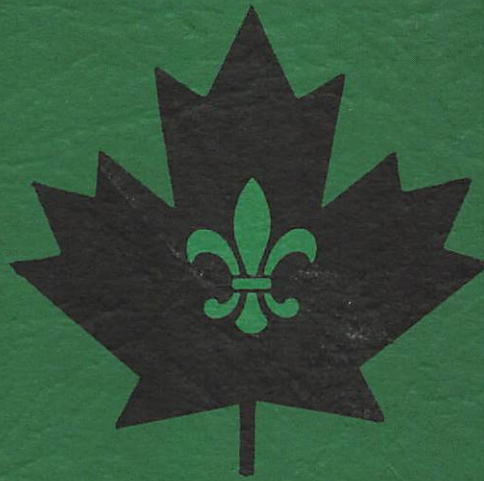

Our Society publication serves as an information source for members engaged in tracing their genealogical roots from Connecticut to Canada, Arcadia, and France. *CML* is, consequently, an important clearinghouse for topics of historic research, plus vital statistics, of special interest to Franco-Americans. Members are encouraged to contribute articles and other informational data, including extracts from their own family studies.

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## President's Message

Writing this Message for the December 1986 CML is a gratifying experience. For I doubt you'll find one genealogical society president who's as proud of the members as me! Over the past five years of its existence, I've watched FCGSC become one of the finest Franco organizations in the family research field--with members in 33 states and three foreign countries. The caliber and quantity of our Library holdings, plus the quality of CONNECTICUT MAPLE LEAF, rank us among the best sources of French-Canadian family data on the east coast.

Progress is never easy. It involved many hours of hard effort on the part of dedicated volunteers who did needed "missionary" work using the media of speaking engagements, personal visits in- and out-of-state, phone contacts, and letters. Although the Society board of directors hasn't always agreed unanimously on issues placed before it, when all's said and done, the entire board unflinchingly unites to work together in implementing a majority decision. What more could a president ask of the directors?

On Saturday, November 1, and Sunday, November 2, the Society hosted an Open House at our new Library location on the village Green in Tolland. All FCGSC members can take pride in this Research Center. It's a handsome facility housed in an historic, 19th century Colonial structure. Equally important, there's ample parking space in the front and rear of the building. And we're only 30 minutes east of Hartford, off Interstate Route 84.

You can imagine the feelings of Society officers during two days spent welcoming guests and members to the Tolland site. We heard nothing but praise for the new Research Center from visitors. As a direct result, the suggestion was made that our recently expanded Library hours schedule be further revised to add Sundays to the list. This proposal will be voted on at the next Society board meeting. As FCGSC grows larger, the Library schedule may be expanded even more.

Now I'd like to devote space to thanking those Society members who contributed so much to making our Open House an unqualified success:

- \* Vice President Lee DeRagon (#8) was the skilled carpenter who performed professional woodwork feats throughout the new facility. He came out of retirement to do this, and also proved to be a first-class painter and sign-painter as well. It's safe to say that we couldn't have reached the November 1 Open House target date without Lee's multiple talents.
- \* Director Marcel Guerard (#3) contributed a considerable amount of time and labor at the new facility, especially where painting was involved. His contribution included providing the vehicle and muscle required for moving furniture, books, and other accessories from the French Social Club in Hartford to Tolland. Even his daughter Nancy showed up at Marcel's side one day and pitched right in with the painting chores. For which we're grateful, too.
- \* Richard Poitras (#115), a Tolland resident, first learned of the new facility's availability and served as intermediary in arranging the initial meeting with town officials. Rich also donated many hours of labor at the site to help paint and perform other necessary chores.

- \* John R. Marquis (#337) delayed a scheduled vacation out West in order to lend a helping hand at the new Library. John worked as hard as one of those beavers that his voyageur ancestors used to trap for a living!
- \* Henry Lanouette (#34), Marcel Roy (#241), Joseph Landry (#315), plus my nephew, Dante Gattoni, joined in as well to ensure that our Open House didn't catch us with any tasks undone.
- \* As we began unloading the small mountain of reference works and repertories at the Tolland facility, five Society volunteers showed up to catalog and review our Library inventory of research works: Director Rolande Clark (#11), Director Anne-Marie Cote (#97), Jacqueline Gove (#10), Recording Secretary Muriel Dagenais (#285), and Arlene DeRagon (#8). This same quintet of volunteers also prepared refreshments--in the form of coffee, tea, and pastries--for the steady flow of visitors during the two-day Open House.
- \* We mustn't forget the generous donations of furniture and other accessories by Society members, which were put to instant use in the Center: Rich Poitras (#115), John Marquis (#337), and Joe Biron (#60) gifted us with much-needed chairs...Tom & Anne Skarbek (#35) brought over a beautiful 3'x5' wooden table as well as a typewriter and several Kardex indexes ...Treasurer Pat & Director Doris Lausier (#4) gave us two 3'x5' tables and two filing cabinets...even the Tolland Genealogical Library, acting through Prescott Brown, its erudite founder/librarian and in-house humorist, donated a useful flag holder for the building's front entrance. The Maple Leaf banner of Canada, now adorning that holder, was the gift of yours truly!
- \* Our Society Library also benefited from numerous recent donations of reference books. Due to time limitations, a complete listing of these invaluable additions, and names of donors, will appear instead in the June CML.

All in all, the November 1-2 Open House went very well and we're pleased that the decision was made to celebrate our move to Tolland with the two-day event. I'd like to take a moment to ask any member who owns Franco repertories and other works of genealogical or historic interest (that they are not presently using) to consider donating such documents to the Library. Now that we finally have the additional shelf space to utilize, your Society welcomes these gifts of research material for the use of FCGSCers.

Our next big Library project will be the acquisition of a Loiselle Index of Canadian marriages. Hopefully, this worthwhile research tool will be on board before my term of office expires in September of 1987. Incidentally, I cordially invite every member who hasn't yet done so to visit our new Tolland facility. Easy directions to the site, and the expanded hours schedule, can be found on Page 414 of this issue.

I'll close by wishing "Peace and Love" to each and every member and friend during this Christmas holiday season. May it be a happy and rewarding one for all of you!

CALENDAR OF EVENTS - JUNE TO NOVEMBER 1986

Saturday, June 7 - Annual FCGSC elections were held during this meeting at the South Windsor Public Library in South Windsor. Following is the slate of new and/or reelected officers and directors for the 1986-88 period (installation of new or reelected officers and directors takes place three months later in September):

Henri E. Carrier (#1) reelected handily to a second consecutive term as President...Publication Committee Chairman & CML Assistant Editor Lionel DeRagon elected Vice President, succeeding Raymond Thomas (#69) ...Treasurer Patrick Lausier (#4) reelected without opposition to a fifth consecutive term...Muriel S. Dagenais (#285) elected to a first term as Recording Secretary vice Lorraine Harlow (#2)...Laurette Dugas Billig (#7) reelected Corresponding Secretary...Directors Anne-Marie Coté (#97), Doris V. Lausier (#4), Jack Valois (#31), and Roderick A. Wilsam (#44) reelected to two-year terms. NOTE: The terms of serving Directors Robert Caron (#45), Rolande Clark (#11), Marcel Guerard (#3), and Robert Leblanc White (#192) expire in 1987.

Saturday, October 4 - Our meeting at the South Windsor Public Library was unaccountably briefer than usual due to a snafu at the state Bureau of Vital Statistics. Result: tabled for a future date was the planned talk by a BVS official on research access to Connecticut vital records.

Instead, President Carrier discussed the proposed new Society Research Center site at the Old Tolland Library. In addition, a reminder was given to all present that membership renewal time is upon us. Henri cited the reluctant decision by the FCGSC Board of Directors to increase yearly fees; viz., Individual membership, \$15; Joint family membership, \$20; Student membership, \$10; Life membership, \$225; Associate life membership, \$300. The cost of buying copies of CONNECTICUT MAPLE LEAF was raised to \$7.50 per issue, plus postage, for nonmembers.

Saturday, November 1 & Sunday, November 2 - A two-day Open House was held at the Society's newly relocated Research Center, situated in the former Tolland Library building at 53 Tolland Green. The historic Colonial structure once housed the Tolland County Courthouse, and FCGSC meetings will now take place in the second-floor courtroom. There Henri C. will have the unique option of addressing us from the towering height of the judge's bench, if he so desires, while any guest speaker could conceivably address us from the confines of a solid oak defendant's dock!

The sizable Library itself, offering four times the shelf space of its Hartford predecessor, occupies half of the first floor and includes a convenient lounge area adjacent to it. We share the ground floor with the Tolland Genealogical Library, whose genial founder and resident librarian, Prescott Brown, has already proved to be a caring and helpful neighbor.

## Calendar of Events - June to November 1986 (Con't)

As stated in your October 23 Open House invitation, President Carrier signed a lease with the Tolland Library Association on October 9. Located on Route 174, our new Library is only 30 minutes northeast of Hartford by car, just off Interstate Route 84. A simple-to-follow map is on Page 414 of this CML issue. Details of the Open House are discussed in the President's Message preceding this Calendar of Events.

### KUDOS DEPARTMENT

The twice-yearly effort involved in getting two issues of CML to Treasurer/Publisher Pat Lausier (#4) in photocopy-ready condition is made so much easier owing to the skilled keyboard talents of Assistant Editor Bernie Côté Bouchard (#196) of New Britain and Bea Couture Sawyer (#154) of Westport.

Bernie prepares the Franco birth-marriage-death listings from Connecticut newspapers, extracted from the Library's voluminous card index file, while Bea is responsible for the current installment of family histories in an ongoing series researched by the knowledgeable Father Albert Goulet (#258), East Blackstone's gift to Southbridge, Mass.

Joe Biron (#60) graciously volunteered the services of his personal computer in formatting, key entering, and printing the extensive Meriden marriage records compiled by Ray Thomas (#69) for this issue. We suspect that Joe, a Bristol resident and retired naval officer, may have been influenced in his decision by the fact that Ray, former FCGSC vice president, is also a Navy retiree. Whatever...our collective thanks go to both of those gentlemen for their unstinting contributions.

Assistant Editor Lee DeRagon (#8) of West Hartford concludes in the current CML his three-part series which extracted the service records of Franco World War I vets from Connecticut. Lee is to be commended for refreshing our memories concerning men and women of French-Canadian ancestry who served this country in a conflict that ended 68 long years ago.

Part VIII of Lee's continuing installments on the 1900 federal census of Connecticut appears in this issue. We were interested to learn that Cynthia DeRagon, daughter of Lee and Arlene, who has typed all those Franco family entries since the series' inception in June '83, is blind. It simply proves that many handicaps exist only in the eyes of the beholder. Thanks once again, Cynthia.

Wilfred Varieur (#133) of Stamford is welcomed once again to these pages. He's donated more absorbing minutiae from his family history. Treasurer Pat Lausier (#4) was the co-subject of an article promoting genealogical research and the new Mormon library branch in Bloomfield. The piece, reprinted in this CML, appeared in a recent issue of KONICA's employee magazine.

Publication Committeeman Marcel Guerard (#3) must have a King's Daughter or two in his family tree. If you want to check out the possibility of une fille du Roi in your own Canadian ancestry, Marcel furnishes in this issue several reference sources that you can consult at the FCGSC Library.



**MARRIAGE RECORDS FOR THE YEARS 1880 TO 1886  
ST. LAURENT'S PARISH IN MERIDEN, CONNECTICUT**

St. Laurent Parish was founded in 1880 and initially served both French and German Catholic residences of Meriden. German members of this congregation left in 1890 to establish their own local parish--St. Mary's.

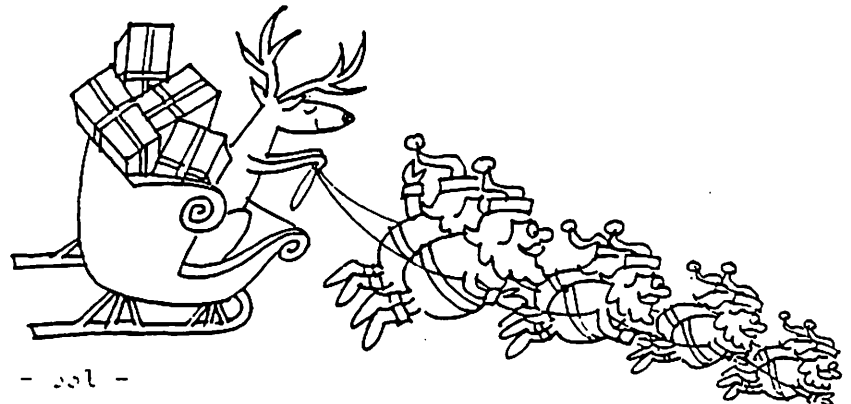
The first line of text, in the listings that follow, contains the full name of each bride and groom. In the case of right-hand column brides, each is identified by number. For complete data on the bride listed alphabetically by name only in the left-hand column, use her identifying number to locate the particular right-hand column entry pertaining to her.

Christian names of brides and grooms were originally recorded in Latin for several years; hence, the odd-looking spellings of those first names. The second line of text rectifies the Latin spellings by furnishing the individual's full name as it appears in Town Hall records. Additionally, the second line lists the person's age at the time of marriage as well as the place of birth.

The third and fourth lines of each entry provide the full names of the marriage partners' parents--obtained, for the most part, from Town Hall death records--plus the parents' places of birth.

The fifth and sixth lines of entry text list: a) Marriage partner's town and state of residence, b) Marriage date, c) Marriage site, and d) Name of officiating priest or, as applicable, justice of the peace.

This first installment of marriage listings covers the period 1880 thru 1886. More information is available on most of the brides and grooms. If you're interested in obtaining such data, contact Ray Thomas at 836 Marion Avenue, Plantsville, CT 06479.

IS IT REALLY POSSIBLE TO EXTEND A GENEALOGY BACK TO ADAM AND EVE?  
OR, DON'T BELIEVE EVERYTHING YOU READ!

The simplest answer to this question is No. Let me explain. In 35 years of genealogical research, I have yet to see a pedigree back to Adam and Eve that can be documented. By assignment, I have reviewed hundreds of pedigrees over the years. I have not found one where each connection on the pedigree can be justified by evidence from contemporary documents. In my opinion, it is not even possible to verify historically a connected European pedigree earlier than the time of the Merovingian kings (circa A.D. 450-A.D. 752).

Every pedigree I have seen which attempts to bridge the gap between that time and the biblical pedigree appears to be based on questionable tradition, or at worst, plain fabrication. Generally, these pedigrees offer no evidence as to the origin of the information, or they cite a vague source.

It is currently my responsibility to review the records submitted for temple work for those individuals who lived prior to A.D. 1500. I would estimate that 90 to 95 percent of these records are duplicates of work that has already been performed. This does not mean that most of the temple work has been completed for those individuals who lived before A.D. 1500. On the contrary, the great majority of the individuals of that time period still need their temple work done. The problem is that the resource procedures and source materials are of such a nature that members working in this time period end up retracing the paths of many before them, obtaining the same results. A few thousand names are listed over and over, while millions of others remain unrecorded.

The result is that nearly all the effort expended in the pre-1500 area, and all that expended in attempts to compile pedigrees back to Adam and Eve, seems to be a waste. At the same time, our more recent ancestors, to whom we as individuals have a far greater responsibility and opportunity, are often ignored--even when many research procedures have not yet been explored.

I would recommend that no one undertake research prior to A.D. 1500 without first checking with the (Church) Genealogical Department, and then only after all avenues of research for more recent generations have been exhausted. The probability of discovering information in the pre-A.D. 1500 time period that would lead to new temple work is practically nil, unless one receives some specific direction.

The volume of the work is such that there is a need for every researcher to be engaged in some aspect of it--but at the same time we must learn to work efficiently and effectively. We do not have time for needless projects that sap our time and resources.

FAMILY HISTORIES: Anger, Beaudry, Bessette, Bibeau,  
Bourque, Brousseau, Casaubon, Durocher, and Paradis

Anger, Bessette, Bourque, Paradis

There are two beatified religious, a local priest, and an Acadian family in four French-Canadian names of Southbridge (Mass.) people referred to by the Rev. Albert Goulet, a local genealogist. They are Anger, Bessette, Paradis, and Bourque.

Sister Leonie Paradis who died in 1912 was beatified by Pope John Paul II in September 1984 at Montreal. "This beatification was very significant. It marked the first time a Canadian was so honored in Canada by a pope. By this means, Pope John Paul II demonstrated his affection for French Canadians," observed Father Goulet.

There are many people in the area with the names of Paradis and Gregoire who are related to Sister Leonie Paradis, Father Goulet added. She was born Virginie Paradis on May 12, 1840, the daughter of Joseph Paradis and Emilie Gregoire who were married in 1837 at Lacadie, Quebec. As a nun she took the religious name of Sister Leonie Paradis and founded the Sisters of the Holy Family at Sherbrooke (Quebec). The sisters served as cooks and maids in church rectories, according to Father Goulet. She died at Sherbrooke in 1912.

Some of her probable relatives were married in Southbridge, such as Alexis Paradis and Rosanne Gauthier in 1896, and William Paradis and Louise Mathieu in 1903. The French ancestor of this family was Pierre Paradis, born on July 20, 1604 at Mortagne, Perche, France which is near Chartres and 70 miles west of Paris. In 1632 he married Barbe Guyon at Mortagne, France. They had 11 children. Pierre and his family emigrated to Canada, and he died at Ste. Famille, Ile Orleans, Quebec, in January 1675. His wife lived to a ripe old age and died in 1700 at St. Perre, Ile Orleans, Quebec.

With a smile, Father Goulet remarked that the name "Paradis" suggests that the first ancestor of this line lived high on a mountain so that local people quipped that he "lived high in paradise or heaven."

The other person honored by the pope was Alfred Bessette, who took the religious name of Brother Andre and died in 1937. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II in May 1982 at Rome.

Brother Andre is related to Mrs. Leonard Lataille of Eastford Road and Mrs. Theodore Benoit of Quinebaug Plaza, according to the local priest-

genealogist. Both are probably third or fourth cousins of Brother Andre. There are also some local residents with the name of Foisy who are related to him. In total, about a dozen Southbridge people are related to this beatified religious, Father Goulet added.

Alfred Bessette was born in August 1845 at St. Gregoire d'Iberville, Quebec, the son of Isaac Bessette and Clotilde Foisy. After working in Hartford, Conn., and Phoenix, R.I., he entered religious life, taking the name Brother Andre. The Oratory of St. Joseph in Montreal was founded by him about 1890.

For many years he served as a spiritual counselor for those with various illnesses. Father Goulet himself met Brother Andre in the mid-1930s while suffering from stomach ulcers.

The French ancestor of this family was the soldier Jean Bessette dit (nicknamed) Brisetout. Jean was born in 1623 at Cahors, Quercy, near Toulouse in southern France. His future wife, Anne Siegneur, born in 1649, was from St. Maclou near Rouen in northern France, close to the Belgian border. Jean sailed to Canada to serve in the Latour Company of the Carignan regiment, along with 1,000 other soldiers of the French Colonial Unit; 400 of them settled in Canada, including Jean.

Jean and Anne were married at Chambly, Quebec, on July 3, 1668. They had nine children. The name "Bessette" means a place with many birch trees, which the first ancestor had on his land.

With reference to Southbridge residents related to Sister Leonie Paradis and Brother Andre Bessette, Father Goulet remarked, "It's extraordinary to have a canonized saint or a beatified religious in one's family."

The Anger family has a local cleric in the person of Rev. Raymond Anger, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Southbridge. Born in 1923 at Attleboro (Mass.), Father Anger was ordained by Bishop Bernard J. Flanagan in 1957 at Worcester. His parents, George Anger and Antonia Boiteau, were married at Sacred Heart in Southbridge on Oct. 23, 1922. The local priest's grandparents, Charles Anger and Julia Prunier, were wed at Notre Dame Church in Southbridge in November 1872.

Father Goulet noted that there are dozens of relatives in town with the names of Anger, Lefebvre, Bean and Beane. One Canadian ancestor of Father Anger was Charles Anger who married Odile Richard on July 15, 1845 at St. Denis sur Richelieu, Quebec.

The French ancestor was Simon Lefebvre Anger who was born at St. Eloy de Tracy le Val, Noyon, France. This area of Noyon, near Amiens and close to the Belgian border, was also the birthplace of the famous Reformed Protestant theologian of the 16th century, Jean Calvin. Simon sailed to Canada where he married Charlotte de Poitiers at Notre Dame, Quebec, in January 1667.

According to the local priest-genealogist, the name "Anger" comes from the town of Angers in the department of Maine-et-Loire in central France near

La Rochelle on the Atlantic Ocean.

The final name in this first list is the Bourque family. Bourque is somewhat unusual since it is an Acadian name. This means that the first ancestor to sail from France to Canada went to Acadia, which is today Nova Scotia, and not to Quebec, Father Goulet emphasized.

The Canadian who came to the United States was Albert Bourque. He married Gracia Bouffard on Aug. 27, 1906 at Ste. Cecile de Wotton, Wolfe County, Quebec. This family left Canada to spend some time in Manchester, N.H., before settling in Southbridge.

The French ancestor was Antoine Bourque who was born in 1609 at Martaize, Loudun, Vienne, France. His birthplace was near La Rochelle on the Atlantic. After sailing to Canada, Antoine married Antoinette Landry about 1636 at Port Royal, Acadia.

According to Father Goulet, "Bourque" was earlier spelled "Bourg" and initially "Boer" which in Flemish and Dutch means "farmer." This indicates a possible Flemish ancestor from Belgium or The Netherlands where "Boer" is a common name.

After reflecting on these names, Father Goulet remarked, "It's nice to live with the knowledge of one's ancestors. By this means, their lives become our lives. They were industrious. They were people of faith and courage. For example, the Acadians suffered much after their deportation yet they persevered heroically."

### Beaudrey, Bibeau, Brousseau, Casaubon

The Southbridge families of Casaubon, Beaudry, Bibeau, and Brousseau trace their lineages to Quebec and the Atlantic coast of France in the 1600s, according to local genealogist, the Rev. Albert Goulet.

The family of Dr. George Casaubon goes back to his grandfather, Georges Casaubon, in Berthierville, Quebec, over a century ago. Dr. Casaubon himself married Beatrice Yerbury at Holy Cross Cathedral in Boston on Nov. 23, 1947. His father, Louis Casaubon, was born at Berthierville, Berthier County, Quebec, and later emigrated to the United States. Louis married Amelina Olivier on Nov. 26, 1911 at Arctic, R.I. Later on, the family moved to Southbridge.

Dr. Casaubon's grandfather, Georges, married Malvina Olivier on Jan. 18, 1869 at Ste. Genevieve parish, Berthierville. Father Goulet pointed out that the local physician's mother and grandmother were third cousins.

The French ancestor was Martin Casaubon, son of Jean Casaubon and Francoise Maissonneuve, who was born in 1663 at St. Jean de Luz, Gascogne, France. The town is near Bayonne in southern France, a short distance from the Spanish border.

Martin sailed from France in the 1680s. Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, 1689

was Martin's wedding day at Notre Dame de la Visitation Church, Champlain, Quebec. His bride was Francoise Lepelle. Eventually, they had six children. Martin was a soldier in the French colonial army who rose in rank from sergeant in the company of Ramezay to captain, and finally to major of militia in 1726 at Berthierville. According to Father Goulet, the name Casaubon means "a good house."

The Beaudry family comes from St. Paul Abbottsford, Quebec. Eugene Beaudry was born in St. Paul Abbottsford and later settled in Southbridge. On Nov. 24, 1891, he married Emilie Cadorette at Notre Dame Church, Southbridge.

Eugene's father, Moyse Beaudry, married Madaleine Stebenne in 1857, and Henriette Desroches in 1865 at St. Paul Abbottsford.

Father Goulet noted that the French ancestor was Toussaint Beaudry, born in 1641 at St. Jean de Velluire, Vendee, France. This town is on the Atlantic coast near La Rochelle. Toussaint arrived in Quebec in April 1664. He worked first as a roofer and then as a school teacher. According to the 1681 Quebec census, Toussaint owned two rifles, seven cattle, and 27 acres of farmland.

Toussaint Beaudry married Barbe Barbier on Nov. 24, 1670 at Montreal. The Beaudry couple had 10 children. Toussaint died in January 1694 at Montreal. In Father Goulet's view, the name Beaudry is of German origin and means "bold ruler."

The Bibeau family also has a long lineage traced by Father Goulet. The ancestral home is St. Ours, Richelieu County, Quebec. Louis Bibeau came to Southbridge over a century ago. His first marriage was to Rosalie Bibeau on Jan. 1, 1873 and his second to Malvina St. Martin on April 11, 1882. Both weddings took place at Notre Dame Church, Southbridge.

The father of Louis was Carme Bibeau who married Catherine Mainville at St. Ours on Nov. 3, 1851. The French ancestor was Francois Bibeau, born in 1632 at Lafond, France, near the Atlantic city of La Rochelle. In 1656, Francois left for Canada. He farmed six acres of land at Becancourt, Quebec. Later he worked as a bartender. His first wife was Jeanne Chalifour whom he wed on Aug. 17, 1671 at Quebec. His second wife was Louise Ennard with wedding bells ringing on Nov. 17, 1682 at Nicolet. Francois Bibeau died in September 1708 at St. Francois du Lac, Quebec. With a smile Father Goulet said that the name Bibeau means "a wine bottle with a long neck."

The Brousseau family's traditional home was in St. Pierre de Sorel, Quebec. Luc Brousseau married Mathilde Bibeault in February 1848 at St. Pierre de Sorel. They later settled in Southbridge where they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1898 at Edwards Hall.

Their three children were all married in Notre Dame Church, Southbridge. Albert married Agnes Lataille on Nov. 21, 1887. Luc, Jr. wed Mathilda Chasse on Aug. 25, 1884. Abdome exchanged vows with Catherine Dubois on Nov. 27, 1893.

The French ancestor was Jean Brousseau, born in 1661 at Le Langon, Fontenay County, France, also near the Atlantic city of La Rochelle. He arrived in Quebec in 1682 and worked as a carpenter. The following Sept. 6, he married Anne Greslon at Quebec City. Jean died in 1699 at Pointe aux Trembles, Quebec.

According to Father Goulet, the name Brousseau means "brush wood." He said the first Brousseau ancestor probably had his home in or near a forest that was difficult to reach due to all the brushwood in the way.

### Durocher

Among those of French-Canadian heritage in the Southbridge area are residents related to a beatified nun and a member of the school committee, according to the Rev. Albert Goulet, local genealogist. These are the Durocher, Proulx, and Despres families.

Mother Marie Rose (Eulalie Durocher) was beatified by Pope John Paul II in Rome on May 23, 1983. She was born Oct. 6, 1811 and died Oct. 6, 1849. Mother Marie Rose founded a congregation of teaching nuns known as the Holy Name Sisters in Quebec. According to Father Goulet, about 150 Southbridge area residents are related to her. Her direct descendants are named Durocher, Dragon, Martin, and Girouard.

The Canadian ancestor of this family was Louis Durocher who married Odile Bonin at St. Ours, Richelieu County, Quebec, on April 6, 1875. The couple had 10 children. In 1891 the Louis Durocher family arrived in Southbridge.

The parents of Mother Marie Rose were second cousins, Olivier Durocher and Genevieve Durocher. Their marriage took place Jan. 20, 1794 at St. Jean, Ile Orleans, Quebec. The French ancestor was Olivier Brien-Durocher, born in 1717 at St. Maurille d'Angers, Anjou province, France. This town is in west-central France near Nantes, close to the Atlantic coast.

After leaving France, Olivier served as a surgeon in Montreal as early as 1741. On Sept. 25 of that year, he married Marie Therese Juillet dit Avignon. She died in 1789, and he passed away in 1795, both at St. Antoine, Richelieu County, Quebec.

Father Goulet pointed out that Mother Marie Rose's mother (Genevieve Durocher) also was descended from Joseph Brien-Durocher. Joseph was also born at St. Maurille d'Angers, France, in 1706. He married the sister of Therese on May 6, 1730 at Batiscan. Joseph remarried in 1743 and died in 1749. These Juillet women were direct descendants of Blaise Juillet who was a great hero in the battle of Long Sault against the Iroquois Indians in 1660, according to Father Goulet.

The name Durocher means "(the house) near the big rock." It was probably used to identify the home of the first ancestor to bear this name, Father Goulet noted.

The priest-genealogist observed, "The members of the Brien-Durocher family should be proud of their ancestors in general and of the beatified Mother Marie Rose in particular. It is very rare in the Catholic Church to have a beatified nun in one's family."

George Proulx, a member of the school committee, is one well-known member of the family that has its roots in Canada and France, noted Father Goulet. He is the son of Claudio Proulx and Georgette Marin who were married Oct. 15, 1941 at Notre Dame Church in Southbridge.

All local members of this family have a common root in Alexis Proulx who married Marie Reine Tardif on Oct. 20, 1783 at St. Louis, Kamouraska County, Quebec. Their sons spent time in various towns in Quebec and then settled in Southbridge between 1886 and 1892.

The French ancestor was Jean Prou (Proulx) born in 1645 or 1647 at Notre Dame de Nantilly, Anjou province, France. This town is near Angers and Nantes, close to the Atlantic coast. About 1667, Jean sailed to Canada where he worked as a farmhand under contract for several years.

Jean exchanged wedding vows with Jacquette Fournier on June 5, 1673 at Notre Dame, Quebec. Jean and Jacquette had 14 children. He died in 1703 and his wife passed away in 1736, both at St. Thomas, Montmagny County, Quebec. Father Goulet said that the name Proulx means "a wise or brave hero." The first ancestor to bear this name was probably a soldier or a hunter.

Another local name that traces its roots back to Quebec and France is the Depres family. The traditional home of this family is St. Damase, St. Hyacinthe County, Quebec, Father Goulet noted.

The Canadian ancestor was Pierre Despres, the son of Victor Despres and Archange Gendron. His three brothers and a sister were married in various parishes of Bagot County, Quebec. Pierre left Canada for Detroit, Michigan. Later he settled in Fitchburg, Mass., where he married Celina Riel in 1871. Father Goulet emphasized that the Despres of Southbridge are descendants of Georges Walter Despres who married Rose Baron on May 13, 1907 at Manchester, N.H.

The French ancestor was Joseph Despres dit L'Orange who was born in the Principality of Orange, Dauphine, France, in the generation before 1753. His birthplace is in southeast France near Grenoble. The royal family of The Netherlands of the House of Orange takes its name from this principality.

After arriving in Canada, Joseph Despres dit L'Orange exchanged wedding vows with Marie Veronique Leroux on Nov. 19, 1953 at Champlain, Quebec. Father Goulet remarked that the name Despres means "house in the meadows."

SERVICE RECORDS OF FRANCO WORLD WAR I VETERANS FROM CONNECTICUT  
Part III

Military documents have long been a valuable source of family background data. Hence, our decision to extract pertinent information from Service Records of Connecticut Men and Women in the Armed Forces of the United States During World War I; 1917-20. The three-volume roster, alphabetized by surname, was prepared and published by the Connecticut Adjutant General's Office around 1941.

Copies of this important reference work were distributed to the Secretary of the State, Connecticut State Library, Commissioner of Public Welfare, each town clerk, state veterans organizations, various U.S. military offices, U.S. Library of Congress, Adjutant General of each state and territory, as well as to public libraries and most college libraries within Connecticut.

With the permission of Mr. Ciccio Savino, Historian for the Connecticut State Armory, and the kind assistance of his secretary, Mrs. Anita Dionne, the first abbreviated extract, covering the names Calvin S. Albee thru Camille C. Devaux, appeared in the December 1985 issue of CML. A second installment, containing the names Charles A. Devaux to Clarence T. Mallett, was published in the June 1986 edition of CONNECTICUT MAPLE LEAF.

This current December 1986 CML carries the 16 final pages of our abbreviated extract of Franco World War I veterans inducted or enlisted in Connecticut. The names begin with Emerson W. Mallette and end with Raymond Willett. As in previous installments, it contains the:

- a. Full name of each individual;
- b. Place where inducted or enlisted;
- c. Branch of service; viz.,
  - 1) AGD = Adjutant General's Department
  - 2) CHAP = Chaplain
  - 3) DC = Dental Corps
  - 4) ERC = Enlisted Reserve Corps
  - 5) FA = Field Artillery
  - 6) FMRC = Fleet Marine Corps Reserve
  - 7) MC = Medical Corps
  - 8) MERC = Medical Enlisted Reserve Corps
  - 9) NA = National Army (draftee forerunner of WW II's Army of the U.S.)
  - 10) NG = National Guard
  - 11) NURSE = Nurse Corps
  - 12) ORC = Officers Reserve Corps (non-regular officers)
  - 13) QMC = Quartermaster Corps
  - 14) RA = Regular Army
  - 15) USCG = United States Coast Guard

- 16) USMC = United States Marine Corps
- 17) USN = United States Navy
- 18) USNRF = United States Naval Reserve Forces

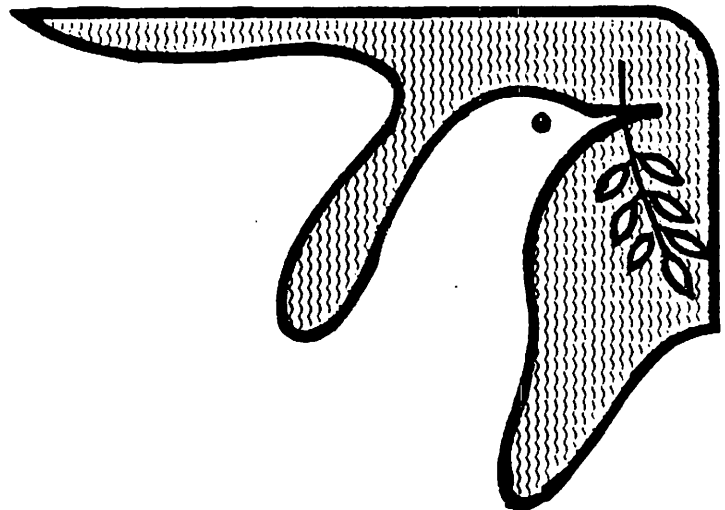
d. Birthplace;

e. Birth date or age at enlistment.

To illustrate the scope of each original record, a photocopy of an actual roster page has been reproduced on the next page. Readers interested in seeing the original work itself will find that it furnishes much more pertinent information on individuals, viz.,

- a. Service serial number of the person;
- b. Race;
- c. Home address;
- d. Individual service record data breakdown:
  - 1) "Ind" = Inducted. This entry lists the local draft board; i.e., "LB 16," plus the board's location.
  - 2) "Enl" = Enlisted, followed by place of enlistment.
  - 3) Unit assignments and dates ("Mch 23/17" = March 23, 1917).
  - 4) Individual's rank at discharge.
  - 5) Campaigns in which the person served during the war.
  - 6) Medical history, if applicable; viz., "WIA" = Wounded in Action, "KIA" = Killed in Action.

Please note that other states also published similar rosters of men and women who served in the military forces during World War I.

SOME VARIEUR FAMILY MINUTIAE

Editor's Note: Octogenarian Wilfred Varieur of Stamford initially contributed family memorabilia to CML in our June 1986 issue. More of his interesting material appears herewith--the 1665 Quebec marriage record of Wilfred's original Canadian ancestor...a piece on Governor Aram J. 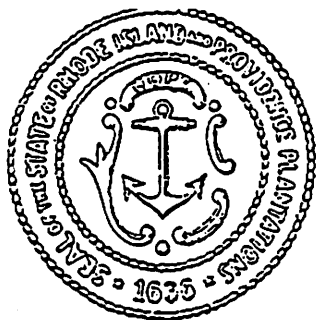
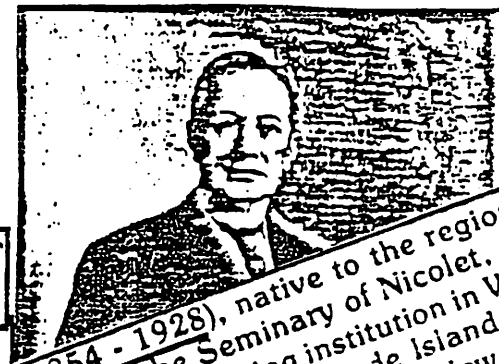

## ARAM JULES POTHIER

*Governor:* 1909-1915; 1925 to February 4, 1928.

*Born:* July 26, 1854 in Province of Quebec, Canada.

*Died:* February 3, 1928 in Woonsocket, Rhode Island.

*Buried:* Blackstone, Massachusetts. Precious Blood Cemetery.

ARAM JULES POTHIER, son of Jules and Domitilde (Dallaire) Pothier, was born in the Province of Quebec, Canada, July 26th, 1854. He was educated in Canadian Schools and at Nicolet College until 1871. Jules Pothier brought his family to Woonsocket, Rhode Island, in 1870, and in 1875, his son Aram, became a clerk in a savings bank of that city from which he rose to become president of the institution. In 1912, he became president of a large trust company in Providence. He was instrumental in interesting a number of important textile concerns to locate in Woonsocket.

Mr. Pothier was elected a member of the Woonsocket Committee in 1885, on which he served for three years; he was a representative from Woonsocket to the General Assembly in 1887-1888; in 1889 and 1900 he was commissioner from Rhode Island to the Paris Exposition. Upon the inauguration of the Woonsocket Government in 1889, he was made city auditor (1889 to 1894), and a member of the school committee 1889-1890. In 1894 he was elected mayor of Woonsocket, and was re-elected in 1895. In 1897 he was elected lieutenant governor by the largest plurality ever given to a candidate for that office, and in 1908 he was elected governor of Rhode Island, and served through re-election from 1909 to 1915 and from 1925 to February, 1928, when he died in office. He had the distinction of receiving in 1909 the largest majority that ever had been given to a gubernatorial candidate in the history of the State, and at the time of his death had been longer in office than any other governor since the adoption of the state constitution. He received the honorary degree of LL.D from Manhattan College, New York, 1911; Holy Cross, Massachusetts, 1912, and Niagara University, in 1912.

Aram J. Pothier (1854 - 1928), native to the region of Trois-Rivieres, alumnus of the Seminary of Nicolet, after having become president of a banking institution in Woonsocket, RI. was elected Governor of Rhode Island seven times. This exploit has been equaled only by New York's first governor, George Clinton.

CLINTON, George (1739-1812), US vice president, statesman and revolutionary soldier, often called the "father of New York state." He built up N.Y.'s economy during seven terms as governor (1777-95; 1801-04). He was a leading opponent of the Federal Constitution. He was vice president for 1804-12 and a presidential candidate in 1804.

## "THE CHINA CLIPPER"...STREAKS WESTWARD...ORIENT=bound

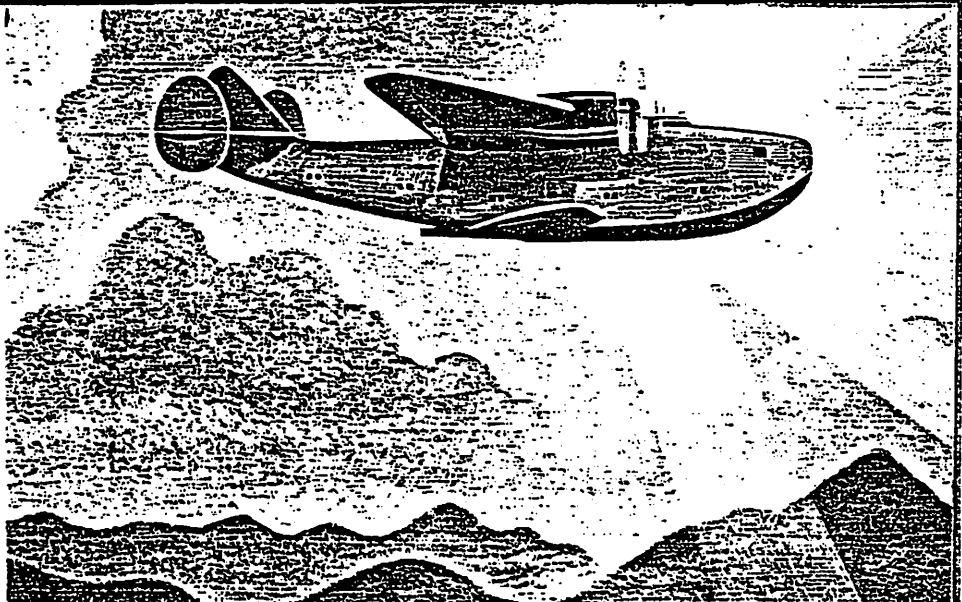
BOSTON, MASS., Nov. 21, 1935 (digest from press coverage). WILFRED E. VARIEUR, Assistant General Manager of Marsters-Temple Tours and a director of the New England Society of Travel Executives, flew westward today with a group of tourism specialists, travel writers and airline officials, to witness an historic event in international aviation. The group, hosted by Pan American Airways, will participate, at San Francisco, in the festivities and celebration marking the trail-blazing inaugural of commercial trans-Pacific flights, and the introduction of U.S.-Orient AIRMAIL. The first passenger flight California to The Philippines, is scheduled for October 1936, another proposed milestone toward the ambitious goal of world-circling air travel.

### A MEMORABLE 1935 EVENT

The governor of California declared a state-wide holiday. Postmaster General James Farley flew in from Washington, D.C. to read a message from President Franklin D. Roosevelt: "... even at this distance I thrill to the wonder of it all," he had written. More than 125,000 people lined the shores of San Francisco's great bay, and millions of radio listeners were tuned in to the nationwide broadcast of the event. November 22, 1935, would be a day to remember.

As bands played and hundreds of boats in the harbor tried to drown each other out with their whistles, the *China Clipper* opened its throttles and picked up speed, spray dashing from its sides and glistening in the afternoon sunlight. It rose quickly, and to the cheers of the crowd swept past the towers of the Golden Gate Bridge and disappeared into the Pacific haze. Its destination: Manila, capital of the Philippines, 8,200 miles away. It was the start of the first scheduled transpacific commercial flight.

The flight of the *China Clipper* was the culmination of nearly five years of planning and hard work. In 1931, after making the decision to open a route to Asia, Pan Am assigned Charles Lindbergh to survey a way across the Pacific via Alaska.

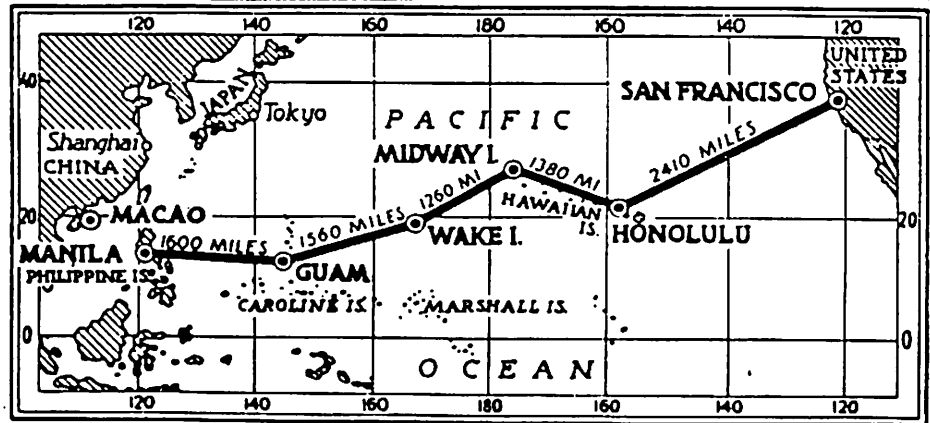

## THE BUTCHER OF LYON

Extract from "The Valois: A Family Genealogy & History,"  
by Jack Valois and the Reverend Raymond Valois, C.S.V.

A kinsman was among some nine thousand victims whose deaths can be charged to SS-Hauptsturmfuehrer (SS Captain) Klaus Barbie, German Gestapo chief for southern France in World War II. Dr. Gaston Valois, 55-year-old staff surgeon at the city hospital in Grenoble, about 42 miles west of the Swiss border, commanded the Unified Movement of the French Resistance for the Grenoble and Alps Region until his capture by Barbie in the chill, early morning hours of 27 November 1943.

The Butcher of Lyon made world headlines following his arrest by Bolivian authorities in January of 1983 and subsequent deportation to France where the 71-year-old schoolmaster's son from Bonn, Germany, was awaiting trial in 1984 for his crimes.

The gallant, wartime role of Dr. Valois only came to light thanks to Arthur Valois, VIII.2, of North Dartmouth, Mass., himself a decorated veteran of 33 combat missions in the skies over Europe as a turret gunner with the 8th U.S. Air Force.

One evening in April of 1983, Arthur happened to watch a segment of "Chronicle"--a documentary program originating at WCVB-TV in Needham, Mass.--which dealt with Barbie's lengthy interrogation of Henri Maubert, a member of Dr. Valois' Resistance unit, and now an international business management consultant living in Wayland, Mass. During an on-camera interview, the 63-year-old Maubert cited the courage displayed under Gestapo torture by his friend and commander, a Doctor Valois.

Details concerning that long-ago incident at the Gestapo prison in Grenoble were provided subsequently by Mr. Maubert in the course of phone conversations with the author and through an extract of the unpublished book manuscript, which he graciously furnished, recounting his own wartime experiences in the French Underground.

Valois, Maubert, and several compatriots were betrayed to the Gestapo by one of their own comrades named, disconcertingly enough, Lafayette. A journalist in charge of internal communications, intelligence gathering, and Underground radio transmissions for Valois' unit, the informer's fondness for the bottle proved fatal.

While intoxicated at a local cafe one day, Lafayette ranted and bragged about his covert activities once too often. Someone tipped off the Gestapo, who quickly took the incautious journalist into custody. Ironically, Valois had already issued Maubert an order to immediately execute Lafayette for his dangerous failings. But the Germans got to him first.

At Gestapo headquarters, the journalist was inexpertly tortured to the point where he lapsed into coma before revealing all he knew. Lafayette was then given a traditional Nackenschuss (a bullet fired into the back of his

neck), and the corpse dumped on the outskirts of Grenoble.

After arresting Dr. Valois at gunpoint in his apartment that morning, Barbie and his men searched the premises and confiscated all personal papers but failed to find the corresponding codes and cipher keys, hidden in an aspirin bottle suspended on a cord outside the bathroom window.

Gaston underwent 12 hours of severe interrogation at the hands of a thin and ascetic-looking, 30-year-old Klaus Barbie--from 6:30 p.m. on November 28 until 6:30 a.m. the next morning. Responsible for eliminating all sedition and subversive groups within his area, the Gestapo chief, in the words of one superior, "devoted himself completely and intensively to Sicherheitsdienst (Security Service) work." It explains, perhaps, why Barbie took personal pleasure in beating prisoners with his fists. Another of his foibles was to turn two vicious, German shepherd dogs loose on prisoners.

Henri Maubert, then 23, who served Dr. Valois as a personal assistant and Underground courier, also was arrested on November 27. Installed in an adjoining cell, while waiting to be summoned for his own interrogation session, he watched through the cell door window as two burly, uniformed SS guards half-carried Valois back to his cell.

As Maubert recalled, "His suit-coat was missing and the remaining clothes soaked with blood. Valois' powerful chest, striped with deep lacerations, showed through a torn shirt. His head lolled slightly over his left shoulder. My friend's wide open mouth now had no teeth left; the lips were cracked and swollen from blows. The forehead was also swollen, from which streaming blood clogged his puffed, nearly closed eyes. His fingers were shapeless--all the fingernails had been pulled off." These had once been the hands of a surgeon.

After the guards dumped Valois on the stone floor of the cell and left, Maubert communicated with him through a tiny hole he'd previously bored with a nail into a mortared space in the brick wall. Speaking in a halting, labored manner, the surgeon assured him that, "They know very little about us, and learned nothing from me. So don't talk. Be strong, and good luck. I can endure no more and am going to kill myself to end it all. It will make things easier for me as well as for all of you afterwards."

"No, Doctor! You can't...please," pleaded Maubert in dismay. "Nothing else to do," replied Valois. Nothing! Don't worry, I know what to do. I won't feel it. Good luck to you and everyone." "Doctor! Doctor!," whispered Henri frantically. But Gaston wouldn't answer. Many minutes later, probably after the surgeon lost consciousness and heretofore rigid self-control, Maubert heard a long, low sob followed by loud, short-lived moaning. Then there was a heavy thump at floor level. Valois was dead.

The frenzied Gestapo jailers found three short but deep cuts on the surgeon's left arm, just above the crease of the elbow. The rusted razor blade he'd used lay on a nearby wooden bench (each unit member secreted one somewhere on their person; Gaston had hidden his inside a leather waist belt). Next to it was a broken lense from his eyeglasses, undoubtedly kept in reserve should the dull blade prove ineffective.

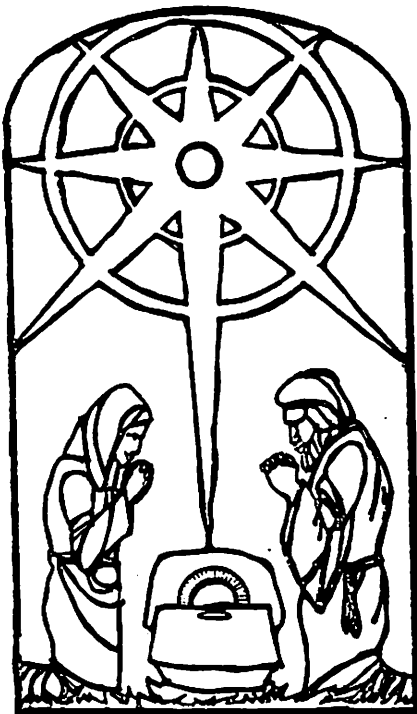
After initial misgivings on the morality of suicide as a solution to despair, Maubert finally came to peace with the premise that Valois' death was his greatest victory in that he sacrificed himself rather than disclose information condemning comrades to slower, possibly more painful deaths.

A graduate of the Medical Academy of Bordeaux, where he was considered one of the best centers on the school's rugby football team, Gaston left behind a widow and three children, one of whom is a practicing physician in Grenoble today. A 1984 query letter to the Comite d'Histoire de la Deuxième Guerre Mondiale (History Committee of the Second World War) in Paris, requesting additional information on Valois, was never answered.

Henri Maubert was able to convince Barbie, under less strenuous torture, that his association with the Grenoble Resistance was of a minor nature. The crux of his cover story: after fleeing home to avoid conscription as a forced laborer in Germany, Henri drifted to the Vercors Plateau area near Grenoble where other escapees from compulsory labor had banded together in scattered, makeshift camps.

There, Maubert maintained, he became acquainted with Dr. Valois, whose group helped provision several of the camps. At Gaston's request, he agreed to serve as a maildrop in Grenoble for Underground propaganda leaflet shipments. But Henri steadfastly denied any knowledge of the surgeon's true role as commander of an active Maquis unit. Barbie eventually believed him.

It didn't prevent a German military court, however, from summarily condemning Maubert to death for treason against the occupying power--as a lesson to other French youths--for the slight offense to which he'd confessed. Following transfer to the military prison at Fort Montluc in Lyon where, fittingly, Klaus Barbie today occupies a cell, his sentence was unaccountably commuted. Henri spent the rest of the war as a slave laborer at Ellrich Concentration Camp in the Hartz Mountains of central Germany.



1900 FEDERAL CENSUS OF CONNECTICUT (Con't)

The eighth installment of Franco-American genealogical data, from the 1900 federal census of Connecticut will be found on succeeding pages. The eastern Connecticut city of Norwich, in New London County, is again featured. Remember, those unusual spellings of various French surnames are generally attributed to English-American census-takers.

Abbreviations used to identify the relationship of individuals to the head of a household are explained on the page preceding the census data. The extract itself furnishes the following useful information:

1. Community of residence.
2. Family surname.
3. Christian name of each family member.
4. Relationship of each person to the head of family (see "Abbreviations Used in the Census").
5. Age of every person in the household ("1/12" = one month old, etc.).
6. Place of birth of each household member.

## FRANCO-AMERICANS: AN OVERVIEW.

Reprinted with permission from the September/October 1985 issue of Le FAROG Forum, official publication of ActFANE (Action for the Franco-Americans of the Northeast), published at Manchester, N.H.

### Introduction

The term "Franco-American" generally described an American of French-Canadian ancestry and, to a small degree, an American of French ancestry. French-Canadian emigration to the United States occurred mostly from Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

**POPULATION.** According to the 1980 census, Franco-Americans number 13.6 million nationwide and rank as the fifth largest ethnic group in the country. The census offers the following breakdown of the five largest ancestry groups in the U.S.:

English - 49,598,035	Irish - 40,165,702
German - 49,224,146	Afro-American - 20,964,769
Franco-American - 13,672,734	

**DISTRIBUTION.** Franco-Americans are found in every state of the Union. The largest concentration and the highest density is found in the Northeast where 22 percent of the country's Franco-Americans live. The states with the largest Franco-American population are:

California - 1,367,100	New York - 898,400
Massachusetts - 957,300	Texas - 689,300
Louisiana - 947,600	Florida - 515,400
Michigan - 943,200	Illinois - 507,200

The states with the highest percentage of Franco-Americans, as compared to the total state population, are:

**LANGUAGE.** Over 1.5 million Americans, aged five and up, speak French. They constitute the fourth largest language group, other than English speakers, in the U.S. The 1980 census gives the following figures for the numbers of persons, five years and up, who speak a language other than English at home:

Italian - 1,618,300	Polish - 820,600

### **HISTORY.**

1604-1613 - Samuel de Champlain explores the coast of New England, Vermont, New York, and the Great Lakes, claiming a large part of Maine for France. In

1608, Champlain founded what is now Quebec City.

17th & 18th Centuries - With Montreal and Quebec as points of departure, explorers, soldiers, and missionaries discover and colonize a territory that covers 31 of today's American states.

1755 - British forces start the deportation of the Acadians from Nova Scotia, scattering the "French neutrals" all over the East Coast and beyond. Louisiana becomes a refuge for these Acadians.

1775-1781 - During the American Revolutionary War, battalions organized with recruits from Quebec fight under George Washington. In 1783 the U.S. Congress awards tracts of land on the shores of Lake Champlain to these soldiers, refused re-entry into Canada by British authorities. These French-Canadians are believed the first to be recognized as refugees by the U.S. government.

1842 - With the Webster-Ashburton Treaty settling the boundaries between Maine and New Brunswick, the Acadians on the south side of the St. John River overnight find themselves U.S. citizens.

1870-1930 - For a variety of reasons, many of them economic, over 2 million Canadians emigrate to the United States during this period. Many settle in the Midwest but the majority head for New England.

While joining millions of immigrants from throughout the world in this new land of opportunity, the French-Canadians are also returning to a land either discovered or first explored by their forefathers. Unlike other immigrant groups, the French-Canadians have no ocean to cross and most Franco-American communities are less than a day's journey from the "mother country."

By the turn of the century, Franco-American communities, with their own institutions and independent cultural life, have developed into large enclaves in almost every manufacturing city in New England. In 1900, Fall River, Mass., has become the third largest French-speaking city in North America, after Montreal and Quebec. By 1930, New England's Franco-Americans had built and were maintaining close to 250 private institutions of learning, from kindergarten to college, attended by 90,000 young Franco-Americans.

1937 - In order to renew ties with their roots, 4,000 Franco-Americans travel to Quebec City to take part in the Second Congress on the French Language. This event leads to the establishment of permanent ties between all of the French-speaking communities on the continent and, to this day, Franco-Americans are included in a number of international organizations dealing with the French presence in North America.

1950-1985 - Attracted by the warm climate, Québécois by the tens of thousands join colonies of northern Franco-Americans already in Florida and California. These groups are now the fastest growing French-speaking enclaves in the U.S.

Mid-1970s to Today - On the heels of a cultural renaissance among younger Franco-Americans, a number of regional and state organizations are created, as well as the first national Franco-American organization.

## Franco-Americans: An Overview (Con't)

CONTRIBUTIONS. From the start, Franco-Americans have provided the labor backbone in the key sectors: farming, lumbering, textile, shoe, and other light manufacturing. They have also generously contributed their sons and daughters to the religious life and to the professions.

In all fields of human endeavor, every generation of Franco-Americans has produced great men and women who made significant contributions to the United States. To name but a few:

Public Service - John Charles Fremont, James Domengeaux, and General Curtis Lemay.

Literature - Will Durant, Jack Kerouac, and Gary Trudeau.

Sports - Leo Durocher, Ron Guidry, and Joan Benoit (overlooked was Napoleon "Nap" Lajoie of Manville, R.I., fabled second baseman/batsman of the 1930s--Editor).

Performing Arts - Jacques d'Amboise, Genevieve Bujold, Robert Goulet, and Michael Sarazin.

CURRENT ISSUES. Although groups and regions within the Franco-American community have specific goals and concerns, a concensus could be built around the following needs:

1. Develop new leadership on all levels.
2. Provide a culturally-relevant education for Franco-Americans of all ages.
3. Broaden educational opportunities for our youth.
4. Provide human services that are culturally-relevant to our people in need.
5. Improve services to French-speaking elderly.
6. Give added value to cultural and linguistic differences within the U.S.
7. Increase international communications, especially in a North-South direction in North America.

## OVER 98 MILLION ANCESTRAL NAMES AVAILABLE

Following is a reprint from TEMPO, employee publication of Konica Business Machines U.S.A., Inc., Windsor, Ct. Editor Kathy Byars kindly granted permission to reproduce her article, which features FCGSC Treasurer & Publication Committee Member Pat Lausier (#4).

Man by nature is a curious animal and, to many, no topic can be of greater interest than oneself. Long before Alex Haley's best-selling historical novel and subsequent made-for-television mini-series "Roots," many Americans had been engaged in the pursuit of researching their ancestries, vis-a-vis genealogy. But Haley's "Roots" ignited a spark.

Genealogical research is a process of asking the following five basic questions over and over again:

1. What do I know about my family?
2. What do I want to learn about my family?
3. What records does the library have?
4. How do I obtain a record?
5. What do I do next?

Two employees of Konica Business Machines, Maryan Cowles and Patrick Lausier, have been interested in genealogy for many years. Maryan has traced her descendants on the maternal side of her family to the Mayflower. Pat, who has been keenly interested in genealogy for the past 12 years, has traced his wife's ancestry back 13 generations and the Lausier family name 11 generations.

Both are extremely excited about a new genealogy library that has recently relocated to Bloomfield from Manchester which is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and directly tied into the vast resources of the main Salt Lake City Genealogy Library of the church, the largest such library in the world. The Salt Lake City library houses over one million rolls of microfilm, one hundred fifty thousand books, eight million Family Group Record forms, and many other records.

Located at 1000 Mountain Road in Bloomfield, the satellite library is open to the general public and many of its services are free-of-charge. A tour, conducted by volunteer guides, will show visitors what is available locally and what can be obtained from the Salt Lake library. More importantly, guides will provide patrons with proper forms and suggest possible directions as they embark on the search of their personal ancestries, which can include birth, marriage, death, and other historical records scattered throughout the world.

According to Lausier, who is the current Treasurer of the French-Canadian Genealogical Society of Connecticut located in Hartford (since moved to

bigger and better quarters in Tolland--Editor), "The study of genealogy can lead to a fascinating excursion through history. It's finding that 'missing piece to a never-ending puzzle' that captivates one's curiosity."

Both Cowles and Lausier admit that the study of genealogy can result in an expensive pastime, but it doesn't have to be. With the advent of the home computer, software packages have been developed which assist the genealogical researcher in tracing one's ancestry--perhaps not the principal reason to invest in a computer, but if there's one already in the home, why not?

Starting from "point zero" can involve civil record search fees, postage and travel expenses. But many resources like the new library in Bloomfield and various genealogical societies, libraries, and archives located throughout the United States and Canada put the "pursuit of one's roots" well within almost everyone's reach.

## ASSOCIATION OF ONE-NAME STUDIES

Genealogists and Family Historians throughout the United States and Canada have spent millions of hours collecting and compiling information of their forebears. Many individuals and groups have collectively spent hundreds of hours working on a select surname line of interest to them. Often this intensive research has been a duplication of work conducted previously or even concurrently by other genealogists. The Association of One-Name Studies has been established to prevent such duplication and to coordinate such efforts on a productive basis.

The Association has been formed to encourage the exchange of ideas and a cooperative liaison between Genealogists and Family Historians who concentrate their research on all references to a single surname. The aims and objectives of the Association are:

1. To bring together those individuals and groups of people who are engaged in the collection of family data relative to all references, branches and occurrences of a single surname.
2. To maintain and publish a register of the surnames being researched and, through close association with the National Genealogical Society, the English Guild of One-Name Studies, the Federation of Genealogical Societies and other major genealogical organizations, to secure the widest possible awareness of One-Name research.
3. To produce quarterly a newsletter and eventually a journal and hold periodic meetings for the exchange of information on sources and research techniques helpful to One-Name activity.
4. To encourage and ensure that members will deal with all reply-paid inquiries relative to the registered surname.

The Association will be divided into eight major groups of ethnic backgrounds: namely British, Germanic, Spanish and South American, Scandinavian, French and Italian, Oriental, Slavic and "Other" origins. The Association will publish a register annually including all surnames being studied. Criteria for inclusion in the Register will be divided into four categories of entry:

- A. Formally Constituted Societies.
- B. Correspondence groups producing a newsletter.
- C. Individual researchers specializing in ALL references to a single surname and the specific spelling variants (determined by the researcher in charge).
- D. Individual researchers specializing in a single surname, but subject to limitations of area and period as defined.

In order to cope adequately with inquiries, it is expected that the Registered Researcher will have accumulated a reasonable volume of data on the specific surname and variants. To become a Formally Constituted One-Name Society, the following requirements need be met:

1. Extract all entries of the surname from censuses in all states and provinces 1790-1910 where published indexes are available.
2. Extract all entries from all telephone directories in the United States and Canada for the surname in question.
3. Photocopy or xerox all entries of the surname in the International Genealogical Index for all states and Canada.
4. Prepare a newsletter or journal at least once each year to be mailed to all members of the given society.

While the goal for each entrant in the Register will eventually be to complete the above four tasks, such a compilation is *not* a prerequisite to registration.

DE ROCHAMBEAU FAMILY OF VENDÔME, FRANCE

Editor's Note: The direct paternal lineages of the De Rochambeau and De La Fayette families which follow are the handiwork of Al Bérubé, a member of Montreal's SGCF. He also provided the photocopy of a commemorative postage stamp, issued by France in 1980, honoring General Rochambeau. Mr. Bérubé noted that the patriotic feats accomplished by both of these volunteer officers significantly contributed to the success of the American cause during the Revolutionary War (1775-83). He has promised us more lineages/biographies of prominent Franco-Americans (Paul Revere, James Bowdoin, Peter Faneuil, Henry Thoreau, John Fremont, etc.) who played important roles in the history of the U.S.

- 1669 - René (IV) DE VIMEUR DE ROCHAMBEAU, Lord DU TREMBLAY; son of René III & Marguerite (HURULT DE ST. DENIS). Married (contract dated 2 May 1669) to Elisabeth DE MENON DE TURBILLY, daughter of Urbain & Marie (DE CHAHANNAI).

VIII Generation

- 1696 - Joseph Charles DE VIMEUR, Lord DE ROCHAMBEAU; son of René IV & Elisabeth (DE MENON DE TURBILLY). Married (contract dated 20 Dec 1696) to Marie Madeleine BRACHET, daughter of Antoine & Anne (DE GENNES).

IX Generation

- 1718 - Marquis Joseph Charles DE VIMEUR DE ROCHAMBEAU; son of Joseph Charles & Marie Madeleine (BRACHET). Married (contract dated 29 Nov 1718) to Marie Claire Therese BEGON, daughter of Jean Baptiste & Jean Claire (GABRE).

X Generation

- 1749 - Jean Baptiste Donatien DE VIMEUR, Count DE ROCHAMBEAU; son of Joseph Charles & Marie Claire Therese (BEGON). Married (contract dated 12 Dec 1749) to Jeanne Therese DE TELLEZ-DACOSTA, daughter of Emmanuel & Madeleine (DE TILLENE).

The Rochambeau family originated in Vendôme, principal town of Loir-et-Cher township in Perche Vendômois province on the Loire River in eastern France. Jean Baptiste Donatien de Vimeur, Count de Rochambeau, was born at Vendôme on 10 May 1725. A marshal of France, he commanded French military forces during the American Revolution.

As a youth, Rochambeau was educated for a religious career but, following the death of a brother, embarked instead on an army career. He fought with distinction in Europe as a cavalry officer during the War of the Austrian Succession (1740-48) and promoted to colonel in 1747. In the Seven Years' War (1756-63), Rochambeau's bravery and skill won him the rank of brigadier general & cavalry inspector.

When the royalist French regime decided in 1780 to aid the American rebels in their War of Independence, the 55-year-old Rochambeau, then a lieutenant general, was given command of the French expeditionary force. He landed at Newport, Rhode Island, in July of 1780 at the head of an army numbering nearly 6,000 men.

General Rochambeau remained entrenched there for about a year, under British naval blockade, while awaiting French naval reinforcements. In accordance with a plan arranged between Generals Washington and Rochambeau, the French troops marched from Rhode Island in June of 1781 and joined an American army encamped near White Plains, New York.

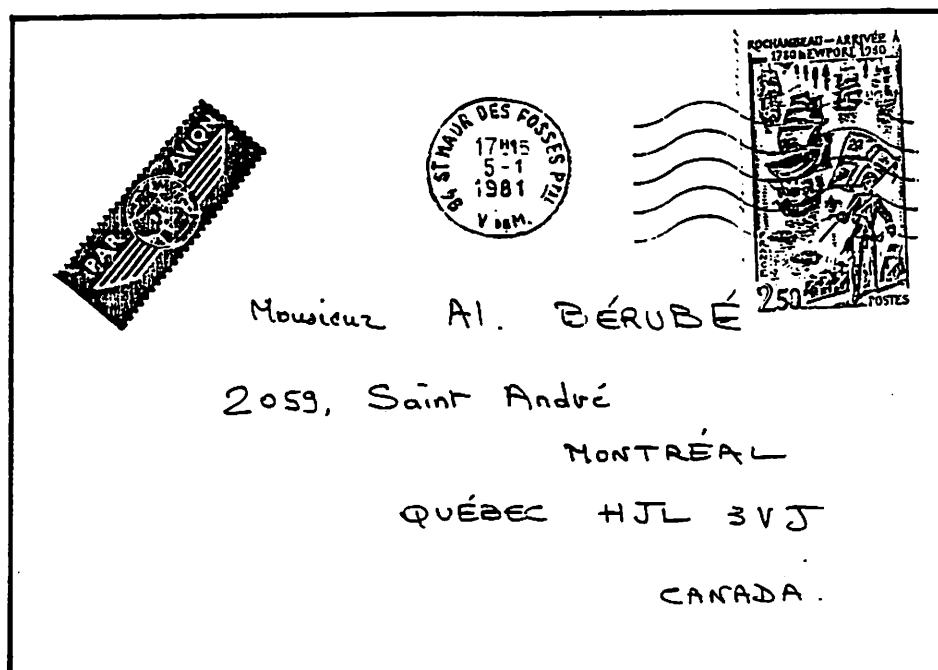
From that point, the combined force swiftly moved south to reinforce the army of the Marquis de LaFayette at Williamsburg, Virginia, arriving there on 14 September. On 2 October 1781, the Americans and French, reinforced by 4,000 troops brought from the French island colony of Haiti by a French fleet under Admiral Francois Grasse, laid siege to the British army at Yorktown, Virginia.

Under the command of General Charles Cornwallis, the English army surrendered to the Continentals on 19 October, which led to the cessation of hostilities and war's end.

General Rochambeau's invaluable services on behalf of the American cause were enhanced by his singular lack of jealousy or self-importance. Though placing himself under Washington's command, he continued to maintain strict discipline among the French troops.

After returning to France in 1783, the Count de Rochambeau was named commander of the Channel coast port of Calais and later of the Alsace region. He also took part in the early events of the French Revolution (1789-92). Given command of the northern France army in 1790, Rochambeau was appointed to the rank of marshal a year later.

He resigned from the army in 1792 and imprisoned by the revolutionists during the Reign of Terror (1793-94). Napoleon Bonaparte restored him to the rank of marshal in 1804 and named him a grand officer of the Legion of Honor. Rochambeau died on his birthday, 10 May 1807, on the family estate at Vendôme in north central France, aged 82, and is buried at Thoré, France. A statue of the count sits facing the White House in Lafayette Square at Washington, D. C. This gift from France was dedicated in 1902 during the administration of President Theodore Roosevelt.

1708 - Edouard ID DE MOTIER DE LA FAYETTE, Lord DU BOUCHET, Married in 1708 to Marie Catherine DE CHAVAGNAC.

XIV Generation

22 May 1754 - Michel Louis Christophe Roch Gilbert DE MOTIER, Marquis DE LA FAYETTE. Married in 1754 to Marie Louise Julie DE LA RIVIERE --daughter of Joseph Yves Thibaut Hyacinthe, Marquis DE LA RIVIERE, and Julie Louise Celeste (LE VOYER).

XV Generation

11 Apr 1774 - Marie Joseph Paul Roch Gilbert DE MOTIER DE LA FAYETTE. Married in 1774 at the Chapel de Noailles, rue St. Honoré, Paris, to Adrienne Françoise DE NOAILLES, daughter of Jean Louis Jacques Paul DE NOAILLES, Duke D'AYEN, and Henriette Anne Louise (D'AGUESSEAU).

The Motier de la Fayette family originated in the Auvergne region of France that comprises the modern-day departments of Cantal, Puy-de-Dôme, and portions of Haute-Loire, L'Allier, and L'Aveyron.

Marie Joseph Paul Yves Roch Gilbert de Motier, Marquis DE LA FAYETTE, was born at the Chateau Chavagnac in Auvergne, France, on 6 September 1757. The family of this statesman and general officer was ancient, honorable, respected, wealthy, and with a tradition of distinguished military service.

La Fayette entered the French army at the age of 14 in 1771 but was forced to leave five years later--an indirect casualty of reforms aimed at eliminating inefficiency and ineptness in the officer ranks. His subsequent decision to visit the American colonies proved to be a crucial judgment on La Fayette's part.

Though anxious to assist the rebellious English-Americans, his petition to leave France in 1776 was disapproved by King Louis XVI. But La Fayette, determined to go at any cost, used his wealth to purchase and outfit a sailing vessel. He set out for America and landed in North Carolina on 13 June 1777.

The 20-year-old marquis was promptly awarded an honorary commission as major general by the fledgling Continental Congress but never given an actual command. Hurrying north to meet General George Washington, who became a lifelong friend, La Fayette was promptly attached to that command in time

to participate in the Battle of Brandywine (11 Sep 1777) in Pennsylvania where he was slightly wounded.

He then distinguished himself in action against Hessian mercenaries at Gloucester, Pa., and also served creditably at the Battles of Barren Hill and Monmouth (28 Jun 1778, New Jersey), where he led a division of American troops.

After failing to persuade Washington in 1778 to invade Canada, La Fayette was asked to return to France in order to stimulate the French war effort on behalf of the American cause. He was arrested immediately for flouting the king's earlier edict against leaving the country. A week later, however, La Fayette was summoned to the royal court at Versailles to personally report on the progress of the war in America.

His efforts to promote increased French participation in the North American conflict were unsuccessful and La Fayette went back to the U.S. in April of 1780. One year later, Washington entrusted the defence of Virginia to the marquis. His series of shrewd, evasive, and defensive maneuvers resulted in the English commander, Lord Charles Cornwallis, being bottled up at Yorktown in August of 1781.

Here La Fayette's force was joined by Washington's Continentals, French troops under command of General Rochambeau, and a French naval fleet. General La Fayette was present on 19 October 1781 to witness the British surrender at Yorktown.

The marquis sailed back to France the following year where he was greeted with great enthusiasm, awarded the prestigious Cross of St. Louis, and appointed a brigadier general in the French army. The years immediately afterward were devoted to enjoyment of his role as a hero and defender of liberty.

La Fayette returned again to the United States in 1784 where he was accorded a rousing reception and invited to the Mount Vernon estate of General Washington. During this period, the marquis developed a markedly liberal political philosophy which even led him to defend the rights of French Protestants.

When the French Revolution erupted in 1789, La Fayette was appointed to the command of French militia and tried unsuccessfully to moderate between the royalist and revolutionary factions. He died at Paris on 20 May 1834, aged 77.

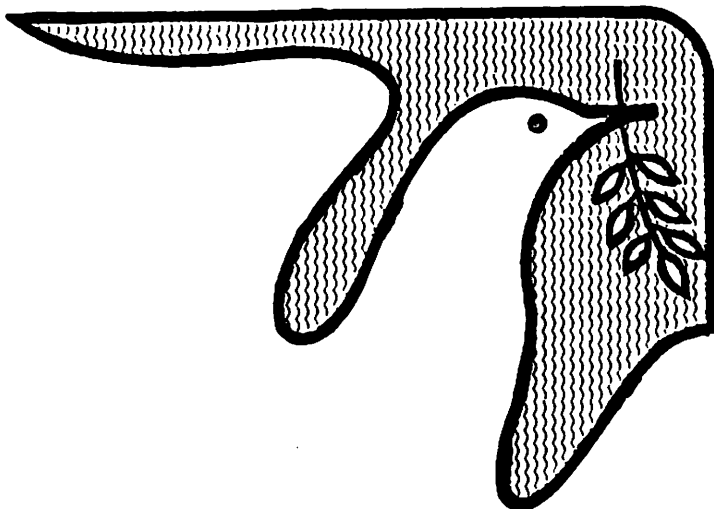

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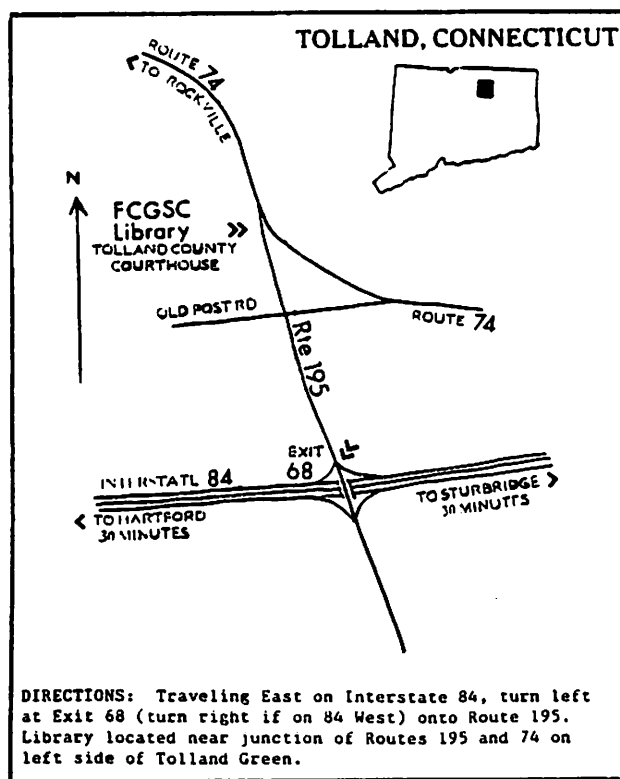
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
