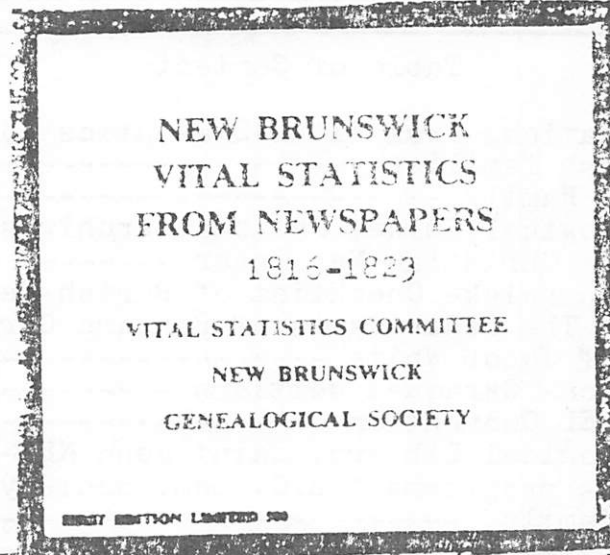

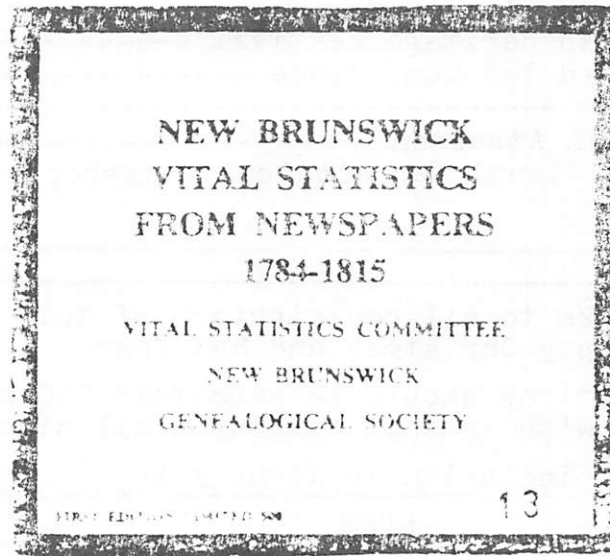

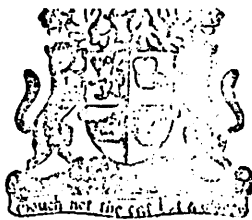

NOW - VOLUME III of McINTOSH GENEALOGY

Genealogical Records of McIntosh Families in the United States and Canada, hardbound, 100pp.

Add to two previous volumes of McIntosh family data a new one covering our families throughout the United States and Canada to aid in research for your particular ancestry. Details of ancestry are compiled from family records of McIntosh family descendants who have contributed their lineages, as well as from county histories, bible records, allied genealogies, manuscripts, censuses, state vital records, obituaries, genealogical magazine articles, and dozens of other sources. Much credit for material must also go to Clan Genealogist Mary Lou Corbe.

The material is completely indexed in three ways: by McIntosh given names; by allied families individual names (spouses, parents, etc.); and by geographical location where known.

Printed on acid-free paper, this NEW volume will be an invaluable tool, a record that will be as good a hundred years from now as it is today. This book is as important to Scottish libraries as those in the United States and Canada, since it names emigrant Scots who came to America in the 18th and 19th centuries, and settled in Georgia, North and South Carolina, and all along the Atlantic seaboard as far north as Nova Scotia.

Bound as a matching volume to the two previous hard-bound volumes, which are still available, this completes the set of volumes of McIntosh ancestral and genealogical data for the U. S. and Canada.

JOHN MCINTOSH OF BEDFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE, AND HIS DESCENDANTS. 1980. By Walter H. McIntosh, 28 Woodside Drive, Topsfield, MA 01963. Hardcover, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, 82 pages, illustrated, indexed, \$17.50.

John MCINTOSH of Bedford, New Hampshire was born in Inverness, Scotland between 1737 and 1740. He married ca 1771/2 Martha HATHAWAY in Merrimack, New Hampshire. The couple were parents to the following nine children: John (1773), William, James, John (1780), Samuel, Mabel, Isaac, and Mary H. This record concerns the Bedford, New Hampshire pioneer, John MCINTOSH, who resided there from 1770 until his death in 1816. The record then traces the migration of his children to Bethel and West Randolph, Vermont and follows the scattering of subsequent generations into all parts of the country. Mr. McIntosh points out the following interesting features in his compilation: 1) Descendants on male and female lines are carried to 1893, lines are considered 25% complete, with 1,113 numbered descendants. 2) John MCINTOSH was both a soldier and a patriot who signed the Association Pled in the Revolutionary War. Proof of lineage is offered for applicants to patriotic organizations. 3) Maps are included for Bedford, New Hampshire and Bethel, Vermont, locating the homes and farms of families are indexed by lineage number for instant identification. The appendix contains an updated list of published and unpublished. The present production of these families were published long ago.

A GENEALOGICAL RECORD OF FAMILIES IN NEW ENGLAND BEARING THE NAME MCINTOSH. 1981. By Walter H. McIntosh, P.O. Box 214, Topsfield, MA 01963. Hardcover, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, 73 pages, indexed, \$17.50.

Mr. MCINTOSH proposes that this book may be considered Volume II of the MCINTOSH ancestry in New England, and a companion volume to *John MCINTOSH of Bedford, New Hampshire and His Descendants* published and reviewed in the *Genealogical Helper* in 1981. This current book covers all (roughly 30 or more) MCINTOSH families in New England. While collecting information on John MCINTOSH of Dedham, Massachusetts and his descendants in Needham, Roxbury, Dorchester, Canton, Newton, Massachusetts; Barnard, Vermont; Maxfield, Maine; Marietta, Ohio; and Lodi, Wisconsin, a vast amount of data was accumulated on other MCINTOSH (various spellings) lines. This material comprises the text of this book. Part one of the book concerns the records of John MCINTOSH of Dedham, Massachusetts. Part two contains MCINTOSH data extracted from various records in the New England area such as records of marriages, records of deaths, soldiers from Massachusetts in the Civil War.

A complete index to these records lists the MCINTOSHES by given name, with approximate date of birth for each, as well as those of other surnames, such as wives, mothers, etc.

My Dear Mr. Kinney:

I wonder if you will be so kind as to write me a letter and tell me something about your family connections. You are, I think, related to me, but I do not know just how. I am collecting information about our family. I have information back six generations but many of the members of the family have become scattered and the record is not complete. I will be glad to send you some of this information if you are interested. The following may interest you and help you to see how we are related.

Israel Kinney (whom we will call Israel the 1st) married Susan Hood at Topsfield, Mass. June 9, 1763. He had been a member of the army with Ge. Wolfe at the capture of Quebec, 1759. He left Newburyport 1767 and went to N.B. and settled at Maugerville and Oromocto on the Saint John River. His son Israel the second married Abigail Cram. (leaving out the other children) They had a son Israel (the third) who married Mary Tracy. Their children (as I have them) are Rosana, Mahala, Enoch who married Hannah Murphy, Israel died young, Mary, Solomon who married Agnes Gannett, Phoebe, Sarah, Caroline, Aaron who married Jane Harding, Francis Adelaide (my grandmother) who married James Kinney her cousin, Samantha, Sabin, Basheba, Mahelay Ann. Or perhaps I should have given you Israel the 2nd children as you may have come through another branch. Israel the 2nd married Abigail Cram. Their children were Israel who married Mary Tracy, James who married Ansie Chapman, Susie, Annie, Betsey.

My grandfather James who married Adelaide his Cousin must have been a son of James and Ansie Chapman. I have no trace of the other children of James and Ansie Chapman Kinney. Have you? My father was Aldon Kinney, son of James. My father died at 24 years of age at Middle Simonds, Carleton county, NB where he was born. I was born in 1876. My father was a harness maker. He learned it from some uncle. He was in St Andrews in 1878-79 for his health, and used to visit his people down there then. He had an uncle or rather a half uncle Lorenzo in Eastport, Maine and I think an uncle George in St. George. I would like to know who were the parents of George I have no record of a George. Israel Kinney the third married a second time to Jane E. DeDrasse and their children were Clara, Lucretia, Lorenzo (who married Lavina English) and Annie who married Gilbert Kitchen (but no George)

I would very much like to make your acquaintance by letter. Write me a nice letter and tell me what you know of your people. I hope you know the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior as many of the Kinneys do. What a wonderful Savior he is. He " bare our sins in his own body on the tree." He that believeth in the Son of God (he says) hath everlasting life." This is life eternal that they might know the only true God and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent. I know him and He is everything to me.

(The following was attached to this letter)

Israel who came to Canada with General Wolfe married Susan Hood at Topsfield, Mass. June 9, 1763. He was at the capture of Quebec 1759. He was a blacksmith. He left with Loyalists and went to New Brunswick in 1767 and settled at Oromocto on the St John River. His wife Susan was 18 years old when they were married. He was drowned in the St John river when trying to cross on the ice in the Spring. They had 14 children, His children were:

Births, Deaths, Marriages taken from " Christian Messenger"
Nov. 1854-July 1857 by Hamilton Branch, Ontario Genealogical Soc.

- 5 April 1855- Obituary: At the residence of John Dickie, Brantford Twp after an illness of 2 days, John Walker, age 67, native of New Brunswick. In 1844 moved from N.B. to Canada and then to Michigan. Last December he came on a visit to his sister, Mrs H. Dickie; died 11 Feb, buried at Mt. Pleasant; leaves 10 children.
- 1 May 1856 - Obituary: At his residence in Pickering on 12 March, Deacon Robert Varden, age 54 years, formerly of Charlotte county, N.B.
- 12 June 1856- Obituary: At Charlotteville Twp on 5th May, James Oakes in his 84th year, born in Mass. U.S.A.; came to New Brunswick at age 7; leaves a large family.
- 12 Feb. 1857- Obituary: Stephen Jones Sr., died at his own residence near Mt. Vernon, on 28th of last month; born in New Brunswick where his parents had come from the American Revolution, one of numerous family; had lived in parish of Springfield, Kings county, N.B., father of 16 children, formerly Church of England; came to Upper Canada in 1837, buried at Congregational Church Cemetery, Burford, beside daughter.
- 26 July 1860- Died: Mt Pleasant, 19th ult., Donald McDiarmid, born 1784 in Perthshire, Scotland; to Canada 1816.
- 24 Sept. 1868-Died: Sovereign-near Delhi, Twp of Windham, 16 April, 77 years, Mary Jane, wife of Deacon Frederick Sovereign, born in Pleasant Valley; Province of New Brunswick, father was Captain Hutchison.
- 10 Dec. 1868- Died: On 28 Oct. 1868, Deacon David Stilwell, 79 years, born 1790 Grand Lake, New Brunswick.
- 24 Nov. 1870- Died: At his residence in South Yarmouth on 11 September, William Yorke, 87 years of age. Was born in Victoria County, N.B. on 6 Sept. 1784. Came to Ontario in 1806, locating at Simcoe where he stayed five years and married Miss Elizabeth Schoff who bore him 7 sons and 4 daughters. In 1811 he moved to Talbot Street in Yarmouth Twsp. His wife died in 1864.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT OF JACOB WHITE, Surrogate Court, County Of York,
Province Of New Brunswick. Registered 13 March 1843.

In the name of God, Amen. I Jacob White of the Parish of Douglas, Farmer, being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God for it. Calling unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make this my Last Will and Testament, that is to say principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul into the hand of God, that gave it, and my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executor nothing doubting but at the General resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Almighty power of God and as touching such worldly things where with it has pleased God to blefs me with in this life. I give demise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form. First I give and bequeath to Elizabeth my beloved wife all the income and profits of my estate both real and moveable to dispose of as she thinks proper during her natural life or as long as she remains my widow and after her decrease or if she should marry again, I give to my daughter Lydia White the front room in the East end of my house with one cow and pasture and hay to keep the cow winter and summer as long as she remains single. I give and bequeath my son Thomas White the upper half of lot No 11 up to the highway and no further and likewise lot No 12 with all the buildings after the decrease of his mother or if she should marry again. I give and bequeath to my beloved sons Jacob White, John White, Henry White, Benjamin White, Samuel White my upper lot No 13 to be divided equally among them. I give to my son Abraham White twenty shillings to be paid out of my estate. I give to my daughters Elizabeth Stone, Dorethy White, Barbery Marchell, Lovina Dunphy, Lydia White, Ruth Boone and Hulda Boone all my moveable estate to be equally divided among them. I likewise constitute make and ordain my beloved sons Henry White and Thomas White my sole executors of this my last will and testament.

CARAQUET

Caraquet, situated on the South shore of the Bay of Chaleur in North East New Brunswick, was for a long time the longest village in the world. Like many other French-speaking towns and villages of the province, Caraquet was founded by the Acadians after their dispersion in 1755. During the winter of 1756, Alexis Landry, Charles Poirier, Olivier Blanchard and Olivier Legere brought their families to this region. They settled by the Petite-Riviere, where we find Ste-Anne-du-Bocage today.

From this region on February 4, 1839 we have a Petition in which many of the inhabitants have signed. This petition from the Inhabitants of Caraquet in the county of Gloucester concerns the granting of the Island of Miscoe at the Entrance of the Bay de Chaleur.

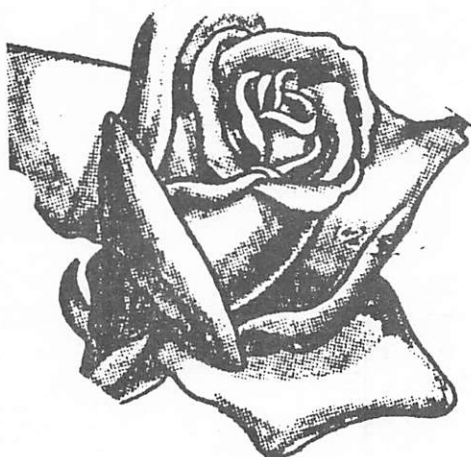

The Guilfoyles of Kings County

The name Guilfoyle came to Kings County to stay on September 12, 1860 when one John W. Guilfoyle petitioned for a lot of land in the "Bishop's Grant" on the South Branch, near what was known as "Dingley Cooch". John was born in Ireland in 1828 and the lot he petitioned for was in Brunswick Parish, Queens County. An adjoining lot was petitioned by his son, John. jr.

The senior John had come to Canada from County Cork in 1856 with other Irish immigrants and had spent some time working on the railway in Nova Scotia and later, in the Passakeag area of Kings County. It would appear that the family's first landfall was at St. Andrews, N.B. because daughter Margaret, their third child, was baptised in the Catholic church there on April 4, 1858, at the age of two months.

At the 1861 census of Brunswick Parish, John had nine acres of his 100-acre lot cleared, had raised 20 bushels of turnips, 20 bushels of buckwheat on four acres and 15 bushels of potatoes on one-half acre. His stock consisted of one pig. The 1861 census listed the family as follows:

John Kilfoy, 36, Irish, farmer, Roman Catholic
Mary Kilfoy, 33, Irish, Roman Catholic

Their children: John, 7, English
 Margaret, 3, native
 Patrick, 2, native

Son John had been born in Wales and came to Canada with his mother some time after his father arrived. He spent a large part of his life in the lumber woods and had become an expert stream driver. He never married and died in August 1956 at the age of 102.

By the 1871 census, the Guilfoyle family had moved to new acreage. In December, 1869, John purchased a lot of 108 acres from John Frazee, for \$300. This was in Studholm Parish, "on the Millstream", in the White's Mountain area of Kings County. After Margaret's birth, three more sons were born; Patrick in 1859, Philip in 1863 and Michael in 1864.

The family name was continued by the marriage of Michael, first to Mary Jane Fenton and, after her death, to Jane Cogger Gallagher, a widow. Issue of this marriage was two sons, John J. and Michael and a daughter Mary Jane. Mrs Gallagher had a son Harry and a daughter Jane from her previous marriage to John Gallagher who died in 1914.

John J. Guilfoyle married Agnes Doyle of Albert County and this union produced three sons, John Eugene, Joseph Murray and Michael Francis, who died an infant. Michael, brother of John J., married Agnes Coughlin, of Saint John. Mary Jane, better known as Jennie, became a teacher and remained a spinster.

Veterans of The Boer War

by Daniel F. Johnson

The following is a partial list of New Brunswickers who chose in 1900 to engage in a War against the Transvaal State in South Africa. Perhaps one of the best known engagements against the Boers occurred February 27th, 1900. On February 19th Lord Roberts arrived at Paardeberg with reinforcements and bombarded the Boer laager with half a hundred guns at a range of 2000 yards. "The sufferings of the Boers were fearful. In the words of an eye-witness: 'Nothing could be done but crouch in the trenches and wait until dusk prevented further attack, while wagon after wagon in the laager caught fire and burned away into a heap of scrap iron surrounded by wood ashes. The desolation produced was fearful, and it soon became impossible to make any reply. So enormous a proportion of the horses were lost that any dash for freedom by night was impossible. The condition of the laager soon became so foul that this alone, apart from the want of food, compelled early surrender. The horrible stench caused a serious mutiny in the camp and a general clamor for surrender.'" For several days Cronje (the Boer leader) refused to surrender. In the early hours of February 27, the furthestmost Canadian outpost, supported by the Gordons, Shropshires and Engineers, made a dash on the Boer laager. Under a terrific fire they succeeded in gaining a protected position within 80 yards of the Boer trenches. At daylight, Cronje sent out a flag offering unconditional surrender." The Loyalist Ships by Daniel F. Johnson

In the Spring of 1783, the first fleet of "upward twenty sail" sailed from Long Island, New York bound for the tiny British trading post of Saint John. The two week voyage was not without danger. Although the fear of American reprisal along the coast of Massachusetts proved unfounded, the more northerly seacoast was treacherous, vulnerable to squalls and storm and to some extent uncharted. Of the Spring Fleet, we know only two passenger lists that survive, namely, those of the vessels "Union" and "Cyrus". (See New Brunswick Historical Society Collection, Provincial Archives of New Brunswick, Fredericton).

Identifying the name of the vessel upon which your loyalist ancestor sought passage is difficult. Therefore any passenger list discovered is very valuable indeed! In "We Lived", Oct., 1982 issue 15 (published by Cleadie Barnett, R.R. #3, Cromocto, N.B.) is a reprint of one such list of "Loyalist embarked on board transport for St. John River, Bay of Fundy." The passenger list provides: men's names, their occupation, origin, and the number of women, children, and servants in each party. However, the name of the vessel is not available.

The first three names on the passenger list are: Capt. John Smith, Thos. Treadwell Smith, Albert V. Norstrand, Lt. Referring to "Loyalists Of New Brunswick", Esther Clarke Wright identifies the above names as leaders of Company 40. She writes, "The Eagle, with part or perhaps all of Company 40, the major part of John Smith's group, was another September arrival." (p.91) This statement is supported by another passenger, Caleb Powell, formerly of Dutchess County, New York who reported to the Loyalist Claims Commission that he "Came from New York in Sept., 1783."

A CELEBRATION OF THE SCOTTISH EXPERIENCE IN CANADA

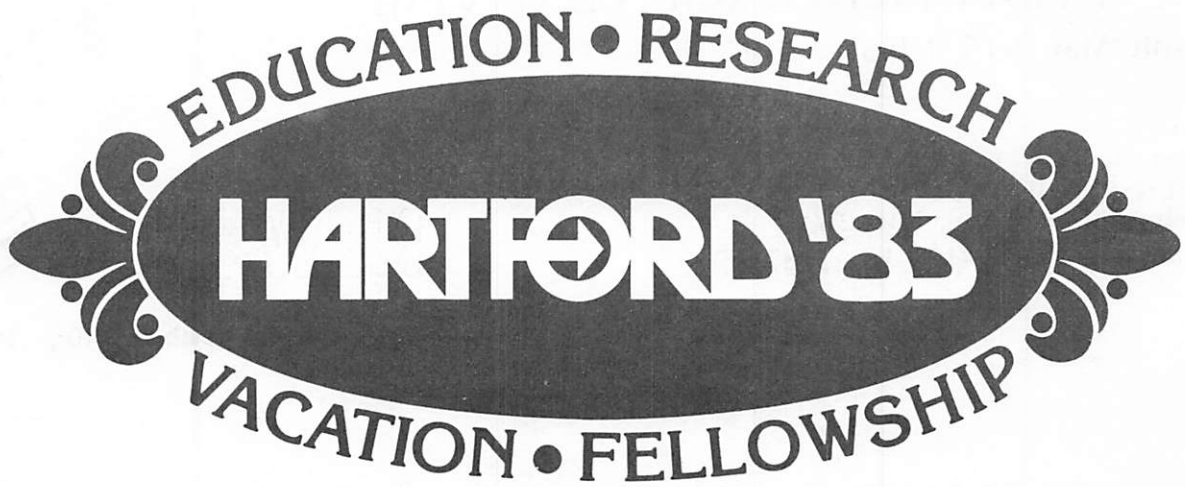

BENJAMIN ATHERTON

Governor Carleton's Nearest Neighbor

As the shores of the River St. John absorbed the waves of migration plowed by the prows of Loyalist vessels, the passengers of those advancing craft found inhabitants already on the fertile intervalle. In the remaining few months before the bicentennial celebration of the "Spring Fleet" which brought to New Brunswick the first tidal waves of refugees displaced by the eruptions in the American colonies, it would be fitting to lend our consideration to those pre-Loyalist folk whose contributions to the cultural and historic heritage of the province pre-date that of the Loyalists whose coming we will soon commemorate.

One such resident of the valley was Benjamin Atherton, an intrepid soul who operated the "up river" trading post for the firm of Hazen, Jarvis, Simonds & White.

Several original sources, including the famous Studholme report prepared for the government in Nova Scotia in 1783, indicate that Benjamin Atherton arrived on the St. John River as a permanent resident about 1769. Major Studholme related that Atherton had cleared nearly thirty acres of land on the shore of the river, some of the clearing having previously been done by the French. He had built a frame house, a log barn, and resided there with his wife, seven children and a servant.

What incentives could have lured a young man from a respectfully comfortable life in Lancaster, Massachusetts, we can only conjecture. Whether or not the characterization of "soldier of fortune" is appropriate to his situation, the record shows that as a young orphaned lad, raised by his uncle Peter Atherton of Harvard, Massachusetts, the young Benjamin at age nineteen signed up for what would become one of the most auspicious and notorious military missions in the history of North America. Sailing aboard the sloop *Victory*, Atherton participated in the campaign which expelled the Acadians from Nova Scotia in 1755.

His term of service exposed him to military superiors whose names are synonymous with the colonial conflict -- John Winslow and Abijah Willard. The Willard family originated in Lancaster as did the Atherton family, so it is not difficult to imagine that families who shared bonds of intermarriage also espoused social and political similarities as well.

Henry S. Nourse, author of *Military Annals of Lancaster, Massachusetts*, has aptly described an experience which must echo the perception of the young soldier Benjamin Atherton:

The Lancaster soldiers, ill clad, often inefficiently provisioned, and suffering much from the rigors of the climate spent the dreary Canadian winter in barracks at Fort Cumberland. In April, 1756, they were allowed to return to their homes. As we have seen, this was not Captain Willard's first experience with Nova Scotia, nor was it to be his last. Little more than twenty years passed from the time when he assisted in forcing the broken-hearted Acadian farmers into exile, and again he sailed for Nova Scotia, himself a fugitive, proscribed as a Tory, his ample estate confiscated and his name a reproach among his life-long neighbors...On the Bay of Fundy, about ten miles west of St. John, is a locality yet called Lancaster. Colonel Abijah Willard gave it the name. It was his retreat into exile...

When Willard arrived as a Loyalist, his former recruit was already on the River, in the employ of James Simonds and James White, traders whose firm had been commissioned by the government. No doubt, Atherton's first experience in Nova Scotia with Winslow and Willard had provided him with the will to return;

perhaps the lucrative appeal of the fur trade sweetened the incentive; and Atherton's freedom from close family ties provided him with the ready mobility to follow his yearnings.

A brief investigation of his family background will reveal a heritage that arises from the notable families of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, families whose directions were charted by the strong vectors of social, ecclesiastical and historical dynamics of seventeenth century colonial New England.

The vital records of Billerica, Massachusetts reveal that Benjamin Atherton was born there on 9 December 1736, the only son of Dr. Benjamin and Mary (Toothaker) Atherton. He was the second child born of the marriage, the first being a daughter, Mary, born two years earlier.

Benjamin's mother was the daughter of Dr. Roger Toothaker and the granddaughter of a doctor by the same name. Her immediate ancestors were players in and victims of, events which characterize the Puritan period of the region. Her paternal grandmother, Mary (Allen) Toothaker was a sister to Martha (Allen) Carrier, the notorious lady of Salem infamy who met her fate on gallows hill alongside the Reverend George Burroughs for their alleged complicity as "King and Queen of the Witches." Mary Atherton's maternal grandfather, John Rogers, was the victim of one of the savage Indian raids of the summer of 1695. He had been widowed prematurely by the death of his spouse, Mary (Shed) Rogers some seven years earlier.

Dr. Benjamin Atherton undoubtedly gained whatever informal medical experience that he had from his father-in-law, Roger Toothaker, and appears to have taken up residence in Billerica rather than Lancaster to further his knowledge under the tutelage of the established Dr. Toothaker.

Dr. Benjamin Atherton and his wife Mary both died in the autumn of 1739, but the causes of death are not recorded in the annals of Billerica. Mary Toothaker Atherton's estate was probated by her brother, also a Dr. Roger Toothaker, and guardianship of the two children, Mary and Benjamin, was assumed by John and Peter Atherton, respectively, brothers of Dr. Benjamin, who resided in Harvard (or more specifically, Still River), subdivisions of Lancaster, Massachusetts.

The combined estate of Dr. Benjamin and Mary Atherton totalled nearly 500 pounds; however, no legacy accrued to Benjamin when he reached his majority. Settlements were made with the children of Mary Toothaker Atherton's first marriage to John Rogers and necessary probate expenses were deducted from the estate. When the probate was finally settled in May of 1752, when Benjamin was fifteen years of age, his uncles Peter and John had absorbed the entire estate by citing expenses for the upbringing of their dependent wards and for their father's share of the support of other family members who had been looked-after by their uncle-guardians.

While the behavior of the uncles might on the surface appear mercenary, it would appear that their young nephew received the same quality education that was provided to his cousins. In later years, Benjamin Atherton's formal knowledge gained him the prestigious positions of Registrar, Clerk of the Peace, and Coroner in the old Nova Scotia province of Sunbury, prior to the relocation of the Loyalists and the founding of the province of New Brunswick.

The Atherton family was one which reached a modicum of influence in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. The immigrant ancestor, James Atherton, came to America from Preston (or Wigan) in Lancashire, England. He is reported by several chroniclers to have arrived on 17 August 1635 aboard the ship *James*, along with a close relative whom most students of the family believe to have been his older brother. Humphrey Atherton, a resident of Dorchester, achieved considerable military and political success, and at the time of his death was commander of the

colonial militia. His funeral was preached by Richard Mather, progenitor of the noted New England ecclesiastical family of the same name.

James Atherton and his wife Hannah relocated on the Nashaway River at a site that was to become Lancaster. Following several serious Indian raids, they returned to the more protective security of Dorchester and later to the home of a daughter in Sherborn where they both died. Their son Joshua remained on the Nashaway, built a home in Still River, and died there in 1721, some fifteen years before the birth of his grandson, the subject of this sketch. His widow, the former Mary Gulliver of Dorchester, lived to the age of 95 and died in Still River at the family home in 1754.

The family of Joshua and Mary (Gulliver) Atherton were Stephen, Hannah, Ensign Joseph, Joshua, Mary, Dr. Benjamin, John, and Peter. The latter, Benjamin's guardian, was at the time of his death in 1764, a member of the General Court, the legislative body of Massachusetts. It was with Peter that the aged Mary lived during her latter years, and young Benjamin no doubt grew up in the household with his grandmother Atherton. It was shortly after her death that he enlisted for the Acadian campaign and sailed to Nova Scotia on 20 May 1755.

Following the events of the fateful year's service in Nova Scotia, Atherton apparently returned with his regiment to Massachusetts. For the next several years there are indications of service of a Benjamin Atherton in various Lancaster regiments. The campaigns suggest duty in the "reduction of Canada" and "service Westward" which probably refer to the Ticonderoga campaign and the final assault on Quebec which resulted ultimately in the Peace of Paris in 1763, ending all French claim to North America.

The record does not mention the whereabouts of Benjamin Atherton from 1760, the last recorded military service, to 1769. How an orphaned lad could appear on the St. John River, four or five years after the settlement at Maugerville and be readily recognized as a candidate for the operation of a trading post on the outskirts of civilization is a mystery. His introduction to such Maugerville families as Peabody, Simonds, Perley, Hazen and/or White must have preceded his selection as an agent for the trading company.

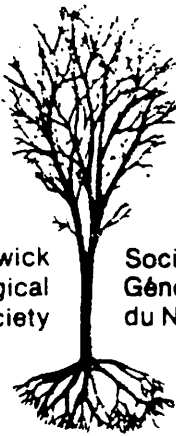
There is evidence that James Simonds, who shared a similar age with Atherton was involved with the military campaign at Ticonderoga, while similar documentation confirms the service of James White in the Quebec campaign. Benjamin Atherton may have become acquainted with one or both of his future business associates during the French and Indian Wars, or he may have come highly recommended as a result of his previous military service in Nova Scotia. Further research may discover relevant information which will clarify the speculation which is all that is presently available to suggest specific reasons for the removal of Benjamin Atherton to the St. John River.

[The continuation of this article will appear in future issues of the Newsletter. Atherton built at St. Ann's Point and later located at Prince William. He became, according to historian William O. Raymond, the first permanent English-speaking resident of present-day Fredericton. He and his wife, Abigail (Mooers) Atherton raised a large family whose names are readily identified with first and second generation Loyalist settlers and some family dwellings are preserved at King's Landing. I am currently attempting to construct as complete a genealogy as possible of Atherton descendants and would welcome the assistance of others who have interest in the family. Please write to:
