

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The following story was written by my great-grandmother, Mary Eliza (McFee) Duncan in March, 1939, during her 84th year. She was born on May 24th, 1855, near Kinnear Settlement, Westmorland County, N.B. where this event took place. Her parents were Charles McFee and Christina Colpitts.

This is an exact transcript given to me by Mary Eliza's grandson, Ainsley Dagg, of Sidney, British Columbia.

A HEROINE

This adventure took place over a hundred years ago, and is a true story, told me by my mother, who was a witness to the act. It was considered by all who knew, to be the biggest day's work and the most courageous act ever accomplished by a pioneer woman, but I will have to take you to the beginning.

In 1831 two young men, Isaac Bleakney and Charles McFee (true names) took up homesteads in New Brunswick on the West Branche of Petitcodiac River, about thirty miles from Moncton (then called the Their homesteads lay side by side separated by a little Bend). brook which they could jump across, although quite deep. They went to work clearing the land which was heavily timbered to make their They were careful to select the largest and best timber for The remainder was cut in lengths, put in piles their buildings. and burned, preparing the land for a crop, and in the spring they each had a nice large field which they sowed with oats for future feed, and while the oats were growing they set to work building their spacious barns, Bleakney building on one side of the little brook and McFee building on the other side. When the oats were ready to harvest they were safely stored in the barns.

Pioneers were coming thick and fast, settling all round, clearing land, building and making homes and roads. Bleakney and McFee were building their houses. McFee was a hewer by trade. They hewed and squared the logs laying them up flat sides together, also making a flat smooth surface inside and out. When they were completed and their large stone fireplaces (which a stonemason from Moncton built) erected, they were very proud of their work and boasted that they had the best buildings of any of the settlers, and in 1833 March 1st they brought their wives to complete their homes.

Mrs. Bleakney (the heroine) brought one cow, six sheep, and household goods. Mrs. McFee brought two cows, six sheep and household goods and they were as happy as pioneers could be in their new homes. In a very short time each cow presented them with a calf and they were quite proud that their stock was increasing.

The cows being well fed, were giving a nice mess of milk and the claves were getting all they could drink. The cream was churned giving butter for the tables and yet there was a surplus of milk, which must not be wasted. They decided that pigs would be the best to take the milk and also would provide pork for the coming winter.

Now pigs were scarce and high priced. McFee was fortunate enough to get one down the river near Moncton and Mrs. Bleakney wanted one too. In course of time word came that John Patterson, a pioneer in Canaan, ten miles distant, had spring pigs for sale. Mrs. Bleakney said "Isaac you must go and get a pig." Now Bleakney was a lazy man and not very courageous. He said "No, I wouldn't walk to John Patterson's and carry a pig home through ten miles of woods, if he would give me the pig. You know the woods are full of bears, and they are very savage this time of the year." She was so disappointed and disgusted that she said "Well, I will go and get the pig myself", (and she did).

They were up bright and early the next morning as all pioneers were. The two men went to their blackland fields preparing for another crop. Mrs. Bleakney milked the cow, fed the calf, did her chores and prepared for her journey. She wore a pair of coarse cowhide shoes made by the shoemaker, a homespun dress which she had manufactured from the wool off the sheep's back, a beautiful plaid shawl (which her Mother had given her brought from Scotland), and a sunbonnet on her head. That was her costume. She did not have any powder or paint on her face. She did not have her hair bobbed or curled, neither did she have her finger nails tinted. She was a small woman weighing just 110 lbs, but she had courage and determination.

She started on her ten mile journey. It was a beautiful morning in May, sun was shining, birds singing, everything showing of spring and life and she was as happy as the birds. She travelled along fine and reached Mr. Patterson's home before noon. She rested over an hour. Mrs. Patterson gave her dinner. She bought the pig, paid \$5.00 for it, it weighed 15 lbs. Mr. Patterson put it in a bag, and if she had been a man would of thrown it across her shoulder and carried it that way, but she was a woman and she took it up in her arms and carried it as if it had been a baby.

She started on her way home, so happy that she had the pig. When about five miles on her way, she thought the pig weighed thirty pounds. However, she travelled on and when within three miles of home she was confronted by a huge black bear demanding the pig; no doubt, he had smelt the pig and wanted some fresh pork for his supper. Now Mrs. Bleakney wasn't going to let him have the pig if she could help it, so she ran. The bear ran too. She shifted the pig from her arms to her left hand holding it by the bag, still running, and with her right hand undid her beautiful shawl, rolled it up and with the aid of her teeth she tied and pinned it the best she could (she had no safety pins), then dropped it to the ground

hoping it would interest the bear until she could get a start (which it did).

Then summoning all the strength and courage that her little body contained she ran as she never ran before.

In the meantime the bear tore the beautiful shawl all in shreds (which they found later) and being so enraged with hunger and disappointment in not getting the fresh pork he quickly picked up the scent and made all haste after her, determined to have her and the pig too. The afternoon was slipping away, Bleakney working in his field was getting very uneasy. No doubt his guilty conscience was troubling him thinking he was such a coward as to let his wife undertake to do a job that he dare not do. He was a very passionate man, so leaving his work he went to the house and shouting to McFee and wife (my Mother and Father) who were working in their field saying "I fear something has happened to the wife." They both went over to try to console him. He was exasperated and saying "It is four o'clock and she is not here."

McFee said "Isaac, control yourself, she has not had time to get here. You must remember, ten miles over that rough road is a long way, and a pig is an awkward thing to carry, and she won't come back as quickly as she went (but she did). And if she gets here by six o'clock she will do well." And as they were talking she came in the clear running for all she was worth and the bear not far behind her and he was running too. My father took the situation in, ran to the house, got his rifle and shot the bear. The heroine reached her house with the pig in safety, but nearly exhausted, frightened beyond words - a forlorn creature. My mother took charge of her. She quieted, comforted, consoled, gave her refreshments and in a few hours had her restored to her normal self.

In the meantime the two men dressed the bear and they had a bear steak for supper, which my mother prepared, and they all enjoyed it very much. Mrs. Bleakney, the heroine, partaking of same and returning "Thanks" for her safety in reaching her home with the Pig!

Now if any of you readers can give us a story of a bigger day's work or a braver deed done by a pioneer woman, or a man either, and vouch for its truthfulness, we would be pleased to hear it. This finishes the Pig story.

Re: **Library/Archives Advisory Committee**

New Brunswick Museum

In the fall of 1988 the "Save Our Museum" committee called on the board of directors of the New Brunswick Museum to appoint an Archives advisory committee from among constituent user groups.

Acting on SOM's suggestion, the NBM wrote in the spring of 1989 to request that the NBGS put forward a nominee to such a committee. The Society honoured the undersigned with its nomination. On 15 February 1990 the appointments (Douglas Lockhead, Richard Thorne, David Bell) were actually made, with Wednesday, 2 May 1990 as the initial meeting date.

I take this opportunity to invite members of the NBGS who have suggestions and concerns as to the services offered by the Library & Archives of the NB Museum to communicate them to me, preferably in written form. I would emphasize that this new committee is merely an advisory group. It does not make decisions.

Without presuming to pre-empt discussions of a committee which is yet to meet, it seems clear that the Museum must now face squarely the issue of whether genealogical users are merely to be tolerated or actually encouraged (through, for example, special funding aids generated primarily with genealogists in mind). While the events of 1986-87 can never be undone, there is still a vast amount of manuscript material at the Museum of use to the non-beginning genealogist. The question the Museum must face is whether such material can practically be made available to the many potential genealogical users, given handling precautions and staff and space constraints.

Wills of Essex, England: The Archdeaconry Court, 1577 - 1584

You may perhaps have heard of the ambitious project here in the County of Essex to transcribe and publish all the wills relating to the County throughout the Elizabethan period, a project which has not been attempted for any other English County.

Already three volumes have appeared, covering the period 1558 to 1577. These have been published by, in turn, the National Genealogical Society and the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

I am now writing to tell you that a secure future for the remaining volumes in this series has now been ensured. Publication has been taken over by the Essex Record Office, with its prestigious publishing record. The Office will be working in close collaboration with the Friends of Historic Essex, who will be organising funding.

The first fruits of that collaboration have now appeared in the form of a volume, "Essex Wills: The Archdeaconry Court, 1577 - 1584".

You may already have purchased copies of the preceding volumes in the series, in which case I am sure your interest will be in seeing the volumes build into the complete series on your book shelves.

On the other hand, this may be a new series to you, in which case I hope the enclosed leaflet will be a useful introduction. You will note from the leaflet that stocks of the earlier volumes have been acquired for re-sale, so that, if you wish now to begin to collect the full series for your library, that can be done.

I hope to welcome you soon to the growing list of libraries and societies which are adding to their resource data through this series.

In all, there were 23 surnames with more than 1000 occurrences. Of these, 20 were French in origin.


There were 472 surnames with 100 or more occurrences. There were some 239000 entries for individuals in the provincial directories for 1988.

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Croft History, Sheshader, Isle of Lewis by Bill Lawson, 1989, 87 pp. Available from Bill Lawson Publications, Northton, Isle of Harris, 15 pounds, British, plus postage. (Postage in the U.K. is one pound)

This book will be of interest to all students of genealogical methods. And it will be of special interest to those who have roots in the Outer Hebrides. More than 30 family names are included but MacLeod, MacAulay, MacKenzie and MacDonald predominate.

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The history of Sheshader is described from the first decade of the last century when it was part of a tack (communal farm) to its division into 14 crofts (small farms) and subsequent divisions until the crofts numbered 24. For each croft, the successive tenants and names of spouses and children are listed. Supporting data include Gaelic patronomics for tenants and their spouses; and birth dates and names of spouses for members of their families. Some individuals of each succeeding generation remained in Strathader but families were large and most had to leave. Many came to Canada or to the United States.

The history is a remarkable blend of data from official records and oral tradition. And the text is supplemented by 80 photographs and two maps. Mrs. Mary MacLeod, mother of Mrs. Lawson, has exceptional knowledge of the history of the village and family relationships. Her daughter made good use of the information in collaborating with the text.

In the foreword, Donald Whyte, President of the Association of Scottish Genealogists and Record Agents, describes some of the work of Bill Lawson. Over the past twenty years, this former college lecturer, has researched every household in the Outer Hebrides back some 200 years. His research has resulted in a data bank of 17,000 pedigree sheets at his research centre Co Lus Thu. (In English, what people belong to).

The Sheshader history is the first of a series, planned by Mr. Lawson, to include all the crofts on the Long Island (Harris and Lewis). But as a professional genealogist, he also undertakes research for individuals. Descendants of Scottish emigrants studying Outer Hebrides families are indeed fortunate that there is a professional with such profound local knowledge to whom they may turn. The history of Sheshader can illustrate to them the results that might be achieved.

WHO IS WHAT? TITLES, TITLES, TITLES

Published by the Clan Maxwell of the USA. Copied from the Central Georgia Genealogical Society, Fall 1985

Many Americans, who (in our case Canadian-) who read history or ethnic news are not familiar with the British titles of nobility that we so often come across in our reading. Just what is an Earl? Is that higher or lower than a Duke? Why is an Earl's wife called a Countess? And what is a Lord? Or a Laird?

KINGS, QUEENS, PRINCES, AND PRINCESSES we understand - these are the monarch and first generation offspring. Other hereditary titles often seen are - in descending order of importance - Duke, Marquess of Marquis, Earl, Viscount, Lord, and Baron. Non-hereditary titles include Baronet and the "Sir" of knighthood.

DUKES used to be semi-autonomous rulers of kingdoms or sub-kingdoms. They did not used to be, but now are related to the monarch - examples are the Duke of Cumberland, the Duke of Argyll.

MARQUESS (Marchioness) are not as common in Scotland as either Dukes or Earls, but rank between the two. It's an imported French title. The Stuarts are the Marquis of Bute, the Kennedys the Marquis of Ailsa.

EARLS are called "Counts" on the European continent - which is why their wives are called Countesses. Earl comes from the Scandianavian title "Jarl". Earls used to rule "Counties" - and in the days of loose central control they were almost independent little kings - examples include the Earl of Glascow (Boyle) and the Earl of Wigtown (Fleming).

VISCOUNTS are what it says: vice-counts, below an Earl. LORDS are a little lower and originally held oversight over a considerable expanse of land which could be expected to furnish a considerable party of armed men in case of war. In Scotland they often head families with several cadet families - the Lord of the Isles with several MacDonald Clans; the Lord Strathspey with sub-families of Grants at Rothiemurchus, Talloghgrom, Glenmoriston, etc.

BARONS usually headed a fortified house and enough land to provide a small party of warriors. The title was hereditary as long as they kept up their obligations to the overlord - which is why one reads of rebellious lords forfeiting their titles and estates.



The records of Mount Desert Island and nearby islands is the latest special publication No. 4 by the MAINE GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY. The records transcribed here are an extraction from the original parts of the first book of records of the Plantation and later the Town of Mount Desert. The book consists of vital records of resident families, warnings-out and cattle marks. MGS has added an Every-Name index with 2,075 entries. 1791 map of the Island and five early photos.

The records themselves tell much about the life of these early settlers, spanning the periods of the War of Independence and the War of 1812, a time of strife and uncertainty for the islanders, oftentimes in relative isolation.

As of the publishing of this book the whereabouts of the original book is unknown. Fortunately in 1983 the book was brought to the Maine State Archives to be microfilmed, but curiously, no record was kept of the lending custodian. The Town of Mount Desert has a typed transcription of the original book prepared accurately by William O. Emery of Ellsworth in 1910.

Picton Press and the Maine Genealogical Society have cooperated in making this high quality book available. HISTORY & GENEALOGY THE PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK (CANADA)

VITAL STATISTICS FROM NEW BRUNSWICK (CANADA) NEWSPAPERS 1784-1875

The project to extract genealogical data from New Brunswick newspapers was begun by the New Brunswick Genealogical Society in 1982. It was continued (commencing with Volume 6) by Daniel F. Johnson. In the past eight years, 35 volumes have been published with a new volume being printed every other month.

This collection has become the largest single source of published genealogical data in New Brunswick. Over 150,000 names are cross referenced.

As well as births, deaths, marriages other data such as passenger lists, tax payer lists, coroner inquests, mates and masters receiving certificates of competency, graduates of medical abroad, epitaphs. burial colleges biographies, shipwrecks, murder trials. executions, attorneys sworn, mention of those living abroad, ordination of ministers and priests etc. are included.

Extracts are generally complete including any parents, children, brothers and sisters and their ages where such information appears in the newspapers. Some items are abridged omitting character reference. When further reference is recommended the notation (see original) accompanies each extract.

Every extract is a numbered entry. The entries are preceded by the name of the newspaper and its date of issue, thereby allowing reference to the source for verification.





A HISTORY OF THE WORLD

One of the fringe benefits of being an English or history teacher is receiving the occasional jewel of a student blooper in an essay. I have pasted together the following "history" of the world from certifiably genuine student bloopers collected by teachers throughout the United States, from eighth grade through college level. It was an age of great inventions and discoveries. Gutenberg invented the Bible. Sir Walter Raleigh is a historical figure because he invented cigarettes. The government of England was a limited mockery. Henry VIII found walking difficult because he had an abbess on his knee. Queen Elizabeth was the "Virgin Queen." As a queen she was a success. When Elizabeth exposed herself before her troops, they all shouted, "hurrah." Then her navy went out and defeated the Spanish Armadillo.

The greatest writer of the Renaissance was William Shakespear. Shakespear never made much money and is famous only because of his plays. He lived at Windsor with his merry wives, writing tragedies, comedies and errors. In one of Shakespear's famous plays, Hamlet rations out his situation be relieving himself in a long soliloquay. In another, Lady Macbeth tries to convince Macbeth to kill the King by attacking his manhood. Romeo and Juliet are an example of a heroic couplet. Writing at the same time as Shakespear was Miguel Cervantes. He wrote Donkey Hote. The next great author was John Milton. Milton wrote Paradise Lost. During the Renaissance America began. Christopher Columbus was a great navigator who discovered America while cursing about the Atlantic.

His ships were called the Nina, the Pinta, and the Santa Fe. Later, the Pilgrims crossed the Ocean, and this was known as Pilgrims Progress. When they landed at Plymouth Rock, they were greeted by the Indians, who came down the hill rolling their war hoops before them. The Indian squabs carried porpoises on their back.
