

BOOK REVIEWS

The New Brunswick Landscape Print 1760-1880 -- Paul A Hachey 111 pp 1980 \$12.00

This book consists of 117 Prints which deals with the geographical area of New Brunswick. Also included are brief descriptions on the various Artists, Engravers and Publishers. Prints such as 1. A View of Miramichi, a French Settlement - 1760 2. View of Saint John City & Harbour - 1815 3. View-Down St. Croix River - 1836 4. View of Sugarloaf Mountain, Restigouche County - 1861 are included. A excellent book for those who want a pictorial view of New Brunswick where their ancestors had lived and died.

Songs of Miramichi -- Louise Manny & James R Wilson 330 pp 1970 39 illus \$12.50

Excellent source book for early woodsmen songs indigenous to Miramichi and the North East area of New Brunswick. Has some genealogical data on early settlers. A good Glossary of place names and lumbering terms used. Some songs dealt with are "Miramichi Fire ", "A winter on Renous ", "The Dungarvon Whooper "and "The Jones Boys ". Very entertaining plus descriptive book on our Forefathers' lifestyle on the Miramichi. A book that can be read over and over as I have done. My Father and Uncle who have spend many years in the lumbering camps can still recall many of these songs as sung around the campfires.

<u>David's Kingdom</u> -- W.A.Spray 140 pp 1979 illus \$6.95

A history of the Anglican Church in the parish of Chatham, N.B. from present to earliest times. Excellent notes on each chapter and a good bibliography is included in book. People with ancestors in Northumberland County would be interested with the study of the Anglican ministers on the early Miramichi as given in the book. A lot of time and research has gone into this work with reference to Rev. Samuel Bacon, St. Paul's Anglican Church, Rev James Hudson and others involved.

<u>Timber Colony</u> -- Graeme Wynn 224 pp 1980 illus \$10.00

A Historical geography of early 19th century N.B., examining the connections between lumbering, settlement farming, and industrial economic opportunity. Excellent notes and sources given with each chapter. A rewarding book to read for those who had ancestors associated with the lumbering trade along any of the many rivers in New Brunswick.

BOOK REVIEWS

Kings County Marriage Register 1812-1828 - Cleadie B Barnett 58pp 1980

Another comprehensive work on Kings County records. This book contains abstract copies of the first half of the Kings County Marriage Records, Vol. 1. Information per entry includes date, names of brides and grooms, place of residence, witnesses and occasionally occupations. Index for both male and female surnames is included. Excellent source book for those with Kings County ancestors. -- Cleadie Barnett R.R.#3 Oromocto N.B. E2V 2G3

Joseph Russell Miramichi Shipbuilder and Financier 45pp 1980 illus - Grant Nielsen

Account of Joseph Russell's life - Personal, Religious and as Entrepreneur. Places of residence dealt with are Chatham NB, Beaubear's Island NB, Liverpool England and Salt Lake City Utah USA. for the period 1820 to 1855. A founder of the Mormon Church on the Miramichi River, he was closely connected to the Mother church in Utah. Included in text is account of Wilford Woodruff's trip to Miramichi in July, 1848 and a list of vessels built by Joseph Russell.

Old North Esk -- W. D. Hamilton 479pp 1979 16 maps and tables Index

A historical and genealogical study of North Esk Parish Northumberland N.B. First 68 pages give a detailed historical and geographical study of the parish prior to 1850. The remaining pages deal with a concentrated study on the families living in North Esk Parish. Families dealt with include names such as: Forsyth, Martin, Whitney, More, Travis, Peabody, Holms, Tozer, Stuart, Gillis, Mutch, Johnston, Kingston, Dunn, White, Walsh, Tushie, McKay, Copp and many more. Over 20 years of research has gone into this book.

The North West Miramichi -- Doreen M Arbuckle 463pp 1978 107 illus 13 maps & diagrams Index

This book gives us a historical and genealogical study of this region plus its relation to the rest of Northumberland County and New Brunswick. First 205 pages gives a historical study of area from 1534 to 1973. Topics such as Militia, Indians, Farming, Education, Communications, Post Offices as well as others are covered. The remaining pages gives a genealogical study on the following surnames: Martin, Forsyth, Menzies, Mullin, Fraser, Sinclair and Curtis. Eleven pages of sources are included to document each chapter. This book is well researched but not as detailed as that of W.D. Hamilton's. Presently I am rereading this valuable text relating to Northumberland County.

LUMBERING IN NEW BRUNSWICK circa 1858

The following list of individuals were engaged in the cutting of timber in the Province of New Brunswick for the year 1858. This list was compiled for notices of "Timber Berth" sales in the New Brunswick Reporter for the months of June and July, 1859.

Dear Mr. O'Brien:

The Bicentennial Commission is developing a project for the collection of New Brunswick folklore, tall tales, myths, and legends. We would like to be as all-encompassing and as representative of the various Provincial regions as is possible, although a collection of such a nature understandably could not be considered 'complete'.

A deliberate search of the traditional sources is being made, but folklore is elusive. Much of our mythology survives through the oral tradition and is infrequently recorded in print. As well, each region of our Province would seem to have its own particular traditions which remain largely unknown to other areas. The sharing of our folklore among all the people of New Brunswick offers an opportunity to explore our multi-faceted culture, and to discover further similarities and differences in interpretation.

With the themes of exploration and discovery in mind, the Bicentennial Commission invites you to share with us any item of information you feel would be of interest, whether that be a traditional story or belief, a saying common to your area, a tall tale, or a legend from the past. The participation of all citizens of New Brunswick will ensure that the spirit of the Bicentennial Celebrations will continue far beyond 1984.

Veterans Records by Mail to Cost More Starting Sept. 1

In order to keep the records reproduction program on a self-sustaining basis, the National Archives is making two changes in its pricing and payment policies on mail requests for copies of veterans record files. Both take effect on Sept. 1.

The cost for reproduction of each record file will be increased from \$3 to \$5. The price rise is the first in 5 years. The Archives' Central Reference Division receives more than 200,000 mail requests annually for files of veterans records, including pension files, bounty land applications, and military service records dating from the Revolutionary War to the early 20th century.

In the second change, a prepayment policy will be put into effect in order to reduce the administrative overhead of maintaining an extensive billing system. Beginning Sept. 1, customers are requested to send payment with their orders when the total cost is known. Payment can be made by check, money order, or Master Card or VISA credit cards. In cases where the cost is not known, a price quotation can be obtained by requesting the order form for copies of veterans records—NATF Form 26. Write to: Military Service Records (NNCC), National Archives, Washington, DC 20408.

THE ROYAL WEST INDIA RANGERS

Situate near the upper reaches of the River St. John in North-western New Brunswick is the small community of Medford, Victoria County. However, it is not uncommon for the local older inhabitants to refer to the area as 'Ranger Settlement'. Ranger Settlement derives its name from a relatively unknown group of disbanded soldiers: The Royal West India Rangers.

Following the conclusion of the Napoleonic Wars, the Royal West India Rangers had been sent to the West Indies to garrison one or more forts among the islands. Their role during this period

has yet to be ascertained.

Our earliest account of the Rangers appears in a dispatch recorded in Contempoary New Brunswick Newspapers: 12 Nov. 1818"Regiments are to go from Ireland to relieve the 4th Battalion of 60th York Rangers, West India Rangers, and Chasseurs in the West Indies ordered to be reduced." Roger N. Duckley in "The British West India Regiments, 1795-1815" makes only passing reference to the Rangers as a 'British special Europian Regiment' (which by description implies the possibility of service on the Continent during the Napoleonic Wars). However, Duckley notes that disbandment in Canada was the Ranger's decided fate "probably because they contained numerous 'culprits' and Frenchmen."

Word that the Royal West India Rangers would be coming to the North American British Colonies was reported in the City Gazette, Saint John, N.B.: 3rd March 1819- "The 3rd and 4th West India Regiments to be disbanded at Sierre Lorne, and the Royal York Rangers, West India Rangers, York Chasseurs in Canada or Nova

Scotia.

Their arrival is documented in "The New Brunswick Royal Gazette":

25th May 1819 - " (Halifax, May 18) - Two Transports have arrived from St. Kitts, with a part of the Royal West India Rangers under the command of Lt. Col. Lavicount. Sailed the 24th ult.; the Transports on board of which are the remainder of the Regiment were parted with on Tuesday last."

22nd June 1819 - "(St. John, June 16) - The Transport ships Buerdon, Abeona, and Star arrived here Thursday last from St. Kitts, via Halifax, having on board the Royal West India Regiment commanded by Lieut. Laviscount. This corps came here for the purpose of being disbanded which commenced yesterday and will probably be completed tomorrow. It is understood that such as wish to locate themselves in the Province will have lands alloted to them and farming utensils furnished; to those who wish to depart the place or settle themselves otherwise, an equivalent of ten pounds is Of those landed yesterday, and paid off, we were sorry to see very many intoxicated, and bidding fair to squander away the little pittance of which they are possesed, leaving them in a very few days objects of compassion, if not a charge to the parish. We are happy to say that not withstanding the disbanding of the above Regiment, added to which the vast number of emigrants within the last ten days amounting, it is said, in the whole to upwards of Two Thousand persons, our City is, comparatively speaking,

remarkedly quiet, and from the very effecient and united exertions of the civil and military authorities, we have every reason to suppose it will remain so.

Out of 530 only about 40 men have chosen to settle on land."

It appears that many of the above disbanded soldiers did not take up their grants of land. There were a number of reasons: The scattered settlements were a great distance from the major civil and commercial communities with the river as the best means of transportation. The growing timber industry drew many to the forest industry. Colonial administrators hoped to create a buffer zone settled by disbanded regiments and veterans of the War of 1812 -1814, such as the 104th Regiment as defence against American invasion.

A Petition to erect a new County (Carleton County) dated 1826. (Carleton County was established in 1831). Reference RS 34 - P4, Calenders of House of Assembly, Provincial Archives of New Brunswick, Fredericton, N.B.

" To His Excellency Sir Howard Douglas, Baronet, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief; and the Honorable His Majesty's Council; and the Honorable The House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened.

The Petition of the undersigned inhabitants of the parishes of Woodstock, Northampton, Wakefield, and Kent in the County of

York.

Most Humbly Sheweth

That your Petitioners are Inhabitants and Settlers in that part of the County of York which lies between the Meductic Falls, and the Canada Line, and from the many serious difficulties which they have to encounter in transacting their necessary business at the Shire Town, arising from the great distance at which they are placed from it, are induced most respectfully to submit the following statement of Facts to your Excellency and Honorable Houses in the hope that their case may be considered, and implicitly relying upon your goodness for affording them relief from the grievances of which they complain.

The County of York in its present state extends from about Three Miles below the Town of Fredericton to the Canada Line, embracing a space of nearly Three Hundred Miles; almost every part of which between Fredericton and the Great Falls is numerously settled, especially in those parts which border upon the River Saint John, and settlements are rapidly forming in the

Interior of the Woods;

That when any of your Petitioners who reside in the upper Districts of the County are obliged to repair to Fredericton, which frequently happens, either for access to the Public Records, or for any other necessary purpose, they incur a very considerable Expense, independently of the loss of time; the Traviling in the Spring and Fall Seasons, being very precarious, and the Roads in those seasons are for some time utterly impassable, especially in the said Upper Districts; and even in the lower Districts where the Roads are comparatively good. Your Petitioners have to encounter much difficulty and even danger in crossing the Eel River and Nackawickag Creek, as no bridges are built over these streams and the Current is very rapid during the Spring and Fall Freshets, and at many other times.

That many of the Back Settlements in the Parishes where your Petitioners reside, are Inhabited by Persons in low, or even indigent circumstances who have lately drawn land, the damage sustained by such Persons, when required to repair to Fredericton, either in obediance to Judicial sammonses to attend the Courts of Justice, or for any other purpose, is very great, as besides the expence, which is considerable, they are probably called away at a time when their utmost care and attention would be requisite in clearing their Farms, for it is at certain times that many parts of labor can be performed upon new Farms with any prospect of advantage, and these Persons cannot possibly return in less than Twelve or Fourteen days from the time that they leave their Farms.

One particular cause of great damage to them is that being absent from their Farms when the weather is favorable for burning the Timber which they had cut down during the preceding winter, the Crops which they raise (if any) are small and very unprofitable, and their Families are deprived of the benefits which might naturally be expected from their Industry.

That many crimes and misdemeanours are frequently committed in remote Districts of the County and the Perpetrators are suffered to escape punishment on account of the Expence which must be incurred in prosecuting such offenders to conviction; and the damage which would happen to the Prosecutors by loss of time &c

in attending the trial of the Criminal.

Your Petitioners humbly beg further to mention another well known source of inconvenience viz. that of being required to attend the Courts as Grand Jurors, as the Sheriff summons Persons for that purpose even from the Parish of Kent; those Persons have to travel, at their own charge, a distance of Eighty or Ninety Miles, and of course are constrained to remain in Town at least during the week which the Court sits, which together with the time required to travel to and from Town to their respective Homes, is generally a fortnight, or sometimes much longer; on this account it frequently appears that the most active and intelligent Persons in these Parishes, and who are most capable of serving as Grand Jurors, when summoned for that purpose, disobey the summons, choosing rather to pay the prescribed fine, than to incur the much greater expence of attending the Court at such a distance; by this means many nuisances which exist in their neighbourhoods are suffered to remain unnoticed, which is a damage to the Public in general.

That many of your Petitioners, being engaged in mercantile and other public business, also sustain great damage in the difficulty of obtaining payment of Debts due to them by Persons who reside in the Upper Parishes; when those Debts amount to a sum which is recoverable only in the Supreme or County Courts. The Sheriff fees alone, in such cases, for serving Writs and levying Execution, being charged from Fredericton to the place where the Defendant resides, frequently amount to Seven or Eight Pounds; the costs of suit being added to this amount to a very considerable sum; whereby your Petitioners are often times deterred from attempting to recover payment of their said Debts, as they are responsable for the costs of suit, if the Defendant's

Property will not satisfy the same.

Your Petitioners therefore, believing that by dividing the County, all these inconveniences would in a great measure be removed, do most humbly pray that your Excellency and Honorable Houses will be pleased to take the premises into your gracious consideration, and grant them relief from these grievances, by erecting the upper part of the County of York into a separate and Distinct County.





With the annual meeting of May 15, the Society moves into another year of activity. The success enjoyed by the Society is mainly a reflection of the efforts of a relatively small group that we tend to take for granted. On behalf of the Society I wish to extend a sincere vote of thanks to the members of the old executive, the chairpersons and workers of the several committees and to all those other

individuals whose contributions in time and effort are invalable to the Society's viability.

Among the activities of note over the last year was the huge sucess of the International Genealogical Workshop 1981. Despite the mail strike at a critical time, the support was most rewarding. As you will note elsewhere in this Newsletter, the 1982 workshop is well in hand for July 31 to Aug. 2, 1982.

Our first attempts as a publisher have also been a success. Dan Johnson and his committee have done a fine job of preparing a handy research aid on "NB Vital Statistics from Newspapers 1784-1815".
