

#### NUMBERING SYSTEMS .... Don't panic!

Numbering systems at first seem complicated and demanding if they are not well understood. The fact is they exist for convenience and are not complicated. The numbering systems exist for two reasons:

#### 1. For a constant easy reference to a person.


The number is only to identify a person. These are used in filing card or computer systems. For instance a father, mother and children could have quite different numbers. Each person's record (or filing card) would show the numbers of the other relatives. This is why computer systems are good at printing charts. The system prints the related numbers into a pre-set format. You could arrange filing cards into the pattern, photo-copy the layout, and add lines with a ruler.

2. Where the number or letter <u>has a specific meaning as to the place</u> of a person in a genealogical table (chart).

These are used to show relationships. This is where most confusion lies. A number has only a limited use for the convenience in using some particular table or chart. A few examples are as follows.

ANCESTRAL LINEAGE CHART, also known as a <u>BIRTH-BRIEF</u> or <u>PEDIGREE CHART</u>. This is a specialized chart which shows only the <u>direct ancestors</u>. These are common, with or without the numbers.

The numbering uses the mathematical function of the power series of TWO(2). It is a neat trick. The chart shows only direct ancesters, which double in number (a power of 2) with each generation.

Printed charts are available for 5 - 7 generations with or without the numbers. Any larger size becomes unwieldy and it is easier to key additional charts into the numbering system. A large example of this is a round fan-type chart.

#### FAMILY TREES drawn manually ( i.e. not on a computer)

These can be vertical or horizontal and show a person, or couple, and their descendents. These charts are irregular because of different family sizes. Before the advent of computer systems, an attempt was often made to identify generations and a linkage between two people. The systems are an aid to using a particular chart but do not have any other special value.

#### Example 1: Christian name of child + Generation number.

George 1, Benjamin 2, John 3, Enos 4, Harold 5, Hugh 6, Joanne 7, Breen 8. (Example 2 is better.)

#### Example 2: Each number is a generation and the order of birth.

From George, 4, 1, 6, 5, 1, 1, 1 Breen Marien (earliest to latest) or George, Benjamin 4(th child), John 1(st), Enos 6(th), Harold 5(th), Hugh 1(st), Joanne 1(st), Breen Marien 1(st).

(Using names probably reduces errors.)

If you set-up a family tree then find earlier information you may not want to re-number existing lines. The easy solution is to number backwards with different symbols. For example:

e.g. William is the 3rd son of Joseph. He is II.3

Eleanor is the 3rd child of William. She is III.3.3.

Chester Henry is the 2nd chld of Eleanor. He is IV.3.3.2.

This is a method that was used by the United Empire Loyalists Assoc.

Just remember that there is no hard and fast "right "system. If you want to use one, then decide for yourself "why?". Then decide on the simplest system you can make up or copy. Consider adding also a simple number for each person which you can key to numbered biographical notes in an attached text.

Many societies request an Ancestral Lineage Chart (Birth Brief or PEDIGREE CHART) from their members. The QFHS is setting up a similar reference file and would like one from you. We have the printed blank charts in the library

Books are shelved in call number order, line-by-line; alphabetically and/or numerically as indicated by succeeding lines. For example:

#### FILING:

The catalog is divided, with author and title cards interfiled in one drawer and subject cards in the other. have followed the standard filing rules: alphabetical, word-by-word; initial articles and punctuation ignored; abbreviations and numerals filed as though spelled out; "Mac" and "Mc" interfiled.

Subject headings are filed alphabetically except where a subject has chronological subdivisions. "See" references are filed in their alphabetical place, and "see also" references before the first entry under the same word. For example:

> The 1851 census for "Canada East" (Quebec) Lovell"s Montreal Directory, from 1842 - 1921.

The non-Catholic civil registers (births, marriages), 1763-1875, for the larger congregations in and around Montreal. Tanguay's Dictionnaire Genealogique des Familles. Vols. 1-7.

The Ontario county atlases, from the mid-1800s, the complete set. These atlases are full of NAMES: land ownership maps, portraits, 'views' of homes, farms, and businesses, directories of Patrons giving occupation and 'nativity', and each has a historical sketch of the county. We have the print version of a few of these, as well as the 1881 Historical Atlas of Quebec Eastern Townships.

#### Scottish resources in the Q.F.H.S. Library:

Baxter A. In search of your British and Irish roots: a complete guide to tracing your English, Welsh, Scottish, and Irish ancestors (1982). Chapter 11. Excellent introduction to Scottish research; includes history, the Clan system, where to find which type of record.

Harper J.R. The Fraser Highlanders (1979). Includes history and origins of the Clan Fraser.

James A. Discovering your Scottish roots: a step-by-step guide for family researchers (1981). Truly a step-by-step guide, for searching in person or by correspondence from Canada.

MacKay W.D. Scotland farewell: the people of the Hector (1980). The Highland Scots in Nova Scotia.

Whyte D. A dictionary of Scottish emigrants to Canada before Confederation (1986). Includes dates, places, occupations, some marriages and children; and sources of the information.

TOPIC & SPEAKER: THE REVEREND JOHN STUART, D.D., U.E. by

OKILL STUART (Great Great Grandson)

Okill Stuart, a member of our Society and now retired from his own successful real estate business in St. Lambert, descends from a very old and illustrious Canadian family that in three generations has known several Chief Justices' and one Prime Minister. There were probably more Knighthoods than in any other Canadian family, all from two distinguished Loyalist ancestors who first arrived in Quebec.

The Reverend John Stuart was born in Paxton, now Harrisburg, Pennsylvania and ordained by the Bishop of London in I770. He served as minister of Queen Anne Chapel at Fort Hunter in the Mohawk Valley from I770 to I78I, marrying Jane Okill of Philadelphia in I775. His parsonage still stands and while there he took Joseph Brant into his home, learned the Iroquois language and translated a part of the Bible for the Mohawk Indians. Desiring to remain under the British flag the family fled to Montreal where he taught school for four years before moving to Kingston in I785.

He served as representative in Upper Canada for Bishop Charles Inglis and founded St. George's Cathedral. They raised a family of eight children, including George the Venerable Arch Deacon of Kingston, John whose daughter Mary married Sir Allan MacNab, Sir James Stuart, Bart., and the Hon. Andrew Stuart, whose son Sir Adam Stuart married into the DeGaspe family and another son, Henry, married Caroline, a daughter of William Smith, Chief Justice of Canada.

Okill was educated at Bishop's College in Lennoxville and Gordonstoun in Scotland and landed with the assault troops in Normandy on 'D' day. He remains active in sports and community affairs and a developed interest in Canadian history.

#### SERVICES AT THE OFHS LIBRARY AND OFFICES

In the library is a microfiche copy of the INTERNATIONAL GENEALOGICAL INDEX (I.G.I.) of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints (the Mormons). This includes Parish records from 90 countries.

Access to the I.G.I. is limited to members and is by appointment. Please call the library to ensure that a microfiche reader is available when you want it during regular library hours, Monday and Thursday. There is a per hour charge of \$1.00 for the use of the readers and any copies of the pages.

Out-of-town members may obtain information from the I.G.I. by using the request form in the December issue of Connections, or request a form from the office with a SASE.

There ia a \$3.00 fee for the search for a family name IN ANY ONE province, county or state. The fee includes thr reproduction of up to 5 pages of surname listings, handling and postage. A charge of only \$1.00 will be made if the name requested is not found at the location specified. If there are more than 5 pages, you will be charges for the extra pages.

Please specify the province, county or state for Canada, England and the U.S.A. as the I.G.I. is indexed that way. Ireland, Scotland, Wales and all other countries, names are listed alphabetically.

PLEASE INDICATE "I.G.I. SEARCH" ON THE OUTSIDE OF THE ENVELOPE.

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#### MICROFILM INTER-LIBRARY LOANS

Arrrangements have been made to borrow microfilms from many institutions for our members, subject to the following rules:

1. ALL FILMS MUST BE USED AT OUR LIBRARY AND MAY NOT BE REMOVED.

- 2. Canadian films are loaned for 30 days, American for only 14.
- 3. Only 3 reels at a time may be borrowed from one institution on behalf of a member, except the U.S. National Archives, no limit.
- 4. Canadian fees \$2.00 for the first film, \$0.50 each for others. American fees \$4.75 for the first film, \$3.75 each for others. Fees include rental and return postage charges, and are subject to change without notice.

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

#### The Good News and the Bad News !

#### A report from your President.

We have had a busy year. The library at the Summerlea Centre has been improving and we will be here for another year. The worst feature of this has been lack of access on week ends and holidays. Attempts to get a better site through municipal assistance have not materialized.

Membership has been maintained and services are improving. We have had a good selection of guest speakers and attendence of up to 70 people when the weather was good. Six work-shops were held with five short evening ones having the best response. The library indexing project is bearing fruit with 400 books with new spine labels and reshelving in progress. By autumn good index files will be available for the first time. Between donations and purchases the library has increased by over 100 books this year. The Jesus Christ Church of the Latter Day Saints, (The Mormons) have donated a microfiche index of their holdings in Utah. Joining the Federation of Quebec Genealogical Societes has provided information, contacts we did not have before, and an awareness of our existence by the other societies.

The publication of the revised 875 Cemetery List Directory and list of 240 for sale has stimulated a good response. A new list has page count and price on it. The prices are based on \$ .50 mailing and \$ .50 per page with a \$2.00 minimum and a discount to \$ .35 per page on large cemeteries. Charging for research services by our volunteers is helping to cover our costs. We have been given a used but good reader-printer by Bell Canada which will replace the old Bell & Howell Reader. We cannot afford the \$ 7000 for a new machine.

Incorporation of the Society is waiting for clearance for the use of our name, there has been a possible legal conflict which must be resolved. We will apply for status as a Registered Charity when incorporation is complete.

The bad news is that we must increase our fees again by \$ 5.00. Dorothy Weller's year end financial report in this issue shows that our operating loss to the end of March is about \$ 1500. This is incomplete because of the added three months rent \$ 1200 due this spring. Our loss for the year is about \$ 2700, \$5.60 per member.

#### THE QUEBEC FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETY

#### ITS FIRST DECADE

#### by Margaret Turner

One of the most faithful and longstanding members of the Quebec Family History Society, Marion Hykle, was asked to present a seminar on Genealogy at the Beaconsfield Public Library in June, 1977. Marion had been lecturing in genealogy at Marianopolis College and Terri Shaw, head Librarian in Beaconsield invited her, and Doris McIntosh of the Missisquoi Historical Society, to give presentations about their experiences in genealogical research. Interest shown in this seminar prompted Terri to call a meeting in September, 1977.

A small group of ten people interested in family history formed the nucleus of the Quebec Family History Society at that fall meeting in the Beaconsfield Council Chambers. From this tiny original group the Society has grown to a membership of 546 in 1987.

The group met monthly at the Beaconsfield library and an interim executive was formed while the work of choosing a name and writing by-laws was carried out. Now, a decade later the Quebec Family History Society is in the process of being incorporated.

Its purpose was, and is still, to assist interested persons in family history research; to preserve, collect, maintain and discover the family history of those Quebecers whose ancestors were English. There are, of course, connections with the French community, not only in Quebec but throughout Canada. As in all genealogical research there is an interest in families from all parts of the world who speak many languages.

In that first year great strides were taken. This little group of people who had never met before developed a warm camaraderie in their mutual interest. Almost everything was new and everyone wanted to learn as much as they could. A "Beginner's Course in Genealogy" was given at the Beaconsfield City Hall by Margaret Stead and Gwen Trask, both charter members. Twenty-three people registered for the five week course. This was a resounding success and many fledgling family historians were launched. Courses were given later in Dorval, the South Shore and other locations until the society had a permanent home where workshops and more courses would be given.

Monthly general meetings were held on the second Tuesday of the month (just as today) at the Beaconsfield City Hall and membership began to grow. The City of Beaconsfield needed their room for their own meetings in 1980 so in January, 1980 the society moved to the lecture room at the Lachine Municipal Library. A good relationship, free of charge, continued until we outgrew the space. In September 1984 the meetings moved to the Maison du Brasseur, the lovely Lachine Community Centre on the shores of the Lachine Canal.

#### "Connections"

One of the most important requirements of a genealogical society is a good journal. Most societies publish at least four of these a year. The QFHS began immediately to prepare a newsletter. The first Editor was Margaret Goldik, a charter member. She brought an almost inborn ability and understanding of putting together a publication. She achieved high standards throughout her career as editor and the Society is indebted to her for paving the way for future editors. Art work on the covers of many issues of "Connections" has been done, and is still being done, by Margaret's husband, Leon. The four issues of "Connections" have never failed to be assembled, printed and mailed on time in the ten years of its publication thanks to the dedicated committee members who have taken part in its issue. Margaret Goldik was editor for the first three years and was succeeded by two other Margarets - Margaret Turner, for one year and Margaret Oke for two years. In September, 1984 Hugh Banfill took over as interim editor until Helen St. John became editor in March 1985. Then in September, 1986 it was Hugh Banfill as full fledged editor. In September, 1987 Bob Alderson became the present editor. Putting the journal together is not an easy task and all have given a great deal of time and effort in the publishing of this worthy paper. The editors have tried to provide as much material as possible on Quebec sources, both English and French.

#### The Library

Many meetings took place at the Beaconsfield Library between the first Library Chairman, Margaret Turner, the new President, Margaret Stead and Terri Shaw. What a tiny library there was in the beginning. The original physical library consisted of two or three shelves on wheels to carry the small collection into the Beaconsfield Council Chambers for the monthly meetings. All the members were hungry for any publication they could lay their hands on. Eventually we needed shelves so in the winter of 1978 the City of Beaconsfield donated space on the second floor of their Centennial Centre where the few books were available twice a month with one volunteer attendant. That was in January and February but in March it was back to boxes and bags and the material was stored in a member's home. Then Beaconsfield Library donated an old yellow bookcase to the cause and the books were housed in the home of Beverley Gilbertson-Yager, who had become Library Chairman in September, 1979.

The most exciting development came in 1979 when Mr. David Stewart, of the Macdonald-Stewart Foundation, offered the Society a room on the second floor of Glenaladale in Pointe Claire where we had our own combined office and library. We moved in in May 1980. Our office-library had a full sized bathroom because Glenaladale had been a private home. When the then Chairman, Colin Chapman, of the Federation of Family History Societies paid a visit he was very impressed with our quarters. He was certain we must be the only member of the FFHS who had our very own bathroom! The meeting rooms downstairs were also available for monthly executive meetings or for workshops and the despatch of "Connections". In the ensuing months many members acquired desks, filing drawers and cabinets, built shelves, painted and shelved books. The librarian began the task of cataloguing the books and periodicals.

She provided an accession list with each issue of "Connections". Several members donated books and there were journal exchanges with societies throughout the world. Later, in 1983, the Macdonald-Stewart Foundation presented us with a second room, known as "Uncle Willie's Room". It had been used by the late Sir William Macdonald the great philanthropist who sewed the seeds of the Foundation. The room was used for the microfilm and microfiche readers that were being acquired.

We needed a new room because in 1982 Nina Maclennan, then recording secretary, had donated a microfiche reader which was to be used for the International Genealogical Index. Nina spent many, many hours negotiating with the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City to obtain it. This was an excellent addition to our little library. Later we would obtain more microfiche and microfilm readers. In 1984, Dr. David McDougall a long-time member and Program Chairman, donated the 47 reels of the 1851 Quebec census in memory of his late wife Doris who had also been an active member.

In 1985 the library officially received permission to participate in inter-library loans enabling us to borrow from other libraries or to loan our material to them. For example, members could now order census records from the Public Archives in Ottawa, books from libraries elsewhere in Canada and so on. In November, 1985 the Heritage Branch of the United Empire Loyalist Society had lost their space in Montreal so they too were provided with a room at Glenaladale by the Macdonald-Stewart Foundation. This library collection was now made available to members of the OFHS.

With great dismay it was learned, in 1987, that the Glenaladale property, so generously donated to the QFHS, The Victorian Order of Nurses and the Montreal Volunteer Bureau, had been sold for subdivision. The building was housed in the city of Pointe Claire and many citizens of Pointe Claire and other municipalities fought to preserve this historic site. Unfortunately it was not to be; the Pointe Claire city council felt that it could not afford to purchase the property and at the time of writing houses are now being built on the land.

This meant that the QFHS had to move! But where was the burning question for several months. In May, 1987, after eight years at Glenaladale, the office services were moved to the home of Joan Benoit, the Society's secretary, and long-time member. The IGI microfiche and reader was moved to another member's home. The books had to be packed and stored. At last a home was found at the Summerlea Centre in Lachine. It is a school, owned by the Protestant School Board of Montreal. A lease was signed for one year so the QFHS library now has its new home and will remain there at least for one more year. Now that it is no longer housed at Glenaladale it is necessary to pay a yearly rental but the Society has fortunately been able to meet this challenge.

Cataloguing of books and periodicals has been much improved and updated by faithful volunteer members. There is now a Directory of Cemetery Lists - about 800 Quebec cemeteries have been recorded. Members continue to contribute these valuable records to the library. A Directory of Surnames has also been printed and brought up to date at regular intervals.

Don Martin succeeded Gilbertson-Yager as Library Chairman in 1983. By now the library was open every Monday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and on the first and third Monday evening of each month. By 1984 there were close to 900 accessioned items and a wide variety of periodicals from several countries. In 1986 Jim Hay became library chairman and the constant and time consuming work of the library continues. The library is now open on Mondays and Monday evenings and on Thursdays. A far cry from the two days a month in the beginning at Beaconsfield!

It would be impossible to name all the committee members of the library who have given so much of their time in these formative years. However, every member who uses the library can only marvel at the excellent contribution that all these people make.

The library and office have always interacted closely. In the beginning the Corresponding Secretary did all her work from home. For the first two years, Marion Hykle, a charter member, handled all the correspondence for the Society. In a genealogical society this is an onerous task. In 1980 she was joined by Joan Benoit. Marion continued for another year while Joan Benoit has continued right up to the present with assistance from Marion. Aproximately 1,600 pieces of mail were handled last year! In 1986 Joan Benoit became the first permanent, paid secretary of the Society. This is a part time position and her appointment filled a great need. Her conscientious work throughout the first decade of the QFHS has been invaluable. Many volunteer typists have helped with office work and with putting the journal together.

#### The Executive

Any society relies heavily on a good president and executive committee. The QFHS has had three outstanding presidents. Margaret Stead was the first. She had extraordinary ability in the formation of a new entity. Her knowledge of genealogy was extensive. She was a member of the UEL Society in Montreal and the Société généologique canadienne française and was aware of the need for bringing an English speaking genealogical society into being. The fact that she had a broad knowledge of genealogical societies in Quebec, the rest of Canada and the United States as well as overseas made her just the sort of person we needed to give direction to the Society. She had the ability to make the fledgling society known through the media and throughout the family history community. She had a great gift of being able to remember member's names and interests so that she was able to bring them into their proper niche in serving the Society. She was president until 1981 when Richard (Dick) Garrity became the second president.

Dick served for five years and steered it through a great period of growth. He had excellent administrative skills and was able to direct his executive and volunteers to give of their best. He spent long hours working at Glenaladale organizing the office, not only in genealogical affairs but also in physical work, such as painting, cleaning and carpentry! He spoke to many groups describing the QFHS and as time went on we became more widely known and, of course, more members joined.

In 1985 Dick joined Margaret as the second Past-President and Hugh Banfill, a long time member is the President as the society enters its second decade. Hugh brings his special skills of computer knowledge, wide knowledge of Quebec province and business experience to the running of the Society. He too has great organizational skills and the society has indeed been fortunate to have had three such able presidents in its infancy. He has been initiated well by being faced with the move from Glenaladale when he began his presidency. Expenses have risen due to the need for more office equipment and the fact that many pieces were old when first received. The cost of books rises steadily so that while the first two presidents had many growth problems, Hugh has further expansion to oversee in the 1990's.

For the first two years the Treasurer of QFHS was Rosemary Joy. 1981 she was replaced by Dorothy Weller who has been our treasurer ever since and our finances are in such good shape today because Dorothy has, in no small part, contributed to keeping the house in order. various committee chairpersons and their committees have devoted many hours; the Telephone Committee has kept us informed about meetings and special events; the Publicity Committee has kept the public and members alike informed through the newspaper, radio and television; the Refreshment Committee provides the opportunity for members to discuss their genealogical finds and problems over a coffee and cookie after the meetings; the Excursion Committee arranges trips and visits; the Welcoming Committee is on hand at all the meetings to make newcomers and old timers welcome. The Membership Committee keeps track of everyone and watches as the Society expands. There is not space here to mention all who have given of their time but past issues of "Connections", especially the June issues with Annual Reports, are testimony to the people who have made the Society work.

#### Other Activities

A myriad of speakers have graced the general meetings in the first ten years. They have come from as far away as England, Scotland and Ireland and the United States. Local speakers have made members aware of the Jewish community, the black community, English immigrants, Irish immigrants and Scottish immigrants. We have learned about settlements in Quebec City, the Gaspé, Montreal, Lachine, Chateauguay Valley, the Eastern Townships and more about the province of Quebec. There have been lectures on Huguenots, United Empire Loyalists, and Indian communities. Members have given splendid descriptions of their research at "Show and Tell" meetings. We have learned about restoring old photographs, how to record a cemetery, how to set up a pedigree chart, how to use computers in genealogy. There have been three Program Chairmen during this decade - David McDougall, Kerr Canning and Gerald Rogers. They have all brought us a wide variety of interesting speakers.

Workshops have been conducted on various topics such as English, Irish and Scottish Sources. Courses have been given for beginners in genealogy. Visits have been made to archival repositories in Montreal and the Public Archives in Ottawa as well as Quebec museums in the Eastern Townsips. The furthest trip was made to England in 1984 when a group of members spent two weeks visiting repositories there.

The Quebec Family History has been people helping people for ten years. This brief history is dedicated to Fran Lowry, a charter member, who passed away too soon in 1986. Fran embodied the ideal of a genealogist. She was friendly, helpful and anxious to share her knowledge. Her smiling welcome at meetings will always be remembered by those who attended in the 1980's. We will continue to share and grow in the 1990's.

Footnote: The author has used nine volumes of "Connections" and her own memory for this history. she regrets if she has missed any important event or person.

The following was submitted by one of our members, Florence Hooten. It was taken from Iowa's "Birmingham Enterprise" dated December 1, 1892.

"It appears that already during the present year, 40,000 French-Canadians, or 3 percent of the whole population of Quebec, have crossed the borders into this country. The total emigration from the Dominion to the States during the 10 years prior to 1891 was 1,000,000 the majority of whom were French or of French descent. The Committee of the Quebec Legislature has not yet announced its conclusion as to the causes of this exodus, but it is clear that at the present rate, the Canadians are individually solving the problem of annexation by industrially annexing themselves."

# BOOK REVIEWS OF SOME RECENT DONATIONS

"Bill " William Archibald Wood of Hudson Que. was to be a speaker at one of our meetings. He couldn't come and instead donated copies of two books which he edited from documents in the Wood Family Archives. The two books are:

The Days of JOHN WOOD , Watchmaker and

Something From Our Hands, the 19th Century Memoirs of the Rev. John Wood, 1828-1905.

Few families have been so fortunate to find such an extensive and continous collection of letters. The first volume starts with the departure of John Wood, watchmaker of London England, emigrating to Canada in 1832 with his wife Anna Wentworth and their five children aboard the barque "Africaine". They arrived towards the end of a cholera epidemic. The letters recount simply the trials and tribulations, and progress of the family as John's business developed and the children grew up.

Their son John grew up and felt a call to the ministry of the Congregationalist Church. He served several congregations, travelled extensively in Canada, England and even to Rome and Palestine. He tells some interesting stories, never malicious, of the church conflicts of the 1860's. The obvious good sense and foreward thinking make these letters an interesting record of people, both men and women, who contributed so much to the growth of Canada in the last century.

The editor has done good job in arranging the letters in a flowing, well connected series with a an interesting variety of content.

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# COMPUTERS FOR FAMILY HISTORY

By D. Hawgood , Hawgood Computing Co. London, Engand

This little book is about the use of computers for genealogists. It is an introduction to the application of computer systems and what they can do. The data base elements and the typical reports available are clearly described. Even the use of spread-sheets, usually ignored, is mentioned. The first edition of this books was reviewed but the review was not published because so much material dealt with computers available in England but not in Canada.

Now that the market has simplfied into either "Apple" or "IBM - type" systems the book is more valuable. The section on transferring data from one commercial system to another is useful if one wants to buy English data on diskettes and use it on Canadian or American software. This is a good book to read if you are thinking of buying but don't know much about it. Then do a lot of talking to others to get software that will be simple but adequate.

La Féderation Québecoise des Sociétés de Genealogie

The Canadian Federation of Genealogical and Family History Societes

The Quebec Federation is publishing a book listing all the people doing genealogical research in Quebec. The QFHS has supplied its membership list to them. The book will be published later this fall and may provide a contact if you are searching for a specific name.

The QFHS has been asked to suppy members to the Quebec Federation committees. We have been slow to do this because reasonable fluency in French is needed. Ernie Smith is now on the Certification Committee which is trying to develop a certification program if it seems desirable. Some years ago about 40 people were certified by the federation. This was based on experience and reputation not on a formal accreditation procedure.

The Société généalogique Canadienne-Française is holding its 45th anniversary conference on October 7-8-9 on the theme of hunting for your non-French ancestors. We will be participating with a display of our publications. One of their members Mr. Henri Bergevin, who is their "apostolic" delegate to the Roman Catholic Diocese of Montreal, will speak to our society in October on the topic of chasing Canadians who were exiled to Australia. Mr Bergevin has just returned from spending six months there doing research.

Joan Benoit our hard working secretary has several other functions. She is the official delegate from the Quebec Federation to the Canadian Federation of which she is both Secretary and Treasurer.

Joan reports to us that members of ten societies met in Ottawa in May and elected an executive for the Canadian Federation of Genealogical and Family History Societies. The Federation is now legally registered, but not incorporated, and has adopted a set of by-laws. The President is Ruth Breckman of the Manitoba Genealogical Society, the Vice-President is Peter Whitelaw of the B.C. Genealogical Society, and Joan Benoit of the Q.F.H.S. is Secretary and Treasurer.

There are four categories of membership (in summary form):

- Full members Independent Genealogical or Family History Societies.
- 2. Associate members Branches of independent societies.
- Institutional Members organizations with related interests.
- 4. Individual members Subscribe to the newsletter etc., but do not vote.

# The objectives are:

- 1. To improve communications between the societies.
- To start a newsletter to help accomplish the first objective.
- 3. To assist societies in dealing with government matters, particularly federal.

#### COMPUTER SURVEY

Some of our members from time to time have offered to use their computers on society projects. We have not been able to take good advantage of this because we did not have the projects to do. Several ideas have come up.

Gerry Rogers' 6 volume History of the Chateauguay Valley should be properly typed and the cemetery lists indexed. This is a series of short (a few pages each) histories of many (120?) small communities and could easily be parcelled out. The files would be put together for final assembly and editing. All word-processing systems on IBM type computers can produce an "ASCII" file which can edited by any other system. A simple data base or spread-sheet could work well on the cemetery lists.

We want to edit our Library Indexing diskettes to provide a complete book list in a manageable size for publication.

Some of our members are using MODEMS and telephone lines to use data banks or transmit data. Should we have one available so that we coud send information to our members?

Could some of our members share their experience and answer questions from other members? Perhaps CONNECTIONS should start a computer query section?
