

MON-FRANCOPHIONE MEMBERS OF THE CAMPOION VOLTIGELIES DURING

The Provincial Corps of Light Infantry, the Canadian Voltigeurs, is probably the best known unit of the Canadian War of 1812–1814. It marked our history with its famous victory on the Chateauguay river on October Soth 1813. However, little is known on the men who joined the Unit. The following article establishes a list of non-francophone members of the Canadian Voltigeurs. When the information was available the list includes: rank, age, name of the father, previous experience and residence.

In 1812, England expected an American attack on her colonies of North America. To reinforce the regular army, George Prevost the Governor General of Lower Canada decided to raise a Provincial Corps of light infantry to defend the Province against a predictable invasion. The battalion would be under the command of Major Charles-Michel Irumberry de Salaberry, from the 60th Regiment, a member of the French-Canadian nobility who served for many years in a British regiment against Napoleon in Europe.

On April 11 1812, orders were given to raise a battalion of 500 to 600 volunteers. The officers and men were to be Canadian born. The unit would not be a regular regiment but would remain a provincial corps governed by the Provincial Militia Bill not by the War Act. During the war, 54 officers joined the ranks of the Voltigeurs. Of those, S7 were French-Canadians and S7 were non-francophones. Fifteen officers had previous experience with the regular army. Five French-Canadians,9 non-francophones and a Swiss officer had served in the British Army.

The militiamen who served in the regiment were all volunteers. When they enlisted, they received 4 sterling pounds or 96 french pounds. During service, they had the same pay as the regular soldiers. In December 1812, they were promised 50 acres of land if they joined the Unit. We can estimate that 700 men joined the rank of the Canadian Voltigeurs. Of those, 198 can be considered to be non-francophone. They represented 30% of the effectives. Out of 24 sergeants 18 were non-francophone of the effectives. The Canadian Voltigeurs were disbanded in March 1815 and the militiamen returned to their civilian occupations. Between 1812 and 1815, the Canadian Voltigeurs were involved in 10 battles:

John Wilson is married and has 2 daughters....the eldest 6 years old. His house is not remarkably clean. They have 4 Bibles and 2 prayer books.

William Davison is a joiner. His Mother lives with him..a brother and sister. He has two apprentices..of these one is a churchman and has a prayerbook. The other and all the family are presbyterian. There are 4 Bibles in the house — which is dirty and the inhabitants ill favored and ill mannered..except the joiner.

Thomas Pringle..and his wife have two sons — a daughter — a great nephew and 5 Bibles. They are a good sort of people but Presbyterians.

Edward Pringle is a joiner..75 yrs of age..very infirm but still makes tables & chairs in a small dirty but. He has a little dog—remarkable for its long fine hair which he cuts & makes stockings of it. He is a papist & has 1 Bible. A niece lives with him.

England and Wales: Civil Registration 1837-1983

There is an exciting new development in the world of English and Welsh Genealogy. As of April 1, the British Government has made available for sale on microfiche the indexes to births, marriages and deaths in England and Wales for the period 1837 to 1983. These are the same set of indexes that are found in St. Catherine's House in London.

The Quebec Family History Society has st up a special fund to be used solely to buy these microfiche. A complete set from 1837 to 1983 would cost over \$15,000. However, the society plans to start buying the microfiche, which begin in 1837, and work its way towards the twentieth century.

Because of the great interest in this project, various donations have already been received. The QFH5 would greatly appreciate any donations to this special fund. Please remember that the QFHS is a registered charitable organization and that any donations are tax deductible.

So began years of cemetery detective sleuthing. Fist on her list was the Dalesville Public Cemetery. Her husband's ancestors, the Calders, and Jean's ancestors. the Gunns. are buried there. Two pages at the back of the Dalesville Cemetery list names of those for whom there are no stones. One of those was Alexander Gunn, Mott's earliest ancestor in Argenteuil. He came to Chatham about 1834 and died in 1867. His wife was Jane Petrie. Mott discovered this information from painstakingly piercing together their tombstones which had crumbled.

In Grenville in 1977, with her husband Archie, Mott searched the Scotch Road twice. "It was in off the road and the sign has been turned upside down," she explained. Finally, Mott asked a passerby. "Oh, I don't know, but I think you should come back at night when they can talk to you," came the strange reply. She copied the 63 markers.

In 1982, she and her daughter Ellen Mott Charpentier, a Brownsburg resident, searched the little cemetery of St. Mary's Anglican Church in Avoca, the Augmentation of Grenville. Only 14 headstones were "There was brush up siahted. over our heads. And on one stone, there was a tree growing right up through it". On the other hand, Mott pronounced McNeil's cemetery in Avoca, which had 235 stones in 1982 "in very good shape". Mott's other children, Donald and Stanley, did not get involved in the family's searches.

In Pointe au Chene, also in the Augmentation of Grenville, the smallest cemetery in Argenteuil listed five headstones in 1983. Alice M J. Noonan recorded the names in this poorly maintained site. One of the legible headstones reads: "In memory of Archibald Campbell, died March 12, 1848, aged 91 years. Native of Argyleshire, Scotland, being one of the first settlers of the Augmentation of Grenville, Quebec, in 1816.

Jean Mott has just about finished recording the cemetery markers in Argenteuil's Protestant cemeteries. There are no more left, except for Morin Heights. "But she's still working on piecing her family tree puzzle.

The Salle Gagnon of the Montreal Municipal Library located at 1210 Sherbrooke Street East is one of the most important repositories of genealogical information in Québec. It contains a wide variety of genealogical materials that relate not only to Quebec but also to the other provinces of Canada and the United States. BOOKS

<u>In Search of Your German Roots</u> by Angus Baxter 122 pages, indexed. For sale by QFHS \$12.

Baxter notes clearly that this book is concerned with the areas where German is spoken, for an ancestor who came from 'Germany' could actually have come from any of a dozen countries. The emphasis is on research which begins in North America and goes back to Germany.

There are chapters explaining how to begin German research and chapters on German immigration to North America. Once researchers have found their ancestors' origin, the last half of the book is helpful in showing where to write for records and what kind of record is available. Baxter has sections on various church records, passenger lists, official records, and even a surprising source of information – funeral sermons! Addresses of state archives and genealogical associations are given, but city and parish archives are listed with no address. A chapter on East Germany is especially pertinent now that Germany is united.

This is a helpful book to anyone attempting German research. Baxter's writing style is easy to read, and his examples are interesting. If you have ancestors from Germany, this is the first book on German research that you should buy.

The History of Stanstead County, Province of Quebec Compiled by B.F. Hubbard. Originally published 1874, reprinted 1988. 390 pages; indexed; may be borrowed from QFHS library.

This book is divided into two parts. Mr. Hubbard begins the first part with a geographical description of each settlement in the county and includes brief sketches of early settlers derived from personal interviews. Next the churches, schools, and lodges of the county are described.

The second part consists of 247 pages of sketches of Stanstead County families, each with a biographical paragraph and a list of children's names and birthdates. An example of a biographical paragraph is from page 326: "OBADIAH BELKNAP, b. in Lisbon, N.H. in 1774—m. Abigail Locke, b. in Bristol, Vt. in 1779. They settled on No. 12, 8th Range of Barnston in 1807. He d. in 1834. She d. April 3, 1861." The book is what every researcher dreams of and is a goldmine of genealogical information guaranteed to make one wish for ancestors from Stanstead County!

<u>History of the Eastern Townships, Province of Quebec</u> by Mrs. C.M.Day. Originally published 1869, reprinted 1989. 475 pages; indexed; may be borrowed at QFHS library.

When this book was written, Mrs. Day had access to many original townships' papers and knew many of the settlers personally. The book, therefore, has a ring of true experience.

The history is divided into three parts. Part One is a brief history of North America, from Columbus' discovery of the New World to the forming of the Dominion of Canada in 1867. In Part Two Mrs. Day wisely narrows her scope to the settling of the Eastern Townships. Especially interesting are chapters four through eight which describe pioneers' daily lives. Mrs. Day relates problems which settlers had with animals ranging in size from the mosquito to the black bear. She tells stories of settlers travelling long distances, a family running out of food, a girl getting lost in the woods. She describes settlers' houses, their means of cooking, their furniture, and their churches.

Part Three is a geographical description of every settlement in Bedford District (counties of Brome, Missisquoi, Shefford, Iberville, and Rouville) and St. Francis District (Counties of Compton, Richmond, Stanstead, and Wolfe). Mrs. Day gives the names of early settlers and lists important buildings. For example, on page 297, Dunham has "two churches, an academy, post office, five stores, two tanneries, two public houses, many mechanics' shops, and some fifty or more private dwellings".

You will enjoy this history if you have ancestors from the Eastern Townships, for you will be able to read a description of each township and maybe even find your ancestor in the list of settlers. Don't expect a biography or genealogy of your ancestor, however. Part Two is interesting to all of you who had ancestors in Canada between 1792-1869, for the description of pioneer life is painfully realistic, and the stories were surely those which circulated at the time.
