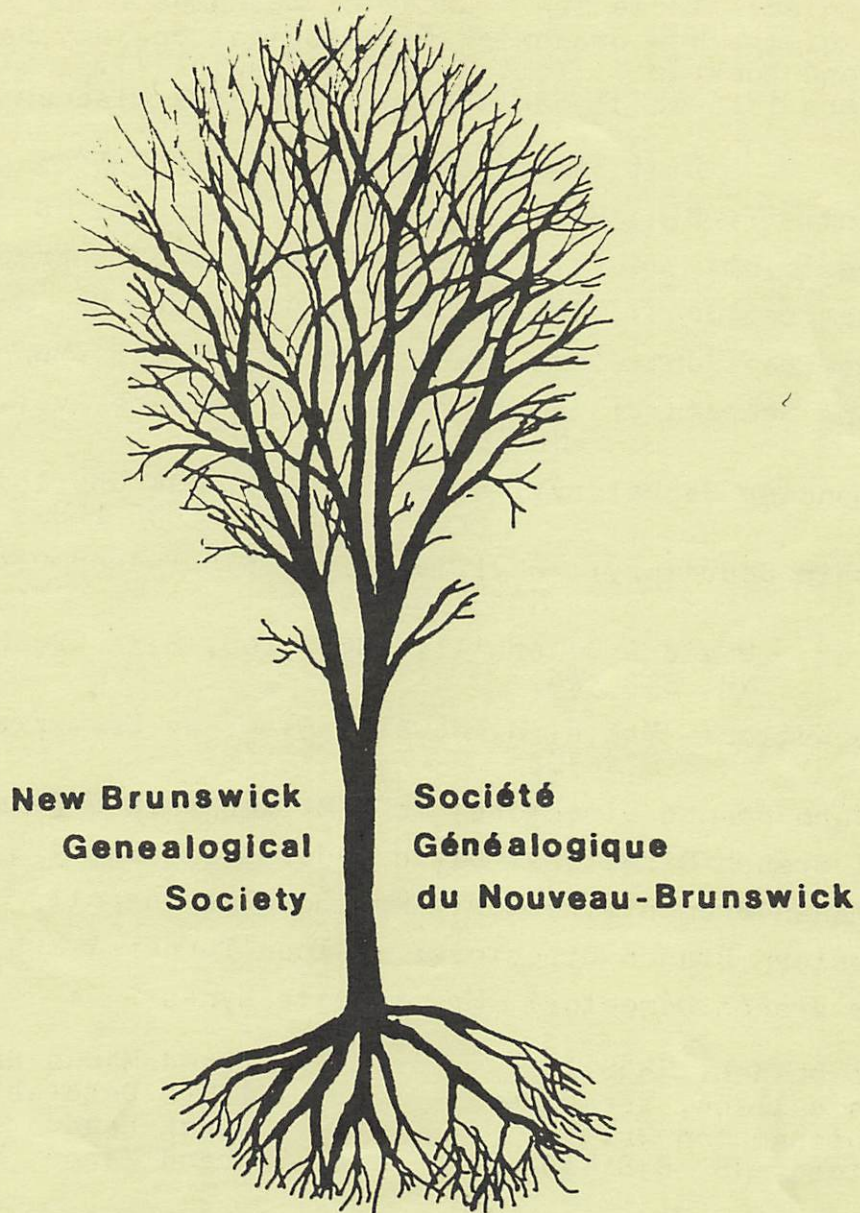

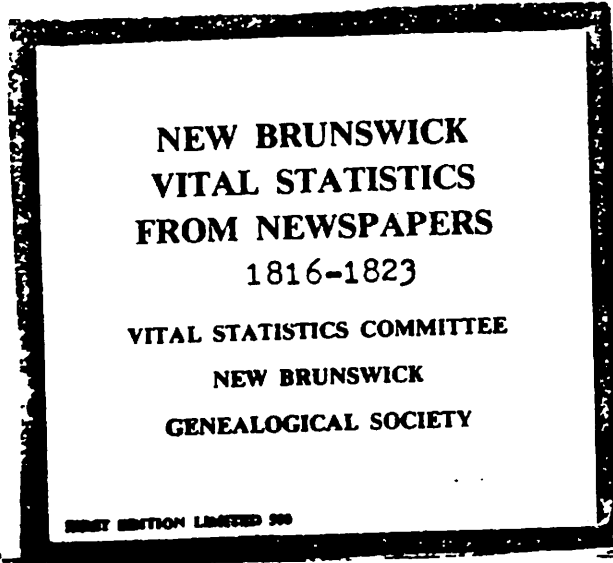

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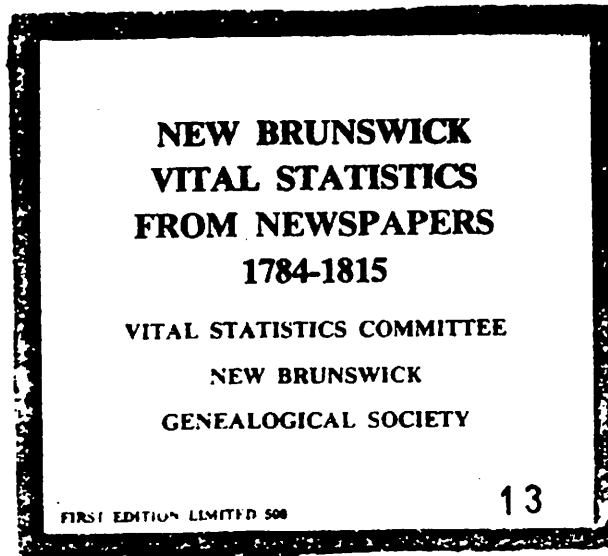

ANNOUNCING

The Irish Lumberman-Farmer

by Joseph A. King

Limited Edition, Privately Printed

254 pages, 75 photographs

If you have roots in Ireland, New Brunswick, Maine, Wisconsin, or Minnesota this book is a must.

If you are interested in a neglected area of American history--the role played by Irish lumbermen and farmers in the Maritimes and Maine and the West, this book is also a must.

The book focuses on several representative Irish families who emigrated between 1815 and 1845 to New Brunswick, Canada. It tells how these families adapted themselves to a new and often hostile environment, how they learned and sometimes invented the lumbering skills in the pine forests and on the rivers, how they carried these skills to such places as Aroostook County in Maine; Oshkosh, Wisconsin; Stillwater, Minnesota; and, in time, to the Pacific Northwest.

It is a history book. The chapter on Ireland draws on many primary sources--parish registers, tithe books, property valuations. It describes in some detail conditions that spurred emigration to places like Miramichi, New Brunswick. The chapter on the Atlantic Crossing tells of the dreadful conditions on the timber and passenger ships that carried the great bulk of emigrants from Great Britain and Ireland to Miramichi and other ports. The chapter on New Brunswick is all about ship-building, logging, farming, the history of the Catholic Church in Miramichi (and also of the Methodist Church in the community of Williamstown), relations between Catholics and Protestants, including some bitter feuding.

Two chapters deal with the emigration of large numbers of Miramichians to Maine, Minnesota, and Wisconsin. A description of the travel routes is included.

The author has reached certain conclusions--based on five years of research into census, surname, and genealogical data--that challenge the conventional view of historians on the role of the Irish (and Scots and Welsh) in the western agrarian economy.

The book has both a Surname and a General Index. The Surname Index contains over 500 names--Irish, English, Scottish, Protestant, Catholic. Extensive genealogies are included for some families (Fitzgeralds, Harrigans, Luceys, Sauntrys, Sullivans, et al.)

The author is a professor of English at Diablo Valley College, Pleasant Hill, California. He has written for genealogical and historical publications in the U. S. and in Ireland, as well as for such general circulation periodicals as Saturday Review and America.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY
CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

- Sec. 1 The name of the provincial society is The New Brunswick Genealogical Society (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the Society)
- Sec. 2 Affiliated branches are named The New Brunswick Genealogical Society, Branch (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the Branch)

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

- Sec. 1 To promote the study of genealogy and genealogical research in the Province of New Brunswick.
- Sec. 2 To encourage the establishment of Branches which will further the objectives of the Society.
- Sec. 3 To encourage accuracy and thoroughness in research.
- Sec. 4 To encourage and instruct members in the ethical principles, scientific methods and effective techniques of genealogical research through publications and workshops.
- Sec. 5 To assemble a library of genealogical guides, handbooks, reference sources, family and local histories, and other books and materials which may assist the members, all of which will be available to the members.
- Sec. 6 To establish friendly relations with other genealogical societies for exchange of ideas and information and the promotion of common interests.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Membership in the Provincial Society is open to individuals interested in genealogy on (a) a direct basis (b) through membership in a branch association.

ARTICLE IV - EXECUTIVE

- Sec. 1 New Brunswick residents holding individual membership in the Society are eligible for election to any office of the executive.
- Sec. 2 The executive is composed of the following officers: Immediate Past President, President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Branch Representatives. The President of each Branch or another named by the Branch in his stead.
- Sec. 3 The affairs of the Society are managed by an executive committee which is composed of the officers of the Society.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

- Sec. 1 An annual meeting of the Society is held in May of each year for the election of officers, the presentation of reports, the appointment of an auditor or auditors, the determination of policy, and the general direction of the Society.
- Sec. 2 Special and other general meetings of the members are called by the executive on its own initiative, and by the executive on the petition of 10% of the members in good standing.
- Sec. 3 The quorum for the annual meeting shall be 12 members in good standing present in person.

ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

- Sec. 1 Elected officers and branch representatives shall serve for a period of one year or until their successors are elected.
- Sec. 2 No person shall be elected president for a period in excess of two successive years.

ARTICLE VII - BY LAWS

By-laws may be enacted to govern the conduct of the Society

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

- Sec. 1 Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed by the executive or to the executive in writing sixty days prior to the annual meeting or to any general meeting that may be called for a special purpose.
- Sec. 2 The membership of the Society shall then be given at least thirty days clear notice of the intention to propose such amendments at the next annual general meeting or at a special general meeting called for the purpose.
- Sec. 3 Any amendments to the Constitution and By-laws must be confirmed by at least two-thirds of the votes cast.

ARTICLE IX - DISSOLUTION

In the event of the dissolution of the Society and after payment of all debts and liabilities, the remaining property of the Society shall be transferred for safe-keeping to the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick or other similar organization dealing with the preservation of historical and genealogical source material, as determined by the membership of the Society at the time of dissolution.

If the Society should be re-activated within five (5) years from the date of dissolution, those properties of the Society entrusted to the organization chosen shall be turned over to the re-activated Society by the said organization. If however, re-activation does not take place within the stipulated five (5) years, those properties of the Society entrusted to the organization chosen will become the property of the said organization.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY
BY-LAWS

1. MEMBERSHIP

- (1) Any person interested in the objectives of the Society and willing to subscribe to its by-laws may become an individual member upon payment of dues as hereinafter provided.
- (2) Membership is of the following classes:
 - (1) Provincial Society Membership:
 - a) Individual. Open to any person wherever resident
 - b) Family. Open to any family wherever resident. Each family member shall have individual membership status.
 - c) Affiliate. Open to any member of a branch of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society.
 - d) Institutional. Open to museums, libraries, or educational institutions interested in supporting the aims of the Society.
 - e) Honorary. Granted by the Executive to deserving individuals who have rendered long or distinguished service to the Society or the Province.
 - (2) Branch Membership: Membership in a Branch of the Society is limited to the activities of that Branch and does not extend to membership in the Society other than as an affiliate.
- (3) Membership is deemed to have lapsed if a member's annual dues are not paid within thirty (30) days of the date due, and the member shall no longer be considered a member in good standing; but membership may be immediately revived upon payment of such dues.
- (4) Any member who allows his membership to lapse, who resigns or withdraws, forfeits all rights to or claims upon the Society's funds and effects.
- (5) Beginning as of May first membership is effective for the ensuing twelve months.

2. DUES

- (1) Annual membership dues are set by the Executive and voted upon by the membership in a general meeting.
- (2) Membership dues for the Provincial Society and for each of the Branches are set and administered by their respective executives.
- (3) Branches may collect Society dues and forward them to the Treasurer.

3. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE EXECUTIVE

- (1) The Executive of the Provincial Society, subject to the by-laws or to the directions given to it by a majority vote of any general meeting properly called, has full control and management of the affairs of the Society and the custody and control of all its property of whatever kind, may enter into contracts of employment, and may borrow and otherwise deal with money.
- (2) When a vacancy, by death or resignation, occurs between Annual General Meetings, the Executive has authority to appoint someone to fill the vacant office until the next Annual General Meeting.
- (3) The Executive appoints the following to carry out programmes and projects of the Society:
 - Membership Committee Chairman
 - Programme Committee Chairman
 - Public Relations Officer
 - Librarian
 - Publications Chairman
 - Such other Committee Chairmen or Officers as the Executive decided to appoint.
- (4) Appointed chairmen or officers serve one year or longer at the discretion of the Executive.

4. DUTIES OF MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE

- (1) The President is ex officio a member of all committees. When present, he presides at all meetings of the Executive. Subject to the by-laws or to the directions given by a general meeting or a meeting of the Executive, he is and performs the functions of the chief officer of the Society.
- (2) A Vice President performs the functions of the President when the President is unable through illness or absence; and he has such other responsibilities as are assigned to him by the Executive from time to time.
- (3) The Secretary
 - a) makes an adequate and accurate record of the proceedings of all meetings of the Society and the Executive.
 - b) has charge of the Seal of the Society, which seal whenever used is authenticated by the signature of the Secretary and the President.
- (4) The Treasurer
 - a) received all money paid to the Provincial Society and is responsible for the deposit of the same in whatever bank the Executive orders.
 - b) properly accounts for all funds of the Provincial Society and keeps such books as are directed.
 - c) presents to the Executive a full detailed account of the receipts and disbursements whenever requested.
 - d) prepares and presents to the Annual General Meeting of the Provincial Society a statement setting forth the financial position of the Society, which statement is audited.
 - e) submits a copy of the annual financial statement to the Secretary for inclusion in the Secretary's records of proceedings.
- (5) The Secretary and Treasurer may be one person.
- (6) Other Officers shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them from time to time by the Executive or by a general meeting.

ANNUAL AND GENERAL MEETINGS

- (1) At any general meeting other than the Annual General Meeting only such business is dealt with as is specified in the petition or the summons to the meeting.
- (2) Every member is given thirty days' notice, to his last known address, of the intention to hold a special or other general meeting or an Annual General Meeting, together with notice of the place and time of the meeting and the purpose of the meeting.


ELECTION OF OFFICERS


- (1) At least three months prior to the Annual General Meeting of the Provincial Society the Executive shall appoint a Nominating Committee of three members.
- (2) The Nominating Committee shall report its nominations to the President at least one month prior to the Annual General Meeting and the membership shall be notified at least two weeks before Annual General Meeting of the Provincial Society.
- (3) Further nominations may be placed on the floor of the Annual General Meeting, providing that the written consent of the nominee has been received by the Secretary of the Society.
- (4) Every person nominated shall be a member in good standing of the Society, and a letter of acceptance shall be filed with the Secretary of the Society.

BRANCHES

- (1) The Executive of the Provincial Society encourages and arranges for the formation or the recognition of Branches of the Society in any city, town, or other district in the province where at least twenty (20) persons signify their desire to be so recognized as a Branch and in writing confirms to the Branch the establishment of such Branch.
- (2) The objectives of any Branch are the same as those of the Society.
- (3) The powers of any Branch are those conferred upon the Society; and a Branch enacts such by-laws as are required for its own good government, provided that such by-laws are not inconsistent with the by-laws of the Society and a copy of the by-laws is lodged with Secretary of the Society.
- (4) Branches forward notification and minutes of meetings to the Provincial Society Executive Committee and makes annual reports to the Annual General Meeting of the Society; including a President's Report and an audited Treasurer's Report.
- (5) The management of each Branch is vested in an Executive Committee of the Branch elected at its own Annual Meeting.
- (6) The Branch is represented on the Executive of the Provincial Society by its president or another individual chosen in his stead.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY LOYALISTS

Charlotte County was one of the eight original counties formed when New Brunswick became a separate entity in 1784. This county was largely settled by Loyalists of several main groups: Loyalists of the Penobscot Association, consisting mainly of people from Fort George on the Penobscot River, Massachusetts (now Maine), who settled in and around Saint Andrews; Loyalist Quakers, who settled at Beaver Harbour; Loyalists of the 74th Association, men and officers of the Argyll (Scotland) Highlanders, who had been stationed at Fort George on the mouth of the Penobscot River, Massachusetts, and who settled on Passamaquoddy Bay; and Loyalists of the Port Matoon Association, composed mainly of privateers and civil army employees sent from New York to Port Matoun, Nova Scotia in November 1783, and hence to St. Stephen, Charlotte Co., in Spring 1784. Others who had belonged to the Cape Ann Loyalist Association of Massachusetts also settled in the area. The following are short sketches of some of these Loyalists. Sources used include: D.R. Jack, "New Brunswick Loyalists of the American Revolution", New York Genealogical and Biographical Record, Vol. 35(1904) to Vol. 40 (1909) - an early list of N.B. Loyalists serialized in six volumes; E.C. Wright, Loyalists of New Brunswick; and various Charlotte County settler's lists.

CLINDENAN, Andrew: a member of the Cape Ann Assoc. In 1785, he was settled on Passamaquoddy Bay, a single man. In 1813, he was a lieutenant of the militia, settled in St. Stephen/St. David Parish, with a family of thirteen members.

COLLINS, James: from Penobscot River, Massachusetts, he was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. He was settled at Pennfield, N.B., in 1783. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. He died in 1804, leaving four sons.

DOWLING, John: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc., and had served with the Nova Scotia Volunteers during the Revolutionary War. One of this name lived in New York City at some time during the War. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he was living on 150 acres in St. Andrews Parish, with his wife and one child.

FAIRLAMB, Samuel: from Chesterborough, Pennsylvania, a Quaker. In 1778, he was attainted of treason and had his estate confiscated. In July 1784, he was living at Belle Vue, Beaver Harbour with his wife Hannah & two children under the age of ten: John and Samuel.

FIELDER, George: a Quaker from Pennsylvania. By the Pennsylvania Act of 1778, he was attainted of treason with a Daniel and Gilbert Fieldes. By July 1784, he was settled at Belle Vue, Beaver Harbour.

GRACE, Thomas: During the War, he served with the Ordnance Department. He was a member of the Port Matoon Assoc. In 1784, he was a grantee at St. Andrews. He also received a grant at Schoodic River (St. Stephen). In 1815, living in St. Stephen Parish were: John and Thomas Grace.

GRANT, William: originally from Keith, Scotland. During the War, he served as a Quartermaster with the 71st regiment. He was a member of the Port Matoun Assoc., and received land on the Schoodic River (St. Stephens). He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784, and also received a grant at St. George. Living in St. Stephen Parish in 1815 were: William Grant Sr. and William Grant Jr. He died at St. Andrews in 1831.

HALL, John: he was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. In 1784, he was a grantee of St. Andrews. Around 1785, he was living in St. Andrews Parish on 250 acres, with his wife and two children. He was one of the first Vestrymen at All Saints Church, St. Andrews.

HENDERSON, Hugh: from New Hampshire. In 1778, he was proscribed as a traitor and banished from that state. One of this name lived in New York City at some time during the War. In July 1783, he petitioned for land in Nova Scotia. In 1784, he was a grantee at St. Andrews. One of this name settled in the Passamaquoddy area. One of this name served with the 74th regiment, and received land on the Digdeguash River.

HITCHINGS, Amos: from New Hampshire. He was a member of the Cape Ann Assoc., with Josiah and David Hitchings. He was also a member of the Penobscot Assoc., and was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. He received a further grant in St. David Parish. He was a builder by trade.

JOYCE, James: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc., and was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he was living in St. Andrews Parish, on 250 acres, with his wife and four children. Also living in St. Andrews Parish, at the same time, was a John Joice, a single man.

LAMMEY, Hugh: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc., and was a grantee of St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he was living in St. Andrews Parish, on 50 acres with his wife.

LITTLE, Samuel: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. In July 1784, he was settled at Belle Vue, Beaver Harbour with probable wife Martha, children over the age of ten: Benjamin and William, and children under the age of 10: Mary and Patty. He later received a grant at Passamaquoddy Bay.

LUMSDEN, George: from New Haven Connecticut, a shoemaker by trade. He arrived in New Brunswick, May 1783, aboard the ship "Union", accompanied by his wife, one child over the age of ten and three children under ten. In July 1784, he was settled at Belle Vue, Beaver Harbour, with his probable family: wife, Elizabeth, two children over the age of ten: Elizabeth and George and two children under the age of ten: Samuel and Stephen.

MARTIN, Andrew: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc., and was a grantee of St. Andrews in 1784. He was an innholder, proprietor of the "St. Andrews Coffee House". He died before August 1795, at St. Andrews. His wife was Charity.

CHARLOTTE Co. LOYALISTS p. 3

MILLEKIN, Benjamin: from Union River, Massachusetts (now Maine). He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc., with Benjamin Jr. Both received a townlot at St. Andrews in 1784. Benjamin Jr. returned to the U.S. Around 1785, Benjamin Sr., was living in St. Andrews Parish, on 350 acres, with his wife and 6 children. He died at St. Patrick, before December 1806.

MOORE, Robert: from New Hampshire. He was a member of the Cape Ann Assoc. In Sept. 1785, he had settled in the Passamaquoddy area, a single man. He died, before May 1805, at St. David Parish, Charlotte Co. His wife was Mary.

NASH, Samuel: from Connecticut. On 14 July 1779, he married Martha Place at Smithtown, Long Island, New York. In July 1784, he lived at Bellevue, Beaver Harbour with his wife Martha and daughter Martha (under the age of ten). He received a townlot at Parrrtown in 1784. He later removed to Upper Canada.

REIDHEAD, William: He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he was living in St. Andrews Parish, on 100 acres, with his wife and one child. He later removed to the U.S.

ROSS, Thomas: a mariner from Falmouth, Massachusetts (now Maine). He was proscribed as a traitor and banished from the State of Mass., Sept. 1778. He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he lived in St. Andrews Parish, with a wife, six children and five servants. He later settled on Grand Manan Island. He died in 1804.

SALT, Maurice: He was a shipwright by trade. He was a member of the Port Matoon Assoc., and received a grant at Schoodic River. He was a grantee of St. Andrews in 1784, and was one of the first Vestrymen at All Saints Church, St. Andrews.

SAVELLE, Jesse: from Providence, Rhode Island. He was a member of the Cape Ann Assoc., with his brother Thomas. Thomas had been an officer of the Customs at Providence. Both received grants in St. David Parish. Both returned to the U.S., and died at Gloucester, Massachusetts.

SELLARS, Robert: He served with the 74th Regiment during the War, and received a grant within his regimental block on the Digdeguash River. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. He lived in the Passamaquoddy area in 1784. In May 1785, he had land on the Schoodic River. Living in St. Stephens Parish in 1815 was a Charles Sellers.

TAYLOR, Gillam: During the War, he served with the Commissary-General's Department. He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785, he lived in St. Andrews Parish with his wife, two children and two servants. In 1785, he was the Assistant Commissary at St. Andrews. He died at Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1843, aged 86.

THORNTON, Matthew: from New Hampshire. He was a member of the Penobscot Assoc. He was a grantee at St. Andrews in 1784. Around 1785 he lived in St. Andrews Parish on 400 acres, with his wife and seven children. Living in St. Stephens Parish in 1815 were: Matthew Sr. and Matthew Jr.

WHITE, Amos: A Quaker. In July 1784, he lived at Bellevue, Beaver Harbour, with his wife Ann, two children over the age of ten: Jonathan and Margery, and two children under the age of ten: Amos and Moses.



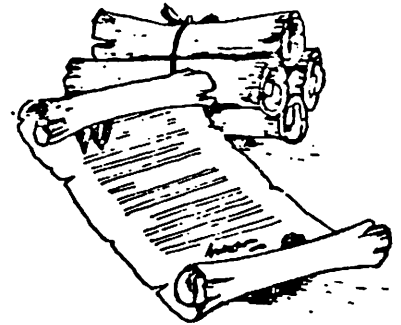

The Arran Clearances

On March 28, 1829 a group of Scots left the Port of Lamlash on the Isle of Arran on the brig "Corsair." Captain Hamilton was in command of the vessel.

The group sailed to Dalhousie, New Brunswick and settled along the Restigouche River. This was part of the first group. Others of the same group continued coming to this area until 1840 when close to 400 had arrived.

Their reason for settling in the New World is rather interesting. Their leases had expired in this year and the Duke of Hamilton would not renew them. He wanted to raise sheep on the land.

Some of the names of the Arran settlers include: Black, Brown, Cook, Murphy, Crawford, Currie, Ferguson, Gray, Hamilton, Harvie, Henderson, Jamieson, Kelso, Kerr, Love, Lowe, McAlister, McAllister, McAlester, McCormack, McCurdy, McDonald, McKenzie, McKinnon, MacMillan, MacMillen, McNeil,

McNeish, Murchy, Marchy, Murdoch, Nichol, McNicol, Pettigrew, Robertson, Stewart, McIntyre, Sillars and Wright.

Land Was Divided

In 1796, Burrell, manager of the Hamilton estate drew up plans for clearances so the natives knew this was coming. Some of them arrived on the Restigouche before 1829. A group of men made application for land in Point La Nim in 1820 and they had to be in this country for three years before applying for land. So when the Arran Settlers came between 1829 and 1840 some of their countrymen were here to meet them.

The clearances in Arran were achieved by the merging of small farms to create larger units. The Duke of Hamilton stipulated the type of farming to be carried on by the farmers. The result of these improvements was to displace many families from the land. As compensation the Duke of Hamilton offered to secure for each man over twenty-one, one hundred acres of land in Ontario or Upper Canada and 50 per cent of the cost of his passage. The colonists, however, refused to move to Ontario. Many of the settlers came out on the "Caldeonia" and settled in Megantic County, Quebec.

Memorial Unveiled

On May 9, 1977 a memorial was unveiled at Lamlash, Isle of Arran

Besides the unveiling, there was a Thanksgiving service at Sannox Church. It included a pantomime by the school children, a tour of Brodick Castle, a bus tour of the island and a reception by Lady Jean Ford, laird of the island at her sixty-room home.

On Tuesday morning August 7, 1979, it was off to Old Scotland and merry England for 48 members of the Caledonian Society of Restigouche. They spent a night on the Isle of Arran, visited the monument, attended a service at Lamlash church and ceilidh at the hotel in Brodick. They also toured other places in Scotland and the city of London.

Survey of Reserve Lands on South West Miramichi River
-George Morehouse
-Deputy Surveyor

Surveying of these Reserves began on May 30, 1818 and concluded on June 29, 1818. Five men were hired from Fredericton area to help in this job. They were Mr Gower, Mr Plham, Mr Bain, Mr James Worth and Mr John Worth. While on the Miramichi, he hired Michael Campbell, John Rogers, David Porter and Daniel Lyons. During his stay, while not camping out in the wilderness, he stayed at John Astle's, Thomas Smith's, William Rogers' or at Indiantown (Quarryville). Provisions for the men were purchased at Thomas Smith's store on Barnaby Island or the store at Beaubears Island.

His Survey included Reserves # 2, 3, and 4. Reserve # 2 contained land bordering on both sides of Barnaby River and on Barnaby Island. Reserve # 3 contained land bordering on Renous River, Indian Brook or Reserve Brook, Dungarvon River, Bartholomew River and on both sides of Southwest Miramichi River between Quarryville and Blackville. Reserve # 4 contained land bordering on Etienne River (Cains River), Savoy's River (Sabbies River), Salmon Brook and on both sides of Miramichi river for above five miles above junction of Cains River and Miramichi River.

BEAVER HARBOUR, BELLEVU - THE PENNFIELD COLONY AND A SHORT HISTORY
OF SOME OF THE FIRST FAMILIES

To get a clear understanding of the history of Pennfield Colony and Bellevu, one should go back to earlier days and find why and how these people came to settle there.

During the Monmouth Rebellion in England there was a group of people called Society of Friends or Quakers who refused to take up arms against Catholic King James II and for this they were branded as rebels and may were thrown into prison and suffered great persecution.

This led to many of them leaving England and coming to Penn.

Now, years later, for almost the same reason the descendents of these people were leaving Pennsylvania and migrating to Canada because they would not swear allegiance to the United States of America against England and in 1783 one group under the leadership of Joshua Knight made arrangements to go to Nova Scotia as New Brunswick was then called.

Early in 1773 Joshua Knight had sought protection from the British in New York and he and many of his followers went there. Joshua Knight was a man of prominence from Alington, Penn. He was descended from Elizabeth Shorter, wife of John Rush Sr., captain of the horse under Cromwell.

In June 1783, a group of people met at the home of Joshua Knight in New York and a month later the following advertisement appeared.

NOTICE

Notice is hereby given to those of the people called Quakers who have entered into an agreement to settle together in Nova Scotia that they are requested to meet at the house of Joshua Knight No. 30 Chatham Street a little above the Sea Water Pump on the seventh day next of the 5th of July at four o'clock in the afternoon in order to conclude upon some matters of importance to them and those who mean to join the above mentioned body.

They are requested to call at No. 188 Water Street between the Coffee House Bridge and the Fly Market and have their names entered as soon as possible. No slave master admitted.

It is interesting to note that the Quakers were antagonists of slavery eighty years before Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation.

The place chosen for settlement through John Parr of Halifax and Governor Carleton was Beaver Harbour or Bellevu. There were 149 lots laid out as first grants which was soon followed by 950 with 15 streets and 800 residents incorporated June 4th, 1785. Three agents were appointed. Samuel Fairlamb, John Rankin and George Brown.

There are only two families living on original grants at the present time. I. L. Wright direct descendant of Elias Wright - Loyalist, Alvah Eldridge direct descendant of William Eldridge - Loyalist.

Among the early settlers who migrated to Beaver Harbour were Caleb and Jonathan Paul sons of James Paul of Warminster, Penn. They were members of the Horsham Quaker Meeting, Penn. Caleb Paul married Joshua Knight's sister Priscilla. He had the first crown grant to the Eastern Wolves Island 500 acres. 20 acres on the west side of the harbour and a town lot. Jonathan Paul owned the land on the opposite side of the harbour. He was a ship builder. We have no record of his marriage which took place in Penn. He had several children, Eliza Ann married William Melony of St. Andrews, Jacob married Lydia Thompson of St. Andrews and Joshua married Elizabeth Stinson of St. Andrews.

Jonathan Paul was burned to death at his home in Woodlands. The name Woodlands was given to this property at a later date by the wife of William Lockett, Lady Ann Lockett. She named it after her family's estate in England. Ellen Lockett, daughter of William and Ann married Daniel Justason of Pennfield and they lived at Woodlands until the property was purchased by Millen McDowell from members of the Thompson and Parker families heirs of the Jacob Paul property. Ellen and Daniel Justason were the grandparents of Mrs. Grovenor Wright and Mrs. Allen Paul of Beaver Harbour.

The settlers were brought to Bellevu in ship under convoy. One being the Camel 293 tons Captain William Tinker. It was late in August before the last ones landed and they suffered many hardships the first winter.

Among the records of the Pennfield Colony we find the following.

SAINT JOHN BRANCH - NBGS.

Agreed by the said Company that they do meet on the seventh day of the week and the 16th of the 7th month to build a meeting-house, this house was to be 25 feet long, 20 feet broad and 11 feet high, this was to be used by the Quakers. We also find among the records of 1785 where land was cleared for a burying-ground. This piece of land is now the property of the Baptist Church, Beaver Harbour. There are no stones to mark it as a burying-ground because the Quakers did not believe in markers for the dead. Members of the Knight and Cross families are buried there. Burials have been made at a later date, however, the last known being that of Asa Best son of John and Ann Best. This burial was made about 75 years ago and the grave was marked until recent years.

The last entry in the old Pennfield Records written by an unknown hand reads as follows: "At a meeting of Friends at the Meeting-House, Beaver Harbour for settling the business of the Society on the 10th day 3 m. 1789, Jacob Buffington, John Dennis, Daniel Registrar and Richard Mead were appointed a committee to examine the accounts and proceedings of the committee who distributed the provisions which were received from friends from England for this place and to report thereon." Little by little it became evident they could not make a living here. In 1789 the Affairs of the Association were closed up.

In 1790 the place was destroyed by a forest fire, only one house was saved, that of Elias Wright, the meeting house and all the records were lost.

Elias Wright was a magistrate and also a grantee of Saint John. He married Mary Walton, daughter of Jesse Walton. He died in 1825, age 76 years.

In 1794 we have the record of the marriage of Joshua Knight to Jane Vernon, daughter of Moses Vernon. This was a Quaker wedding at Pennfield.

After the fire many of the settlers moved back to Pennfield Ridge, Pocologan, New River and Mace's Bay, in fact Mace's Bay was first settled by five loyalist families from Beaver Harbour. The dream that Joshua Knight had of a large colony with Bellevu as its city was now crushed and only a few struggling settlers remained to build up the little village of Beaver Harbour.

The following appears in the Winslow papers, 1803, "Parish of Pennfield, population 54".

Gradually more families began moving into Beaver Harbour. There was plenty of land for all as the first settlers had left their grants. These people settled on small farms, they fished and farmed for a living. There were two saw mills which cut about 400,000 feet of boards. Two vessels were built at Beaver Harbour about 250 tons. They made excellent farmers and lived quite comfortably. These people were Anabaptists and Anglican and a few Quakers by faith.

During the days of the Fenian Raids the people lived through days of anxiety and the men of the village took turns doing guard duty. Armed with muskets and clubs they guarded the shoreline and roads entering the village to warn the people of any invasion, but the Fenians never did arrive and their fears gradually abated. We have, however, several cases of plundering. The following example is taken from a Saint John paper under the date June 17th, 1813, the editor remarks "It is reported that last week the privateer whaleboat "Weasel" Daniel Snow commanding, mounting one gun of small caliber and manned by eight men from Castine, Maine put into Beaver Harbour where they plundered the inhabitants of that place. Mr. Wright and Mr. Young were, we understand, the principal sufferers. These mauraders plundered them of almost every thing they could lay their hands on, taking even the wearing appar-

el of the women and children."

A letter written in simple language dated June 10th, 1913, presumably by Mr. Wright giving details of the scurvy treatment that he and his neighbours underwent at the hands of the gang. I wish to inform you for the good of the public that on the night of the 8th inst., there came to my house twelve or fifteen men in a boat and with a crow bar broke open the door and robbed me of 300 lbs. of sugar, nearly a barrel of coffee, 200 lbs. of dried meat, my wife and daughters' clothes, 2 pr. boots, all my fishing lines, part of a barrel of molasses, part of a cask of nails, a large trunk filled with small articles, one piece of dowlas, one and one-half gross of Cod hooks, several padlocks, several gross of buttons, four lbs. powder and many other articles. They went to Captain Young's house and robbed him of ten lbs. of sugar, seven pieces of broadcloth, six pieces of cotton and all his wife and children's clothing. They also took Captain Cross' boat and fishing lines, etc. After loading Captain Cross' boat and their own with plunder they said they were sorry that they had no more boats to load. The sturdy men of Charlotte County were not the kind to be overawed and stand idly by while their friends and neighbours were being robbed. A number of them collected and manning three boats went after the buccaneers put them to rout and drove them ashore. Another time they sailed into the Harbour under cover of darkness and stole nearly all of George Wright's flock of geese. One of the group made a bag with a piece of sailcloth or canvas, they put a penny in the bag for each goose stolen and tied it around the gander's neck with the following note.

"Mr. Wright: We bid you goodnight. We stole your geese at a penny apiece and left the pay with the Gander."

This petty plundering was carried on under the plea of legitimate warfare for although these small boats could not in any manner be described as sea-going vessels yet they all acted under a commission of the President of the United States of America which entitled them the treatment of prisoners of war if captured.

On another occasion an American Naval ship or Man-O-War as they were then called fired at the rock in the middle of Beaver Harbour. This rock was called Rams Head by the settlers as it resembled the head of a ram, the cannon balls knocked great pieces of the rock so we now have one ram's head minus his horns.

Joshua Paul moved his family from St. Andrews to Caleb Paul's grant on the Eastern Wolves Island. He farmed and fished and raised a family there. His wife Elizabeth was disowned by her family because she had married a Quaker but later the two families became reconciled and they visited one another frequently and a member of Elizabeth's family, Joseph Stinson is buried at Paul's Cove, Eastern Wolves Island. Joshua Paul died at the home of his daughter Julia Ann Wright, Jan. 24, 1890, aged 94 years. Elizabeth died at the home of Julia Ann Wright Feb. 28, 1890 age 87 years. Among his children were two sons, Thomas and Joshua from whom the present day Paul families of Beaver Harbour are descended.

In 1893 Wallace Matthews of Campobello while fishing off the Wolves Island picked up a bottle containing the poem quoted below:

November 13th, 1858.

Kind friend do not destroy me
For I bear upon my breast
The names of those who placed me here
Long years ago to rest

Yes they kindly placed me here
You see the pains they took
To give to my poor self alone
This quiet little nook

They were a youthful laughing band
With spirits high and free
They were united by true friendship
And lived in harmony

They bade me as their trusty friend
Their names thus safe to keep
That future ones might think of them
As neath the sod they sleep

The poem was signed by: Mr. Joshua Paul Sr., Mrs. Elizabeth (Stinson) Paul, Thomas Paul, Joshua Paul Jr., Walter Warnock, Julia Ann Paul, Agnes Kennedy, Elizabeth Kennedy (cousins) Harriott Paul, Isadora Margaret Paul, Emily Euphemia Paul.

The poem had been written by Julia Ann Paul one evening while the family were gathered in the old homestead on the Island. The poem was signed by each of the company and placed with a lock of hair of each in a bottle which was hidden in the bottom of the kitchen chimney.

Julia Ann Paul was the wife of George Wright of Beaver Harbour. She was the daughter of Joshua Paul and Elizabeth Stinson Paul of St. Andrews. They made their home for many years at Pauls Cove, Wolves Island, Charlotte County, N. B.

The first sardines were packed by Lewis Holmes at Beaver Harbour at this time Patrick and Lewis Connors became interested in the sardine industry. They took over Lewis Holmes business, moving it to Black's Harbour. This was the beginning of Connors Bros., Limited, and the famous Brunswick Brand Sardines in 1882. At that time women packed the fish and put the covers on by hand with a metal hand tool called a header.

Beaver Harbour is a prosperous community of at present about 400 citizens. It consists of two general stores, a post office, new breakwater and government wharf, a small restaurant, community hall, Anglican Church Hall, Connors Bros. No. 4 Sardine Factory, smelting plant and cold storage, new school and many fine homes. Black's Harbour can proudly boast of having a theatre, a store, a fine modern hospital and medical centre, a modern rink, bank, a post-office, a main office, a hotel, and many fine homes, four churches and the largest sardine packing industry of its kind in the world.

Time and change:

From the days of log cabins, candle light, open fireplaces and brick ovens.

To the days of electricity, street lights, electric stoves and baseboard heating.

From the days when the men and women were called home to their meals by the dinner or supper horn.

To the days of the shriek of factory whistles, the swish of rubber tires on the hard surfaced roads, diesel engines in boats bringing the fish into the plants to be processed or perhaps even a jet plane breaking the sound barrier.

From the days when the ladies wore hoop skirts, bustles, and Quaker bonnets to the days of shorts and mini skirts.

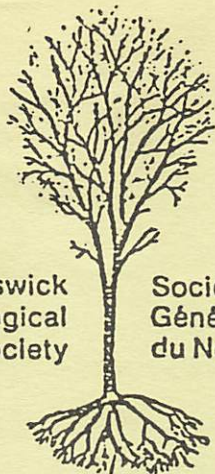

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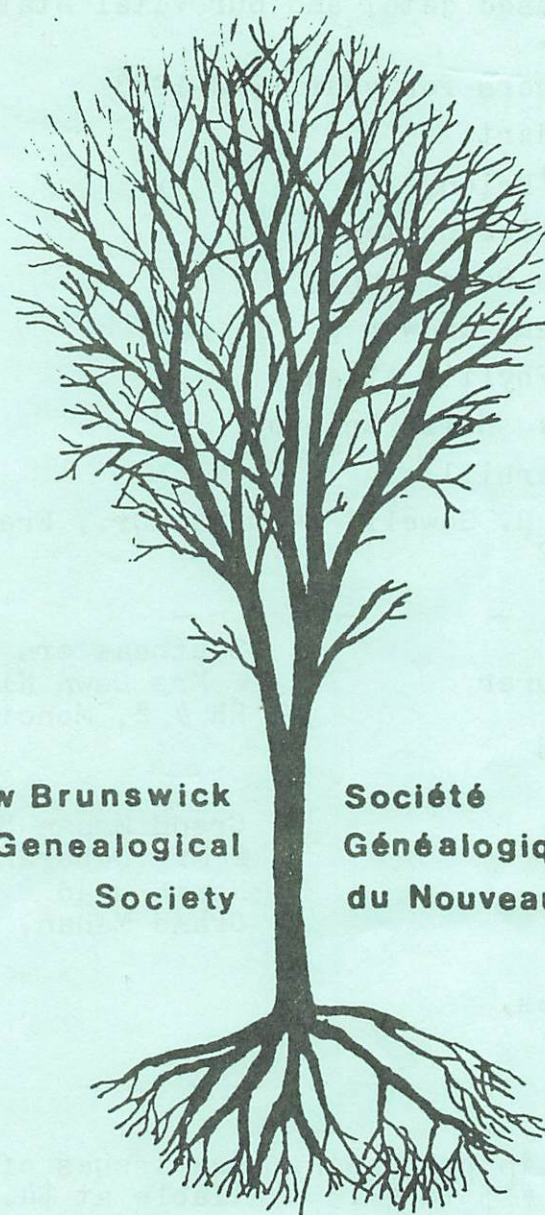
