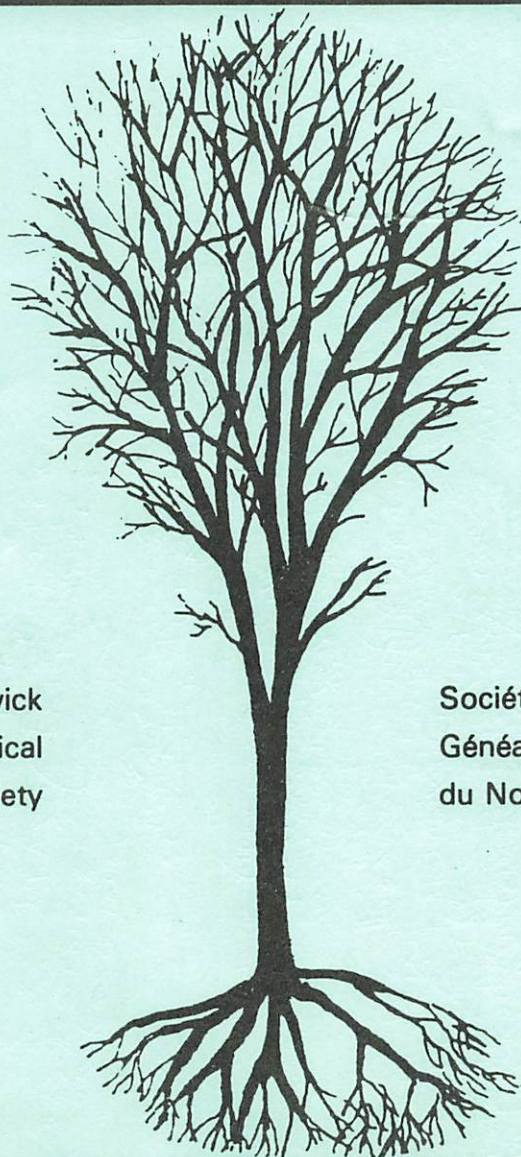

This publication was begun twenty years ago as a part of material used in the preparation of a master's thesis on the New Brunswick militia, which had its origin by virtue of legislation enacted in 1787.

The work is about 450 pages in length. It is not indexed but is arranged alphabetically by county and by regiment within each county. Brief histories of each regiment are given and each member is listed by date of appointment, promotion, resignation, etc.

Old Fowler Burying Ground Inscriptions, Aulac
Foot of Fowler's Hill, Westmoreland County, N.B.
- Patricia W. Hart

- #1. M. A. Fowler / who departed this life / Feb. 1st 1799 / in the 4th month of her age.
- #2. Here lies the body of / Ann Fowler / who departed this life / Nov. 9th 1798 / in the 29th year of her age. / "They who in Jesus live / But happy still are they / Who to God their life give / And 'scape this earth away."
- #3. Here lieth the body of / Jeremiah Fowler / who departed this life / August 6th 1822 / Aged 27 years.
- #4. Amos Fowler / Died / June 28th 1840 / Aged 81 years / Also his wife, Ann / died Nov. 19th 1798 / Aged 29 years.
- #5. Here lieth the body of / Mary Keillor / Who departed this life / April 22nd 1811 / In the 78th year of her age.
- #6. Here lieth the body of / Thompson Keillor / who departed this life / March 9th 1799 / in the 22nd year of his age. / All you that come my grave to see / Remember now and think of me / Just in my bloom was snatched away / Repent therefore make no delay.
- #7. Here lieth the body of / Will^m Keillor / who departed this life / Jan 10th 1794 / in the 22nd year of his age. / Death like an overflowing stream / Sweeps us away our life a dream / An empty tale a mounting flow / Carries us .. we all must go.

According to David Taylor, Area Superintendant, Historic Sites, New Brunswick in 1972, File #213, originally with a collection of papers, books and clippings at Fort Beausejour, was removed to the Archives Dept. (now the Ralph Pickard Bell Library) at the University of Mount Allison in Sackville for proper use and safekeeping.

Fowler's Hill is the hill running up out of the Tantramar Marshes to Aulac, now replaced by the TransCanada Highway. A square wooden white house on the Cumberland Basin side of the road, near the bottom of the hill, replaced one of two stone houses built on the property by Thomas Keillor, a stone mason, who arrived at Cumberland Point (Aulac) in 1774 with the Yorkshire emigration from England. The Fowler-Keillor family cemetery stood behind the barn surrounded by a stone wall. Only parts of four broken gravestones remained near the only section of the wall that is left, and the ground was covered with a mass of wild rose bushes in 1971.

Thomas Keillor, a Pre-Loyalist, is not listed in the above inscriptions. However, his will was registered in Cumberland on the 12 August 1777, and, according to Howard Trueman, his wife, Mary (Thompson) Keillor was buried beside him, and there may have been other members of the Fowler-Keillor families as well in this small burying ground.

Thomas and Mary Keillor left Shelton, Yorkshire, England with a young family,

Amos married (1) circa 1791, or earlier, Ann Keillor and they had three or more children who were 6, 4, and a newborn baby when their mother died in 1798. During this period, in 1795, Amos ran a vessel between Saint John and Sackville to purchase goods required by settlers in Sackville and Dorchester as well as carrying passengers. This method of merchandising was very important to all settlers who could afford extra luxuries.

The Fowler family were active members of St. Marks Episcopal Church at Mount Whatley. Amos sr. was vestryman in 1795 and Warden in 1822-23, 1827, 1830-31. After living in Sackville for a number of years, Amos returned to his old home in New York State and returned with his nephew, Gilbert Lawrence, born 27 October 1785, who married 14 April 1808 at age 23, Sarah Trueman, daughter of William Trueman jr. and his wife Elizabeth Keillor.

Amos married (2) Sarah Huestin (Wethered) Etter, daughter of Samuel Wethered, Adjutant of Fort Cumberland. Her first husband, Peter Etter II, was a jeweller and silversmith at Cumberland Point who drowned in the Bay of Fundy when returning home from a trip to Boston in 1798. Their family consisted of 9 children, two or 3 by his first wife Letitia Patton, and the eldest about 11 years of age when his father, Peter, died. This family joined Amos at Fowler's Hill. The house was left to Amos jr. and eventually to his son Rufus S. Fowler.

Known children of Amos Fowler sr. and his wife Ann (Keillor) Fowler:

1. Amos jr. born circa 1792; died 1861 at age 69, buried at St. Marks Anglican Churchyard, Mount Whatley. He married Lydia S ____ born circa 1794, died 6 Oct 1864 at age 70.
2. Jeremiah born circa 1795; died 6 August 1822 at age 27. He is buried in the Old Fowler Burying Ground.
3. M. A. (these letters may stand for Mary after her grandmother and Ann after her mother) She was born circa Nov 1798 when her mother died; died 1 Feb 1799 at age 3 months. She is buried in the Old Fowler Burying Ground.

landed in Halifax and fortunately took an overland trip to Cumberland Point. Their possessions sent by water, were lost when the ship was wrecked before reaching its destination. Two sisters of Mary (Thompson) Keillor, Jane the wife of John Carter sr., and Ann the wife of William Trueman sr. also arrived with their families in 1774 and 1775.

The known children of Thomas and Mary (Thompson) Keillor were:

1. Thomas born in England, married a Miss Trenholm and settled at Amherst Point. Family of 11 children.
2. Elizabeth born in England circa 1758 was 16 when she arrived in Nova Scotia; died 22 April 1825 at age 67; and married William Trueman jr. in 1777. Family of 10 children. Her mother lived at Prospect Farm with the Truemans from 1806 until she died in 1811.
3. John born in England circa 1759 was 15 when he arrived; died 11 Sept. 1839 in Dorchester; and married Elizabeth Weldon. He became a prominent Justice of the Inferior Court for the County of Westmoreland and a large landowner. The stone house he built in 1813, situated on a grassy knoll behind large trees in the centre of Dorchester, has now become an interesting museum with a spiral staircase going up three storeys from a kitchen ell to the farm boys attic bedrooms. Family of 8 children.
4. Robert born in England circa 1765 was 11 when he arrived. He also moved to Dorchester where he bought land and was appointed the first jailor in 1802 holding the office for five years. The Court House stood on land given by John Keillor. The jail and tavern were on the ground floor, the court room and jury rooms on the second storey and bedrooms on the third floor. In 1803 Robert added a kitchen and stable. He married Miss Dobson. There were no children.
5. Ann born in England circa 1770 was 4 when she arrived; she died in childbirth on the 9th or 19th November 1798 at age 28. She is buried in the Old Fowler Burying Ground. She married Capt. Amos Fowler and they lived with her mother in the stone house her father had built at Fowler's Hill. Family of 3 known children.
6. William born in England circa 1773 was a year old when he arrived; died 10 January 1794 at age 21. He is buried in the Old Fowler Burying Ground.
7. Thompson born at Cumberland Point in 1778 and named after his mother's family; died 9 March 1799 at age 21. He is buried in the Old Fowler Burying Ground.

Capt. Amos Fowler was born in Westchester Co., New York circa 1759; and died 28 June 1840 at age 81 at Fowler's Hill. He is buried beside his wife, Ann Keillor, in the Old Fowler Burying Ground. Amos was a Loyalist who "came to Cumberland Point October 1783 sent no claim home that year." As a result, his claim could not be accepted at a later date. However, he received in 1875 a grant of 250 acres on Cobequid Road and in 1803 the census listed him as a freeholder in Westmoreland Co.

Recently, I spent a few hours in the county records archives at Natchez, Mississippi, reading deeds, bonds, wills and whatever else came to hand regarding my Grafton ancestor.

For relaxation I read a few other wills including one written by William Dunbar, Adams Co., Miss. about 1810. The will had some interesting bequests and requests which might mean something to one of your researchers.

He said, in part:

"To my son William I leave all my chemical, astronomical and philosophical apparatus; to my wife Dinah I leave my electrical machines, microscopes and all other instruments of inferior value.

"To my nephew, Sir Archibald Dunbar of Northfield, living near Elgin, N.B., send him notice".

THE WISTED FAMILY

Among Saint John City's older Irish Catholic families is the Wisted Family. The Wisted's roots began in the Counties Offally & Tipperary in the mid seventeenth century. Today little is known of the family experience in Ireland, but later generations exhibited a strong military tradition. According to family tradition, two brothers and a sister were the first to come to Saint John about the early 1850's. The sister Mary Wisted married John Elmore, a widower 5th March 1867. Her brother Michael Wisted (1830-1921) settled on St. Patrick Street and became involved in the coal business. He was later joined by another brother Thomas M. Wisted a veteran of the India campaigns who became a well known merchant in Saint John.

Following his arrival Micheal married Jane, daughter of Wm. Robinson. She died of paralysis on 26th September 1901 and was buried at Fernhill Cemetery. Their children included:

THOMAS M WISTED

Thomas M. Wisted was born in Tipperary, Ireland in 1835. On October 14th, 1852, at age 17, he enlisted in the 73rd Imperial Regt. at Dublin. The regiment was sent to the Cape of Good Hope and later spent some time on the Channel Islands. With the outbreak of the Crimean War in 1854 young Wisted was among the first to volunteer to reinforce the 97th. After a short period at Windsor Castle in May 1854 the regiment was ordered to Malta. Here they received orders to aid the Greek King in quelling a revolution. In November they were sent to Sabastopool where they spent 15 months in the trenches. On March 22nd 1855 Pte. Wisted was with the famous Capt. Healy Vickers when the officer was killed in action. At the fall of Sabastopool on 8th September 1855 he was one of the storming party. Of the 16 ladders readied by his company for scaling purposes, only two remained intact when they reached the walls. Mr. Wisted received a wound in the left leg, but not seriously. Following the end of hostilities, his unit returned to England in August 1856.

In 1857 Thomas left England with others sent to relieve Sir Colin Campbell combating the mutinous Seboys (Indian Soldiers). After sailing to Calcutta, they marched 1,386 miles arriving at the town of Lucknow three months later, but eight days before its fall. The regiment lived in bell tents, fifteen men to a tent. Mr Wisted had gone as long as six weeks without cooked food while on some of his campaigns. Speaking of one experience he said: "I remember Christmas Day, 1854. Our Christmas Dinner consisted of hard tack and raw pork, dealt out very sparingly and we were mighty glad to get it. For three months we had for covering one blanket, each with three holes, one for our head and two for our arms. This we would put on like an overcoat and in this we slept many a night endeavoring to keep warm. We marched in burning sun with heavy kits and in heavy marching order."

Once while in action Mr. Wisted's rifle became clogged and useless. Given permission to return to camp to procure another one, he took the wrong turn at a crossroad. He was pursued by the enemy Sepoys but evaded capture by dodging from tree to tree until safely back in his own lines. After ten years service Wisted returned to England in 1868. In 1873 he received an honorable discharge as corporal and in April of that year sailed to Saint John where his brother and sister had come about twenty years earlier.

For several years he engaged with his brother in the coal business. He celebrated his 50th wedding anniversary at his residence on St. Patrick Street. Later he operated a grocery store at the corner of St. Patrick & Clarence. It was at this shop that the young Lawrence McLaren (destined to become Lt. Gov. of N.B.) would listen breathlessly to the veteran's tales of stirring days in Crimea and the hot burning plains of India. With the outbreak of WWI, the then Lt. McLaren fought courageously with the loss of a leg at Vimy Ridge.

Thomas M. Wisted was an enthusiastic temperance man, a member of St. Malachi's Society, Father Mathews Assoc., St. Joseph's Society. As a devoted subject of the Crown, no patriotic demonstration was complete without his presence. He died June 25, 1916 and was interred at the New Catholic Cemetery, Saint John

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the HAWKINS JOURNAL, a magazine of historical and genealogical information pertaining to the descendants of MICHAEL HAWKINS, a Loyalist of New Jersey, who emigrated to the Province of New Brunswick in the May fleet of 1783. In this magazine, to be printed three times per year, we will explore the descendants of Michael and Laney (Brower) Hawkins who have established residence throughout Canada and the United States. We will also explore the ancestry of both of these people and of the families which have married into the Hawkins family over the years. We will also explore the official records of the families whether it be in the records of births, marriages, and deaths; newspapers; census returns; cemetery records; original documents; family Bibles; or the many other sources which have or which may become available.

Prior to introducing Michael Hawkins, we must first spend some of our time exploring the history of the Loyalists and their removal from the colonies to the Canadian provinces and beyond.

THE LOYALIST. Prior to 1775, the inhabitants of the Colonies in North America swore allegiance to their King and to Great Britain. They found little reason to disavow this allegiance during the first one hundred and forty years of the existence of the colonies. Although they considered themselves as Colonists and apart from their English cousins living across the sea, they depended upon Great Britain for many of their supplies, for the British army to fight the long extended French and Indian Wars, and Parliament to appropriate the taxes necessary to maintain the colonies. However, the Treaty of Paris of 1763 brought about a strong change in attitude. The French and Indian Wars were ended, the land in Ohio was theirs, but almost immediately, Parliament issued the Proclamation of 1763 which closed the Ohio Territory to settlement. Many were outraged as they were convinced they had fought for that territory, its fertile lands and the right to settle there but now the government in England, in its wisdom, had seen its way clear to close that land to settlement to protect the colonists from possible future uprisings from the Indians.

The next twelve years brought many outrages to the Colonies as the course of history was changing. The Stamp Act, the Navigation Acts, the Intolerable Acts, the Boston Massacre, the Boston Tea Party, the Townshend Acts, and others, all read like a brief history of those years and the coming changes.

In 1774 the Continental Congress met in Philadelphia. In spite of its protestations of loyalty, and in spite of having completed its sessions without committing the colonies to a policy of independence, the cleavage between the radicals or Whigs, and the conservatives or Tories had widened. It had passed the Nonimportation, Nonexportation, and Nonconsumptive Agreements, which were adopted under the name of the Continental Association. Tories who refused to subscribe to the Association were proclaimed as violators, and were sometimes subjected to tarring and feathering. The clashes between the British troops stationed in Boston and the American militiamen, at Lexington, in April, and at Bunker Hill, in June, 1775, and the violent propaganda which followed those clashes, widened still further the rift between Whig and Tory.¹

With the coming war, the colonists were divided. The Patriot cause, which to the British was treasonous, was lead by men who were dedicated to the freeing of the American Colonies from British rule. On the other side stood the Tory, known for his loyalty to his King, who stood against the Patriot battle for independence. Known for their loyalty, they became Loyalists, and many fought with the British soldiers in the battles that first seemed to lead to British victory against the rag-tag Patriot army but which, ultimately, lead to the defeat of the British army and to the independence of the colonies from British rule. The terms of the Treaty of Paris of 1783, while ending the war and acknowledging the independence of the thirteen colonies, also provided for the safety of "Tory" Loyalists against retaliation, confiscation and even ill-treatment by the government of the new Republic, but there were no guarantees. There being no way to secure the fair treatment promised, persecution continued and the movement of the Loyalists became an exodus of considerable proportions.²

The Loyalists who came were "Loyalists" for many reasons. Some were afraid to remain in the States, some definitely did not want to, and others were looking for free grants of land. "All assumed the mantle of loyalty, though in some cases, it fitted badly." ³

Fleets of ships left in the Spring of 1783 from New York carrying these Loyalists to the land to the northeast--to Nova Scotia--and hope for a new way of life. The River Saint John was a "land of promise" and by 1783 1300 settlers had been attracted to the river valley, but one year later the numbers had risen to 9260 with 3000 more in the vicinity. Grants of land had been made at Keswick as early as 1765 so there were settlers there when the Loyalists arrived.

Transportation was provided from Parrtown in Nova Scotia and up the Saint John River by the British government. Some tools, implements, seeds, and food for a year and sometimes more were also provided. The Loyalists of the spring fleet had gone up the river to Prince William, Keswick and Queensbury and they were dependent upon supplies for the winter but they did not arrive. Although they had had time to build small log homes during the summer, they had little time to consider the matter of planting crops. Without provisions from the government in the spring of 1784, they had to revert to the Indian ways of hunting and

fishing to survive. Spring came as a welcome relief though, and at that point the Loyalists could begin to build their log houses anew, to clear the land for crops, and begin life in the new country. The government support had to be extended and there were some scandals as the the distribution of the food, but the new settlers began to make a home in this wilderness.

In 1784 New Brunswick was set apart from Nova Scotia as a separate province and in the following year St. Anne's, now Fredericton, was set aside as the capital, much to the ire of the people of St. John. The government began immediately granting land, in blocks instead of to individuals, usually to disbanded regiments. However, this plan did not work well as blocks of land were, in some cases, too far up river and the terrain too difficult to farm, and in many instances, the grants included lands that had already been granted to others. To many it was just too difficult to deal with this government disorganization and many simply deserted their lots and went back to the United States while others joined fellow loyalists in Quebec and Ontario.

Land speculation also became popular. The land around Keswick had been granted, in many cases, as early as 1765, and although these early settlers had improved their lots considerably, many were willing to sell to these Loyalists, some at great profit.

Through all of this, many Loyalists did settle, grow and prosper. They built their homes in the wilderness, raised their families, and died in this new home, loyal to their king. Their descendants have spread far and wide but now, with the coming of the bicentennial era of the American Revolution and the bicentennial of the Loyalist removal to New Brunswick, a great pride has again manifested itself in these men and women who left their homeland, for whatever reason, and came into the wilderness to establish new homes.

MICHAEL HAWKINS was one of these loyalists. We know not his reason for "loyalty." Perhaps it was for love of King; perhaps for personal gain; perhaps for fear--whatever it was he established our family in a new home in Keswick, at the confluence of the Madam Keswick and the Saint John and it was here that many generations of the family grew and from which many set out into new lands, new lives, and new allegiances. But it is amazing that wherever and whenever I meet these cousins, we all seem to share the same stories and the same traditions of the family and home.

Thus this magazine is beginning in a hope that it will provide the medium for gathering the family history and genealogy and that a greater interest in ourselves--our pasts, our presents, and our future--will come from it.

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FIRST GENERATION

MICHAEL HAWKINS, LOYALIST

The first of our family to locate in the Province of New Brunswick was one Michael Hawkins, a Loyalist of New Jersey. As yet it has not been ascertained who his parents were or where their home was in New Jersey, so we will begin with Michael's story after his arrival in New Brunswick and hope that light will eventually be shed upon his parentage in the not too distant future.

The first official record of Michael Hawkins in New Brunswick is his Memorial, dated in 1788, in which he makes a request for land from the Crown. The Memorial, which reveals some information about his service to the King, reads:

To His Excellency Thomas Carleton
Esquire Lieut. Governor & Commander
in chief over the Province of
New Brunswick--Chancellor & Vice
Admiral of the same &c &c &c

The Memorial of Micheal Hawkins
Most Humble Sheweth

That your Memorialist is a Native of New Jersey but join'd the Royal Army early in the late Rebellion and in 1777 engaged in Major Ward's Company of Refugees and in the defence of the Block House¹ he received a Wound from which he was disabled for Nine months. That he emigrated to this Country in the May fleet of 1783.

That your Memorialist has never obtained any Land whatsoever from Government but as Lott No. 10 on the Madam Rishvie² Granted to Robert McCargo, but is now unoccupied by the Death of Said Robert McCargo last Spring Your Memorialist Humble prays' that Your Excellency would be pleas'd to assign said Lott to Your Memorialist as his Quota of Land.

THE HAWKINS JOURNAL

On May 1, 1788, Michael Hawkins signed that Memorial to Sir Thomas Carleton which presented his first request for land from King George III on the Madam Keswick. On the same day he also purchased his first parcel of land in New Brunswick.

THIS INDENTURE made the first day of May in the year of our Lord, One Thousand seven hundred and Eighty Eight and in the Twenty Eighth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the Third by the grace of God of Great Britain France and Ireland King defender of the faith and so forth,

Between LEWIS FRASER of the County of York Province of New Brunswick Yeoman and MARY his wife of the one part and MICHAEL HAWKINS of the Province and County aforesaid Yeoman of the other part

Witnesseth that the said LEWIS FRASER and MARY his wife for and in consideration of the sum of THIRTEEN POUNDS current and lawful money of the Province aforesaid to them in hand paid by said MICHAEL HAWKINS at and before the sealing and delivery of these present the Receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged and themselves therewith fully contented...satisfied and paid...SELL...land situate lying and being on the Eastern Bank of the River Madam Kishvie in the County aforesaid as appears by Grant under the Great Seal of the...Province bearing date of the thirtieth Day of January...1787...bounded Northerly by Lot No. 3 being a tract granted to John Althouse Westerly by River Madamkishvie and extending Easterly from the River until it contains two hundred and nine acres more or less...known...by being called Lot No. 2 in land granted the late Corps of New York Volunteers together with all buildings, houses and out houses, barns, sheds, fences, woods, and underwoods, and all and every improvement...

In 1791 Michael Hawkins again petitioned Thomas Carleton, stating that he has "resided since the Year 1783 in the Province and has never obtained any land, a Lot No. 11 on the Madam Kishvie Granted to LEWIS BENNET has never been settled nor improved thereon...Lewis Bennet has left the Province with the intent not to return..." and ask that the Council would grant said lot "Your Memorialist being perfectly willing to pay the expence that may accrue from the exchange of the same."²

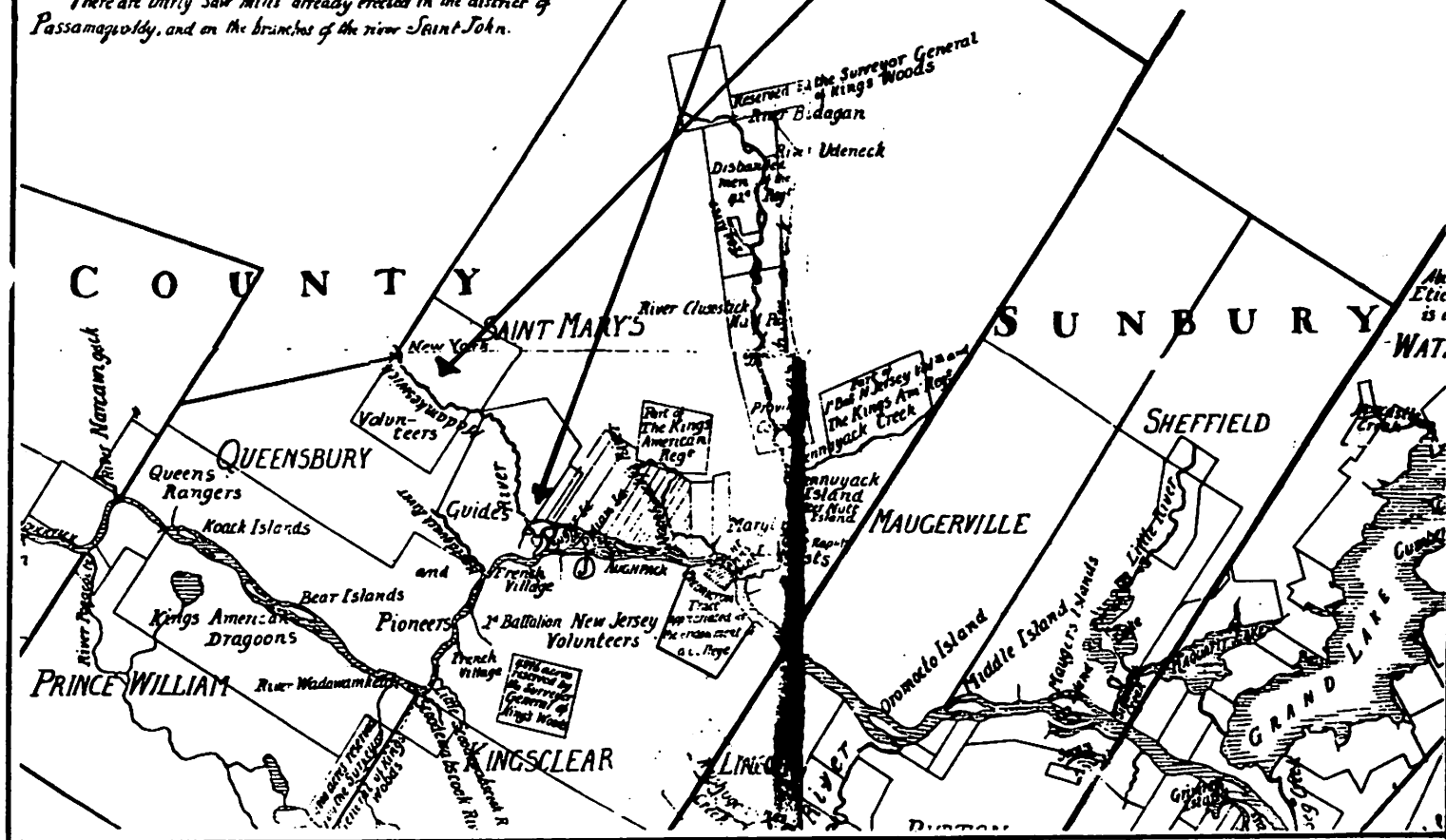

The river Saint John is navigable for vessels of fifty tons as high up as Saint Ann's point from thence to the Great Falls and upwards, the communication is easy for canoes or batteaux. All the branches below Saint Ann's point are navigable for boats of any size.

The falls at the mouth of the river are passable twice in every tide, when the waters of the river are level with those of the bay, which is about twenty minutes each time. At high tide the water falls into the river, and at low water the fall is outwards.

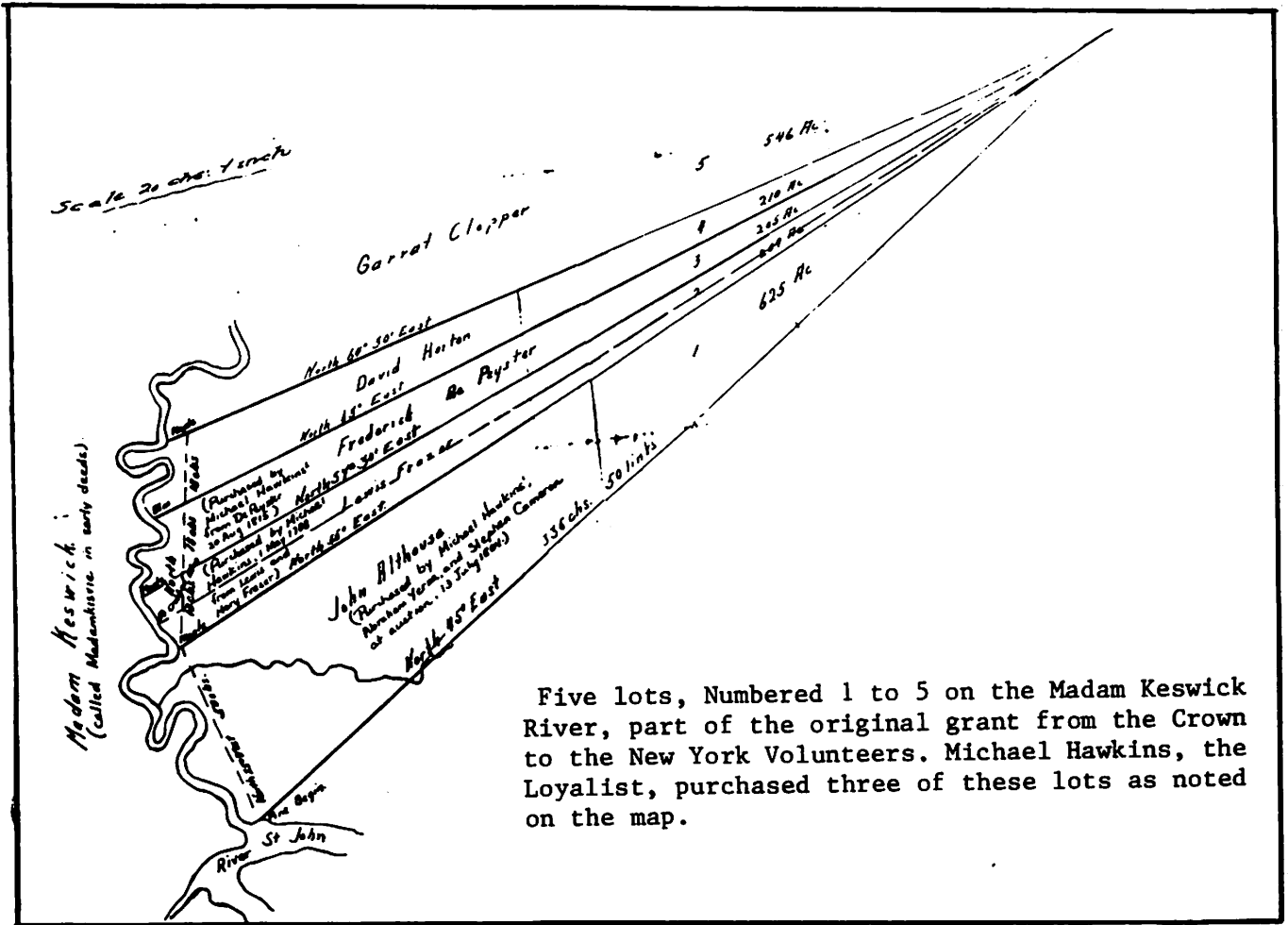
There are thirty saw mills already erected in the district of Passamaguddy, and on the branches of the river Saint John.

Michael Hawkins's land was located on the Madamkeswick near this point. As will be noted, he also owned land in the New York Volunteers block which is upriver from Keswick.

Together with Stephen Cameron and Abraham Yerxa, Michael Hawkins attended an estate sale in Fredericton on 13 July 1804. At the sale, Sheriff William Anderson was to sell land owned by John Althouse, deceased. For 215 Pounds the three men, as highest bidders, purchased land on the Madam Keswick, in York County, described as

...beginning at a Pine Tree on the Northeast side of Madamkeswick Creek, thence up the said creek to land belonging to Serjeant (sic) Fraser and bounded on East by land of Serjeant Kruger, containing 700 acres more or less.¹

On June 6, 1811, Michael Hawkins, for the first time with his wife Eleanor, quit-claimed to Stephen Cameron of Fredericton, for seventy-one pounds, thirteen shill-

ings, and four pence

...one equal and undivided third part of a Tract of land and premises situate lying and being in the Parish of St. Mary's...late the property of John Althouse Deceased the whole tract containing 700 acres more or less and purchased by the Said Michael Hawkins, Stephen Cameron, and Abraham Yerxa at a Sheriff Sale in Fredericton on 10 February 1784 (sic)

...

The deed is signed by the mark of Eleanor and Michael Hawkins and was witnessed by Sam^l Clapper and James Cameron.¹

In 1815 Michael again purchased land on the Madam Keswick, this time a tract containing 206 acres and designated Lot No. 3 in St. Mary's Parish, County of York. This land was purchased from Frederick DePeyster "of the City of New York, in the United States of America," Merchant, and his wife, for the sum of 100 pounds. The deed was dated 20 August 1815.²

The first purchase made by Michael Hawkins down river from St. Mary's, this time on the Saint John River itself, was by a deed dated 6 July 1815. In that year he obtained from Charles Ryant of the "Township of Grantsham in Province of upper Canada and vicinity of Niagara," Lot No. 21 in the Nashwaaksis Grant. He paid fifteen pounds for the lot.³

Perhaps one of the most interesting documents of Michael Hawkins's, is a deed dated 30 June 1824. In that deed

...Michael Hawkins of Douglas...in consideration of my strong attachment to the Church of England...grant to the Rector Church Wardens and vestry of St. Mary's Church in the Parish of Douglas All that Lot and piece of land containing one acre more or less on which the church now stands lying lately in the Parish of St. Marys' now is said Parish of Douglas (late-ly erected)...to have and to hold forever.⁴

The deed was signed by Michael Hawkins, his mark, and witnessed by Henry Smith and Michael Hughes.

The church, known as St. Marys' Parish Church, has long since disappeared, but the location of the former church building is still visable. The churchyard and burying ground is known as the Keswick Cemetery and located at Mouth of Keswick. In this cemetery will be found six white posts, now surrounding the Yerxa lots, which mark the original boundaries of the church building. In the yard are buried his son John Michael Hawkins and many of his descendants. Nearby are buried Abraham Yerxa, with whom Michael Hawkins had many business dealings, along with many of his kinsmen, all loyal members of the Church of England and subjects of the King.

We next find mention of Michael Hawkins in 1825 when he sold to his son Michael Hwwkins Junr. In this deed, dated 16 June, Michael Hawkins Yeoman, and his wife Leany,

...for and in consideration of One hundred Pounds...from Michael Hawkins Junr, Yeoman...a piece and part of land in Parish of Douglas on the Mad-amkeswick river known and described as Lot No. 2 in the grant of the late Corps of New York Volunteers...containing an estimated 209 acres.

Signed with their marks, the deed was witnessed by John West.¹

The last land transaction made by Michael Hawkins, Loyalist, to be found in the official records, was made in 1839. On the 26th of April he sold to Abraham Hawkins, for 150 Pounds, land on the Madam Keswick Creek which he had from Frederick DePeyster and his wife Ann, containing 260 acres more or less. The deed was signed with Michael Hawkins's signature!! and was witnessed by David and Michael Yerxa.²

Thus ends the official record of Michael Hawkins and his wife Eleanor. No doubt, other records of Michael will come to light with further research in the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick and in New Jersey. The only clue we have, at this time, to Michael Hawkins's dates of birth and death is a note, found in an old family Bible once owned by his grandson Stephen Hawkins, which reads:

Generation One: MICHAEL HAWKINS, LOYALIST

Your grandfather (meaning Michael Hawkins) died about 1845--95 years old
...grandmothers name was Elenor Brower died about 1837 age 74 years.

Thus, if this information is correct, we can place the birth of Michael Hawkins at about 1750 in New Jersey. His wife, Eleanor Brower¹, probably a daughter of Cornelius Brower, a Loyalist of New York, was born about 1763. We do know that the Loyalist, his wife Eleanor, and their daughter Sarah and her husband James Yerxa, were all buried in a small family cemetery just to one side of the present Keswick Cemetery. Family members tell me that there were once large gravestones there marking each grave but that, in later years, cows were allowed to graze there and those stones were eventually knocked down and destroyed.

* The parentage of Eleanor Brower has not been ascertained however there is much written about the Brower family which will eventually provide interesting reading in an appendices. It is through her supposed connected to Anneke Jans Bogardus that the Hawkins family became involved in the erroneous suit involving Trinity Church in New York City and the fortune supposedly resting in a bank in Holland, waiting for those who could prove descent from Anneke Jans Bogardus. Much money and time were spent in this persuit by many Hawkins family members as well as many other families in New Brunswick and the United States. Unfortunately, it was this suit that also brought about the loss of many family records, including the family Bibles, which family members trusted to "lawyers" to use in the suit but which were never returned.

PART IV

Anneke & Roelof--Some Descendants

Sara Roeloffson

Sara, the daughter of Anneke Jans and Roelof Jansen, was married three times at the Dutch Reformed Church at New Amsterdam.

Her first marriage on 29 June 1642 to Dr. Hans Kierstede gave ten children to the world of which seven survived to reach adulthood.

After the death of her first husband about 1667, she married for the second time on September 1, 1669 to Cornelius Van Borsum, the son of Egbert Van Borsum and his wife, Annetje Hendricks. They came from Embden, Holland. From this marriage one child was born, a daughter, Anna. Cornelius died in September of 1682.

In her third marriage she exchanged vows with Elbert Elbertzen Stoothoff on 21 July 1683. Sara was 56 years old. Elbert was a widower whose first wife's name was Altje Cornelius Cool.

Sara, who had been baptized 5 April 1627 at Amsterdam, had come over to the new world with her parents in 1630. She spoke both English and Dutch and became greatly proficient in the Indian languages.

Her capabilities did not go unnoticed and were often used by the leaders of the Dutch colony. In 1664 she acted as an interpreter in negotiating a treaty made by Peter Stuyvesant with the Hudson River Indians. Sara's talent did not go unappreciated and on account of her excellent services over a number of years she was rewarded by a patent of land that was granted to her second husband, Cornelius Van Borsum, on October 14, 1673, ". . . of a lot on Manhattan Island, north of the windmill on the west side of the road that runs to Klatchhook."

Sara died before the 21st of October 1693, as on that date both a will and a codicil were proved in her name. The codicil to her will was dated August 7, 1693, thus, we know she died between those two dates, in her 67th year.

There is no question that she lived a long, hard, and fruitful life. She was a true pioneer woman and obviously an intelligent person. She had just turned 15 at her first marriage and in the years that followed she would bring ten children into the world. She is an ancestor worthy of our memory.

The Kierstede Brothers of Magdenburg

Hans Kierstede and his brother, Jochem, were refugees from the

city of Magdenburg, Germany. This is the city that was sacked by Tilly in 1630.

What occurred there or what was allowed to happen by General Tserclaes Von Tilly, who was by birth a Dutchman, was typical of the horror men can inflict on their brothers when the thin veneer of civilization is wiped away and evilness is loosed upon the land. It is a wonder that anyone at all survived.

Within a period of 12 hours the city was reduced to rubble and smoking ashes. No one was spared whether young or old including the women who were raped and then murdered. Even the children were slain by the sword and the entire number of people killed was not less than 30,000 with some chroniclers claiming the number was as high as 50,000 dead.

Somehow, Hans and Jochem did escape and eight years later were able to find their way to America. How they survived and where they were in the intervening eight years is unknown to this writer. Seventeen years after their arrival, Jochem, on a trip back to Holland with Evert Bogardus, on that same fateful ship, perished. And thus it is that Jochem never married and left no issue, but his brother, Hans, a physician and surgeon employed by the Dutch West India Company, met and married Sara Roeloffson.

Hans and Sara raised a family of ten children as we mentioned before, six sons and four daughters. It is known that Hans died prior to 17 July 1667 as on that day his name is mentioned in a deed that describes him as dead. His youngest child, Rachel, baptized 13 September 1665 must have been only a little over one year old when he passed away.

The name of Hans Kierstede first shows up in the Dutch records on May 1, 1638. He left the service of the West India Company before 28 August 1648 because on that date a power of attorney is given to Willem Turck to collect money due him from the Company for his late service.

After he detached himself from the West India Company he remained in New Amsterdam working in a private capacity as a surgeon and physician.

Four of his sons lived to promulgate the Kierstede line: Hans, Roeloff, Lucas, and Jacobus. Three daughters matured, married and raised their families.

The Holmes Family

Jacobus Kierstede married Anna Holmes at Flatbush, N.Y. on 22 May 1691. She was the daughter of Samuel Holmes and Abigail Stillwell and was the granddaughter of Reverend Obadiah Holmes.

Samuel Kierstede, the grandson of Anna Holmes, married Mary Johnson and eventually emigrated to New Brunswick with his family in 1783. His grandmother, Anna, a descendant of the Holmes family, has a family line that can be traced back to the early 15th century.

The Holmes family originates from the parish of Manchester in Lancashire, England. The information gathered to date begins

with Nicholas Hulme who married Janet. They had sons named James and Robert. Robert had a son named Robert who married Alyce, a woman whose family name is still unknown as in the case of Janet.

In a will, dated 11-8-1602, Robert who married Alyce, left his lands to a son, Robert, and to his widow, Alyce. He was buried at Stocport as "Ould Robert Hulme of Reddich."

Robert, the son of Robert Hulme of Reddich, married Katherine Johnson. He died at Chester, England and was buried at Stocport on 12 November 1640. They gave life to one daughter and eight sons. One of the sons, Obadiah, born 18 November 1606, was Anna's grandfather.

Obadiah married Katherine Hyde on 20 November at Collegiate Church in Manchester. Their first child, John, died in infancy on 27 June 1633. Late in 1634, a second son Jonathan, was born to them in Manchester, England. Four years later, in 1638, Obadiah, his wife, and young son sailed for America from Preston in Lancashire. At least eight more children were added to the family after they settled in America.

Baptized March 18, 1610 in Didsbury, England, Obadiah lived to the age of 76 years, dying October 15, 1682. He is buried in a family plot located in Middletown, Rhode Island.

He was well educated having attended Oxford University as did two of his brothers. When he first came to America with his family they settled at Salem, Massachusetts where Obadiah made glass and was called a glass worker.

In 1639, Obadiah was given membership in the Puritan Church of Salem. About ten years later, when the family moved to Seekonk, Massachusetts, his church membership was transferred to the church of Reverend Newman in Rehoboth.

A quarrel soon erupted between them as Obadiah claimed Newman slandered him, saying he had taken a false oath in court. Obadiah and eight others left the Puritan church and were admitted to the Baptist church.

Newman then excommunicated them and things continued to worsen until all the ecommunicates were tried at Plymouth on October 2, 1650 in front of Governor Bradford, John Alden, Capt. Miles Standish and William Bradford. At this juncture, seeking freedom of worship, Obadiah left Massachusetts and settled east of Newport, now Middletown, Rhode Island.

The following spring, in early May, he and a few other members of the Newport church were visiting fellow Baptists in Lynn, Massachusetts, when they were seized, imprisoned and tried in a court session held in Boston on May 31, 1651.

Obadiah was sentenced to pay 30 pounds or be whipped with the same number of lashes. He refused to pay the fine nor would he allow his friends to pay it. He was then thrown back into prison until that fall.

On the 5th day of September he was tied to a post on State Street in Boston and beaten so terribly that it was said he could not stand the torment of having any portion of his body touch his bedding except for his knees and elbows. Evidently, he was a man of strong spirit as later on he wrote of this episode in his life in

this manner: ". . . as the man began to lay the strokes upon my back, I said to the people, though my flesh shall fail, and my spirit shall fail, yet my God would not fail. . . I had such a spiritual manifestation of God's presence. . . I could well bear it, yea, and in a manner felt it not. . . the man striking me with all his strength. . . with a three corded whip, giving me there-with thirty strokes. When he had loosed me from the post, having joyfulness in my heart. . . I told the Magistrates, you have struck me with roses. . ."

He was a hard-working, God-fearing, honest man who devoted his life to his family and the Baptist church. Obadiah was also very active in civil affairs and in 1676 was commended by the General Assembly for his work and contributions to society.

The Stilwell(Stillwell) Family

Nicholas Stillwell whose origins can be traced back to Guilford, Surrey County in England, emigrated from Leyden in Holland about 1638 and after the death of his first wife, Abigail Hopton. He brought with him his only two children from his first marriage, Richard, born about 1636, and Nicholas, born about 1638, and he settled on Manhattan Island.

His great-grandfather, John of Collampore, Surrey County, England, was born in 1515 and died in 1558. John was married to Joana who died in 1585. They had five children, one of whom was also named John, born in 1539, and who married Jane Pearl or, perhaps, Parle.

John Stilwell and Jane Pearl, the grandparents of Lt. Nicholas Stillwell had four children, the younger of whom, was Nicholas Stilwell, born in 1570 and died in 1607. His wife's name was Ales or Alyce and they had a family of six children, the fifth being Nicholas II, who was born about 1603 and was the one who emigrated to America and known as Lt. Nicholas Stillwell.

Nicholas II, took as his second wife, Anna Van Dyke, by whom he had as issue: Ann, b. 1639; Abigail or Alse, b. 1645; William, b. 1656; Thomas, b. 9-7-1651; Daniel, b. 13-11-1653; Elias; and Jeremiah, b. 16-10-1660.

The family eventually settled on the eastern shore of Staten Island, where Nicholas died on the 28th day of December in 1671.

The child named Abigail is of interest as she is in the direct line of ancestry. She married three times. She first married Samuel, the son of Obadiah Holmes on 26 October 1665.

This first marriage resulted in the following children: Samuel, b. 12-2-1668, who died single; Henry, who died single; Joseph, b. 17-3-1672; Catherine, b. 15-6-1675; Ann, b. 20-12-1670, who married Jacobus Kierstede; and Mary, who died single.

After the death of Samuel Holmes, Abigail, in 1680, married William Osborne who died without issue. Her third marriage, in 1683, to Daniel Lake resulted in five more children being added to the family: John, Abraham, Elizabeth, Thomas, and another child named Ann.

Legendary Origins of The Stillwell Name

It is said that the origin of the name Stillwell can be traced to about the year 1450 and came from certain peculiar wells or springs near Warborough in Surrey County, England.

They were called still-wells or high still-wells and the name was applied to the members of the families and all their descendants who lived on the lands in the vicinity.

Among the peculiarities attributed to these wells or springs were the fact that they were still, deep, pure and sparkling, and they never froze, all of which characteristics are said to have been preserved in the traits and habits of the descendants of those who took their name and first drank of their waters.

The Search For Lydia Dey

My original research on Lydia Dey appeared to indicate she might have been descended from Dirck Janse Dey(alias Dirck Jansen, alias Dirck Sieken), but recent investigations of mine and material I have received from William Brower Bogardus of Modesto, Calif., a direct descendant of Rev. Bogardus, provides the information needed on Lydia Dey.

She married on 8-2-1718 to Samuel Kierstede at Port Richmond, Staten Island. Her parents remained unknown to me as I had not found Lydia's baptismal records, but several clues had emerged in my research.

The first was found in a Rutland family genealogy that had a section on the Kierstede family and it stated that Lydia was the daughter of John Dey who married Mary Molines in 1695. A brief note made mention that Mary and John were Huguenots.

Another clue was dug out from an extensive genealogy on the Treman family by E.M. Treman, written in 1901.

Then, in the records of baptism for the children of Lydia Dey and Samuel Kierstede, I found the following additional clues:

1. Lydia's surname is rendered capriciously as: Deny, Dey, and Deuy. Possibly some researchers mistook the letter "u" for an "n".
2. Witnesses at the birth of their son Samuel(the baptism) were: Jacobus Egberts and Catherine Dey.
3. Witnesses at the baptism of their son Johannes were: Francois Bodin and his wife, Maria Deny(Deuy).

Finally, just prior to finishing this article, I received more(but incomplete) material and if all of the information I have is assembled I am at last able to describe Lydia Dey's ancestral background as follows:

Laurens Duytzen was born in 1610 in Holland and died at Bergen, New Jersey on 14 January 1668. He came to the colony of New Amsterdam on the ship Fire of Troy, arriving in July of 1639. He married twice, first to Gritje Jansen, and then, secondly, her sister, Ytie Jansen. He had the following children(the information does not state from which spouse):

1. Margarite, b. 23-12-1639
2. Hans Laurens, b. 23-3-1642, died before 1644
3. Hans Laurens, b. 28-9-1644
4. Jannetje
5. Cornelius

Hans Laurens(Hans Laurentzen Dutsch(Duyts)) married:(1) Jannetje Juriaens on 2-10-1667 and(2) Neeltje Adriaens on 27-9-1673. He had the following children(again the data I have does not tell me from which spouse): Laurens, James, and Catherine.

James Hans Dey, bp.31-12-1671,N.Y., married ca. 1695 to Mary Molenaar and had: Elizabeth, Mary, Catherine, and Lydia(this is the Lydia we are seeking).

He married a second time to Margaret about 1705 and they had: James, Sarah, Lawrence, Margaret, Isaac, John, and William.

Lydia was born about 1700 in Richmond County, Staten Island and in all likelihood spent her entire life there. Her father, James, who had served as highway surveyor and was a corporal in Capt. James Pollion's company of militia in Richmond County, signed his will as James Deuy. Two of her siblings, Margaret and William, each named a daughter Lydia.

Thus, with the hopeful addition of a few more facts in the not too distant future, our search for Lydia Dey is almost over and we can add a few more individuals to Catherine DeLong's family tree.

The Puzzle of Aaron DeLong

Who was Aaron DeLong and where did he come from? What origin did the other DeLong families of New Brunswick have? These questions are waiting to be answered and with the help of a great many people in the United States and Canada I am able to write this section. Numerous clues provided by others helped to lead me to the right records to verify most of the information. Some questions still remain, but I believe before long the ancestry of all the New Brunswick DeLong families will be known.

From my study of numerous records it seems that the surname was originally: De Langet. They were evidently French Huguenots and since the fianl "t" is not pronounced in French, it was eventually dropped to form De Lange, then De Lang, and, finally, DeLong and Delong. All of these progressive changes can be found in New York state records.

The known and verifiable line begins with Franciscus Adrianus-zoon De Langet who was born in 1634 in North Brabant. His son, using the method of name adoption employed by the Dutch of that time, had the name of Adrianus Franciscuszoon De Langet, but used various shortened forms of his name and was shown in many records I studied as Ary or Aryan Fransen. I found at least three variations: Ary Franz Langet, Adriaan Fransen, and Aryan Fransen. He probably used many others.

Ary was most likely born about 1655 since his first son was born in New Amsterdam around 1680, thus, his marriage to Rachel Jansen Pier possibly occurred about 1678 or 1679.

Rachel was the daughter of Jan Theunissen Pier and his wife,

Maritje Jans. Jan Pier, who most likely was born in the Netherlands, died before 1676, since his wife, Maritje, remarried on the 12th of April in that year to Willem Jansen Romen. Rachel, it is thought, was born between 1657 and 1659.

The major part of the early family history appears to center in Dutchess County, New York, and, in particular, around the towns of Fishkill and Poughkeepsie. Another area is in Ulster County, New York and the town of Kingston where a considerable number of baptisms took place.

The following was found in Dutchess County records:

Martin Wiltsie, son of Cornelius Wiltsie was born in Newtown, Queens, Long Island and batized at Jamaica, Long Island on 22-5-1715.

About 1733 his family moved to Dutchess County--there he married, Maria DeLange, a native of Dutchess County--intentions were registered at Fishkill on 14 December 1735. She was the daughter of Frans De Lange and his wife Maria Van Shaick and was baptized at the Poughkeepsie Dutch Church on 10 October 1716.

Maria's brother, Arie De Lange married Martin's sister, Anne on 6-6-1734 and they raised a family of 9 children.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS SERVICE

CHANGES IN PROCESSING REQUESTS FOR COPIES OF VETERANS' RECORDS AND PASSENGER ARRIVAL RECORDS.....

Effective May 1, 1984, all requests for copies of military service records or passenger arrival records must be submitted on NATF Forms 80 and 81, respectively. After May 1 prior versions of these forms (NATF Form 26 and NATF Form 40) will not be accepted for processing. All forms other than the NATF Form 80 or NATF Form 81 that are received after May 1 will be returned.

A change in payment policies will also take effect May 1, 1984. NARS has in the past required that payment accompany requests for copies of verterans' records and passenger arrival records. After May 1, 1984 payment should not be sent with the NATF forms 80 and 81. NARS will research the request, prepare copies of any records located, and HOLD THE COPIES FOR 30 days or until payment is received, whichever is sooner. As soon as records are located and copied, researchers will receive a bill and instructions on returning their remittances.

Researchers should also submit a separate NATF-Form 80 for each file (pension or bounty-land or compiled military service) desired. Previously researchers could ask for multiple files on one form. This change is designed to facilitate processing by the National Archives. The National Archives Trust Fund Board has announced that all restrictions have been lifted on access to name indexes to Passenger Arrivals and Passenger & Crew Lists in the custody of the National Archives. The Passenger Arrival Records 1883-1954 previously subject to a fifty year restriction have been released by the Immigration and Naturalization Service. 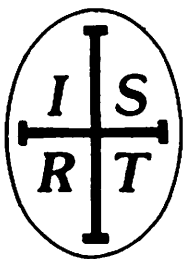
