

MYSTERIOUS CRYPTIC NOTES FROM ESSEX by Gary Schroder

I obtained recently from England a copy of an extensive family tree drawn up by one of my ancestors, John Gilson Auger (1866-1946), who was an oyster merchant in Burnham on Crouch in Essex. He was also the Secretary of the Burnham on Crouch Cricket Club as well as being one of its top bowlers. The family tree which details my ancestors from the 1750s until the early 1900s was drawn up on the back of a railway platform timetable dated 1901.

Unfortunately, various entries on the family tree were written in some form of late nineteenth century shorthand. So far, no one has been able to decipher these cryptic notes.

The spring's source also provided the water supply for the parsonage. "Springbrook" also identified their Mission and parochial school, the former post office nearby (1875-1932), as well as the road linking the neighbouring municipalities.

According to historian Joseph-Edmond Roy, the founder of West Frampton, P-E. Desbarats, personally chose a group of British immigrants to settle his land. Most were Irish Catholics, whom he considered to be "a hard working people, sound of both mind and body and of a peaceful nature". Also favoured among the hand-picked settlers, were a small group of Protestants, the majority of whom were Anglicans.

In his book <u>Histoire de la Seigneurie de Lauzon</u>, Roy noted that by 1825 the Anglican community only answered to ten patronyms: (full names and wives' maiden names were researched by Laval's study group with the help of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Morin of Frampton) William Bartholomew(Margaret Wilson), Hugh Bradley(Isabella Wilson), John Foster(Anne Bagley), John Hodgson(Hannah Maria Brown), Hugh Hurley(Jane Jackson), John McBean(Mary Ann Ross), Adam Ross(Elizabeth Adam), Robert Ross(?), William Sargeant(Margaret Hurley), William White or Whyte(Maria Wren), and Andrew Wilson(Mary Jane Bradley). Not yet knowing who the remaining descendants might be (if any), this preliminary listing, along with a detailed inventory and analysis of the cemetery's 88 headstones, formed the basis of the genealogical work. Following are a few findings pertaining to the layout of the cemetery and related family histories along with certain problems encountered during the first part of the research.

Although there were no physical traces of 20 or so burials which took place between 1860 and 1923, studies showed that the Bartholomew, Bradley, Ross, Sargeant, and White families were more numerous and as such had a relatively important posterity. Even as they were first to occupy burial space nearer the perimeter of the church, so did their descendants remain at the center of social, religious and local activities throughout their entire stay in Frampton.

Another interesting fact deriving from the layout of the cemetery was the burial of married women nées Bartholomew, Bradley and White: most are reunited with their original families while their husbands are interred elsewhere in the cemetery.

In establishing the histories of pioneer families, difficulties of a different nature arose. First of all, records of burials in the first Protestant cemetery situated elsewhere in Frampton (c1830-1836) remain to this day non-existent. Springbrook's present cemetery remains almost as secretive since very few inscriptions on its headstones indicate possible family alliances.

As well, (this comes as no surprise to genealogists), certain census

reports and church registers were either missing or lacking pertinent information relative to the majority of Frampton's first Anglican settlers. Important papers were also lost in at least two fires in Frampton: one in 1889 at the home of Hugh Hurley(2nd generation), who was church warden at the time, and another in 1905, when the Springbrook parsonage was burnt to the ground.

For these reasons, only the Bartholomew and Bradley lineage could be completed with 95% accuracy. Both however are most revealing of the strong alliance created over a century and a half within the small community. In fact, the group never surpassed 39 households in its 150-year history, a "demographic peak" being reached in 1865.

During this time, a Bartholomew never married a Bradley. Although no papers attest to it, their respective wives, Margaret and Isabella Wilson, may have been sisters. These settlers nevertheless became related to one another through marriage with the Pickford, Matthews, Ross, Hurley, and Sargeant families and quite early on in the colony. As in any isolated society, consanguinity was high. This may explain in part why celibacy became the norm within the community in the twentieth century — a situation which eventually led to an alarmingly low birth rate!

These two family histories also revealed that their patriarchs, who originated from Ireland like most of the Anglicans in Frampton, passed away within weeks of each other in 1880. Some seventy years later, as the last remaining Anglicans left Frampton, two of their direct descendants, Helen Elizabeth Bartholomew and James Ross Bradley respectively joined their pioneering ancestors in the Springbrook cemetery in 1947 and 1952.

Certain name-giving traditions were also evident within the lineages under study. For instance, Hugh Bradley's four grandsons, born between 1848 and 1860 (cousins), were all christened Hugh. Another way of attributing names was to give a newborn his mother's or grandmother's patronym or full name. James Bradley and Martha Ross' three sons, for example, were called: Adam Ross, James Ross, and John Ross. Similarly, Hugh Bradley and Elizabeth Wilson's grand-daughter was named Elizabeth Wilson. Although this type of recurrence can be somewhat confusing for researchers, it certainly denotes both a fondness for their predecessors and a willingness to perpetuate ancestral names.

Further help in reconstructing family and community history was rendered from unexpected sources, such as an autograph album used by Margaret Bartholomew between 1887 and 1908, two quilts prepared for Anglican fundraising purposes in 1907 and 1917, and a personal diary kept by George Earl Hurley covering his last years in Frampton, from 1936 to September 1st, 1947.

Most of the album's 67 messages contained familiar patronyms from Frampton. Thoughts and poems signed: "your cousin", "favourite aunt" etc., actually helped in situating or confirming the position of certain family members living at the turn of this century(1888-1908). On a community level, this personal memento revealed the mobility of its owner both in and away from

Frampton during holidays and festivities such as Christmas, St. Patrick's Day and Easter.

Quilts with family members' names on each square also proved to be an important asset in piecing together several family histories. The 1917 quilt, for example, with its 377 embroidered names was a veritable study in genealogy — and a fitting example of community spirit. In fact, a good number of Irish Catholics and French Canadians participated in this annual effort meant to support the Anglican pastor and his Mission!

Finally, one of the more evocative documents to this day pertaining to the Anglican way of life is the diary belonging to G.E.Hurley, a direct descendant of the patriarch Hugh Hurley, who was discharged from the British Navy in 1828 and settled in Frampton in 1830. It not only instructs the reader on daily activities and social, religious, local, political and family events, but also provides an interesting insight into the thoughts and feelings of the author. It is not my purpose here to dwell on the diary's contents since an analysis can be found in the booklet Christ Church in Frampton but rather to demonstrate that preoccupation with detail seemed to be a family trait. In fact, the Hurley family papers and photos, (some documents were unfortunately burned in 1889) constitute a rare example of an Anglican family's history that can be traced all the way back to the mother country, in this case County Down, Ireland and followed up today in Sherbrooke, Québec.

It is hoped that this brief overview into ways in which family histories were primarily set up and interpreted has been informative. It is only fair to add that without the help of descendants in Lennoxville and Sherbrooke - the Bradley, Cumber, Foster, Hurley and McBean families - the results would not have been as complete. These families, alongside friends and former neighbours of Frampton and Saint-Malachie, willingly participated in more than thirty oral interviews. These efforts reaped a harvest of information, documentation and artefacts relating to the Anglicans and their everyday life.

The town's last travelling reporter - Jos. White; the Anglican midwives - Annie Foster Bradley, Jane Bradley Wilson, and Violet Doherty; the community's seven fiddlers - Jim Bradley, John Foster, G.Earl Hurley, Andrew Hodgson, Jos. Reed, Jos. White and Anthony White; the all-night square dancing, poor farming, lumber camps, the inevitable wakes and even Rev. Felix Jamberine Boyle's "miracle" at the end of the 19th century were all evoked. Here then was history recounted by some presented within the context of the place of worship built by their ancestors: Christ Church in Frampton.

Unfortunately, not all the names of former Anglican residents of Frampton can be mentioned here, but nominal listings of the cemetery, landowners (1884), teachers, pastors, etc. can be consulted in the comprehensive report prepared by Laval's study group. A condensed English version has just been donated to the Québec Family History Society by La Corporation culturelle de Frampton.

As evidenced here, family histories can have far reaching effects. In this particular case, they have been instrumental in unifying both the ancestral and more recent past of an entire community. More importantly, their use within a folklore perspective shows how influential they have been in helping redress a somewhat forgotten piece of local and regional history. With this in mind, we can only hope that similar efforts be encouraged in the near future.

In Search of the "Forlorn Hope"
By John M. Kitsmiller, 11
Manuscript Publishing Foundation, Salt Lake City, Utah, 1988.

This two volume reference is subtitled "A Comprehensive Guide to Locating British Regiments and their Records (1640-WW1)".

The "Forlorn Hope" is a military term for a picked contingent of soldiers - sent cut as an advanced picquet, scouts or storming party. The name refers to the fact that most of them were killed, wounded or captured and only occasionally came back. This book is a guide for people who have a difficult time tracing their ancestors in the British Army. Usually in Army research the major problem to overcome is determining the regimental number and name. Without this data, it becomes almost impossible to access the tremendous collection of military records housed in the Public Record Office at Kew England. Unknown to many, a large selection of those records is also available through the worldwide branch genealogical library system of the LDS church.

It includes the following:

- How to find regimental names/numbers - Military records of genealogical value - Typical research problems and solutions - Register of War Office (W.O.) records on microfilm available through the LDS Library system - Bibliography of British Military Records, L.D.S.Library - List of garrisons, barracks, etc., worldwide - List of Colonels of regiments 1800's-1881 - Historical table for each regiment - List of disbanded regiments and dates - Dates of Military Importance - and other sections.



This book was donated by David McDougall from his collection. There are histories of the settlements, of local industries and social organizations. In view of recent controversy a list of local midwives shows that they were welcome in serving the community. An annual appendix is the inclusion of "Teacher's Return", lists of students and licensed teachers and inspectors reports. Costs of household provisions around 1900, are shown. A

This 660 page book is a facsimile edition of a book originally published in 1897. The first 9 chapters are history from 1604-1756. Chapters X-XV are detailed histories of individual townships. Chapter XVI is later general history followed by Chapter XVII about Religion and Churches in the County.

There are detailed histories and genealogies of many families. A chapter of ADDITIONS AND CORRECTIONS, the detailed index and the list of errata testify to the careful attention of the editor.

In Search of Your Canadian Roots by Angus Baxter.

This book reflects Angus Baxter's thorough approach to genealogy research. He begins with two chapters for the beginning genealogist, seasoned with hints such as "always cover return postage", and "names were often spelt as they sounded". Next is an interesting chapter on the migration patterns which brought British, Germans, Ukrainians, and other nationalities to Canada. There follows a chapter each on the L.D.S. Church, National Archives, censuses, church records, and coats of arms.

The meat of the book is the province-by-province survey of sources. For each province are listed locations of records useful to genealogists: civil registration, land records, cemetery records, census returns, wills, and church records. example of the incredible amount of detail is the list of Ontario church registers. Baxter lists all parishes of each diocese which existed before civil registration in 1869, and then he lists locations of church registers and the dates of the entries. For example, the Cornwall Anglican registers contain births, marriages, and deaths from 1803-46 and are located in the National Archives of Canada. When you turn to cornwall in the Libraries section, you will find a whole page of items held by the library.

Angus BAxter writes well and has the attention to detail which is the mark of an expert genealogist. Once you read this book, you will be busy writing letters and making plans to visit the many places listed.



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FRASER ANCESTORS By Brenda Merriman

In many English-speaking areas of the world, looking for Fraser ancestors is like the proverbial needle in the haystack. In other areas, it is merely difficult. To my horror, I discovered not one, but two Fraser lines in my family. Both were in Argenteuil County, Quebec, and, from a distance, I could find few records to help sort and identify them. After spending short bursts of time in research over twenty years, it became depressingly evident that my two Fraser families were among dozens in the same area. My goal like most people was to find their origin in Scotland and continue the genealogical process there. In chronicling the progress of a family history, I find it of more interest to present the findings as they are discovered, rather than the traditional construction of a standard genealogy, which seldom indicates the trail of dreaded obstacles and occasional inspirational new clues that we all experience. This is a tale, unfinished of course, of a Fraser history. For the traditional-minded, some charts are appended.

Catherine (Kate) Fraser, my great-grandmother, was the sweet-looking women who smiled at us from an old newspaper clipping, in celebration of her 60th wedding anniversary in Winnipeg in 1912. My father had collected enough information about her that told us: she married Peter DOUGALL (blacksmith in St. Andrews East) 12 March 1852 at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in St. Andrews East, Quebec. The same church's record told us of her birth and baptism dates and those of her siblings; the father John Fraser was described as "blacksmith at St. Andrews":

- -- Catherine d/o John Fraser & Nancy Fraser b 29 Dec 1833
- -- John s/o John Fraser & Nancy Fraser b 25 Jan 1835
- -- Duncan s/o John Fraser & Nancy Fraser b 10 Nov 1836
- -- Eliza d/o John Fraser & Nancy Fraser b 4 Feb 1839

Kate Fraser died in 1914 in Winnipeg, information also collected by my father. Where was I going to go with this? I searched Quebec Census returns from 1825 to 1891 over a long period of time. John Fraser, the father of my great-grandmother Kate, was nowhere to be found after the birth of his last child. The widow Nancy Fraser appeared in St. Andrews East census returns thus:

- 1851 -- age 40, b Canada, Presbyterian, with the three younger children
- 1861 -- not found St. Andrews East
- 1871 -- age 60, b Quebec, Church of Scotland, living with John Fraser age 51 (single), Elizabeth Fraser age 66 (single), and Mary Fraser, age 40 (single)
- 1881 -- age 67, b Quebec, Presbyterian, Scottish origin living with John Fraser age 42 (unmarried) and a range of unmarried Frasers from age 38 to 24
- 1891 -- age 81, b Quebec, parents b Scotland, Presbyterian, living with (as head of household) sister Mary age 66. The next family enumerated is headed by Alexander Fraser age 38 (unmarried) with brothers and sisters ranging from ages 52 to 34.

Nancy is probably buried at St. Andrews East Protestant cemetery, and hopefully her husband John and family. There was nothing in St. Andrews's church registers about the marriage or burial of John Fraser, and no trace has yet been found of Kate's three siblings.

FRASER ANCESTORS (cont'd)

Since Nancy's birthplace was consistently given as "Canada" or "Quebec", with a date ranging from about 1810 to 1814 (about 1811 in 1851 and 1871), I began to search for baptisms at that date. St. Andrew's Presbyterian church records at St. Andrews East did not begin until 1818. However, the Anglican church there had records from 1812. In the latter I found the baptism in 1812 of ANNE FRASER d/o John and Margery Fraser, born 3 March 1811. This is the closest I have come to determining Nancy's parents, on the strength that Nancy is of course a nickname for Anne. St. Gabriel Street Presbyterian registers in Montreal were also searched, but no other Anne/Nancy Fraser was found.

From the three sets of church registers and census returns, it was possible to learn much more about this John Fraser, Nancy's alleged father. He settled at Rivière Rouge in Argenteuil in 1806 as a farmer, born either 1787 (1851 census) or 1776 (second marriage record) in Scotland. On 17 August 1808 (widower, farmer at Rivière Rouge, age 32), he married Margery McIntyre at the St. Gabriel Street church. Apparently he had three young children from his first marriage, two sons having been born in Scotland, and a daughter Elizabeth born 1806, baptized at St. Andrews East Anglican church. The latter told me that John's first wife's name was Ann. Anne/Nancy was the first of eight children born to this couple, including daughter Mary in 1822, the unmarried sister living with Nancy in 1891.

Such local histories as A History of Lachute (G.R. Rigby, 1964) and A History of the Counties of Argenteuil, Quebec, and Prescott, Ontario (C. Thomas, 1981 reprint of 1896 edition) were consulted. The latter said that this John Fraser came from Inverness-shire and that "Mrs. Fraser" died 25 October 1882; it's unclear whether this refers to John's wife Margery or to the wife of one of his sons. Inverness-shire is the ultimate "haystack" and any John Fraser is a needle. It was said that the John Fraser who arrived circa 1834 was from Banff-shire, but it turned out that all data on him was wrong to be Nancy's husband.

The (1984) IGI for Inverness-shire produced four marriages for a John Fraser in the 1790 to 1805 period (his sons Alexander and James were born in Scotland 1802 and 1804).

These were:

- = Ann Grant, Inverness, 5 March 1792
- = Ann Fraser, Kirkhill, 4 January 1792
- = Anne Simpson, Inverness, 12 January 1799
- = Ann Lee, Inverness, 4 June 1804

Only the Fraser/Fraser marriage in 1792 showed sons Alexander and James, baptised 1802 and 1803, respectively. However, this couple also had a son John baptised at Kirkhill in 1794. The IGI has not been searched for all possible children of this couple, so any connection is still very tenuous. There is no evidence in Quebec of John Fraser and his wife Anne having children older than Alexander.

Since Nancy Fraser's husband John was dead before 1851, the earlier census returns for Argenteuil (heads of families only) were searched. Briefly:

1842 -- JOHN FRASER had been settled there 8 years, total 12 in family, 10 born in Scotland, 1 married male (30-59), 1 married female (14-44)*JOHN FRASER had been settled there 36 years, total 9 in family, 2 born in Scotland, 1 married male (over 60), 1 married female (over 45)

1831 --*JOHN FRASER total 13 in family, 2 married males (21-30) [one could have been a mistake for the over 60 category], 2 married females (14-45, and over 45)

1825 -- JOHN FRASER total 3 in family, 1 married male (30-60), 1 married female (over 45) *JOHN FRASER total 11 in family, 1 married male (25-40), 1 married female (15-45) None of the above seem to apply to the family of John and Nancy Fraser, although these * are likely her father John. Since their children were born in the 1830s at St. Andrews East, one can only assume that the 1825 and 1831 census might have been too early to catch them, while the 1842 census was too late. There were many lateral columns in these enumerations and from experience it's safe to say that census-takers could easily confuse ages and numbers when they reached the bottom of a page or had to continue on second pages, maintaining the correct lines. Another possibility is that if John Fraser the blacksmith was in St. Andrews during any of these censuses, he was not enumerated as a head of family.

Many years later, a marriage bond was located by pure chance for John and Nancy, dated 5 January 1832 -- not in Quebec, but in Longeuil, Upper Canada, across the Ottawa River and upriver from their Quebec residence. The couple was described as both of St. Andrews East. The witness was one Alexander Fraser; Nancy's oldest brother was named Alexander. Bondsmen were James MacIntosh, Esq., and James MacIntosh, tailor, both of Longeuil. We are still looking for the actual marriage record.

Kate Fraser moved with her husband Peter Dougall to Renfrew a few years after their marriage. A very welcome index to the <u>Renfrew Mercury</u> newspaper recently became available, and in it I found another chance discovery:

Died 31 Jan. [1895], St. Andrews, River Rouge, Que., NANCY FRASER, widow of the late John Fraser, and sister-in-law of the late Dr. Wm. Fraser, Montreal, and mother of Mrs. P. Dougall, aged 85 years.

Although I thought I had discovered Nancy's ancestors, here was a brand new clue to her elusive husband John Fraser. I knew that none of her sisters had married a William Fraser, so this must be a brother of John, and his parents and ancestors would be John's as well. A fair amount of material was available in Montreal on Dr. Fraser, and we learned that he was born circa 1814, that he qualified as a medical practitioner in Montreal in 1836 and that he married Miranda Charles 4 August 1840 in the Anglican Christchurch Cathedral. He was associated with the Montreal General Hospital and McGill University. When his wife died in 1891, nineteen years after her husband, she left a considerable legacy to the University to establish a Chair in Comparative Pathology. Biographical information was sketchy, referring only to the doctor as "began life as a very poor man", but finally we found a reference that his origin was in Perth, Scotland, and his cemetery stone mentioned "Killin" as birthplace.

Out came the IGI printouts again, for Perthshire. In the parish of Killin we found a John Fraser baptised 12 April 1808 and a William Fraser baptized 23 March 1810, eldest sons of Duncan Fraser and Catherine Robertson. My John named his second son Duncan and his first daughter Catherine; Dr. William named his first two children Maria Catherine and Duncan Robertson.

The marriage of Duncan Fraser and Catherine Robertson also took place at Killin, 18 July 1807, according to the IGI; Duncan Fraser's baptism was found there 24 July 1783, son of John Frazer and Catherine Buchanan. Much work remains to be done in actual parish registers and other sources to see if these lines can be extended.

Another interesting clue that surfaced in the <u>History of Argenteuil. Quebec and Prescott. Ontario</u> was in the descriptive and biographical content relating to St. Andrews East. A Dr. William ROBERTSON from Perth in Scotland, a graduate of King's College, Aberdeen, and the (London) Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, came to Canada about 1834. He lived in St. Andrews from 1847 until his death in 1871. A half-brother, Colin Robertson of Lachute, is mentioned. Were these cousins of John and William Fraser? Did William Fraser train with William Robertson and come to Canada with him, Robertson settling eventually where he had relatives?

The search is not always uphill. I hope that this tale might present some optimism and exploration for others who flounder with common Scottish surnames.

A Grandmother Remembers. Grosse Ile

The grandmother, Jeannette Vebman Masson responds to her children and grandchildrens' questions about life 'in the old days' on the quarantine island in the St. Lawrence River below Quebec City.

Madame Masson's father is Belgian born, a writer and linguist employed as an interpreter by the Federal government, her mother a Canadian of French ancestry.

Part Departmental statistics, part historical facts dealing with the mid 1800's influx of immigrants from the old countries, the snapshots give shape and form to the text.

Mixed in with the hard facts is the warm story of Jeannette Masson's life on Grosse Ile in the early 1900's. There are lyrical passages in her descriptions which reveal an almost spiritual love of the isolated and sometimes wild nature of her island home. The eldest of a family of four surviving children she writes-

"I remember the rainy days. We went up to the attic and there, comfortably installed on old rag carpets, we looked out of the dormer windows. The river opened up to welcome the raindrops and rolled them into waves. The song of the rain falling on the roof lulled my little brothers to sleep and I felt so good, so happy, so much in tune with life."

This book provides a look back to a simpler time, a book to lift ones spirits.

King's Men: The Soldier Founders of Ontario

by Mary Beacock Fryer

If you are trying to find a loyalist ancestor, this is not the place to look. This book does not have any lists of men in Loyalist regiments or sons and daughters of Loyalists. However, once you have found your Loyalist ancestor elsewhere and want to know what his regiment did in the American Revolution, this is the book to read.

Mrs. Fryer describes the background and perspective of the Revolution before giving a detailed account of the activities of each regiment and a brief biography of each regiment's leader. She inclkudes colour photographs of regimental uniforms and maps of famous campaigns and battles.

There is a chapter each about the Royal Highl; and Emigrants, the King's Royal Regiment of New York, Butler's Rangers, the King's Loyal Americans, the Queen'; s Loyal Rangers, the King's Rangers, and the Loyal Rangers, formed in 1781 near the end of the war.

This is a factual book, as evidenced by twenty pages of endnotes, and it includes sorrows and victories of war. You will read about how men were recruited and where the battles were fought. You will learn that whole families were disrupted by persecution and flight to Canada. This book shows the broad variations among Loyalists, and it will increase dramatically your understanding of the Revolution.



OUR "CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION" STATUS How it might affect you.

As you may be aware, QFHS was recently declared a <u>charitable organization</u> and, as such, has received permission from Revenue Canada to issue charitable donations receipts for income tax purposes. This privilege does, though, carry certain restrictions of which potential donors should be aware.

- 1. An official receipt may be issued for all gifts and donations to the Society so long as that gift or donation is voluntary. No right, privilege, material benefit or advantage may accrue to the donor.
- 2. Property, merchandise or supplies may be gifted to the Society and an official receipt issued so long as these items do not carry some right, or advantage to the donor such as promotion or advertising for the donor's business.
- 3. The Society can pay for services and later accept the return of all or a portion of the payment as a "gift" provided it is returned voluntarily.
- 4. The Society may issue receipts for Membership fees provided that fee DOES NOT convey a material advantage to the member. (i.e. a reducvtion in workshop registration fees.) The right to vote at meetings and to receive financial statements and reports on the activities of the Society is not considered to be a material advantage.

Therefore - official receipts for income tax purposes will now be issued stating with receipt of your 1989-90 membership fees. Having said that, I'm sure you will appreciate that the task of filling in these receipts may take some time due to a backlog builkt up since August. 1989-90 membership fees dated and received on or before the 31st of December 1989 will receive official receipts dated 1989. 1989-1990 membership fees dated and received in 1990 will receive official recei;pts dated 1990.

The Society will be happy to receive financial contributions from individuals at any time, but, due to the amount of paperwork involved, official receipts will only be given for donations of \$10.00 or more.

A Report from your President

1988-89 FINANCIAL REPORTS, 1989-90 BUDGET, and other things.

The opposite page shows the consolidated financial reports for last year and the budget estimates for this year. We apologise for being late in publishing this. The figures for last year are a total of the 9 months before we were incorporated and the three months after incorporation. There were two separate financial reports. The 1989-90 Budget was developed in October and \cdot is based on 7 months experience after our March 30th financial year end.

1988-89 Costs were up as expected due to the increased rent and moving expenses. Revenues were up due to more workshops, increased sales of cemetery lists and books, paid research by volunteers for the society, so that the \$ 1500 loss was not as bad as expected.

For the 1989-90 budget the higher estimates reflect the dues increase, higher sales of cemetery lists and books, and increased I.G.I. search fees after we received the new edition. Now we get the commercial discount on most of the books for sale from our office, a nice addition to our revenue. Even with the increased membership fees, the renewals have been coming in earlier than last year and there are many new members. After a loss last year, we predict that we can buy some books and break-even this year. If we get a surplus then we will start replenishing our reserves.

The reorganization of the library after the move has proceeded well under the direction of Audrey Ballard. Cataloging is almost complete, books were reshelved and can be found, the periodicals are colour-coded by country for easy selection. We continue to have many donations of books. Maintenance on our old film and fiche reader-printers is now done without a labour cost due to the generosity of a member in preparing the genealogy of the family of the repairman.

The society now has status as a Registered Charity. Donations of money or things of defined value are eligible for CHARITABLE RECEIPTS for income tax purposes. Later in this issue is a statement from Barbara Winn, our Treasurer, about the conditions concerning membership dues and their use as a charitable donation.

Memberships cards have been delayed due to a shortage of the continuous form cards (now corrected) and will be issued with a Charitable Donations Receipt before the end of December.

The society will welcome any donations and will issue receipts for income tax deductions. The money will be set aside for a new reader-printer, about \$ 9000, books and equipment.

A few years ago we had to take major risks with the society, buy a computer, hire a part-time secretary, find a new site and pay rent. We had to commit our reserves or fold up. We are prospering and succeeding and with your help we will keep improving our operations and rebuild our finances.


