

LIBRARY CORNER by Mimi Hayward & Wendy Hayes

The cataloging of the library is well under way and soon cards will begin to appear in the catalog drawers, initially as a guide to the books and eventually as a guide to all the library resources - microfilms, journals, cemetery lists, maps, pamphlets, etc.

In the next few issues of Connections we will outline the classification of various materials, the subject headings used, and the way in which localities are shown. We want the system to reflect users' interests - family names, places, and time periods. Neither of the universally used systems, the Library of Congress and the Dewey/Sears, were suitable so we borrowed and adapted from each of these and added some original ideas suited to the QFHS collection. We are still modifying and adding as the need arises - it's a 'living' system!

The call number, on the top left corner of the card and on the spine of the book, identifies by line:

- 1. General subject content
- 2. Geographic locality and type of work
- 3. Author, editor, compiler (responsibility)
- 4. First year of publication
- 1. General subject content: 2 letters
 - AD = General almanacs, directories, yearbooks, annual reports
 - BG = Blography
 - CL = Cemetery lists
 - FH = Family histories
 - GN = Genealogy (general)
 - GS = Genealogical sources
 - HD = Heraldry, insignia, flags, decorations
 - HG = History, geography, demography
 - MH = Military history
 - PER= Periodicals
 - PR = Preservation, restoration
 - FIC= Fiction
- Geographic locality and type of work: 3 numbers.1-2 numbers
 - 000 = World-wide / International
 - 101 = North America
 - 100 = Canada
 - 300 = United States
 - 300 = Europe (except U.K.)
 - 400 = United Kingdom
 - 500 = Mexico. Central America, South America, West Indies
 - 600 = Asia
 - 700 = Africa
 - 800 = Australia, New Zealand, Pacific Islands
 - 900 = Arctic and Antarctica

The second digit represents country, province, group of states, as appropriate; the 3rd digit represents county groups, for example: 151 = Canada(100)/Quebec(150)/Montreal Island(151)

"ENGLISH RECORDS" IN QUEBEC FRENCH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES

Last year the Q.F.H.S. joined the Federation of Genealogical Societies of Quebec. This has provided new contacts about sources of information for our members. They are not all equipped to answer quickly letters written in English but usually have someone who will make the effort. Because most of their work is with the Roman Catholic church records, the repertoires des mariages, only recently have some groups worked on "protestant "records in old communities.

Ernest Blondin of the société de genealogie de l'Outaouais has published books on old Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist and United, Baptist and Lutheran birth, marriage and burial records, and cemeteries lists from the Gatineau -Pontiac areas and Eastern Ontario areas of the Ottawa Valley. Guy W.- Richard of the Quebec City Society at Sainte Foy has a personal card index of 35,000 marriage, birth and death records of the older "protestant". Anglican, Methodist, Congregationalist and other churches in Eastern Quebec. The areas covered is East of Lèvis and Quebec City and includes Gaspé and the North Shore. Mr. Richard will answer any inquiry for \$5.00 and will refund the cheque if you supply added information for his records. 

There are lots of reference goodies is this issue like Alison Yeats' list of journals from other societies and Hugh Banfill's article on sticking a number on great grandma so that you can find her when you want her.

This being the last issue before the holiday season, let me say on behalf of myself and all the people that make our society the great one that it is, a very Merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year to you and yours and I hope Santa leaves you lots of old birth certificates, wills and family hierlooms under your family (Christmas) tree.

LOOKING AHEADNEEDS , COSTS,
CHANGES in WORKSHOPS and ANSWERING QUESTIONS

Like all societies we run with a budget. For the first time this year we will play \$4000 in rent and face a forecast loss of about \$1200. Our increased membership income and reduced taxes and mailing costs for CONNECTIONS helped us to take the rent and loss risk for a year.

We face more costs in the future. The reader-printer for micro-fiche like the I.G.I. is obsolete and repair parts will not be available. We must plan for a new reader-printer costing up to about \$5000. The computer system is working well and needs to be expanded for about \$1000. We now understand fully what a time consuming job the manual membershp records were. We now print 550 mailing labels for CONNECTIONS in less than an hour. An up-to-date membership list is available at any time so that labels for renewal notices are printed within half an hour.

You will soon see the results of the library indexing project. The job could not have been done manually. What volunteers would type 6000 or more dreary little cards and 2000 finicky lttle labels. But we cannot produce a single alphabetic list of all the books because the file on a diskette is not large enough.

We get up to 18 requests per month. Joan Benoit tries to get a quick answer which will encourage memberships. Once Gary Schroder and Joan got interested enough that the answer was two days work in three different placesfree! Even typing and mailing an answer costs time and money. Your executive has already set up a committee to look into the cost of answering requests. We are proposing a charge per hour for searching our library, with a minimum charge for non-members. Most other societies have set polices on charges because they cannot afford paid staff working for free. You have probably found this out for yourself when writing other societies. We are not a charity and our charges are the lowest of any.

Workshops are more expensive now that we must hire the hall in additon to speaker's costs. There is enough effort involved that organisers feel frustrated with little return to the society despite the work and financial risks. We have decided to raise the price of work shops. The beginners' workshop will be \$ 12 instead of \$10 and others will be \$ 20. Fees will be payable with enrollment and will be returnable on reasonable notice or if the workshop is cancelled. Angie's extensive list of workshops is tentative and depends on the demand. Their success will eliminate our forecast loss.

We need to cover our possible loss for the year and have a surplus to put towards our needs and better service. We solicit your suggestions on how to raise our income. Please encourage possible new members, as we lose some every year, 50 new members nets us about \$600. We need your help to keep building a productive, friendly and useful society.

HERALDRY

(a short explanation)

Written & Illustrated by

Heraldry had its origins as a method of identification in the twelfth century at the height of the feudal system in England, Scotland and Europe. As local wars became large scale confrontations and weapons increased in sophistication, more defensive armour was required and knights were soon enclosed in heavy armour and helmets that concealed their identity from their followers. It then became the custom to paint symbols on shields and helmets that would be recognized by friend and foe alike on the battlefield. Banners were also emblazoned with various symbols that would be recognizable at a distance and serve as a rallying point around the king or knight.


The medieval knight had his symbol not only on his shield, but on a surcoat that was worn over his armour, thus arose the term coat "of arms". These "arms" were displayed on his banner and on the cloth that covered his horse and came to be worn in civil life on the clothing of both he and his wife.

As no two men of the same region were allowed to use the same "arms", they then became personal symbols and were used on seals to documents and letters written for them by the clerics, the only literates at the time. A personal "crest" was sometimes worn on top of the helmet, not usually in battle, but in the jousting tournaments. This word "crest" is erroneously used today to signify a complete achievement of arms or any badge of a military unit, school or corporation.

armour became outdated, the arms were now used for decorative purposes to mark personal property such as curtains, furniture, buttons, brooches, silverware, china and writing paper as identification of the owner. As time passed and more and more people adopted their own "arms", it became neccessary to control were appointed to make visitations Heralds throughout the country to record the arms used by various families and they had the power to make changes if it was found that another family had a prior right to similar designs. Heralds established the rules which have remained valid with very little alteration to this day. Therefore everything connected with "arms" is called "heraldic" and the whole complex of armorial knowledge and art is called HERALDRY.

The College of Heralds in England was established in 1484 to govern the design and granting of arms. The Court of the Lord Lyon in Scotland and the Chief Herald of Ireland govern for those countries. In Scotland, a grant is protected by law from improper use by anyone other than a direct descendant of the original grantee and any other person using these arms can be prosecuted.

There are certain rules governing the design of a coat "of arms". If you look carefully at drawings of arms, it is seen that only a few basic colors are used and only certain designs which, at first, seem confusing but, in fact, are not complicated. The five colors are red, black, blue, green and purple with sometimes an orange and a sort of maroon. The colors are called "tinctures" and the last two, "stains". Two "metals" are also used, gold and silver which are usually shown as yellow and white. The basic rules for general use are very simple. Color is not shown on top of another color nor metal on another metal as this would be too indistinct at a distance. Any of the above colors, though, will show up well on either white or yellow. Likewise, white or yellow shows up well on any one of the colors.

Now an explanation of the coat "of arms". They are usually shown on a shield which will be one or more of the colors and metals mentioned above. On this may be placed various symbols or "charges" which vary from simple lines called "Bends, Chevrons, Fesses, Saltires, Pales", ect. to many forms of animal and plant life. Even everyday items like water buckets, keys, ladders and anchors were, and are still used. Above the shield is usually depicted the helmet on which is the "crest". It is attached to the helmet by a twisted silk called a "torse". From this hangs the "mantle". It is thought that the mantle originated during the Crusades to keep the heat of the sun off the back of the armour. A motto on a scroll completes the "achievement" of the arms. Sometimes animals or mythical creatures are depicted on each side of the shield. These are called "supporters" and are only granted to royalty and various nobles and countries.

Heraldry is used by almost all nations, even those which are now republics and if you look closely at national flags, it will be seen that most of them conform to the rules outlined previously. Cities have their individual arms although not all have been registered properly. The City of Montreal has an attractive shield which conforms to all the rules but which has not been registered with the College of Heralds. The City of Westmount seems to be the only city in the Province of Quebec which has officially registered its arms. Many cities and towns in Ontario have been granted new and attractive arms in place of the old ones which had been devised when Heraldry was at its worst in the Victorian era. Most of the states in the U.S.A. use very complicated and generally unattractive arms or "seals" as they prefer to call them.



The earliest arms were very simple but as more families adopted arms, they became more complex and symbols were used to reflect the surnames of the owners. Fox used fox's heads, Applegarth used apples, Miller used millrinds and Shelley used seashells. These are known as "canting" arms, signifying a pun on the name of the owner.

Heraldry is still alive and well today as can be seen in the arms of the countries within the British Commonwealth and also in their flags. Companies and corporations in these countries use arms and badges although most now use company "logos" which are, in effect, another type of heraldry. The armed forces have badges for the many branches and regiments. Members and ex-members may wear these badges embroidered on blazers and ties composed of the colors of the regiment. The Royal Canadian Legion follow this practice with their own badge and tie.

The language used for describing coats of arms is a mixture of Old French and even Saracen words and there is a speific sequence to the description. This makes it easy for anyone with a fairly basic working knowledge of it, to draw or paint these arms in their proper colors without actually seeing them.

The belief that anyone with a certain family name entitled to use the arms of someone else by the same name FALSE. Unless they are able to prove that they are descended in a direct male line from the original holder of the grant of it is unlawful for them to display them. Unfortunately, fancy little heraldry shops in city streets and shopping malls are offering your "Family Arms". These shops con the purchaser into laying out money for a, so-called, "Family Name" shield of arms which, in no way whatsoever, has any connection with the hoodwinked purchaser's family, other than a similar surname. It is legitimate, however, to display the shields of lawful arms of cities, universities, clubs or societies to which one is a member. If one desires to obtain their own coat of arms, there is legitimate means to do so, but it must be done through the College of Keralds, Court of Lord Lyon or the Chief Kerald of Ireland. This will cost a considerable amount of money and may take up to two years of research. Once granted, these arms are now handed down in perpetuity in that family.

At the present time in Canada, any citizen wishing to obtain a grant of arms must petition the authorities previously mentioned in England, Scotland or Ireland. As Canada has many citizens of other ethnic origins, this is not always practical or desirable. The Keraldry Society of Canada has for some years now, been very active in trying to persuade the Government of Canada to set up a Canadian Keraldic Authority to have the power to grant arms to Canadians, regulate their use and, hopefully, prosecute violators.

For Scots, or their descendants, it is perfectly legitimate to wear or display the badge of the clan with which their name is associated. This badge consists of the crest of the clan chief and is surrounded by a belt on which is written his motto. They cannot use the crest, however, without the belt around it.

There are many books on Heraldry available which go into much more detail than I have been able to cover in this brief article. Unfortunately, most are rather expensive and not always readily available in your local library. If anyone is interested in knowing more about this fascinating subject, I will be only too happy to help you. Heraldry obviously ties in very closely with genealogy and sometimes a knowledge of it can help to unravel a rather complicated family tree.

National Forum on Heraldry in Canada

On 26 March 1987, The Honourable David Crombie, Secretary of State of Canada, and Major Terence C. Manuel, President of The Heraldry Society of Canada, co-hosted a National Forum on Heraldry in Canada. This historic meeting took place amidst the Gothic splendour of the Centre Block on Parliament Hill in Ottawa. More than 75 delegates attended from all walks of Canadian life, including leading academics, members of the legal and medical professions, the military, ceremonial and protocol officers, Native People, federal and provincial officials, churchmen, artists, and representatives of many prominent organizations.

Among the invited guest speakers were two experts from Great Britain: Dr. Conrad Swan, York Herald at the College of Arms in London (Dr. Swan is the first Canadian-born British herald); and Mrs. C.G.W. Roads, Lyon Clerk and Keeper of the Records at the Court of the Lord Lyon in Edinburgh (Mrs. Roads is the first female British herald). They spoke with much eloquence about the heraldic traditions of England and Scotland respectively. Afterwards, many delegates raised concerns about particular aspects of Canadian heraldry.

Discussion focused on the need for the creation of a Canadian heraldic authority, independent of, but co-operating with heraldic authorities overseas. During the conference, it became apparent that Canadians must establish a multi-cultural heraldic authority, capable of acknowledging symbolic traditions from various parts of the world. Delegates observed as well that grants of arms require legislative protection in Canada. Numerous other recommendations resulted from this constructive deliberation.

Mr. John D. Blackwell, representing The Ontario Genealogical Society (Canada's largest and only armigerous family history association), presented a Brief to the Forum, stressing the importance of providing for "the registration of genealogical information in order to administer the lawful descent of arms in Canada." He went on to say that: "Genealogy has traditionally been the handmaid of Heraldry.... Therefore, it will be imperative for the Canadian Officer of Arms to be assisted by persons competent to judge the genealogical, historical and legal pitfalls of verifying a pedigree,

using either Canadian or foreign documentation. This is a formidable and endlessly challenging task." In conclusion, Mr. Blackwell noted: "As a major repository of artistic and genealogical history, a Canadian heraldic authority could eventually become a great national treasure — rivalling the vast collections of European counterparts. In this increasingly depersonalized age, the establishment of a Canadian heraldic authority would also help us all hold onto the things in our lives that make us individuals. We heartily applaud the vision of The Heraldry Society of Canada."

Delegates left the meeting greatly encouraged by the interest of the government and the progress being made in this significant endeavour. An official report of the National Forum on Heraldry in Canada has since been released, and anyone wishing further information should write to: State Ceremonial, Department of the Secretary of State of Canada, Ottawa, Canada, K1A OM5 (which has recently produced a splendid videotape presentation entitled "Heraldry: Symbols of A Sovereign People" and an illustrated teaching kit called "Canada: Symbols of Nationhood"); or, Hon. Sec., The Heraldry Society of Canada, P.O. Box 697, Station B, Ottawa, Canada, K1P 5P8 (which publishes a most informative journal named Heraldry in Canada). To continue from the last issue with the 2nd line of the call number, the 1 or 2 digits following the period (not a decimal point because even though we have used divisions of ten for locality, it is not a decimal system) identify the form and general content of the work:

- .01 General works
- .1 Handbooks, Manuals
- .2 Bibliography, Book catalogs
- .3 Indexes of names
- .33 Bibliography (for works not classified as BG)
- .4 Indexes/Lists (other than names)
- .44 Church history
- .48 Indexes with atlases
- .5 Directories, Non-book catalogs
- .6 Dictionaries, Encyclopedias
- .7 Periodicals, Societies
- .8 Maps, Gazeteers

- 3. The third line is the Cutter number (taken from an abbreviated Cutter table) for the author, editor, or corporate body responsible for the work. When the responsibility is not identified, the Cutter number represents the first word (not an article) in the title.
- 4. The fourth line identifies the <u>original</u> year of publication. For example a 1978 facsimile edition of an 1851 county atlas will have 1851 in the call number and both dates on the catalog card.

It seems that even in 1852, city folk were given the census form to complete and these were collected later. The form requested information regarding birthplace, religion, age, sex, handicaps and births/deaths in 1851. A certain Mr.Charles Secretan had a real good time filling out his form.

Judge from the following "Remarks" column on the form:
"I have no personal knowledge where I myself or any of the other
persons living in this house were born, or when, and cannot
therefore, state with certainty, my own or their ages. I believe
them to be of the sexes before mentioned but, not having
inspected their persons, cannot, with the exception of myself, be
sure that the information herein given, is correct. Nor can I
tell whether they are married or single, widows or widowers with
the exception of my mother. Some or all of them, with the above
last mentioned exception, may, for aught I know, have had "births
in 1851". I know I had none, nor do I wish to have any. As to
what are "Lunatics", I am not able to define. I sometimes thinks
myself slightly affected in that way. Some of our most celebrated
physicians are of opinion that more than nine tenths of the human
race are cracked and I think they are not far wrong.



SERVICES AT THE OFHS LIBRARY AND OFFICES

Out-of-town members may obtain information from the I.G.I. by using the request form in the December issue of Connections, or request a form from the office with a SASE.

A charge of only \$1.00 will be made if the name requested is not found at the location specified. If there are more than 5 pages, you will be charges for the extra pages.
