And they were not disappointed!!

Roots '97, the second International Conference on Family History, held at Montreal's McGill University on June 6th, 7th and 8th, to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the Quebec Family History Society was, by all accounts, a tremendous success. Frequently heard comments throughout the convention were that there was a good variety of topics and that the speakers were all extremely knowledgeable and very helpful. One woman even asked if she could sign up for the next QFHS Conference.

The Opening ceremonies, Friday night, at the McCord Museum of Canadian History was a relaxed and friendly affair. At the beginning of the Wine and Cheese Reception QFHS President and Chairman of the organizing committee, Gary Schroder, made a short welcoming speech and described some of the exhibits open for viewing. The rest of the evening was spent in friendly group conversations and touring the museum. It gave everyone present a chance to mix, mingle and discuss - what else - family history.

Saturday dawned hot and sunny, a typical Montreal Spring day. The halls of the Stephen Leacock Building bustled with activity from early morning until late afternoon. The three lecture rooms were the main centres of events but throughout the day there was plenty of time to browse. And browse they did!

During the breaks people crowded around the numerous booksellers' tables purchasing books, charts, and CD Roms or just checking out what was available for family historians. They lined up to search the computerized *Parchemin* Notarial Data Base under the guidance of members of the Parchemin Notarial Data Bank Project. Also they used computers, supplied by CAM (Internet), to "surf the 'net".

The Banquet, Saturday Night at the Chateau Champlain Hotel, gave people a chance to relax and discuss the days' lectures. The Roots Committee, along with Past President, Hugh Banfill and QFHS Secretary, Joan Benoit were led to the Head Table by a piper of the 78th Frasers and a soldier of the Franche Marine, in 18th century garb, from the Stewart Museum on Ste Helen's Island. During dinner there were speeches, door prizes and entertainment by the Ceilidh Dancers of Montreal, followed by an evening of music and dancing, and an opportunity to socialize with new acquaintances and old friends.

Sunday was another beautiful day, but the family historians at the Roots Convention preferred the cool halls and lecture rooms of the university - arriving early for more informative instruction and demonstrations, culminating in a "Meet the Experts" session and a "Home Children's" Reunion. It was a tired, happy and well-informed throng who departed through the gates of McGill campus that night to continue their tireless search for that elusive ancestor.

On behalf of the QFHS, I would like to thank the organizing committee of Roots '97, GARY SCHRODER, DOUG COOKE, DOUG POPE, LORRAINE GOSSELIN, NORA BERNIER and the numerous volunteers who, through their exhaustive efforts, made this conference a success.

THE ABBOTT FAMILY

Joseph, William, John and Harry A Son of Westmorland who founded a Canadian Dynasty

When I began my family history, in the search for the earliest point of origin to which I might lay claim, I naturally began with the surname. If one's last name is Baker, for example, it is presumed a male progenitor must have been a Baker. I speculated that Abbott might have been related to church history. In Medieval times Abbotts were not always celibate.

My ancestor, Rev Joseph Abbott had named his country home in Grenville, Quebec, Grenville Abbev and he wrote a series of 'Border Legends, a farmer's guide called the Emigrant, and other works, and he sometimes used the pseudonym "A Monk of Grenville Abbey". His brother, Rev. William Abbott, named his home "The Priory". There was a coat of arms: "three pears, or". Often in family coats of arms the symbol depicted was a pun on the last name of the bearer eg, the coat of arms for someone named Ryetown might be three stalks of rye. I thought I had made

an exciting deduction when I reasoned that the pears on our coat could be a pun on the name Abbott; the French word for a father of the church is l'Abbé, and the regular word for father is le père. In Old English, pear is spelled pere. Tickled pink with my "discovery", I felt inspired to write the Herald of Arms to see if he would confirm my idea. The rather dry letter I received in reply tended to squelch my brain-wave, but I was undaunted! (as all budding genealogists should be)...

Rev. Joseph was born at Little Strickland, Westmorland, England. A missionary for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, he built stone churches and spread the message of the Gospel in remote settlements in Lower Canada. He even engaged in a skirmish, armed only with his walking stick, against the Patriotes in the 1837 Rebellion (my other great-grandfather, Louis-Victor Sicotte, was as ardent a Patriote as one could find). Joseph

was the father of Sir John Abbott, Canada's third, and first nativeborn, Prime Minister. Joseph and his wife had twelve children, six surviving to maturity.

At times it seemed I was getting a lucky series of breaks in my research. Joseph had written a book he called "Philip Musgrave, or Memoirs of a Church of England Missionary in the North American Colonies". The name Musgrave meant nothing to me, but by luck, I was leafing through Sir Walter Scott's Peveril of the Peak, and noticed a footnote on a Sir Philip Musgrave. Remember, at this time, I was "Canadian", and knew

absolutely nothing of my ancestry. But I now realized that Joseph had chosen this name for some reason. Why this pseudonym?

Isolated in a pulp mill town, 500 miles north of Vancouver, there was little on English historical figures in our local library, but the next summer, I was at U.B.C., and would dash away after class to the well-stocked library. As if at a feast, I would roam from shelf to shelf, indiscriminately sampling morsels of information. Still, nothing on Musgrave! Then, on microfiche, I saw it. The name resounded like the inexorable tramp of the Roman Legions

along Hadrian's Wall: "The Cumberland and Westmorland Archaeological and Antiquarian Society Transactions, Vols I to?" (I forget my Roman numerals).

It took the librarian some time to locate the set. Through lack of interest, the books had been relegated to storage. So deep into the innards of the library had they been sunk that one had to descend by elevator, and enter a labyrinth of eerie, dimly-lit corridors and steel book-stacks, then climb a ladder up to a remote platform. A naked lightbulb swung overhead, casting weird shadows. It looked a bit like a gangster's hide-out -- more of a place to meet Al Capone than the dignified Sir

Phillip. I was frightened. I took a small knife out of my purse. I glanced quickly about. I slit the pages and started to read...

At last I had the much longedfor information on Sir Philip Musgrave. He represented the monarchial values to which Joseph so clearly adhered. The discovery of the C.W.A.A.S.T. volumes was the beginning for me of a deep interest in Cumbrian history and eventually nothing would do but to go and see it for myself. And in Penrith, I found there is no end to historical searches. For in the town centre I

found another Philip Musgrave -- an even more plausible reason for my ancestor's pseudonym -- the longing for home of a man who was to die on foreign soil.

"The hills! How I love them!" he would write, "the sight of them to me, is like life from the dead."

Westmorland is a rugged isolated district in North West England. The small villages still retain much of their original character. The landscape in the Northern Counties is redolent with the sense of privacy and conservatism. Tidy fields are hemmed in by networks of stone walls, put together without mortar. In the

villages, small, austere-looking farmhouses have stood for hundreds of years beside their rough old outbuildings of grey stone with slate roofs, all seeming to grow out of the very landscape itself. The tiny hamlet of Little Strickland even today resembles a feudal village with a significant number of interesting old Halls, some built around strong towers or 'peles', which once served as fortifications in the days of border warfare. These are now almost all farmhouses, but are reminiscent of a bygone glory, with their beams and walls four to six feet thick, leaded glass windows and ornately sculpted ceilings. Life in the dales was simple: the chimneys of the houses

were enormous, and joints of meat were hung there to dry, and the family would gather under the smoky dome, knitting, or spinning wool and flax, the men carding the wool, and the school-boys reciting their Latin verse. The White Friars of Shap Abbey, who settled in the area soon after the Conquest, saw to it that the sons of Lords and the sons of day labourers, who sat side by side in school, learned their Latin, and it was said that in Westmorland, they "ploughed in Greek and sowed in Latin." Life as an emigrant would not be easy.

Rev. Joseph's first thought on seeing the Canadian landscape was the biblical adage "in the sweat of thy brow shalt thou earn thy bread."

Joseph and his brother William were founding members of the committee to establish McGill University, and Joseph became its first Vice-Principal. His son John became a brilliant law student there, and his rise in the world of commercial law led eventually to the highest office in the land. But he was a reluctant Prime Minister. "I hate politics", he said, "and what are considered its appropriate methods. I hate notoriety, public meetings, public speeches, caucuses. Why

should I go where doing honest work will only make me hated and my ministry unpopular, and where I can only gain reputation and credit by practicing arts that I detest, to acquire popularity?" As a lawyer, "one of his most prominent characteristics was a strong sense of justice. Although remarkable for his dislike of litigation, no sooner was he satisfied that injustice was being done or oppression practiced than with intense concentration of energy, he would throw himself into the case and press it to the end with indomitable capacity."

On October 21st, 1880, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was created as Abbott drew up the contract between the Government and the Company.Later Sir Edward Beatty, a C.P.R. President, would say: "He prepared almost wholly in his own hand-writing - the contract Government between the Canada and those who had undertaken to build a transcontinental railway... The contract which Sir John Abbott wrote is a public document of great importance in the history of Canada... the contract and the charter of the Company still stand among the finest pieces of accurate drafting - coupled with an amazing foresight as to the

future of Canada - to be found since Confederation and one that has since borne the test of judicial scrutiny in a manner which was as satisfactory as it was exceptional."

On June 28, 1886 the first official train for the Pacific coast left Dalhousie Station, Montreal; Mayor Beaugrand and officials from the Canadian Pacific were on hand; cannons were fired as the train pulled out, carrying mail and immigrants. As his early biographer, Hutchison, writes: "Bearing (his) extraordinary services in mind, it is not surprising that, when the first transcontinental train crossed Canada in 1886, the souvenir time-table contained the photograph of its first General Counsel, John Abbott among those of the men who had made it possible - the Prime Minister who had fathered it, Lord Mount Stephen and Lord Strathcona who had seen it through its financial troubles, and Sir William Van Horne, its builder."

It has been said that there were few men more familiar with railway law matters that Sir John Abbott, and it is equally true that there

were few more familiar than his brother Harry Abbott, C.E., with the history of railroad construction in early Canada. The period during which Harry was General Superintendent of the Pacific Division was one in which practically all the pioneer work of the C.P.R. was done and he played a chief role in building up the railway on the coast. On January 26th, 1886, he wrote Van Horne: "If application has not already been made to change the name of the Post Office from Granville to Vancouver. I would suggest that the change be effected as promptly as possible." In 1884 Van Horne had written a friend: "Hamilton! Hamilton!! This is destined to be a great city, perhaps the greatest in Canada, and

we must see to it that it has a name commensurate with its dignity and importance, and VANCOUVER it shall be if I have the ultimate decision."

Harry then let the contract for the clearing of the townsite, laying out the new town of Vancouver.

The arrival of the first through train from Montreal to Vancouver took place on May 23, 1887. The buildings were decorated with evergreens, flags, and bunting while from every flag-mast in the city a flag of some nationality was flying out before the breeze. Horses and

vehicles were decorated with bright colored ribbons. Strings of ship colors were stretched over streets and all the ships in the harbour were decked out. "The FIRST THROUGH PASSENGER TRAIN entered the station and pulled up in Vancouver. The scene for a few minutes was indescribable, shaking of hands and congratulations were the order of the day and everybody seemed delighted beyond expression. On alighting from the train Mr. Abbott was immediately surrounded by friends who showered congratulations on him from every side and for some minutes a succession of hand shakes were tendered which met with a hearty return from him. About this time the music of the band was heard and a moment later a procession of several hundred people headed by the City Band and Fire Brigade in full dress came marching down the roadway and halted at the station. When the band had finished plaving. Mayor McLean mounted a baggage truck and called for "Three Cheers for Mr. Abbott" which were given with a right good will."

"Mayor McLean then congratulated Mr. Abbott on the termination of the great undertaking he had worked so persistently at for the last few years and also congratulated the people of Vancouver on the realization of their hopes."

"Mr. Abbott on receiving the address said: "Mr. Mayor, ladies and gentlemen. I take the greatest pleasure in congratulating you upon the completion of the C.P.R. ... here we are, and here we will remain. (Great applause). ... anyone who sees the city to-day can judge of the enterprise and push of its founders. Vancouver is a name well-known to-day all over America and Europe, as proof of this, the immigration into this country from Europe has increased four or five times this year over last year. There is no reason why this should not be; this is a great country, and the immigrants should succeed, and I hope they will. It must be remembered we have valleys as well as mountains, and these valleys are wonderfully

fertile and capable of holding a large population... and I feel confident that if the people of Vancouver show that pluck and energy in the future that they have in the past, the coming greatness of Vancouver will be realized in the fullest extent...."

Years later, an address to Canadian Pacific shareholders by Company President Beatty more fully summed up the import of the mammoth undertaking: "When the C.P. was incorporated, Canada was little more than a geographical expression and the population West of the Great Lakes didn't exceed 170, 000. With the completion of the Company's main line, the country became a united nation. It may be confidently asserted that no other contract ever entered into by the Dominion, has produced a return to it in any way comparable with that received as a result of the original agreement with the C.P. Syndicate."

In 1887 John Abbott was elected Mayor of Montreal and reelected by acclamation in 1888

Sir John Thompson said of Abbott: "The man who succeeded Macdonald was worthy to be his successor. Sir John Abbott's great qualities of brain and heart, his great qualities of statesmanship, his great abilities and his great desire to serve this country will never be fully understood by the Canadian people because his career as first minister was so short."

John Abbott was married to Mary Bethune, daughter of Dean Bethune of Montreal.

While these great events were taking place, a young girl was just entering university in Montreal. She was Maude Elizabeth Seymour Abbott, the daughter of William, Rev. Joseph's brother, and her life had had an inauspicious beginning. For her story and more on the Abbott Family see *Dr Maude* on page 25 in this issue of *Connections*.

Thanks to Elizabeth Nichols for an interesting letter in which she queries our statement that you would not find the baptism of Anne Jane Mather in the IGI. She has sent the *Individual Record* format printout from the 1994 IGI for Anna Joanna MATHER (correct) and for Jacobo MATHER (wrong), both with the same date and parents and from the same source document. "A Latin entry does appear to have been misread, in an extraction done in 1967". Ms Nichols also enclosed a photocopy of the source document, *Registers of New-castle-upon-Tyne*, in Latin, from which the original Jacobo IGI entry was wrongly translated.

BUT - that still leaves this editor with a quite different puzzle, and leads me to wonder if a revised version of the IGI is ever issued, bearing the same date. The original *IGI Error*

was described as being taken from the 1992 microfiche edition, (received from a source unable to contact). On checking the QFHS Library's 1992 microfiche edition, the Anna Joanna entry is indeed there and reads correctly. The incorrectly translated Jacobo entry is also there. So - either there exist two 1992 versions of the IGI, or what? Aplogies for any confusion caused.

THE CANADIAN GLEANER

Mrs Valerie Finding (#2297) 2714 Lincoln Road Victoria BC V8R 6A7

Mrs. Finding writes "Does anyone in the QFHS know anything about a purported index to the weekly newspaper "The Canadian Gleaner" for the years 1864-1874 compiled by Shirley Burke Thibault in 1982?" Shirley Thibault is no longer at the given address. The enclosed Gleaner information sheet states that this was a weekly newspaper published in Huntingdon, Quebec, also known as the Huntingdon Gleaner. The first Gleaner was published in the Fall of 1863. There were

two brief periods when the paper ceased publication. A fire destroyed the Gleaner offices and presses on the 24th of June 1870. A meeting of citizens was called and (they) voted to continue the paper. To facilitate this it was decided to increase the yearly subscription rate of \$1.00 to \$1.50.

The majority of the earliest English-speaking settlers in the Counties of Huntingdon, Beauharnois and Chateauguay, and upper New York State were from Scotland. Later emigrants came from England and Ireland. It is to these people that the notices in the Gleaner pertain. The index of names is a guide to the birth, marriage and death notices from January 1864 to December 1874. Through Interlibrary Loan Mrs. Finding can obtain microfilm copies of the Gleaner but would very much prefer to have recourse to the Index first. She would appreciate hearing from anyone who knows a source for this Index.

PEDIGREE CHARTS: and a few uncommon SURNAMES:

Luc Lepine, Archivist at the Archives Nationales du Quebec, has donated 3 pedigree charts to the QFHS Library - they contain some unusual surnames and variations.

1) Descendants of Jean BIGUET

of Normandy, France, who settled in Quebec in the late 17th century.

BIGUET became BILLET then BEYETTE. Other names include: LEVIER, DUBOIS, ACHIN LAFOND, MIGNERON, BAYARD, LAFORET, CHAMIALLARD, SUPRENANT, VANDRICK, STONEBERG, SWITZER, SMALLMAN, LAVERTURE, RENDELL, RINN, PASTHUMUS This chart gives most marriage dates from 1691 to 1987, but no locations. A contact name and phone number are available.

2) Descendants of Joseph JEGOUT b. 1695 in Montigny, France. This family remained in

Montigny, Pexonne, and Reherry, France until the 19th century, when Jean François GEGOUX settled at St Louis de Gonzague. Quebec and married Marie Josephete LEDUC of Beauharnois. Names in France include: ROUSSEL, MENGIN, JACQUES, HOVASSE, LECOMPTE, DEMENGET, ALIZON, BERTON DEDENON. LAURENT. MARCHAL, LEDOUX, SAUZER, HOUILLON, GRIDEL. Names in Beauharnois, Ile Perrot, Vaudreuil and St Jeanne de Chatal, Quebec: in Alfred. ON: in Clayton and Watertown, NY; and in Los Angeles. CA. include DAOUST, VALADE. MONPETIT dit POTVIN, TREPANNIER, BOYER, CLEROUX, BRANCHARDT, LEFORT (Alfred), BLENIER and BERTRAND (Clayton), LAVINE (Watertown) and FETHERO (Los Angeles). Most of the birth and death dates given are pre-1900 in Quebec, though the Ontario and US dates are early 1900s. There is no contact name on this chart but the name could be made available to anyone researching these families.

3) RICHARD, LEPINE, FONTAINE and others: This chart comes from the Manitoba Genealogical Society and includes some names from Quebec of those who, in the 19th century, went to Manitoba and settled in Winnipeg, St. Boniface, Ste. Agathe and St. Charles. The LEPINE ancestry traces back to Ambroise

LEPINE, Louis Riel's general in the 1870 Red River Rebellion.

RICHARD ancestry includes Michel-Ulysse MARTINEAU, aunt of Sir Wilfred LAURIER. Other names on this chart from various places in Quebec, Manitoba or Ontario: BERIAULT, BARIL, BEAUVAIS, THIBERT, ST. MARTIN, BRIEN, FOURNIER, CUSSON, PINSONNEAULT, BONNENFANT, VANDALE, GODARD, LEMYRE, CHRISTIN, DUCHESNEAU, LAPERCHE, ROY, PELLERIN, HONORE (or HENRY), MARION.

BOOK REVIEW

ABBOTT James L.G. *Harry Braithwaite Abbott , C.E.* n.d.[1926] 98p. Reprinted 1996 by Elizabeth Abbott, Sainte Anne de Bellevue, QC

The Reverend Joseph Abbott was a clergyman of the Church of England in North Westmorland when, in 1818, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel sent him to Canada to his first parish of St Andrews, Quebec. In 1820 he married Harriet Bradford, the eldest daughter of the Reverend Richard Bradford, clergyman in charge of the nearby parish of Chatham. Bradford had been a proud fighter in the [British] Navy, had sailed as a midshipman with Captain Cook on his voyage up the St. Lawrence River and had served as Chaplain to the Duke of Kent when the Duke was in his summer residence at Sorel.

Joseph Abbott was also an interesting man - he wrote a series of "Border Legends"; The Emigrant: an Early Farmer's Guide [c1818] and The Search for Philip Musgrave, a collection of historical romances set in the Lake District and in Canada. He sometimes used the pseudonym, 'A Monk of Grenville Abbey'.

These were the ancestors of the Abbott family in Canada.

Henry Abbott's life and times present an interesting Canadian historical vignette of this period of immigration, settlement, political storms and railway building. In all of these Henry Abbott was involved.

Though young at the time, he remembered the 1837-1838 Rebellion - his militant clergyman father rounded up the men of the Parish and led them off to fight the Rebels, his father armed only with a walking stick!

His mother is said to have sheltered Papineau in the cellar of her father's home while he. Papineau, attempted to escape to the United States.

Henry Abbott was the first General Superintendent of the Pacific Division of the CPR during this period of the pioneer work in railway construction. His brother John Abbott was elected Mayor of Montreal, and in 1892 succeeded Sir John A. Macdonald as Prime Minister of Canada.

The life of Maude Elizabeth Abbott, the daughter of William, brother of Joseph, had a tragic beginning with the desertion of her father and the abandonment of the children. She and her sister were adopted into the family of their loving grandparents. Maude went on to become a pioneer woman doctor and a world-renowned cardiologist - the first woman to be inducted into the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame.

Elizabeth Abbott's 'Notes', in the reprint edition of this book, and her accompanying article about the Abbotts, are important in making the book an interesting work of social history.

PUBLISHING and SEARCHING FOR GENEALOGIES

Genealogical magazines and society publications are filled with comments, ads and guidance on "publishing". What is frequently overlooked in these accounts is the research benefits of publishing in a certain way. All genealogists are anxious to find one another and share information. Publishing is an important tool in helping find one another.

In CANADA the National Library in Ottawa offers a wonderful facility which every genealogist should know about. Every genealogical author should use them in the following ways:

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The first copy resides forever in the National Library and is a permanent record of the country's print culture.

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2. Cataloguing: The National Library catalogues every item that arrives via "legal deposit" and publishes that catalogue annually through "Canadiana" and throughout the year in "Forthcoming Books" in a periodical called "Quill and Quire". These indexes are available in every major library in the country and throughout the world. In larger libraries the entire holdings of the National Library, past and present, are viewable and searchable on computer terminals. For those with home connections to the internet you can search this catalogue from home!

The main advantage of this is that Eli Wasser can enter, say, the North York Library on Yonge Street in North York, Toronto, Ontario and learn that Miss Millie Jones published a genealogy on the "Wasser family of East Pickle Lake, Manitoba" in 1957. He can then complete a request to have the second copy of the Wasser Genealogy sent via interlibrary loan to his local library for his personal study.

Two important things made this "print encounter" between Miss Jones and Mr Wasser possible. Firstly Miss Jones knew enough to send her two copies of the Wasser Genealogy to the National Library. Secondly Eli Wasser knew enough about library search and retrieval systems so that he could find the Wasser Genealogy sitting on the shelf in Ottawa. And after the "print encounter" Jones and Wasser might have other types of useful and informative meetings.

A question for every author, publisher or descendant of one. Did you send your two copies to the National Library? Did you know that you can send copies of that genealogy you wrote ten years ago? Or forty years ago! Its never too late to join this process! It is estimated that fewer than 10% of all the family histories lodged in various local libraries have been sent to the National Library. There is an immense "catch-up" job to be done by all authors and their descendants!

A question for every searcher. Did you look in the National Library catalogue to see if your search interests are listed there?

THE ABBOTT FAMILY DR MAUDE

While Joseph Abbott's offsprings were thriving, his brother William and his wife Frances were enduring a *Via Dolorosa*. In 1854 word reached Joseph and his wife that their nephew and niece, John Seymour Abbott and Frances Elizabeth Seymour Abbott, were gravely ill. Joseph went by horse and buggy to St. Andrews to be with William and Frances for two months to help the family face the

impending tragedy. Young John died on Christmas eve, age 18. A month later, 20-year old Frances died. In his letter to his friend Lt. Col. Thomas Kains, from Montreal February 11, 1855. Joseph writes: "Bella (Isabella Kains) will have lots to tell you all about my poor brother's sad bereavement. He has been dreadfully cut up by it." Joseph had returned home on the coldest day ever known "in this hyperborean climate; the thermometer was 36 below zero", and braved the uninterrupted sweep of a fierce Northeaster on the wide expanse of the Ottawa from Ste. Anne's to Lachine: "Oh, it was a bitter, bitter day -"

These two deaths were to be followed by others in nightmarish grim succession. In 1859 William died, and in 1860 his widow lost her daughter Harriet Anne, age 16. The next year her daughter Mary Isabella died, age 23. In 1864 Alice Maude Margaret died, age 19. And as Joseph would say, "but their cup of misery was not yet full." A short two years later, an even more dreadful series of catastrophes

with unforeseeable eventualities was unleashed upon the family.

Elizabeth Bayley Abbott was Frances' last remaining daughter, and had married an Anglican Minister named Jeremy Babin. Babin's mother had died and the father remarried and went away to the U.S.A. with the new wife, abandoning his children. It fell to Jeremy, the eldest, then a teenager, to raise his young

siblings, including a crippled sister, Mary. This Jeremy did with some success, all the boys attended Bishop's and Jeremy graduated with a B.A. in 1863. Then brother 'Job' took his turn at family responsibility, looking after Mary, while Jeremy established himself as the priest in charge of the Buckingham congregation.

Jeremy brought his bride Elizabeth to his parsonage home and in January, 1866 Mary arrived to live with them. Jeremy appeared reluctant to accept this responsibility again, and in April Mary disappeared. Her body was found in the

Lièvre River, a full investigation took place, and in July Jeremy was charged with her murder. The only possible alternative to the grim conclusion that Jeremy himself must have done away with her was the slim evidence that a carter named Moise Leduc, hired to take her to Ottawa one day may have violated her and left her body in the icy river. The trial took place in Aylmer, west of Hull.

Public feeling ran high against Jeremy and

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his wife, and when Elizabeth, who was pregnant, arrived with her mother, Mrs. William Abbott for the hearing, there was "no room at the inn" for them: none of the public inns would give them lodging.

The young couple's maid testified that both the curate and his wife had been kind to Mary; that Elizabeth had often sat with her and kept her company. But there was no feasible explanation for her disappearance, except the story of the shifty Leduc, who was eventually found to be a resident in Ottawa, and witnesses testified that he was of no fixed address, that he was of a violent and dissolute character, and that he had disappeared from his usual haunts some time after April 1866.

The Bishop of Montreal, among others, was a character witness for Jeremy.

In January 1867 Babin was acquitted for lack of evidence. The young couple resorted to the shelter of Mrs William Abbott's home in St. Andrews, and in these terrible circumstances, Maude Abbott was born.

The pathos of the helpless victim, the brief tragic course of her life, abandoned by her father, possibly murdered or at least placed in a dangerous position by a brother who allowed her to be taken in charge by rough carter of dubious character, aroused the

righteous indignation of the general population The subject would not die down. Reverend Babin, unable to endure the accusations, followed in his father's footsteps and abandoned his young family, decamping to Kentucky. His abandonment was the last blow to Elizabeth, and a short time later, at age 27, she died of pulmonary tuberculosis. As grief overwhelmed her once again, a heartbroken Frances held close to her two orphaned

grand-daughters; the little scrap of humanity that would become Maude Abbott was only seven months old. Two years later, Frances' youngest son, Edward Joseph Christopher, an engineer, drowned in the waters of the Upper Ottawa near Lake Temiscamingue, age 24. His body was never recovered. In 1878 William Robert, her last child, died, July 17, age 33, and the elderly Frances had a stained glass window installed in Christ Church, St. Andrews: "To the memory of my beloved husband and children, all of whom it pleased Almighty God to remove from this world before me".

That tower of strength, Joseph, had passed away in 1862, and the support of John

and his sister Harriet had become a boon to the elderly Frances Abbott, and drew the families even more closely together. Mindful of her age, of the terrible suddenness with which death can strike, France named John and his sister Harriet as guardians of Maude and Alice. John and Harriet virtually adopted Maude.

As Joseph had said in his memoirs, he and his wife 'would leave this vale of tears, and go without a murmur of regret' when the time came. Harriet died January 21, 1873, age 68. She had outlived seven of her children and her husband, and

was buried beside him in Mount Royal Cemetery, their graves marked by a small reddish brown stone. In plots beside the Abbotts are Strachan Bethune, (Dr. Norman Bethune was a famous member of this family), Simon McTavish McKenzie and other names which hearken back to early Canadian history.

Her daughter Harriet was willed the little cameo brooch that Joseph had presented to his young wife on their wedding day, a tiny

memento of that day of innocence on which, had they been able to foresee some of the tragedies the future would hold, their courage might have failed them.

Little Maude and Alice had a protected life in St. Andrews. Her grandmother "raised the orphaned children of her daughter and through many subsequent years she was a familiar figure in St. Andrews where she met the bereavements of her advancing age with a living faith that vanquished sorrow, and a lovely serenity of spirit that shone as a beacon light in the homes of that community until her own passing on December 12, 1890.

Maude's early education was carried on entirely at home under a governess. "lots would envy us a governess," she writes in her diary, "what geese some girls are. Why, there are hundreds of them going to school and longing to get away from it ... one of my day-dreams, which I feel to be selfish, is that of going to school. And once I begin dreaming of the possibilities I become half daft over what I know will never come to pass. Oh, to think of studying with other girls! Think of learning German, Latin and other languages in general. Think of the loveliness of thinking that it entirely depended on myself whether I get on."

Maude's stellar career as a pioneer woman doctor and internationally renowned cardiologist has been well-documented by such authors as Drs. Douglas Waugh, *Maudie of McGill* and Hugh MacDermot, *Maude Abbott, a memoir.*

The first Canadian physicians to become world figures before 1922 were William Osler and Maude Abbott. That was the year in which a third name was added, that of Frederick Banting who discovered insulin. In 1994 Maude was the first woman laureate to be inducted into the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame.

After John Abbott's death, Maude would write, that it was "he, and he alone, who made me go on when I was ready to give up my career."

We had a Reluctant Prime Minister, and also, an inadvertent feminist in John Abbott, for he gave his full support to the Donaldas of McGill, as they were about to break down a male bastion.

Several of Sir John Abbott's descendants achieved fame, and include actor Christopher Plummer.

SECURITY, CONTINGENCY PLANS AND OTHER UNPLEASANT REALITIES

The recent unfortunate occurrence where thieves checked through the building and stole our new computer reminded me that I wanted to pass on a bit of security advice.

Security can be considered under three aspects: the physical equipment, the software, and the data. For each one, the security measures should be proportional both to the possible monetary and time costs to replace.

The physical equipment represents a considerable monetary investment, but if it is stolen or damaged, it is usually easy to replace. The important aspects are to make sure your equipment is insured properly, and is in a relatively well-protected environment.

For businesses, the loss can be greater than the value of the equipment. For example, the QFHS' computer was used for E-mail, and thus communication with our members. This is where contingency plans come in: in our case, it was simply to have our Webmaster, Norman Berriman, read and forward any messages to the appropriate person. There was thus only a slow-down, but no interruption of E-mail service.

The second set of items to protect is the software, that is the programmes that run the computer or that perform specific functions, such as your genealogy programmes. The protection here will be based on the cost and the rarity of the software. The standard protection is to copy it, store the original in a different location (safety deposit box, at your office, at a friend's house, etc), and use the copy. You may not want to go to this bother if it is very inexpensive and easy to obtain, however, if it is expensive, or old, out of date, and you cherish the work it performs, I would strongly suggest you go and copy it now!

The third group consists of data, or the information you have entered. Although it is the one with the least monetary value, it is the hardest to replace, and should thus be well protected. The data should be saved when you enter it, and backed up on different media (ex a disquette) on a regular basis. Once again, the care and frequency will depend on how easy it is to recreate the data if it should be lost. A few suggestions: do not rely on the automatic save feature of your computer, but rather save at logical steps or intervals. For example, I always save at a minimum when I have typed in one screen of text; I also save when I have modified one section or one screen - whatever is smaller - and always when entering a record, such as a genealogical entry. In this way, if the power goes off, or I mess things up, it is relatively easy to know what I have lost, and need to reenter.

The same reasoning applies to backing up files: if you have spent an evening entering family tree information, this should be backed up from your hard disk to a disquette. If what you have been doing is writing letters, and you have kept a paper copy for your records, the need for a backup is not as great, and you might not care if the file is lost at some point. Think how upset you would be to locate, reenter, and verify the information to help you determine the need for backup.

QUEBEC NOTARIAL RECORDS

If any of you read the Montreal Gazette article on the data base appearing on the Internet, you must have been puzzled by the fact they were referring to 30,000 records in Quebec from 1635 to 1800. Of course, this is nonsense. What the Gazette did not mention was that this was a sample from the *Parchemin* data base. It now contains over 300,000 records, and the company which is creating it has recently added records for 10 more years, extending its reach to 1765. You may have already read about this data base in an article I wrote in an earlier *Connections* issue.

Of course, those of you who came to Roots '97 already know this: not only was one of our speakers Mr. Julian McKay, Director of the Parchemin Notarial Data Bank Project, but the actual data base - the full 300,000 - was available for trying out by all.

Unfortunately, what has appeared on our Web site and in the March '97 issue of *Connections* was incomplete and could lead to erroneous conclusions. The *Parchemin* data base contains references (not the actual text) to all existing notarial records in Quebec from 1635 to 1765 (for the moment - there are plans to continue, and some records are there up to 1800). These index records contain all the names that appear in the documents, in the original spelling, all dates, and whatever key words are appropriate. These include marriage contracts, wills, sales of property, etc. They can be used as is, or as a reference to the original documents. It is not necessary to know the notary's name, as the data base provides it. The settlers of New France apparently set a great store to passing contracts in front of notaries. For the genealogist, this means, for example, that if you have ancestors that were *voyageurs* in the early fur trade, the chances are good that you will find a contract between your ancestor and a Montreal fur merchant, for trade in the west. Also, if you have an ancestor that had some kind of a trade, the contract between his parents and an artisan who agreed to take him on as an apprentice should be in the base.

The *Parchemin* data base is available at several libraries or genealogical societies, but the most accessible is probably at the Quebec National Archives, on Mullins street in Montreal. The QFHS Library also carries a book describing the contents, and listing the notaries [*Parchemin S'Explique* (Ref GS 150.3L3 1989)]. This book was reviewed, by Lorraine Gosselin, in *Connections* [vol 17 issue 2 - page 13] December, 1994.

OTHER INTERESTING SITES

Someone has remarked that the purpose of requesting interesting and useful websites is to build a compendium. That is not the case, it was not mentioned nor referred to. What we are after is quality, not quantity. There are already too many web pages that are compendiums of anything and everything. What we want to do is pass on the address of sites we believe would be of interest to our members, that have already been scrutinized and found helpful, especially if they carry actual archival records, and not only list of chat groups. If you are really into compendiums, who can compete with Cyndi - http://www.oz.net/~cyndihow/sites.htm - who now lists over 21,700 genealogy sites.

So if you see anything of this type, please be generous and pass it on for the use of all the members of the OFHS.

For example, member Sherm Delmage offers the following site which is not genealogical, but can be of great help to genealogists looking for family members: http:///www.worldpages.com It provides lists of names, addresses, E-mail addresses, even maps of specific locations. I tried it out a couple of times, and the site seems to be improving every time.

For those of you with French Canadian ancestors, you might be interested in contacting one of the one-name societies. A list of more than one hundred appears on the site of La fédération des familles souches québécoises inc. - http://www.mcc.gouv.qc.ca/pamu/organis/ffsq.htm - the site is in French, but that should not be a problem, as the list is simply of names and addresses, with E-mail contact where available.

This company is apparently at work in the Montreal region, sending out advertising from a Pierrefonds address, each signed by someone with the same name as the addressee - a "cousin" perhaps?! The Halbert's names appears only in very small print.

The Quebec Consumer Protection Office, in the May 1997 issue of its magazine Protégez-vous, devotes a full page of comments on Halbert's. Among other items, it says (my translation): "the great specialty of Halbert's is to deceive consumers." The author goes on to note that there is very little genealogical information, that it is not tailored to the particular family name, and that name and addresses are out of date and better obtained from a telephone book or an online directory.

There is also an index to surnames that accompanies the actual valuation of lands and houses.

MARY SECORD

Recently I received a short article, written by June Exelby, of Craik, Saskatchewan, about the history of her 5X grandmother Mary Secord. In the June, 1993 issue of 'Connections' [vol. 15 #4] David Cooke also wrote an article about Mary - here for the benefit of new members are both articles, with a list of family names of her descendants, compiled by June Exelby. MARY SECORD THE UNKNOWN HEROINE

In Canadian history one woman stand out as a symbol of Canadian fortitude and courage. She is Laura (Ingersol) Secord. We all know the story of her overnight trek through the woods, avoiding American checkpoints to inform the British of the plans for an American surprise attack. Her efforts turned the tables on the invaders and helped turn the course of the War of 1812.

There are two other Secord women also worthy of praise for their courage. In New York, in the late 1770s, Issac Swayse was jailed by the Patriots for his outspoken loyalty to the King. On the evening before he was to be executed his wife, (?) Secord, came to visit him. He was able to escape the prison by exchanging clothes with his wife and made his way to safety in Canada. She was never seen again and her fate remains unknown.

Mary Secord (Laura's aunt by marriage) was born in 1736, probably in Cortland Manor, New York. Nothing is known of her early years. She married a Captain Krookston who was killed in the Indian Wars. Her brothers left overcrowded New York for the Wyoming Valley in Pennsylvania, for land. Mary must have followed. She married a second time, Joshua Beebe (born October 10th, 1738 East Haddam, Connecticut) who had moved to Pennsylvania for the same reason. They had seven children as they moved from Ashford to York and later the Susquehanna.

Both the Secords and the Beebes were Huguenot families and owed their very survival to the British crown. When revolution stirred Joshua and his eldest son, Adin, naturally supported the King. They joined Butler's Rangers and fought in the Indian department. Mary and the rest of the children moved to Niagara for safety.

In 1779 Joshua Beebe carried important dispatches through enemy lines to the blockaded city of New York. He contracted small pox and died there.

Mary, now a widow for the second time and with six children in tow, removed to Yamachiche refugee camp near Three Rivers, Quebec for the balance of the war. While in camp she met Christopher Pearson, the rations officer, a widower with two girls and married for a third time.

With the signing of the peace treaty in Paris provision was made for reparations to be paid by the Americans to those who lost property and land due to their loyalty to the crown. When it came time to pay said reparations The States objected. Mary Secord and other Loyalists were left destitute. The crown, aware of the plight of the American refugees, offered free land in Canada to veterans and their families.

Christopher Pearson, his wife and new family were among the five hundred settlers who sailed from the St. Lawrence around the Gaspe peninsula to Paspebiac Beach on the Bay of Chaleur in June 1783. Lots were drawn and land distributed to these transplanted Americans. Life was not easy there. Fields had to be cleared, there were poor harvests and bad weather to contend with.

Mary Secord, Krookston, Beebe, Pearson or "Grandma Pearson" as she was later known lived to the ripe old age of one hundred

three years. During her lifetime she had pioneered in Pennsylvania, raised a large family during a revolution, survived life in a refugee camp and started a new life in Canada.

I think you will agree that Mary Secord's whole life was every bit as courageous as her niece's one evening in 1813 and every bit as worthy of praise.

THE STORY OF MARY SECORD

Mary Secord was born February 21st, 1736 at New Rochelle, New York. She was the seventh child of Daniel Secord and Catherine Mabie. The Secord family were of Huguenot stock. Ambroise Secord, saltmaker, came to North America from England in the 1630s, after his family had fled from France some 25 years earlier.

Born into a family of tall, slim, blond males, Mary was blond but small compared to her brothers. She attended school in New Rochelle for a short time, where books were very scarce - her only book was a Primer containing prayers and spelling lessons. The teachers used birch switches and dunce caps to keep the children in line, but most of Mary's education came from her experience.

She wore homespun clothing, mostly of wool, dyed with leaves and berries. All their garments were made over as they became worn and made over again for a younger child until there was scarcely a scrap left. She wore leather shoes in winter and went barefoot in warm weather.

There were many epidemics, such as measles, small pox, scarlet fever, malaria and dysentery and Mary, in another time, would probably have become a doctor as she was always nursing someone or an injured bird or animal. Doctors were very few and they made their own medicine from herbs. As a child

Mary watched closely and took it all in. At that time many people believed that disease was caused by the Devil and were always seeking magic and quak cures but Mary had a more practical approach, she believed in tender loving care.

Religion played a large part in the Secord family life. The Sabbath began at 3 p.m. on Saturday and ended at sundown on Sunday. The children were encouraged to spend time alone and devote their thoughts to God and prayer. They were forbidden to travel, cut their hair, shave, make beds or cook on the Sabbath. All the essential things had to be finished early on Saturday.

The land owned by the family was used to grow tobacco, wheat and corn. They had a few cattle, sheep and hogs for their own use and hired hands or slaves to help with the work.

The citizens were their own police and firemen. In 1736, the year of Mary's birth, Benjamin Franklin organized the first volunteer firemen, water was used hand to hand in leather buckets. Mary was about 15 when street lamps were installed in New Rochelle. They had to be lit every evening and the dirt streets all had a gutters down the centre for drainage.

Food was plentiful and there for the taking, including deer, quail, wild turkey and fish.

They grew some vegetables in their home garden and bread was made from wheat or corn. Milk was always available and maple sugar was a common sweetener. Cooking was done in the fireplace and heated by it and it was quite common to make beer, wine and applejack.

Their furniture was all made from logs and put together with wooden pegs. Beds had straw or feather mattresses and the table was made so that it could be taken down after meals to make more room for the large family. There were no rugs on the floor or curtains on the windows. No sheets for the beds and no mirrors in the house.

In the evenings the mother and older girls would spin or weave and the men would mend tools, carve new handles, make broomsticks, butter paddles, cups, spoons or other necessities.

While Mary was growing up there were skirmishes with the Indians. The settlers were in need of more land for hunting and farming and the Natives, unhappy with these intrusions, were constantly trying to defend what they believed to be theirs.

The British had several small groups of Rangers to try and keep the peace. They travelled around to check on the residents and would take their meals with a family or sleep over if the time was appropriate. Mary, like all young women, was fascinated with these Rangers.

One, Captain John Crookston, stole her heart. He was tall, 5' 9", not as tall as her brothers, but a charming, handsome English Ranger. They married when Mary was about 20 years old and soon produced an heir, named John for his father and grandfather. Young John was only a few months old when his father was shot in the head during one of the skirmishes with the Indians. Mary was heartbroken

She moved to Ashford, Connecticut to leave her grief behind and found employment as a

kitchenmaid. She had left young John behind with his grandparents, hoping to make enough money to have him come and live with her, but as with many things, plans go awry and she only saw him a few more times in her lifetime.

Mary's eye was still for the soldiers, even though she had promised herself not to marry one. When she met Joshua Beebe, a friend of her brother, he was working as a labourer. They married in the late 1750s and moved, with Josh's job, from Ashford to New Haddom and then to York, Pennslyvania, where they acquired some land near the Susquehannah River. They settled in, planning to stay for the rest of their lives. They had six children by this time and young Joshua, the seventh and last one was born there. They built a cosy log house, large enough for those times and gradually acquired things to make it a comfortable home.

Times were not on their side. The Indian wars ended but the American settlers were constantly seeking new land. Many of the settlers were wealthy young men, from Europe who were too lazy to cultivate the land and only wanted to hunt and as the game moved on they wanted more land to carry on their pursuits. The British were having trouble keeping the peace. The Americans were refusing to pay the taxes forced on them by England and they were about to make their Declaration of Independence. The people loyal to the King of England joined the troops to fight for England.

One of Joshua Beebe's boyhood friends, John Butler, was commanding a troop of Rangers. He would come to visit with the Beebes and always had the same plea for Josh, "Come join us. We need you if we are ever going to have peace." John Butler had spent a lot of time with the Indians and spoke their languages and they trusted him. He was very persuasive in getting them to join in the fight against the settlers. The Indians would

help the Rangers with one battle and then return home, so that each time they had to be persuaded again.

Finally Joshua Beebe and his 15 year old son, Adin, agreed to join Butler's Rangers. It was a no win situation for several years. They would win one battle and lose the next two. Late in 1777, when the debate was very stormy over new policies and new taxes for the Confederacy, Butler once again got the Indian Nation to join with them to defeat the American forces. An urgent message had to be sent to New York City to inform the British Commander there that the Rangers were ready and waiting for instructions. Josh Beebe volunteered to take the message. He was in good health, an excellent horseman and a seasoned traveller. He could travel 90 miles

in three days, if all went well. It would take him several weeks to get to New York, through the rugged mountain terrain, providing he could get new horses along the way.

He did get through with the message but while resting and regaining some of his stamina he contracted small pox. There was no cure and he died there in 1778.

Mary and her sister-in-law, along with their families and other Loyalists' wives and children were forced to flee from their homes, taking nothing with them but what they could carry. They went to a camp at Niagara where they were in great need of clothing and other necessities.

Mary married a third time to Christopher Pearson and they settled at New Carlisle, Quebec with other Loyalists.

"Seeking information on the MAHONEYs of Prescott, Ontario for September 1999 reunion! 1) My great-grandmother, Catherine MAHONY, daughter of Catherine ALLAN and Jeremiah MAHONY was born May 15, 1830 in Ireland, and together with her siblings, Dennis, b. 1825 and Annie, b. 1833, came to the Prescott area where they were granted a concession of land in 1848. Catherine m. John MCCARTHY, b. Dundee, [Beauharnois Co.] Quebec, son of David McCarthy and Ellen KENT, both b. Castlelyons, Fermoy, Ireland. It is documented that they settled in Dundee in 1826, and are buried in St. Agnes Cemetery. [Prescott? - not listed in QC or ON Cemetery indexes, ed.] Catherine and John McCarthy settled in Prescott. They had 10 children, one of whom. Charles Augustine was my grandfather. John engaged in the brewery business - Grenville Brewery. Both he and Catherine are buried in St. Agnes Cemetery.

"The first McCARTHY reunion was held in Prescott in 1996. It is anticipated that I will host a MAHONY/O'MAHONY get-together in Prescott in September 1999, but ... I know little of my Irish O'MAHONYs, since they and the McCarthys continued their feud across the sea."

"Researchers can consult the Centre's collection of memoirs, maps, old photos and slides Tuesday, Wednesday and Sunday, from 1 to 5 p.m. Among the collections are documents pertaining to the history of the Soulanges Canal, Dorion families and the lives of seigneurial families.

Ordnance Survey Memoirs of Ireland, Vol 6: Parishes of Co. Londonderry 1, 1830, 1834, 1836. Day A, McWilliams P, eds. Belfast: Institute of Irish Studies, 1990.

The Memoirs (a recent contribution to the MAILBAG) were written in the 1830s and were intended to accompany the Ordnance Survey maps of the same period.

In the 1980s the existing manuscripts were transcribed and published. The volumes contain, for some parishes, "a list of the persons that have emigrated to America ... during the years 1834 and 1835. It will show the name, age and religion of each person, the townland in which they resided, the year emigrated and ports to which the different persons have gone". [Note from the transcriber: Spelling of names as found in original manuscripts.]

A Murder Mystery

While researching the **Proudlock** genealogy, I was contacted by a man in USA - who is writing a book about the history of Malaya. A portion of that book deals with an Ethel **Charter** who was married to a William **Proudlock**.

William Proudlock was born in 1879, in Whittlesford, Cambridgeshire, England. He was the son of William Proudlock, formerly of Shilbottle, Northumberland. His wife, Ethel, was having an affair with one William **Steward** when she learned (from him) that he planned to marry a Chinese woman. Ethel thwarted the would be marriage by murdering William Steward.

She was found guilty of the crime but wasn't executed. She was pardoned (not exonerated) and exiled from Malaya. Her faithful husband, William Proudlock, suffered the disgrace and stuck by her, believing her innocent! They fled to Kuala Lampor in shame and then to England. From there they appear to have "vanished".

Where did they go? No one in the Proudlock "clan" has any knowledge of the story - suggesting that this matter was "hushed up" and not spoken about "in front of the children".

William and Ethel had at least one daughter. The scandal was well publicized in England (1911). The author of the upcoming book needs help in finding the final whereabouts of William and Ethel Proudlock. He will give credit in his book to anyone who can supply information.

A movie starring Bette Davis (1939) called **The Letter** is based on this murder - via a story written by Somerset Maugham with the same title.

Notes to the Financial Statements / July 31, 1997

1. Purpose of organization

The Quebec Family History Society provides information and assistance to persons conducting family history research. The society is incorporated under Canada Corporations Act as a not-for-profit organization and is a registered charity under the income tax act

2. Significant accounting policies

The Quebec Family History Society follows the deferral method of accounting.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions from members and the general public are recorded as income when they are received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collections is reasonably assured.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recognized as a current expenditure in the year of the acquisition.

Contributed services

Members and volunteers contribute many hours of time to assist the Quebec Family History Society in carrying out its activities. Because of difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

3. Deferred contributions

Deferred contributions represent membership fees received in the current period that are related to the subsequent period.

4. Capital assets

During the year the society purchased office equipment amounting to \$9,813. which amount is included in equipment purchases and maintenance. **Purchases included:** a new photocopy machine; computer system; micro-film reader; over-head projector and screen.

5. Lease commitment

The society has entered into an operating lease for its premises which expires in 2000. Future minimum lease payment are: 1998- \$14,533; 1999 - \$15,036; 2000 - \$15,036

6. Statement of changes of financial position

A statement of changes in financial position has not been included as all of the information normally contained in such a statement is fully disclosed in the statements presented.

If you were born before 1940 consider the changes you have witnessed !

You were born before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen food, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, videos, Frisbees and *The Pill.* Before radar, credit cards, atoms, laser beams, ballpoint pens, panty hose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes and before *man walked on the moon.*

You thought "fast food" was what you ate during Lent and a "Big Mac" was an oversized raincoat. You were born before house husbands, computer dating, dual careers, and when a "meaningful relationship" meant getting along with cousins. You were before day care centres, group homes and disposable diapers. There were no electric typewriters, FM radio, tape decks, artificial hearts, word processors and young men wearing earrings. "Time-sharing" meant togetherness, a "chip" was a piece of wood or a fried potato, "hardware" was where you bought nuts and bolts - and "software", "Fax" and "e-mail" weren't even words.

It was before sex change operations and people still believed that you needed a husband to have a baby! Closets were for clothes, not for 'coming out of'. Bunnies were small rabbits - and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer Jeans were scheming girls named... Jean. People got married first, then lived together. How quaint!

Before 1940 "made in Japan" meant junk, "making out" referred to how you did on an exam and "a stud" was something that fastened a collar to a shirt. "Going all the way" meant staying on a bus until it reached the depot and McDonalds, pizzas and instant coffee were unheard of.

There were '5 and 10 cent stores' where you bought things for *five and ten cents*. Ice-cream cones were a nickel (chocolate covered 10 cents). For one nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600.00, but who could afford one - a pity because gas was 11 cents a gallon!

Cigarette smoking was fashionable, *Grass* was mowed, *Coke* was a cold drink, a *Joint* was a piece of meat you had on Sundays, and *Pot* was something you cooked in. "Rock Music" was grandma's lullaby, a "gay person" was someone who was the life of the party and "Aids" were helpers in the Principal's office.

Those born before 1940 are a hardy bunch !! Think of all the ways in which the world has changed and the adjustments you have had to make .

(Note that it is dulongj - ie a "J" not an "I")

The site tells a fascinating story of the research going on to retrace Catherine Baillon's roots back to Charlemagne.

The site refers to an article to appear, in French, in *Mémoires*, the Société généalogique canadienne-française's publication; you will find it in the Journal section of the QFHS library (Fall 1997 issue, # 213). If you read French, you might like to consult it, if not, the web site gives quite a bit of information and promises more to come. This is a serious project, uniting the following associates: René Jetté, John P. DuLong, Roland-Yves Gagné, and Gail F. Moreau. Mr Jetté is one of the best-known experts on French Canadian genealogy, he is a member of The Quebec Family History Society, and people who attended *Roots '97* will remember his participation both as a conference speaker, and a member of the panel of experts.

In their article, they state that hundreds of thousands of North Americans descend from Catherine Baillon, and thus might descend from Charlemagne. A site to keep an eye on in the coming months and years.

IF YOU HAVE ANCESTORS THAT COME FROM SAINT-PIERRE, MIQUELON or THE MAGDALEN ISLANDS

The parish registers for baptisms, marriages, and deaths have been entered on the http://www.cancom.net/~boblang/ web site.

The entries for Saint-Pierre and Miquelon cover the years 1763 to 1792, while those for the Iles de la Madeleine extend from 1793 to 1816.

The census information of 1857 for Miquelon lists the civilian population, government functionaries, and seamen wintering over.

My academic package of WordPerfect 7 upgrade - bought while I was a student - cost about \$30 instead of \$138. So if you fall into the above categories, and are contemplating some software purchase, it may be worthwhile checking if you qualify for a discount.

PERIODICAL SOURCE INDEX (PERSI)

The Periodical Source Index (PERSI) is a comprehensive subject index to genealogy and local history periodicals written in English and French (Canadian journals in French), since 1800. The collection also includes literature from the 1700s, but less complete. PERSI represents 27 volumes in print; also available online from Ancestry Inc. through their Ancestry HomeTown Library (not a free database).

PERSI indexes approximately 4000 journals worldwide, including 200 Canadian journals. The primary indexing is by: Locality or Family records or Research Methodology with cross-indexing. The main locality divisions are: US places, Canadian places, Other foreign places

Articles are available (cost varies) from local libraries, publishers (information given) or from the Allan County Public Library which holds a complete collection of <u>all</u> the journals indexed.

This is an extremely useful, wide-ranging and comprehensive tool. **BUT** ... The print version is difficult to locate in Canada - only the National Library in Ottawa has the complete run from 1986 on (annual volumes, an ongoing subscription). The University of Alberta in Edmonton, and Universite Laval in Quebec City have the 1847-1985 volumes. The **complete** PERSI is searchable online via the Internet, if you are willing to pay the annual subscription rate of (US) \$59.40, which includes access to the numerous other Ancestry databases of marriage records, land records, maps, census, cemeteries, etc., and *Ancestry Magazine* and *Genealogical Computing*.

If you do not live in Ottawa and do not have Internet access, a shared online subscription, and access through your area Public Library may be an option.

Pioneer Mill Sites in the Chateauguay Valley

Gerry Rogers contributes another well organized article on the life and times of the Chateauguay Valley. Names, places and types of mills are recorded and indicate the financial and family developments of this important farm area south-west of Montreal.

The Royal William

Nora Bernier writes of this Canadian success story. Her great-great-grandfather, George Black, laid the keel of the Royal William at his Quebec City shippard in the fall of 1830. The ship left Pictou, Nova Scotia August 18th, 1833 and arrived at Cowes, England, 25 days later. Controversy, as to the full journey under steam was settled in 1891.

Discovering an Ancestor: William Trenholm

The use of Memorial Inscriptions, leads to the discovery of the life and times of a pioneer who had a village named after him, Trenholmville, near Kingsey in the Eastern Townships. The author makes use of the National Archives in Ottawa, and the I.G.I. to lead him back to family records in England. An interesting trail.

Genealogy of Etienne Rose and Mary Burt

The drive to seek better living conditions and a better way of life is recorded in this article by Theresa Rose of Vernon, Texas. The Rose family moved from Montreal to Detroit in 1830 and were involved in the timber and shipping business of Michigan.

William Smith and Catherine "Black" of Gaspe

The difficulty associated with misspelled and mispronounced surnames is the key to this short article on the Smith's of the Gaspe involving the Black or Blake names.

No. 2 December 1992

Gross Ile - Subject of Controversy

This island, just below Quebec City, was the quarantine station for the many ships carrying passengers to North America. Marianna O'Gallagher, has led the fight to keep the plight and memory of the Irish immigrants, in the forefront of a proposal for a Federal Park on the Island.

Place Name Trivia

Pennie Redmile reminds us of the very local nature of much of our research. Many areas with map reference names are not the only sites with that name. Beech Ridge can be found in the Chateauguay Valley while the locals of St. Andrew's East have an entirely different place in mind. Many present place names have replaced the original settlement names. So be careful, there maybe a reference to Scotland that may lead you far away from the British Isles to Southern Ontario.

Information, Privacy and Cemetery Records

The Charters of Rights and Freedom has changed the manner in which disclosure of information maybe made available. There is a Privacy Act and an Access to Information Act. Hugh Banfill looks at this legislation and the way genealogists are assisted or curtailed in their efforts to delve into public records.

Horrors! My Wife is My Cousin

David Cooke writes of his research into Quebec records and the problem of name changes due to nationality. One of his French relations named Langlois actually had been a Langlais. His name had been Sargent before he was captured in one of the French raids into New England. He stayed in Quebec and somewhere along the line Langlais was added and then changed to Langlois.

Descendants of John Toohy and Rose O'Connor

This is the story of a family, its growth in Quebec and its association with the Grand Trunk, C.N.R. Montreal and the West. There is much detail of individual family members, one of whom may have been the Ralph Toohey of the 1948 Grey Cup champions, the Montreal Alouettes.

Statistical Returns of Marriages and Death

An important look at where to find living family members. An important source is the Quebec Statistical Returns of Birth, Marriage and Death which begin in 1926. Births are not open to the public but marriages and death are available. In addition, a reference is made regarding the 1881 Census for the British Isles.

No. 3 March 1993

The Mohawks of Quebec

The closing of the Mercier Bridge brought the natives of Oka and Kahnawake into the public eye as never before. Gerry Rogers traces the early years of Mohawk settlement along both sides of the St. Lawrence. The names of Gill, Williams, Rice, Tarbell, Hill, Stacey, Jacobs, McGregor etc. indicate the number of settlers children who became part of the Mohawk by adoption.

Ancestral Notes From The War of 1812

Luc Lepine is an authority on the Quebec participants in the War of !812. He is seeking to identify every militiamen who enlisted in the militia of Lower Canada. He includes some names of the six Select Embodied Militia Battalions.

What Were My Ancestors Worth?

How much does it cost to keep your family for one year? What did it cost your Grandfather to keep his family. Was he wealthy or poor? Tim Wilcock, of the West Surrey Family History Society has made available a Table of Price Indices 1830-1992 starting with 1830 and a base of 100 until 1992 when the base has become 3487. A bequest of 10 pounds in 1830 becomes 348.7 pounds. Interesting!!

Knight's End

A short item --- somehow not quite divorced from the article above. Mr. Knight had financial difficulties and unfortunately jumped into the St. Lawrence River at Quebec City.

My Montreal Roots

A concise presentation, by Robert Wilkins, regarding the settlement of his grandparents and the development of their family in the Montreal area.

A Model To Follow

The Anglo-Protestants of Megantic County, Repertory of Births, Marriages and Burials 1826-1991 by the Thedford-Mines, Societe genealogique de la region de l'Amiante, 1992, XLV + 708 pages Illustrated. This book has been assembled by a French Society because the work needed to be done. The work is meticulous and contains much more than just the bare facts. Guy W. Richard and Renald Lessard are to be congratulated.

No. 4 June 1993

Name Patterns in England Before 1850

Sheila James, presents an excellent discussion of the use of Christian names and the pitfalls involved. Variations of spelling, nick-names, use of second names rather than first names etc. The use of family common names through succeeding generations can be significant or totally useless. In addition, she indicates the years when particular names entered common usage.

The Historical Society of Argenteuil County

The history of the Northshore of the Ottawa River dates back to the days of Champlain and Dollard des Ormeaux. John Leggitt and Elizabeth Wales introduce us to the Society and the Museum on the banks of the Ottawa at Carillon

History of the Houde Lineage

This article is more than a presentation regarding the Houde family; when Louis Houde died at the age of 95 in 1712 he had 75 grandchildren and 31 grandsons. It contains much valuable information regarding the development of family names in France. In the 9th Century almost all baptismal names were germanic in half of northern France.

Military Marriages of Enlisted Men

We seldom have the opportunity to find information about enlisted men in the early military records. Gary Schroder has listed the names of 159 soldiers who were married between 1760 and 1850 in Christ Church Anglican Cathedral, Montreal.

Commonly known as "Griffith's Valuation" it is used as a Heads of Household census substitute for 19th century Ireland. It is available on microfiche for sale on a county by county basis. There is also an index to surnames that accompanies the actual valuation of lands and houses.
