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One Hundred Fifty-two Years  
in Acadia

September 10, 1755. For all peoples, all nations, certain significant dates are remembered with particular fervor. Be it the anniversary of national independence, the birthday of a popular hero, or perhaps the end of a great war, the dates become incorporated into the national character. They become milestones in the evolution of a people. For the Acadians, descendants of a people who in the 17th and 18th centuries occupied present-day Nova Scotia, the 10th day of September, 1755, is just such a milestone. It was on that very day that the British authorities loaded the first of their number onto vacant troop transports, intending to lead them into an exile from which there would be no return.

The Great Dispersion had been many years in coming, the inevitable consequence of an irresistible force meeting an apparently immovable object. Just as in nature, the one or the other must give way, so it was with the Acadian people and their British masters.

By 1755, the French presence in Acadia was already 152 years old, dating from an early attempt by Poutrincourt to establish a colony in the area. This first try foundered, but a second, in 1610, knew success.

For all practical purposes ignored by the authorities in Paris, as was the rest of Canada, until the middle of the 17th century, the settlement at Port Royal (Annapolis) took on a chiefly commercial character. The fur trade, North America's answer to Spanish gold, made many an adventurer dream grand thoughts.

A small number of colonists did migrate to Acadia during the seventeenth century, more through the efforts of the fur entrepreneurs than through any governmental policies. Thus, by the eve of the Seven Years' Wars (1755), when the English colonies counted more than two million inhabitants, Canada had barely fifty thousand, while Acadia had eighteen thousand at most.

From the very first, the little colony was the victim of the centuries-old English-French rivalry. Explorers of the time had the habit of claiming vast territories, as far as the eye could see, for God and the mother country back in Europe. Columbus had done it in 1492. So had John Cabot in 1497 and 1498 when he landed on the coast of Newfoundland and claimed that land for England. English pretensions extended to the mainland, however, in spite of Jacques Cartier's landings there in 1534. Thus, from the date of the very first French settlement in the area, warfare was inevitable.

As had been the case with Quebec, colonists did not flock overnight to the new outpost in the wilderness. England could use her colonies as a means of ridding herself of religious dissidents. France took the opposite approach, however. With the civil wars of religion in the recent past, the central government did not wish to encourage conditions overseas which could conceivably lead to a repeat performance of these wars. For this reason, only bona fide Catholics were to be permitted to emigrate. Despite the almost continual presence of Huguenot merchants in Acadia, the colonists were overwhelmingly Catholic.

It is not certain when the first colonists (as distinguished from men of fortune) came to Acadia. In all probability, the first

such people came on board the Saint-Jehan (St. John) from LaRochele in the year 1636. At any rate, by 1644, twenty families had already established themselves in the area about Port Royal.

The historian Geneviève Massignon claims to have discovered their place of origin: La Chaussée, a commune in the Vendée region of France, once belonging to the d'Aulnay family. The d'Aulnays had been active in the early exploration of Acadia, so it seemed logical to surmise that the first colonists might have come from among the peasants who worked the d'Aulnay lands. Massignon claimed to have found a remarkable coincidence between the names of the inhabitants of La Chaussée, and those of the first known French inhabitants of Acadia. In recent years, her conclusions have been put into question.

Whatever the accurate story might be, the twenty families of 1644 had, by 1671, through natural increase and the arrival of new colonists, grown to number 320 persons. These were still almost exclusively located at Port Royal. Elsewhere in Acadia, numerous half-breed families existed, through the inter-marriage of fur trappers and native women.

From 320 souls in 1671, the population grew to 885 persons in 1686, 1,068 in 1693, 1,484 in 1707, and 2,500 in 1714, the first year of English domination.

While the Acadians were almost all of French stock, this was not entirely the case. A thirteen-year period of English rule, starting in 1654, brought a number of British colonists into the area. Most of these left after the French regained control in 1667. Still others did not. Peter and Charles Malonson, brothers from Boston, of Scottish ancestry, and born in 1633 and 43 respectively,

came to Acadia between 1654 and 1657. Both converted to Catholicism, married local French women, and became French subjects.

The same was true for Lawrence Granger, a native of Plymouth, England. He arrived about 1657. Roger Casey, an Irishman who was also a prisoner of the English, escaped and found refuge in Acadia about 1665.

The Forest family became implanted in Acadia in a like fashion. Michel de Forest, whose ancestors had been French Huguenots and who had helped found New Rochelle, N.Y., went to Acadia when he was 21 years old, ca. 1659. When the British withdrew 8 years later, Michel chose to stay. The descendants of these men integrated themselves with the already present Acadian stock to such a degree that their "foreign" nationality disappeared.

With the signing of the Treaty of Breda, July 31, 1667, Acadia reverted to French hands. Colbert, Louis XIV's chief minister who was then in power, sent a detachment of colonists to Acadia. Since his accession to power in the early 1660's, this man had been favoring immigration to the New World, and this chiefly for the economic advantages that foreign markets would produce for French goods. It was he who was responsible for the "Filles du Roi" being sent to Canada to provide wives for the male population. It was he, once again, who convinced Pierre Boucher, Sieur de Boucherville in New France, to write his "Histoire véritable et naturelle" in 1664, extolling the pioneer life in Canada.

Through Colbert's efforts, a small group of colonists was sent to Acadia in 1670. Among these were the ancestors of the Amirault, Arsenault, Bariault, Benoit, Brossard, Doiron, Gareau, LePrince and Levron families.

The 1686 census reveals that a number of other households had been established <sup>in the</sup> 15 years that had elapsed since the last such head count. Among these were to be found the Allain, Aubeis, Babineau, Bujol, Buot, Calvé, Célestin-dit-Bellemère, Coste, Devault, Guidry-dit-Gravois, Mazerolle, Michel, Petitot-dit-Sinceennes, Préjean, Renaud, Roy, Saulnier, and Simon families.

Finally, between 1698 and 1713, the last year of French rule, yet another group of immigrants came to Acadia, among these being the ancestors of the Bonnevie, Blondin, Bodard, Boucher, Boutin, Boisseau, Brasseur, Carré, Cellier, Champagne-dit-Orillon, Darois, Duon, Fougère, Gauthier, Garceau, Héon, Mouton, Nuirat, Poitier, Savary, Surette and Vigneault families.

To these colonists by intent, we may add several others who came to New France for different reasons, such as the Lozd and Léger ancestors who fought with the Carignan-Salières Regiment against the Iroquois in the late 1660's and who later decided to stay in the New World. We can also list Robert Cormier who was first a fisherman, and only later a colonist.

Finally, we may add those civilians who had service occupations in and about the fortress of Louisbourg on Cape Breton Island. Those who did not manage to get repatriated, in many cases, suffered the same fate as the inhabitants of Acadia proper.

We must remember that the term "Acadia" had two applications, a general and a specific, much as we use the term "America" to designate two continents, but also as an unofficial name for just one country in the Northern Hemisphere.

Acadia in its general sense comprised all French establishments

in North America outside of New France or Canada. These stretched from the Gaspé Peninsula south, included the present-day Maritime Provinces, and ended with some small fish and fur posts in eastern Maine.

In its more specific sense, Acadia was taken to cover present-day Nova Scotia, minus Cape Breton Island. The distinction was not important until 1713 when England finally succeeded in getting control of Acadia. The War of the Spanish Succession had engulfed Europe for more than a decade. The Treaty of Utrecht was meant to end it all. In order to put an end to the Acadian/New England rivalry, and also to secure its fishing interests in North America, England insisted upon, and got, possession of Acadia and Newfoundland.

It was at this point that the question of just what constituted Acadia came to the fore. The English thought that they had obtained a good deal more than the French were willing to concede. The French handed over only the Nova Scotian peninsula. France retained control of the rest, including the strategically placed Cape Breton Island. Some French minds were not even this generous. As late as 1757, if we are to believe Bellin's map drawn for the French naval ministry, Acadia, now that France no longer owned it, comprised a strip of land 35 miles wide, running the length of the Atlantic coast of Nova Scotia.

In spite of this fiction, England controlled the Nova Scotian peninsula, including the major Acadian settlements at Port-Royal and Grand-Pré. Two factors kept British authority from spreading any further: the lack of an on-going state of war, and the existence



of Louisbourg. After 1714, old Acadia was therefore broken up into sections: Acadie (Nova Scotia), Ile-Royale (Cape Breton), Ile-St-Jean (Prince Edward Island), and <sup>what</sup> was later known as Acadie-française (New Brunswick.)

The major population centers were, it has been said, in the hands of the British: Port-Royal, Grand-Pré, Cobequid, and Cap-de-Sable. As the years passed, Peticoudiac and Chipoudy, in the future New Brunswick, received some settlers from the larger centers, people anxious to live once again under the French flag.

Still, it must be stressed that the majority of the Acadians chose not to flee, but rather to stay and till their lands. They saw no reason to move, as long as their way of life was not threatened.

The first threat was the British oath of allegiance. The new governing authorities were eager that the oath be applied to all Acadian inhabitants. From the Acadian point of view, however, such an oath would jeopardize their nationality and their religion. Their soil had been conquered, but their hearts remained French. Acquiescence to British demands could conceivably have meant being made to take up arms against the king of France and abjuration of the Catholic faith. The Acadians were as ready to accept these as they were disposed to leave their lands. After fifteen years, a compromise was reached.

The British authorities, despite a goodly amount of saber rattling, were not disposed to force the oath issue too far. As much as they hated to admit it, the British needed to stay on relatively good terms with the Acadians. Without the local farmers, the British garrison's supply of food would be cut off.

If the Acadians were made to flee, in all probability they would destroy the dikes which kept the tides from inundating the rich coastal farmlands -- an irretrievable loss for those who would follow.

The Treaty of Utrecht had given the Acadians the choice of staying under British rule, or of emigrating elsewhere. Here again, if the British had been disposed to see the Acadians leave, it would have also meant the departure of thousands of farm animals, and the slipping away of the accumulated wealth of over a century of farm exploitation. If younger sons and daughters could be allowed to make the trip over into "Acadie française", the established farmers had to stay put.

On this count, there was no quibbling to be heard on the part of the Acadian heads of families. Undoubtedly aware of their economic value to the British, they were determined to play out the oath issue until the British crown admitted to conditions: that the status of Acadian land titles would remain unchanged, and that the Acadians would never be required to take up arms against the French.

Upon George I's accession to the crown of England in 1714, the issue was forced, but to no avail since the status quo remained. In 1727, at the accession of George II, the same issue <sup>was</sup> put to the Acadians. Again the answer was "no" to the oath, as long as the reserve clauses were not included.

A breakthrough occurred in 1730, when Richard Philipps, governor of the province, dispensed the inhabitants of Grand-Pré from ever having to take up arms against the French or their Indian allies. This was what the Acadians had so long awaited

The fact that Philipps might not have been speaking in the name of the Crown was not fully appreciated at the time. In any event, the "French Neutrals" as they were now called, would know 19 years of relatively peaceful co-existence with the British Crown before the issue of the oath would once again raise its troublesome head. In the interim, the Acadians returned to their fields.

As was always the case, European wars had their repercussions in America. The War of the Austrian Succession broke out in 1741, although it was not until 1744 that England and France found themselves both involved and, as usual, on opposite sides. The Acadian population, by and large, remained passive as French, Canadian, and British detachments carried on the war on Acadian soil. Some Acadians furnished provisions to the French, but the overwhelming majority stayed faithful to the pledge of 1730.

In Acadia, the war would last another four years, during which time, the reputedly impregnable fortress of Louisbourg would fall into English hands after a siege of 47 days. France regained the citadel at the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, Oct. 18, 1748.

During the following year, Halifax was founded by the British as their answer to Port-Royal and Grand-Pré. Up until this time, British settlers had steadfastly stayed away, fearing dire consequences if ever they should be caught in the midst of another Anglo-French contest. With the founding of Halifax, the story of the Acadians enters its last phase before the great events of 1755.

William Shirley, governor of Massachusetts, together with Cornwallis, the new governor of the province, embarked upon a course designed to create a British counter-population in Nova Scotia.

When Cornwallis disembarked at Halifax in 1749, he headed a group of 2,576 colonists -- not to mention several hundred soldiers. The German immigrants, of which there were 600, eventually founded the settlement of Lunenburg.

Cornwallis further decreed that more concrete measures be taken to bring the Acadians firmly into the British camp: stationing more soldiers in their midst to assure their loyalty, and encouraging Acadian farmers to marry loyal Protestant women.

The Acadians, understandably, were alarmed. Cornwallis was bound to extract an unconditional oath from them. An important new element, now, however, was Cornwallis' forbidding any Acadian dissenter to remove his household from the province. Individuals were in theory still free to go, but all possessions had to be left behind.

To Acadian delegations, Cornwallis could only say that the oath of 1730 had been invalid, and that British patience was wearing thin. The fact that the overwhelming majority of Acadians had remained faithful to that oath apparently counted for nothing. A terrible chain of events would now unfold.

Indian tribesman, inflamed by L'Abbé LeLoutre, their missionary, attacked Halifax and spread horror in the surrounding countryside. Military detachments from Canada installed themselves on the Isthmus of Chignectou. Raiding parties penetrated far south into New England. In the midst of all this, the Acadians, still faithful to their word, could do nothing but wait for British vengeance to fall upon their heads.

LeLoutre did not stand idly by. After preaching escape to the inhabitants of Beaubassin, and not having much positive result,

and, profiting from the appearance of an English force off Beaubassin, he had his Indian allies set fire to the settlement, and thereby forced the inhabitants off onto French-controlled soil. The bishop of Québec vehemently reprimanded this so-called missionary but no matter, since the damage had been done.

The exodus had begun. By late in the summer of 1750, more than 1,000 Acadian families had transported whatever they could carry, to the other side of the Bay of Fundy. By 1752, more than 2,500 had made the trek to Acadie française. Another 2,500 had moved to Ile St-Jean. These unfortunate individuals had not yet given up hope of returning one day to their farmlands. LeLoutre and his band of Indians kept these hopes in check, however.

The year 1753 saw the coming to power in Nova Scotia of Charles Lawrence. Administrator to the British settlers, and to the two thirds of the Acadian population remaining in the province, he would not obtain the actual governorship until December of 1755. The man had the worst sort of reputation, even among his own men, one of unmitigated wickedness and deviousness toward any who stood in his way. When a sizable number of Acadians, living in the utmost misery north of the Bay of Fundy, decided in early 1755 to return to their farms in Acadia, Lawrence seized the opportunity by obtaining a force of 2,000 soldiers from Massachusetts governor Shirley and attacking Fort Beauséjour. The French garrison contained a mere 460 men, among whom were 300 Acadian refugees forced to bear arms by the French commandant. The British recognized this fact in the capitulation agreement. Still, no Acadians were allowed back into Nova Scotia. They had no choice but to flee into the northern forests.

Back among the Acadians of Port-Royal and Grand Pré, the situation was going from bad to worse. In May, Lawrence collected all weapons which could eventually be used for self-defense, as well as small boats which could find use in an escape. Lawrence was determined to end the Acadian problem once and for all. Unbeknownst to London, Lawrence proceeded with the next step of his plan. Informing the populace of Port Royal, Grand Pré, Cobequid and Pisiguit of his intention to administer the unconditional oath of allegiance, the latter responded as might be expected, saying that the proposed oath was unacceptable, and that they were more than willing to reaffirm the conditional oath agreed upon 25 years earlier.

Lawrence had earlier explored with London the possibility of declaring the Acadians' land titles invalid as long as they had not taken the oath of allegiance. London encouraged him in this matter, telling him to ascertain the legality of such a move from the chief justice of the province, Jonathan Belcher. Belcher offered no objections, stating furthermore that immediate action was necessary if the Acadians were ever to be chased from the province.

During the summer of 1755, Charles Lawrence obtained the assurance of Massachusetts governor Shirley that the latter would furnish vessels to transport about 7,000 persons. In the meantime, British excursions into Acadie Française had as their goal the starvation into submission of whatever Acadians<sup>who</sup> might be hiding in the region.

Shortly thereafter, representatives of Grand Pré and Port Royal were given the order to appear at Grand Pré to hear of the latest governmental decisions concerning their land titles. Four hundred

eighteen landholders came together in the church of St-Charles-des-Mines at Grand Pré, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Friday, September 5th, 1755. Colonel John Winslow, Lawrence's emissary, then announced to the assembly that they were all prisoners and that they would soon be exiled from the province.

Having thus captured a majority of the heads of families, Lawrence had only to await the arrival of the wives and children who under no circumstances wished to be separated from their husbands and fathers. Five days later, September 10th, 250 Acadians were herded onto ships and led off to an uncertain fate in a far-off land. More than 8,000 ~~would~~ follow the same route....

Disarmed by the colonial authorities, those Acadians still in Nova Scotia had little choice but to surrender. Those in the future New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island fared no better. Only those intrepid enough to set sail for Québec, or to make the overland trek, were able to escape deportation. As for the rest, those not able to fend for themselves in the woods were rounded up in turn and shipped away.

It had been decided that, in order to prevent any resurgence of Acadian strength, the exiles were to be thoroughly dispersed--never more than two families to a town. Hungry, ill-clothed, lacking all but a few private possessions, the exiles arrived in the major seaports from Boston to Savannah. No care had been taken to preserve families intact, so orphan children abounded; these, along with children whose parents were present, were bound off as servants by the colonial authorities. Virginia refused to accept its share of refugees and sent them to England where they languished in Southampton and elsewhere for seven long years.

When it was all over, when the Seven Years' War had drawn to a close, England was mistress of North America from the Caribbean to the Arctic, and from the Mississippi to the Atlantic. It no longer mattered who lived where. It was only then that travel restrictions were relaxed and the Acadians were once more able to seek out a country of their own. Some returned to their old Acadia, only to find the British implanted on the old habitations. To these Acadians, there was no avenue but to start all over again, either in uninhabited areas of Nova Scotia, or along the coast of New Brunswick.

Still others, including many exiles from New England, made the overland trip to Quebec, where at least they would have the satisfaction of living amidst a French majority.

Those in the southern colonies went to Santo Domingo, or to Haiti, or to French Guiana, or perhaps to New Orleans which was then in Spanish hands. Those in England were repatriated to France where they became a burden to public welfare. They were all paupers, French-speaking foreigners, who yearned for life in America. These would have to wait 20 years, until a humanitarian gesture from the Spanish government provided for their transport to Louisiana.

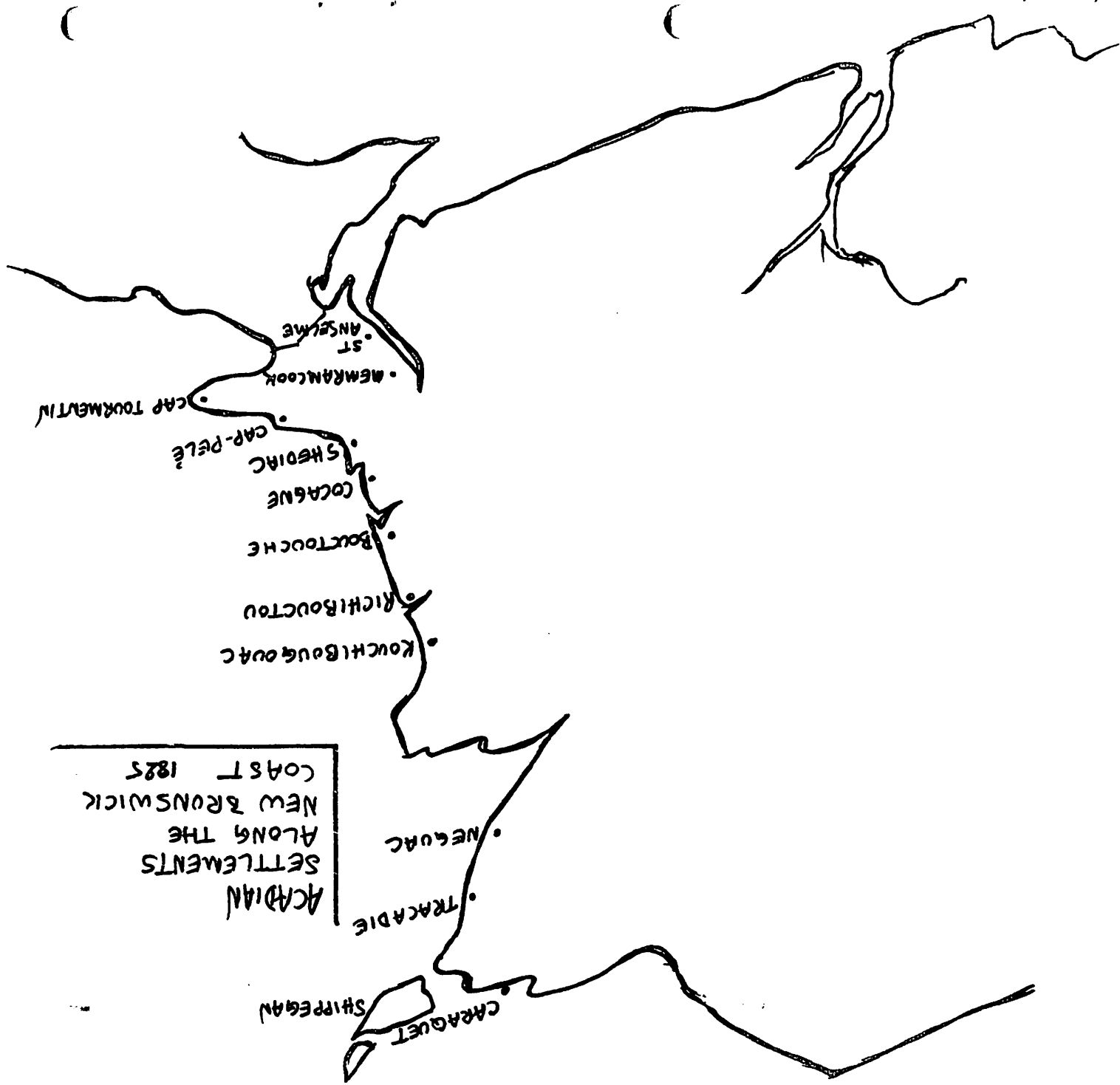
The Acadians knew great suffering. A large percentage of them died-- and all for what today would seem like reasonable requests-- the freedom to practice their faith, the right to own land, and the privilege of remaining neutral in international clashes. It is the 225th anniversary of their exile that we commemorate this year.

The Acadian Comeback

In the Maritime Provinces today, approximately 400,000 persons can claim to be Acadians. Of these, approximately one half live in New Brunswick. At the time of the Great Dispersion, virtually the only Acadians to be found in the province were isolated groups of families, living a border-line existence as a hunted people, daring not stay in one place too long for fear that the English would track them down. From the very first years of the Dispersion, therefore, the Acadian communities that exist today already had their first settlers. In many cases, however, these settlements were only temporary. Even after the end of the Seven Years War, when the threat of deportation no longer hung over their heads, the Acadians had to live with the hard fact that the English were not about to give them easy access to land titles.

From an English point of view, this attitude probably arose out of fear that legal land grants might set a precedent for the Acadians reclaiming their old farms. The British had to keep all their options open, at any rate, and could not afford to start hemming themselves in before gaining an appreciation of the resources in their new acquisitions.

The Acadians who returned to the Maritimes from New England and points south had no choice but to maintain a semi-nomadic existence. Population centers developed along the St. John River, but with the advent of British settlement in the area, these Acadian refugees were driven deeper and deeper into the

forest until they reached Madawaska.

At Memramcook, the Acadian population was larger, and consequently not so easily displaced. Still, their tenuous position with respect to their land titles kept Acadian younger sons constantly on the road looking for more remote places to start a farm and raise a family.

It was in this way that the village of Bouctouche was founded, as an outgrowth of the parish of Memramcook. Charles LeBlanc had resided with his family at Memramcook for the better part of fifteen years. Originally from Grand Pré, he had been deported with his wife, Marie Barillot, and family, to Massachusetts. They apparently were assigned to Stoughton, Mass., the town where they waited out the war (Jehn, p. 68). At Miquelon in 1765, they made their way to Windsor, Nova Scotia by 1770, before gravitating towards the growing settlement at Memramcook. (Arsenault III, p. 1228)

During the early summer of 1785, Charles LeBlanc's two sons, Francois (b. 1766) and Charles, (b. 1765) struck out into the forest. They were approaching the age of marriage, and had chosen to start their farms away from Memramcook. Along their path lay scattered farms and clearings-- marking the place where others had preceded them. After a five-day walk, the brothers came to a place where three rivers flowed into the sea. The land seemed fertile enough. The ocean promised bountiful harvests of fish and oysters, the latter of which literally infested the waters. The day was June 24th, the Nativity of St. John the Baptist. To this saint, the brothers dedicated the project which they were about to undertake.

Francois and Charles were convinced of the great advantages that Bouctouche offered the prospective settler, yet more colonists had to be found if a viable parish was to be established. The brothers had only themselves to spread their message. The first two to jump on the bandwagon were, coincidentally, two brothers: Isidore and Joseph Bastarache.

Their father, Pierre, b. 1725, and married to Anne Gaudet, had been deported to South Carolina with his brother Michel. Finding themselves in the company of twelve other Acadians in a colony that did not particularly care to have them around, the group set off on foot in the spring of 1756 with no more than a compass to keep them on the right trail, and a firearm or two to ward off starvation.

Walking north through the forests of North Carolina, Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York, they made their way to Lake Ontario and the headwaters of the St. Lawrence. After a brush with death at the hands of the Iroquois, the party sailed downriver, eventually making it to Montreal and Quebec -- still in French hands. Leaving certain security behind, they preferred risking a second deportation in order to find their wives and loved ones who, presumably, had been left behind.

The story ended well for Pierre and Michel both. They found their wives. Family tradition has it so. The story, luckily enough, is corroborated by an English observer, writing in 1815 from Miramichi, New Brunswick (Michaud, p. 49).

The intrepid Michel Bastarche settled with his wife Marie Gaudet at Baie Ste-Marie, Nova Scotia as soon as circumstances permitted (Arsenault, 404) (Michaud claims at Tracadie.)

Pierre, with his wife and three children preferred life at Memramcook. When his sons chose to move to Bouctouche, the ageing father followed them, breathing his last, at the new settlement, March 24, 1796.

The two sets of brothers, Charles and Francois Leblanc, and Isidore and Joseph Bastarche, formed the nucleus of the new colony at Bouctouche. They settled there with their wives in the spring of 1786. They were followed a year later by a LeBlanc brother-in-law, Benjamin Allain, who came accompanied by his family.

During the winter of 1787, the first Acadian child was born at Bouctouche, Laurent, the son of Charles LeBlanc and Madeleine Girouard. In the absence of the priest, the child was baptized by the oldest individual present, Pierre Bastarche. In areas lacking a regular pastor, it had long been the custom among Acadians to have the most venerable old person present preside at baptisms, marriages, and burials. The priest would later make these provisional acts official.

This was a custom which saw constant use during the years of exile in the American colonies. Only in Pennsylvania and Maryland, where one or two priests might be found, could Catholics receive some sort of ministry. Elsewhere the Catholic clergy was banned. In Massachusetts, a Catholic clergyman, if found out, would be deported from the province. A second incident would mean his death.

An interesting footnote to Acadian religious customs may be read in the parish register of Deschambault, Quebec. On October 27, 1766, Michel Robichaud and Madeleine Landry had their marriage revalidated. The priest added the following (in French):

"They have shown me a document which explains that they were made prisoners by the English, and chased from their country and that, refusing the lessons and the teachings of the English ministers, they were married in the presence of their relatives and of some aged Acadians in New England. This they did in the hope of renewing their marriage vows if ever they could find themselves, their prison ended, in the presence of French priests. We have therefore given them the nuptial blessing..." (Tanguay, VII, Robichaud)

At Bouctouche, new settlers kept arriving: Jean and Joseph Babineau in 1789. The following year came Jacques Cormier, Paul-Gervais Girouard and Joseph LeBlanc, brother to François and Charles. They were joined later by Jean Savoie, Jean Jaillet, Jean Babineau, brother-in-law of the Bastarache men, François Robichaud, and François, Michel, Grégoire, and Israël Cormier, the last three of whom were brothers. Along with earlier settlers, these men, their wives and descendants were to form the majority of Bouctouche's inhabitants.

The LeBlanc and Bastarache brothers applied to the provincial government (New Brunswick having been set off in 1784) for legal recognition of their land holdings. The application was made in 1791 and granted three years later. While 1786 may be the year in which Bouctouche's first colonists arrived, 1794 marks their legal recognition by colonial authorities.

Psychologically, for Acadians, an outpost had not "made it" as a settlement until a church had been built, and a priest assigned to minister to the inhabitants. In Pre-Dispersion Acadia, with the exception of the larger settlements, the inhabitants

were served by itinerant missionaries whose duties were not only those of caring for the Acadians, but also for their Indian allies.

With the arresting by the British of all Catholic clergy in 1755, the position of priest in the Maritimes became quite precarious. It meant a return to the travelling missionary role since for the time being, fixed ministries were out of the question.

By the end of the war, with British dominance assured in North America, there was no longer question of interfering with the ministerial activity of priests. Still, the itinerant missionary could not put down roots. The flock, once concentrated in four or five areas, now was scattered far and wide in groups of two or three, perhaps ten or twenty families.

The first important missionary work to be effected among post-Dispersion Acadians was that of Father Charles Bailly, dispatched to Nova Scotia by the Bishop of Quebec in 1767. Father Bailly would spend the next five years criss-crossing the province of Nova Scotia, from Annapolis to Halifax, from Cap de Sable to Louisbourg, baptizing children up to 12 years of age, revalidating marriages, and saying a few prayers over the graves of the departed.

Fr. Bailly was followed in this work by Joseph-Mathurin Bourg, an Acadian-born priest who had been trained in Paris and ordained in Quebec. Still to follow were Reverends Girouard and Castanet, the latter being a French priest who had found refuge from the Revolution in the service of the Bishop of Quebec.

Memramcook, having the largest Catholic population in New Brunswick after the Caraquet area, was the first Acadian outpost in southern New Brunswick to receive a permanently assigned



missionary, this in 1782. Richibouctou got its first church in 1798, and its first permanent missionary in 1800. Bouctouche was officially part of the Richibouctou parish, so many early baptismal, marriage, and burial acts are to be found at the mother church instead at Bouctouche, where the ceremonies actually took place.

Yet, if we are to pick a date when Bouctouche was set up as an ecclesiastical jurisdiction, it would have to be November 19, 1800, the date when the parish registers were opened. St-Jean-Baptiste de Bouctouche would continue to be served by travelling missionaries until 1839 when Father Julien Rioux was appointed the first permanent pastor. At least one missionary gained valuable lessons from his work on the New Brunswick coast. Francois-Norbert Blanchet, whose ministry there ran from 1820 to 1827, would thirteen years later become Vicar Apostolic of the Oregon Territory, and later, first bishop of Oregon City (later, the Diocese of Portland.)

Bouctouche, which had had but two or three dozen inhabitants in 1800, had 80 years later more than 3,300 (Michaud, p. 82). The parish had become too large, so three missions were opened in the interior: Ste-Anne, St-Antoine, and St-Pierre, with populations of from 478 to 254 souls.

The LeBlanc brothers had chosen well their place of settlement. In the world of 19th century agriculture, Bouctouche not only had fertile soil to offer, but easy access to the forests and the lumber trade, as well as an opening onto the sea and its riches. This explains the rapid growth of the village in so short a time.

The Acadian never asked for a hand-out from anyone. All that he did ask was a corner of the earth to call his own. He and

his family would nourish this ground with the blood of their veins and the sweat of their brows until it yielded its fruit. This is the attitude that the Acadians took with them wherever their exile ended. It is this same attitude which they passed on to their descendants.

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#### A Few Newspaper Excerpts....

"By a vessel which arrived yesterday from Halifax, in 4 days, we learn that two men of war, a 50 and 20-gun ship were arrived arrived there from Virginia, and that there were 19 sail of men of war in that harbour; that a number of transports were preparing to sail for the Bay of Fundy which were to be convoy'd by Capt. Rous, in over to carry off the French inhabitants of Nova Scotia." Boston Weekly Newsletter, Thursday, August 21, 1755.

"The Government of Nova Scotia having judged it necessary to remove the French inhabitants thereof, and to disperse them among the British Colonies in North America..... and as a consequence of this resolution, one Vessel with about 30 families is already arrived in the Port of Boston." Boston Weekly Newsletter, Thursday, Nov. 13, 1755.

(last Tuesday morning)"...there arrived a schooner from Nova Scotia with 121 more of the French People called Neutrals." Boston Weekly Newsletter, January 15, 1756.

"A ship with about 250 of the French Inhabitants of Nova Scotia, commonly called Neutrals, put into Rhode Island last week by reason of contrary winds; she was bound to New London in Connecticut colony." Boston Weekly Newsletter, January 22, 1756.

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Some old Acadian remedies....

BOILS: Make a poultice out of bread or out of some potato starch, then place it on the boil.

BURNS: Pour some cod liver oil on the burn, then cover with a beech leaf.

CANKER SORES: Crush and burn some mussel shells until they are reduced to an ash. Apply the ash to the affected part.

COLDS: Make a mixture of Molasses, Ginger, and Baking Soda and take when needed.

CUTS: Rub some lard over the cut.

DROPSY: Coat a piece of string with tar, and wrap three times counter-clockwise around the affected part.  
Alternate method: place a salted herring on the affected part.

EAR ACHE: Place a drop of eel grease in the ear.

FEVER: Place a salted herring in each stocking.

HAIR LOSS: Rub some bear grease on the scalp.

HICCUPS: Place a door key on the afflicted person's back.  
Alternate method: place a ten cent piece under the tongue.

MUMPS: Rub the neck with a piece of wood from a pig's watering trough.

PAIN IN THE SIDE: Pick up a pebble, spit on it, and put it back.

SEA SICKNESS: Put sand in your boots.

SORE THROAT: Wrap a salted herring around the throat.

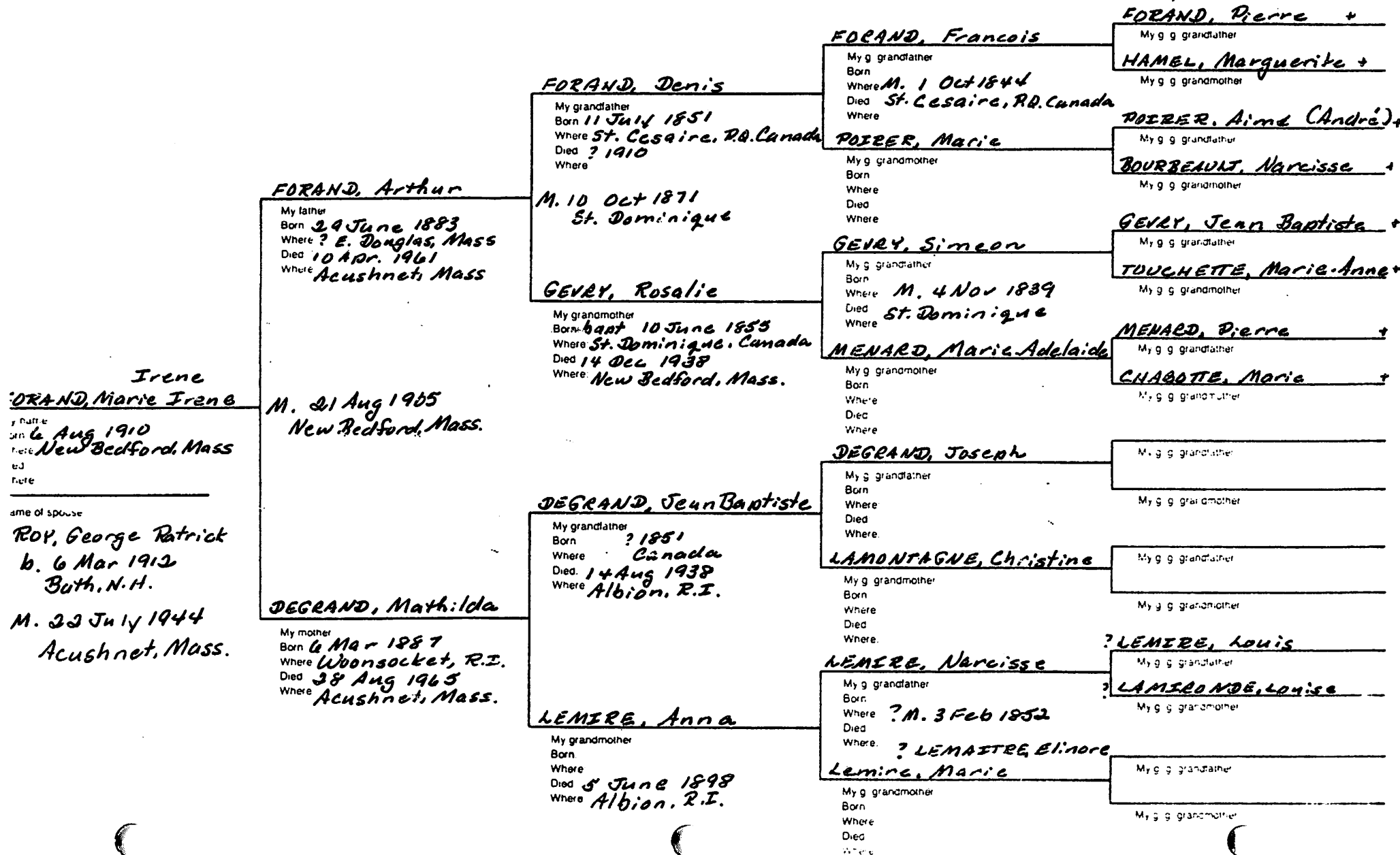

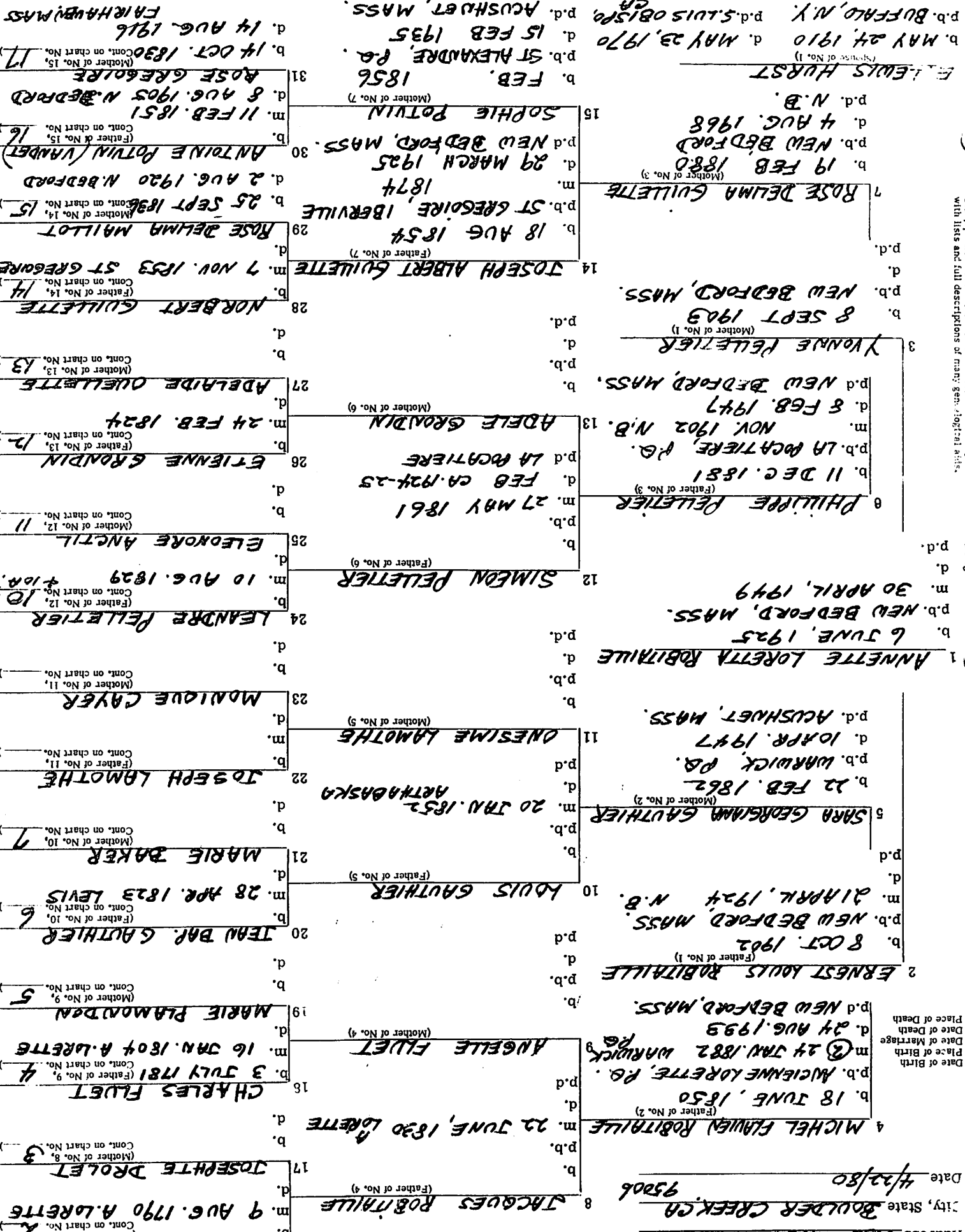

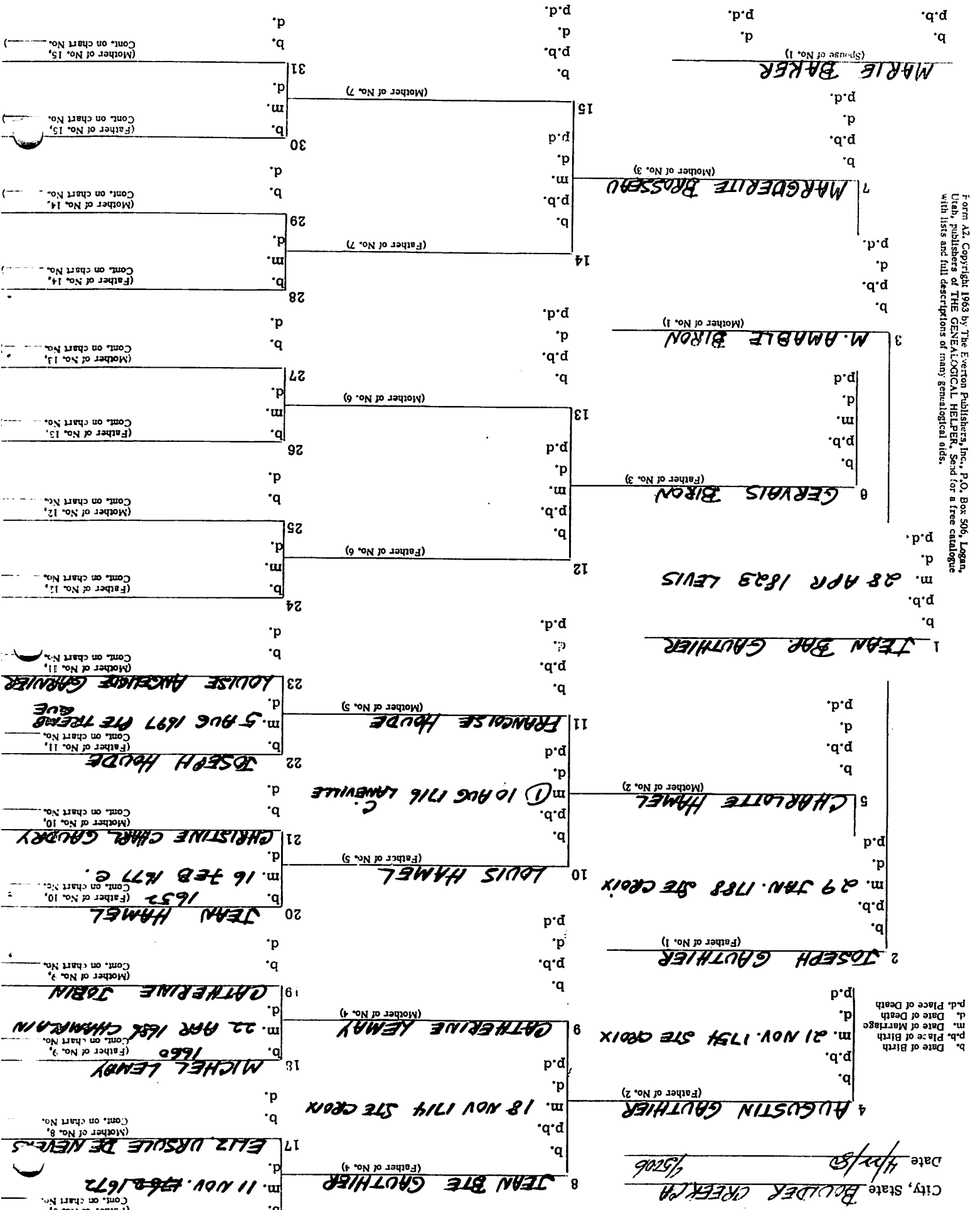
