Nova Scotia 1770 Census - Chicago Genealogical Society 49pp Reprint 1975 Index.

A Valuable work for people doing research in early New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Book contains the 1770 census for Amhurst, Annapolis, Barrington, Cumberland, Falmouth, Granville, Hillsborough, Horton, Lononderry, New Dublin, Onslow, Donegall, Sackville and Truro. The 1773 census for Yarmouth, 1775 census for Conway and Harbour of St. Johns River and the 1787 census for Queens Co., Nova Scotia are also listed. These records gives the name of the head of each household plus a breakdown of boys, women & girls in house and also religion and race of people listed. Copy of map from this book is enclosed in this Newsletter.



Antique Furniture by New Brunswick Craftsmen - Huia G. Ryder Paperback 1973 180pp 82 illus Index Bibliography

An excellent source book for anyone collecting New Brunswick Furniture or wanting to know more about this subject. Chapters are devoted to Furniture of the Acadians, of Saint John City & County, Charlotte Co., Sunbury Co., York Co., Albert & Westmorland Co., Northeast Counties, Northwest Counties and Portable or Campaign furniture prior to 1900. Also included is a list of early Cabinetmakers previous to 1900 and their dates of operation. The author gives a descriptive account of each Craftsmen and also has photos of their products whereever possible.

<u>Loggieville - Child of Miramichi</u> - James A. Fraser 1973 108pp illus Footnotes

This is the sixth major publication of the author. This book gives the history of Loggieville from its early beginnings in the 1800's to the 1960's. Notes on the early settlers such as: John Murdock, Duncan Robertson, Robert Logie, Duncan McCrae, John Blake, Philip Hierlihy, William Garden, Donald McCraw, Alexander MacDonald, Patrick Mealye and others are given. Life of the village, its Schools, Church, Companies, Societies and other occurrences are studied in detail.

SIFTING MAINE RESOURCES

by Lauralee Clayton, Editor, THE MAINE SEINE, Maine Genealogical Society

Since New Brunswick and Maine roots are often intermingled, readers may find themselves tracking ancestors and digging for evidence Down East. A four-pronged approach might not be a bad idea, in this case.

- 1. You might find help from joining the Maine Genealogical Society. Individual memberships are \$5 (as of March, 1982) or 7.50 (same household, family membership). Address to write is MGS, Box 221, Farmington, Maine 04938. The fast-growing organization has 953 numbered memberships since founding day back in 1976. Membership brings six issues a year of "The Maine Seine," and allows for free queries. Four meetings take place around the state each year.
- 2. The Maine Old Cemetery Association is a group you can join for \$3 a year, and you'll receive newsletters from MOCA which contains queries on Revolutionary War veterans. The address is 8 Greenaway Road, Springvale, Maine 04083. Special projects include the Surname Index Project, recordings of gravestone inscriptions around the state. Notebooks are housed at the state library in Augusta. You can write the SIP project at the state library address (below) and, for a fee, obtain data through the mail.
- 3. The Maine State Library and Maine State Archives are housed in The Cultural Building, Augusta, Maine 04333. Although staff members do not have time for specific research projects, at times they will search indexes upon request, to my knowledge. Microfilm readers at the archives and hundreds of volumes of genealogical interest as well as other resources are on tap for the visiting historian. At last report the state library did have Saturday hours; call first to confirm this information. You can find the building near the state capital, (visible due to its dome top).
- 4. Finally, try the Maine Historical Society, 485 Congress Street, Portland, Maine 04101. Corresponding genealogists can pay a one-time search fee for research in the stacks. Expect to pay a fee, also when you visit the library, which fairly bulges with resources, as well.

Other places to look are the Special Collections, Fogler Library, University of Maine at Orono; genealogical section of library at Bowdoin College!, Brunswick; genealogical collection at Bangor Public Library and Belfast Free Library, to name a few; and the Bath and Penobscot Marine Museums, the latter located in Searsport, Maine.

Four Maine newspapers carry genealogy columns with free queries on Maine roots and links; "The Maine Sunday Telegram" in Portland, Me. 04101; "The Courier-Gazette" at 12 Main Street, Camden, Me. 04843 (queries one to a file card, and capitalize names); "Family Album" in the Belfast "Republican 04976.

The Rankin Celebrations Days will be held on July 1-3, 1982 at Mabou, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. This brings together the descendants of John Rankin, the Emigrant who came from Scotland in 1801 to Mabou Harbour NS and his half brother, who landed at Mabou Coal Mines in 1830.

The Blois family reunion will be held on August 8-9, 1982 at West Gore N.S. This reunion was the brainchild of Ralph Blois of Oregon, USA who started a Newsletter Blois Voice in December 1980. This gathering brings together the descendants of Abraham Blois, Loyalist soldier who was given 200 acres of land in The Gore. This 200 acres is still in family hands.

The Blakeney family reunion will be held on August 25-27, 1982 at Halifax N.S. This reunion will be the 200th anniversary of the Blakeney family's arrival in Nova Scotia. The first Blakeney was a Loyalist soldier who received a land grant of 100 acres in Nova Scotia in November, 1782.

Dear Balch Family Member,

Are you aware of your possible ancestry? Can you trace your family lineage back to the

Allow me to introduce myself. My name is Jack R. Balch and I am the president of the Balch House Associates of the Beverly Historical Society. All this may not mean a thing to you but I am very proud of it as are all the members of our association and hopefully when you read what I have

to say, you to will be proud.

John Balch was born in either Horton or Bridgewater in Somersetshire, England in 1579. At this point begins a time covering some 44 years which we are still trying to piece together. We do know that in September of 1623, John came to the new world on board a ship under Captain Robert Gorges. The ship landed in Cape Ann, today called Gloucester, Massachusetts, where they set up a fishing station under the direction of the Dorchester Company. This was part of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. At this time John's occupation was listed as a "Salter", or one who salted fish to preserve them for shipping back to England. The fishing station was a failure and the Dorchester Company paid the men off and offered them passage home. John and several others decided to stay on. At this time the King presented John and several other men with 200 acres each. It was on this land, which is today Beverly, Massachusetts, that John built his home in 1636 and that home still stands today, not far from famed Salem. In 1650, an extension was built on the south side of the original house with a chimney between. In the northern part you can still see the original timbers, the summer beam, posts and rafters.

John Balch died in June, 1648, leaving his wife and three sons, Benjamin, John and Freeborn. Oldest son, Benjamin was the one who carried on the name. Benjamin had 13 children

and died at age 73 in 1703.

Since that time there have been many Balch family members who have contributed much to our great country. The second woman to ever be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize was Emily Greene Balch in 1946 and this is just one example.

We have a marvelously dedicated Geneologist who continues to labor over volumes of

paperwork in an unending attempt to fill the gaps in the family history.

The main reason for this letter is to make you aware of your possible heritage, and to extend to you an invitation to join the Balch House Associates. The dues is just \$5.00 per year and in these times that is a bargain. For this you receive a newsletter twice a year which will keep you up to date on the happenings at the Balch House and interesting stories about other members and history.

We have a family reunion every other year and the next one is in July, 1982 and it takes place at the Balch House in Beverly. The affair is a gathering of the Balches and friends from all over the country and lasts a good part of the day. It gives everyone a chance to get acquainted and we'd love to meet you there. Why don't you mark it on your calendar for 1982 and be there, I'll show you around the house which was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973, as the oldest

wood frame house with a documented history.

Please don't miss this opportunity for as it says in the Bible in the book of Proverbs. "Remove not the ancient landmark which your fathers have set, By wisdom a house built and by understanding it is established; by knowledge the rooms are filled with all precious and pleasent riches.'

Another Society formed last year was the Blackville Parish Historial and Library Society. Its area of concern is the Blackville Parish, Northumberland Co. Working on Census records, Cemetery records, preserving local records and this winter had a grant which involved taking oral history from older residents. JAMES HUGHSON

At the close of the American War of Independence (or American Revolution, depending on one's viewpoint) the thousands of colonials who had remained loyal to the British flag had little practical alternative but to emigrate, leaving behind homes, farms and most of their personal wealth and possessions. Accordingly, the British Parliament passed legislation permitting compensation for the losses incurred by the Loyalists. Claims for remuneration were to be brought before a commission in London. Many of these claims are on record at Public Archives in Ottawa.

In his claim, made in 1786, James Hughson states that he had been a farmer in Albany Co., N.Y., fled to NY City in 1776, served under Major Ward building Fort Delancey at Bergin Pt., arrived in Gagetown, N.B., July 15, 1783, removing to Belleisle after March 25, 1784. Attesting to the accuracy of the claimant's statement was Capt. William Harding, a name frequently found in various records concerning James Hughson and/or his family.

While the main influx of Loyalists to N.S. and N.B. arrived in 1783, an advance party of some 500 was to sail to Annapolis, N.S. in the Fall of 1782. Those who had signed on were to gather at one of three appointed embarcation points: Lloyd's Neck, Queen's Co., and Bergen. (Bergen Co. lies along the Lower Hudson River in New Jersey.) The agents at Bergen were: Rev. Dr. Seabury, Major Thomas Ward, Capt. George Harding, Capt. Frederick Hauser, William Harding and Joshua Pell. Some 110 settlers and dependents who had signed up at Lloyd's Neck did not get away until the Spring of 1783.

The 1782 Fall Fleetarrived at Annapolis on October 19, 1782. The Fleet consisted of nine ships, including the "Amphritite" and the sloop "Happy Couple", containing 360 settlers in all. One of these was Amos Botsford Esquire, attorney from Newton, Conn. Many of Mr. Botsford's personal papers, including a list of the heads of families in the 1782 Fleet, are in the keeping of Public Archives, Ottawa. The list includes the names James Houston, wife, 5 children, and James Houston Jr., as well as the names of William Harding, Major Thomas Ward. Several families named on the list crossed over to the St. John River of N.B. in 1783 and settled on parcels of land granted by the Crown.

William Harding lived in Ulster Co., N.Y., and joined the British forces in 1776, serving occasionally with Major Ward. After coming to Annapolis in 1782, he went to N.B. in April 1783 and settled in Majorville (Maugerville) on the St. John River near Gagetown. He subsequently resettled at Belleisle Bay near James Hughson, indeed their families petitioned together for a grant of some 1500 acres in Springfield Parish, Kings Co., N.B.

When Jacob Hughson, son of James, petitioned for land in Upper Canada in 1835, having moved there from N.B., he made several statements concerning the service of his father to the Royalist cause. The statements were witnessed and supported by a number of prominent citizens of N.B., viz. John Ward Jr., William Hardin J.P.

JOHN HUGHSON (1786-1860)

One of the puzzles confronted in writing the story of the Hughsons in New Brunswick has been that of the origins of John Hughson who in his later adult life resided in the Butternut Ridge area of Havelock Parish, Kings County. While simple proximity suggested a relation with the Springfield Parish Hughsons whose patriarch was James Hughson, Senior, a Loyalist from New York, there was no evidence, no record of family ties, no convincing similarity in the font names of the children.

Another Loyalist settler of New Brunswick was Gabriel Huston (or Huson, or Hughson). Dr. Esther Clark Wright states in "Loyalists of New Brunswick" that Sergeant Gabriel Huston of the Guides and Pioneers regiment settled on lot 125, Block 3, on the east side of the St. John River near Gagetown. The early Gagetown church records reveal that on February 17, 1790, several children of Gabriel and Jane Huson were baptized: Elizabeth (an adult), Daniel, James, Elpheus McKeel.

Also according to these records, Daniel Huson married Elizabeth Hicock of Waterborough, February 11, 1801. At least some of their children (baptismal dates) were: Samuel Morice (1803), Rebecca (1824), Charlotte (1823), Thomas Richard (December 13, 1829). The land transfer records for Queens County held at Gagetown indicate that a number of transactions were entered in respect of lands owned by Daniel and his son James. The lands in question were in Hampstead. Also owning lands in Hampstead were Andrew and Alexander Hueston (Hughson).

Again, the church records at Gagetown report the marriage on April 14, 1813 of John Houghson and Abigail Sharp of Waterborough. Abigail's brothers and sisters included William, John, Margaret and Simon.

In a letter dated December 19, 1978, Mr. Horace G. Hughson of Fredericton, a great-grandson of John and Abigail wrote that John and Abigail's children were named Sarah, Ann, Amey, Elizabeth, John, Jane, James and Adelaide. Another letter, August 14, 1977, by Mrs. Earl W. Walker contained the information that Andrew Huson had married (Margaret) Ann Price, had resided at Hampstead, and had died c.1844. His children were Adelaide Huson (born 1836 or 1838), Alexander Huson (born 1840), Clarissa Ann (born 1842) and another who had died in infancy.

Other bits of data that might be relevant to the Gabriel (Hughson) (Huson) Huston family are as follows:

- a) James Huson, in 1838, petitioned for permission to construct a grist-mill in Richmond, Parish of Woodstock, Carleton Co.; he was formerly of Waterborough.
- b) James Huson, in 1813, is mentioned in a St. John paper as a constable.
- c) Lydia Hussen and Benjamin Sweet married October 16, 1798, Gagetown.
- d) A Samuel Hughson married Caroline Ann Traviss daughter of Whitney Traviss of Portland Parish (St. John) July 22, 1818. (St. John newspaper?)
- e) New Brunswick Museum holds material containing references to Sgt. Garabet and Sgt. Gamaliel Hughson, of the Guides and Pioneers.

While the spelling of the name "Houston" places in doubt whether the person named on the Botsford list is James Hughson and not James Houston, the pregoing observations strongly suggest that the Hardings, Wards and Hughsons travelled very similar paths from 1775 to 1783. The circumstantial evidence points to the conclusion that James and James Jr. "Houston" may well have been "Hughsons". The index of land grants in N. S. lists such names as James Huston, James Hueston, James Hughston, but the insertion of the letter "t" in the name was, as often as not, an error.

The history of Sarah Ann Clark

In 1874 the Canadian government brought several families out from England to settle the land. They came in a sailing vessel and the journey lasted three weeks. They brought their clothing and some bedding. Some of the families included: Martin, Watts, Day, Hoar, Hunt, and Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Clark and their five children.

Sarah Ann Clark was fifteen years old at the time. She was working in England and was not anxious to come to Canada. But, she knew that if she did not come with her family it would be a long time before she would see them again. So, she consented to come.

They arrived in May, 1874 and travelled to Balmoral with teams of oxen. They were given land at the "height of land" where one can look down on a little lake called Martin's Lake. Each family was provided with a log cabin, a "Star" stove, a wooden table and benches and a bag of flour. As the English families had lived in towns they had some very difficult years.

Began To Clear Land.
The men started at once to clear the land and the women and children helped too. They cut down trees, burned the stumps to make it easier to remove them and planted potatoes among the ashes. With a wooden spoon they scooped the eyes, out of the potatoes, planted the eyes and ate the potatoes.

They regretted that they had left so many of their belongings behind them in England. Things that would have been so useful in their new life.

Sarah Ann and her sister walked out to Campbellton to do housework. Later Sarah Ann married George Day and they had two children. One day, George Day and Arthur Hunt were fishing on Martin's Lake (the old Martin house is still standing). Sarah Ann wondered why he had not come in to dinner. She ran down to the lake and saw the boat overturned and no sign of the men. Their bodies were never recovered from the lake.

Three Hundred Acres
Francis Roberts and his sons had

three hundred acres on the Roberts Road, now called St. Maure. Thomas, one of the sons, had a farm and was in much better circumstances at this time than the Clarks were. He had cattle and sheep and Thomas was a weaver. He had been married to Ellen Hoar. His marriage reads as follows in the marriage register: New Brunswick, Thomas William

Roberts of the Parish of Dalhousie in the County of Restigouche, bachelor and Ellen Hoar of the Parish of Durham in the same county, spinster, were married by bans at Durham this the first day of July in the year of our Lord, one thousand, eight hundred and sixty-seven (1867) by me, Angus McMaster, Presbyterian Minister, New Mills. In the presence of Charles Cook and William Gray.

Ellen died and left Thomas with four children. He married the widow, Sarah Ann, who had two children, on May 2, 1932. He drove out to Balmoral to the Clark home with a horse and sleigh where the wedding took place. He then took Sarah and her children to his home on the Roberts Road. Thomas and Sarah Ann had four children. There were ten children in all in the home along with Thomas' father, Francis making thirteen people altogether.

Cut and Sold Lumber

They took contracts for several thousand feet of lumber. Then they would travel into the South East to cut the wood. It was then traded with Jimmy Reid of Charlo for staples including barrels of pork.

They would cut cedar trees, slice them into blocks of a certain size and store them in the shed to dry. In the evening they would bring a block into the kitchen and with a two-handled knife, cut shingles. He would straddle the block and pull the knife toward him. The shingles were then sold in Dalhousie at twenty-five cents per bunch.

Kerosene oil for their lamps was twenty-five cents per gallon so they tried to save it as much as possible.

In 1900, Thomas bought an acre of land at the corner of the

Balmoral and St. Maure Roads where he built a home. He organized the first school district and was instrumental in having the Selwood school built.

The men called it "Selwood" because they sold wood to raise money to put up the building. Before that the children had to attend Eel River School, four miles away.

After some years, Mr. and Mrs. Roberts moved out to Dalhousie Junction. After the death of M1. Roberts, Sarah Ann lived with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Roberts at Dalhousie Junction. She died in 1934 at the age of 75.

She Reminisced

She often reminisced about the days when she worked for Farmer Combs at his cheese factory near Bath, England. She talked about those hard times the first years in Balmoral. She recalled how she would take a button, cover it with wool and flannel, put it into melted beef fat in a saucer, light it and that would provide light for the evening when she would be knitting and sewing for the family. She made candles out of beef tallow.

The French people in Balmoral helped them in many different ways. One family gave them a calf. Another family gave them a lamb. Sarah Ann's grand-daughter, June Arseneault of Dalhousie Junction has two coins and the trunk which her grandmother brought from England.

In the Riverview Cemetery there is a monument to Mary Hamilton, third daughter of Captain John Hamilton, wife of Peter Stewart. We do not seem to be able to find any more information about Captain John Hamilton's family such as, the number of children, where they lived after their parents went back to Scotland around 1838 and so on. Perhaps all of the family except Mary went back to the old country.

We know that John Hamilton had several lots when the town was divided, according to the map of 1822

Grants Obtained in 1800

In an article researched and written by Herman Morin for the Dalhousie Diamond Jubilee book dated 1965, he says: Grants of land within what are now defined as the town limits were obtained very early in 1800 and the first one was the grant. This included everything east of a line drawn from Barberie's Cove (then Arseneault's) to the upper end of Douglas Island then called Indian Island. This is no longer in existance. It has been transformed to warehouses and the Common User Dock.

Included in the first survey at that time were two lots to the south which are of interest. Lot number one, then granted to Louis Arseneault, was later acquired by Andrew Barberie, a descendant of French Huguenots from the Island of Jersey. They migrated from the United States at the time of the Revolution and entered Canada as Empire Loyalists.

The property was owned by the Barberie family for many years. Some of it was taken over by the government for the thermal plant and the original Barberie homestead was demolished.

A second lot of land, adjoining that granted to Louis Arseneault was granted to Joseph Arseneault who, on the 17th of July, 1807 also acquired the John Perry grant by purchase. In later years, part of the Perry grant was obtained by Dugald Stewart whose descendants still farm it, and part to John and William Hamilton.

The Hamilton section faced the Restigouche estuary and bordered on Goderich Street east, better known to older residents as Hamilton Avenue. John Hamilton built a beautiful home at the north west corner of his property, now called Adelaide Street Extension. The home will be described in another article.

· Pioneer Exporters

John and William Hamilton, the Montgomerys, Peter and Dugald Stewart, W.S. Smith, H & P Ramsay and R. Ritchie were the pioneer exporters of square timber. Fish was also very plentiful.

The merchants hired coopers such as Edward Harquail to build the barrels in which they shipped the salmon and other fish.

In 1832 fifty-two vessels were loaded at Dalhousie. From this settlement a considerable trade in timber and fish was carried on to Great Britain and with the growing timber exports, two shipyards were prepared to build vessels to carry forest products to British markets, The first vessel that was constructed was the 300 ton "Hamilton." Naturally they brought back supplies from the Old Country which they sold to the local settlers.

Early Wrights were artisans

As a suffix, "wright" means "maker."

Thus we find scores of names in the old English, such as Wheelwright, Cartwright, Copperwright and Shipwright, indicating makers of commodities and implements: Boatwright was a maker of boats, Shoewright would be shoemaker,

Used singly, "wright" referred to one who was regarded as a skilled artisan in various materials, and was often given in conjunction with the name of some craft. Later, Wright came to designate carpenters or craftsmen in general and gained popularity as an occupational surname. Today, it is America's 27th most popular surname with over 400,000 bearers.

Wright is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word — "wyrhta" which, like the Latinized form "faber," signifies a skilled workman of any kind, especially an artificer in wood or hard materials. And to this day the word wright in Scotland means a carpenter. Smith (or Gowan) was the general term for a worker in metals.

In Canterbury Tales, the early English poet, Chaucer, says:

"He was a well good wright -- a carpenter."

Way back then in old England, where family names were first assumed, he who wrought metals was called Smith, and he who wrought in wood was called

Old English forms of the name were Wryde, le Wryght, le Wricte, le Wrytte, Wrighte and Wryte. The family has been prominent in England for many centuries, especially in Suffolk, Kent, Surrey, Warwick, and Durham. Cranham Hall, in Essex, is one seat of the Wrights, and Bilham House, county York, another

ty York, another.
Wright's Park is well known in Scotland. And the Irish branch of the family was established by Ireland Wright, who migrated to the Emerald Isle during the time of Cromwell.

The name was first brought to Colonial America in the ship Fortune, by William Wright, who sailed from London about August, with his wife Priscilla, and arrived at Cape Cod (Plymouth) November 9, 1621.

Another early settler was Thomas Wright, who became deputy to the general court in Wethersfield, Conn. in 1643. His wife

was Margaret, widow of John Elson. Thomas was directly descended from one of the first to use the name of Wright in England, Sir John, Lord of Kelvedon Manor in "Ongar Hundred" Parish of Kelvedon Hatch, in County Essex. He was granted arms, June 20, 1509, and died in 1551.

In 1645 Benjamin, who had come from England, was a tanner and large landowner at Guilford, Conn. He had nine children, and from him descended Silas, a governor of New York and United States senator, and William, a governor of New Jersey and also a senator.

The Wrights have a notable record as state governors. Besides Silas and William, there was Sir James Wright, the last royal governor of Georgia. He was born in South Carolina in 1714, the son of Benjamin Wright who came to this country from County Durham, England. Robert Wright was governor of Maryland, and Indiana listed Joseph.

The Oyster Bay, Long Island, Wrights were founded by Peter and Nicholas. One of the most famous surgeons of his day was Dr. Thomas Wright of the Long Island branch. Dr. Thomas was an ardent patriot and served on board the privateer Grayhound during King George's war, from 1744-1748.

One of the founders of Methodism in this country was Richard Wright, who came over with Francis Asbury in 1771. Thomas Hynson Wright, a surveyor for Lord Baltimore, was one of the delegates to the Assembly at Annapolis in 1736. His son, Col. Thomas Wright, was delegate to the Colonial Convention of 1775, and the first military commander of Maryland forces during the Revolution.

Major Samuel Turbutt Wright, also of the Maryland family, was a hero of the Revolution and one of the principal leaders at the battle of Long Island, where it was that Maryland's heroic "400" fought so gloriously. Revolutionary rosters contain the names of many Wrights who served with distinction on both sides of the conflict.

In 1807, Stephen Wright and his partner, Charles Brown, built the first steamboat, the Clermont, for its inventor, Robert Fulton. Frances Wright, a social reformer, founded Nashoba, a community of

blacks to colonize Africa, in 1826. Benjamin Wright (1770-1842), pioneer civil engineer, supervised construction of the Erie Canal. Harry Wright (1835-1895), organized and managed the first all-pro baseball club.

Horatio G. Wright (1820-1899), military engineer, was a Uniongeneral in the Civil War. In 1893, Frank Lloyd Wright's first independent architectural commission was Winslow House in Chicago, later the Robie House. And on December 17, 1903, Orville and Wilbur Wright made the first successful flight of a large heavier-than-air machine at Kitty Hawk. North Carolina.

The 1790 census takers recorded 1,135 colonia! families answering to the names of Wright, Wrights, Write, Writes, Rite, Rites, Right and Rights. All 13 original states (except Rhode Island and Maine) were wel! represented by Wright households.

Today there are about 110 Wrights who have become famous because of their contributions to the progress and welfare of society, some of whom are among the 409 Seattle residents bearing the name.

The arms reproduced here were granted to the Wrights of Essex, England. No motto is given with this family insignia, which can be claimed by descendants of the pioneer Thomas, of Wethersfield, Conn. The leopards represent valiant warriors who undertook hazardous feats of force and courage.

"Per ardua" is the motto used by Irish Wrights on their coatarmour, which means: "I can go through difficulties."

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Control of the section of the

Ladies and gentlemen, it gives me great pleasure to present the first Annual Report of the President of the Saint John Branch of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society.

The Saint John Branch was born in April 1981 with the adoption of a Constitution by the membership and the subsequent ratification by the Executive of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society. If that was the birth of the Branch, then the conception must have occurred at Dan Johnson's course "Researching Your Family History" at UNBSJ in the winter of 1980. A group of interested graduates of the class got together for several informal meetings at various homes during the fall of 1980 to discuss their mutual interest genealogy. This was followed in January of 1981 by a public seminar on Genealogy, led by Mr. Bob Fellows from the Provincial Archives, and held at the Museum. As a result of the positive response to the Seminar, it was decided to form a Saint John Branch of the N. B. G. S. The rest is history. Our membership has grown from the handful that began the group until today we have a paid membership of 58.

I would now like to look in retrospect at the past year of our existence in an attempt to evaluate our progress:

There are several criteria which must be met if any organization or interest group like ours is to be successful. I would like to discuss how we have tried to meet these criteria.

First, there must be a strong well organized leadership. I believe we have been fortunate to have a dedicated, hard-working Executive for the past year. I would like to make particular mention of the outstanding contribution of three members of the Executive. Without the untold hours of work contributed by these three gentlemen, there would be no Saint John Branch. I am referring to Mr. Mac Heckbert, Mr. Lennox Bagnell and Mr. Dan Johnson. I would like to personally thank these three along with all the other members of the Executive for their efforts and support during the past year.

Second, there must be interesting, informative and relevant programming. During the past year we have had the following guest speakers: Professor Bill Spray, Joanne Claus, Margarite Dube, Peter Murphy (twice), Gregg Finley, Bob Boyce and Harold Wright. In addition, we had a special Sharing Session and an Irish Night. Hopefully each of those programs has contributed in some way to the knowledge and intellectual stimulation of the members and guests.

Third, there should be ongoing special projects which can involve the entire membership. During the past year, our main project was the alphabetizing of the 1851 Saint John Census. A great number of our members worked on this project in various ways such as copying, proofreading, sorting cards, typing, etc., and this is what has made it such a success up to this point. Last summer, with less than a week's notice, we manned an information booth at Brunswick Square during Loyalist Days. Several hunderd people visited our booth and this made us "visible" to a large segment of the population. Recently, we were invited to contribute articles to the New Brunswick Genealogical Society Newsletter and already, several articles have been published. We are at present sponsoring a course in Family History, taught by Dan Johnson every Thursday evening at the Museum.

Looking into the future, there are several projects which we can all look forward to and participate in. For example, we still have important decisions to make regarding the publication of the 1851 Saint John Census. In addition, we have been asked to host an International Genealogical Seminar in 1983. Also, there is the possibility of producing some television specials on genealogy for Fundy Cablevision, Channel 6.

As you can see, we have accomplished much in just one year of existence and I feel have met the criteria at least adequately. However, there are still many areas in which we can improve in order to serve our membership, the community and the field of genealogy. I would like to make some suggestions which I hope will be considered by the incoming Executive:

- 1. We should make an effort to really get to known each other better on a personal level. An attempt has been made to do this by the use of name tags, but I feel that additional areas should be explored such as a closing banquet, Branch sponsored field trips, etc.
- 2. A Committee system of organization should be adopted so that members of Committees would be selected from the general

membership, not just the Executive. This would generate more participation and take advantage of the talents of all our members.

- 3. We should strive to exhibit a higher profile in the community, in light of the increasing interest in history which is going to occur during the next three years.
- 4. We should work towards more profitable liaison with our sister genealogy Branches throughout the Province, as well as the parent body in Fredericton.

In closing, I would like to thank all of you for your interest, encouragement and support during the past year. I will look forward to working with all of you in the future.
