
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

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

FAMILY HISTORY RESEARCH IN NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA PROVINCIAL ARCHIVES OF NEW BRUNSWICK (PANB) GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH CHECKLIST (1988)

A. Purpose: This guide has been prepared to assist family historians research at the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick. It lists valuable genealogical resources and shows on floor plans where finding aids, guides and indexes are located.




B. Introduction: The Provincial Archives is
located on the Fredericton campus of the
University of New Brunswick. The hours
are from 8:30am to 5:00pm Monday to
Saturday, except statutory holidays.
Parking is available in the rear of the building. The


- C. Advance Research: It is best that before visiting the Provincial Archives each genealogist will have done a considerable amount of research on their family, filled out pedigree charts and family group sheets, checked family Bibles, interviewed relatives, studied legal documents such as wills and land records, gathered together photograph albums, certificates, newspaper clippings and other family records, and prepared a list of questions to be researched during their stay at the Provincial Archives. It is especially important that approximate dates and locations for ancestors be known as this information will greatly speed research work.
- D. Microfilm: Family Historians are reminded that many of the more helpful genealogical records have been filmed and the reels can be borrowed at no charge from the Provincial Archives through the researcher's library.
- 1. Registration. Please sign the visitor's register daily. At the time of the first visit each researcher is asked to fill out a Registration Form that reminds visitors that documents must be handled with great care, pencils must be used and briefcases, bags, parcels and coats are to left outside the Search Room. Researchers with cars should obtain a parking sticker at the front desk.
- 2. Archivist. To one of the two archivists on duty briefly describe your research project and they will offer you directions and suggestions. The staff is available to assist visitors at any time during their stay.

- 3. <u>Guides</u>. The Provincial Archives' staff have prepared guides to assist family historians conduct research. These are available free upon request and can be ordered in advance of a visit:
  - (a) Beginner's Guide. This eight page guide explains fundamentals, gives the addresses of institutions, and offers other suggestions. It helps those just getting started at a family history.




- (b) <u>County Genealogical Guides</u>. These list census, church, marriage, school, land, and other microfilmed records for each of New Brunswick's fifteen counties.
- (c) "Publications on Sale at the Provincial Archives"
  This sheet lists census books available for sale.

Note: A map of New Brunswick showing the counties and the major communities follows. The counties are subdivided into parishes. Data on the creation of counties and parishes is found in the County Genealogical Guides.



4. Family Histories Index. This index lists family histories in the form of files (MC1), books (MC80), and microfilm. Fill out a "Request Form" to view all but the microfilm. Donations of Family Histories are always welcomed.



- 5. County Reference Collection (MC2).

  Contains files and binders of church and marriage records, epitaphs etc. for each county.
- 6. (a) Microfilm Subject Card Index. For family, local and church histories and records.
  - (b) <u>Vital Statistics Card Index</u>. For epitaphs extracted from various sources.
  - (c) Biographical Card Index. For biographical sketches found in various books and compilations.
  - (d) New Brunswick Publications (MC80) Index. Access is provided through an author, title and county index. Especially note family and local histories.
- 7. (a) Land Petitions (RG10, RS108) Card Index. Although there are petitions from 1784 to about 1918, only those from 1784 to 1850 contain biographical data.
  - (b) Land Petitions: Current Series (RS272) Card Index.
    Documents cover years from 1830 to present. Little biographial data. Partially indexed and filmed.
- 8. (a) Naturalization Records (RG3, RS547) Card Index. For the years 1810-1867. Microfilmed.
  - (b) Passenger Lists (RG3, RS23E) Card Index. 10,000 names 1816-1838. MC80/1263 = published version.
  - (c) Supreme Court Records: Exchequer (RG5, RS189) Card Index. Files cover the years 1795-1901.
  - (d) Records of the Intermediate Courts (RG6) Card Index Files are available for most dounties.
- 9. (a) Justices of the Peace (RG9, RS581) Card Index. For years 1867 to 1958. Microfilmed
  - (b) Saint John Burial Permits (RG15, RS315A) Maiden Name Card Index. For years 1889-1919.
  - (c) Marriage Bonds and Licenses (RG3, RS551) Card Index. For years 1810 to 1900ca.
- 10. (a) Supreme Court Records: Original Jurisdiction (RG5, RS42) Card Index. For years 1784 to 1822. Index for 1822 to 1835 is found in finding aid.
  - (b) Court of Equity Records: Original Jurisdiction (RG5, RS55) Card Index. 10,000 files 1784-1910.





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- 14. Photocopier. Researchers are welcome to photocopy records at .10 per page. Genealogists wishing to copy pages in bound books should check first with the archivist on front desk duty.
- 15. County Census Publications. Books are available for the following counties:

There are films on census records from 1851 to 1891, church records for many of the older churches, passenger lists 1816-1838, Saint John Burial Permits 1889-1919, military records 1784-1867ca, tax records, Late Registration of Births 1810-1887, teachers petitions & licences 1812-1882, school returns 1820-1954, marriage bonds and licences 1810-1932, county marriage registers 1810ca-1888, wills, land petitions, grants, deeds, leases and mortgages, newspapers, Equity court records 1784-1910, telephone directories 1889-1982, and city directories 1865-1968. Some genealogical films are listed in County Guides.

### CEMETERY TRANSCRIPTION GUIDELINES by CHARLOTTE BRANCH - N.B.G.S.

- 1. Describe where the cemetery is situated according to name, parish, and county, and give travel directions such as route number of the adjacent road and its distance in kilometers or miles from an intersection or landmark. Record the date of the transcription.
- 2. Describe the basic physical characteristics of the cemetery. Note its religious denomination, if known; the owner of the land, if private; its state of repair and indicate whether burials are still being performed.
- 3. Copy each stone, line by line, exactly as it appears. Use a slash (/) to indicate the end of a line. Do not edit or abbreviate the original inscription. Use brackets () for editorial notes.
- 4. Upper and lower case lettering should be differentiated. Use a printed letter in your notes to denote upper case and a written letter for lower case or print in upper and lower case. This method provides a better historical record; gives a good sense of the actual appearance of the stone, creates a pleasing effect when typed and lessens confusion arising from letter similarity.
- 5. Each stone should be allotted a number for indexing purposes. The numbers will also help to indicate family relationships between stones.
- 6. A series of stones may be parallel or perpendicular to a walk or driveway. They should be recorded, in order, from the aisle and the recorder should return to the place of beginning to record the next series. Designate each series with the word SERIES followed by the numbers of the stones.
- 7. A number of adjacent stones may indicate family relationships. It must be obvious, such as created by a border of fence, edging material, corner posts, or a trimmed border with a surfaced interior. This can be designated by the word GROUP followed by the numbers of the stones.
- 8. Transcribe the principal stone in a group first, followed by secondary stones, and the footstones last. Copy the main side of a stone first, then the sides and rear, and designate by the words (side) or (rear).
- 9. An inscription may begin or end with a verse or biographical data, and it should be noted at the end of the transcription by the word (elogy). It is necessary to copy only those passages containing specific references to the individual.
- 10. The transcriber will occasionally encounter letters or numbers which are difficult to read. Leave the appropriate number of spaces and <u>underline</u> if the digits are totally indistinguishable, and fill in the digits and underline if there is reasonable certainty. Use a checkmark in your notes to confirm that an unorthodox inscription is correct.

### Francis Annesley Cosgrove

My paternal great-grandfather, Francis Annesley Cosgrove, was born in Dublin Ireland in 1778. He came to Nova Scotia in 1818 and settled there, raising a family and eventually dying in 1856. He was a former soldier who had fought in the Napoleonic Wars and probably in the American war of 1812, for his obituary mentions America as one of his fields of battle. His subsequent life in Nova Scotia is fairly clear, but his former life in Ireland is not. Probably it was well known to his son and daughters, but no records were kept, unfortunately.

The obituary to which I refer speaks of Mr. Francis Cosgrove as a religious and a well-learned man whose parents died when he was very young. The child, Francis, was then entrusted to the care of a religious grandmother whose early teachings he never forgot. Just what his religion was we do not know, but probably the Church of Ireland, for in the late 1820s he was converted and baptized into the Free Will Baptist Church operating at that time in his area of Nova Scotia. Once settled in that province, he carried on the trade of shoemaker and with the aid of his army pension, he was well able to maintain his growing family.

According to my father's Journal, Francis Cosgrove's mother was Eliza, the daughter of Francis Annesley and his wife, a member of the Ingalls(Inglis) family. His father was Francis Cosgrove, possible a soldier who fought in the Seven Years War, the date 1759 and Minden are mentioned. The names of the first Francis' parents are not given. The Annesley family tree reads in part:

W. Annesley m...?

Francis Annesley m...Ingalls(Inglis?)

Eliza Annesley m. Francis Cosgrove

Francis Annesley Cosgrove b. 1778, d. 1856

When Francis Cosgrove came to Nova Scotia in 1818, he was a member of a group of disbanded soldiers who came over from Ireland after the Napoleonic Wars and who were settled in the Dalhousie Settlement near Annapolis. His name is listed formally in an article entitled "Disbanded Soldiers living in the Dalhousie Settlement 1820." N.S. Genealogist 1983, as follows:

The name of his regiment at the time of his(or its) disbandment was The Prince of Wales Tipperary Regiment of Foot(99th). Francis received his discharge at St. John, N.B. in 1818.

From 1818 - 1825 the list is the same, and ends at the year 1825.

By coincidence, Sgt Francis Cosgrove was waiting for his Army pension at this time. (See Callbeck's <u>History of Annapolis</u> County, P.262).

It is interesting to note that two Francis Cosgroves seem to be on active duty in the army suring the same period of time, the difference being that we know nothing of the "Captain's" antecedents, while we do know at least where the "sergeant" was born. We could speculate that they were one and the same person

in this way: Captain Francis may have been wounded at Waterloo (Sergeant Francis actually was), and placed on half-pay, retiring because of his wounds in 1816. Maybe he no longer wanted to stay in Ireland, so he joined the Tipperary Regiment as a regular soldier and eventually came to Nova Scotia. A fanciful theory, I know but it could have happened.

A survey of the Dalhousie Settlement around the early 1820s shows Francis Cosgrove with two males living in his household. As no female is mentioned he probably was a widower when he came to Nova Scotia. In the Census of Annapolis Township in 1827, there are now three females in his household in addition to the males already mentioned, with one live birth within the previous year. We know that Francis married Elizabeth Martha Cuthbert of Halifax in the early 1820s(exact date unknown) so the new birth must be from that marriage. The question is - who was his first wife, the wife he married before he left Ireland?

My father's Journal seems to indicate that a Mary Dillon Smith may have been the first wife. Mary was a young widow with one child, Barry Smith, when she married Francis Cosgrove. She was also the great grand-daughter of the Earl Barry. It would seem that young Cosgrove moved in high circles before he left Ireland if this is true. Unfortunately, there is no proof. The couple had three children: Francis Annesley, Annesley, and a daughter whom my father referred to in later years as "Mrs. Oliver." Two of the males mentioned in the 1820s survey of the Dalhous de Settlement may have been these boys. Young Francis and Annesley apparently did not stay in Nova Scotia(if they ever came there), for family records state that they both became British soldiers and died unmarried at Gibraltar sometime in the 1850s. Their sister, Mrs. Oliver, is never mentioned again. She could have been married at the time Francis Cosgrove and his household left Ireland and very likely remained there. As for Barry Smith, we have no further word of him, although he may have been one of the males who came out to Nova Scotia. Perhaps he remained in Treland.

To add to the confusion, a Catherine Cosgrove was married to Augh Autchinson in St. Paul's Church in Halifax in 1821. Their history and descendants are fairly well documented in the Nova Scotia Archives, but whether there is any relationship to Francis Cosgrove has not yet been determined. Work is now being done by my cousins Ruth and Ross Burgess of Middleton, N.S. It should be noted that Hugh Hutchinson was a member of the same regiment as Francis Cosgrove, and arrived in the province at the same time, 1818. He and his young wife also became inhabitants of the Dalhousie Settlement.

Francis Cosgrove's obituary mentions six daughters and one son surviving him in addition to his widow, Elizabeth Martha Cuthbert. Only five daughters are shown on the family tree: Frances Ann who married Joseph Durling; Eliza who married William Heine and who was my grandmother; Elizabeth who married Thomas MacLean; Isabella who married Daniel Quigley; and Adelaide who married John Wheelock. The son, Francis Annesley, married Priscilla Martin. Was the sixth daughter "Mrs. Oliver" or Catherine Hutchinson? Were they one and the same person?

One final note: Francis Cosgrove and his family left the Dalhousie Settlement and made their home in the Kingston-Aylesford area of the Annapolis Valley. Francis died in Margaretville and was buried in North Kingston Cemetery. On his ornate tombstone there is a Free Mason sign, surely a strange device for a man who died as a shoemaker!

### AMAZING HOMO SAPIENS

The number of our ancestors doubles for each generation we go back. This means many things, one being that 1,024 people (11 generations before us) had to exist before we came along. If we go back 21 generations, it means 1,048,576 people came along in our direct line before we did.

### THE COY FAMILY

Following information copied from Fred Hoben's Journal, which is located at the NB Museum, Saint John, NB.

We can place Edward Coy and family in Upper Gagetown in the year 1771, as his daughter, Mary, afterward, Mrs. Bradley, in an account of her religious life, written by herself, claims to have been born in Gagetown on Sep. 1st of that year. There is no doubt, but that Upper Gagetown was the section that was meant as her father's farm was in the Little Spry Grant (#3), and his intervale grants, lots 5,6,7 and 8 were in Canning, directly across the St. John River. However we have the assurance that the COYS alway lived on good terms with the Indians.

Edward Coy and wife, the former Amy Titus, and some family arrived on the St. John River from Pomfret, Connecticut, and settled at Maugerville in 1763, about the time Maugerville was laid out as a township. His third daughter, Jane, was the first female child of English or American parentage to be born along the St. John River.

There had been no settlement at Maugerville or along that side of the river since 1701, when the French settlers had been floated off by a huge spring freshet and they abandoned that part of the country as unfit for settlement.

When later it began to be understood that the British Government planned to settle the township with disbanded soldiers, the settlers who were already there, began to fear that they would lose their homes, and all they had gained by their hard work, but largely through the intercession of Joshua Mauger, who at that time was Commissioner in London for NS and who understood the situation. They were finally confirmed in possession of their lands and property. In gratitude for this favour, the township was named Maugerville and Mr Mauger was given a grant of Maugers (Gilberts) Island and several lots on the eastern side of the township.

After abandoning his farm at Maugerville, Edward Coy received a grant of four lots of intervale in Canhing. (Lots 5,6,7, and 8) But it is not likely that he would attempt to make a home on this lower intervale. But it would be more reasonable to suppose that he moved directly to Gagetown when he became a settler on, or a tenant on, Col. Wm. Spry's "Little Grant", so called, of 5,000 acres, and made a permanent home. There is something of a legend in the Coy family to the effect that moving to the highland in the spring when water was high and back again after it fell off, was tried. A system of this kind could not work out very well as it would mean a lot of work and confusion. At Gagetowh, he gave the name to Coy's Lake; In Canning to Coy's Gut, an inlet from Grand Lake on the back part of his intervale; On the St. John River, at the head of the Long Reach, Coy's Mistake Point. This last was because of a mistake he made on the return trip from the mouth of the river Where he had gone for needed and from what is now Saint John. supplies, in a row boat, on the return trip he rowed up inside the Long Point and had to row back and around. Hence the name Coy's There are different versions of this adventure, but I Mistake. T got it handed down through think the above is the most reasonable. the Coy family.

We are also told that being among the first settlers in an almost unbroken wilderness, and far from a base of supplies, that the family endured great hardships, and on one occasion were saved from starvation by an Indian, who knew their circumstances, throwing a fat beaver's tail into their tent. Thus the fact that the supply of provisions ran low at times is readily admitted. But there is no instance on record of his name being on the indigent list. Nor did he receive any government bonus as did may of the Loyalists.

When we consider that of a family of eleven children, ten were successfully raised to maturity, (one died from the effects of vaccination) and lived to take their places in the life of their generation. - Benjamin, a Baptist Minister; Asa, a leading deacon and organizer of the First Baptist Church at Fredericton; Mary, an author; Edward and David were successful farmers; and the rest respectfully married and responsible citizens. Mary was a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and seven of her brothers and sisters of the Baptist Church. Edward was a deacon of the Canning Baptist Church. I think we should consider a very good record for the family of a pioneer. How many of the present day can do better?

My great great grandfather Coy, during the last part of his life, was totally blind. This was caused by an attempt made to clear away cataracts from his eyes by putting finely ground glass in them, which instead of clearing away the cataracts, destroyed his eyesight altogether. My great great grandmother became something of an invalid during the latter part of her life and the elder members had to support the family. We are told that by God's kind providence they were comfortably provided for.

Edward Coy died Nov. 19, 1795 aged 70 years, and Amy Titus, his wife Apr. 23, 1802. Both are buried in the cemetery by the Baptist Church at Upper Gagetown.

David Coy born 1776 died 1866 was one of the younger sons of Edward Coy and Amy Titus, his wife. He married Mary Ebbett on Feb. 28, 1801. Of the same Ebbett family, Catherine married John Estabrooks (son of Elijah, Sr.), Sarah married John Hoben and Elizabeth married Reuben Hoben. In all there were eight girls in the Ebbett family.

David Coy and Mary Ebbett had a family of six children: - Eliza born Feb. 7, 1802 married Mar. 18, 1830 to Israel Parent, Joseph E. born Dec. 6, 1805 died Jan. 30, 1895 married 1845 to Harriet Whitehead, Sarah born Oct. 6, 1808 died June 1880 unmarried, Margaret J. born Nov. 14, 1810 married Mar. 24, 1835 to David Hartt, Charles E. born Sep. 25, 1813 married to Margaret Wood, Mary Ann born Apr. 5, 1818 married Dec. 29, 1842 to William Whitehead.

David Coy, apparently inherited most of the real estate owned by his father. At this late date, we cannot tell how this happened to come about. Probably he took care of his parents in their later years. We know that Edward Coy was living in Gagetown in 1771, so we can assume that David was born on the Coy homestead on the Spry Grant.

David Coy built the first frame house of any size, to be built on the Upper Gagetown side of the river. This house is still standing today. (NOTE: I visited this house in 1984 during COY REUNION. A descendant "Arthur Coy" still lives there - B.S.)

Some changes have been made, such as taking our the old chimneys, brick ovens and fire places, putting on a sheet iron roof. The original roof was of shaved pumpkin pine shingles, and is still on under the present roof of aluminum. As the pitch was not steep, sparks from the big chimneys would lay on it and set fire, especially after it was on a number of years. The sheet iron roof was kept well tarred and lasted for around ninety years. It was replaced with an aluminum roof in 1854. I do not know the exact date when the house was built, but would judge between 1795 and 1800. It was used in those days for the farmer to have a house before he got his bride, and David Coy married in 1801. An ell and woodshed has been added and now it stands one of the largest and best built in the village.

There is a story, and I believe it is correct, to the effect that a white girl fell in love with the son of an Indian Chief, and went with him as his wife, and when her child was born, a girl, she died, and the chief made his son bring the baby to it's grandparents, saying that if it had been a boy, it would have been kept with the Indians. But as it was a girl, he thought it would be better with it's English grandparents. The Chief's son remained devoted to the little girl and brought it presents, moccasins, etc., until his father, the chief, forced him to stop. I have checked this story in every way, to the best of my ability, and all circumstances make it appear that Mary Ebbett, wife of David Coy, was a half blood Indian, and my great grandmother Coy.

I might say, here, that it appears that the "Sons of the Pioneers" went in for building larger houses than necessary. Quite a contrast to the comfortable log houses of their fathers. Evidently David Coy must have been a prosperous farmer of his day, or he could not have built such a house. It is now occupied and is the property of his great grandson, Arthur Coy and family.

David Coy and Mary Ebbett, his wife, were honest and industrious farmers of their day - cooking their food in the fire place, weaving cloth on their own loom by hand, getting their footwear made by the village cobbler, keeping a large number of cows, and making home-made cheese. All hay and grain was cut with the scythe or cradle.

There was a saying that one should not burn more candles than one had ships at sea. In short, living in the same old way as it had been done before, for centuries, and no doubt, as happily as now. They lived to a good old age and are buried in the cemetery by the Baptist Church at Upper Gagetown.

Joseph Edward Coy 1805-1895, eldest son of David Coy and Mary Ebbett, married Harriet Whitehead in the year 1845, when he was forty years of age and she was twenty. His father, David, died in 1866. Therefore my grandfather was fifty-one years of age at the time of the death of his father. His mother lived two years longer, or until 1868. His younger and only brother, Charles, married

Margaret Wood at About the same time, 1845.

The two families and the two old folks lived together in the same house. As the families of the two younger men began to increase in size, this arrangement did not prove satisfactory and the two brothers decided to divide their property, and separate. At that time, with the property of their father and their own, they were both wealthy men owning a large amount of real estate, consisting of highland farms, intervale and lumber land, stock, etc.

Charles Coy, with his family moved up to lots 70 and 71, where he made his home on this block of land of about 350 acres with house and barns and owning other blocks of land, both highland and intervale lying near.

My grandfather, who was the oldest son, remained on the home-stead, and his father and mother stayed with him.

I have heard my mother, who was Joseph E. Coy's third daughter, Rebecca, speak of her grandfather, David, to say what an agreeable old man he was in the home. He would entertain himself, reading his Bible and singing the old hymns. His eyesight remained good up to the time of his death at 90 years of age. My mother claimed that he had received his "Second Sight", as it was claimed very old people did sometimes. My mother would be thirteen years of age at the time of his death and could remember him quite well. I do not remember of hearing her speak of her grandmother Coy. I know that there was always friendly relations maintained with her two brothers, Charles and David, who lived on a farm just below Gagetown. The farm is still occupied by their descendants. The original Ebbett homestead was in Canning, not far from the Sunbury County Line.

Joseph E. Coy born Dec. 6, 1805 died Jan. 30, 1895 married 1845 to Harriet Whitehead born 1824 died May 1895. Children: Mary married William Jones, Margaret married Isaac Stephenson, Rebecca born Jan. 21, 1854 died Aug. 18, 1940, married Nov. 9, 1881 to John Hoben, Joseph married Fanny Harding, Franklin married Georgie Brooks, and Sarah married Judson Dykeman."

### FANJOY FAMILY UPDATE

To persons interested in the Fanjoy genealogy

This letter is to update you on my work on the family genealogy since issuing The Fanjoy Story in February 1985. It has been an interesting and, in some respects, a successful period regarding knowledge of the history of the Fanjoy family. The emphasis has been on researching the earlier history in the United States and Europe.

### Update on the earlier document

It is assumed in this letter that the reader is familiar with the contents of <u>The Fanjoy Story</u>. It was reproduced in issue 25 of <u>Generations</u> (September, 1985), the publication of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society, and was serialized in the <u>Kings County Record</u> during the spring of 1985.

Many letters and inquiries were received regarding the document. The positive response has been gratifying. No assumptions in the document have been proven invalid; some have been proven correct.

For a few of the records of the early family members, starting on page 8, more precise dates and other information have been gathered. One important change and one additional fact should be pointed out:

- On page 8 there is the record of Charles Fanjoy (IV), who was reputedly the father of Charles Alvin Fanjoy (84). That is probably not so. New evidence indicates that it is likely that Isaac and Sophia (Foster) Fanjoy (see page 9) were the parents of Charles Alvin. It is still probable that there was a Charles Fanjoy (IV), a son of William (III).
- On page 9 it is shown that Edward Albert Fanjoy (IV) had a second wife. Her name was Pamelia Davis (1842-1931).

#### Visit to Washington, D.C.

I visited the National Library of Congress in Washington, mainly searching Virginian records about the Revolutionary War, and for information about servants and convicts sent to that colony from Britain. Nothing new was found about William Fanjoy, the young man who had arrived in Virginia from London late in 1773 or early in 1774. However, a great deal was gathered about the colony, including the political, military, economic and social environment there in the 1700's.

Many of the records of that period have disappeared, and it may never be possible to determine where William lived. However, the main records of the state are in Richmond, and a search there may yield useful information. In July, 1775, William was a private in the 2nd Virginia Regiment of the Continental Line, fighting for separation from Britain. The decree on 17 July, 1775 that led to the creation of the regiment stated that a servant was not to be enrolled "unless he be an apprentice, ... nor any such apprentice, unless the consent of his master be first had in writing." Since he was enrolled, we can conclude that a document had been signed by his master authorizing it. Apparently, he must have been considered equivalent to an apprentice, a reasonable conclusion considering the legal and general standing of servants, as opposed to slaves, at the time.

On 7 November, 1775, British Governor John Dunmore of Virginia issued a proclamation that all indentured servants and slaves who took up arms for Britain would be freed. Transported convicts were considered in law as involuntary indentured servants. This ruling would have been tempting to young William Fanjoy, only two years into his seven year sentence. It clearly gave him an incentive to attempt to join the Loyalist side in a war that was gradually expanding, but one in which most current opinion held that Britain would win in the end.

At some point, William was able to make his way to the British side. We know, of course, that he joined the Pennsylvania Loyalist Regiment in Philadelphia in December, 1777. I am optimistic that, either in Virginia or London, there will be muster rolls or other records that will shed light on his movements during the period between 1775 and 1777.

I searched the limited records at the National Library of Congress regarding New York City and New Town, nearby on Long Island, but found nothing helpful. These were the places where William was in 1782 and 1783, before he, his wife and son travelled to Saint John.

### Visit to Boston

I did a limited search of the New York City material at the New England Historic Genealogical Society records in Boston. Nothing of interest was found. It would seem that one has to go to New York to access the extensive historical material on that city.

### Trip to Europe

My wife Nan and I were in Europe for seven weeks in the autumn of 1985, mainly on business. However, I was able to do some genealogy also. Before the trip, I had engaged genealogical researchers in London and Paris.

We were in Europe at the exact time of the 300th anniversary of the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes on 17 October, 1685. There were major commemorative events and special publications on the subject in England and France. The signing of the Revocation by Louis XIV culminated and legalized intolerance by the Catholic majority of French citizens toward the Protestant minority. The exodus of Huguenots from France, including the Fanjoux', peaked around this time.

#### Visit to London

I had hoped that the researcher would make a breakthrough on the Fanjoux/Fanjoy family in that city during the period 1685-1775. She did good work, but could not establish positively the link between William Fanjoy, the youthful convict, and William Fanjoux, the man who was probably his father. Nor could she establish any link from William Fanjoux back to the Fanjoux' who had come from France. The limited new information she found only strengthened the theory that they were directly related.

The Huguenot Society of Great Britain and Ireland has a major project underway to computerize and index many records not indexed now. Perhaps we will get important new information from that project.

I visited a major exhibition about the Huguenots, of which the Queen was Patron, and spent some time in the library of the Huguenot Society. Unfortunately, we could not be in London for the special Thanksgiving service for Huguenot descendents at St. Pauls Cathedral, conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

#### Visit to Paris

We received good data and clues on the Fanjoux family from the researcher. It was mainly vital statistics about the family in Tours in the 1600's. I visited the Archives Nationales in the Palais Soubise, and Nan and I visited the Bibliothèque de la Société d'histoire du Protestantisme Français (the Huguenot library). Some material was gathered, but much more time would have been necessary to research adequately the collections.

Président Mitterand of France participated in a moving ceremony at the UNESCO headquarters, attended by 2000 persons, which commemorated the tri-centenary. In his long speech about the political significance of the Revocation, he described the day as "a sad anniversary; one of the saddest of the long history (of France)."

I contacted Dr. Jacques Fanjoux, a cardiologist in Nevers. He sent me his family tree back to 1650; I have not been able to make any linkages to it. To his knowledge all Fanjoux' are, and have been, Catholic. He confirmed that the name is in danger of disappearing in France, so he was excited to know that the anglicized version is thriving in North America. He also confirmed that the name is derived from Fanum Jovis, as outlined in <a href="The Fanjoy Story">The Fanjoux</a> and one of his sisters have had their interest in their roots renewed by my work, and they could become important researchers on the subject.

### Visit to Tours

We spent a weekend in this beautiful small city in the chateau country southeast of Paris. It was quite moving to me to be in the city from which the Fanjoux' fled exactly 300 years previously. Nan and I attended service at the tiny Protestant church there.

By luck, I met a Huguenot amateur genealogist who knew her way around the local archives. She retrieved for me original records from 1633 and 1635. The earlier document was an agreement for a Mathieu Fanjoux to open an apothecary business in Tours. The latter was the marriage contract (seven pages of it) between him and Catherine Fleury. They were the parents of the Mathieu senior mentioned in The Fanjoy Story. It was very exciting.

### What do we know about the Fanjoux'?

To summarize, I now have many details of four generations of one Fanjoux' family in France, a Protestant family that had some of its youths in London by 1688. The five youths mentioned on page one of <a href="https://doi.org/li>
</a>. The Fanjoy Story were definitely brothers and sisters. They were all born in Tours in the 1660's. My theory still is that the William Fanjoy who came to America could be a great-grandson of Mathew, Paul or Jean.

I also have some information on a few branches of Dr. Fanjoux' family. Further, I have information, including the will, of an Antoine de Fanjeaux, a Protestant preacher in the late 1500's in Languedoc. It is not linked to anything else yet.

One fascinating story was of the arrest of the mother of the five young people who made it to London, Catherine (Thouvois) Fanjoux and other Huguenots in October, 1685 at St. Malo on the English Channel. They were trying to escape to England, which was against the law. The document states that she was the widow of the late Mathieu Fanjoux of Tours. She and the others were released the following February after renouncing Protestantism. It is not known whether she made her way to England later, or stayed in France.

The marriage contract of 1635 referred to Mathieu's parents, Jacques Fanjoux, a merchant, and Elizabeth Langlois. He was a merchant in Paray-le-Monial in Burgundy, a well-known Huguenot centre during this period, and a place where there were other Fanjoux'. Interestingly, the Catholic ancestors of Dr. Jacques Fanjoux were from the same area during the same period, which raises the possibility that one or more brothers changed religion in the period 1550-1600.

Apparently, the Fanjoux' were only in Tours during the 1633-1685 period. They were in the region around Paray from before that to the present day.

Two other new places of interest were identified. The village of St. Paul-Trois-Chateaux, near the east bank of the Rhone River 60 km north of Avignon, has an ancient wall around it. One of the gates through the wall is the portail Fanjoux. I have a photo of this original gate. St. Paul T.C. was a Roman town, and still contains remains of that period. About 46 kilometres north-west, on a hill in the village of Largentière, there was a Chateau Fanjaux (yes, "aux"), which had some prominence in the early 1200's. It was believed to have been built above a Roman temple of Jupiter. It is a hospital now, and no longer goes by that name. I hope to learn more about both places.

### A Reunion? A Book?

People ask when the next family reunion will be organized. I can't answer that now, but hope that one could be held within 3-5 years. By that time the pine tree planted during the first reunion, which is thriving, should be a noble sight. Of course, if anyone is interested in taking the lead for an event sooner, I would be happy to help.

People also ask me whether there will be a book regarding the family history. That cannot be answered yet either. I would like to gather all my material into a more substantial document than <a href="https://document-to.com/">The Fanioy Story</a>, but don't want to commit to that major task until the record is more extensive and complete. Perhaps some day.

The Huguenot Cross is derived from the Cross of Malta. The extremities of each branch are indented triangles, and balls terminate the points. It is quite like the Croix de l'Ordre du Saint-Esprit (the Holy Ghost) instituted by King Henry III in 1578.

The dove is a biblical symbol, often identified with the Holy Ghost. It is always represented on the cross as though it is flying to the earth from heaven.

The Huguenot Cross came into use officially in 1688 as the symbol of French Protestants.

An alternative cross has, instead of the dove, a hanging elongated ball, like a pestle. It was called a "trissou" in lange d'oc, the language of the people of Languedoc. This cross preceded the one with the dove, and is still in limited use.

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### Atlantic Canada and Genealogical Research

The specific roles of individuals, societies and professionals in the field of genealogical research were outlined by Terence M. Punch, in an address to the International Genealogical Warkshop, held at Fredericton in September. Mr Punch is a recognized authority on genealogy in the Atlantic Provinces.

Individuals, he said, must behave ethically, intelligently and co-operatively in genealogical endeavours; Societies must bring people together, elevate their sights and co-ordinate their projects. The role of the professional, Mr Punch stated, is to give leadership set example and publicize their developing discipline.

Some of these initiatives are already in place in the Maritimes, he said, but more people are needed to assume leadership and to contribute to helping the rest.

The upcoming publication of a "Genealogist's Handbook for Atlantic Canada Research" will represent, Mr Punch said, "another major step forward to reinforce the claim that the Maritimes often provide Canadian leadership in the field of family history".

#### WALTER MACFARLANE: CLAN CHIEP AND ANTIQUARY

No clan in the Scottish Highlands was more renowned for their prowess in the field than the NacFarlanes of Arrochar. Yet this fighting race took no part in the Jacobite risings, and the chiefly line produced three remarkable brothers: Walter MacFarlane, LL.D., record scholar and genealogist; William MacFarlane, M.D., P.R.C.P., who practised medicine in Edinburgh; and Alexander MacParlane, P.R.S., merchant and astronomer in Jamaica. They were all born at Invertoch (later called Arrochar House, and now The Cobbler's Hotel), in Dumbartonshire...

How they shunned the military traditions of the clan and sought knowledge is told in Walter MacFarlane: Clan Chief and Antiquary, published by Aberdeen & North-East Scotland Family History Society. The book (iv + 70 pp.) is largely about Walter MacFarlane, chief of the clan from 1709 to 1767. He is well-known as "the indefatigable collector of the ancient records of the country," yet almost nothing was known of his personal life when the author began his researches. Here, in this inexpensive work, Donald Whyte, Vice-President of the Scottish Genealogy Society, shows he was much more than a 'student' of ancient history. The MacFarlane chief emerges - not only as a patriot - but as an agricultural improver, who sought to restore his 30,000 acre estate to greatness, and to built Arrochar's first church. Unfortunately, he married late in life and left no heir; the chiefship and estate passing to his brother, Dr William, who sold Arrochar in 1784, after being in the family for five and a half centuries.

Those who lament the paucity of records for studies of this nature will find much to interest them in the author's historical notes and extensive references. There is moreover, an Appendix of original papers and a listing of MacFarlane's Collections.

## BOOK REVIEW

The Scots Overseas, A Selected Bibliography by Donald Whyte, published 1988 by the Federation of Family History Societies, The Benson Room, Birmingham and Midland Institute, Margaret Street, Birmingham B3 3BS England.

This publication results from many years of historical and genealogical research by Scotland's preeminent genealogist. And it reflects Mr. Whyte's outstanding grasp of things Scottish in Canada and other countries.

About 800 titles are listed including about 250 relating to Canada. The titles include books, pamphlets and journal articles which, to quote the author, illustrate "literary, administrative and social history of countries as diverse as Africa and Japan, Russia and Australia, or India and Canada". And the significance of the Scots-Irish is not forgotten and an Appendix of titles about them is included.

Mr. Whyte has provided us with an invaluable companion to his monumental book, A Dictionary of Scottish Emigrants to Canada before Confederation published in 1986 by the Ontario Genealogical Society. His bibliography should be on the library shelves of anyone interested in Scottish history, emigration, or genealogy. It is available from the publisher for 1 pound 50 pence plus postage charges of 60 pence airmail or 44 pence surface mail.

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

# Benjamin Bonnell, the Loyalist


