AN ICE STORM, GENEALOGY AND A CAT NAMED ELVIS

Now that the days are getting shorter and summer has been tapped on the shoulder and told to move along, our thoughts once again linger on memories of last January. When one day Winter, dressed in all her finery, decided to shower us with freezing rain, unaware of the destruction she was causing as layers of heavy ice downed power lines and of how dependant we are on the comfort that electricity provides.

Some of us were without power for a few hours, some for a few days and some for several weeks. But ... the ice storm also provided opportunities to offer help, such as the many volunteers who worked long hours at the shelters that opened in areas both on and off the island. One woman even flew to Montreal from Texas to volunteer her help after seeing a report on television. The storm also hit areas of Ontario and our U.S. neighbours in Vermont and Maine. From the New England States and as far away as Virginia people came to Quebec to help during our time of crisis. Their generosity will always be remembered.

During this time the QFHS had to cancel the scheduled monthly meeting and I was asked to notify the members on my phone chain about the cancellation. I thought what a perfect opportunity to help - in my own small way - by offering a fellow member, who was without electricity, to stay at our home this is how we met Sylvia Green-Guenette, Bob Irwin and Elvis - their charming black cat, with big blue eyes.

While Elvis quietly explored his new surroundings and found a comfortable spot under our bed, Sylvia and I discussed genealogy. We soon discovered that we both have ancestors who settled in the same areas of the County of Ascot in the Eastern Townships. Sylvia is a direct descendant of Abraham Hyatt, brother of Cornelius and Gilbert Hyatt who were among the early settlers. Gilbert was given crown grants and was responsible for assigning lots to other settlers. He also built a gristmill by Rivière Magog in 1794.

The map of Ascot (1864) shows the lot and range numbers together with the names of the property owners. We could easily see how near our ancestors lived to one another. For example: on range number eight near the coppermine were Sylvia's ancestors, the Green family, and on range number four the Libby family. My own ancestors include the Johnson family, originally from London, England, who settled on range number six. This farm was built in the mid 1800's and was passed down thru four generations of the Johnson family and remains in the family to this day. Other ancestors of the same area were the Burtons, of which two daughters each married one of the Johnson boys. Jessie Ada married Edgar Johnson in 1871 and her sister Mary married Alfred W. Johnson in 1872.

On the second day of their stay Sylvia phoned home and the answering machine came on - indicating that the power was back on. All too soon it seemed our very pleasant visit came to an end and once again we searched the house for Elvis ...finding him curled up, sound asleep, in his favourite spot under our bed. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Sylvia, Bob and Elvis for the nice time we shared during last winter's ice storm.

It has also occurred to me that there may be other people, who when grouped together - in shelters or planes, trains, automobiles, etc. - have discovered a shared interest in genealogy, maybe even with ancestors who were relatives, neighbours or friends. It would be interesting to hear their stories.

IRISH FAMILIES IN ANCIENT QUEBEC RECORDS

When searching for that elusive ancestor - English, Irish or Scottish - have you considered delving into French-Canadian records?

Recently a small booklet was donated to the QFHS Library by Barb Woodside. It is entitled *Irish Families in Ancient Quebec Records* and may help to open a few locked doors for frustrated family historians. This 28 page booklet was first printed in 1872; again in 1908 and 1924; for Canada's Centennial in 1967; and by St. Malachy's Church, Mayo, Quebec in 1969. It contains an address given by Judge John O'Farrell, Advocate and President of the Hibernian Benevolent Society of Quebec, at the Annual Concert and Ball of the St. Patrick's Society of Montreal on the 15th of January 1872. This article contains excerpts from that address.

In his speech John O'Farrell related a history of 'the forgotten Irish colony on the banks of the St. Lawrence'. He stated that although not generally known, long before Wolfe scaled the heights of Abraham a large Irish element had settled in Canada, inter-married with the French and had become absorbed into the French population of this country. He discussed the work of *Tanguay*-births, marriages and deaths from the parishes of Lower Canada - and stated that of the 2500 families that made up the population of Lower Canada at the close of the seventeenth century (well-nigh) one hundred families are shown by *Tanguay* to be natives of Ireland and in about thirty cases either the husband or wife is also shewn to be of Irish origin.

In most cases the French priests who made the entries in the Registers have gallicised the orthography of the Irish names as to render them undistinguishable from the French settlers. In some cases the Curé seems to have abandoned the attempt to spell the Irish name and merely entered the baptismal name, adding after it the word "Irlandais / Irlandaise."

[a person of Irish birth "male / female"]

For example:

Timothy O'SULLIVAN became Timoté SYLVAIN. Timothy was the son of Cornelius Daniel O'Sullivan, County Killarney and Elizabeth McCarthy both citizens of Cork, Ireland. In 1720 Timothy, a practising Surgeon, married Marie Gautier, daughter of

the Governor of Three Rivers, widow of Christophe Dufros de la Jemmerais (and mother of Madame d'Youville, foundress of the General Hospital of Grey Nuns) at Pointe aux Trembles, Quebec. A certificate signed by FitzJames, Duke of Barwick, Lord Clare, Mr Rute, Mr Douglas, Mr Couq [all colonels of Irish regiments in the service of France] attests to the descent and parentage of Timothy O'Sullivan and relates his sixteen years as Captain of Dragoons in the Irish Brigade. The certificate also states that, having sailed for Ireland to recruit for his regiment, he was taken prisoner by pirates and brought to New England, whence he escaped to Canada.

Teague Cornelius O'BRENNAN became Tec Corneille AUBRY. He was the son of Connor O'Brennan and Honorah Janehour of St Patrick's (Diasonyoen), Ireland and married at Quebec on 10th September 1670.

Jack HUSSEY became John HOUSSEY dit BELLEROSE. Son of Matthew Hussey and Elizabeth Hogan, born in the Parish of St. Lawrence O'Toole, Dublin, Ireland and married 11th October 1671, in Lower Canada.

Jack REILLY became Jean Baptiste RIEL (nicknamed Sansouci). Native of St. Peter's Parish, City of Limerick, Ireland, married at Isle du Pads on 21st January 1704. Jack Reilly is the direct ancestor of "Louis RIEL".

Brothers, Peter and John LEAHEY became Pierre LEHAIT and Jean LEHAYS.

Sons of Thomas Leahey and Catherine Williams of County Wicklow, Ireland. Pierre/Peter was the trusted servant of Louis de Buade, Count de Frontenac, Governor of New France. John/Jean was married at Quebec on 9th September 1688.

Mary KIRWAN became Marie HIROUIN (Soeur Marie de la Conception - a nun of the Hotel-Dieu of Quebec). She came to Canada in 1643 and was buried in 1687; she is stated to have been the daughter of a Scotch noble.

It is highly probable that in the original owners of the lands fronting the St. Lawrence near Quebec are to be found the descendants of the "Wild Geese", the disbanded soldiers of the Carignan Regiment. On the South Shore, opposite Quebec the names of Martin, Nolan, Healey, Barrett, Moran, Gearan and Burke became Martin, Nolan, Nolin, Hallé, Barrette, Morin, Guérins and Bourkes. On the North Shore O'Leary, Allan, Magee, Barry, O'Brien, O'Dea, McMorrough and Bennett became Alaries, Alain, Mainguy, Morean, and Binette.

On searching through the Registers of the Quebec Cathedral, both before and shortly after the Conquest, John O'Farrell found the following names with a remarkable Irish ring: Caissy, Massy, Harnois, Cahey, Cahel, d'Alet, Mally, Kéry, Lanan, Barden dit Lafontaine, Jacson, Janson dit La Palme, Obaurette, Maclure, Delané dit Laliberté, Deniou, Deniau, O'Neil, Carel, Travers, Mony, Molloye, Grefin, De Gannes, Hill, Gourlée, Gourdon, Duffy dit Charest, Graton, Conc dit Montour, Couc dit Lafleur, Griffon, Guéré, Bélet, Boilan, Trehet, Martin, Lérét.

He also found that persons bearing these names intermarried more frequently with each other; that they generally assisted as groomsmen and bridesmaids at each other's weddings; and that after the Conquest, when

Irishmen, fresh from the sod, dropped into Quebec, the Registers show them to be best man or Godfather on every available occasion among the families bearing these names.

1759

February 19th, before the Conquest, a soldier of the Regiment of Berry married and his best man was Sergeant Noel François Nicholas Finégan (Finegan) of the same Regiment. Also, on the same day, Pierre Bélet (Bailey) married, his best man was Nicholas Martin (Martin), another soldier in Boisherbert's Company. On February 20th Martin married and his best man was Antoine Jacson (Jackson). On February 26th Pierre Louis Helleine (Allan) dit Jeanesse, a soldier, married and his best man was Nicholas Devin (Devin). On April 23rd Louis Nicholas Lachaux dit La Grenada, a soldier in Montresson's Company married Elizabeth Donlan (Donnellan) the best man was Corporal Pierre Boillan (Boylan) and one of the invited witnesses who signed the register was Captain Delainé, both of the same Company. On June 24th, after the Conquest, Martin Echenner (who may have been a Shanahy) married and the three witnesses were Duffy dit Charest; Barthelmi Hill; and Guillaume DuBarry.

1761

August 7th Mrs Janson is Godmother to Massey's child. On September 21st Thomas Caret (Carey) is married to a Moran. September 27th Louis Langois (*Langlois denotes a person of English-speaking origin*) and Charlotte Moran were sponsors for the child of Jean Langlois. On November 23rd Jean James was married to Françoise Guéry. November 25th Charles Martin is Godfather to the daughter of Michel Jourdain (Jordan) and on February 1st, 1762 Charles Orion (O'Ryan) dit Champagne was married, the witnesses were François Bélet, Joseph Delais and three

Maclures. It is also a very striking fact that all families bearing these names exhibit a fondness for the Christian names of Bridget and Judith.

The year after the Conquest three Irishmen appear in Quebec; their names are Daniel Donne, William Curtain and Jeremiah Duggan. [Duggan is the barber mentioned by Smith, the historian, as having joined the Irish-American General, Montgomery, at the siege of Quebec in 1775, at the head of 500 Canadians]. As soon as these three men appear in Quebec there is scarcely a christening or wedding that takes place amongst the families bearing the (Irish) names mentioned without the signature of one of them in the Register. Duggan eventually married a granddaughter of Abraham Martin and Curtain married a niece of a Langlois.

With regard to the name O'Neill

When Wolfe was thundering his cannon at the gates of Quebec in 1759 a man named O'Neill had occasion to have a child baptized ... and whether he had reason to fear being tried for treason under British law ... or whether he had a recollection of the English statute awarding the penalty of death for treason to any one assuming the name of O'Neill is uncertain. But... on signing the register as father he wrote his name Onell (in one word). After the Conquest as the years rolled by his Irish orthography improved until on November 24th 1761, as witness to the marriage of his niece he signed the register "P. O'Neill".

Where have these Irish names disappeared to? The answer is simple. Many have not disappeared. The Abbé Faillon states that with reference to many English-speaking persons, the French being unable to pronounce their names, used the Christian name and added L'Anglois after it. After the Conquest Jeremiah

Duggan's name was changed to Jérémie de Ganne, William Curtain to Guillaume Cotonne, Edmond to Rougement, Edmonds to Haimond, Leahy to De la Haye, Daly to Dalais, Penny to Péné, Fitzsimmons to Simon and Shallow to Châlé [these changes were found in the Quebec Parish church Register in February 1762]. As large as the 'Irish colony' must have been it received many more inhabitants after the Conquest when the shattered remnants of the Irish Brigade, who after having served through the war, settled in this country.

From volume X of The documents relating to the History of New York, John O'Farrell lists officers of the French army - with unmistakably Irish names - killed or wounded at the battle of Ticonderoga (or Carrillon as the French called it). They are:

Adjutante de Macarti (MacCarthy); Captain de Patrice (Fitzpatrick); Duglas; Adjutant Carlan (Carolan); de Moran (Moran); Forcet (Forsyth); de Harenes (O'Hearn); Deniau (O'Donohue)

Besides the list of killed or wounded there is also frequent mention by de Montcalm to the King of the great bravery and eminent services of such officers as: de la Paure (Power); d'Herte (Hart); de Barotte (Barrett); de Lac (Lake); de Coni (Cooney); de Hughes (McHugh); Belcombe; Floid; D'alet (Daily).

All names to be found in the list of officers of the Brigade as given by McGeoghegan and O'Connor.



This is only a portion of the information to be found in this informative little booklet. Ginny Haen has donated this book to the QFHS Library, to help others who may be doing research in Dorchester County, and as a potential source of 19th century Quebec Strays. She will gladly answer any requests for information and documentation, or reference to researchers who are working on the other families.

This compilation is clear, readable and logical; and documentation for most events is available from the author. Maps, descendency charts and family group sheets are included. This large group of Frampton area families left Canada in the mid to late 1800s and moved to Door County, Wisconsin.

Some of these families included:

Two examples:

St. Remi, a village in the Seigniori of Lasalle, Huntingdon County, population 275, lists four - Alexis BISSON, William DUNN, Narcisse LEFEBVRE, Eli PARE.

Riviere du Loup, village and Seigniori, population 4000, lists three - Dr. L.A.DAME, Antoine L. LEGRIS, George E. MAYRAND.

These commissioners were not necessarily lawyers or Judges, and only a few were notaries. [We wonder - was this position a forerunner of the present-day Ombudsman?]

THE MAILBAG

On September 24, 1996, I visited several cemeteries in Megantic County. At St. James Anglican Church in St. Jacques de Leeds, I was searching for my maternal gg grandfather, James McAtee's grave. I did not find it in spite of the fact that the church records show that James McAtee was buried here on September 3, 1849. The records also show that James McAtee had five children baptized in St. James and that he married his second wife, Latitia Crawford on April 2, 1838 here.

St. James is a beautiful, well-kept, octagonal, white frame church with a box near the door containing a "Visitor's Book". I recorded a few notes along with my name and telephone number, and went on my way. On October 7, 1996, I received a phone call from Phillip McAtee of Warner Robbins, Georgia. He had visited St. James on September 25, 1996, looking for the same James McAtee. He is a cousin that I knew nothing about! We have since exchanged a lot of information. Just think, if I had not taken time to write those notes in the Visitor Book at St. James, I would not have known about Phillip and would still be missing a lot of family data."

NORTHUMBRIAN MARRIAGE, 1750

In: Christie J. Northumberland: its history, features and people.

The Gentleman's Magazine describes a Northumbrian marriage in 1750 as follows: "Married in June, 1750, Mr. William DONKIN, a considerable farmer, of Great Tossan (near Rothbury), in the County of Northumberland, to Miss Eleanor SHOTTON, an agreeable young gentlewoman of the same place. The entertainment on this occasion was very grand, there being provided no less than 120 quarters of lamb, 44 quarter of beef, 20 quarters of mutton, 12 hams, with a suitable number of chickens, &c, which was concluded with 8 half anchors of brandy, made into

punch, 12 dozen of cider, a great many gallons of wine, and 90 bushels of malt, made into beer. The company consisted of 550 ladies and gentlemen, who were diverted with the music of 25 fiddlers and pipers, and the whole was concluded with the utmost order and unanimity."

The magazine concludes - "Surely, there could have been nothing to equal this out of the Scandinavian Valhalla."

71ST HIGHLAND LIGHT INFANTRY:

In: The Manchester Genealogist. 1996; 32(4):292-5.

This article by M. F. Tighe, as Dorothy suggests, will be of interest to anyone with an ancestor who came to Canada with the 71st Highland Light Infantry (before 1810 the 71st Highland Regiment of Foot). The campaigns of the regiment are traced from its beginnings. On 25 March 1824 the regiment embarked for Canada. They arrived at Quebec 24 June 1824, and from there moved to Montreal, then in 1828 to Kingston then served in York, Upper Canada from 1829 to 1831. During this time the desertion rate was high, presumably many were seeking a new life across the border in the United States. Some took their discharge in Upper Canada and received land in lieu of a pension.

By 1834 the remainder of the regiment had returned to their Headquarters at Edinburgh Castle.

RESEARCH IN QUEBEC - THE DROUIN COLLECTION

As you will see in the Librarians' report, the QFHS has bought a series of 'index books' for the Drouin Collection (*Fonds Drouin*). These microfilms are creating a great deal of interest for genealogists interested in Quebec research. The huge lot of 2365 reels of microfilm in the collection contains baptism, marriage, and burial records up to at least 1940 and sometimes even into the 1960s. Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish churches and synagogues are included. The various index books, now available at the QFHS Library, will help you prepare for a search through the microfilms themselves. At the moment there are only two places in Montreal where the microfilms can be viewed: at the Montreal Public Library (Salle Gagnon) and at the library of the *Société généalogique canadienne française* (you must be a member).

These microfilms are a trove of many other types of information, not all of which appears in the indexes. If you read French, you might wish to consult the *Société généalogique canadienne française* publication *Mémoires* in the QFHS library's Journal section. The last two issues - and this appears to be an ongoing series - deal with the idiosyncrasies of this mighty collection. In addition to the advertised content of births, marriages, and deaths, there are many other legal and historical items: BMS Records of the Quebec garrison from 1817-1826, letters exchanged between historical personages, the journal of a French privateer, evidently the microfilmers were busy and acquisitive.

BOOK REVIEW

**Rogers Colin D. THE FAMILY TREE DETECTIVE:
TRACING YOUR ANCESTORS IN ENGLAND AND WALES.
3rd ed. Manchester: Manchester University Press, 1997.
Distributed in Canada by UBC Press, Vancouver, BC.**

An excellent and 'user-friendly' manual for both beginning and experienced researchers, this book is organized in the same practical manner as the previous edition, "around the need to solve problems rather than around sources; the three basic problems in genealogy concerning a search for the records of parents [birth], of marriage and of death." (A note on presentation)

This approach allows the reader to go directly to the pages dealing with his current research roadblock, for example: failure to find a birth entry in the indexes; finding more than one possible birth; indexes or certificates not accessible - alternative sources; entry missed by the searcher; misleading clues (research results based on misinformation); child was adopted; failure to locate individuals in the census.

Each of the 3 major sections - Looking for parents, Looking for Marriages, Looking for Deaths, is subdivided chronologically: 1837 to the present, and 1538 to the present. The census information divisions are: 1801-1831, 1841-1891, and census less than 100 years old.

"Welcome to the Middle Ages!" This new section has been added because, as the author says, so many genealogists have traced at least one ancestral branch back to the 16th century. Among the topics dealt with are: Manorial records, Inquisitions *post mortem*, Guilds and freemen, and Hundred rolls.

Throughout the text there are several useful and unusual lists, for example: Abbreviations used in Victorian census; Prohibited degrees - categories of people not allowed to marry each other; Medieval probate series; Abbreviations used in electoral registers to describe individual voter status.

Appendices include extensive bibliographies for Britain, and for genealogists elsewhere in the world; Complete addresses for Registration districts, and the location of records from abolished districts (with reference to the Website for updates since 1996); Advice on employing professional help.

This is a most useful book; set up in a way that allows the user to easily find the information that is needed **NOW**. It is the researcher's "ready-reference" companion.

FRENCH-CANADIAN RESEARCH-ORIGINE DATABASE Thanks to a cooperative project between several French and Quebec organizations, over 1,000 birth and baptismal source records of French immigrants to Canada have been found and mechanized. Note that a cursory check revealed at least two O'Neils and one John William on the database. Available online at the Francogène bilingual website <http://www.cam.org/~beaur/origine/> If you understand French you can also read about the latest update in the summer '98 issue of *Mémoires*, the journal of *la Société généalogique canadienne-française*, in the Journal section of the QFHS Library.

INTERNET-BASED GENEALOGY COURSES are available at several different sites; note that while some are free, others charge fees. Visit the site of the **US Gen Web Genealogy project** [<http://www.rootsweb.com/~genclass/index.html>]; courses are given by the Iowa Digital Education Association and include England, Ireland, Scotland, and African American genealogy, with more to come. Also see the **Spectrum Virtual University** [<http://www.vu.org>], the **Vanished History Mall** [<http://www.vanished.com>]. Publishers of the popular genealogy software package Family Tree Maker have their own online genealogy classes at [<http://www.familytreemaker.com/university.html>]. Of course, these should be used only as supplements to the seminars given by the QFHS!

GENEALOGY SOFTWARE REVIEWS are provided at several sites. You can try **The Mining Company** [<http://genealogy.miningoc.com>]. Read their "Software Roundup 97" on this commercial site if you are in the market for new software. You could also do a search: for example, use AltaVista and request "genealogy software review"; note that you should include the quotes if you do not want answers in the millions!

NEW RECORDS AVAILABLE ON CANADIAN DATABASES inGeneas, [<http://www.ingeneas.com>] directed by a team of professional genealogists, announced almost 8,000 additions to its Passenger List and Immigration Databases. If your interests include Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, or Ontario, you might like to look up the Immigration Database. Additions to the Passenger List include 500 who travelled from Scotland to Nova Scotia and 900 from the British Isles to New Brunswick.

COMPUTREE

MORE IRISH LINKS the site that bills itself as "**Sixty Best Ireland URLs on the Internet**" [<http://www.irelandgenweb.org/best.htm>] should keep you busy for weeks.

ON-LINE WEB MAGAZINES You may consult the "e-zine" **Journal of Online Genealogy** [<http://www.onlinegenealogy.com>] which "focuses on the use on or line resources in genealogy and family history." The June 1998 issue features articles on such topics as "inGeneas and Other Canadian Immigration Resources", "What Was Wrong With PAF 2.31?", "Another Genealogy Scam?", and "Press Releases".

ON-LINE MAPS Quebec City's **Laval University Library's** Map Collection [<http://www.bibl.ulaval.ca/ress/carto2/cadres.html>] can be viewed and printed. Mostly in French, but should not be a problem as map names include dates, and sometimes English titles. One interesting example is Joseph Bouchette's 1831" topographical map of the districts of Quebec, Three Rivers, St-Francis and Gasp , Lower Canada."

US OBITUARIES - The **Erie County Public Library** has published an **Obituary Index Listing** [<http://www.ecls.lib.pa.us/obits.html>] that will no doubt be of interest to those researching in Pennsylvania. Their files run from 1822 to the present, while those listed on-line go from 1987 to May 1998. You will also find many links to genealogical information for Erie County, although this is not obvious: you must click on "[here](#)" for more information on how to contact the Library for genealogical information."

LINKS THAT NO LONGER EXIST The links provided in this column usually direct you to the specific page that contains the information; you may find, after a few months, or even days, that the links no longer exist. Sometimes it is because the page has been moved somewhere else on the same site. One way to solve this problem is to try entering the address of the home page, which is usually the address shown, but stopping after the "com", the "org", or the country designation, and looking for an index on the site. For example, the last link above, <http://www.ecls.lib.pa.us/obits.html> will bring you directly to the obituary page, but if you enter <http://www.ecls.lib.pa.us>, you will reach the home page of the Erie County Public Library, and you can search their index to reach the obituary page.

Commonly known as "Griffith's Valuation" it is used as a Heads of Household census substitute for 19th century Ireland. It is available on microfiche for sale on a county by county basis. The PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH in MONTREAL HISTORICAL SUMMARY AND LOCATIONS OF THE RECORDS

by Mimi Hayward

Our sincere thanks to Reverend D. G. Neil, and the Church Council of Knox Crescent Kensington First Presbyterian Church, for permission to reproduce the two charts titled "Our Men of the Cloth" and "Our Church Family Tree". These charts help to clarify the growth since 1786, and the changes, locations and amalgamations of the various Presbyterian congregations in Montreal. Much of this information comes from documents provided by the Knox Crescent Kensington and First Church, and by the Presbyterian Church in Canada Archives, Toronto.

[Any errors are mine.]

Presbyterianism in Montreal had its formal beginnings in 1786, when the Reverend John Bethune preached to a small congregation, many of them Scots from disbanded Highland regiments who had chosen to remain in Montreal when their regiments returned to Great Britain. When the Northwest Company was formed, several retired officers of Highland Regiments joined it, and were among the founders of the Saint Gabriel Street Church.

After the departure of Rev. John Bethune, to take up land in Williamstown, Glengarry County, Ontario, the Montreal congregation, known as the 'Society of Presbyterians' conducted services in the old Jesuit Church, also used by the Anglicans. Both were guests of the Recollett Fathers in their sanctuary.

The first building, St Gabriel Street Church, popularly called "The Scotch Kirk", was erected in 1792, under the ministry of Rev. John Young from the Presbytery of New York. It remained active until 1886. The Church was located on the southwest corner of Champ de Mars. In 1886 it was appropriated for use as the Court House. The congregation moved to Ste. Catherine Street, east of Phillips Square, opposite the present St James United Church.

"From our church family tree, it can be visualized that much splintering has taken place, not all attributable to the natural demographic shift of a growing city. Personalities, cultural roots, prime church allegiance, church music, even the correct posture in prayer and hymn singing, played their part in the multiplicity of congregations."

In 1803 the congregation divided over a

decision on whom to call as minister and the dissident minority, who preferred to be connected with an American Presbytery rather than the Church of Scotland, formed Saint Peter Street congregation, re-named Saint Andrew's in 1824. In 1831 another group withdrew to form Saint Paul's Presbyterian Church. In 1844 at the Disruption, the majority supported the Free Church but the property was disputed and the Free Church majority erected a separate building which became Cote Street Free Church.

In 1865 the Presbyterian Theological College was established, and in the 1870s moved into its own building, the interesting Victorian Gothic-Scottish Baronial building (Architect: John James Brown) near the upper corner of the McGill campus. The College is now on University Avenue.

In 1909 the congregation amalgamated with Chalmer's Presbyterian, taking the name First Presbyterian Church. In 1984, First was amalgamated with Knox, Crescent and Kensington, to form the present Knox, Crescent, Kensington and First Presbyterian Church.

Add to this St. Joseph (1866); Stanley Street (1874); Calvin (1887); Melville (1887); Westminster (1892); Fairmount (1910) - Taylor (1876) - Kydd memorial (??), Fairmount-Taylor-Kydd (1969); plus churches on Montreal Island suburbs and the regions south, west and north - Lachute, Beauharnois, Ormstown, St. Andrew's East, and so on, the process of obtaining copies of specific records appears to be a matter of wading into a sea of confusion.

But not so!!

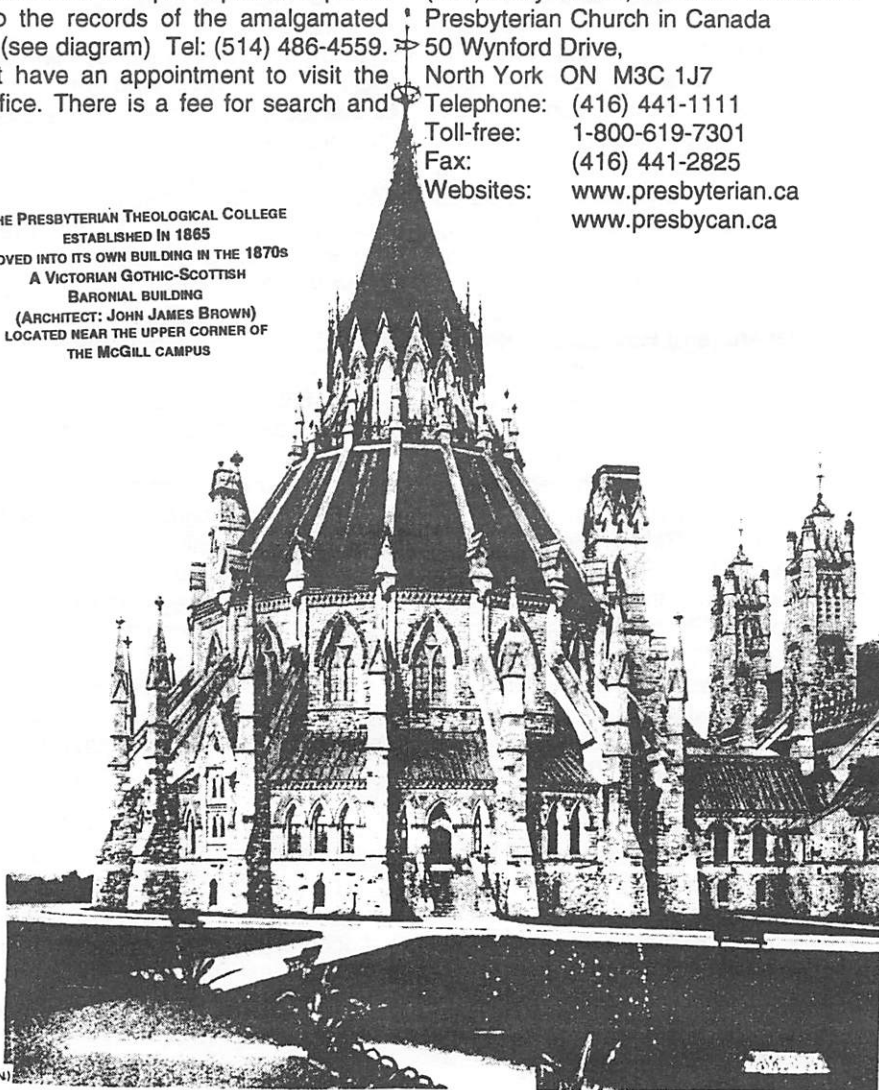

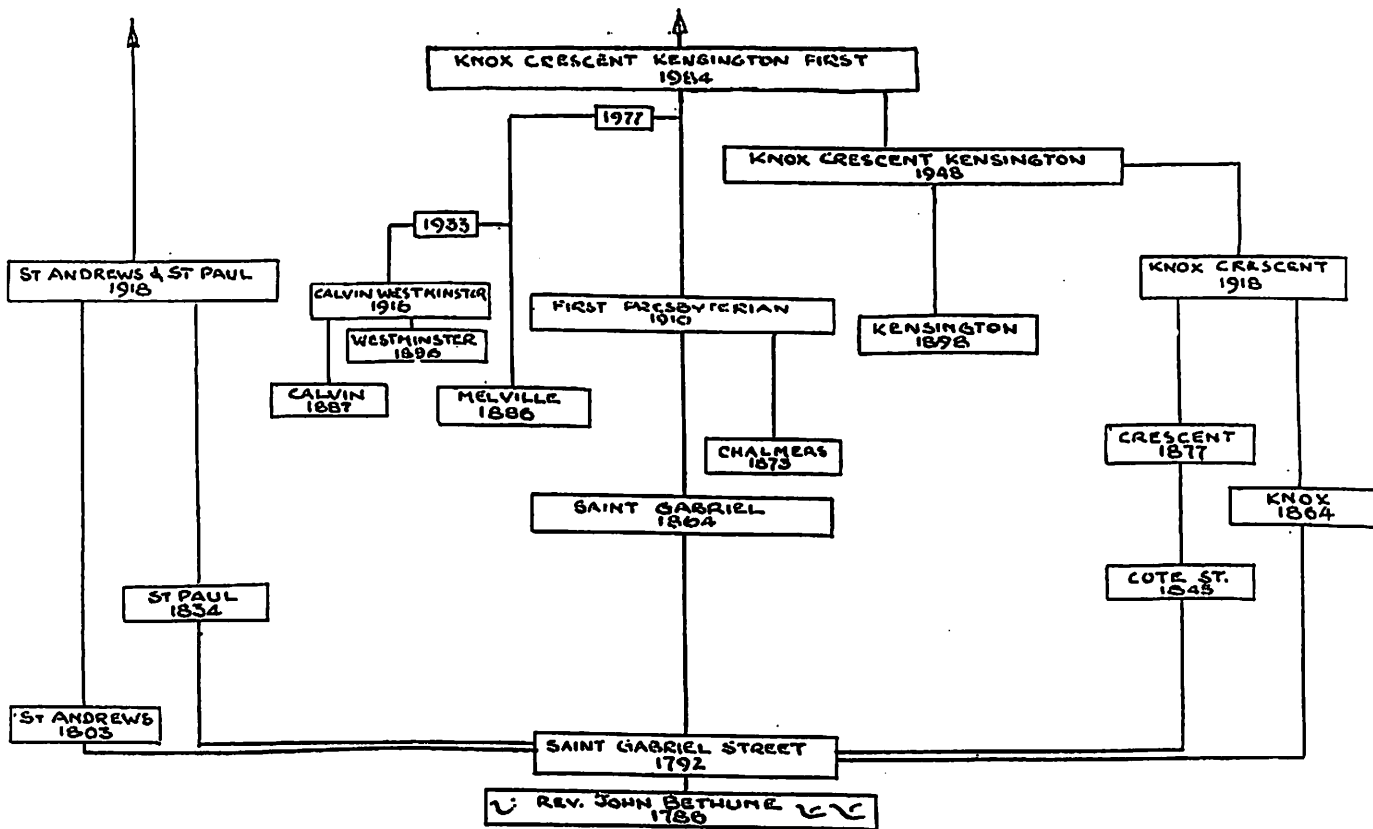

THE NEVER ENDING PUZZLE
A COWANSVILLE QUEBEC TALE

Will you take a moment and walk in my shoes for a day, for that is the only way to understand what I and so many others are going through. Walk down the same path I do and you'll notice the route is not too clear. It is sometimes difficult to know where you are going because you can no longer see where you came from. The path has no ancestors, for me this path has no end.

I was born on May 7th, 1966 - or at least that is when we light the candles every year and sing Happy Birthday. Just because someone is adopted doesn't mean they have to doubt everything they are told. Do they? Having a birth certificate is something I have never known, something I hope to have one day. A small piece of paper other people never even think about, a piece of paper I may never have. I carry a Canadian Citizenship card, a card normally issued to someone born outside Canada. Society tells me I am different and because of that I don't ask why? I don't ask questions because often times nobody has the answers. The never ending puzzle ! Only one piece missing when in fact none of them ever really fit. It is hard to explain in so few words what it feels like to want something so bad, something most people take for granted.

There are several children out there just like me who were placed for adoption through the Archdeacon John Peacock during the 1960's. He decided that our pasts should never be discovered, he decided we did not need to know. Our history was left to collect dust in his basement, forgotten over the years and later destroyed. These documents were written in a language known only to him, a language he chose should someone stumble upon what now are only ashes. John Peacock decided our ancestors were not important, that *WE* didn't need to know. He made choices far too complicated for only one man to make, one man who may never have known what the consequences would be.

Do you or someone you know have these missing pieces. These pieces that are a part of me . . . a part I may never know.

Though we cannot determine how many children were adopted, we do know of 9 children, of whom 3 are trying to learn their birth identity. (see query # 1645)

It is my hope that by making the story known - anyone with information regarding identities of birth mothers or of other children adopted through Rev. Peacock will contact us at Parent Finders Montreal or contact me at QFHS library. Jean's story is sobering - to think a young 18 year old suddenly discovered she was NOT eligible for Canadian citizenship. Thanks to the nice people at Gazette Probe - this appears to have been fully resolved and Jean is anxiously awaiting the arrival of the long coveted birth certificate she was denied.

MORE GHOSTS OF ST MARY'S

In 1994 I submitted an article entitled *The Ghosts of St Mary's* which was published in the December issue of *Connections* [vol. 17 / #2 / pg 28]. It was about the Protestant civilian and military graveyards which stood at what is today the foot of the Montreal side of the Jacques Cartier Bridge. Recently, while undertaking the personal project of indexing the various death announcements which appear in the now defunct *Montreal Star* during the year 1900, I came upon a fascinating article about the same cemetery.

GHOSTS OF ST MARY'S [PART I / DEC 1994]

An acquaintance of mine recently told me that when he was a young child growing up in a tenement at the foot of the Jacques Cartier Bridge, he witnessed the accidental unearthing by road workers of a surprisingly well-preserved coffin just south of Malo Street. The astonished labourers, having completely extracted the casket, called the appropriate authorities who rapidly arrived on the scene to remove this unexpected legacy from Montreal's past. While many individuals [especially those on the scene] were amazed with this seemingly macabre discovery, Montreal historians were not. They knew that much of this area had at one time served as a large burial ground for both the military garrison and ordinary citizens of the city.

Indeed last summer (1994) marked the 50th anniversary of the removal of the remains of hundreds of British military figures and their families who were interred in what became known as the Old Military Burial Ground, located on Victoria Road [later changed to Papineau Road] immediately north of de Maisonneuve Boulevard. Today, this is a municipal park - Parc des Veterans.

Originally located outside the old city walls, the first military burial took place in the year 1814. Between that year and the last burial in 1869, over 1,100 soldiers, their wives and children were interred. However, the ground became redundant with the withdrawal of the British garrison from Montreal in 1871 and with the opening of Mount Royal Cemetery a couple of decades earlier.

The Old Papineau Burial Grounds were, in fact, two cemeteries. The smaller of the two was located north of Mignonne Street [today de Maisonneuve Boulevard] and directly opposite the Taylor Presbyterian Church, built in 1893 and which still stands today. This cemetery was used for military burials. The larger of the two burial grounds was located immediately north of the other and was used as a civilian Protestant graveyard from 1797 to shortly after the middle of the nineteenth century. It was at one time known as *St Mary's Cemetery* although later in its history it was popularly called the New Burial Ground. It extended northward between Papineau and Cartier Roads, almost to Ontario Street. The principal approaches of the Jacques Cartier Bridge were built over this ground in the 1930s.

Several of the individuals who were buried in the military ground were quite noteworthy, not the least of which is Lieutenant-General, Sir Benjamin D'Urban, G.C.B., K.C.H., K.C.T.S., Commander of the British Forces in North America during the turbulent period 1846-49. He died in this city in April 1849 and his military funeral was the most imposing ceremony to take place in this city until this time. His brilliant military career spanned nearly half a century, including service during the Peninsular Campaign of the Napoleonic Wars. The South African city of Durban is named in his honour.

MORE GHOSTS OF ST MARY'S

Also interred in the same graveyard are the mortal remains of Lieutenant George Weir of the 32nd Regiment who was killed in 1837 while trying to escape Patriot captivity. Not surprisingly his grave was surrounded with a cast iron fence to keep potential desecrators at bay.

The removal of the remains from the military ground finally took place in the summer of 1944 after several periods of neglect and vandalism inflicted the unfortunate graveyard. The most serious of these occurred immediately after the departure of the British forces in the early 1870s, leaving the two cemeteries particularly isolated and vulnerable. According to *The Montreal Star* in its June 29, 1912 edition, the cemeteries had become "the resort of idle men and boys, stray dogs and cattle". It even became necessary to station two police officers on the burial grounds twenty four hours a day to protect the yard from any further desecration. It is estimated, that for all intent and purposes, the remains of the British military personnel buried there were exhumed and successfully transported to the Field of Honour in Pointe Claire where an imposing dedication ceremony was later held.

My friend's childhood memory recalls to light, however, the fact that there was never any systematic attempt to exhume the bodies of the ordinary Montrealers who were laid to rest in what was, at that time, a very beautiful and isolated area beyond the walls of the city. While the weather-worn tombstones were eventually removed, their earthly remains were left behind in their final resting place - *St Mary's Cemetery*. From there, every now and then, they remind us of their ghostly presence.

GHOSTS OF ST MARY'S [PART II / DEC 1998]

An unidentified citizen reported in the July 28, 1900 edition of *The Montreal Star* his observations on the lamentable state of the

military graveyard at that time. This same person took the opportunity to record some of the engravings on the various tombstones scattered throughout the cemetery and they are transcribed below:

"IN HOPE OF GREAT RESURRECTION, HERE LIETH THE BODY OF CH. HUNGERFORD POLLEN A CAPTAIN IN THE ----- REGIMENT, WHO DIED 6TH AUGUST, 1812, AGED 26"

"SACRED TO THE MEMORY OF LIEUT. WM. LLOYD, R.N. WHO DIED IN MONTREAL OF TYPHUS FEVER CONTRACTED IN VOLUNTARY ATTENDANCE AT THE EMIGRANT SHEDS, JULY 12, 1849. THIS MONUMENT WAS RAISED AS AN AFFECTIONATE MEMORIAL BY SURVIVING FRIENDS."

"BENEATH ARE DEPOSITED THE REMAINS OF LT. COL. MACKENZIE FRASER (LATE) DEPUTY QUARTER MASTER GENERAL IN THIS COMMAND, 29TH OCT. 1848, AGE 33."

"JOHN CHARLES ROMER, ESQ., LATE LIEUT OF H.M. 89TH REGIMENT, SECOND SON OF JOHN AND MARGARET ROMER. BORN AT SURAT IN EAST INDIES 1821 DIED AT MONTREAL 10TH SEPT 1844"

"LIEUT. COL. JAMES WILLIAM BOUVERIE, COMMANDING H.M. 89TH REGIMENT, YOUNGEST SON OF EDWARD BOUVERIE, ESQ., DELAPPE, ABBEY, NORTHAMPTONSHIRE, DIED IN THIS GARRISON 25TH FEBRUARY, 1843, AGED 43. ERECTED BY HIS BROTHER OFFICERS."

"FRANCES STEHELIN, SECOND DAUGHTER OF CAPT. B. S. STEHELIN, ROYAL ENGINEERS, DIED 1848, AGED 12 YEARS."

"PHILIP JOHN HORNBY, CAPT. ROYAL ENGINEERS, DIED APRIL 8, 1848, AGED 27."

LIEUT. COL. R. P. HOLMES, COMMANDING ROYAL WELSH FUSILIERS, BORN 1789, DIED 1819."

"COL. VAVASOUR, ROYAL ENGINEERS, DIED FEBRUARY 4, 1891."

"LIEUT. ANDREW BEATTY, DIED AT ST HELEN'S ISLAND, 1854, AGED 27."

"COL. GEORGE GRAYDON, K.H., COMMANDING ROYAL

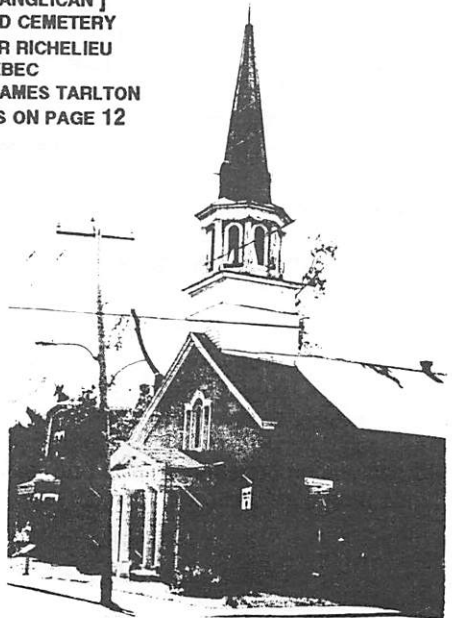

The last three listed plus Northfield United Church, Concession 9, Lot 35 in Cornwall Twp are sold as a package (17 pages, \$9.50).

The complete list will be posted in the QFHS Library, along with the Society's bibliography of books, atlases, family and local histories, etc. of historical and genealogical interest for the three counties.

"On August 16 past, I visited Saint-Jean at the end of the "Balloon Festival". In one of the exhibition tents, I found an historical display related to the history of the city and district, including a photograph of a church with a tall spiral steeple entitled [translated] St. James Church at the beginning of the century. The accompanying text read: "The church is the oldest religious temple in Saint-Jean. The first

mayor of Saint-Jean, Nelson MOTT, as well as Mary MACNIDER, the mother of Felix-Gabriel MARCHAND, who was the Premier of Quebec from 1897 to 1900 rest in the cemetery. From the collection of Mario Wilson" As Mary Macnider was a second cousin to my maternal Great Grandmother, Mary Susannah, and the Macnider name was spelled correctly - i.e. no Mc and no upper case 'N' - I knew I had found a relative!"

Jim followed this up with a visit to the Quebec Archives branch on Mullins Street, and with the help of the (always helpful) staff, found the Parish Registers for St. James Anglican Church, in what was then called St. Johns. These registers, 1816-1899, Births, Marriages, Burials are on four microfilms: Nos. 1613, 1614, 6935, 6936.

On microfilm #1614, page 0345: Folio 5: "Died on the Twenty-third Day of April, Eighteen Hundred and Fifty-five, Mary Macnider, widow of Gabriel Marchand, aged sixty-eight years, and was buried on the twenty-seventh day of the same month and year." By me: Chas. Bancroft. Witness: Thomas Gibson and ??

On a subsequent trip, "I visited the old section of Saint-Jean, formerly known as Dorchester (1776-1845), and found St. James Anglican Church on the corner of Jacques-Cartier Nord and St. Georges streets. An old cemetery is on one side and across the back. There I found the headstones for Mary Macnider (1788-1855) and Amanda BINGHAM (1784-1809) - the wives of Gabriel Marchand (1780-1852). Gabriel himself is buried at Saint-Jean l'Evangeliste, corner of Longueil and Saint-Jacques. The Saint James Church Cemetery has 30-40 headstones.

[QFHS has a partial transcription - recorded by Gerry Rogers in 1970. Some of the other surnames are: TOWNSEND, BERESFORD,

PATTERSON, SANFIELD, HEATH, CHEESEMAN, McGINNIS, PIERCE, O'HARA, VAUGHN, TITUS, HONSINGER, BICK, MOTT, RIPLEY, COOPER.] Down the street is the Société d'histoire du Haut-Richelieu where I met the President, Nicole Poulin, a charming and very helpful lady, who has a wide grasp of the history and genealogy of the Saint-Jean area. 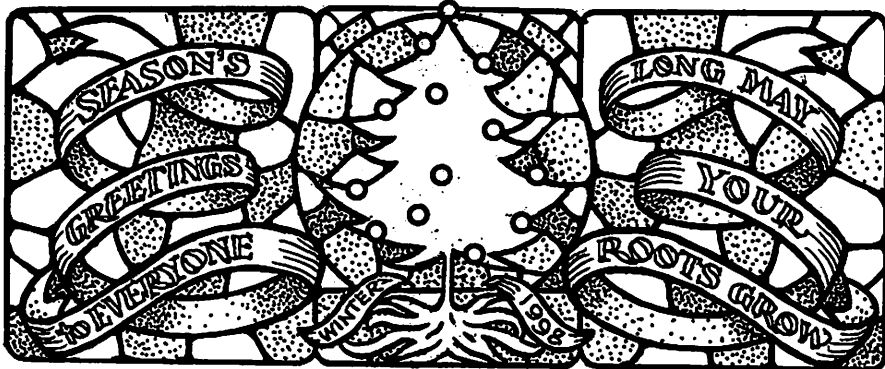

Notes to the Financial Statements / July 31, 1998 (unaudited)

1. Purpose of organization

The Quebec Family History Society provides information and assistance to persons conducting family history research. The society is incorporated under Canada Corporations Act as a not-for-profit organization and is a registered charity under the income tax act

2. Significant accounting policies

The Quebec Family History Society follows the deferral method of accounting.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions from members and the general public are recorded as income when they are received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collections is reasonably assured.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recognized as a current expenditure in the year of acquisition.

Contributed services

Members and volunteers contribute many hours of time to assist the Quebec Family History Society in carrying out its activities. Because of difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

3. Deferred contributions

Deferred contributions represent membership fees received in the current period that are related to the subsequent period.

4. Capital assets

During the year the society purchased computer and office equipment amounting to \$4,220 [1997: \$9,813], which amount is included in equipment purchases and maintenance.

5. Lease commitment

The society has entered into an operating lease for its premises which expires in 2000. Future minimum lease payment required under the lease are: 1999 - \$15,036; 2000 - \$15,036

6. Statement of changes of financial position

A statement of changes in financial position has not been included as all of the information normally contained in such a statement is fully disclosed in the statements presented.

A QUESTION OF BANFILLS IN BROME AND COMPTON FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE? *HUGH MURRAY BANFILL*

When I was a teenager at Bishops' University in the Eastern Townships of Québec I was told that we were descendants of Hugh and Charles BANFILL who lived in Barrington N.H. in 1722. It was 40 years later that I started to ask if it was true.

The Rev. Ernest W. TAYLOR's "History of Brome County, Quebec" (1906) states that many of the Brome settlers came from Barrington. TAYLOR was related to the BANFILL family through marriage. He told the traditional story about the family. Taylor notes the Brome County Banfills in the genealogical sections of his books. But how did the story come through?. In the list of ancestors of Barrington - Brome families are Hugh and Charles BANFILL. Working backwards from present day in Quebec to George BANFILL, 1746-1838, of Newbury and Corinth VT, who was the father of Benjamin BANFILL who came to Brome County about 1827 is relatively easy.

A register of the grants of lands in the Town of Barrington N.H. in 1722, near Portsmouth, shows:

So there is some truth in the story!

How then was George BANFILL of Corinth and Newbury, VT.
related to the BANFILLS of Portsmouth and Barrington NH?

This story begins in Portsmouth, New Hampshire with the life of John BANFIELD or BANFILL. He was born in 1642 probably in Cornwall, England or in Barbados. He lived in Portsmouth N.H. as a sailor, boat builder, carpenter and farmer. John BANFILL/BANFIELD shows up in Portsmouth N.H. by 1671, in the old Strawberry Banke area, with a 5 s(hilling) subscription towards Mr. Moodys Mayntenance at the Meeting House 17th day of March 1671. About 1671 he married Mary PICKERING, daughter of John and Mary PICKERING. There are various tax entries in the Portsmouth records i.e. 9 Dec.1688 - Strawberry Banke - Constable rate for town - John Banfil 3/s: 3 Jan. 1688 - Constable rate for province - John Banfil 9/d: 30 Oct. 1691 - for the poore - John Banfil 1/s.9/d: July 1696 -Strawberry Banke Rate for Towne Store of Powder & lead 2/s. Allotment of seats in 1793 "Seated below staires in meeting house - In front seat before ye minister John Banfield, and Below stare fronting ye Pulpit Goody Banfield" (North Church Record). A barn of his, or

a later John, is still an historic site in Portsmouth.

The family probably was English from Devon, Somerset and Comwall. BANFILL and BANFIELD were common names in the South West of England before the 17th century. There were various spellings too, such as Bampfyld, Banfield, Bamfill, Bamfield, Banfyld, Banfeild, Bonfield, and BANFILL. One source suggested that the name was derived from "BEAN FIELD". The international Genealogical Index has many BANFILL entries in Comwall although I don't know of any direct link to John BANFILL, 1642-1707 of Portsmouth N.H.

The Probate Records in 1707 report John BANFILL's death from Barbados. Various petitions which list the heirs (children) were made on 4 Nov. 1708, 9 Dec. 1721, 7 Mar. 1721/2 about the division and settlement of the estate. (There were BANFIELD families in Barbados before 1640, and the name is well known there even now.) Many Probate summaries of Banfield /BANFILL wills have been published in the New Hampshire series and many land transaction records are available.

A QUESTION OF BANFILLS

The New Hampshire Historical Society Library at Concord has a manuscript series of Genealogies of Old Portsmouth Families by Agnes P. Bartlett including BANFIELD. Some old documents have both BANFIELD and BANFILL spellings. BANFILL becomes more common in later years. Similar but less complete accounts by others were published in the Boston Evening Transcript Genealogical Columns on Jan. 4 1902 page 12 , Aug. 16, 1915, May 29, 1933 page 20..

The 1732 census of Portsmouth shows BANFILL land holdings including barns, meadows, horses and oxen for Heads of Households:

BANFILL, George:

BANFILL, Samuel (Capt):

BANFILL, John.

During the 1776 REBELLION (after all - the author is a Loyal Canadian) men had to sign "The Association Test" of loyalty. In Portsmouth John BANFILL, Joseph BANFILL and Tobias BANFILL (probably his sons) signed "Yes" in favour of the rebellion. In Nottingham John BANFILL, physician, was a "Non-signer with explanation ".

The 1776 Census of New Hampshire, indexed by Jay Mack Holbrooke shows:

BANFILL, CHARLS Portsmouth Rockingham Y 114

BANFILL, JOHN Portsmouth Rockingham Y 120

BANFILL, JOHN Nottingham Rockingham NH 108

BANFILL, JOSEPH Portsmouth Rockingham Y 120

BANFILL, TOBIAS Portsmouth Rockingham y 120

Several generations of BANFILLS lived in Portsmouth until about 1814 and left or died before the 1820 Census. What happened to the Barrington lands?

In the Portsmouth Land Record Books I found:

1733 Hugh's estate to his son John Sr. Quit claim (Book 20 Page 76, 25 April 1734) from Samuel BANFILL to John BANFILL on their father, Hugh BANFILL's estate, which included the Barrington land. John Sr. sold Father Hugh's Portsmouth land to his brother Samuel (Book 19 Page 205, 8 May 1733 Josh. Pierce Rec.) Probably an agreed switch to settle the estate.

1734 Samuel Brown to John BANFILL for 50 shill's for 72 acres-Barr. (Bk 20 Page 180, 4 July 1734 Josh Pierce Rec). Charles' estate with Barrington land to his son John Jr.

1739 Capt. Samuel BANFILL sold land, originally father Hugh's, in Portsmouth for 257 pounds to John BANFILL: 12 April 1739, Book 24, Page 46, Josh Pierce Rec.

1742 George BANFILL and wife Mary who lived in Portsmouth sold their Barrington land.

1743 John Jr., ship-wright when conscripted for the Louisbourg Raid sold (Book 28, Page 24) "John BANFILL Jun. son of Charles BANFILL late of Portsm.... for 50 pounds from John BANFILL Sr. esq. and son of Hugh BANFILL late of Portsm. A certain tract of land in Barrington, 177th in 5th Range... Belonged to Charles BANFILL afores'd dear father of Jn BANFILL

1744 John Jr.'s death reported at sea (probate record).

So JOHN Sr. owned

108 Acres from father Hugh's estate

60 Acres of Charles' land via John jr.

72 Acres from Brown

Total 240 Acres in Barrington NH

And in 1739,

Portsmouth land bought from Samuel Banfill.

Then John Sr. started to sell:

1756 Barrington - John BANFILL to Richard Swain for 200 pounds (Book 50 page 472 28 Oct. 1756).

1766 Barrington - John Banfield-BANFILL to Starboard for 27 pounds, of lot 264 of 54 acres half of... the same being the whole lot laid out to the Right of Hugh BANFILL, deceased, my late father.

1767 Barrington - John BANFILL to Isaac Fernald for 25 pounds one half of Lot 264 in 6th Range laid out to the right of Hugh BANFILL (C 517).

And buy and sell more land in Portsmouth:

1767 Brewster to John BANFILL in Portsmouth (Book 79 page 371, 20 Feb 1767).

1767 John BANFILL of Portsmouth, yeo., his wife Joanna Banfill, Spinster, conv. to Capt Samuel Langdon of Portsmouth, Gent., land in Portsmouth, about 10 acres, vol. 89 /43, 6 March.

Which he sold in 1797 when he was 95 years old.

A QUESTION OF BANFILLS

- 1797 Portsmouth - John BANFILL to Nathaniel BANFILL for \$3000 (Bk 144 Page 278, 17 Feb). This may not have been all his land.
- 1798 Portsmouth - Nathaniel BANFILL to Tobias BANFILL (goldsmith) for \$1000 part of land purchased from John BANFILL (Book 158, Page 210, recorded 13 April 1801 by Samuel Brooks Rdr.).
- 1798 John BANFILL, Physician of Nottingham sold 40 acres of land in Nottingham for 70 pounds to Charles Osgoode (Bk 148, page 140, 25 April 1798, recorded by Samuel Brooks). This is John BANFILL with four sons, who went to Bradford VT before 1796.
- 1813 Alexander BANFILL of Alexandria, husb. 22 Feb. for \$30 conv. to James Sheafe of P.Merchant, my right in lands and buildings on Witch Creek so called in Portsmouth, bounded by lands of Samuel Langdon, M. Woodward & D. Huntrife, together with Salt marshe thatch beds, etc....wich farm or part thereof I have claimed as estate of my Grandfather John BANFILL which he purchased o Elizabeth Miller...

SO in Barrington

John Sr. became the owner of Hugh's land and Charles' via John Jr., and Samuel Brown's. Which John started to sell in 1756 and later in 1766 when son (?) George BANFILL, 1746-1838, was 20 years old.

Why would JOHN Sr. SELL?

John was 61, widowed after Mary LEAR's death (date unknown but before 1759). He had remarried on 5 July 1759 to Johanna JONES, widow of Nathaniel JONES (South Church record). The land was rocky and poor at Barrington so he sold out and moved back to Portsmouth.

How to decide who were John BANFILL and Mary LEAR's children?

No birth records or baptism records were found. There is the Probate Court record of the inheritance for son Joseph BANFILL in 1740 from Joseph Walker. John BANFILL Sr.'s wife Mary LEAR had died about 1755-6. In the printed New Hampshire Wills we see on page 244 the mention of "Release of claim by John Banfill, June 17, 1767, to the administrator, in the right of his wife

Mary, deceased, daughter of Tobias Lear, in behalf of their children."...so they had more than one who were still minors. I was told that the Witnesses were Tobias and Nathaniel BANFILL, probably the two adult sons living nearby. Supporting evidence is the 1776 Portsmouth Census listing John, Nathaniel and Tobias. One source refers to the witnesses but the original document has not been found. At that time probate records were entered serially in books, not in a tidy file. The records of an estate that took 14 years to settle are scattered and auxilliary documents may be mentioned but not included.

The key person seems to be John BANFILL, known as John Sr., 1702-1801. His obituary in the New Hampshire Gazette 3-Feb-1801 states simply "Died...in this town ...Mr. John Banfill age 99". I could not find a probate record of a will. Circumstantial evidence indicates probably six sons. These were:

1. Joseph BANFILL, referred to specifically in a bequest to him in 1740 by Joseph Walker as **the son of John BANFILL**. He was the father of John BANFILL of Eaton NH who went to Eaton Preble Cty. Ohio in 1807 and build the first JAIL there. Joseph went to Eaton NH with his family. There may be some confusion here with a son Joseph b. 3-Oct-1781 as the 1810 Census shows a much younger man than the elder Joseph if the return is correct.
2. John BANFILL b. 22 Nov. 1740,(South Church Rec. Portsmouth) Physician, of Nottingham NH "Non-Signer" of 1776, moved to Bradford VT before 1796 and sold his Nottingham land in 1798. He and his wife Sarah had 4 sons between 1767 and 1789. What would be more natural for John at about 55 years old than to move to Bradford, Vermont because his eldest son John now farmed closeby in Corinth and brother George BANFILL was nearby in Newbury Vermont.

He petitioned with others for the founding of the Bradford Social and Literary Society in Bradford VT on 10 Sept. 1796. A copy of the petition is on the wall of the Bradford Library. John died by 1800 leaving a widow Sarah, the subject of

several land deeds. His son John married Hannah DEARBORN of Epping NH 17 Mar 1792 and had a large farm and 11 children in Corinth Township, VT. At least one of his grandchildren, Elizabeth H. BANFILL, went to Indiana.

3. Tobias BANFILL/BANFIELD, a goldsmith, probably was named after his Grandfather Tobias LEAR. In 1798 he purchased from Nathaniel BANFILL for \$1000 some of the land Nathaniel had bought in 1797 from John Banfill for \$3000. He, with his son Tobias and family, went to Wolfborough NH about 1812 and died in Dover NH. He and his children used the BANFIELD spelling of the family name. In 1992, BANFIELDs still lived in the Wolfborough N.H. area.

4. George BANFILL, b. 1746, The fall of Quebec in 1760 ended the French and Indian Wars. The North and West were now safe from raids. This enabled the expansion North in New Hampshire and West and North into the new State of Vermont. George Banfill bought land in North Haverhill N.H in 1770. which was sold for him by his son George Jr. in 1818. George BANFIELD(?) was also the hero of the 1771 flood at Bradford Vt., then Mooretown, when he rescued a woman and her sheep. The canoe later over-turned. They had to be rescued, the sheep was not. George Sr. moved to Newbury VT by 1774. He helped to build the first bunkhouse there for single men then in 1776 married Anna SANBORN, daughter of Reuben SANBORN. George was a Sergeant in the Company of Capt. Stevens, Township Clerk of Corinth Vt. from 1780 - 1786, and owned over 254 acres there. The "History of Newbury" relates that it is not certain if he quit or was fired as Township Clerk.

In one document he was described as a boat builder. In later years he and his wife Anna SANDBORN lived in Topsham with son Samuel and his family (Vermont Census records). A Pension Application for his wife Anna includes a list from a family bible of the date, day of the week and time of day of the birth of each of their 11 children. All documents examined showed that he and his children used the name

BANFILL. Clearly no one spelled this out to the stone mason who carved the name BANFIELD on his grave stone.

5. Samuel BANFILL b. 1751, (a minor in the 1767 Release of Claim?) enlisted at age 24 in 1776 and has an army record in Capt. Eliaphet Daniel's list. An early settler in Eaton NH, his descendants still live in the Conway - Ossipee area.

6. Nathaniel BANFILL in the Portsmouth census for 1790 and 1800. He bought John's land in Portsmouth in 1797 for \$3000.(record 144.278), part of which he sold to Tobias Banfill in 1798 for \$1000. Nathaniel married Marian BANFIELD 15 Nov. 1792, North Church record, and had four children whose birth dates, but not names are recorded in Dr'in Mss.rec. Ports Atheneum. I could not find a record of their names, but an Alexander Banfill of Alexandria has a land record, 22 Feb 1813 claiming ownership of land through his grandfather John Banfill's estate so he was probably a son of Nathaniel who had bought some or all of John's land in 1797. Nathaniel moved to New Castle N.H. until 1816 or later, then to Eaton N.H. or Newbury Vt.

7. Records of all other families of John's generation seem to be more complete and indicate no male survivors from cousins or brothers. John BANFILL Sr. died in 3 Feb. 1801 at the age of 99 years. His obituary was printed in the New Hampshire Gazette. Only three years before he sold his lands for \$3000. I could not find a Probate record so where did his money go, medicare bills then would not account for it?

CONCLUSION

I think that George BANFILL, 1746-1838, was the third or fourth of John BANFILL Sr. and Mary LEAR's sons. He left home about the time John Sr. sold the Barrington Lands, rocky and not very good. George grew up there. He had to be literate to be Township Clerk in Newbury Vt. He and his wife Anna SANBORN lived, in their old age (census records), at son Samuel's farm in Topsham for 17 years next to Benjamin and his family, who left for Brome County by 1827.

A QUESTION OF BANFILLS

Undoubtedly George told the story of the Barrington Lands to his children and grandchildren when they asked where they had come from... and the story got passed on. This would explain the family story of being related to both Hugh and Charles of Barrington. Hugh was George's grandfather and Charles his great uncle.

AND LATER

George's son Benjamin and family came in 1827-28 to Potton Township of Brome County, in the Eastern Townships area of Quebec, then CANADA EAST or LOWER CANADA. About 1828 Nathan Mills Banfill was working in a field and found what was first called the Bolton Spring, renamed the Potton Sulphur Spring when it was found to be in Potton Township of Brome County. About 1875 a resort hotel was built there by N.H. Green, about 1936 the hotel burned down.

Benjamin BANFILL's wife Sarah MILLS was a widow. Sarah and her first husband Samuel HALL got a Royal Land Grant of 1200 acres in Compton Cty. Que. in 1802. Of this they sold 1000 acres for 5 shillings. In 1834 son John BANFILL purchased from his half-brother and sisters 75 acres of the land his mother had left in 1807 when she was a 25 year old pregnant widow with 2 children.

The details of this story were published in *CONNECTIONS* VOL 8, #1, SEPT 1985. Benjamin's eldest son John, who would have known his grandfather well, lived in turn with his grandson Herbert BANFILL...who told me the story.

Later, grandchildren of George BANFILL and Anna SANBORN through son Samuel of Topsham, VT settled in Bamston and Coaticook, Quebec from about 1850 to 1893 but did not leave any descendants as they moved back to New Hampshire. Samuel and his wife Sarah EASTMAN moved to New Hampshire. Sarah died at Henniker and Samuel at Nashua.

Benjamin's descendants have been extensively documented through Quebec, New Hampshire and the Middle and Western States. BANFILL families in 1996 near Colebrook and Concord NH are descendants of Benjamin's Grandson William BANFILL, buried at Caanan Vt. One descendant gained a certain notoriety as a teamster during the American Prohibition by smuggling booze from Canada. He hauled hollow logs across the border

with the hollows filled with bottles and camouflaged with snow.

At the Bolton Pass the square odd building with the half-moon upper veranda was the stage-coach stop before it was owned by Nathan and Joel Banfill from 1860-66. Looking abandoned in 1984 it has been recently reconditioned and is lived in. Joel later was a partner in the "BANFILL and VILAS FOUNDRY" at East Farnham which later became the Vilas Furniture Company at Cowansville. Richard Banfill had the first General Store at Bolton Forest, now Eastman. He was charged with selling liquor to the miners... he fought claiming that it wasn't liquor but "cider".

Nathan Banfill's wife was Susannah Holland, widow of Nathan Taylor. In the second marriage she had four sons but it was not a happy marriage. In later years she knit many pairs of mittens, selling them for a pittance, to pay for a gravestone for her first husband. Among Susannah's last request was the plea that she might be buried beside her first husband. The four sons were not sympathetic to her desire: besides it would mean providing another gravestone, since the inscriptions on the first left no room for her name and record. She was therefore buried beside her second husband and inscriptions for both were made on the same monument.

Bessie Jane Banfill, 1899-1975, was a well known nurse who published four books on her nursing experiences in the Grenfell Mission at Mutton Bay on the Labrador Coast, the Magdalene Islands, a Hospital at Smeaton Sask. and at the Indian Residential School on the Tokawaka Reservation on the B.C. Coast. For her pioneer nursing in the West she received a medal from King George V in 1935. In her will she specified that if anyone did not follow her instructions, to donate her body to Queen's University Medical School and no funeral services, that person had to pay all the funeral expenses!

Grafton County of New Hampshire has an unmined lode of BANFILL data. George BANFILL of Newbury and Corinth had a son George who lived nearby, mainly in the area of North Haverhill and Bath N.H. for many years. There are many (80?) land transactions in the name of George BANFILL, father or son as Grantor or Grantee in Grafton County NH. In 1818 George Jr. acted for

his father, now 72, in the sale of the land bought in 1770 in North Haverhill. Although there are no marriage or birth records, a son Reuben could have been living with his father and mother when he met and married Laura Phillips of Bath NH. There are Census records of Bath in 1830 For Reuben BAMFILL, in 1840 for George BANFIELD age 20-30, wife 20-30 and child 3-4, later in 1850 in Stratford showed a George BANFIELD age 35 a Doctor with wife Elizabeth, 33, and children Nathaniel 8, Elizabeth 5y and George 7 mths.

In Portsmouth "Banfield Road" still exists near the Saggemore Crick by the old BANFILL properties of 1730. Captain Samuel BANFIELD's estate in 1720 is described in Brewster's "Rambles around Portsmouth". In 1984 there was the "Banfield Road Automobile Wreckers".

Samuel C. BANFILL, b. 1801, a grandson of John, 1702-1801, was HOG-REEVE (do you know who that is?) in Eaton N.H. in 1826, farmer and trucker who died 8 Feb.1881. His descendents still live in the Eaton- Conway area.

BANFILLS IN OHIO

A John BANFILL settled in Eaton, Preble County, Ohio in 1806 with his two sons from Eaton N.H. and later the rest of his family. John BANFILL disappears from Eaton N.H. between 1800 -1810. A History of Preble County, Ohio states that John BANFILL came from New Hampshire in 1806 and with the help of his sons built the first jail at Eaton, Ohio. Thankfully he was not the first inmate. He was the son of Joseph BANFILL of Portsmouth. There were many BANFILLS in Ohio about 1900, but very few in the 1990's. At least one family moved to Indiana.

BANFILLS IN MICHIGAN and WINDSOR Ont.

These are descended from Reuben BANFILL 1805-1899 who died in Capac Mich. Listed as Reuben Bamfill in the 1831 Census of Bath N.H. he was first married to Laura Phillips of Bath N.H. about 1832. They lived in New York State for a while before moving to Capac, Michigan about 1850. His death certificate states that he was born in New Hampshire and his father was Isaac BANFILL born in Scotland and mother was unknown. An obituary in 1899 states that Reuben and his second wife died on the same day and other members of his family were sick and could not attend the funeral. The only witness, was his

son James, in his sixties (also sick), who could not remember, or did not know, his grandmother's name and probably got the other names wrong.

There is **Scotch Hollow** the road between Newbury Center and Boltonville in Vermont. This was so named because many of the early Scots settlers in Newbury like Sarah Mills' (Banfill) family, settled there. I believe that Reuben was the son of George of Newbury, Vt., and a grandson of George, who had lived on Scotch Hollow in Newbury Township of Orange County, not Scotland.

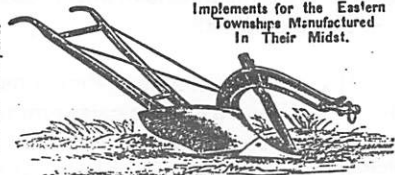

Thanks to Pennie Redmile for the last three.

Bonaventure and Gaspé can be found at **members.tripod.com/~gasperoots/index.htm**. Many of these sites have lists of family names, query pages, local genealogy sources, and sometimes lists of volunteers willing to do research. See the main address listed above for other counties, maps, searches by family name, and other interesting tools.

COMPUTREE

FRANCO-AMERICANS

If you are searching for French-Canadians or Franco-Americans, there is a list of those buried in Pine Grove Cemetery in Waterville, Maine at www.mint.net/~frenchcx/pinegrov.htm. An interesting feature of this site is the notation of both the French name and its anglicized version. For example, Barney-Bernard, Burgess-Bolduc, Butler-Breton, Gurney-Gagné, Lashus-Lachance, Perry-Paré, Pooler-Poulin, etc.

MORE NEW ENGLAND RESEARCH - NEED HELP?

If you need to have specific records looked up, you might consult the *New England Historic and Genealogical Society* at www.nehgs.org. Their *QuickSearch* service provides a form to mail or fax in, with detailed prices, and the records they will look up. These include census records, vital records, passenger arrival lists, New England naturalization records, and many more. They also show range of dates for each type of record they will search.

LISTS OF FAMILY NAMES

Several members have asked for sites where they can look up family names. I am providing a couple, but be warned that they consist mostly of E-mail addresses of people searching for information, and are not primary sources of data. Still, if your name is relatively rare, these sites could prove useful. Try Surname Web www.surnameweb.org/ or Surname Helper at cgi.rootsweb.com/surhelp/srchall.html. You can also try one of the standard search engines: enter your surname + genealogy. Try this at AltaVista www.altavista.com - useful results have been obtained with this method.

FINDING LIVING PERSONS

Many of the pleasures and tasks of genealogical research involve contacting people. These two sites might help you. The first is a worldwide telephone directory based in Europe; you can search white or yellow pages for many countries at www.eu-info.com/inter/world.asp. The second site is based at the University of Hanover, Germany, and is called MESA, MetaEmailSearchAgent. It bills itself as the "largest email address book worldwide." It uses seven search engines and allows you to set a maximum number of seconds for your search. Go to mesa.rzn.uni-hannover.de/

CANADIAN MILITARY HERITAGE PROJECT

This ongoing project groups its information in useful categories for the Canadian researcher: French-Indian Wars (17th Century), American Revolution (1775-1783), War of 1812 (1812-1814), Rebellion of 1837 (1837-1838), and continues with Fenian Raids, Red River Rebellion, Nile Expedition, North West Rebellion, South African War, and on to the more modern wars. "WHAT SHOULD I BUY?" GENEALOGY SOFTWARE REVIEWS

I regularly receive requests to recommend "the best" genealogical software. For those not on the Internet, there is a good source of information in our library's Periodical Section. (Web sites with reviews were listed in the September version of this column.) *Family Chronicles* magazine has run several feature-length articles in the past couple of years. Please note that some programs listed may have a newer version since the review was written. Issues in which reviews appeared: Nov/Dec 96 (*Family Tree Maker*3), Jan/Feb 97 (low-cost software, including the popular *Brothers' Keeper* 5.2), Jul/Aug 97 (*Family Matters* - a shareware program for Windows), Sep/Oct 97 (*Family Tree Maker* 4.0), Nov/Dec 97 (*The Master Genealogist*), Mar/Apr 98 (*Ultimate Family Tree Maker Deluxe*).

When selecting genealogical software, there are two very important points to consider: make sure the program supports GEDCOM (for example if you want to transmit information to a user of another program), and choose software that matches your own personality and desires. For example, if you want the most sophisticated system and are willing to spend the time learning to use it properly, you may consider *The Master Genealogist*. *Family Chronicles* writes about it "there is currently no better tool for serious genealogy research," but also "not the program for casual users and many beginners have a steep learning curve." On the other hand, they characterize Family Tree Maker as having a "main interface ... extremely easy to use" and "very hard to get confused by this program, even if one is fairly computer illiterate." You may also want to select based on what your friends have, in order to have help easily available.

GENEALOGICAL FORMS

I sometimes receive requests for the location of forms on the Internet. They do exist at several sites, but you can try the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (The Mormons) at www.lds.org and find a Pedigree Chart and a Family History Research Log; both can be printed and photocopied for use. Some sites listed in the September issue of *Connections* CompuTree under on-line courses also have various useful forms.

INTERNET VIRUSES AND HOAXES

Recently I have received several E-mail messages from friends warning about new viruses with the request to "forward this to all your friends ASAP!" These are usually hoaxes, trying to con people into clogging the system with messages. If you receive one, before forwarding consult one of the Internet security sites. For example try www.symantec.com/avcenter/hoax.html. The site contains lists of current hoaxes and the text that accompanies them.

As a result of the destruction of the 19th century censuses of Ireland, the Sir Richard Griffith's Primary Valuation of Land for the period 1848-1864 is the principal census substitute in Irish genealogical research. Commonly known as "Griffith's Valuation" it is used as a Heads of House-hold census substitute for 19th century Ireland. It is available on microfiche for sale on a county by county basis.
