Taken in the last half of the 1880's, this photograph, looking south, shows buildings on the east side of the 300 block of South Stephenson Avenue, Iron Mountain. The sign on the first building on the left, located at the southeast corner of the intersection with East Ludington Street, reads City Hotel. A small sign between this building and the next advertises a dressmaker. The second store, at 305 South Stephenson Avenue, was a general store operated by Charles Schuldes and Emil Carriere between 1885 and 1889. Their advertising banner stretches across the street. The tall pine at the right stands near where the intersection with East A Street would be today, and beyond is forest and swamp. [Menominee Range Historical Museum]

with a prominent dry goods house there; he returned to Ishpeming, and in March, 1881, the firm of Taleen, Jochim & Co. was organized. This firm occupy a large double store, complete in all its arrangements, and carry a large stock of goods, with each department complete in itself, and in charge of a number of the firm. They have already established a large trade, their sales for the past year being over \$100,000. Mr. Taleen has had a long experience in dry goods business, and understands it thoroughly; he was married, April 18, 1882, to Miss Maria Charlotte Wetterlund, a native of Sweden. [Page 451]

NELS THOMPSON, time-keeper at Lake Superior Mine, is a native of Norway, and was born April 23, 1846, and emigrated to America in 1870, and two years later came to Marquette County; located at Ishpeming, and began work at the New York Mine, and remained at that mine eight and a half years, and since then has been with the Lake Superior Mine, and holds the position of time-keeper. He married Miss Carrie Presthus, a native of Norway, May 13, 1874. They have four children -- Bessie R., Carrie M., Thomas H. and Conrad N. [Page 451]

F.P. TILLSON, dealer in drugs, medicines, toilet and fancy articles, was born in Romeo, Macomb Co., Mich., April 26, 1853. He received his education in that State, and learned the drug business in Dixon, Ill.; came to Ishpeming in 1876, and bought an interest in the drug business of J. Ropes & Co., under the firm name of Ropes, Tillson & Co., and continued four years, when he bought out the interest of Mr. Ropes, and since then has successfully continued the business; has a large established trade. MOSES B. TONTLOFF, billiard room, wines and liquors, is a native of Canada, and was born August 5, 1842; he came to Ishpeming in 1873, and two years later opened his present business, and has carried it on for the past seven years. He married Miss Esther Lebeau, a native of Canada, April 24, 1863. They have six sons and five daughters. [Page 451]

N. VOELKER, saloon, was born in Prussia, Germany, May 8, 1820; emigrated to America in 1845, and came to Lake Superior the same year; arrived September 8, at Copper Harbor, and engaged in mining; was there four years, then went to Sault Ste. FAITHORN JUNCTION FACTS.

Arthur Wells, of Dunbar, was a guest at the Harter House last Tuesday.

The farmers in the vicinity of Faithorn commenced shipping sugar beets last Monday. It is estimated that there will be fifteen carloads shipped from here this season. Peter LaCroix being the largest shipper, having raised fourteen acres, which will probably yield six or seven carloads of sugar beets.

Geo. Harter, the father of the town, has one of the finest farms in this vicinity. He has 2,000 acres of timber and farming lands with 280 acres under cultivation. He has twenty-six horses, ten milch cows, fifteen head of young cattle and forty hogs. This year he raised 225 tons of hay, 2,400 bushels of oats, 1,200 bushels of potatoes, 1,000 bushels of rutabagas, 200 bushels of carrots, 1,000 bushels of mangéis, and 2,000 heads of cabbage. He also had an extensive garden, which supplied him with all the vegetables of the season. He has an orchard of 200 fruit trees and a large variety of small fruits, and, although the orchard is young, he picked over 100 bushels of choice apples this year. In addition to his farming interests, Mr. Harter owns the hotel, a store, and a saw-mill and does quite an extensive logging business. Last season the mill turned out 800,000 feet of lumber and 4,000,000 shingles. He expects to increase the lumber cut this year to 1,500,000 feet and make the same number of shingles as last year. Mr. Harter also has a cedar yard one mile west of Faithorn on the Soo line, from which he sold \$3,000 worth of posts and poles, and \$2,000 worth of ties last year. He expects to handle about the same amount this season. His entire business last year was over \$65,000.
