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THE DESCENDANTS OF EDMUND AND JANE (WEBB) PRICE

Edmund Price and Jane Webb were married at Woodbridge, New Jersey in 1757, and ten years later they brought 4 or 5 children with them to become one of the very early English-speaking families to settle on the St. John River in New Brunswick. Eventually, they had 14 children - the descendants of 12 of these are traced in this book.

The three co-authors are all descendants of Edmund and Jane, and they spent 3 years researching details regarding their descendants, consulting Census Records from 1851 through 1871, Petitions for land grants, property transfers, probate records, etc.

THE DESCENDANTS OF EDMUND AND JANE (WEBB) PRICE is a large book - 8½ by 11 inches, containing 275 pages and listing approximately 12,000 names of descendants and 4,000 spouses from throughout North America. The book is completely indexed.

Second and third generation members removed to newly opened settlements in New Brunswick, all along the St. John, Miramichi and Petitcodiac Rivers, as well as their tributaries.

RESEARCHING YOUR ANCESTORS IN NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA by Robert F. Fellows.

This book of more than 300 pages begins with an historical sketch of the province and then goes on to describe the genealogical records found in the Provincial Archives, the New Brunswick Museum, the University of Moncton, the University of New Brunswick, Mount Allison University and various libraries, historical societies and small museums throughout New Brunswick.

Individual chapters describe in detail the New Brunswick church, marriage, cemetery, probate, census and land records. The reel numbers of the microfilmed records are also provided to help those wanting to order these films on inter-library loan. Other chapters deal with newspapers, periodicals and photographs; suggestions for researching Acadian, Pre-Loyalist and Loyalist ancestors are also included.

The appendices include lists of the genealogical books, church records and tombstone epitaph transcriptions found in the Provincial Archives in Fredericton, the epitaph transcriptions found in the New Brunswick Museum, and the Baptist church records for New Brunswick kept in the Maritime Baptist Historical Collection at Wolfville, Nova Scotia. Another appendix covers the history of the various counties in New Brunswick and outlines the growth of the parishes within these counties. Another in appendix provides a list of the genealogical terms most commonly used by family historians.

To further assist the genealogist there are two "Quick-Reference Address Pages" at the beginning of the book. Another chapter explains the fundamentals of starting the compilation of a family history and outlines the use of Pedigree Charts and Family Group Sheets, the organization of genealogical records, the interviewing of relatives, the writing of good letters, the researching of archival records, the reading of old handwriting and other helpful matters.

The book is thoroughly indexed.

PART IV

NOTES ON PETER DAY, by George Edwin Day; Contributed by Donald P. Wright

"Peter Day was born in Weehawken, New Jersey, and he was married to Catherine Allen, of New York, whose father was a dealer in Real Estate.

"Mr. Day was a Methodist, and his wife an Episcopalian. They lived in New Jersey until three little girls were born to them, the name of one of whom was Sarah. At the close of the Revolution they took their children and furniture, and moved to Shelburne, N. S. The winter which followed their arrival was exceedingly severe and, being unprepared for such inclemency, all their children died before spring. Being discouraged with the place, they moved up the St. John River, and bought a farm at Swan Creek, N.B., which was afterwards sold to Thomas or Asa Turney. They lived at Swan Creek until four sons were born to them, viz. Abram, Laurence, Peter, and John. When they grew to manhood, my mother said they were generally considered the best looking young men in the county. The father, Peter Day, died probably in 1831, and was buried on his own farm at Swan Creek.

"Abram, the eldest son, married his cousin Catherine Allen, daughter of Laurence Allen who also moved from New York. They settled at Maquapit Lake, and had five sons and three daughters. The sons were George, John, Charlie, David and Solomon (twins). The girls were Phoebe, who married John Ferguson, Margaret who married Sam. Ferguson, and the other one, whose name I forget, married an Upton. (1) One of their daughters became Mrs. Chas. Perley of Maugerville, who was killed by being thrown from her carriage.

"Laurence Day married Lucy Palmer, daughter of Nathan Palmer, whose farm afterwards became their home. Mr. Palmer's wife died at the age of 70 and he lived to be 84. They were both buried in the cemetery attached to the Congregational Church in Sheffield. Laurence Day and his wife had ten children: Henry, Jane, Alfred, Sophie Jane, Sarah, Mary Ann, Hannah, Nathan, John, and George Edwin. Jane died at about 4 years of age. The others lived to maturity. At the time of writing, I George Edwin, am the only one of the family left. I was born September 9th, 1833.

"Peter Day, Jr., married Ruth Wasson of Sheffield, sister of James Wasson. (2) They settled at Grand Lake where they had a large family. One of the daughters became Mrs. Barton, another became Mrs. Branscombe. These settled at Grand Lake, and remained there. The others moved to Ontario, and established a colony named Daywood for them, near Owen Sound, Georgian Bay. Mr. Day lived to be about 90 years old. He was for many years a Deacon of a Baptist Church. His family in Daywood, which Temple Day (my nephew) and myself visited, are financially prosperous.

"John Day went to the Miramichi, when it was a great lumber centre. He married an Irish Lady, a native of County Longford, Ireland. They had five daughters: Mary, Katherine, Helen, Margaret, and Ann. Katherine married a man by the name of Savage. They lived at Eastport, Maine. The others, I think, are married in N. B. My father's mother, Mrs. Peter Day, Sr., died at our home at the age of 88, and was buried beside her husband at Swan Creek.

"My father, Laurence Day, died at 73 years and three months, and mother nearly 83, and were buried at Sheffield.

PART V

THE SHARP FAMILY by Daniel F. Johnson

"Among the first families to settle the Millstream, Studholme Parish, Kings County, N.B. were the Sharps. In 1685 William Sharp Sr. settled on the Raritan River, New Jersey where he met and married Mary Smith of the same place. In 1708, he was admitted to the Presbyterian Church in Woodbridge, N.J. Records can be found of only two children: William Jr., born 1695, and Agnes.

"William Jr. was a farmer and surveyor in Middlesex County, New Jersey. He had two children by his first wife: John, born 1727, married Zeruah Paine, and Mary, born 1729, married Elisha Dunham.

"About 1736, William Jr. married Sarah Langstaff, born 1721, 21 April, of Piscataway, N.J. They had five children: Henry, born 1737, William, b. 1739, Samuel, b. 1741, Langstaff, b. 1743, and Jonathan, born 1745.

"'THE DESCENDANTS OF HENRY SHARP' is available at the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick, Fredericton, N.B. for those wishing additional information on the Sharp family.

"Samuel Sharp was born about 1741 in Hunterdon Co., New Jersey. Dr. Freeman Sharp writes: "Bereft of his father when a small boy less than eleven years of age, Samuel, by the terms of his father's will, was bound out as an apprentice and learned the trade of blacksmith, specializing in the making of nails. It is apparent that his youth was spent in Piscataway, and at the time of his marriage, then aged about eighteen, he is called of that place in his marriage bond." On July 2, 1759, Samuel married Priscilla, daughter of Joseph and Priscilla Sutton.

"An educated man, Samuel prospered in his trade, and in 1774 he moved with his family to Hunterdon County. His children included: Samuel, Robert, b. 1764, Joseph, b. 1762, Henry, b. 1791, Martha, b. 1774, Sarah and Mary.

"1776 marks the year that the American Colonies revolted against British rule and taxation. In December of that year, Samuel was forced to abandon his properties and flee to the British lines at Woodbridge, New Jersey. Though later joined by his family on Staten Island, New York, he never returned to his native province. During the course of the Revolution, he served with the Loyalist forces. At it's conclusion, he settled on Staten Island, but his stay was temporary. Though the war had ended, American sentiment ran high, and his family joined the Loyalist evacuation of New York. In July of 1783, their vessel arrived at Saint John Harbor in the then British province of Nova Scotia, now New Brunswick.

"Experiencing difficulty in obtaining a land grant, Samuel purchased the escheated property of Thatcher Sears on the Kingston Peninsula, while his three sons, Joseph, Robert and Samuel Jr. received lots

on Long Island on the Kennebecasis River. His eldest son, William, remained on Staten Island, New York.

"Samuel Sharp was joined by Nathaniel Johnson, a Loyalist from Staten Island, who had fought side by side with him during the Revolution. Nathaniel had experienced similar difficulties with his American neighbors, having been forced to hide in a hollow pine stump armed with his musket while an angry mob searched his house but a few yards away. Nathaniel arrived in New Brunswick in October of 1783 and settled on land near Oak Point on the Long Reach of the Saint John River.

"While living on the Kingston Peninsula, Samuel engaged in the blacksmith trade, teaching his son Robert, to take over the family business. It was at this time members of Samuel's family went their separate ways. In an historical essay published in The Kings County Record in 1892, the following account is given:

"Here they remained for a few years, but they soon discovered that the land on which they settled was not likely to prove as productive as they had anticipated. After numerous enquiries they concluded then (1786) to come to the Millstream. The roads then were not as they are now, but rough and hilly so that much of the journey had to be made on foot. Upon their arrival in Millstream, they took shelter with Mr. Bonnel, who was the only resident of that place. The dwelling, which stood near where J. E. McAuley's store now stands was a small log structure built in the most primitive fashion, and with this addition the occupants numbered 17 men, women, and children. They ate off a small rough table brought by Samuel Sharp from Staten Island and capable of seating about six persons. At the conclusion of each meal, the table was set out of doors to make more room for the occupants of the building.

"The first few years were full of hardships and privations for these early settlers. On one occasion the wolves killed all their sheep. An early frost prevented their potatoes from maturing; the largest did not exceed a hen's egg in size."

About 1805, then aged 64 years, Samuel Sharp sold his Millstream property to his old friend Nathaniel and departed for Queens or York County to live his remaining years with one of his numerous descendant families. His brother and sister, Henry and Martha were living here as late as 1851.

THE SECOND GENERATION

Joseph, b. 22 July, 1762, son of Samuel and Priscilla (Sutton) Sharp married Hanna Ogden on 18 August, 1788, and settled in Queen's County, N.B. According to D. R. Jack's 'BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES', their children included: Henry, b. 10 Feb. 1790, d. 1831; Jehu,

b. 20 Sept. 1793, d. 1853; Joseph b. 26 Nov. 1799, d. 1879; Samuel b. 22 Jan. 1802, d. 1874; Robert b. 19 Mar. 1806, d. 1866; William & John (twins) b. 20 Nov. 1810; Anna 20 Feb. 1792, d. 1878; Priscilla Sutton b. 20 Sept. 1795, d. 1871; Hannah b. 6 Sept. 1797; Elizabeth b. 10 Dec. 1803; Mary b. 11 Sept 1808; Rachel, b. 12 May 1815, d. 1877.

Robert, b. 1764 removed with his father, Samuel Sharp, to The Millstream in 1786. According to Grace Aiton in "The Story of Sussex & Vicinity" Robert "and his household of eight spent nine years in a log cabin before they were able to erect a frame dwelling which thereafter sheltered several generations of Sharps." Following the death of his first wife Elizabeth Johnson, Robert married Barsheba _____. Their children included; Samuel 1788-1862, m. Elizabeth Parlee; Nathaniel, b. 1792, m. Elizabeth McName; William, b. 1790, m. Sarah McAlbee; Joseph b. 1791, m. (1) Sarah Parlee, (2) Jerusha (Craft) Frazee; Robert 1808-1863 m. Sarah H. Crawford; David b. 1811 m. Mary Ann Folkins; Anne m. Jacob Wright; Mary, m. Moses Jordan.

The Millstream and Sussex communities have benefited much from the determination and hard toil of these early pioneers. Their descendants took active community roles in the establishment of local churches and schools. Succeeding generations became respected merchants, farmers, teachers, and doctors, all stemming from the 10 year old boy who studied the blacksmith trade without his father's guidance-Samuel Sharp Esq.

Another branch of this family moved to Carleton County, after a very brief stay in the Sunbury County area. The following article appeared in the Oromocto POST on the 4th of January, 1978 and I am including it in it's entirety here as an addition to the above article on the Sharp family:

PROBLEMS WERE PLENTIFUL IN MAUGERVILLE-SHEFFIELD by Eugene Campbell

In the past, we've profiled men who have settled and left their names in Sunbury, but upon the arrival of the Loyalists in 1783 many men stayed but a short time.

Problems in this area were plentiful - the pre-Loyalists at Maugerville and Sheffield made it difficult to settle and own land. In many cases court actions resulted; the lands originally granted during the days of Nova Scotia had to be regranted when the new province of New Brunswick was formed. But none-the-less, those who stayed but a short time did help mold the area and make it a better place for future generations.

Maugerville was only one of a number of homes for Tamerlane Campbell. Originally he had settled on the Amesbury Township, located on the Kennebecasis and Saint John Rivers. There, he had a log cabin and several acres of land. During the Quebec problems of the mid-18th century, he fought directly under General Carleton who was to become New Brunswick's first Governor. Campbell served in the French

War, and was again sent to Quebec after the English captured that place. His place was to superintend repairs.

It was about 1779 Campbell came to the Saint John River, and settled near the Maugerville colony. Here he was to receive a grant of 8,000 acres on the Oromocto River along with William Hazen, James White and Jacob Barker. Shortly after, he sold his share of timber land on the Oromocto to Samuel Peabody. A committee statement of 1783 reported to Major Guilford Studholme, commander of Fort Howe in Saint John:

"Tamerlane Campbell has a log cabin and about two acres of cleared land, has been on the river about four years, but on the lot he now possesses about one year, is a loyal subject and fought under General Carleton at the attack on Quebec early in the late troubles. Has a wife and five children. We beg leave to recommend him to be confirmed in his possessions." Campbell had married some time previous to 1769.

From Maugerville along with Benen Foster, several sons of Elijah Estabrooks and Archelaus Hammond, Campbell moved further up the river. Today the descendants are numerous throughout Carleton and Victoria Counties.

At the time, several other families also left homelands and went up the river to seize eagerly upon land previous settlers had declined; they were the Esteys, McKeens, Perleys and Stickneys from Maugerville, Hartts and Coys from Gagetown and Kenneys, Kimballs and Shaws from Burton. Campbell settled at Woodstock, where he took up lots 77 and 78.

In 1785, Alexander Sharp married Hester, eldest child and daughter of Tamerlane Campbell, she being 16 years of age at the time. Sharp had been another settler to this area who left soon after. Sharp, the son of James of Edinburgh, Scotland, was probably born in that place and records show in his early years apprenticed as a dyer in Edinburgh. At the age of 17, near the end of his apprenticeship, he entered (or was forced) into the navy, where he served for three or four years. Later, it is said, he was forced into the army.

After coming to N. B., he settled at Hampstead, on a Loyalist grant of 1783. Records show he taught school for some time on the Long Reach in Queens County, but in 1788 he moved to Woodstock and his grant under date of Nov. 1, 1796, comprised 418 acres and was adjacent to those of his father-in-law, Tamerlane Campbell.

In 1795, Sharp was taken ill with scarlet fever and died in the log cabin he had built several years before. His wife, who married just two years after his death, died in 1828 suddenly while sitting in her pew in the Baptist meeting house at Jacksontown. They both lie buried in the old public burying ground on the river front of their farm in Woodstock.

In continuing with the Sharp story, the following obituary appeared in the October 13, 1979 issue of the Woodstock BUGLE:

"HOWARD A. SHARPE - Funeral services were held at Flewelling's Funeral Home, Nackawic for Howard A. Sharpe of Dixon Lodge, Fredericton, formerly of Hawkshaw. Rev. J. E. Tarrant officiated at the service.

"Mr. Sharpe was born at the Barony, 85 years ago, a son of the late Alexander and Hester (Hall) Sharpe. He was a farmer and was also employed for several years as a bookkeeper with H. A. Corey Ltd. at Pinder. His death occurred at Dixon Lodge.

"He is survived by his wife, the former Effie Wiggins; a brother, John of Bass River, N. S.; a sister, Miss Susan Sharpe of Boston, Mass.: several nieces and nephews.

"Burial was in the Barony Cemetery."

PART VI Report on the October monthly meeting of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society at the New Brunswick Museum in Saint John - speaker, Mrs. Marion V. Robertson, Archivist at the museum.

Excerpts from Mrs. Robertson's talk follows:

"I have not had time, or taken time, to make a study or gather statistics on the genealogists I have encountered, but I cannot help but think that the rootlessness of our society, the weakening of family ties, the predominance of the nuclear family in this century, has been the underlying cause for the growth of an interest in family history. Rootlessness, rather than the publication of ROOTS has caused people to search out their forbearers."

"Many, many, people would, of course, like to acquire their family pedigree, and are truly interested in its content, but are not willing or are unable, for reasons of their own, to undertake such a time-consuming project. These people must, in time, be referred to a professional searcher. In this respect, we must mention that there is a widespread belief abroad that libraries and Archives should have endless drawers which contain the genealogies of all families in the areas they serve, and that all that is required of the individual seeking the genealogy is the price of a photocopy.

"Our archives does indeed have drawers of index cards, but these entries are in no way connected, and no one can connect them but the genealogists themselves, or a competent professional researcher. If a family history has already been written, and deposited in our institution thanks to a genealogist who was prepared to spend long hours in its compilation, it is a rare good fortune for members of that family, and it will be readily available to them for note taking."

"A Director of Research for the British Society of Genealogists has quoted the following factors governing success or failure in genealogical research: status, name, continuity and record. In

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other words, if the family being traced were of eminent status, had a rare surname, unusual Christian names, lived in the same area over many generations, and if the records of the area are well preserved, then success would be achieved. If one or more of these factors is missing, the search brings difficulties, and the majority of people can trace their family back only three or four hundred years. This statement was applied to research in England: think, then it is not surprising that a one hundred year search in New Brunswick for the eighteenth century emigrant will be many times more difficult."

"Our Archives and Libraries are located on the third floor of the New Brunswick Museum, and are presently undergoing complete renovations, necessitating their closure to the public. Hopefully, by January of 1980, we shall resume full services to the public with expanded facilities.

"We shall be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. From September through May we shall be open to the public from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays, statutory holiday week-ends excepted.

"We have a total staff of three full time and three part time workers. We are responsible for preserving and making available to the public the holdings of the Ganong and Webster Special Libraries, and of a general library containing an exceptional collection of New Brunswick newspapers, government documents, shipping records, military publications, church publications, published genealogies, published works on surnames and heraldry, publications of several historical societies and other published works of general or Museum interest. We are presently concerned with the integration and cataloguing of the Museum's Science Library, which had long been neglected and which is, indeed, a very valuable collection."

"As you well know, civil registration of births and deaths was not undertaken in New Brunswick until the last decade of the nineteenth century. Registration was not well enforced until 1920, and despite that we still have residents of Saint John, born in the mid-nineteen twenties, seeking records of their births which were not registered. The absence of such a record brings difficulties, unless the parents of the individual belong to a church which administered infant baptism, and the church records are extant, or unless the individual has access to the cradle rolls of churches which administered adult baptism, or to school records.

"Marriages were registered in several counties of New Brunswick from 1812 - 1888. Provincial registration started in that year. We have microfilm of the County marriage records as available in that medium. The Carleton County records on microfilm are virtually illegible.

"We have copies on microfilm of the Probate records of the several counties of New Brunswick. Some of these are incomplete, particularly those of Saint John County, and must now, since the removal of the nineteenth century probate records from Saint John, be sought

in the Provincial Archives.

"We have typed copies of abstracts of the land petitions for New Brunswick. The Latter Day Saints microfilms of these records are often illegible, necessitating referral of researchers to the Provincial Archives for the original record. Cadastral maps showing the location of original grants are available in our Archives.

"All published genealogies in our custody, as well as local histories containing genealogical information, are catalogued, and can readily be located in our library catalogue... We do not, we wish to point out, photocopy copyright material.

"Over a long period of time, as a by-product of newspaper research projects, we have indexed deaths contemporary to the period being researched, but in no way do we have complete records of deaths in the Province.

"We have typed copies of baptismal and marriage records of a few churches, and an extensive file of epitaphs, all indexed. We have papers of some New Brunswick families; these can be of assistance to their descendants, or to allied families.

"We do not have passenger lists of emigrant vessels arriving in New Brunswick, nor have, despite widespread searches of the Public Archives of Canada, any been located."

Mrs. Robertson also made many other useful suggestions with regards to a genealogical search. For instance, "have you considered the information that may lie dormant in an old account book, where son John and daughter Jane may have purchased items on their father's account, thus determining their parentage?" What about records of a Goal, in particular a debtor's goal.

In closing her talk, Mrs. Robertson said: "This openmindedness is of great benefit to the researcher on his first visit to an institution where he wishes to use the genealogical collection. On the first visit he should consult with the research assistant, making known to that person the sources which he has already consulted, and his particular genealogical problem. Frequently a research assistant must try to draw out the researcher, or present materials to his attention with which the genealogist is already quite familiar, and much time of both researcher and staff member is wasted. The researcher with an open mind will accept variations in spelling, the possibility that his Colonel ancestor was in fact a Cornet in a Loyalist Corps, having been advanced in rank only by successive generations of descendants. He will not be positive as to his ancestor's religious affiliation, and must even keep, as some have found, an open mind as to his racial origin. Few, if any of us, despite all our imperfections, or "our lot in life", would choose to be anyone else, nor should we wish that our ancestor's had been other than they were."

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A NOTE FROM DON MACLEAN re: DICTIONARY OF SCOTTISH EMIGRANTS TO CANADA:

"Donald Whyte, Chairman of the Council, Scottish Genealogical Society is preparing a dictionary of pre-1855 Scottish emigrants to Canada. Many members of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society will be familiar with his classic work on Scottish emigrants to the United States. His Canadian book will be similar but it promises to be more comprehensive. At present, he is gathering his basic data and putting together reference cards. The details which he would like to include for each emigrant are; name, parentage, destination, date and ship, dates of birth and death, occupation, date of marriage, name of wife or husband, parentage of spouse, children, references.

Children born in Scotland are given cross-referenced cards on which details listed above are also included. Issue born in Canada are simply listed. Spouses born in Scotland are also given individual cross referenced cards.

This is an important work and perhaps the New Brunswick Genealogical Society might help. Could we put together a team to gather information to ensure that Mr. Whyte has the best possible coverage of New Brunswick immigrants?"

PART IX OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING Julia Walker, Acting Secretary:

The regular meeting of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society was held at the New Brunswick Museum in Saint John on October 27, 1979, with Mr. Graeme Somerville acting as Chairman.

Following the opening remarks by Mr. Somerville, the minutes of the Annual Meeting were read by Daniel Johnson. The financial report was also read, showing a balance of \$1,153.26 in the society's account.

In accord with the usual custom, each person present stood and gave his or her name, and indicated the names of the families being searched.

Mr. Eugene Campbell spoke briefly on the Newsletter, and spoke of plans for future issues.

The Chairman reported on the book of early marriages in Saint John which had been advertised by the author, Mrs. Bertha Wood-Holt. He also answered questions and had a photo-copy of the manuscript for members to examine.

Reports were given as follows: Julia Walker on the forthcoming publication of the Kings County Census for 1851 being printed by the Provincial Archives; Betty Sewell on the York County Census for 1851, also being printed; and Daniel Johnson on his publication of the Census for Victoria County, 1851.

Before listening to the speaker of the day the members enjoyed a coffee break and informal discussions.

The speaker, Mrs. Monica Robertson of the N. B. Museum spoke on the genealogy material and facilities at the Museum. She noted the increased interest in genealogy, for various reasons, including more time available, religious reasons, matters of inheritance, and so on. She listed the materials available and the house the Museum Archives are open. During the question period she replied to questions concerning the publications planned by the Museum, starting with the recent book on Irish Immigration, and she said the next plan to re-publish E. Stone Wiggins' History of Queens County.

The Museum Archives is now closed for renovation and when re-opened will have more room, more material available and better security for the documents and other material.

Following this part of the program, the meeting adjourned.


