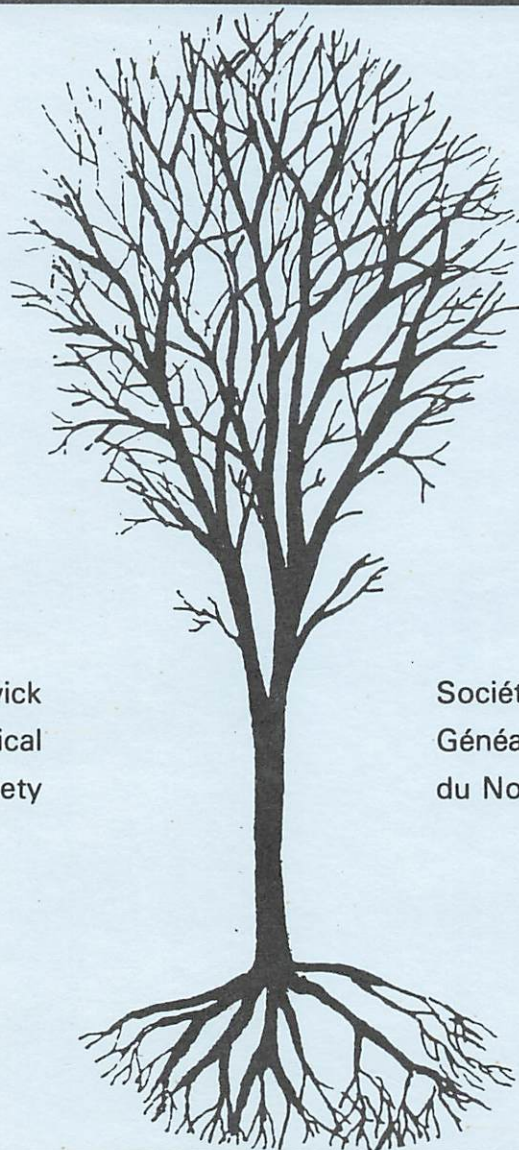

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THE NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY CONSTITUTIONARTICLE I - NAME

- Sec. 1 The name of the Provincial Society is the New Brunswick Genealogical Society (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the Society).
- Sec. 2 Affiliated Branches are named The New Brunswick Genealogical Society, \_\_\_\_\_ Branch (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the Branch).

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

- Sec. 1 To promote the study of Genealogy and genealogical research in the Province of New Brunswick.
- Sec. 2 To encourage the establishment of Branches which will further the objectives of the Society.
- Sec. 3 To encourage accuracy and thoroughness in research.
- Sec. 4 To encourage and instruct members in the ethical principles, scientific methods, and effective techniques of genealogical research through publications, and workshops.
- Sec. 5 To assemble a library of genealogical guides, handbooks, reference sources, family and local histories, and other books and materials which may assist the members, all of which will be available to the members.
- Sec. 6 To establish friendly relations with other genealogical societies for exchange of ideas and information and the promotion of common interests.
- Sec. 7 The Society shall be carried on without purpose of financial gain for its members and any profits or other accretions to the Society shall be used in promoting its objects.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Sec. 1 Membership in the Society is open to individuals, families, and institutions interested in Genealogy.

#### ARTICLE IV - EXECUTIVE

- Sec. 1 New Brunswick residents holding individual, or family membership in the Society are eligible for election to any office of the Executive, provided, however, that no more than one person from a family membership shall hold executive office at the same time.
- Sec. 2 The Executive is composed of the following officers: Immediate Past President, President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Membership Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and three representatives of each Branch.
- Sec. 3 The affairs of the Society are managed by an Executive Committee which is composed of the officers of the Society.

#### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

- Sec. 1 The Annual General Meeting of the Society is held in May of each year for the election of officers, the presentation of reports, the appointment of an auditor or auditors, the determination of policy, and the general direction of the Society.
- Sec. 2 Special and other General Meetings of the members are called by the Executive on its own initiative, and by the Executive on the petition of ten percent (10%) of the members in good standing.
- Sec. 3 The quorum for the Annual General Meeting shall be twelve (12) members in good standing, present in person.

#### ARTICLE VI - ELECTIONS

- Sec. 1 Elected officers and branch representatives shall serve for a period of one year or until their successors are elected.
- Sec. 2 No person shall be elected President for a period in excess of two successive years.



# ARTICLE VII - BY-LAWS

Sec. 1 By-laws may be enacted to govern the conduct of the Society.

# ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

- Sec. 1 Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed by the Executive or to the Executive, in writing, sixty (60) days prior to the Annual General Meeting or to any General Meeting that may be called for a special purpose.
- Sec. 2 The membership of the Society shall then be given at least thirty (30) days clear notice of the intention to propose such amendments at the next General Meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose.
- Sec. 3 Any amendments to the Constitution and By-laws must be confirmed by at least two-thirds of the votes cast.

# ARTICLE IX - DISSOLUTION

- Sec. 1 In the event of the dissolution of the Society and after payment of all debts and liabilities, the remaining property of the Society shall be transferred for safe-keeping to the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick or other similar organization dealing with the preservation of historical and genealogical source material, as determined by the membership of the Society at the time of dissolution.
- Sec. 2 If the Society should be re-activated within five (5) years from the date of dissolution, those properties of the Society entrusted to the organization chosen, shall be turned over to the re-activated Society by the said organization. If however, re-activation does not take place within the stipulated five (5) years, those properties of the Society entrusted to the organization chosen, will become the property of the said organization.



THE NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY BY-LAWS1. MEMBERSHIP

1. Any person, family, or institution interested in the objectives of the Society and willing to subscribe to its By-laws may become a member upon payment of dues as hereinafter provided.
2. Membership is of the following classes:
  - (a) Individual. Open to any person wherever resident.
  - (b) Family. Open to any family wherever resident. Each family member shall have individual membership status.
  - (c) Institutional. Open to museums, libraries, and educational institutions interested in supporting the aims of the Society.
  - (d) Honorary. Granted by the Executive to deserving individuals who have rendered long service to the Society or the Province.
3. Membership is deemed to have lapsed if a member's annual dues are not paid within thirty (30) days of the date due and the member shall no longer be considered a member in good standing; but membership may be immediately revived upon payment of such dues.
4. Any member who allows his membership to lapse, or who resigns or withdraws, forfeits all rights to, or claims upon the Society's funds and effects.
5. Beginning as of May first (1) membership is effective for the ensuing twelve (12) months.

2. DUES

1. Annual membership dues are set by the executive and voted upon by the membership in a General Meeting.
2. Membership dues for the Society and for each of the Branches are set and administered by their respective Executives.
3. Branches will collect Society dues of members and forward them to the Society Treasurer.

### 3. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE EXECUTIVE

1. The Executive of the Society, subject to the By-laws, or to the directions given to it by a majority vote of any General Meeting properly called, has full control and management of the affairs of the Society and the custody and control of all its property of whatever kind, may enter into contracts of employment, and may borrow and otherwise deal with money.
2. When a vacancy, by death or resignation, occurs between Annual General Meetings, the Executive has authority to appoint someone to fill the vacant office until the next Annual General Meeting.
3. The Executive appoints the following to carry out programs and projects of the Society: Membership Committee Chairman, Program Committee Chairman, Publications Chairman, Public Relations Officers, Librarian, and such other Committee Chairmen or Officers as the Executive decides to appoint.
4. Appointed chairmen or officers serve one year or longer at the discretion of the Executive.

### 4. DUTIES OF MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE

1. The President is, ex officio, a member of all committees and when present, presides at all meetings of the Executive. Subject to the By-laws, or to the directions given by a General Meeting, or a meeting of the Executive, the president is and performs the functions of the chief officer of the Society.
2. A Vice President performs the functions of the President when the President is unable through illness or absence, and has such other responsibilities as are assigned by the Executive from time to time.
3. The Recording Secretary
  - (a) makes an adequate and accurate record of proceedings of all meetings of the Society and the Executive.
  - (b) has charge of the Seal of the Society, which Seal whenever used is authenticated by the signature of the Secretary and the President.
4. The Corresponding Secretary
  - (a) answers correspondence about the Society and performs other duties as assigned.



5. The Membership Secretary

- (a) keeps an up-to-date membership and mailing list and performs other duties as assigned.

6. The Treasurer

- (a) receives all money paid to the Society and is responsible for the deposit of the same in whatever bank the Executive directs.
- (b) properly accounts for all funds of the Society and keeps books as directed.
- (c) presents to the Executive a full detailed account of the receipts and disbursements whenever requested.
- (d) prepares and presents to the Annual General Meeting of the Society, a statement setting forth the financial position of the Society, which statement is audited.
- (e) submits a copy of the annual financial statement to the Secretary for inclusion in the Secretary's records of proceedings.

7. The Treasurer and a Secretary may be one person.

8. Other officers shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them from time to time by the Executive or by a General Meeting.

5. ANNUAL AND GENERAL MEETINGS

- 1. At any General Meeting other than the Annual General Meeting only such business is dealt with as is specified in the petition or the summons to the meeting.
- 2. Every member is given thirty (30) days' notice, to his last known address, of the intention to hold a Special or other General Meeting, or an Annual General Meeting, together with notice of the place and time of the meeting, and the purpose of the meeting.

6. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- 1. At least three (3) months prior to the Annual General Meeting of the Society the Executive shall appoint a Nominating Committee of three (3) members.

2. The Nominating Committee shall report its nominations to the President at least one month prior to the Annual General Meeting and the membership shall be notified at least two weeks before the Annual General Meeting.
3. Further nominations may be placed on the floor of the Annual General Meeting, providing that the written consent of the nominee has been received by the Secretary of the Society.
4. Every person nominated shall be a member of the Society in good standing, and a letter of acceptance shall be filed with the Secretary of the Society.

## 7. BRANCHES

1. The Executive of the Society encourages and arranges for the formation or the recognition of Branches of the Society in any city, town, or other district in the province where at least twenty (20) persons signify their desire to be so recognized as a Branch and in writing confirm to the Society the establishment of such Branch.
2. The objectives of any Branch are the same as those of the Society.
3. The powers of any Branch are those conferred upon it by the Society; and a Branch enacts such By-laws as are required for its own good government, provided such By-laws are not inconsistent with the By-laws of the Society and a copy of the By-laws is lodged with the Secretary of the Society.
4. Branches forward notification and minutes of meetings to the Society Executive Committee and make annual reports to the Annual General Meeting of the Society; including a President's Report and an audited Treasurer's Report.
5. The management of each Branch is vested in an Executive Committee of the Branch elected at its own Annual Meeting.
6. The Branch is represented on the Executive of the Society by three (3) duly appointed representatives.
7. A Branch supports the Society by payment of its dues as stipulated in By-law 2 Dues: Section 3. Such payment entitles Branch members to membership in the Society.

A separate index has been added for both the husband and the wife with cross-reference to the Main Sequential Listing. The introduction provides descriptions of the formation and structure of the County and its Parishes.

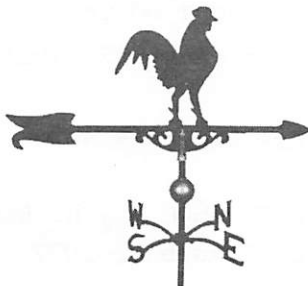

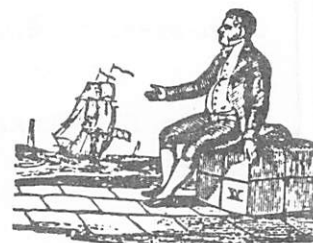
#### BOOKS OF ATLANTIC CANADA

LOYALIST ISAAC BOSTWICK

Isaac Bostwick was born in Stamford, Connecticut in 1759, lived in Greenwich in 1764, and probably in New Milford in 1775. By 1782, he was living on Long Island, New York, where he married Tamson Cable. In 1783, the family went to New Brunswick, and settled on the Kingston Peninsula, where Isaac died in 1808. Isaac and Tamson had ten children: Mary (b. 1783-d. young), Hanford (1785-1865), Hannah (1787-1871), Sarah (1789-1820), Clarissa (1789-1816), Thomas (b. 1793-d. around 1875), Jared (1794-1858), Ann (1797-1882), Jane (1800-1877), and Hiram (1802-1854).

ANCESTRY OF ISAAC BOSTWICK

Isaac was a fifth generation American, descended from Arthur. The surname Bostwick is of Cornish British origin meaning the house near the haven or creek, from 'bos' = a house and 'wick' = a haven or creek. The name is also from the Dutch meaning a town in the wood, from 'bosch' = a wood and 'wick' = a town.<sup>1</sup>

Arthur Bostwick (great-great grandfather of Isaac) son of Arthur was baptised 21 December 1603 at Tarporley, Cheshire Co., England. He was married first to Jane Whittell, 8 January 1627/8, at St. Helen's Parish Church, Tarporley, England. Jane Whittell was baptised at St. John's Church, Chester on 11 April 1602, daughter of William & Margaret (Barnes).<sup>2</sup> This Arthur was the first Bostwick in America, having settled in Stratford, Connecticut 1639-40, where he occupied one of the original town lots. Arthur married secondly the Widow Ellen Tomlinson around 1650. He settled for a time (1643-48) at Southampton, Long Island, then returned to Stratford, where he died around 1680/1.<sup>3</sup> Children of Arthur & Jane listed baptised at Tarporley: Mary, Jane, Ellen, Arthur, and John\*(below).<sup>4</sup>

John Bostwick (great grandfather of Isaac), son of Arthur and Jane. John was baptised 18 October 1638 at St. Helen's Parish Church, Tarporley, Cheshire Co., England, and died at Stratford, Connecticut before December 1688. He was married around 1665 to Mary, daughter of John and Mary (Carter) Brinsmeade.<sup>5</sup> Mary was born 24 July 1640 at Charlestown, Massachusetts, and died in 1704 at Stratford. There were seven children mentioned in John's will: John, Zachariah\*(below), Joseph, Mary, Elizabeth, Jane, and Benjamin.<sup>6</sup>

Zachariah Bostwick (grandfather of Isaac) son of John and Mary. He was born at Stratford, Connecticut 24 July 1669 and died there August 1734. He was married first to Elizabeth \_\_\_\_\_ (mother of Meredith), around 1690 and then to Kezia Talmadge, after 1715. The will of Zachariah dated 6 August 1734 and probated 21 August 1734 mentions sons: David, Jonathan, Zachariah, Ephraim, and Marriday (Meredith)\*(below), and daughters: Mary, Martha, Parnel, Susannah & Elizabeth.<sup>7</sup>

Meredith (Merridy, Meriday) Bostwick (father of Isaac) son of Zachariah and Elizabeth was born around 1714, at Stratford, Connecticut. The estate of Meredith Bostwick, late of Greenwich, Connecticut, was probated 5 August 1763 at Stamford, Connecticut. His first wife was Mary Strong, whom he married around 1743. His second wife and the mother of Isaac was Hannah Hanford, whom Zachariah married around 1757.<sup>8</sup> Isaac was baptised on 29 July 1759 in Stamford First Congregational Church, Connecticut, the son of Merridy.<sup>9</sup> (The Bostwick Genealogy made an incorrect guess as to his parentage putting him as the son of Isaac Bostwick and his wife Mary Kimberly, of Derby, CT.<sup>10</sup> No evidence of a son Isaac is found in either baptismal or probate records for this couple. It is correct, however, to assume that Isaac is the son of Meredith and Hannah, according to the baptismal record found, despite the discrepancy found between his baptismal date (29 July 1759) and his birth date (27 May 1760) from a Bible. Such discrepancies are very common, since the Bible record was written down many years after the event and based on hearsay evidence.)



Hannah was the widow of David Lockwood, and the daughter of Captain Elnathan Hanford and Sarah St. John, of Norwalk, Connecticut. Hannah was born 8 March 1728/9 at Norwalk. She remarried 15 February 1764 at Greenwich, Connecticut to John Perrott.<sup>11</sup>

#### LIFE OF ISAAC BOSTWICK

Isaac lived in Connecticut, being baptised in Stamford, living in Greenwich at the time of his father's death and mother's remarriage and possibly later in New Milford. He gave evidence in the claim of Samuel Miles, of New Milford, at the Loyalist Commission inquiries into losses suffered in America.<sup>12</sup> The property of Samuel Miles had been appraised by Isaac Bostwick and Sylvanus Whitney. (In these claims, the petitioner had to state where he had resided in 1775, before the outbreak of the Revolutionary War.)

On November 18, 1782, Isaac married Tamson Augusta Cable at Smithtown, Long Island, New York.<sup>13</sup> Long Island was occupied by the British from the Autumn of 1776, until the Autumn of 1783, and was thus a Loyalist haven. Isaac had probably joined other Loyalist refugees on Long Island, at some point during the Revolutionary War, when being a "Tory" meant being a traitor to America.

We call them "Loyalists"; to the Americans they were "Rebels". The new, struggling American government needed money, and got it by confiscating Loyalist property. The revolutionary force against Britain needed support, and got it by beating, harassing, and imprisoning those who would not go along with their cause. People who remained loyal to the British Crown were thus forced to seek refuge in places such as Long Island and eventually New Brunswick. Nearly one-third of the colonial population left in such a way.<sup>14</sup>

The British colony of Nova Scotia, part of which later became New Brunswick, remained loyal to the British and thus

became a haven for an estimated 12,000-15,000 displaced Americans. Nova Scotians remained aloof from the rebellions of England's other American colonies mainly because of its geographical isolation from centres of discontent and its greater financial dependence on Britain.<sup>15</sup>

There is no evidence that any of Isaac's siblings had to flee Connecticut because of Loyalist sentiments. The other two Loyalist Bostwick's listed by Wright are of no immediate relationship to Isaac.<sup>16</sup> Some of the Perrott family (and thus Isaac's half brothers or sisters) were Loyalists. Isaac's half-sister Amelia Perrot married a Jonathon Lockwood, son of Gershom who may be the same man who was a Loyalist in New Brunswick. As well, his mother's sister, Sarah Hanford, married Loyalist James Hoyt and settled for a time in New Brunswick. However, the only male Perreau (sic) listed by Wright is Joseph who settled on the Magaguadavic River, New Brunswick.<sup>17</sup>

It is highly probable (but unproven) that Tamson Cable was the daughter of Jabez and Mary (Denbo) Cable of Fairfield, Connecticut. Jabez was born in 1733 in Fairfield, son of George and Sarah (Shaw), and married Mary Denbo, daughter of Salathiel and Ruth (Rumsey) of Westport, Connecticut. During the War, Jabez had been held prisoner for his pro-British sentiments, but eventually escaped to join the British on Long Island, New York, and began piloting ships and vessels for them. He arrived in New Brunswick on the ship "Symmetry" with the June Fleet, and was granted a townlot at Parrrtown (Saint John) in 1784. He was on the voter's list as a "Freeman of Saint John" in 1785, occupation 'yeoman'. In a grant of 1786, Jabez received land on Grand Lake, Queens Co., but did not settle there. By 1788, he was a cordwainer in Saint John. His children: Jared, Molly, Ruth, Salathiel, Denbo, Hannah, Sarah, and possibly Tamson. It is not known what became of this family.<sup>18</sup>

Looking at naming patterns would seem to substantiate this theory. Isaac and Tamson called their first child Mary, which could have been the name of Tamson's mother. As well, they named

a son Jared (an uncommon name), but that of Tamson's brother (if the above holds out). Sarah is another Cable name , that of Tamson's sister and grandmother.

Isaac and Tamson arrived in New Brunswick with the Spring Fleet, on the ship "Hope". The "Hope" had left New York in mid-April, 1783 and passengers were disembarked in New Brunswick on June 1.<sup>19</sup> Isaac and Tamson did not remain long at the mouth of the Saint John River, the place chosen for disembarkation. With thousands of Loyalist refugees arriving simultaneously, chaos must have been the order of the day. The landing place at the mouth of the River, and the place chosen for settlement was rocky with thick underbrush and cedar swamps. Few preparations on shore had been made, and there were no available clearings to set up the provided tents. It is not surprising, therefore, that many Loyalists quickly organized themselves into groups and began at once to search upriver for a better place to settle.<sup>20</sup>

Such a group were the Loyalist grantees of Kingston Parish, Kings Co., NB who were predominantly a Connecticut group, and who had lived together as refugees on Long Island, New York, during the Revolutionary War.<sup>21</sup> The majority of them had arrived in New Brunswick with the Spring Fleet, May/June 1783, on the ships "Union" and "Hope", and had traveled upriver to an area known as Kingston Peninsula.

The land chosen was hilly, but well timbered, with suitable streams for mill purposes - a very important consideration when setting up a new community. Immediate problems to contend with were clearing away the thick underbrush and setting up tents for shelter. Life in this new wilderness was a far sight different from the one they had left behind.

Soon, friends and relatives from later fleets joined them there. Such common origins gave the Kingston group of Loyalists a sense of solidarity, and they were able to organize themselves quickly. The town of Kingston and surrounding lands were surveyed in July, 1783, lots were drawn and work was begun

immediately to provide shelter for the coming winter. The narrative of Walter Bates: "Kingston and the Loyalists of the 'Spring Fleet' of 1783", is an interesting account of these beginnings.<sup>22</sup>

The Kingston grantees received lands along the southerly banks of Belleisle Bay, the southerly banks of the Long Reach in the Saint John River, and the northerly banks of the Kennebecasis River, the area known as Kingston Peninsula. The grant was finalized on paper, 15 July 1784. In this grant, Isaac Bostwick received lot # 20, lying on the southerly bank of the Saint John River, in the Long Reach, almost directly west of the town of Kingston.<sup>23</sup> His descendents still own and farm this land. It is a mixed farm now, with dairy cattle, vegetables, and an orchard. In the winter, pulp wood is taken out.

A daughter Mary was born to Isaac and Tamson on 17 October 1783, and must have been one of the first children born in the colony.<sup>24</sup> Mary must have died before May 1784, as Isaac Bostwick had no children at that time, according to the victualling lists of Loyalist refugees households of that date.<sup>25</sup>

Lumber was always an important commodity on Kingston Peninsula. As early as February 12, 1784, Isaac Bostwick sold lumber to Governor Parr, "for the use of Royal Refugees settling on the River St. John and its branches."<sup>26</sup> In later years, his son Hiram Bostwick and family cut and sold cord wood and logs.

Religion was of such high priority to the early settlers at Kingston, that they very quickly set out to establish a Church. In the Spring of 1784, Wardens and Vestrymen were appointed for the first Anglican church, and land had been set aside for Church use, when the lots were drawn in July, 1783.<sup>27</sup> Isaac Bostwick was among the signers of a petition dated at Kingston, Kings Co., 20 March 1786, from "the proprietors of the town of Kingston" who had an "ardent and sincere desire for the propagation of the Christian religion in the public worship of God." The signers requested a clergyman of "most distinguished abilities" to be



appointed to the parish, since Kingston was the centre of the county and could well serve the people.<sup>28</sup> Construction was begun on the Church in 1789.

In a petition dated 4 September 1802, Isaac Bostwick requested the adjoining lot #21 (which had been originally granted to Ralph London), stating that "the last proprietor put me in possession of the lot to clear and improve as I should think proper". However, the owner had not returned, and Isaac requested the lot to "assist him in the support and maintenance of a large family and enable him to provide for his children".<sup>29</sup> He did receive this lot.

Isaac Bostwick died intestate, 18 August 1808, leaving a widow and nine children aged 6 to 23. Administration was granted on the estate of Isaac Bostwick, Kingston, on 14 September 1808 to Tamson Bostwick and Handford Bostwick.<sup>30</sup> We have this description of Isaac Bostwick from the Funeral Sermon preached by Rev. Elias Scovil: "During his stay in this transitory world he supported the character of an honest man, a kind husband, an affectionate parent and a faithful brother." As a tribute justly done, he was buried with Masonic Honours.

Tamson Bostwick died in 1814. The "Agreement of the Bostwick Family", dated 27 December 1820 outlines the holdings of the Bostwick family and how they were to be divided.<sup>31</sup> By 1820, the youngest child of Isaac and Tamson would have turned 18. The agreement was a document whereby "the Estate of Isaac Bostwick, deceased in the year 1808 has been settled and agreed upon by all the remaining heirs". Heirs listed were: Handford Bostwick (Administrator), Thomas Bostwick, Gerard(sic) Bostwick, Hiram Bostwick, Ann Prince and Jane Bostwick. Three children had died previously: Mary, Sarah, and Clarissa. It is interesting to note that Hannah had been excluded from this agreement, perhaps because she had married before her father's death and had been settled upon at that time. Property divided by Bostwick children:

Lot # 20 - original Loyalist grant

Lot # 21 - petitioned for in 1802

Lot # 19 - "with saw mill on the premises"

One lot of land lying in the Lower Cove of Saint John.

(This was probably the lot that Isaac Bostwick was granted in Parrtown in 1784).<sup>32</sup>

#### DESCENDANTS OF ISSAC BOSTWICK AND TAMSON CABLE

HANFORD BOSTWICK was born 21 September 1785, Kingston Parish, NB. He built a sawmill on the Long Reach of the Saint John River in 1820. He was married on 7 November 1822 to Maria G. Seely, who was born about 1801. His marriage is listed in Kings Co. Marriages; both Hanford and Maria are listed as residents of Kingston Parish. Witnesses to the marriage were Jared Bostwick (a brother to Hanford) and Linus Seely (possibly a brother to Maria - Linus was born around 1799, as shown from the 1851 census for Kingston Parish, which puts him in the same generation as Maria). Hanford died 13 August 1865, Lower Norton, NB and is buried in Church of The Ascension Cemetery, with his wife Maria. His will dated 21 January 1863 mentions his wife Maria and daughter Harriett, wife of Samuel Edwin Hoyt, so I assume he had only one child. In the 1851 Census for Norton Parish, Hanford is listed as a Farmer.<sup>33</sup>

i) Harriett Maria Bostwick was born 30 April 1834, and was baptised 31 August 1834 at Hampton. She was married to Samuel Edwin Hoyt around 1852. It is probable that Samuel was born around 1826, as listed in the 1851 Census for Norton Parish, the son of Samuel Beldon Hoyt and Clarissa Ketchum who were married in 1822. Samuel Edwin Hoyt, died Norton Parish, August, 1872. Harriett died 21 February 1913 and is buried beside her husband in Lower Norton Burial Ground. Harriett's will mentions only her son James Edwin. Samuel and Harriett Hoyt had seven children:<sup>34</sup>

- a) Maria Hoyt was born around 1852, and was married to George Dixon, before 1872.
- b) James Edwin Hoyt died 25 February, 1939 at Norton Parish. His will lists his wife Carrie Hoyt, sons: Fenwick E. Hoyt, Norton Parish; Jack H. Hoyt, Norton Parish; Rev. Harold H. Hoyt, Saint John; Rev. Herbert J. Hoyt, Gagetown; and Lucy G., wife of Albert Dickson, Hampton.<sup>35</sup>
- c) George F. Hoyt b. 3 June 1858, d. 21 December 1859, buried in Church of the Ascension Cemetery, Lower Norton.
- d) Charles Arthur Hoyt
- e) Fanny Hoyt
- f) Charlotte Hoyt
- g) Clarrissa Hoyt b. 10 June 1864, d. 28 August 1864, buried in Church of the Ascension Cemetery, Lower Norton.

HANNAH BOSTWICK was born 19 October 1787, Kingston Parish, Kings Co., NB, and was married on 22 March 1807 Kingston Parish to Jesse Raymond. Jesse Raymond was born 23 December 1774, son of Silas Raymond (1748-1824) and Sarah Barlow (1746-1821), Loyalists from Connecticut. Raymond P. Gorham's manuscript, "Kingston Loyalists" lists the genealogy of the Raymond family. Hannah died 8 May 1871, and was buried in Trinity Anglican Cemetery, Kingston, with her husband Jesse who died 2 January 1859. Jesse & Hannah Raymond had eight children and lived in Norton Parish, where Jesse was a Farmer.<sup>36</sup>

- i) Charles Raymond was born around 1807 and was married to Hector Beldune/Belding.
- ii) Isaac B. Raymond was born around 1809, was married around 1846 to Eliza Smith (born around 1819), and lived in

Norton Parish in 1851, where he was a Farmer. Isaac and Eliza Raymond had two children:<sup>37</sup>

a) George Raymond born about 1847.

b) John Raymond born about 1849.

iii) John Marven Raymond born about 1812, was married first to Caroline Whelpley (b. ca. 1811), daughter of Richard and Charlotte (Gorham) Whelpley. John and Caroline are listed in the 1851 Census for Norton Parish, Kings Co. John is listed as a Farmer, and they had one servant. In the 1871 Directory of New Brunswick, John is listed as a Justice of the Peace and Farmer, Central Norton. John Raymond's second wife, whom he married around 1873 was Jane E. McArthur, widow of John McArthur. Jane died September 1878, aged 53 and is buried beside her first husband in Kirk Hill Cemetery, Sussex. John's third wife was Maria Carman. His will dated 7 October 1885 mentions his wife Maria; his sisters Mary, Clarissa, and Hannah; his brother Silas; and his two nephews George and John, sons of his brother Isaac. Inventory of his estate was taken on 7 January 1886. In view of the names mentioned in the will, John Raymond probably had no children of his own.<sup>38</sup>

iv) Sarah Raymond born around 1814 was married to Issac Hoyt, a sea captain, after 1851. Captain I. G. Hoyt was lost on passage from Liverpool to South America in 1856, aged 48. He is buried in Christ's Church Cemetery, Bloomfield Station, Norton Parish, with his wife Sarah and son Charles A. (1853-1859).<sup>39</sup>

v) Mary Raymond born around 1816, unmarried, died after 1885.

vi) Clarissa Raymond born about 1819, unmarried. She was a school teacher, who taught in the first school in Sussex Station around 1865. She died after 1885.

vii) Silas Raymond born around 1823, and married after 1851, first to Helen Wetmore, then to Francis Flewelling. In the



1871 Directory for New Brunswick, Silas is listed as postmaster and farmer, Central Norton. He died after 1885.<sup>40</sup>

viii) Hannah Raymond born about 1829, unmarried. She was a school teacher, who taught in the first school in Sussex Station around 1865. She died after 1885.

SARAH BOSTWICK was born in Kingston Parish, Kings Co. 23 October 1789 and died there 15 February 1820, an unmarried woman. She is buried in Trinity Anglican Churchyard, Kingston. A Gorham genealogy has Sarah, d/o Isaac married to Loyalist Nathaniel Gorham. However, it certainly was not this Sarah Bostwick, as she was only two years old when the first child of Nathaniel and Sarah Gorham was born in 1791.<sup>41</sup>

CLARISSA BOSTWICK a twin to Sarah, was born 23 October 1789. She was married between 1808-1811 to Daniel Crawford. Daniel was born about 1781, probably son of James, a Loyalist from Westchester Co., New York. Clarissa died 15 August 1816, and is buried in Trinity Anglican Cemetery, Kingston, NB. Daniel Crawford was remarried on 8 March 1818 to Blanche Cox. Daniel & Clarissa Crawford had at least one child:<sup>42</sup>

i) Henderson Crawford was born around 1812 and was drowned near Oak Point, Saint John River, on 22 June 1828, aged 16.

THOMAS BOSTWICK was born 31 January 1793, Kingston, NB, and was married on 22 March 1832 to Harriett Brittain. The Kings County Marriage Register states that the marriage took place with "consent of guardians", so it may have been that Harriett's parents were dead, but if the 1851 census record of her age as 55 is correct, being married in 1832 at age 36 should not have meant she needed consent. Witnesses to the marriage were Hiram Bostwick (Thomas' brother) and Joseph Brittain. Harriet was born around 1796, Greenwich Parish, Kings Co, and died before 1861.

Thomas died between 1871 and 1881. Thomas and Harriett Bostwick lived in Kingston Parish, where Thomas was a Farmer. In 1871, Thomas lived with the John Rogers' family, who had been his servant in 1861. Thomas and Harriett had at least one child: 43

i) James Bradford Bostwick baptised 16 August 1840, Greenwich Parish. This child must have died before 1851, since the census of that year shows Thomas and Harriett as a childless couple.

Another child may have been the John Bostwick, who died at Westfield Parish, Kings Co. 26 October 1838, aged 2.

This cemetery was opened in 1892. It is located at the west end of Campbellton, Restigouche County, New Brunswick, one block south of Roseberry Street.

It serves all religious denominations except Roman Catholic, which is served by two other cemeteries in the city.

The inscriptions were copied verbatim and all data from each stone shown in one place on the list, under the initial of what appears to be the principal family name on that stone. These surnames are in alphabetical order. Abbreviations were not changed. Any errors are shown as they appeared, with correct information (if known), following in brackets. Also in brackets is some additional data from other sources such as church records. Some lines were doubled up to save space, but content is as complete as the legibility of the stones allowed.

An index is provided for those surnames that appear on stones headed by another surname, as some parents, for instance, were buried in a plot owned by a son-in-law, or vice versa.

The copying was done in May and June 1985 by Mrs. Gwen McDonald, Mrs. Ila McRae and Jackson Ross. It was updated by the compilers, Mrs. Maxine Bain and Jackson Ross, on July 14. All are members of the Restigouche Branch of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society. (Cont'd- p.26)

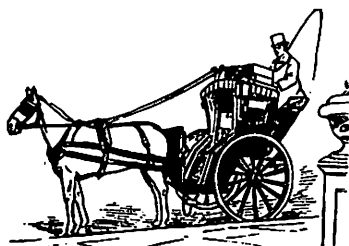
A limited edition of Richard Pugh and His Descendants is available for sale by the author. The price is \$11.00 (including postage and handling).

**MICROFILM  
FROM O.P.C.S.****of Birth, Death and Marriage Indexes - England and Wal**

The Office of Population Censuses and Surveys (OPCS) is now able to offer for sale, microfilmed copies of the indexes to birth, death and marriage records for England and Wales for the years 1866 to 1980 inclusive.

The indexes have been filmed at a 30x reduction and are available on 16mm diazo film on open reels. It should be noted because of the age of the records, the quality of reproduction may be variable. A 'blip marker' counting facility has been incorporated on each film. The films will be individually boxed and labelled with the type of index, year and quarter.

The separate indexes for births, deaths and marriages are arranged by quarter according to the date of registration and quarter is arranged alphabetically by surname. For the years up to 1912 a roll of film contains one or more quarter's index of births (or deaths or marriages) whereas for the later years most of the rolls consist of one complete quarter only of births, deaths or marriages.

The information contained in the indexes has been expanded over the years. All indexes contain the registration district in which the event was registered and a volume and page 'number' which is the reference to the appropriate entry in the register. In addition, the birth indexes from the September quarter of 1911 contain the maiden surname of the mother. The marriage indexes from 1912 show the surname of the other party to the marriage and the death indexes from 1866 show the age at death: the date of birth of the deceased is included from the June quarter 1969.

The complete set of all three categories of indexes for the years 1866-1980 amounts to 1130 rolls of film but customers can of course purchase indexes for any selection of years or category they require.

The indexes are subject to Crown copyright and may not be copied in any form either in whole or in part (to a third party) without the written consent of the Office of Population Censuses and Surveys.

The cost of microfilm of the indexes (excluding Value Added Tax (VAT)) is:-

for the period 1866-1912 inclusive - £7 per quarter + postage and packing

for the period 1913-1980 inclusive - £20 per quarter + postage and packing

Prices can be subject to alteration

Charges are exclusive of VAT, which where appropriate will be added at the rate applicable at the date of invoice.

The conditions of sale are set out overleaf and an Order form on which detailed requirements should be specified is attached. Orders will be invoiced and will normally be processed for despatch within 4-6 weeks from receipt of order. OPCS reserves the right to refuse orders for which the microfilm is not available for inspection.

The filming of the earlier indexes for the period 1837-1865 should be completed shortly and will then be offered for sale.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING  
NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY  
MAY 25, 1985

The Annual Meeting of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society (N.B.G.S.) was held at the Central New Brunswick Woodmen's Museum, Boiestown, N.B., on Saturday, May 25, 1985, at 2.00 p.m. The President, Mrs. Jan Dexter was in the chair and approximately thirty members were in attendance. Prior to the time scheduled for the Annual General Meeting the Museum staff conducted tours for the Society members, and served a delicious lunch.

The President welcomed all the members present. A special welcome was extended to members of the Chaleur Branch. This was the first Annual Meeting attended by this Branch. The youngest Society Branch, the Boiestown Branch, was recognized and thanked for their kind invitation to host the Annual Meeting. All members introduced themselves and stated the family names they are researching.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting, May 26, 1984, were read and approved.

It was noted from the minutes that:

- (1) The second edition of INDEX OF SURNAMES BEING RESEARCHED BY MEMBERS OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, April 30, 1984, was published.
- (2) The book NEW BRUNSWICK MILITIA OFFICERS' LISTS 1787-1867, by Dr. David Facey-Crowther, was published.
- (3) VITAL STATISTICS, Volume V, was published.
- (4) The N.B.G.S. is not permitted to have a permanent display to advertise its services at the New Brunswick Museum.
- (5) It is prohibitively expensive to have advertising flyers printed at this time.

#### REPORTS

##### President - Mrs. Janice Dexter

The President reported that in her first year as President, she had given attention to the problem of the relationships between the New Brunswick Genealogical Society and its Branches. Changes to the N.B.G.S. Constitution will be proposed at this Annual Meeting. She and the Recording Secretary, Ross Wilton, attended a meeting in Boiestown in the spring to discuss the formation of the N.B.G.S. Boiestown Branch. The Society is in need of more members who are willing to work on behalf of the Society so that it may continue to perform its vital role.

##### Treasurer - Mr. David Underhill

In his final report as treasurer, David reported that the Society received \$5,148.60 in membership dues; has \$3,659.96 in cash; and has total assets of \$8,810.69.

#### Generations Editor- Mr. Bill Kilfoil

Four volumes of GENERATIONS were published this year. The cover will be redesigned. Members are requested to submit material for publication to the Editor well in advance of the publication date.

#### Queries Editor - Mrs. Betty Sewell

Mrs. Sewell announced her resignation after serving six years in this position. She said that being Queries Editor was a most satisfying and rewarding work, and through this service, many people found valuable genealogical information.

#### The International Genealogical Workshop

Mrs. Jan Dexter reported that the plans for the Workshop, August 3-5, 1985, at Saint John, N.B., are nearly finalized and that registrations are being received. A good attendance is anticipated. The theme of the Workshop will focus on the Irish. Dr. E. Trainor, of Belfast Ireland, who is in charge of the Public Records of Northern Ireland, will be in North America later in the summer but will not be at the Workshop. He will be available to conduct a workshop in September, if something could be arranged.

#### BRANCH REPORTS

##### Boiestown Branch - Mr. Wilmot Ross, President

This is the first report of this recently formed N.B.G.S. Branch. In March, 1985, a steering committee was formed, and in April an executive was elected. The executive of the Boiestown Branch, N.B.G.S., are: Mr. Wilmot Ross, President; Mrs. Betty Saunders, Vice President; Mr. Andrew Stillman, Secretary; Mrs. Stella Ross, Treasurer. There are eighteen paid-up members.

##### Capital Branch - Mr. Clifford Marks, President

Nine regular meetings were held during the year. This Branch meets on the first Tuesday of each month with an average attendance of twenty-five members. There are about fifty paid-up members. The major project was the organization and hosting of the 1984 International Genealogical Workshop. This Branch is contacting the appropriate authorities with respect to the possible non-release of the 1891 census; and the format, content, and cost of information from N.B. Vital Statistics. The Branch received a government grant to provide summer employment (12 weeks) for four students to work at the Archives transcribing

census records for Victoria, Northumberland, Kent and Queen's Counties. No similar grant will be available for the summer, 1985.

Chaleur Branch - Mrs. Annette Hynes, President

Mr. Jackson Ross reported that this Branch held three meetings during the year. They completed the work on the 1871 Census of Restigouche County and have it ready for printing. They copied records from the St. Francis Xavier Church in Charlo, 1843-1920 (index included), researched the History of Heron Island and published it in the Dalhousie News, and copied records of the Presbyterian minister who served from 1833 to 1847. They are working to finish the New Mills Cemetery records, the History of the United Church in Restigouche, and some of the other United and Anglican Churches in the area. This Branch has about 20 members and interest is growing.

Grand Manan Branch - Mrs. Gleneta Hettrick, President

This Branch reported by letter. They have about 75 members many of whom have joined to receive their quarterly publication THE SANDS OF TIME. The President of this branch answers letters of request, some having come from as far away as Papua, New Guinea.

Saint John Branch - Mr. Jim McKenzie, President

Mrs. Dexter reported that Mr. Jim McKenzie agreed to serve as President for a second term. This Branch held seven meetings during the year. At the December meeting, members filled out family group sheets listing their first ancestral families who arrived in New Brunswick. This material was collected and published in book form under the title ARRIVALS. Next year this Branch plans to publish DEPARTURES, from cemetery listings.

Southeastern Branch - Mr. Weldon Turner, President

The Southeastern Branch reported that they held five regular meetings on Saturday afternoons at 2.00 p.m., on the odd numbered months. Mr. David Christopher is the new President. Some activities of this Branch included field trips to the Court House at Hopewell Cape, and the Saint John Museum. In November they held an interesting program on Family Reunions. The Colpitts, and Lutes families held large family reunions during the summer. A workshop was held in March during Heritage Days at the Riverview Mall.

It was moved by Mrs. Betty Sewell, seconded by Miss Eileen Wallace, that the reports be accepted as presented. The motion was carried by vote.

Following the Branch reports, the N.B.G.S. President presented each Branch President with a bound book containing Vital Statistics, Volumes I-V for each Branch library.

NEW BUSINESS

It was moved by Mr. Ross Wilton, on behalf of the N.B.G.S. Executive, seconded by Mr. Bing Geldart, that the changes in the Constitution and By-laws be approved as circulated to the membership. Following discussion on branch representation on the Executive, and the number of GENERATIONS per family membership, the motion was passed unanimously by vote.

It was moved by Mr. Ross Wilton, on behalf of the N.B.G.S. Executive, seconded by Mr. David Underhill, that the fee structure be as follows:

Individual Membership	\$15.00 per year
Family Membership	\$20.00 per year
Institutional Membership	\$20.00 per year

The Branch will forward \$13.00 to the Society Treasurer for individuals who join the Society and join a Branch.

The Branch will forward \$15.00 to the Society Treasurer for a family who joins the Society and joins a Branch.

Branches will collect Society Memberships and forward monies to the Society Treasurer.

This dues structure will begin in 1986. Branches are encouraged to accept this structure in 1985. Following discussion of the need for higher dues, the motion was passed unanimously.

The Executive received complaints about the high cost of securing Vital Statistics information. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to the Deputy Minister of Health stating the complaint. Later a complaint form which could be sent to the Premier, might be printed in GENERATIONS. Mr. Jerry O'Brien agreed to secure a copy of the Vital Statistics Act for inclusion in the records.

There is a need for qualified personnel to conduct genealogical research in different parts of the province. At present only the Chaleur Branch, the Grand Manan Branch and the Saint John Branch are able to handle this task. There is no researcher at the New Brunswick Provincial Archives.

The possible non-release of the 1891 Census was discussed. It was agreed that the N.B.G.S. should request the release of this Census. It was moved by Mr. David Christopher, seconded by Mr. Jerry O'Brien, that the Executive write to Statistics Canada to request that the policy of 100 year release of Census Records not be changed. Motion carried by vote.

The Vital Statistics Committee, Mr. Daniel F. Johnson, chairman, ceased operation on April 30, 1985. Volunteer interest in the Vital Statistics Committee has abated. During its four years of operation, this committee published five volumes of New Brunswick Vital Statistics covering the period 1784-1834. The N.B.G.S. expresses its thanks to the members of this committee.

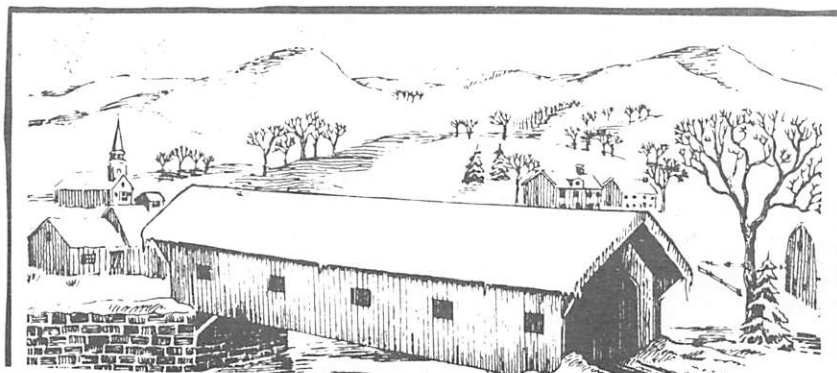

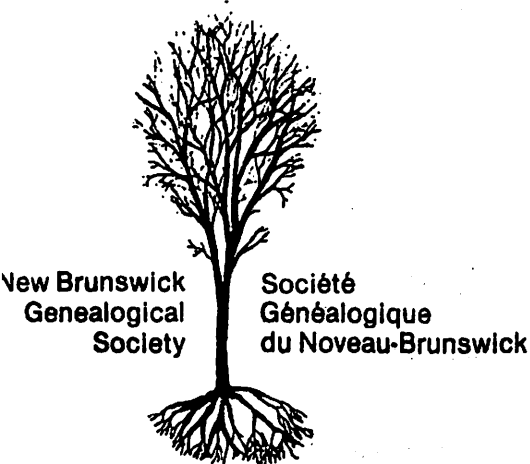

*HISTORICAL & GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH*

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This journal will be devoted to genealogical and historical research and will be published for the first time in March/April 1986.

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The publication will cover the ancient and beautiful Province of Ulster, reflecting the social history, the myths and legends of the Province.

The journal will not only help those interested in genealogy but will also be beneficial to those with an interest in history.

Each issue will include articles written by experts in the field of genealogical and historical research.

Topics to be included will consist of Parish Register Extracts, Census Returns, Voter's Lists and other materials previously unpublished. One of the main features in each issue will be an in-depth study of a specific location in Ulster.

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### GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN IRELAND

Over the past three years members of the Offaly Historical Society have been involved in collecting and indexing source material for genealogical research. To date most of the parish records in County Offaly (King's County) have been indexed and some in the neighbouring counties of Laois (Queen's County) and Westmeath. There has also been a big interest in recording pre-1900 tombstone inscriptions and approx. half the graveyards in Co. Offaly have been recorded. Some of these have been published in book form and are proving very popular with the public. Also we have collected and indexed such material as old wills, estate records, land records (tithe books - 1830s and Griffith's Valuation - 1850s), family histories (some unpublished), lists of genealogical interest from old newspapers and so forth.

As our project progressed news of it spread and we had visitors calling from overseas who were tracing their ancestors in the area. Then the letters of enquiry began to arrive. With the success rate we were achieving in answering these queries we realised how important the work was. Heretofore it could take many hours going through parish registers on microfilm and other material in national repositories searching for baptism records etc. In some cases the enquirer would not know the parish of origin of their ancestors. The indexes we were compiling could be consulted and within a short time we could establish the parish of origin.

It is difficult to estimate the numbers of people who emigrated from these three Irish midland counties to such places as Australia, England, New Zealand, and the U.S.A. in the last century. Despite the fact that we have had almost one thousand enquires by post and personal callers over the last two years or so we know that this figure is only the tip of the iceberg. Our aim is to reach as many as possible of those descendants of people who emigrated from this area and let them know that we have the necessary sources available for finding their 'roots'.

In addition to ancestral research many enquirers are also anxious to get information on the local history of the areas their ancestors came from, photographs of buildings and places they would have been familiar with, relatives still living in the area, etc. Establishing links between long lost cousins is, I consider to be one of the most satisfying aspects of this type of work. Over the years the Society has built up an impressive collection of local history material relevant to the area and this coupled with local knowledge gives an extra advantage to our ancestral research programme.

The Society is thankful to its many friends overseas who have helped to 'repatriate' information on emigrants from the area by sending ships' lists and tombstone inscriptions identifying the county and often the parish where they were born. We are currently comparing this data with parish records.

In the field of genealogy, there is a black mark against New Brunswick. This is the result of the high costs of obtaining birth certificates and other documents from the Vital Statistics Branch of the provincial Department of Health. New Brunswick prices appear to be the highest in Canada.

There is also a degree of discrimination being practiced by the bureaucracy of the Branch. It certainly does not pay to go to that office and announce you want a certain document for genealogical purposes.

Everyone appreciates that inflation and other factors have increased the costs of most, if not all, goods and services, including those supplied by governments. But, \$25.00 for a birth certificate? Just a mite steep and a hefty assessment for those who are senior citizens and living on fixed incomes.

Public pressure is one weapon available to us to fight this unwarranted exorbitancy. If you feel strongly enough about these excessive fees, why not send a letter of protest to the Minister who heads the department responsible for these fee schedules?
