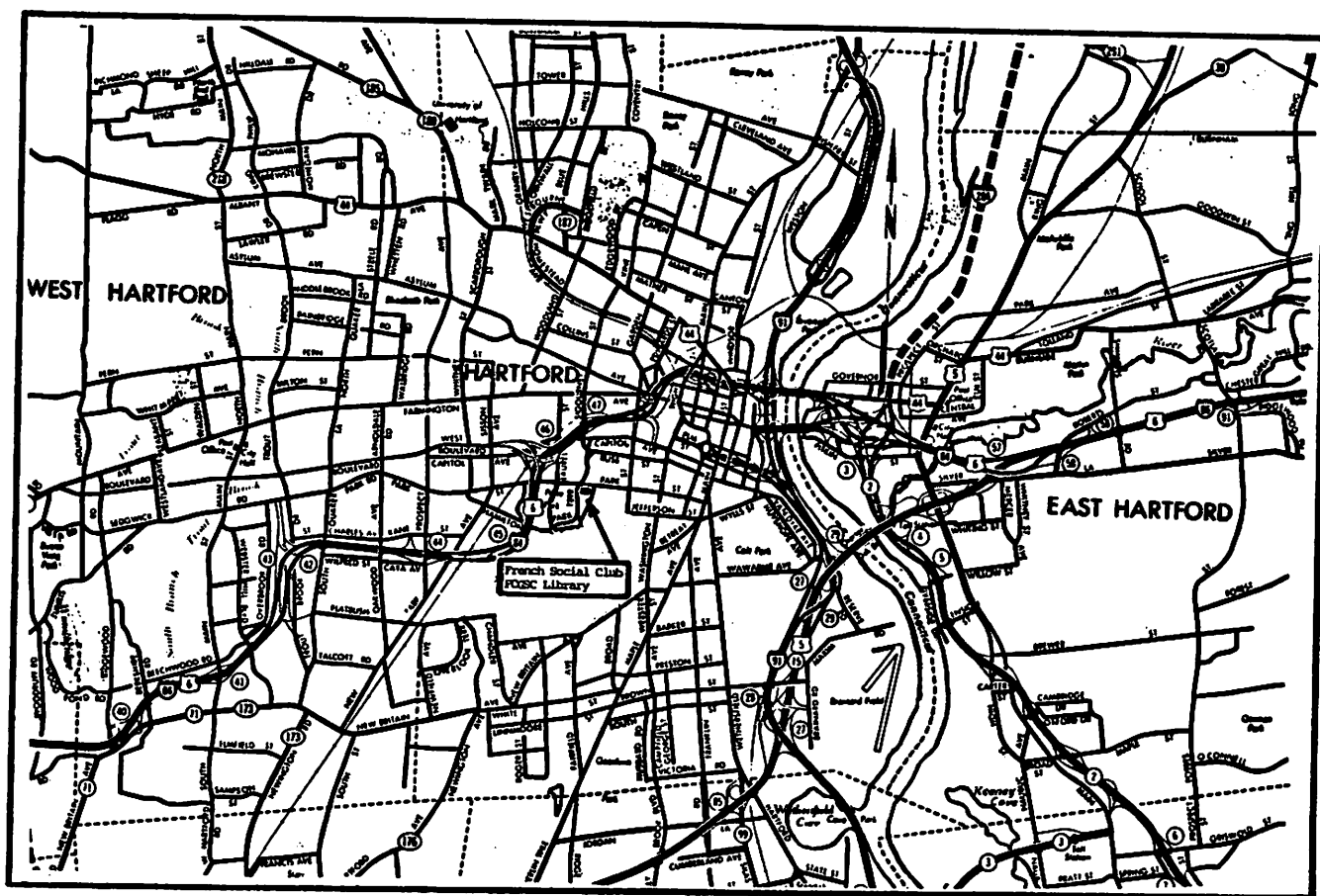

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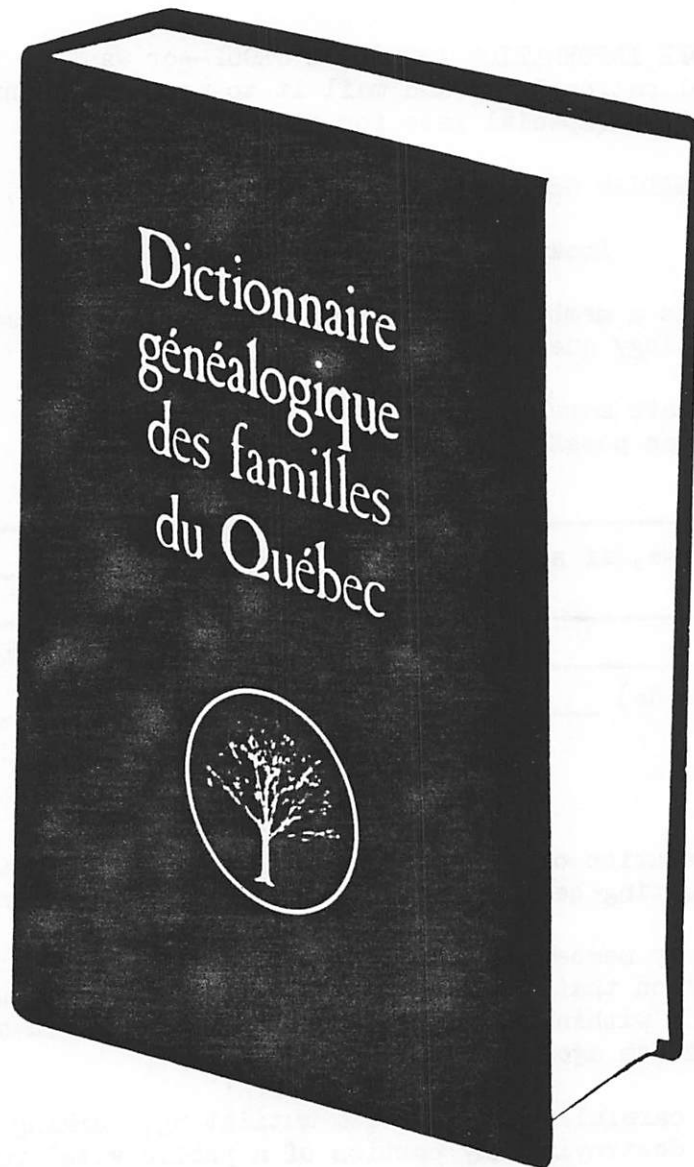
