



The Regans of Semiwagan Ridge

The Regan history on Semiwagan Ridge begins with, Cornelius and Ellen Regan Irish immigrants, who, according to the I85I census (Parish of Nelson) arrived in the "Colony" of New Brunswick in the year I830. They likely settled in Semiwagan a year or two after that date. In I85I Cornelius Regan was farming, and he and his wife were raising their children in a log home. There was no information passed down on them, so little more can be said. There's a headstone in St. Michael's cemetery, Chatham, with their names on it, and two of their children. As to where they came from in Ireland, the Mizen Peninsula Co. Cork is a possible location.

Church and census records tell us that, Cornelius and Ellen had, at least, IO children and were, Cornelius, Mary, Catherine, Margaret, Charles, Jeremiah, Eleanor, James, David and Johanna. Like their parents little is known on them. Cornelius Jr. is believed to have married a Honora Donovan, and moved to Newcastle, Miramichi. Charles and James stayed On in Semiwagan to raise families of their own. Charles married Bridget Foley, James married Ellen Casey. David inherited his fathers house, but died at the early age of 26, Johanna also died young at age 22. As for Mary, Catherine, Margaret, Jeremiah and Eleanor, it is not known what happened to them.

The old Regan house in Semiwagan Ridge still stands. In 1877

James Regan acquired ownership of it, after the death of his brother

David, in Nov. 1876. James made renovations to the house sometime

after he moved in, he expanded the upstairs with a cottage roof.

This house was passed on to his son James (Jimmy). A veteran of the

first world war, James Jr. was the last Regan to occupy the home, he

was unmarried and living alone at the time of his death, in March 1950.

Several years after, the property was sold. It is now owned by the

McAuley family.

The old homestead may be in different hands now, but Regans have stayed on in Semiwagan Ridge, of the family names found there today, it is the most common, hopefully its place there will be secure for many years to come.

The Amazing Dr. Tumblety

Travelling Quacks selling quick cures to an unsuspecting public was a phenomena of North America to which the community of Saint John was equally vulnerable. In the year 1860, such medicines as Kidder's Rheumatic and Bone Liniment, carried by many respectable establish-ments of Saint John, was unabashedly advertised as a cure for Rheumatism and similar complaints. Undoubtedly, physicians of the day abhorred the abuses committed by self appointed claimants to their profession, but had to contend with an unregulated society.

About the first week of July, 1860, Dr. Francis Tumblety (alias J.H. Blackburn) arrived in Saint John. He immediately lodged at S.B. Estey's American House. In late August he engaged William Hamilton as clerk.

On July 3rd, 1860, an advertisement in the Morning Freeman announced the arrival of Dr. Tumblety.

The Indian Herb Doctor from Canada has arrived and may be consulted free of charge at his Rooms in the American House, King Street. The Doctor will describe disease and tell his patients the Nature of their Complaints or Illness without receiving any Information from them.

Dr. Tumblety attracted the reader's notice with such advertisement headlines as **Given Up By All Doctors** and **Pulmonary Consumption Cured In Last Stage**. His miracle treatment with herbs was expounded in the Morning Freeman July 26th, 1860:

Our Motto

We use such Balms as have no strife With Nature or the Laws of Life; With blood our hands we never stain Nor Poison men to ease their pain.

Our Father - whom all goodness fills Provides the means to cure all ills; The simple Herbs beneath our feet Well used, relieve our pains complete A simple Herb, a simple Flower, Culled from the dewy lea These, these shall speak with touching power Of change and health to thee.

F. Tumblety, M.D.

From July 3rd to September 1st, 1860, the Morning Freeman carried advertisements containing testimonials to the success of Dr. Tumblety's treatment. An example was the testimony purportedly written by Thomas W. Robinson, the son of James Robinson of Union Street, Saint John dated August 25th.

Dr. Tumblety - Dear Sir:

For upwards of two years, I have been troubled with a bad cough, night sweats, debility, emaciation, etc. I got so bad that I at times raised large quantities of matter mixed with blood. This frightened me for I thought I had a short time to live. Night after night I used to sweat so that when I came under your treatment I was little better than a withered bud. I have had no distress from my cough since I commenced using your medicine; in five weeks I was completely restored. I have gained upwards of ten pounds of flesh and I am still on the gain.

Advertisements in the Morning Freeman carried other optimistic, if not incredible, testimonies. John F. Toland, 33 King St. and Miss A. Levin, Hazen St. opposite Fleming & Humbert's Foundry were cured of consumption. A son of R. Laskey, Esq., Block Maker, Peter's Wharf had his hearing restored under Dr. Tumblety's treatment. One Peter Hart testified that he was cured of blindness. Others who bore testimonies of recovery for a variety of ailments included Josiah Adams, Carleton; Timothy McCarthy, 45 Water St.; W. McLaughlin, Esq., Indiantown; Capt. S.C. Stevens of steamer "Lion", Indiantown; Francis McEveney, 92 Charlotte St.: Alexander Johnston. Brunswick Oil Works (Inflammation of the Liver); Skiffington, James resided Suspension Bridge (cured of Dypepsia); Mary Carroll, Tower Hill, Carleton; James Cameron, Portland Bridge St.; Peter McLaughlen, employed by R. Rankin & Co.; John Harding, American House; P. Douglas Jr., son of Peter Douglas, Gardener at Lunatic Asylum, Saint John; B. Gillis, Stackhouse & McLaughlin Shipyard; John Dennis, Butcher, Prince William St.; James O'Brien, Harris & Allan's Foundry.

The wondrous testimonials published in the local papers were of particular interest to James Portmore, a joiner by trade, who for the past ten or twelve years had been suffering from disease of the kidneys and gravel.

At age six, James had emigrated in 1807 from Derbyshire, England with his parents, William and Esther Portmore. His father died December 12th, 1853 at age 82 and was buried in the Old Wesleyan Burial Ground on Thorne Ave. James Portmore, born May 4th, 1801 was one of six children, his siblings being Charlotte (Mrs William Magee); Margaret (Mrs. John Pettingell); William Frederick (married Mary Peck); Esther and Harriet (Mrs. Thomas Paul)

In 1847, during the massive Irish immigration to the Port of Saint John, James Portmore was contracted to build a pest house on Partridge Island. Yet so great were the deaths, that the board meant for the pest house was used instead to build coffins. James Portmore married Mary Buchanan. No children are known to have been born to the couple, although an adopted child, John Calhoun died December 12th, 1846 at age 22.

Lately, James had felt of sufficient health to attend to his work as a carpenter. Induced by Dr. Tumblety's advertisements, he purchased two phials which he brought to his home on Sheffield St.

He took a teaspoon of this in water three times a day. When first he took it he cried out that 'that would burn the heart out of a man.' He continued, however, to take it for nine or ten days regularly. He always complained of the same burning sensation in the stomach after taking it, and he lost his appetite which was previously good. On the 17th, he went to Dr. Tumblety again, and brought another bottle of medicine which looked like the former, and which he took in the same way. After he used this, he vomited and grew so sick that he had to take to his bed. He could then eat nothing.

She went for Dr. Tumblety to see him, and when he came to the house, she charged him with having killed her husband by the medicine he had given him. She pointed to the bottles on the table, and said the medicine was there, and she meant to show it to the doctors. He said very well, and took up a bottle

and smelled it, and then put it down again. He told her to apply hot water fomentations over her husband's kidney's, and she did so. He then went away. promising to send a balsam at 4 o'clock to settle his stomach, and immediately after he was gone she missed the bottles.

When Dr. Tumblety did not return, Dr. Humphreys was called in. He found Mr. Portmore as suffering from a pain in the stomach which he diagnosed as acute inflammation of the stomach. James Portmore died September 15th, 1860. On Friday at 4 o'clock a funeral service was held at his house on Sheffield Street near the Sunday School House. His remains were interred in the Old Wesleyan Burial Ground, Thorne Ave. where a monument to his memory stands today.

At the written request of the Mayor (who had visited Mrs. Portmore) the Coroner held an inquiry Thursday afternoon at the house of the deceased. Dr. Tumblety, who was present at the examinations, questioned Mrs. Portmore. Dr. Humphreys and Dr. Botsford, who visited Mr. Portmore a few hours before his death, testified that in this instance, they were satisfied the inflammation was caused by an acid or irritant introduced to the stomach.

On Thursday night, Dr. Tumblety mounted his white horse. His clerk, William Hamilton, last saw him between 10 and 11 o'clock on the St. Andrews Road beyond the Suspension Bridge on his way to Calais Maine. Following the testimonies of S.B. Estey and William Hamilton, the Jury returned a verdict of Manslaughter against Dr. Tumblety.

On October 2nd, 1860 the Morning Freeman contained the following curious advertisement:

I have received notice of the result of the Coroner's Inquest. I shall return when my business here is finished, earlier if the Authorities desire. I am innocent and anyone charging me with the offence is a liar and a scoundrel. F. Tumblety, M.D., Calais, 1st Oct.

On October 16, 1860, the Morning Freeman reported that it had received a copy of the Eastport Sentinel which they were

requested to publish. The editors of the Saint John paper were suspicious that Dr. Tumblety, himself, was the author of the article.

... One Mr. Portmore died. He had been an invalid for many years. The doctors, after draining his pocket, had declared him incurable. He had called on Dr. Tumblety who told him that he could not be cured, but that he would somewhat relieve his case. The medicine was given (a decoction of parsley tea) Mr. Portmore stated to sundry persons that the medicine did him good. The following persons have stated that in their presence

Mr. Portmore declared Dr. Tumblety's medicine relieved him: Mr. McSorley, Mr. Esty of the American House, The Editor of the New Brunswicker of St. John, Mr. Isaiah Grendle of this place. One of the Faculty, hearing of the case, had an interview with Portmore, advised him to abandon the parsley tea, and take his medicine. Portmore took the advice and the medicine and died. Here was a case. The ingenuity of the doctors was employed to use it against their rival. Dr. Tumblety was absent from the city on professional business.

The above article revered Dr. Tumblety. Dr. Tumblety had triumphed. The rush of the afflicted to his rooms was greater than ever. Having publicly decried the Coroner's Jury as liars and scoundrels and having uncomplimentary addressed the Saint John doctors, it is not surprising that Dr. Tumblety never returned to face the charge of Manslaughter.

During the following five years, while the American Civil War raged to South, newspaper exchanges continued to bring word of the amazing Dr. Tumblety. On October 16th, 1861, Dr. Francis Tumblety's advertisement in the American And Commercial Advertiser was copied by the Morning News of Saint John. The doctor had established himself at 220 West Baltimore St., New York and was announcing his intention to leave for the West. Canadian references contained in the ad included the Governor of Canada, Mayors of Toronto, Montreal, Hamilton, Brantford, London and Quebec as well as other Canadian and American prominent men.

On November 27th, 1861, the Morning News contained another incredible account:

The <u>Buffalo Express</u> of Friday morning -From an officer of the Potomac Army, whom we met yesterday, we derive the astounding information that the notorious Dr. Tumblety who cut so memorable a figure in our city a few years ago, actually holds the position of Senior Surgeon on the staff of General McClellan.

Yet, still more astounding were the reports which appeared in the Saint John Morning News and St. Andrews Standard both newspapers bearing same date of May 10th, 1865. These newspapers reported that Harrold, the associate of John Wilkes Booth (who assassinated President Abraham Lincoln) was Dr. Tumblety's agent. The Morning News announced that Dr. Tumblety, charged with complicity with Harrold in the Assassination and Conspiracy, was arrested at St. Louis, Mo. in accordance with orders from the Federal War Dept. The St. Andrews Standard simply reports that the doctor suddenly disappeared from Brooklyn.

The <u>St. John Globe</u> of December 27th, 1865 furnished our final notice of Dr. Tumblety.

From New York <u>Sunday Mercury</u> - We are honoured with a visit from the celebrated Indian Doctor last evening, who is once more going about curing diseases with the most magical success, and threatening to send all the undertakers, sextons and grave diggers to the almshouse. He carried in his hand a bunch of fragrant herbs, which, if introduced into the catacombs of Egypt, would set all the mummies on their legs, as lively as before they were wrapped in their cerements. Of course he came off with flying colors, his loyalty being as genuine as his medicine ... He believes the authorities were instigated to arrest him by the proprietors of Greenwood Cemetery [New York] who found that, after he located himself in Brooklyn, the sight of a hearse in that city was as rare as the approach of a comet

SOME CEMETERIES OF SAINT JOHN CITY, NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA

Recent publications by local authors are uncovering a wealth of genealogical data transcribed from old tombstones within the present city limits. The oldest surviving burial ground in the City is known today as the Loyalist Burial Ground. It was originally administered by the Trinity Church Corporation. In the 1950's, a mapping of this cemetery was completed using the standing gravestones as reference points. The Centennial Souvenir published in 1883 included epitaph inscriptions taken at that time. This rare book, long out of print, is a treasured item among genealogist and collectors alike. It was the discovery of a list of burials dating back to 1839, that led Graeme Somerville to publish Some Burial Records of the Loyalist Burial Ground, Saint John, N.B. Mr. Somerville also conveniently included the monumental inscriptions which were included the Centennial Souvenir thereby condensing both epitaphs and burial records into one book.

With the closure of the Old Loyalist Burial Ground, Trinity Church Corporation purchased property on the east side of Courtenay Bay near the Marsh Bridge. It is fortunate that both the list of burials and a plan of the place of burials still exist. In 1901, D.R. Jack, a noted Saint John historian visited the cemetery and recorded epitaphs from number of the stones. The following year he returned with Jonas Howe and continued this work. In 1907, a another well known historian, James Hannay, again visited the Old Church of England Cemetery. In 1988, Daniel F. Johnson published the complete epitaphs of the cemetery (including the works of Hannay and Jack) in This cemetery was sold to the City. Following a tragic accident, the Beautification Committee restored the Cemetery, but in the process most stones were placed in circular lots and not returned to their original place. Consequently the burial plans are essential in locating specific places of burial.

The 6,766 recorded burials and associated plans of the cemetery were carefully extracted and compiled by the late Lennox W. Bagnell. The resulting publication The Burial Records of the Church of England Cemetery, Saint John, N.B. stands out as one of the most important genealogical works undertaken in New Brunswick.

EARLIER DAYS IN ALBERT COUNTY (N.B.)

David Christopher, a member of the Southeastern Branch, NBGS, recently came across an 1890 letter published in the Maple Leaf newspaper. Rhw Maple Leaf was published in Albert County during the 1880's, 1890's and early 1900's.

The letter follows:

REMINISCENCES

HARVEY CORNER OR PASSMORE'S OVER 60 YEARS AGO

Interesting Incidents connected with the Settlement and its Inhabitants.

To the Editor of the Maple Leaf:

Dear Sir: Being somewhat at leisure thinking of old times and looking back to the years of 1825 to 1830 I thought I would write the history of Harvey, New Horton and Rocher at the time which might be interesting to some of my old associates, as well as the younger people.

We will start from Passmore's now Harvey Corner and go up the hill, (then all woods) to the gate that opened to the path leading to the house of grandfather Bray by the shore. I suppose it may be interesting to the young generation to know the names of families, as I proceed with my letter, Gideon, Benjamin, Patty and Olive, completes this family. We will now return to the highway, onward a few rods was the well known Baptist meeting house, merely boarded and shingled with rough boards for seats, used only in warm weather, no fireplace or stove. we move on until we come to the John Smith farm and residence about one hundred rods to the left, his children by his first wife, Jane, Nathaniel, John, William, and Robert, his second wife a Mrs. Reed, her children Granville, Joseph and Susan, their children by second marriage Gilford, Gilbert, and Eliza, making a very large and happy family. Mr Smith was a very successful farmer, was also in the lumbering business having a saw-mill at Locher Lake. He was the only magistrate south of Shepody River and a gentleman of high standing in that part of the country.

The next farm was owned by David Oliver who soon after moved Next on the Rocher, (comments later). right Stevens, on the late John Reed farm, his children John, Then down to the left was the widow Reed's home and Ann. holder and fortnightly post-office. Her children were Dunkin, Gideon, John and Ruxby, late Mrs. William West. Next by the mills lived Dunkin, his children William, James Ralph and Susan. The saw and grist mills were the only ones south of the Shepody River in 1826. The old saw-mill would saw about 6 to 8 per day, finally she was new geared and would keep two or three men People came from all quarters to see the improvement. Over the brook, by the noted old willow-tree, was Jas. Turnbull's house, his wife Sarah, daughter of Squire Reed a loyalist to the Crown who at the time of the Revolutionary war with others, moved from Conn. to Horton, N.S. from there to New Horton. He was a manufacturer of shoe and knee buckles which were the fashion in King George's time. He had two sons Benjamin and James, also two daughters Sarah and Betsy. The family of Mr. Turnbull was Rufus Reed, Louis Hunt J.S. Dodge and Jerusha Copp, (having no children of their own).

Next farm above lived Rev. Nathan Cleveland preacher of the Baptist faith for a good many years, a very conscientious On the same farm lived Samuel Sloan, wife and one honest man. Next farm above Mrs. Betsy Copp. son, Joseph. Her child by first husband was William Peck, by second husband, Eliza, Mary, Jerusha, David and Lucy. On the next above lived Samuel West, his children were Mary Ann, Rebecca, Jane, William and Allen a good industrous family. On the next farm lived William Reed, who married the widow of James Reed, she having one son the late William J. Reed. Her children by the last husband were Edwin and Chipman, Alfred Hunt was on of their family. Mr. Reed was a farmer and ornamental stone-cutter, a very good and industrous citizen. Adjoining was David Akerly's farm, his children David, Zillah, Betsy, Sally, Eleanor and Asael, Asael was killed by the limb of a tree falling on him. Next Gilbert Forsythe, children Jane and James.

The next building was the school-house, which the boys will remember by the birch rod, (no matter boys we had good times then). Our first school teacher was Levi Wells, next Thomas Cochran, (drunk part of the time in school), next Giles Smith, next William Smith, (rum again). It might be interesting to some of the boys to have the roll called. Here it is: Charles and Joseph Goff, Rueben and William Wilbur, Mary Ann, Jane, William and James Ferguson, William, Hannah, Sarah, Laura, John and Mariner Cannon. Betsy, Obediah, Levi and Ruth Wilbur. Sarah Forsythe Kinnie, Alfred and Aldia Hunt, Asael and Eleanor Akerley, Ephraim Bennett, Betsy Cannon, William J. Reed, Edwin Reed, Jane and Allen West, Mary, Jerusha and David Copp, Alexander Brewster, William D. and James Ralph Reed, John and Edward Stevens, J. S. Dodge, George, William and Elisha Oliver.

The next was the Hunt farm occupied by Benjamin Bray children Allen, Austen, and Ann. Later this farm was owned by Abial Peck. Next farm Grandfather Forsythe, family, Gilbert, John, Harding, Caleb, Sarah Forsythe Kinnie grand daugher. Half mile further down the road David Wilbur his children Mary Ann, Watie, Obediah, Levi, and Ruth. Next Otis Cannon, children William, Hannah, Sarah, Laura, John and Mariner. Next William Ferguson, family William, Mary Ann, Jane and James. Next Benjamin Wilbur, John and Reuben (brother) also Joseph. Next farm grandfather Goffs, very old people, David Goff Jr. his children Charles and Joseph. One mile down the right road were Isaac Elliott, sons, Smith, George and Isaiah, close by in the woods James Taylor, children, Jane and William.

down to Rocher Head lived Daniel Copp and wife no Away We will now take a run over the beach. First house children. and family. Charles Anderson Next grandmother Anderson. children, Charles, William, Aaron, Rebecca, Nancy, Nelson and Olive. Next Charles Cannon, wife and daughter Betsey. Here the road ends, and we will now return up back of the beach. first house and farm was owned by Samuel Copp, his children, Obediah, Delila, Chandler and Jonathan. Next was John Copp, wife and daughter Mary, next James Copp and wife. Further along by the little brook lived Convers Richardson of Vermont, he had two sons, also his brother Timothy lived with him. He run a saw mill and farmed. Next was William Anderson, farmer. Next David his children, George, William and John, perished on Nantasket beach with shipmates John Elliott and a Mr. DeWolf. also had two other sons and one daughter, Elisha, Bartlett Mary, his business was farming and lumbering, a very industrious man. We will now start from Harvey Corner down the bank road, after passing through the woods we arrive at Thomas Stevens home, on the right his sons, Aaron, Elisha and daughters. Next the widow Brewster, children, Luke, Hannah, Joseph and John. farm Ezra Bishop, boys, Joseph and Harding. Opposite, lived Capt. Newton Wells, children, Newton, James and two daughters. Down by the river we find Capt. Isaac Turner, his children, Elizabeth, William and John. Capt. Turner was heavily engaged in the lumber business at Rocher, also running a large store at the Bank. A very enterprising gentleman. Next over the little brook we find Capt. Hiram Edgett ship building and trading, his sons Next grandfather Bishop, sons, Ezra, Timothy, Hiram and Edward. Joshua, William, Ann and Thomas. Then over the horn Elijah West, in the woods. Next lived Thomas Brewster, children, Edward, John and Margaret. On the point or hill lived George Turner, one son Henry Alewis. Half a mile further lived Aaron Stevens farming and tending fish weirs. We will now return once more to Harvey Corner. On the corner stood Mr. Passmore's blacksmith shop and to the west, on the bank of the mill-pond, stood his house. children were James, Joel, and two daughters. Over the the left lived the widow Stevens, sons, Edward, Nehemiah and Rebecca.

Opposite lived Jonathan Robinson, his children were, Nelson, Joseph, Leve, William, Ann and Lucinda, farmers and Innholders. Next up the hill was Aaron Stevens, school teacher, children, John, Mary, Jonathan and Axie. On the next farm lived Nathan Bennett, children, Josiah, Robert and Katy. Next John Bennett, his children, Sutherland, Rachel, Sarah, Eliza, Elias, Johial, John, Mary Jane, Joshua and Caleb. farm George Bennett, farming and store keeping, his sister Mary Ann kept house for him. At the bottom of the hill was Hiram Stevens, his children, Harding and others. Collins Christopher, children, Charles and Mary Ann. On the farm Nathaniel Lock one child, late Mrs. Pulsifer of Salmon River. On the corner as you go to the bridge, lived Council Turner, an industrious farmer and one son John. We now turn to the left, and on the left lived Deacon Joseph Turner, children, the late Elisha P. Allen, and two One mile further lived grand father Tingley, his children, William, Daniel, Josiah, Charles, Thomas, Agreen, David Daniel Jr., lived on the corner by the lane, Abigail. children, Josiah, and others whose names I forget. The Tingley's were heavily engaged in the lumbering business also farmers. William Tingley lived one mile up the lake.

With very few exceptions the above record includes all the inhabitants, except children under five years of age. principle business of the people say from 1825 to 1828 was living principally amongst themselves. The women farming, carded, spun and wove pretty much all their clothing. Almost every farmer had a spinning wheel and loom in the house. were caught in weirs on New Horton flats. Cod were caught back the Island by stakes with cords attached driven into the Almost all farmers wore shank moccasins. Boots little known at that time. James Turnbull owned the first American plough, and the first iron shod ox-sled also the first American hand hay rake. Old Uncle John Bennett said that if the sled run so much easier down hill it must run so much harder Mostly all sythe-snaths were made from crooked trees. Rakes were made from saplings and heavy enough for a man without raking hay. In fact all tools were what were carry, in haying time thought homemade. The farmers called impossible to get their haying done without rum. ministers took their glass before going to the pulpit, or rickety platform. Quilting parties were quite popular, and sitting down to a good cup of tea was the delight of the old ladies and suppose always will be. Our holidays were general muster, and election day amusements for small boys was playing ball, larger ones took to horse racing and others to rum and fighting. The boys usually went to Rocher when they wanted to dance and have a good time.

KEEP PICTURES AND RECORDS ON TAPE

By Frank W. Bouley (C.S.G. #4776) September 1987

I have been using an Apple II+ for seven years now and have files, biographies, and charts on over 1700 ancestors. Answers to queries are a snap; I just tell the computer to print it out while I have a cup of coffee. And for organizing and editing my material, there is no better method.

There is one drawback, however, and that is that I can not enter my large collection of pictures and photo copies of vital records. When digital processing gets a little better, I suppose that will solve the problem. I must wait and see.

This summer my wife and I went on a five week camping tour of the United States and purchased a Vidcam so we could have a video record of the trip. I managed to buy one with a very good Macro Lens for close up work. While visiting my brother on the West Coast I noticed that he had an old tin type of my grandmother and her siblings when they were The photo was faded and only about three inches square. It was not easy to make out details. Needless to say, that is a picture my brother would not part with, so I tried an experiment. I mounted the picture on an easel and then took a tight closeup with the Vidcam, describing who the people were at the same time. When I played the tape back on my brother's VCR, using his 25" TV, I was delighted at the result. There was the tin type, as large as the TV screen, and so clear that the people looked like they were about to come to life any second. I was able to see details that I had not noticed on the original.

Since arriving back home I have recorded my collection of pictures with marvelous results. I give a running verbal dialogue, describing everything about the picture while it is showing. I also record birth and death certificates and any other vital papers. If focused properly, the printing comes on my TV screen clearly and very easy to read.

When all the material is recorded, I play it back, keeping an index of the foot markers on the tape so that I may forward to any picture or record I desire. I can make copies of this tape and send them to relatives who do not have these pcitures.

If you don't have a Vidcam, get one. It will become the right hand of the computer. You can take it to cemeteries and tape gravestones or family functions for a taped record of the meeting. One thing is important; make sure that any Vidcam you purchase has a good Macro Lens for close up work.

Although, like most of us, I am hoping to publish my family history, I am now thinking about making a taped version with pictures, charts, and even computer graphics for illustration. I will write a script and describe everything that is showing on the screen including little biographies.

Isn't technology wonderful!!!

AHNENTAFEL NUMBERING SYSTEM

Ref: Roots III computer program for genealogy.

Ahnentafel is a German word meaning Ancestor Table.


The Ahnentafel number at the beginning of each generation is equal to the number of individuals in that generation. For example, the fourth generation in the chart starts at number 16 and 16 members.

Of all the Ahnentafel numbers in any one generation, the first half of the numbers are on the father's side and second half are on the mother's. For example, in the fourth generation on the sample chart, numbers 16-23 are on your father's side and 24-31 are on your mother's.

All odd numbers are female and all even numbers are male.

Multiply any Ahnentafel number by 2 and you get the number of that person's father. Add one to that number and you get the same person's mother.

Spouses are consecutive-number pairs with the husband the lower of the two numbers.

GRAVESTONE RUBBING IN COLOR by Charles E. Alford, 491 Haskell Place, Delmar, NY 12054 (518) 439-4526

Materials Required
Tube of artist's oil based paint (suggest purple, rust or dark brown)
Tissue paper, about 24" by 28" (type used for gift wrapping-inside box)
Masking tape 3/4" - 1/2" wide
Used nylon stocking (no runs in foot or lower leg portion)
Piece of raw wood about 10" by 10" by 1/4" (wood must not be painted or treated)
Scissors
Elmer's glue
Foster board about 24" by 28"
Section of newspaper folded in half

Procedure

1. Remove all grass, vines and any protruding bumps from the area to be sure that nothing will pierce the tissue paper which would cause the paint pigment to get on the gravestone.

2. Tape thin plastic such as that used by dry cleaners to cover clean over area to be rubbed. This will protect the stone should pigment


penetrate the tissue paper.

3. Take a single sheet of tissue paper and hold it to the light to be sure that there are no holes in it. Put this paper against the area to be rubbed, wrap it around the edges of the gravestone where possible. Using small pieces of masking tape, attach the paper over the area to be rubbed. The paper must be tight and free of wrinkles. Don't put the tape on any of the area to be rubbed as it can't be removed without tearing the paper, use the outside area instead.

4. Cut a nylon stocking about 5" above the heel. Roll the upper section of the stocking into a small tight ball and place it inside the heel. Tie a tight double knot using toe portion and lower leg section with the heel portion in the middle. Put about a pea size portion of the artist's paint from the tube on to a corner of the board. Dab the ball of the stocking into the paint and rub it out in an area of about 6" diameter. (The raw wood absorbs the oil from the paint leaving mostly just the pigment.) Make sure the pigment is worked in well or you will get blotches on the rubbing. Rub the ball gently over the tissue paper. If you rub too hard the ball will push into the void areas and you will lose detail and may tear the tissue. If the tissue paper is torn, start over. Go over the entire area first and then go back over to darken and get a uniform color. Redab the ball in the paint and and work it out on the board as needed. tinue rubbing until the depth of color is obtained. The darker the color the better the contrast. Remove the tissue from the stone by tearing the masking tape from the tissue. Don't let the masking tape get against the rubbed area as it can't be removed. The rubbing is now nearly dry and can be rolled loosely for transporting. the paint on the board is wet and stains anything it touches.

- 5. Trim the tissue paper leaving about 1/4" 1/2" border and glue to the poster board as follows: Center the rubbing, face up on the poster board. Bring the bottom half up to the half, folding with a light crease in the middle. Put as section of a newspaper folded in half inside the folded rubbing. Run a thin bead of Elmer's glue across the folded rubbing about 1" below the fold. Using the newspaper push the paper so that the glued area is against the poster board.
- 6. Move the newspaper over the glued area and rub toward the top of the poster board. Now fold back the tissue to just above the glue and apply another bead of glue and repeat the process until the upper portion of the tissue is glued to the poster. Now turn the poster board around and worling out from the middle to the edge. The tissue should noe be free from wrinkles. Trim the poster board as desired.
- 7. Mount in a glass covered frame for best preservation.

On October 4, 1880, the County Clerk of Humboldt County, California prepared a list of all persons who received their naturalization papers and were residing in that County. It listed the name, age, occupation and date of naturalization. These naturalization papers were issued by the Superior Court of Humboldt County unless otherwise noted.

GENEALOGICAL RESOURCES IN ENGLISH REPOSITORIES

This volume provides genealogists and family historians with the location of manuscript records, microfilm copies and transcriptions of documents, and printed resources in the 175 key record offices and libraries in England.

Not only will researchers worldwide have the opportunity to correspond directly with a repository regarding specific classes of records, but they will also be able to find microform or printed copies of some resources in nearby libraries in their own countries.

Two lists of resources are given for most repositories. One includes those items which will identify an individual with a specific location. The second list includes classes of records and printed materials with information that may provide vital data and/or prove family relationships. In all, there are approximately one hundred different resources enumerated.

Additional information for each county includes changes in the geographical boundaries and administrative jurisdictions since 1888, maps of the pre-1974 counties, post-1974 counties and the post-1965 London Boroughs which indicate the location of specific record offices and libraries. Names and addresses of city and county libraries with resources not available in record offices are also given. The location of LDS Family History Centers (formerly called Branch Genealogical Libraries), and the addresses of Family History Societies located within each county, complete the list.

For the convenience of readers, repositories have been categorized into three groups. Included in the Greater London section are those which contain genealogical resources for more than one county in England, or represent a special segment of the population. Repositories located in counties other than Greater London are grouped together in a second section, while libraries in the thirty-two London Boroughs constitute the third section.

CLANS OF IRELAND

A Clans of Ireland Office, to help organize gatherings of the 243 Irish Clan names, and to be the centre for a new Irish Clans' Association, is to be set up in Dublin.

Plans for the office, which will receive the support of Bord Failte, (The Irish Tourist Board) were announced Monday, 6 November, by Mr. Matt McNulty, Deputy Director General - Bord Failte, at a reception in the Genealogical Office, Kildare Street, where the new Clans office will be housed. The reception was attended by Chieftains or Representatives of 20 Irish Clans already organized, who will form the nucleus of the new Clans' Association. Mr. McNulty said the idea of organising the Irish Clans in a coordinated way and forming a Clans' Association was initiated by Rory O'Connor, a television journalist, who is also a chieftain of the O'Connor Kerry Clan.

Mr. McNulty said the objective was to organise as many new clans as possible in the next year or so and then to involve the Irish abroad, particularly those in the United States, Australia, Canada and New Zealand. An organiser is to visit the various countries in a major organising and promotional drive through the media with the Irish organisations abroad.

Mr. McNulty said that 14 Irish Clans had already decided to hold rallies next year, and this information was being circulated at home and abroad in a special Bord Failte Clans' Rally brochure. He said the organisation of the Clans complemented the setting up of 30 heritage centres throughout Ireland, to help Irish people, particularly emigrant Irish and their descendents, to find their roots. A major computerised system of all available family records, was also going ahead, and would be completed in the next three years.

The O'Connor Kerry Chieftain, Rory O'Connor, said a publicity drive two months ago in the provincial and national press and radio had brought a remarkable response. Representatives of 70 further clans had expressed a wish to organise and he had sent them his comprehensive plan for organising a Clan and a history of their own name from Edward MacLysaght's Irish Families. It was intended, he said, that all this organisation would culminate in an international rally for all the Clans of Ireland on the Hill of Tara in 1992.

Mr. O'Connor asked all organised clans to write to the Clans' Office so that a Clans register could be started. He also urged other people still thinking of organising their Clans to write for any advice or help they might require.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES MICROFILM RENTAL PROGRAM PREPARES FOR RELEASE OF 1920 CENSUS

(Washington, D.C.) On March 2, 1992, the National Archives will make the 1920 census microfilm available to the public for the first time. And, the National Archives Microfilm Rental Program will rent copies made from the original silver masters.

"We're excited about the release of the 1920 census," said Rita Hope Counts, President of Professional Mail and Distribution Services, Inc. (PMDS), the company now fulfilling the Microfilm Rental Program contract for the National Archives. "In fact, we expect such a great demand for the census microfilm, we're taking advance rental orders starting September 1, 1991, so we can have them processed and ready to go as soon as we get the microfilm in March."

The National Archives awarded PMDS the Microfilm Rental Program contract in September 1989, and PMDS plans to uphold the same level of service the program has provided since 1983. Under PMDS, the program will continue to be the only microfilm rental program to offer microfilm copied directly from the National Archives silver masters.

"Because of this," said a National Archives spokesperson, "the quality of film PMDS provides cannot be matched by any other rental program."

This microfilm can be ordered directly by individuals or through more than 6,000 local libraries across the country. The rental rates are \$3 per roll for orders of 1-4 rolls; \$2.50 per roll when 5-9 rolls are ordered; and \$2 per roll for orders of 10 or more rolls. The postage and handling fee of \$3 is waived for orders of 4 or more rolls.

To assist first-time users, the Microfilm Rental Program offers a Start-up Kit for \$20. Included in the Start-Up Kit are the complete set of catalogs required for census and Revolutionary War research, order forms for ship passenger arrival and veterans records, research guides, coupons for free rental of two rolls of microfilm, additional catalogs that list available genealogical publications, and a Rental Program membership card.

The membership is a lifetime one, entitling the member to a 10% discount on a selection of National Archives and other genealogical publications.

Two new books offer history of northern Maine

A book review from the Bangor Daily News, 25 Nov. 1989.

This has been a year of books dealing with Maine people and towns, and all reveal a richness of genealogical background, as well as early settlement history.

Two such volumes have sprung from Northern Maine. "The County: Land of Promise, a Pictorial History of Aroostook County" published in honor of it's sesquecentennial, and a second, "The Story of Germain Dube of Hamilin and Some of His Descendants" written by Guy F. Dubay and edited by Leonore M. Bravo.

The pictorial history covers a period of 1839-1898, as well as the Indian and Acadian cultures. By words and photographs it gives the readers a comprehensive coverage of a land and people not previously written about.

More than 20 people contributed. The general editor is Anna Fields McGrath, who is presently acting library director of the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

Both old and new photographs and artifacts illustrate the work. The reader is introduced to the northern reaches of Maine through many colored photographs of scenery and weather conditions. Covered, also, is the history of the Swedish Colony at New Sweden and the important Loring Air Force Base at Limestone.

Dubay's work on his French ancestor, Germain Dube of Hamlin, Maine was fostered by the stories told him by Louis Dubay. Louis regaled his family with adventures of his childhood at Hamlin Plantation, where he was born in 1908.

The sessions were always told at breakfast when the sun was rising over San Francisco Bay and "his unique voice reflected the Madawaskayan cadence of the language of that home that he left so long ago", writes Dubay.

"Several years ago we took Louis home after a 57-year absence and as he approached The County, he was constantly looking for things which no longer existed...and the hills were lower, the land flatter and the distances shorter."

Building on the stories of Louis Dubay, Guy Dubay traces the migration of the family from France to the St. John River Valley or what was then called "Madawaska"

"If you consider East as Acadia and West as Quebec, we have a melding in Madawaska of the French-speak-

ing element from Quebec with the Acadian Maritime people to form a new sub-cultural strata which of late has been dubbed 'Madawaskayan or Breyon,' writes Dubay who explores this idea through depositions, plot maps of first settlers, store logs and record books, and the boundary issue which set Maine's northern border in 1839.


When the United States federal census of 1840 was taken, for instance, there was a problem of just where was the international boundary. The census taker couldn't tell where he should stop counting people in the Valley...so he counted them all...on both shores of the river. Thus, the Maine census of that year includes names of residents who do not appear in the 1850 census, as they were British citizens.

The settlement after The Bloodless Aroostook War in 1839 was, so some thought in the County, the result of "The Devil and Daniel Webster inebriating the British Foreign Minister sufficiently to secure concession".

The book is charmingly illustrated with line drawings and paintings of various Dube/Dubays and there is a priceless section of photographs right up to the present year.

Guy F. Dubay graduated from the University of Maine at Fort Kent and is a teacher in the Elderhostel Program there.

CHANGES IN 1990

Changing of the fiscal year and the increase in membership dues appear to have created a bit of confusion.

Membership fee's are now \$20 annually for individual memberships and \$25 each for family or institutional memberships. Our year now begins on January 1st and ends on December 31st. We ask that you pay dues in your own currency whether you live in Canada or the United States. Magazine mailing costs to the U.S. are more than twice the cost of mailings to Canadian addresses.

In either case your membership entitles you to receive the four quarterly issues of GENERATIONS each year. These are published in March, June, September and December.

Branches of the Society are free to set their own schedule of dues and in most cases these are slightly different from the Society rates. Branch dues are listed elsewhere in this issue of GENERATIONS.

One more point: Mail posted in Canada must carry Canadian stamps. Therefore, all SASE's should ber Canadian rather than U.S. stamps. The rate for regular business size-and-weight letters mailed from Canada to the U.S. is currently 45 cents.
