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From The Editor

Family historians are always trying to gain insight into how their ancestors really lived. We are curious to know what it must have been like to live in houses heated by only a wood-burning fire, which had to be tended continually to keep it burning; to cook meals over that open fire; to spend long, cold winter nights in the company of relatives with only a few candles to light the darkness.

What did they do if the wood supply was low - and there was no dry wood to replenish it? If the larder was almost bare - and nowhere to get more food? If there weren't enough candles - and no more to be found anywhere? When they had to battle ice, sleet and snow to care for live-stock - Daily, regardless of the weather. What did they find to talk about, with the same people, day after day?

Well in January many residents of Quebec and parts of neighbouring Provinces and States had the *Opportunity* of acquiring a first-hand knowledge of this quaint life-style !

It happened suddenly - with very little warning! On the morning of Monday, January 5th, many of us awoke to a cold, eerie silence. Outside it was like a scene from a science fiction movie. *Everything* was covered in ice - trees, bushes, houses, cars, electrical wires and roads. Streets looked like shimmering rivers of ice and there was very little traffic as driving was treacherous. Those with battery operated radios quickly learned that we were in the throes of a major *Ice Storm*. An ice storm which some newspapers declared is the costliest natural disaster in Canadian history. It lasted just under five days, with a reported 100 mm of accumulated precipitation. Thousands of people were without heat and electricity for up to three weeks - and more. Families crowded into shelters or in with relatives and friends. Each person has their own story to tell, a tale to tell their grandchildren and great-grandchildren, of how they survived the *Ice Storm of 1998*.

This editorial is not for those of us who lived through it. It is for QFHS members in the U. K., Australia, New Zealand, and those warmer climes of Canada and the U.S. who have never witnessed an ice storm or blizzard imagine what your ancestors had to endure during a Quebec winter! It is also the reason your March 1998 *Connections* may be a bit late - computers do not work on candles. Also, as the office / library of the QFHS was closed during the storm and subsequent blackout, I received no articles, fillers, ads, notices or reports until early February.

My excuses now made ... I would like to take this opportunity to thank all contributors to 1997 issues of *Connections* and invite anyone with articles; letters to 'The Mailbag'; tips, questions or reviews for 'Computree'; or any information which they think would be helpful and of interest to QFHS members to submit them to the Quebec Family History Society - *Connections*.

ON THE TRAIL OF ANCESTOR ANTOINE

Canada's centennial year awakened in many Canadian families a new interest in their heritage. Like others in our village of Pine Grove, Ontario our five children completed scrapbooks and took part in a community project designed to trace the route followed by Etienne Brûlé, the first white man to see Lake Ontario.

My own knowledge of Canadian history was limited. Born in Holland, I had married my husband, Maurice in 1945 - a year after he landed in Normandy with the 4th Canadian Armored Division - and joined him in Montreal, the following year. Until 1967 I had given little thought to family ancestry but, caught up in *Centennial fever*, I was struck by my husband's nonchalance about his Norman descent. Increasingly, the early history of Canada intrigued me. How many generations of Maurice's ancestors had gone before? Who was the first Canadian LEDUC?

Consulting the Quebec National Archives I traced my in-laws' ancestry through the marriage records of the towns of St. Bruno, Chambly, Beloeil, Verchères and finally Cap-de-la-Madeleine. In the last place I found listed in the census of 1666, our first Canadian ancestor from France, Antoine Leduc. Ten years earlier Antoine had left his parents, Jean LEDUC and Françoise DESAUBRIES of Louvetot in the archdiocese of Rouen, Normandy, to emigrate to North America. Maurice and I visited the farm at Cap-de-la-Madeleine where Antoine had worked as a hired hand and the old St. Michel estate near Sillery where Jean-Baptiste, the elder of

Antoine's two sons, had lived. We also located the former seigneurie of St. Blain, near Verchères, where Antoine's second son, Pierre-Charles, had settled more than 250 years ago.

Several months later Maurice was transferred to Vancouver, B.C. There I resorted to the large selection of Quebec History books, census records and genealogical periodicals at the University of British Columbia. Telephone directories of U.S. and Canadian cities also provided clues. Soon my files contained the names of 2000 of Antoine's descendants,

spread over ten generations and throughout the North American continent.

Leads from the university combined with trips to the archives in Quebec provided some vivid glimpses of Antoine's life in 17th-century Canada.

For example, notaries' records showed that he had rented a 3½ year old pregnant cow for 20 livres a year, payable in money or pelts. The lease of his homestead at Grondines, 80 arpents in size, obliged him to

pay each year 40 sols in silver money and two big capons as his seigneurial dues.

I continued to trace Antoine along the St. Lawrence River, where he farmed the land and went on distant journeys to barter with Indians. I learned that Antoine's wife, Jeanne FAUCHEUX, was one of 800 young women called *filles du roi* - orphans, for the most part, sent to Canada to marry and populate the country. Their trip was financed by France's Royal Treasury. Once chosen, they embarked for the distant land, knowing little of what to expect. I could imagine Jeanne's fears, for

almost 300 years later I too had apprehensively set out on a similar journey, crossing the Atlantic Ocean with a thousand other "war brides" also at government expense.

There remained the puzzle of Antoine's background. Although I had studied numerous yellowed documents and written several letters to France, I could find no trace of him in his native country. In a last effort, Maurice and I decided to visit Normandy, going first to Louvetot, near Caudebec-en Caux, on the banks of the River Seine, where I believed Antoine had come from. Again no trace of a Leduc in their 17th-century registers.

Not for several years did I learn - from correspondence with the archives' director in Rouen - that there had once been another Louvetot in the region. Situated halfway between Dieppe and Rouen, this Louvetot had been amalgamated with a neighbouring village called Grigneuseville. Anxiously I wrote to the mayor there and on an unforgettable day in 1978 he confirmed that the Louvetot registers of the 17th-century were dotted with Leduc names.

Where else but Normandy would Maurice and I go for our next vacation! In September 1978 Maurice and I made the trip to Normandy again and in the mayor's office, in Grigneuseville, I eagerly copied from the old, brittle Louvetot registers the Leduc genealogy, dating back to 1612 and the birth of Antoine's father. Maurice and I then drove to the hamlet of Louvetot itself, now only a sandy crossroads with embankments on both sides to protect neighbouring farmland from the blustering winds.

Here, at the crossroads, stood the 13th-century church of Sainte Marie Madeleine, built of flint and torchis - a mixture of clay and

straw. Around the church was a small cemetery which most likely contained the graves of Antoine's parents, his three brothers and two sisters. Inside the church was a rather long epitaph to Nicholas Leduc, Antoine's great-uncle and parish priest of Louvetot who died in 1626.

On September 17th, 1978, at 10 a.m., the church bell tolled to call a special mass in memory of the Leduc-Desaubries family and their descendants, now settled in Canada. It was a moving moment as my heart went out

to Antoine's mother. I thought of the many times she must have prayed in this church for her adventurous young son. For Antoine, with his love of ships and travel, had hired himself out as a sailor, and at age 13, sailing from Dieppe, had left his homeland forever. Now the crossroads at Louvetot is named Place Antoine Leduc, in memory of Antoine.

We found more strange links with the family past. Maurice recalled that he had travelled the road from Rouen to Neufchâtel-en-Bray, close to Louvetot, as the Canadian Army swept through Normandy, liberating

his ancestral hamlet. At Dieppe I walked along the seashore trying to reach back more than 300 years to the time when Antoine had left that port aboard the Saint-Sébastien, a 28-gun man-of-war that carried him to the New World. It was as if I were looking into the mists of history across the sea to Canada's beginnings.

Back in Canada I followed the exploits of the early French explorers, traders and settlers. In the cold pages of history books I tried to follow Antoine as he had braved the Canadian wilderness. One day, at Simon Fraser University in Vancouver, I held a slim volume

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published in 1840 by the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec. As I flipped through its pages a passage leaped out at me. In the summer of 1682 three Frenchmen, Leduc, Abraham and Lachapelle, had been attacked by the Iroquois at Teiaigon [now Baby Point in Toronto]. They had lost their cargoes but kept their scalps.

Was this Leduc our Antoine? Had he travelled 850 kilometres from Trois-Rivières to Teiaigon in a birchbark canoe? I found my answer in the legal records of the period. At that time Governor Frontenac was granting fur-trading permits to 25 noblemen and seigneurs each year. The traders then formed partnerships with others, equipped canoes and engaged men. Conditions for the journeys were generally laid down in a notary's contract.

Leafing through old contracts at the Quebec National Archives, I discovered that during the first two months of 1682 Antoine had sold two bulls, paid off his debts and had a marriage contract drawn up - something he had neglected to do for 11 years. He willed 500 livres to his wife. Was he getting ready to leave on an extended trip?

I began an extensive search through hundreds of filing cards containing entries of notaries' documents, willing Antoine's name to be among them. Then my heart skipped a beat.... One card read: "17 mai 1682. Marché entre

Louis Dandonneau, Sieur du Sablon, Desmarais, Moreau, des Islets et Leduc."

Two of the six men mentioned in this contract were Antoine and his friend Paul Abraham called/dit Desmarais. With three men in each canoe they had paddled to the Great Lakes to trade for furs with the Indians. Antoine and his five companions each had permission to carry a gun and one white blanket, a hood, four shirts and a pair of leggings to trade for their own profit.

To avoid the 20 portages necessary along the Ottawa River route from Montreal to Georgian Bay they had paddled to Lake Ontario, stopping at Teiaigon where the Indians attacked them. Thence they had portaged along the east bank of the Humber River to reach the Holland River, where they had put their canoes back in the water. They had paddled across Lake Simcoe to Georgian Bay and on to the fur-trading post on the island of Michilimackinac. It was almost the same route taken by Etienne Brûlé.

While tracing the Leduc ancestry I have discovered that Antoine and his companions had portaged along the Humber River right behind our former home in Pine Grove. To the surprise of our family Antoine's trail had come full circle and he himself had come to life for us, no longer just a name in some dusty corner of the archives.

EDITOR'S NOTE

The above article first appeared in *Connections* - vol. 4 # 3 - September 1982 and was reproduced at that time by the permission of Mrs Adrienne Leduc. It had previously been published, in French, in *Selection du Reader's Digest* [March 1979] and in English in *The Reader's Digest* [September 1979]. Since writing the article Mrs Leduc reported that Louvetot, France has installed a plaque at Place Antoine Leduc which reads: "Antoine Leduc né à Louvetot Pionnier Canadien du XVII^e Siècle" [Antoine Leduc born in Louvetot Canadian pioneer of the 17th-century]. Also that the 13th-century church of Sainte Marie Madeleine has been declared an historical monument and is now being restored. For some years Mrs Leduc taught Genealogy and Family History classes in the Vancouver area. Now with her extensive knowledge and the data gathered in her research, which led through archives, census records, across the Atlantic to a Norman village and right back to her own back yard, she has published a book about the life and times of Antoine Leduc. Titled: ANTOINE: coureur de bois

**THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE LOWER-CANADA MILITIA
DURING THE WAR OF 1812**

While studying the officers of the militia I was able to find the names of 37 surgeons who served at some time with the militia of Lower-Canada. The members of the medical staff show a large variety of medical experience. You will find surgeons who served during the American Revolution and some who had not yet finished their studies. Most were of French, English or German origin. You will note that the profession runs in some families.

Arnoldi, Daniel (1774-1849): Surgeon to 2nd Battalion of Montreal, 29th of January 1814. Medical examiner for the district of Montreal. Son of Peter Arnoldi, of German origin. He wed in 1804 Elizabeth Franchère. Dictionary of Canadian Biography, (DCB), VII.

Barbier, Louis M. Raphael (1792-1852): Assistant-surgeon to the Voltigeurs Canadiens, 24th of July 1814; surgeon to the Saint-Ours Division; he resigned in January 1815. He received a grant of 500 acres of land after the war. He wed in 1815 Elizabeth Walker, daughter of Doctor James Walker, Christ Church, Sorel. Member of the Assemblée législative 1824. (DCB, VIII)

Blanchet, François (1776-1830): Hospital-Superintendent in 1805; surgeon to 1st Battalion de Québec. Founder of the Newspaper **Le Canadien** with Pierre-Stanislas Bédard, Jean-Thomas Taschereau, Louis Bourdages, Joseph Bernard Planté and Joseph Levasseur-Borgia. Member of the Assemblée législative in 1808-1817 for Hereford County. He was cashiered by the Governor James Craig in 1810. He wed in 1802 Catherine Henriette Juchereau Duchesnay. (DCB, VI)

Carter, George (1775-1837): Chief-Surgeon of militia; surgeon to 1st Battalion of Trois-Rivières 22nd of February 1812. He wed in 1806 Mary Ann Quircke Short.

Chicou-Duvert, François (1790-1841): Surgeon to 1st Boucherville Battalion; He offered his services on the 20th of March 1812. Son of Pierre Chicou-Duvert, military surgeon and Madeleine Côté. He wed in 1814, Christ Church, Sorel, Helen M. Mount, daughter of Ph. Mount from Saint-Denis.

Cockburn, James (1763-1819): Surgeon to Quebec British Militia. Member of the Assemblée législative 1816. He wed in 1815 Dorothy McKeige, Holy Trinity, Quebec City.

Couillard, Antoine-Gaspard (1789-1847): Surgeon to 4th Battalion of Select Embodied Militia (SEM) 25th of May 1812; he resigned on the 19th of January 1813. Lieutenant to the Saint-Thomas Division, 28th of March 1811. Son of Jean-Baptiste Couillard and Marie-Angélique Chaussegros de Léry. Noble. (DCB, VII)

THE MEDICAL STAFF OF THE LOWER-CANADA MILITIA DURING THE WAR OF 1812

Coyteux, Charles: Surgeon to the Division of Trois-Rivières 22 February 1812.

Doty, Samuel: Surgeon to 3rd Battalion of the SEM, 15th of September 1812.

Farnden, Joseph (....-1843): Surgeon to 5th Battalion of the SEM in 1812; assistant-surgeon to 70th Regiment, 9th of August 1814; he served with the Battalion of Chasseurs Canadiens, 9th of November 1814. He wed in 1815 Magdeleine McGillivrey, Garrison Church, Montreal.

Fortier, François, junior: Assistant-Surgeon to 1st Battalion of the SEM 25 March 1813; medical student recommended by Joseph Painchaud, 19th of August 1812; lieutenant to 2nd Battalion of Quebec City, 23rd of May 1806.

Fraser, Simon (1769-1844): Major to the Terrebonne Division, surgeon; Ensign, 1783, in the 84th Regiment, lieutenant on half-pay to 42nd Regiment, 1783-1802. Son of Malcolm Fraser and Marie Allaire. Father of the notary John Fraser.

Haussman, Thomas: Surgeon to 2nd Battalion of Quebec City.

Hérigault, Jean-Baptiste, Jr. (....-1826): Assistant-surgeon to 5th Battalion of the SEM, 4th of June 1813; surgeon to 3rd Battalion of Montreal, 1st of March 1812; transferred to the battalion of Voltigeurs Canadiens. Son of Jean-Baptiste Hérigault, doctor, and Amable Mayrand.

Iserhoff, Gustave (1755-....): Surgeon to the 3rd Battalion of the SEM 25 May 1812; resigned 25th of September 1812. Surgeon with the Brunswick Regiment of Rhetz in 1783. He was recommended by James Cuthbert. He wed in 1783 Geneviève Simon Pépin, Christ Church, Montreal.

Ivory, Robert (v1841): Surgeon to battalion of Voltigeurs Canadiens; assistant-surgeon to 3rd Regiment of Foot 23rd of November 1809. He returned to his army rank in 1816. He received a grant of 800 acres of land at the end of the war.

Kimber, René-Joseph (1786-1843): Surgeon to 4th Battalion of the SEM, 19th of January 1813. Captain to the North Division of Trois-Rivières, 4th of February 1814; lieutenant, 3rd of October 1807. Son of René Kimber, merchant of Trois-Rivières and Marie-Joseph Robitaille. He wed in 1811 Marie Berthelet, daughter of Pierre Berthelet and Marguerite Viger.

Labrie, Jacques (1784-1831): Surgeon to 2nd Battalion of the SEM, 25th of September 1812. Born in Saint-Eustache. He studied in Scotland, 1807-1808. He wed in 1809 Marie-Marguerite Gagnier, daughter of a notary. (DCB, VI)

Léonard, Augustin: Surgeon to 1st Battalion Townships 20 July 1810.

Lionnais, J-François: Assistant-surgeon to 3rd Battalion of the SEM 25th of March 1813.

Lusignan, Charles-Alexandre (....-1839): Assistant-Surgeon to battalion of Voltigeurs Canadiens, 25th of January 1815; ensign to 2nd Battalion of Montreal. Son of Charles Lusiniari. He wed Phebe Blache.

MacAllister, Joseph: Assistant-Surgeon and Dentist to 4th Battalion of the SEM, 25th June 1813.

Martineau, Édouard: Assistant-surgeon to 2nd Battalion of the SEM, 25th of March 1813; ensign to 1st Battalion of Quebec City, 9th of April 1812.

Mercier, Augustin: Assistant-surgeon to the 6th Battalion of the SEM in 1812; assistant-surgeon to the 2nd Battalion of Quebec City.

Morlay, John: Surgeon to the Verchères Division, 10th of March 1814. He wed in 1809, Marie-Marguerite-Appoline Desrivières-Beaubien.

Munro, Augustin: Surgeon to the Longue-Pointe Division in November 1813.

Munro, Henry (ca 1770-1854): Surgeon to the Corps of Voyageurs Canadiens in 1812. Son of the honourable John Munro from Upper-Canada. He wed in 1809 M. Josette Serindac, Saint-Gabriel Presbyterian Church, Montreal.

Myers, George: Surgeon to the Pointe-Claire Division, 8th of November 1813.

Nelson, Robert (1794-1873): Surgeon to 7th Battalion of the SEM in 1812. In 1814, he served with Indian Warriors. Son of William Nelson and Jane Dies. He wed Emily Bathe, Christ Church, Montreal. He was a patriot in 1837. (DCB, X)

Nelson, Wolfred (1791-1863): Assistant-surgeon to the Saint-Denis Division. Member of the Assemblée législative in 1827. Son of William Nelson and Jane Dies. He wed in 1819 Noyelle de Fleurimont. He was a patriot in 1837. (DCB, IX)

Painchaud, Joseph (1787-1871): Surgeon to 1st Battalion of the SEM, 25th of May 1812; surgeon to 2nd Battalion of Quebec City, 11th of March 1811. Son of François Painchaud, navigator, and Marie-Angélique Drouin. He received his medical license in 1811. He wed in 1815 Geneviève Parant. (DCB, X)

Sales La Terrière, Pierre-Jean (1789-1834): Surgeon to battalion of Voltigeurs Canadiens, 25th of April 1812, surgeon to the 1st Battalion of Quebec City, 19th of March 1812. He resigned in 1814. His father arrived from France with Fleury Mesplet circa 1780.

Sales La Terrière, Marc Pascal de (1792-1872): Staff-Surgeon, 1st of December 1812; and with the 6th Battalion of the SEM. His father arrived from France with Fleury Mesplet circa 1780. He studied medicine in Philadelphia. Member of the Assemblée législative in 1824. He wed

Eulalie-Antoinette Dénéchau, daughter of Claude Dénéchau. (DCB, X)

Selby, George (1760-1835): Surgeon to Montreal British Militia, 28th of February 1811. Son of George Selby and Ann Robson. He wed in 1785 Marie Josephe Dunbar, Daughter of William Selby and Thérèse-Joseph Deschambault. (DCB, VI)

Selby, William Dunbar (ca 1786-....): Surgeon to 5th Battalion of the SEM, 25th of September 1812. He resigned 3rd of January 1814. Son of George Selby.

Stubinger, George (1759-1822): Surgeon to the Chambly Hospital; Late surgeon with the Hesse-Hanau Regiment. He wed in 1786 Marie Anne Quintal and in 1787 Marie-Charlotte Boucher de la Broquerie, daughter of Joseph Boucher, Sieur de la Broquerie.

Talham, Joseph Alexis (ca 1760-....): Surgeon to 2nd Battalion of the SEM, 25th of May 1812. He resigned, 25th of September 1812. Son of Joseph Talham, captain with the Régiment d'Anjou. He practiced medecine in L'Assomption from 1784 to 1788. He wed in 1785 Appoline Poudret, daughter of a merchant of L'Assomption.

Trudeau, Toussaint Casimir: Assistant-surgeon to battalion of the Voltigeurs Canadiens; assistant-surgeon to the Chasseurs Canadiens 25 April 1814; lieutenant, July 1812, ensign to 3rd Battalion of Montreal, 11th of April 1812. He resigned on the 24th of November 1814. He was present at the battle of Sackett's Harbour.

Witcher, Isaac: Surgeon to 3rd Battalion Townships, 24th of July 1810.

Editor's note:

It is also available for sale through the QFHS Bookstore [Price \$29.00 plus \$ 5.00 P/H].

This book was reviewed by QFHS President, Gary Schroder, in the March 1996 issue of *Connections* [vol. 18 / #3 / page 18], in which he describes it as a 'valuable new tool for local historians and for genealogical research in 19th century Quebec.' He also states that 'the book is partially bilingual in nature as there is an introduction in English which describes the organization and functions of the Canadian Militia during this period. The text which is written in French consists of brief military and biographical details on over 2,700 officers of Lower Canadian militia units. However, anyone who has the slightest knowledge of French can easily understand what is written.'

HAUNTED BY AN ANCESTOR ... HELP !!

Mary Ralston BURWASH, according to papers in the United Church Archives, Toronto, was a member of a New England family of West Norwich, Vermont. And possible a native of Habkirk, Scotland.

She married Nathaniel Burwash, who was born June 7th, 1743, in Kent, England. After years in the British Navy he came to America - Vermont - to seek a new life. Mary and Nathaniel's first child, Adam Burwash was born in 1781 and Stephen, my ancestor, in 1782. Several more children followed.

From the beginning this couple had difficulties. Mary RALSON'S family wanted to be loyal to the newly emerged country, while Nathaniel, Mary's husband, remained loyal to Britian.

In an effort to resolve this sorry conflict Nathaniel and Adam made their way, in the late 1790s, to St Andrews East, where they found a growing community. Encouraged, they returned to Vermont. Nathaniel, Mary and their children then moved, in 1802, to River Rouge, a small farming settlement - east of the village of St Andrews East. I can only imagine how heavy-hearted Mary must have been.

Before she left Vermont a fire, believed to have been started by *The Green Mountain Boys*, had destroyed the Burwash home - taking the life of one of her daughters. Not only had she to deal with this loss, but she was leaving all she had known and was walking into the unknown with her husband and surviving children.

Although Nathaniel Burwash had good financial resources, this was not enough. According to his papers, deposited in the United Church Archives, Toronto, Mary's great-grandson, a key person in the early Methodist movement of Argenteuil County, wrote:

"Meantime, the mother [Mary Ralston Burwash], unbalanced by the longing for the associations and ties of her early life, left her Canadian home and perished in the attempt to return through the woods to Vermont."

I am haunted by Mary Ralston Burwash and the story she might have told. Please help me find her and set this poor soul at rest.

Where were she and Nathaniel married? Vermont? New Hampshire? Did she even reach Vermont when she disappeared from "her Canadian home"? Could she have been buried in a Quebec Cemetery? A Vermont cemetery? I would appreciate any information.

PERSEVERANCE REWARDED

Abstracted from the Parish Registers of St.
Stanislas, Judicial District of Trois-Rivieres:

On December 25 1833 Jean Enoch Prince married Angele Trottier. Parents names are **not** given (unusual in a Catholic marriage record) - but - the record contains the information that, with the permission of M. Cadieux, Vicar General, Enoch Prince had taken the name Jean at his baptism into the Catholic Church just prior to his wedding. Witnesses: Joseph SIROIS, S. LAFONTAINE, Pierre TREPANIER, Hubert SIROIS.

The determined researcher then scanned the entries before the marriage record, and found on the preceding page, the baptism, also on 25 December 1833, of Enoch Prince, age 33 years. This record gave the names of his parents, Isaac PRINCE and Louise BEADS, thus opening a window on another generation.

BOOK REVIEW

ANTOINE: COUREUR de BOIS

by Adrienne Leduc
Mazarin Publications-1996

This 344 page novel is the story of a 17th-century share-cropper's son. It is a blend of fact and fiction with a list of characters, both fictional and real, at the front of the book. There are also several drawings of maps depicting areas of the New World at that time.

The tale centers around the adventurous exploits of Antoine Leduc, 6Xs great-grandfather of the author's husband, Maurice. As you will see by Adrienne Leduc's article, on page 5 of this issue of *Connections*, this novel is the result of years of painstaking research.

It begins when Antoine leaves his home and family in Normandy, France at the age of thirteen to work as a *Mousse* [cabin boy] on a ship sailing to New France. A round trip voyage estimated to take six to eight months.

While the ship is anchored in Quebec, reloading for its journey back to France, Antoine makes an impulsive decision. He tells his friend, Paul, that he has decided to jump ship and remain in the New World for a few years - to make his fortune. On September 1st, 1656 the ship, *Le Saint Sébastien*, set sail for France and the following Sunday Antoine made his mark on an employment contract, drawn up by a notary, to work for one year in a brewery in New France.

This book describes, briefly, the life of a peasant family in 17th-century Normandy and the hazzards of an ocean voyage to the New World. It is through Antoine's adventures that the reader has a glimpse of the hardships endured by the early settlers.

As the story unfolds it chronicles his life as he matures from a naive young country boy to a seasoned *coureur de bois*. In vivid detail the author describes a pirate attack; Antoine's capture by Iroquois warriors, his adoption into the tribe and his eventual escape; his numerous trading and map-making journeys; his love of the young Ojibwa woman, Tehya; his marriage to a *filie de roi*, Jeanne and the birth of their child, the first of the Leduc ancestors born in the New World.

For anyone who has traced their ancestors back to 17th-century New France - or expects to - this novel portrays many of the people, places and circumstances that ancestor may have encountered. For anyone else it is an interesting vignette of Canadian history. A copy of ANTIONE: *coureur de bois* may be found on the shelves of the Quebec Family History Society Library. 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BOOK REVIEW

Merriman, Brenda Dougall. About genealogical standards of evidence: a guide for genealogists. Toronto: Ontario Genealogical Society, 1997.

Why must family historians be concerned with 'standards of evidence', 'burden of proof', 'preponderance of evidence'? Why worry about accurate documentation of your information sources? "Is this not mere indulgence in lofty theory?"

The author answers questions with questions:

"How **responsible** do you want or expect to be in this interesting pursuit? What kind of **legacy** will you leave behind when your days are done? Will it be something that will **endure** by long-accepted standards?"

This booklet is a concise and well organized guide to help the researcher to critically evaluate genealogic sources - are they primary or secondary, are they authentic and reliable, are conclusions logical? Even primary sources may contain faulty information; supporting evidence may be required. An unusual case is used to illustrate "the danger of sole reliance on a primary source for evidence." A man died in December of 1886. His death was reported three times - by his brother within a week, by his son after two weeks and, three months later, by the parish priest as he was updating his records. Each person gave a different **day** of death and quite different **causes** of death! Perhaps an obituary, a funeral home record or a gravestone will give supporting evidence for a particular date. In such a case, when you draw conclusions from all the available evidence, explain your decision and document the sources.

The basic purposes of genealogical research, establishing identification and relationship, and the basic means by which these are established, are clearly explained. Each point of discussion is illustrated with copies of the appropriate records.

As the author states "this booklet **will** tell you something about ... standards of evidence and documentation, and how you can apply these to your own work. It **will not** tell you how to trace your ancestors ... or what or where the sources are that you need for your own research ... it assumes that you have done some minimal reading and/or researching on the subject already." It is intended as "a supplement to workshops or seminars ... or a reference work when doing your own research and checking your own research notes."

Included are lists of Further Reading, Accreditation Institutes, and Home Study Programs. A centrefold 'Check List for Genealogical Sources' can be photocopied.

For serious researchers and family history writers, this book is also an important genealogical resource!

STRAYS: an index to the OGS Strays Project. Volume II. Toronto: Ontario Genealogical Society, 1997. Project co-ordinator: Shirley E. Lancaster.

The introduction to this second volume of the OGS Strays Project series includes, as did the first volume, answers to the basic questions: What is a stray? Why do we collect strays? Where do we find strays? What do we do with strays when we find them?

Records of strays may provide valuable clues to the whereabouts of missing relatives, one generation or several generations removed. They are found in a variety of records from civil registration to census, from published local histories to gravemarkers.

This booklet contains a further 2000 Ontario strays, most of these found in records from B. C. and the Prairie Provinces. There are some though, who 'strayed' only as far as another Ontario county - equally elusive when there was no knowledge of where they had settled.

Three typical Source Examples are illustrated: a local history from Erskine, AB; a BMD Index for 19th century Regina newspapers; the 1901 Canada census from Selkirk District, MB. The 1901 census is a useful source of strays because it gives general place of birth.

The Strays Submission Form for Ontario is included. The QFHS form for Quebec has been published in each recent issue of Connections. As in the previous volume, the full bibliographic reference is given for each source so that the researcher can examine the original document and perhaps find further family information. These volumes demonstrate the value of collecting strays, and the importance of more widespread Strays Project exchanges.

***From Generation to Generation; How to Trace Your Jewish Genealogy and Family History.* Arthur Kurzweil, HarperPerennial, Revised Edition 1996, New York. 388 pages (\$25 for the soft cover edition, available at most local bookstores)**

When I wanted to make a gift to a friend who was just getting interested in genealogy, I asked Stanley Diamond, president of Montreal's Jewish Genealogical Society, for advice. His sole recommendation was *From Generation to Generation*. I can well understand why, after peeking at the copy I bought before presenting it to my friend.

It has a section that applies to all genealogical research, explaining the many types of sources available, how to gather your history and check records. This also serves to set the context for the next section, devoted to various types of specifically Jewish records: differences from other genealogies, basic sources, family names, sources in Europe and North America. There are fascinating descriptions of how to find information to "walk the streets" of the villages where ancestors originated, and how to find cemeteries and interpret tombstones.

Several references are made to data available in Canada; for example, libraries such as Montreal's own Jewish Library are cited as good sources. Workbook sheets are also included to help the budding genealogist.

Of particular interest is the small section on Holocaust research "The Search for Victims and Survivors." The author does warn that, despite some occasional and sensational newspaper reports on brothers and sisters finding each other after many years, the odds are against discovering living relatives. He provides tactful and sensitive ways to question family survivors about this painful and horrible time in their lives. Sources to be consulted where survivors may have registered are also listed.

This is an easy to follow and well-thought out book for those starting on their Jewish family tree or looking for relatives who may have survived the Holocaust.

THE MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF JACQUES MENEUX dit CHATEAUNEUF

My wife's first ancestor to come to Canada was a surgeon, Jacques MENEUX dit CHATEAUNEUF. He was born, circa 1639, at Chateau Giron in Brittany. The exact date of his arrival is not known but he was here some time before his marriage on 23 October 1663 at Chateau Richer near Quebec City.

He married Margaret LePEUVIER, daughter of Nicolas, procureur at the Parliament in Paris, France. The couple settled at the seigneurie of Charny-Lirec in Ste. Famille, Ile d'Orleans and raised ten children of whom seven survived.

Jacques entered Hotel Dieu Hospital in 1690 and was released shortly afterward, returning in December 1690 when he died.

I always wondered why a surgeon with skills that would be so valuable to the colony would give up his chosen profession and become a farmer. I later found out that he had practiced his profession for a period of time, going north with two missionaries to Hudson Bay for a number of years.

Going north would have been lucrative for Chateauneuf as he may have received a portion of furs from the trading posts for his wages.

I wanted to find out more about his travels to Hudson Bay and found it in *Le Bulletin des Recherches Historiques*. This new information brought me to a startling conclusion, that Chateauneuf had been murdered at Hudson Bay in 1686!

The story goes that: travellers arriving at Fort Ste Anne in 1686 were told that a cook, in a fit of madness, had killed a Jesuit priest, Father DELAMS, and a surgeon. The only surgeon there had been Jacques Chateauneuf. How could this be? According to the information I had, he had died peacefully in

bed at Hotel Dieu four years later.

I re-examined this passage and found that the murder information had been extracted from *Journal de L'expedition du Chevalier du Troyes à la Baie Hudson en 1686*, a book edited in 1918 from the original journals of the explorer, Chevalier du Troyes.

I was fortunate to find a copy of this book at the Provincial Archives on Mullins Street, in Montreal, and read the passage. It did indeed state that the author arrived at the fort and two soldiers told him of the double murder. Three days later three English ships attacked Fort Ste Anne, renaming it Fort Albany.

Luc Lepine, Senior Archivist at the Montreal Archives told me about a book, *Les Morts Violentes de la Nouvelle France*. It is a comprehensive index of violent deaths in pre-conquest New France. I was unable to find Jacques Meneux dit Chateauneuf listed and yet he certainly would have qualified.

I then re-examined my information and found out that TWO surgeons had gone north and that the author of the first article had, incorrectly, assumed that Jacques was the unfortunate victim of the mad cook.

My mystery was solved.

I now feel confident that Jacques Meneux dit Chateauneuf died peacefully at Hotel Dieu in 1693.

His wife remarried in 1696 and moved, with five of her children, to her new husband's farm at Riviere Ouelle, where she died at age 70 in January of 1707....

or did she?

While checking the Hotel Dieu records for Jacques, I had found Marguerite LePeuvier had died several years BEFORE her second marriage.

I guess I have a new mystery to solve.

Did you have ancestors who came to Canada in the mid-nineteenth century? If you did, especially if they were Irish, two books published by Heritage Canada will certainly interest you.

Québec City celebrated 1997 as "The Irish Summer"

The celebration web site welcomed visitors with these words: "A hundred and fifty years ago Québec received thousands of emigrants, mostly Irish, fleeing famine in Europe. We remember and honour their memory."

1847, *Grosse Île - a Record of Daily Events* by André Charbonneau and André Sévigny, is an absorbing glimpse into one of the years when our ancestors fled Ireland, a "year in which nearly 100,000 emigrants, mostly Irish, disembarked at Grosse Île or the Port of Québec."

The book is presented as a diary, but not that of a single person. Rather, it records actions by medical personnel, the volunteers, administrative measures, newspaper reports, numbers of deaths and burials, and first-hand accounts of the emigrants themselves. It is dotted with weekly tables of ship arrivals and departures. Weekly tables of patients at Grosse Île, with the number of deaths and patients discharged, tell a sombre story.

Not all emigrants came from Ireland. The week of July 4 to 10, for example, shows that while 9782 came from Ireland, 3898 came from England, 436 from Scotland, and 956 from Germany.

It includes many other tables such as the "sickness and death rates by port of departure in 1847" and an "Enumeration of Authorities and Working People Involved with Grosse Île in 1847."

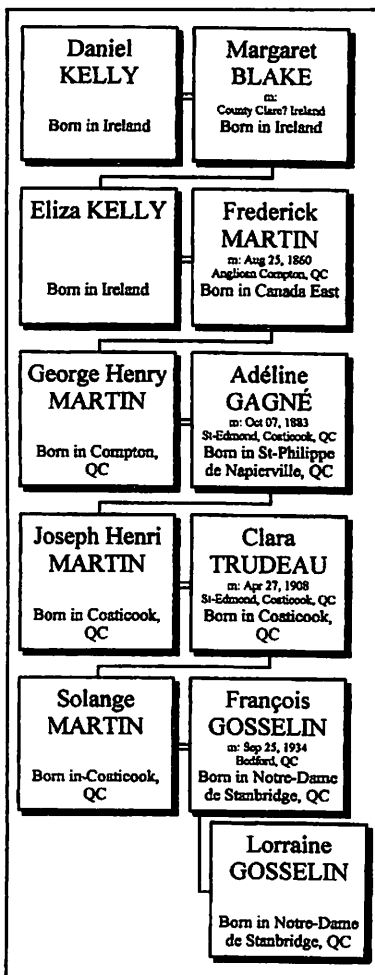
The book is also generously illustrated with maps and black and white and colour pictures.

A companion book, available in English and French, is *A Register of Deceased Persons at Sea and on Grosse Île in 1847*, by André Charbonneau and Doris Drolet-Dubé. Genealogists will of course be interested by the list 8308 people that have been identified. Of course, this book does not specify if these people came with children and left descendants but the information may prove useful. For each emigrant who died and was buried at Grosse Île, the listing shows the following: name, age, ship, port of departure, country of departure, and week of death.

There are additional lists, dealing with emigrants who died aboard ship, and for

staff and sailors who died and were buried on Grosse Île.

A few of my Irish ancestors



To complete the listings, the authors have provided a cross-index of the women who died at Grosse Île and whose maiden names were available, and a list of all the ships who docked at the Port of Québec and Grosse Île in that fateful year of 1847.

If you wish to pursue this theme from a local Irish perspective, newspapers such as the *Cork Examiner* carry editorials and letters from readers describing the situation or even denying any troubles existed.

MILITARY SITES

QFHS President Gary Schroder gave a talk on *Military Research for Family Historians* at our December 1997 meeting. I thought it might be interesting to find out what the Internet had to offer on the subject. My first stop was at the National Archives of Canada to obtain the address of the WWI veterans' archives Gary had mentioned. The Canadian Expeditionary Forces (CEF) records are located at <http://www.archives.ca/db/cef/index.html>; you can search for a person, obtain a reference number, and find out how to obtain the documents. The data base refers to more than 600,000 soldiers, and some attestation records have now been scanned in.

Further surfing revealed there are hundreds of sites dedicated to all aspects of military history. At present, not many have lists of soldiers' names, but they appear to be growing. You can find historical sites, official lists of regular units, militia information, re-enactment groups for those who wish to join a regiment to which their ancestors belonged, sites created by government agencies, by existing units, by military buffs, by genealogists, books about military history, vendors of military artifacts, music, information about uniforms, and practically every other aspect you can imagine. Included are not only the wars of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, but the war of American Independence, the War of 1812, the British-French wars of the 18th century. If you have a specific time frame or area in mind, you should find considerable information. My advice would be to bookmark the more interesting sites, and return to them periodically, as many of the ones listing names are under construction, and promise more to come.

Most link to a few other sites, but there are several that will lead you to hundreds, if not thousands, of military information sites around the world. You might start by consulting Cyndi Howells' list of Canadian Military Sites at <http://www.oz.net/~cyndihow/milcan.htm>. At this address you can link not only to Canadian, but to Worldwide Military Resources, and U.S. Military and Civil War sites.

Those interested in Canadian and British regiments should visit T. F. Mills' site at <http://www.du.edu/~tomills/military/america/cargxref.htm>. It includes a very well-organized index. Each regular army or militia regiment may have one or several sites. An ikon indicates the type of site, e.g., official/semi-official, historical, museum, re-enactment, etc. The regiments are listed in numerical and alphabetical order. Contemporary regiments and corps since 1945 are included, as well as those for earlier units for which web sites exist. There are pointers to Canadian Army Regimental lists for 1945, 1964, and 1994, to Loyalist Regiments of the American Revolutionary period and to web site indexes for the Australian, British, and South African Army.

Another well-structured index for military history is the *War, Peace and Security Guide* of The Canadian Forces College's Information Resource Centre at <http://www.cfcsc.dnd.ca/links/milhist/index.html> It carries a time line that runs from the Peloponnesian War (431-404 BC) to the Persian Gulf War (1991), and should satisfy any foray into military history.

The British Public Record Office (PRO) has considerable information for genealogists on its site at <http://www.open.gov.uk/pro/famfacts.htm>; or you can go directly to the WWI Service Records page at <http://www.open.gov.uk/pro/ww1news.htm> and see the progress on filming WW1 Soldier's Documents.

Those researching Loyalist ancestors will find several sources, a few of which provide a list of names. Loyalist muster rolls included with British Military and Naval records are kept at the National Archives of Canada. A description of each reel can be found at <http://www.inforamp.net/~griffish/gene/mil/must.txt>.

Some Loyalist units are listed at <http://www.brigade.org/loy.html> and on the Olive Tree site at <http://www.rootsweb.com/~ote/loyreg.htm>. I haven't compared the lists, so it would be a good idea to check out both.

There is a King's Rangers Muster Roll at <http://www.erols.com/candidus/rangers.htm>, with each soldier's name and rank, and a list of Butler's Rangers can be found at <http://www.iaw.on.ca/~awoolley/brang/broffr.html>.

If such names as *Royal Roussillon* and *Languedoc* cause a shiver of recognition, you should consult the *1755 French and Indian War* site created by Larry Roux of Syracuse, NY. It is dedicated to "the French soldiers who came to New France between 1755 and 1760 to fight in the French and Indian War." at <http://web.syr.edu/~laroux/> or go directly to the soldiers' lists at <http://web.syr.edu/~laroux/lists/alpha.html> For each of the several hundred entries, or it may be thousands, the surname, nom-de-guerre, name of regiment and company appear.

Still under construction is a War of 1812 site with a partial muster roll for the Regiment de Meuron at <http://www.norlink.net/~jkeigher/muster.html>

If you are researching ancestors who served in the Boer War (1899-1901), you might consult the site on the Canadian casualties at <http://www.islandnet.com/~duke/boercas.htm>

SOFTWARE HEADACHES

Did your genealogical software company go out of business? This is what happened to QFHS member David Carr, who is using *Family Roots* software. Quinsept, providers of Family Roots, has closed. (Refer to announcement by Quinsept president Steve Vorenberg at <http://www.familyroots.com> - but you won't get any answer from this address) Unfortunately, this is an unavoidable situation when dealing with software packages. You may wish to check for a User Group that might point to someone taking over the system. My advice, if the programme is satisfactory, is to continue using it, and to monitor these sites. If it works correctly, there is no urgent need to convert now.

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In the case of Family Roots, there are a couple of ways to go at present. The owners of *The Master Genealogist* (<http://www.whollygenes.com/html/fr.htm>) have offered to convert Family Roots files to their format; you should first check out if this system will do what you expect. In addition, you can also check out an information page for Family Roots "Orphans" at <http://www.ogram.org/familyroots/index.shtml>. You may wish to wait for developments, and consult with other users before making a final decision in this or any other similar case. (Note that the page was updated between the time I found it and finalized this article.)

EXPENSIVE SOFTWARE FOR THE IRISH RESEARCHER

John Grenham, author of *Tracing Your Irish Ancestors*, has announced his *Irish Recordfinder*, an expert system for genealogical research on Irish records. It is "designed to allow someone with no knowledge of genealogical records to obtain a detailed custom-made analysis of all Irish records relevant in researching a particular ancestor."

Read all about it at <http://indigo.ie/~rfinder/spec.htm>. The creation of an expert system can be quite arduous and time-consuming, so one can expect a high price. However, at \$780 for the complete package, I will save my \$\$ toward a generator or wood stove! If anyone buys this package, please let me know what you think of it.

The LI-RA-MA Collection "consists of documents created by the Imperial Russian Consular offices in Canada during the period 1898 to 1922." In 1627, the Jesuits were protesting that there were too many Protestants in the colony. Samuel de Champlain and his wife were Huguenots. An interesting presentation.

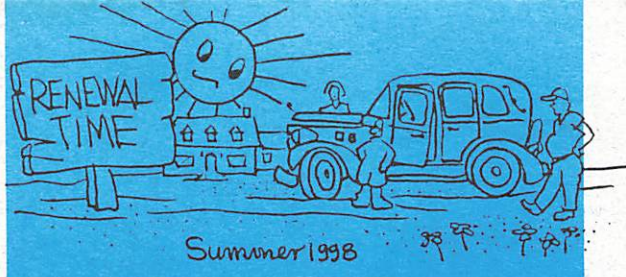

**THE MONTREAL PRISON
1784 - 1886**

The Concordia University and the McGill University Libraries in Montreal contain thousands of books and other documentary collections that are of great benefit to family historians in Quebec. While doing research in the McLennan Library of McGill University I discovered a book called "*History of the Montreal Prison from 1784 to 1886*" written by the Reverend John Douglas Borthwick who was, for many years, the chaplain at the prison. This book, consisting of two hundred and seventy pages, was published in Montreal in 1886.

Besides describing the foundation of the Montreal prison, there are also selected lists for some of the prisoners who were involuntary residents there during the nineteenth century.

The actual Montreal Prison registers are held at the Montreal branch of the Quebec National Archives. Registers for the latter half of the nineteenth century are not yet open to the public.

The author lists principal events of the Court of King's and Queen's Bench in chronological order beginning at 1812 to "the present day" [1886]. The following is a selected list of prisoners who were convicted by the Court of King's Bench.

SEARCHING FOR FRENCH CANADIAN ANCESTORS

I have previously written about my search for German ancestors. In the March '98 issue of *Connections*, I have given information about some of my Irish ancestors. Now our Editor, Dawn Ouellette, has asked me to write about my French Canadian ancestors. Not to worry, I only have a few Scots ancestors about whom I have yet to write!

Any researcher who has delved in the various records available in Quebec knows that having French Canadians in one's family tree makes it easier to trace its roots. This also has considerable influence on the way research is done.

The real issue, however, is not really between the language our ancestors spoke, but rather the religion they practiced at the time of an event, especially baptisms and marriages.

The difference lies between the conventions employed in Catholic and Protestant records. For most pre-twentieth century records, the mother's maiden name appears on Catholic baptismal records, but often does not on Protestant ones. The main difference for marriage records is that the names of the parents of both spouses appear for Catholics but do not for Protestants. Thus, French Canadian research is done mainly through marriage records, while recourse to other records is used to complete and/or authenticate the research. This is also the reason there are so many "répertoires" listing only marriages for French Catholic parishes. However, the more recent ones usually include baptisms and burials. The major indexes, such as the Loiselle, available at the QFHS Library, are also based on marriage records. So if you have French Catholic ancestors, the best place to start is with a marriage index, either a

Province-wide one, if available, or a specific one for a parish or region; the *répertoires* have been prepared for practically all parishes that ever existed in Quebec. With these tools, some amateur genealogists can trace their family back to 16th century France in an afternoon.

Those of us who have Protestant ancestors can only envy their luck. We can console ourselves by realizing that there are of course some missing records, or some that are difficult to decipher, as most names of people and places were spelt phonetically before the eighteenth century in Europe and North America. Researchers have also come to the conclusion that some ancestors had such heavy accents that it made the recording of their

place of origin difficult for the officiating minister or priest.

A certain prejudice exists concerning the religion - or religions - our ancestors practiced; this places blinders before the eyes of the researcher. An example is a distant cousin who stated most emphatically that his ancestors "were always Presbyterian, and would never have married in the Anglican Church!" Fortunately for both of us, I had a copy of the marriage records - from the Compton Anglican Church!

Whether your ancestors were practicing Catholics or Protestants should not limit

your research. For some reason that I have yet to clarify, I have come across several mid-nineteenth century unions that took place in the "other" religion. Protestants marry in other denominations and even in Catholic churches, while Catholics marry in Protestant churches. This occurs even when both parties appear to be from the same religion. In one case in which I was involved, a long string of Catholic marriages and baptisms was broken by one marriage we could not find; we finally located it in an Anglican church a few miles from the couple's home.

Other problems in research are related to family names. Besides variances in spelling proper names, there is also the problem of the "dit". Some families carried two names for part of their history in Quebec.

An example would be Martin dit Bellavance. Eventually, they dropped the "dit".

In some branches they retained the first name while in others, it was the second. You could then have a series of ancestors called "Martin", and another branch, with the same primary ancestor, "Bellavance". The original ancestor from France did not necessarily carry the double name.

Most variations in spelling are easy to spot: Ouellet/Ouellette, for example much like Smith/Smythe, MacDonald/McDonald. More caution is required for other names; today's Ouimet/Ouimette could have been Huymet, and in the US, Wilmet.

A good source of information for current research is the Société généalogique canadienne-française's magazine *Mémoires*, which is available in the Journal section of the QFHS Library. If you cannot read French, you can still scan the

magazine for the names of your ancestors, and have someone help you out if you find something interesting. The articles often deal with recent research on the French origins of the first settlers; many earlier works carried best guesses as to the villages and towns from which they originated. Recently, with increased co-operation between French and Quebec genealogists, much progress is evident in record validation. There is also increasing respect for genealogists as historians, and the lines are getting more blurred between the two.

A good source for current research is the Société généalogique canadienne-française's magazine Mémoires, available in the Journal section of the QFHS Library

The chances of finding a royal ancestor are probably quite low, as most nobles came for short periods to the Colonies, and most returned to France after the Conquest, in the 1760s. You will find however that you are related to many early colonists and to their more famous descendants for this simple mathematical reason: the pioneers of 17th century New France represent about the 15th generation; this generation is composed of more than 16,000 individuals, but only about 4,000 men and women established families here before

1680. There are thus many duplications in Quebec family trees. If you have some French Canadian blood, you probably have a lot of cousins here!

If I look at my own family tree, both my Father and my Mother are descendants of Abraham Martin, for whom the Plains of Abraham are named. Like many French Canadians, we descend from Louis Hébert, a pharmacist, and the first farmer established in Quebec. My Mother shares a great-great-grandfather with Pierre Elliott Trudeau. And so it goes

In response to the '**Perseverance rewarded**' item in the March 1998 MAILBAG [vol 20 #3], contributed by Luc Lepine, we have received, via Luc, a most interesting letter from James Hansen, the great-great grandson of Jean Enoch PRINCE and Angele/Angeline TROTTIER. In his position as reference librarian and genealogical specialist at the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, Mr. Hansen has the opportunity to scan the many genealogical journals received, and because of his own French-Canadian ancestry pays particular attention to the Canadian journals. He was quite surprised, therefore, to see the item concerning the marriage of his own great-great grandparents.... "I have undertaken considerable research on these families over the years and I thought you might like to find out the rest of the story. I am enclosing copies of my working genealogy of the PRINCE family. Although his [John Enoch's] age varies from that given in his baptismal record, and there is some difficulty about his mother's name [Elohe RIGGS /Louise BEADS] I have no doubt of the connection."

Enoch Riggs PRINCE was born at New Gloucester, Maine and moved to St. Stanislaus de Champlain in French Canada, two or three years before he married [1833] Angeline TROTTIER. Jean Enoch and Angeline had four children, all baptized at St. Stanislaus de

Champlain. The family moved to Ontario County, Ontario in the 1840s and in 1860 to Chippewa County, Wisconsin. James Hansen has given permission to share his 'working genealogy' which gives this PRINCE line ancestry back to the early 1700s in Gloucester, Maine. It will be in the QFHS Pedigree File along with the original marriage record.

THE DIRECTORY OF MONUMENTAL INSCRIPTIONS LIST

QFHS publication

The Quebec Family History Society publishes a thin blue-covered book that may be useful to researchers investigating ancestral burial places in the Province of Quebec.

Over the years members carried out their own research, and recorded names from small cemeteries in many locations in Quebec Province. The Q.F.H.S. *Directory of Monumental Inscription Lists* began with the donation of this work. Slowly, over the years, the collection grew through donations, purchases and recordings of Society-organized projects. We have also received donations of lists for cemeteries located in other provinces and countries.

Most of the cemetery lists have been put into binders and are available for viewing in the Quebec Family History Library on Cartier Avenue, Pointe Claire.

The Directory also includes names of cemetery lists in other libraries, although the QFHS may not have a copy. This information service on other library holdings is useful for those beginning their research in and near the Province of Quebec. Also noted in *The Directory* are lists - of lists which are in process of completion. All in all, a large collection which has grown to over 1200 since the initial ones were donated 20 years ago.

The Quebec section is divided into counties for easy reference. Others are listed under their provincial, state or country name.

Some of the inscription lists are still in the original handwritten form, others have been printed into books, and slowly, some are being retyped and put onto diskettes. Researchers can purchase the total cemetery list or request a surname search in particular cemeteries. If we cannot supply a list for copyright reasons, we can put the enquirer in touch with the source.

The Directory is a valuable source of cemetery names and includes the names of donors and submission dates, which may someday provide insight into the growth of our Society. Hard work by individual members, dedicated to the search for ancestors, sharing their knowledge and research, afford us the opportunity to benefit from their work. Unheralded and generous, these donors have provided a research basis for all of us who are interested in Quebec ancestral burial locations. We salute them !!

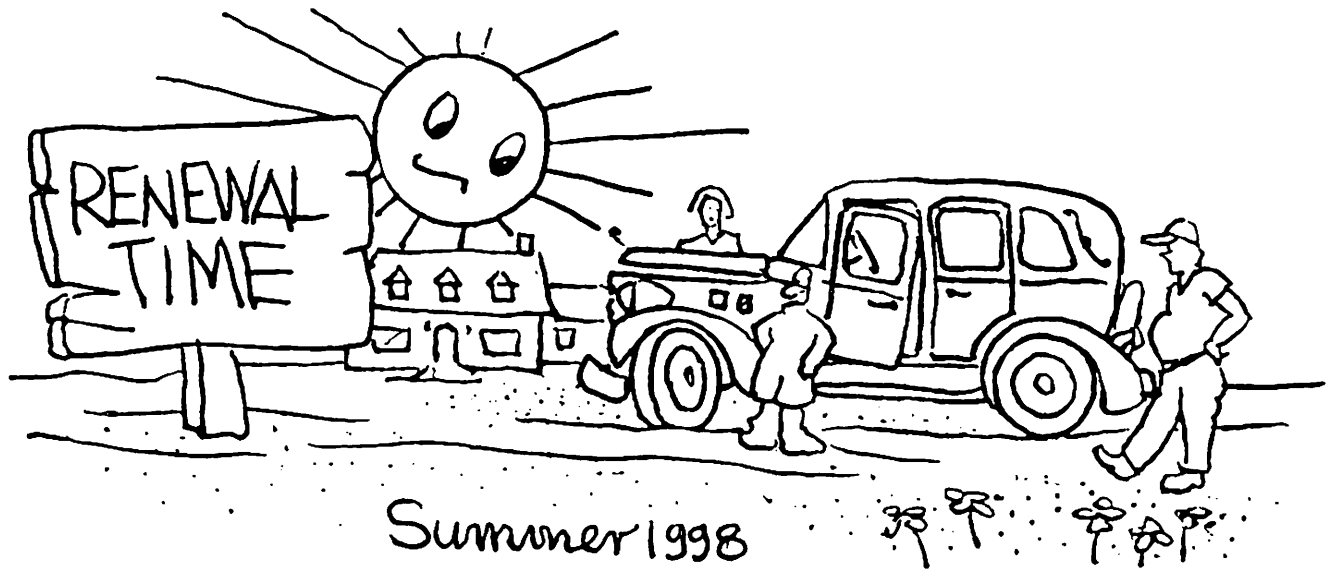

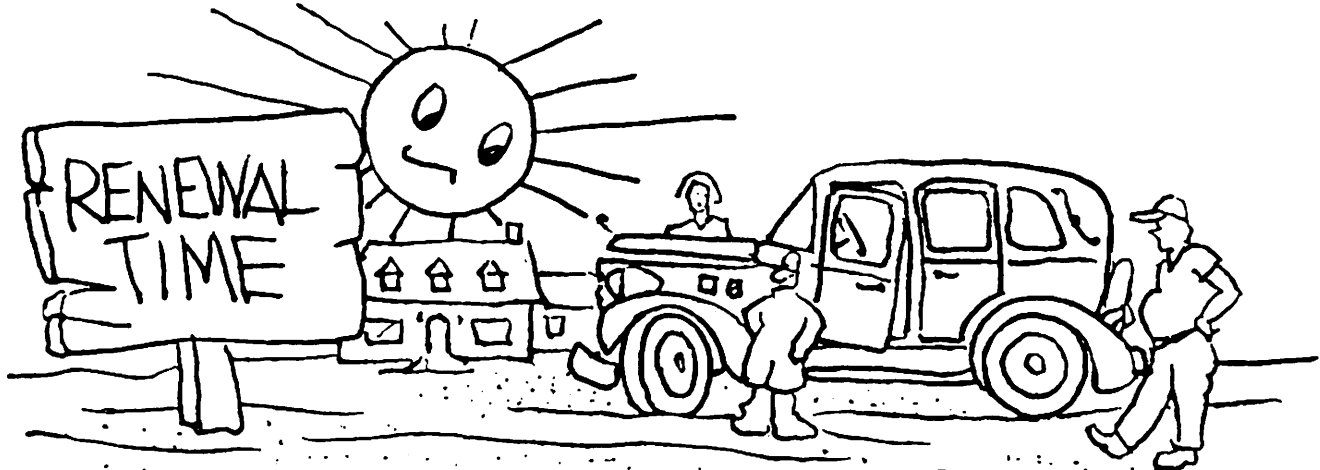

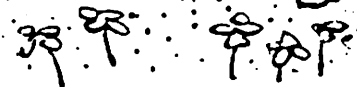

Like a Court Case

In researching my late wife's COOPER family there were a few mysteries. Who was her paternal COOPER grandmother, and what happened to her?

I found grandfather Frederick William COOPER in the Mount Royal Cemetery records, but apparently no record of a wife. His burial service was in St. Thomas's Anglican church at Sherbrooke St. E. and DeLormier where three of their four children were baptized. Then my brother-in-law suddenly remembered he had their marriage certificate. It showed that they had been married by a Justice of the Peace at Rouses Point N.Y. in 1878 and her maiden name was Mary Jane Brennan. In 1878 Irish Catholics and Anglican English couldn't get married in Montreal. A further check of the church records showed a burial for Mary Jane Cooper on 28 January 1896 with the comment "to the crypt at Mount Royal Cemetery"... graves were not dug in the wintertime. A recheck of Cemetery records now found the information..."in a free grave at an undisclosed location"... a pauper's grave.

The marriage certificate had some written notes on it "No. 1388 SCM - F.W. Cooper is Pltff - The Royal Victoria Hospital Deft - Plaintiff Exhibit No. One." What did this mean?

A discussion with Luc Lepine, archivist at the Archives Nationales du Quebec on Mullins St., resulted in the invitation to bring the document to the archives. A check on the computer system identified SCM No. 1388 as the Superior Court of Montreal case files Batch No. 1388 in 1897 with a case of F. W. Cooper vs the Royal Victoria Hospital.

A few minutes later a box of dusty old court records were delivered to me. Wearing white cotton gloves I undid the string on a batch of court records. Among them was the envelope of the suit of F.W. Cooper vs RVH for \$10,000 alleging negligence had caused the death of his wife. The marriage certificate, "Exhibit No. One", was to establish his right as an interested party - her husband. Mary Jane COOPER, nee Brennan, had died 15 days after a miscarriage at the RVH on January 8, 1896. The file contained:

1. The Plaintiff's submission.
2. The Defendant's reply.
3. The Temperature chart of the patient.
4. Details of court date delayed due to doctors being out of the country.
4. The decision of Mr. Justice Curran against the plaintiff.
5. The statement of court costs of \$17.40.

In November 1895 Mary Jane BRENNAN (COOPER) was in the RVH due to problems with her eighth pregnancy. Of her seven earlier pregnancies only four children survived. Problems recurred and she was admitted on January 7th 1896. On January 8th 1896 she had a miscarriage at the RVH. The Claim by the Plaintiff alleges that on the 17th. 10 days later, Mary Jane was taken by the nurse to see an eye-ear specialist Dr. Buller. Mary Jane, still in a weakened condition, walked, didn't use the patient elevators.

"That moreover the said Mary Jane Brennan was insufficiently clad and was not protected by proper underwear and was only covered by a thin chemise and had neither drawers or petticoats. ... That whilst she was thus abandoned by the nurse, and whilst she was thus unprotected by sufficient clothing, the said Mary Jane Brennan caught a severe cold and became chilled and exhausted by fatigue.

That after a long wait of two and a half hours, the said Mary Jane was notified that she could not see Dr. Buller and she was obliged to go back to her room without the assistance of a nurse or any other person, and was obliged to climb up the stairs and walk through the long passages above described.

That the said Mary Jane Brennan thus worn out by fatigue and benumbed by the cold, was unable to retire to her own bed but fainted and was put back in her sick bed out of which she never rose, and she died on the twenty third of January after great suffering."

The suit, for \$10,000, alleged that the death was due to negligence when she travelled around the hospital inadequately clothed in the cold weather. That Mary Jane caught a chill and this caused her death. The defense denied the allegations and stated Mary Jane Brennan left Dr. Buller's without permission or proper care and the consequences were her own fault.

Medical science was not so precise then was it pneumonia or an infection? The judgement decided that there was not enough proof of hospital misconduct and decided against the plaintiff.

EPITAPHS FROM COUNTRY GRAVESTONES

While working on old cemetery records I found that Gerry Rogers had taken the time to copy some epitaphs from early tombstones. *Connections'* readers might be interested in the poetic expressions of loss. Gerry titled his work "*Epitaphs From Country Gravestones*". A few examples include:

Beechridge Presbyterian Church Cemetery

In memory of John Fineleson, a native of Ross-shire, Scotland, who died May 10th, 1857, aged 48 years. Also of his father Donel Fineleson who died July 22nd, 1858, aged 93 years. Angis, son of John and Catherine Fineleson died September 19th, 1857, aged 16 years and also their son, Donel died April 18th, 1857, at 11 months.

"They're gone, they're to a land of light
Where the glorious day ne'er ends in night
Where a cloud ne'er came across the sky
Where the tears are wiped from every eye
Where all is holiness, love and bliss
And none regrets such a world as this".

A Successful Fishing Expedition

Last December I went on a fishing expedition with a difference this time I was fishing for relatives. The relatives I was seeking were descendants of Mary Jane TUBMAN COSTELLO, a sister of my grandfather Albert TUBMAN.

Mary Jane TUBMAN, the eldest child of Thomas and Lily (TELFORD) TUBMAN was born in 1855 in Cavan, Ireland. In 1856, Thomas, Lily, and Mary Jane TUBMAN immigrated to Caldwell, Quebec to settle on Lot 3B Range 6 township of Bristol county of Pontiac. Mary Jane's siblings, born at Caldwell, were: Margaret Ann (Mrs. John Joseph ROONEY), George Thomas, William James, Robert John, Matthew Henry, Thomas Albert (my grandfather), and Andrew Wesley. Three of these children left the Caldwell farm during the 1880s: Robert John to Minnesota, George Thomas to Minnesota via Northern Ontario, and Mary Jane to Manitoba. The ROONEY family moved to Earleton, Ontario in 1908 and the four brothers farmed in Bristol township; Andrew on the homestead, and the rest on Range 8 of Bristol.

From family stories, I was told Mary Jane TUBMAN married and went to Manitoba. After searching Canadian census records, I determined that Mary Jane left Bristol after 1881. In the March 1922 issue of the Equity, the obituary notice for Lily (TELFORD) TUBMAN lists Mrs Robert COSTELLO from Gladstone, Manitoba as a daughter. (James was the known name of her husband).

From ten letters sent to people with the surname COSTELLO living in Manitoba, I received two direct responses and a response from the letter being forwarded. The three respondents were relatives that I was missing in my TUBMAN family tree. From these letters I found out that the TUBMAN/COSTELLO family consists of "yours, mine, and ours". James COSTELLO, a widower with five children, and Mary Jane TUBMAN, a widow with one son, had a son and a daughter from their marriage.

Unknown to me a copy of the letter was forwarded to the family living in Alberta. In March I received a letter from Murene GARTON of Rivercourse, Alberta, granddaughter of Mary Jane TUBMAN. As a postscript to the letter, Murene invited me to their family (CLARKE) reunion to be held on July 28 in Alberta. My mother, Mary (HODGINS) TUBMAN, commented that I should attend as neither family, those in the east nor those in the west knew each other. Plans were made. I flew to Saskatoon and drove to Rivercourse, Alberta, where I was a guest of Murene and Orval GARTON.

To a genealogist, the family reunion of the family of Alexander and Christena (COSTELLO) CLARKE was a gold mine of information. At this reunion, the six surviving members of the CLARKE family: Olive, Murene, Christie, George, Earl, and Tena, met in the same place for only the second time in 61 years. This family was split up after the mother's death in 1932, hours after giving birth to twins, Teddy, who only lived for five months, and Tena. Alex CLARKE, their father, died three years later. Tena was adopted by her father's sister Reubena and her husband James COSTELLO, a step-brother of Christena COSTELLO CLARKE, making Tena a cousin to her siblings.

Another Pontiac connection was discovered during this trip. The CLARKE family spent the winter of 1932 on the farm of Hiram HODGINS at Vermillion, Alberta. A book on the history of the Vermillion district lists Hiram HODGINS as the owner of a quarter section of land and the

adjoining section owned by John HODGINS. From another book I discovered that Mr. & Mrs Hiram HODGINS were married in Bryson, Quebec on 1903. They had one daughter Alma. From Lester HODGINS's book, *Hodgins Kindred Forever*, I know that John Hiram HODGINS was the grandson of Pioneer John HODGINS from Thorne.

In September Christie and Annie CLARKE from Vermillion, Alberta visited with my parents Kenneth and Mary TUBMAN. Christie was introduced to cousins in the Shawville area and shown the TUBMAN homestead and cemeteries where his relatives were buried. During this trip Christie and Annie also found out that their great grandparents were buried in the same cemetery in Maxwell, Ontario.

Through Mervin COSTELLA in Gladstone, Manitoba, a grandson of Mary Jane TUBMAN, I have made contacts with decendants of Matthew TUBMAN who settled in Thorne. These contacts have information on HODGINS, QUEALE, and TELFORD families, which are some families I am researching.

This fishing expedition was a success as not only did I get information for my family history project, but I have made new friends and was able to introduce family members to each other.

A little bio: Gloria F. Tubman

I grew up in the Shawville area. I have worked for Agriculture Canada and presently work at Communications Research Centre, Ottawa. The main area of my research is Pontiac County in Quebec as well as counties Cavan and Leitrim in Ireland. I am the Vice-Chair of OGS - Ottawa Branch.

In January fellow OGS - Ottawa Branch member Gerry Neville and I will publish, through OGS-Ottawa Branch, a book on Anglican Church Records for North Clarendon.

Still on Scotland, if you want to look up your family's clan tartan, see <http://www.house-of-tartan.scotland.net> (1) Just enter your clan name, and you can see the corresponding tartan. Entered mine - Muir - and printed a picture of the tartan. Also has a link to a Clan Connections Page.

TITANIC CRAZE

Thousands of references to the *Titanic* abound on the Internet. If you want to check if any of your family travelled on the ill-fated ship, see Philip Hind's *Encyclopedia Titanica* at <http://www.rmpic.co.uk/eduweb/sites/phind/> Find passenger lists, naturally divided into First, Second, and Third Class; also Crew Lists. Servants are shown separately, of course. Some passengers have brief biographies, and you can also see who survived and who did not.

People who wish to see actual graves of Titanic passengers take QFHS president Gary Schroder's tour of Mount Royal Cemetery. If you missed this spring's tour [Sunday, June 14th], keep on eye on the notices and seminars page for the next time.

MAGAZINES WITH USEFUL WEB ADDRESSES

If you have even a minimal understanding of written French, you should find sites to match your interests, including some on genealogy and history.

I find the most interesting commercial genealogy magazine so far is *Family Chronicles*; it is available in the Periodical Section of the QFHS Library. The editors invite genealogists to vote for the most useful genealogical websites at <http://familychronicle.com> so it should be a good address to bookmark.

PERSI

In the past few months, several journals have carried articles about PERSI, the Periodical Source Index, which is justifiably famous for its references to articles in thousands of genealogical periodicals. If your curiosity was aroused, you can search from at least two on-line sites: the first is from the Allen County Public Library (Fort Wayne, Indiana), PERSI's creators, at http://www.acpl.lib.in.us/database/index/welcome_persi.html. From here, you can print out a form to order copies of articles by mail. But you may find it easier to search from *Ancestry's* site, which also carries references to many other searchable databases - find them at <http://www.ancestry.com/ancestry/search.asp>. You can also go to their on-line store and buy the PERSI CD-ROM; it can be ordered by phone if you do not wish to display your credit card number on the Internet.

Mimi Hayward tells me that a printed version of PERSI is available at the National Library in Ottawa. You may wish to reserve a place on one of the next tour's arranged by the QFHS.

INTERNET ADDRESS CHANGES

Web sites often seem to move or disappear. I often find some sites' addresses change between the time I come across them and when I write the PC Page; I have rechecked the above addresses as close to press time as possible to minimize this, but you may still find changes.

The ever-popular Cyndi Howells' list has moved to <http://www.CyndisList.com>. She now has a sponsor, but the access seems to be slower - hope this improves. There are now over 28,000 links carried on this site.

Daniel Parker writes from Toronto praising Marlene Simmon's "A Few Thoughts on Researching Your Protestant Roots in the Quebec Civil Registers" Volume 16 No 3. He adds some of his own experiences in dealing with the Civil Registers.

Canadian Genealogy and Regimental Histories of the American Civil War

Marlene Simmons continues to delve into libraries in Northern Vermont and has uncovered the histories of the 10th and 13th Regiments of Volunteers. If you have any possibility of a relative being a soldier in one of these Regiments you must read this material.

Finding Origins of Early Quebec Settlers

Nora Bernier relates her story of researching Quebec City records, in the early 1800's for the Walsh, Black, Gilley and Baldwin families using notarial wills, newspaper files and the records for St. Matthew's and Mt. Hermon Cemeteries.

My Experiences With Ontario Vital Statistic Searches

Ron Cox has much to offer the reader wishing to start research in Ontario. His own search involves finding (a) information on a specific event for an individual and (b) to try and reconstruct a family. He indicates how to complete a request for information from Salt Lake using forms available in the Office. (Inter-library loans maybe made direct with Ontario Archives).

The Story of a Dark Plot Revisited

Temperance in the late 1800's in the Townships leads to a murder attempt on a Temperance Crusader. An actual murder attempt took place 100 years ago.

No. 2 December 1994

Scotland and France

These two countries have many years of diplomatic and military alliance. This article indicates there was another strong connection extending over a much longer period through the religious orders in both countries. French was the language of the Scottish court for many years. Interesting insights.

Some Quebec City History

A visit to the home of Sir Walter Scott in Melrose Scotland, prompted Allison and Ted Irwin to correct an error in the Scott family tree indicating that Thomas Scott, brother of Sir Walter, was buried in Montreal. Their correction leads to a short discussion of St. Matthew's Church, Quebec City.

No. 3 March 1995

The Abolition of the Seigniorial System

An excellent presentation regarding the change from the Seigniorial to the free tenure of land. This very thorny question had been a long standing bone of contention. The history and the personalities are very well sketched with an outcome "which was so satisfactory to the contending parties, that what had theretofore, been a burning question in the public life of the province, disappeared from public discussion".

Weather and Emigration

A short discussion of the part weather may play in movement of large numbers of people from one place to another.

The Seignories of Missisquoi

Another well written reprint from the Missisquoi County Historical Society. The system was transported from France to New France and is the basis for the development of settlement in Quebec.

Did You Know That

Ron Cox has written an interesting essay on the arrival of the only subsidized emigration from Ireland to Canada, 29 July 1818. It is a description of the actual progress by ship and flat-bottom boats to the area of settlement on the Thames River near London, Ont.

No. 4 June 1995

A Genealogical Research

There are outside Quebec, in Canada and the United States, more descendants of the first French settlers of the St. Lawrence Valley than there are in the Province of Quebec today. Robert Chartrand, of Ottawa, recounts a search which started with a request for information from a sailor on a U.S. warship in the Mediterranean.

The Internet and All That Jazz

Ron Cox does not believe that we should all jump on the Internet band-wagon. Ron points out the way that the Internet started, where it is now and where it seems to be going.
