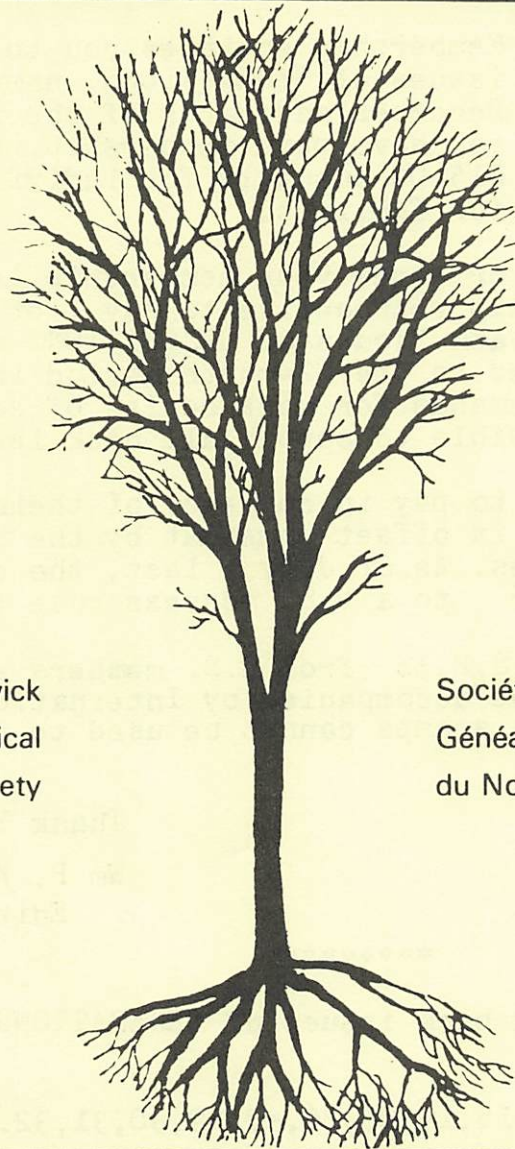

Membership entitles you to receive four issues of GENERATIONS, namely, June, September, December and March of the 12 months for which you have paid membership. Presently, dues are \$15.00 annually for individuals and \$20.00 for families.

If you join N.B.G.S. or renew your membership later in the year we make your membership retroactive to May 1 of that year and supply you with any back issues of GENERATIONS which may have already been published in the 12-month period in question. Due to unusually heavy demands for back copies of certain issues, it is not always possible to supply all back issues, but we try.

We like U.S. members to pay in currency of their own country because the exchange is offset somewhat by the higher mailing cost to U.S. addresses. As of July 1 last, the cost of mailing a copy of GENERATIONS to a U.S. address rose to 86 cents.

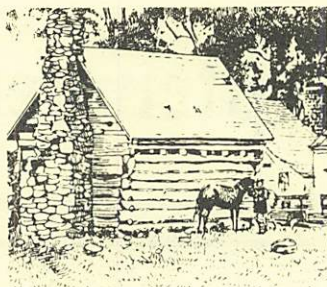

Excerpt from a letter from Robert Cunningham, dated 4 November 1985

"I took the following items (verbatim) from the notes of ALEXANDER MUNRO (variously MONRO & MONROE) who was a resident of BAIE VERTE, N.B. all his life, - from childhood - having been born in Scotland. He was a land surveyor and a Justice of the Peace and in the habit of recording genealogy of early settlers along with those of marriages he performed (also with the fee charged! up to 15/- (fifteen shillings) until sometime after Confederation, when the rates went up to \$1.00, \$1.50 or \$2.00 - depending on what the traffic would bear, I suppose) on the backs of his pages of surveyor notes which are now in Mt. Allison Archives. Munro died c. 1895, an old man.

following a discussion of life in Baie Verte in earlier years - 1879-80 - 1790.

The above is confirmed by Benjamin McElmon, now 24 Nov. 1879, in his 89th year. Son of Peter (about 1790 born). He was born in Jolicure and can remember 80 years of his time, moved to Tidnish where Squire Robert McElman now resides when 10 years old (1800 or 1801)

after some more reminiscences:

When my father moved to Tidnish his nearest neighbor was one family at River Philip. His father came from Ireland. Benjamin McElmon born about 1790.

My father was 84 years old, eldest brother was 90, oldest sister 80. My uncle on my father's side was 95 and his wife 106; my youngest uncle, father's side, was 88 who was a member of N.B. Legislature for some years for Kent, N.B. Most all the old settlers lived to be old people, all drank good rum in those days.

(This seems to mean that Alexander married Frenholm to Allen for twelve shillings - sixpence and received ten shillings on account, leaving two shillings and sixpence owing.

On the same day he married James McElman to Caroline Gooden (a corruption of Goodwin). I don't know what Spillar means.

These are almost certainly your McElmons. The name changes are not at all unusual for the times (Simon Graham spelled his daughter's name (Annie McElmon) as Annie Halman which gave Ray and me a lot of trouble for a while. See variances of Monro - at least five.

This means that the McElmons (McElmons, McElmans) were very early settlers on the marshes (Chignecto Isthmus).

I can't find an earlier record than Benjamin McElmon b. 1790 - there are records of the pre-Loyalists of 1755 & 1753 so the McElmons might have been 1763-84 Loyalists! How lucky can you get!"

Bob added the following in the same letter:

"So there was a large family of McElmons in Baie Verte area. Baie Verte is about 10 miles from Sackville on the road to P.E.I. - So you've driven thru your ancestors area. Next thing to do is look for graves.

Goodwins came to Baie Verte area shortly after the attack on Beausejour by Shirley's Regt. in 1755. Goodwin was in Shirley's and came from Massachusetts. Thus, McElmon could have come about the same way and the same time, or else by way of Halifax, 1749."

Excerpt from a Robert Cunningham letter dated 11 January 1987:

"There was a family of McElmons on Dorchester Island very early in the history of the island and they built a stone house there. I know the location. These, I feel, were your McElmons/McAlmons, since Hickmans lived nearby (They were shipbuilders), and this may be the origin of the Hickman McAlmon you once mentioned..."

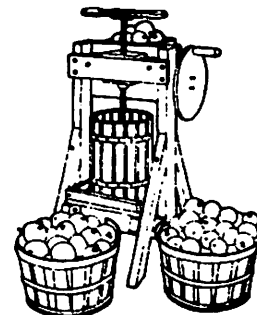

LOYALIST JOHN SHAW
Wickham, Queens Co., N.B.

Originally from Dutchess Co., New York, John Shaw was the only son of Timothy, who died in 1779 on Long Island, N.Y.(1) In 1776, Timothy and John declared their allegiance to the British crown.(2) John arrived in New Brunswick, with the Spring Fleet, May, 1783 with his wife, two children over the age of ten, and two children under the age of ten.(3) He received a townlot in Parrrtown in 1784,(4) but had settled in Queen's Co by 1787 when he was a claimant to the British government for losses suffered in America.(5) John's claim valued at five hundred dollars included the farm of 186 acres in Dutchess Co., New York, plus livestock and farming utensils. On April 20, 1810, administration in the estate of John Shaw, Queen's Co. was granted to John Shaw, Jr., Mayes Case, and Thomas Carpenter.(6) John's wife was Amy.(7)

John and Amy Shaw probably had more children than those listed above, since they are listed as having four children upon their arrival in New Brunswick in 1783.

CATHERINE: probably one of the children born when the John Shaw family arrived in N.B. in 1783. She was married at Gagetown to Thomas Carpenter of Wickham on 2 April 1796.(8) Thomas was probably a son of Archelaus Carpenter.(9) Loyalist Archelaus Carpenter, a cordwainer from Westchester Co., N. Y., arrived in New Brunswick September, 1783 aboard the ship "Cyrus" with his wife and four children.(10)

Loyalist Elisha Case was a farrier from Rhode Island, who arrived in N.B., June, 1783, aboard the ship "Symmetry" with his wife and five children.(16) Mayes Case died 24 January 1846 in his 74th year(17).

Index to D.A.R. Miscellaneous Records Published.

Researchers studying Maine families look forward each year to the appearance of a new volume of genealogical miscellany prepared by the state's D.A.R.; these compilations include such data as vital records, Bible records, cemetery records and family notes. The Daughters have placed these annual volumes at Maine State Library, Augusta; Maine Historical Society, Portland; National Society, D.A.R., Washington, D.C.; and for the last 40 years at the Bangor, ME, Public Library. Now they announce the publication of a 113-page Index to D.A.R. Miscellaneous Records (1987) that covers the entire 55-year run, indexes the contents by Maine towns or by other states and concludes with a 34-page index to the principal families. More than half the book is made up of solid family listings (father, mother & children), and just a few of the families mentioned are: Dickinson, Fawcett, Grew, Hallett, Kearney, Kimball, Perkins, Pratt, Price, Saunders and Stockford. about 338 families are mentioned.

The book is the result of more than 60 years of collecting by Mrs Fawcett. Her findings go back to 1433, with a record of one Robert Sharp, a notary public in Scotland.

The Sharpe family name came to the Woodstock area in 1788, when Alexander (?) Sharp settled on the east side of the St. John River. One of his notable descendants was Francis Peabody Sharp who developed several well-known varieties of apples common to New Brunswick orchards.

While the volume may be a bit "heavy" for those not related to any of the families in it, nevertheless it should give Mrs Fawcett tremendous satisfaction to see in print what she has labored almost a lifetime to assemble.

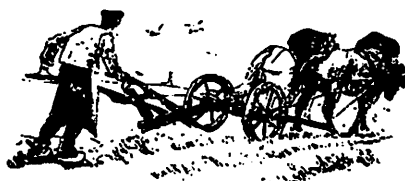

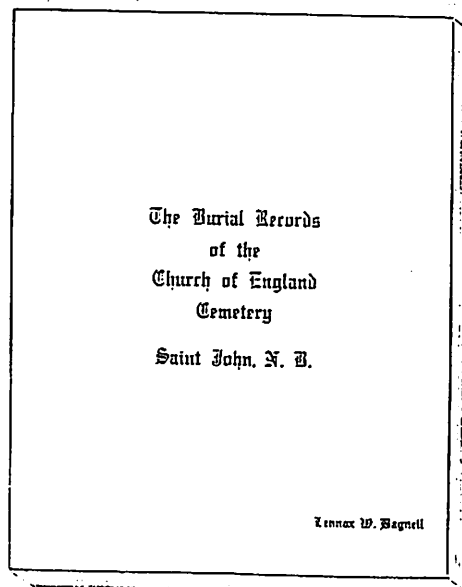

SOME PEOPLE OF NEREPIS, NEW BRUNSWICK

Westfield is situated in the south side of Kings County and is divided into two districts, by the St. John River, #1 and #2. #1 is divided into sections and known as "Westfield Beach," "Lingley" named for owners of land there, "Sagwa," an Indian name, meaning "daughter of a chief", and "Nerepis" another Indian name meaning "valley between hills."

Westfield is a small farming country. It is also noted for its lumber and large game.

Nerepis is surrounded by a chain of mountains, many of which are noted for their beauty.

Bald Mountain, the highest peak, is to the north of Westfield. It is said to be the highest mountain in N.B. Another mountain of note is Eagle Rock; the early settlers naming it that, on account of large numbers of eagles nesting there. Another point of interest is West Mountain, from which can be seen, the Valley of Nerepis, Woodmans Point, many farms in Westfield #2 on the east of the Saint John River, and also 13 lakes. The Nerepis River, which has its head-waters in Queens Co. flows through the Nerepis Valley, and joins the St. John River at Lingley.

Who the first settlers of Nerepis were is not known. The first on record was Colonel Henry Nase who received from the Crown a grant of 6,000 acres at Welsford. Not being satisfied with this account of it being too far inland, he sold it and bought six lots of 50 acres each between Nerepis and Westfield. He settled on a part of this, calling it "Beau Bear Point". His son, Capt. Philip Nase settled in Nerepis. A famous pine tree, which it is said he planted is still standing, and is known as the "Capts. Pine".

In May 1783 Major John Coffin, an Englishman, who distinguished himself in the Revolutionary War, arrived in N.B. from South Carolina, bringing with him his wife (who was a daughter of the Governor of South Carolina) and two sons, John and Henry. He also had as servants 2 black men, William Watson and Samuel Smith and one white woman. He received a grant of 5,000 acres at the mouth of the Nerepis, part of an estate known as "Glazier Manor." On July 2,

Colonel Nase began a house for Major Coffin at "Beau Bear Point". It was finished on September 4 and on September 26 Coffin took possession calling it "Alwington Manor", the family name of all Coffin estates. He was so pleased with his house that he gave Colonel Nase a horse on October 3, 1783.

In 1785, Major Coffin received a grant of 1,000 acres at Welsford. After living some time at Alwington Manor, where two sons and 2 daughters were born, he was called back to England on duty. He sold Alwington to Wm. Belyea, who then named it Woodman's Point.

Major Coffin later returned to N.B. bringing 14 boys, Wm. Blagdon Sr. who is well remembered in Nerepis being one of them. Mrs. Coffin did not come back from England. General Coffin as he was known at this time, built a log house on land later owned by Thomas Lingley Sr. Johnston Lingley's house is now on the same foundation. This part of the country was at that time forest. The only house known to have been built then was occupied by a man named "Monday". He and his wife's graves are at the side of the road about 200 yards above Sagwa Station.

General Coffin cleared land and built many buildings near Sagwa. A house and three other buildings was later moved off a hill by Thomas Lingley, Sr., 17 yoke of oxen being used for this purpose. Thomas Lingley Jr. is still using the same buildings. General Coffin was a man well liked. He owned much property and enjoyed helping the poor. His chief worry was that the wood on his lands would not last his lifetime. He was fond of hunting and spent much time with his canoe and gun, having as guide an Indian called "Joe". He did much for the country and through him the Glebe Land was secured for the Church. He died in his log house on May 12, 1838, aged about 90 years. His grave is in the west corner of the cemetery of Woodmans Point. A stone is at his grave also an oak tree which Wm. Blagdon Sr. planted to his memory. Nelson Coffin is buried near

his father.

Captain John Coffin, the General's eldest son lived for some years in the house now owned by R.M. Burden at Lonewater Farm.

Captain Coffin's wife, a St. John Woman had for her footman one Wm. Watson a son of the General's servant. He was well liked and respected, dying about 1916, at an advanced age.

The first post was carried from St. John to Fredericton on horse back October 15, 1788. Later this was taken by stage coach.

February 8, 1861, is known as "Cold Friday" 28° below zero with a heavy wind. It was the coldest day remembered in N.B.

In 1866 a railroad between St. John and Fredericton was started being finished 1869.

On the first Monday in October 1869 a heavy wind struck Westfield and is remembered as the "Saxby Gale". It uprooted trees and tore down buildings.

The first train went from Westfield to Fredericton the first Tuesday in October 1869. It had an engine, the "Yo-ho" and 6 passenger cars. One other engine called "John Parks" was in Westfield at the time, but had become damaged the day before, by running into a barn which the "Gale" had blown across the tracks near the place now called Sagwa. This train was brought to Westfield in a schooner ~~for the U.S.A.~~

The first English Church on record was at Woodman's Point. Later one was built at Westfield but this was burned and in 1900 a new one was erected. The first resident clergyman was "Parson Milner" a man well liked.

In 1888 a high freshet did much damage to the N.B. Railroad which at this time was taken over by the C.P.R. It also carried away the Nerepis bridge which connected Lingley and Woodman's Point. This bridge which was 3/4 of a

mile long was replaced. A bridge, highway and railroad combined was built at this place in 1916-1919, said railroad being owned by the C.N.R.

During the world war of 1914-1919 Westfield sent a number of men to the front. Those who enlisted being Fred McKenzie, Talmadge Porter, Wellesley Porter, Harold Parker, Ronald Machum, Aubrey Caulfield, George Greer, Byron Greer, Roy Lunnin, George Flanagan, Fred Wallace and Arthur Wheaton.

The ones who gave their life for their country were Fred McKenzie, Roy Lunnin, George Flanagan, Talmadge Porter and Roy Machum.

In 1903 a forest fire swept through Nerepis and Westfield destroying thousands of dollars worth of lumber. There was another large fire in 1907. In 1911 a forest fire burned the Presbyterian Church at Nerepis. In 1914 a Presbyterian Church was built at Lingley. A fire started back of Westfield in 1921 and after being kept in control for some days, it came into the Village on August 6th and destroyed many buildings including the Methodist Church at Hillandale. This Church has been rebuilt. Many of the houses have also been replaced.

In the spring of 1923 a freshet, one foot lower than that of 1888 caused much damage to the C.P.R.

The first electric power and lights were brought to Westfield from Musquash in 1922 - 1923.

A Community Hall is now being built by the people of Nerepis and at this time (1924) is near completion.

Westfield has an Orange Lodge, Womans' Auxiliary and Womons Institute.

Records start with Michel L'Arche Hache' dit Gallant of Beaubassin, Acadia in the year of 1690 when he married Anne Cormier. One direct descendancy group extends for 12 generations.

Originated in 1975 a considerable amount of information has been accumulated and currently is being put on computer. At the present time there are over 6,000 individuals and families listed. Statistics have been obtained from members of the Association in addition to the bibliography attached.

A unique aspect of this association is that it is a non profit undertaking and information is given freely at no charge, but one must be a member. One becomes a member by submitting a Member's GALLANT Ancestor Chart (MAC FILE) which will be added to the computer. The MAC FILE may be requested from the office in Medford, MA. On receipt of the chart at the association the person is automatically a life member at no cost. The only stipulation is that when writing to the assn. a SASE (self addressed stamped envelope) must be included. Our Canadian cousins can send international reply coupons.

We cannot do extensive research for members but will answer questions and look for basic names. If information is in the computer a print out will be sent to you.

The Jonah Family
From Montbeliard to Hillsborough
1752-1775

Foreign Protestants were brought to Halifax beginning in 1749 under Governor Cornwallis. The government desired hard working settlers to be loyal to the British, and to make the colony in Nova Scotia self supporting. An agent was acquired to secure for King George protestant Europeans who would come to Nova Scotia.

Pierre Jeaune, farmer, age 32, from Montbeliard; his wife and their five children arrived at Halifax August, 1752 on the ship, Speedwell.

Montbeliard was a French speaking principality belonging to the German 'Empire'. A clerk wrote on the ship's list-Jeaune. In the next fifteen years the name would be written; Jonet, Jeaunee, Jeaunaie, Joinet, Joney, Jony, Jeaunay, Jonais and Josnet. Today the spelling used is Jonah. As time went on, Pierre changed to Peter.

The government of Nova Scotia, as part of their agreement with the settlers, issued food quarterly to the settlers; ship's bread, beef, pork, butter, dried peas, vinegar, oatmeal, molasses and rum. Records were kept of each member of the family when this victualling took place.

An Anglican missionary, Mr. Moreau, was provided to minister to the French-speaking settlers. He recorded births, deaths and marriages. He also acted as teacher for the French-speaking children.

The settlers began to work off their passage debts to the government by building fortifications on Saint George's Island. They complained of poor living conditions. Many died, including three Jonah children.

The majority of the Swiss and German people were moved to Lunenburg in 1753. Military protection was provided. Blockhouses were built. Each family was given a town lot and a garden lot. The Jonah family had a lot on Fox Street, in Creighton's division.

Homes were built; potatoes, flax, turnips, oats and barley were planted. Livestock, provided by the government, were pastured in the common around the town.

A daughter was added to the family in 1754. Families were given 30-acre farm lots. The Jonah lot was northwest range A-37. Families moved to these lots.

Life was severe and there was much sickness. Much of the livestock died. Victualling continued. The settlers faced several years of hostilities from the French and Indians. Often the settlement was raided. Settlers were scalped, or killed or carried off.

Charlotte, the mother of the family, died in 1756. The same year Pierre married Alexandrina Isslin, who also came from Montbeliard.

Pierre, it is thought, went on a livestock expedition in 1756 with some others, to the deserted Acadian area. They collected and drove many head of cattle but many animals died of fatigue and hunger during the rough journey across country.

Another son was born in 1758. This year was the worse one yet for savage attacks. Settlers abandoned their farms and returned to the town. The military force at Lunenburg through that summer was the 'Royal Americans'. (Ten years later, John Jonah would join this regiment.) During one Indian attack, the ten-year-old son of Pierre Jonah was carried off by Indians while he was on his way to the northwest blockhouse.

Three more sons and a daughter were born to the family while they were in Lunenburg. The settlement became fully established with progress reported. There was a great increase of cattle. A good quality of grain and root crops was raised, and fire wood was cut to supply Halifax and the army. Peace was established.

The settlers began to spread to other areas. The Jonah family settled in Hillsborough in 1768.

My father is the brother-in-law of my child because his stepsister is his wife. I am the brother of my own son who is also the child of my grandmothers; I am my brother's brother-in-law, my wife is her own child's aunt; my son is my father's nephew, and I am my own grandfather.

We know that mental health is unfortunately one of Canada's serious health problems today. It is interesting to examine these earlier records to see how they compare. They show a total of 50 persons institutionalized in 1838: 29 new admissions and 21 held over from the previous year.

Lets have a closer look to find out who these people were. First of all, Sex. According to these records, the patients were overwhelmingly male, which was holding proportionately. There were more than twice as many males as females in 1838 or 70% of the patients that year, up from about 62% earlier, as illustrated in Table 1.

Where were they from? Computation was made for 1837 entries (53) and the admissions for 1838 (29) totalling 82 persons as in Table 2.

Unknown	2	These figures speak for themselves. The mad Irish appear as 67% or two-thirds of those hospitalized in this period, and providing 58.6% input in 1838. This makes them expensive immigrants. It would be interesting to see the figures after the influx of the potato famine Irish.

Less city slickers become too complacent however, one must consider the labour force of the time. Doubtless, most of the Irish were residents, part time at least, of Saint John, working in the shipyards and the urban employment pool.

The age distribution is Teenagers, the "terrible twenties", (30 to 45) as the sensitive period for job insecurities and possible menopausal starts for females, and 46+ since death was usually younger in those days.

Their teenagers with only 7 or 8.5% were certainly in better condition than ours. But the other findings are comparable. For instance,

modern career studies both in North America and in Britain show that the group from 30 to 45 years of age are the most anxious about job disappointments and the future. The group were the most prominent in these nineteenth century records as well, at 33 or 40.2%. The disturbing stresses and tensions felt in the twenties are reflected in these listings. We cannot really compare the oldest category since the death dates are so different now.

What were their death ages? The pattern is the same as Age Groups. That is, one teenager; (20-29) = 7; (30-45) = 11; and (46+) = 2. TOTAL 21.

In sum: the period from 30 years to 45 was crucial for people in the 1830's as it still is today. Not very encouraging is it?

Preserving Old Newspapers

To bleach old newspaper clippings, dissolve one tablet or two tablespoons of liquid milk of magnesia in a quart of club soda. Mix well. (If using a tablet, make sure it is dissolved). Let this solution chill for eight hours in the refrigerator, then pour into a shallow pan. Soak the clippings in the solution for an hour. This treatment counteracts the acid which causes the papers to yellow and become brittle. This procedure will keep the paper like new for as long as 50 years and can be repeated. 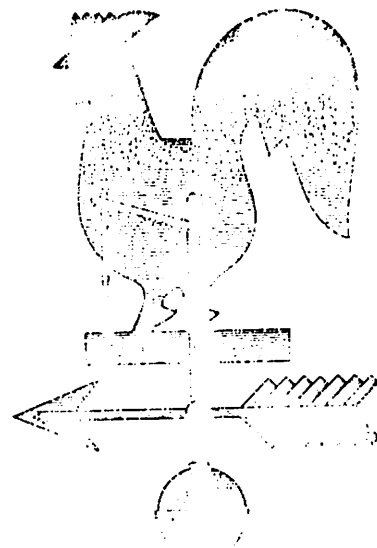

MARITIMERS IN THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR

Daniel F. Johnson, B.B.A., C.G.(C)

The Maritimes (New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island) were affected by the struggle between the American states in 1861 and 1862. The first English settlements in the Maritimes had been made by pioneers from the New England states, then colonies under the British Crown. Loyalists with colonial family ties had settled the Maritimes almost 80 years before. Yet, by the time of the American Civil War, strong commercial ties had been established with the Southern Colonies. Like their American neighbours, Maritimers were divided in their sympathies and many left to fight in both the confederate and federal armies.

The tensions preceding the Civil war were evidenced in the small town of Woodstock, New Brunswick near the American border. On January 9th, 1860, a public meeting was held there and the following resolution was passed.

Whereas there have been for several days past afloat in this community and reports to the effect that during the late autumn or present winter, George L. Raymond, Esq., J.P. of Woodstock induced a colored boy, William Hoyt, aged about 18, lately a resident of this county, to accompany him into the U.S.A. and that there he sold him into slavery... (1)

Mr. Raymond responded to the accusation that "the last he saw of Hoyt, he was standing on a wharf in New York." This was confirmed when Hoyt returned the following December with the explanation that he went to sea. (2)

Another New Brunswick native who suffered personally from circumstances preceding the American Civil War. was Capt. Thomas Vaughan of Saint John. In a letter to his brothers, D. and T. Vaughan dated February 6th, 1861 at Savannah, Georgia, E.A. Scoullard provides the following account:

"I am sorry to say Capt. Thomas Vaughan, jr. has got into a little trouble here with a lawless mob who accused him of entertaining negroes at his table and of saying a negro was as good as a white man; and they have been trying for a fortnight to get their hands on him. On Saturday they sent Charles Brown, the stevedore to the captain, to meet them at their room and that they would give him a fair trial. He very foolishly went without letting me or anyone else know it and they brought these charges which the captain denied; but being a set of dare devils, they took him off into the woods and took off part of his clothing and tarred his head and face and stuck a little cotton on him and then carried him back to the ship. They did not injure his person in any way except cutting off his hair on one side..." (3)

If further adds, the above young lady, only 18 years of age, left her home 3rd Sept., came the whole distance, about 1800 miles, alone, walking 16 miles to Presque Isle, then taking the stage to Mattawamkeag, thence walked to Belfast, thence by boat to Boston and New York. She was sent back to Boston and went with 10th Regt. to Baltimore, at last arriving at Annapolis about 15th Oct. when she found the object of her affections. (36)
