

NEW KINCARDINESHIRE Perth Parish, Victoria County, N.B. by Daniel F. Johnson

New Kincardineshire Settlement, familiarly known to the neighbouring communities as the 'Scotch Colony', was a successful example of planned colonization in New Brunswick. The first settlers had journeyed from Scotland, induced by the lectures of Capt. William Brown, the architect and proponent of the planned migration. Duncan E. MacPhail writes:

- * Regarding his travels in the United States and Canada, Capt. Brown remarks: 'I am astonished to see such splendid tracts of rich land, surrounded by beautiful scenery, all lying waste while thousands in the Old Country are struggling to redeem even a single stony barren acre." 1
- Mr. MacPhail in his book provides a comprehensive description of New Kincardineshire Settlement evidently drawing upon oral tradition as well as contemporary documents.

The following excerpts were drawn from Hon. B.R. Stevenson's <u>Report on Immigration to New Brunswick 1874</u> which appears in the Calendars of the House of Assembly.

The parties of emigrants who had resolved to form the New Kincardineshire Colony, New Brunswick began to leave their homes early on Friday, the 25th April, and an agreement having been made for a special train on the Caledonia Railway, from Aberdeen to Glasgow, the first party consisting of 120 individuals from Kintore, an ancient although a small borough and parish on the Don, at the entrance of the Gar[], one of the more fertile districts of Aberdeenshire, left their homes by the Great North of Scotland Railroad, soon after 6 a.m. on the morning named. They were joined by a much small group at Buxburn, a station near Aberdeen, almost in the suburbs of that city. ... (They) passed over the North - Esk into Forfarshire where only a few families joined at different stations; and after the Tay was passed and Perth, none joined. (page 6-7)

On Saturday morning, May 10th, 1873, Hon. Stevenson received word that the "Castalia", with the Colony on board, had arrived at Saint John. Several other emigrants, unconnected with the Colony, were also on board. The Saint John <u>Daily Telegraph</u>, May 12th listed their names, viz. John Smith, Thos. Wooley, James C. Wooley, wife and five children, Nichol McLaren, F. Cove, Peter McLeod, Denis Machoy, Thos. Wells, wife and daughter, Edmund Hay, wife and two children Wm Cameron, R.W. Candow and James Wright. The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> also reported that - The sick child was conveyed to the Hospital on Saturday. Its parents' name is McLaughlin and it is about 2 1/2 years old. The McLaughlins joined the vessel at Glasgow and were not, therefore, originally part of the Kincardineshire colonists.

Stevenson reported that 'necessarily 90 to 95 percent were bound for (New) Kincardineshire. About 200 of the colonists transferred, with their belongings, to the steamer "Olive" and proceeded to Indiantown where they boarded the "David Weston". The party steamed up the St. John River arriving at Fredericton on Saturday evening. Accommodations had been prepared for them at the Court House. On Sunday, they attended divine services at the Presbyterian churches. The following day, they boarded the "Ida Whittier", 195 passengers, in all. While proceeding up the river, an hour was spent at

Woodstock where greetings were exchanged. Being desirous of reaching their destination, the colonists continued their trip until darkness compelled the steamer to tie up at the Mills, about 17 miles above Woodstock. At 11:30 a.m. on Tuesday, May 13th, the settlers arrived at their destination, Kilburn's Landing, Perth Parish, Victoria County. On Wednesday, about 4 p.m. the remaining colonists arrived at Kilburn's Landing aboard the steamer "Rothesay".

The passenger list of the "Castalia" appeared in two Saint John newspapers, the <u>Daily Telegraph</u> and the <u>Daily News.</u> Passengers who appeared in both papers are listed below. Those names followed by an asterisks (*) were not Kincardineshire Colonists.

In comparing the two passenger lists, discrepancies were found in the numbers of children reported. The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> contained the following information which differs with the <u>Daily News</u>. James Adams, five children; Peter Anderson, three children; William Bisset, one child; Alex. Cocker, four children; James Cocker, merchant, two children; William Couts, three children; Andrew Davidson, three children; Henry Duthie, no children; David Edward, no children; Jas. Findlater, two children.; Donald Fraser, no children; James Ford, no children; James Kelman, three children; John Home, no wife nor children; Alex Hunter, no children; Alex. Lawson, three children; Charles Lindsay, two children; David Logan, two children; Robert MacIntosh, no children; James Marr, six children; Alex Matheson, two children; William McLaughlin, two children; William L. McPhail, two children; (Donald) Donald McPherson, wife, two children; John McRobert, wife, four children; Thomas More, two children; Duncan Munro, two children; Alex Paterson, no wife; Wm Petrie, three children; Arthur Robertson, two children; John Robertson, no children; Alex. Taylor, one child; Thomas Watt, seven children; Andrew Wilson, five children;

Mr. Shives Statistical Reports appear in 1874, 1875 and 1877 in the <u>Calenders of the House of Assembly for New Brunswick</u>. These reports contain the name of each lot owner in the settlement, the number of souls in each settler's family, acres located, acres chopped, acres cropped, houses, barns, horses, cows, oxen, sheep, swine, young cattle and a monetary evaluation of each. Wheat, oats, potatoes, buckwheat and turnips appear as the primary produce of New Kincardineshire for the years evaluated. The names of some lot owners appear for the first time in this list in 1874 and 1875. Therefore, there is no entry for the year(s) preceding their appearance. New Kincardineshire was originally divided into two sections: Stonehaven and Kintore. The chart below includes (A) Name of Lot Owner (B) Number in Family in 1873 (C) Number of Family in 1874 (D) Number in Family in 1875 (E) Lot Number First Granted (F) Acres in Lot (G) Kintore or Stonehaven Lot.



Not all the colonists chose to settle at New Kincardineshire. On July 11th, 1873, the 'Daily Telegraph' reported that a gentleman named Cunningham who came to this country with the Kincardineshire Colonists had purchased the Taylor Farm just above Government House. Yet others continued to arrive. On August 12th, 1873, The 'Daily Telegraph' relayed the news of the arrival of the "Acadia", Anchor Line, from Glasgow. Among the passengers were Wm Mann and his wife, Agnes, and Jessie, Donald and Alex. Mann, bound for the New Kincardineshire Colony. The 'Carleton Sentinel' of Woodstock reported in October 11th, 1873, that Mr. Lawson, wife and four children passed through there on Tuesday en route from Scotland to join their sons at the New Scotch Settlement, Kincardine. The community was to prosper and grow. On 27th July, 1873 the wife of Henry DUTHIE, farmer, gave birth to a son. - the first birth in the Colony.

Daniel LEE of the Parish of Saint George, N.B. -A Preliminary Portrayal of Him and His Family

This brief article presents various facts we have been able to discern from public records concerning Daniel Lee of the Parish of Saint George, New Brunswick and his ten surviving children. It also identifies many of his grand-children. We have sub-titled this piece a preliminary portrayal as there are gaps in the information we have yet found concerning members of this family. Hopefully further information is available on this family from other sources which will provide a more comprehensive picture of the family. Nevertheless, we are hopeful this sketch will be of assistance to others researching this line.

Daniel LEE deposed in an 1810 Memorial, Petitioning a grant of 300 acres of land for himself and 200 acres for each of his two oldest sons (N.B. Land Grants), that he was born in the County of Worcester in Old England circa 1757. In this same Memorial he stated he had immigrated to Canada in 1774 and that he had resided constantly in N.B. since that time.

We have been unable to ascertain at what port Daniel disembarked or where he lived in his initial years in America. The earliest record we find of Daniel in America is in 1783, at which time he was residing in what is now Maine. That year, he, with one other inhabitant of the Plantation of "Cobscook pasmequady", signed a petition urging the establishment of courts and a register of deeds for the eastern part of the District of Maine (Collections of the Maine Historical Society, Vol. 20, pg 305).

In November 1789, Daniel Lee sold to B. Shaw the 100 acres of land he possessed in Township #2 in the Bay of Passamaquoddy. Township or Plantation #2 subsequently became the towns of Dennysville and Pembroke. Daniel's 100 acres lay in that part of Plantation #2 which became Pembroke. Specifically, Daniel possessed lot number 23 lying between the north branch of the Cobscook River and the head of Ox Cove.

Daniel "Lea" was still residing in Maine in 1790, however, as he was enumerated in the census of that year among the inhabitants of Plantation #2 east of Machias.

Daniel Lee removed from Plantation #2, Me. to the Parish of Saint George, N.B. sometime between August 1790, when the census of Maine was taken that year, and 26 November 1791, at which time Daniel Lee, "of the Parish of Saint George", purchased at public auction 400 acres of land on the River Magauadavic (Charlotte County Deed, Book B, pg 151). Colonel Hugh MacKay, a Justice of the Peace and a large land holder in St George, attested in the above cited Memorial of 1810 that he had been acquainted with Daniel Lee for upwards of twenty years. MacKay's statement tends both to confirm that Daniel had not resided in N.B. continuosly since 1774, as Daniel stated in his Memorial, and to substantiate late 1790 — early 1791 as the date of Daniel's removal to Saint George.

While Daniel makes no claim in his Memorial to having borne arms during the American Revolution, he does state he was frequently employed by the British

authorites to gather intelligence on the strength and movement of the revolutionaries in and around Passamaquoddy, especially their Indian allies. His residence in Plantation #2 no doubt afforded him an ideal vantage point for monitoring the movements of the Indians who lived at or frequented the Eastport - Passamaquoddy area.

While living in Plantation #2, Daniel Lee married Martha (). This event probably occurred about 1783, as their oldest child was 26 years old at the time of the 1810 Memorial.

Martha's maiden name is unknown to the authors. We hypothesize, however, that she was possibly a daughter of Robert & Catherine Ash. At the time of Daniel's marriage there was only a handful of families in Plantation #2, of which the family of Robert Ash was one. There definitely was a long, close relationship between Daniel and the family of Robert Ash. Daniel and Robert were neighbors for several years in Plantation #2, Robert's land abutting Daniel's on the south. Robert was the other signer with Daniel of the 1783 petition referred to above. Daniel Lee removed from Plantation #2 to St George where at least one member of Robert's family had preceded him and to which others relocated approximately simultaneously with Daniel. Daniel and his wife Martha sold land in 1796 to Robert Ash's son James at what appears to be a very favorable price. Robert subsequently leased from James a portion of this property which abutted Daniel Lee's land. Several subsequent deeds were executed between the descendants of Daniel Lee and Robert Ash. At least two early marriages occurred between their descendants. And a Daniel Lee was the executor of James Ash's will. (For additional background on Robert Ash, see our "Ancestry of James Ash", Generations, Vol. 37, Sept. 1988.)

However, this close association between the two families does not in itself prove a blood relationship. Thus, pending further evidence, Martha remains a 'Lost Lady' whose maiden name awaits identification or proof.

In his Memorial, Daniel stated that he then possessed only one small lot, which he had purchased and on which he lived, which was "so steril and rocky as to baffle the united exertions of himself and family to obtain a livilihood on it". We are unable to speak to the quality of Daniel's farm lot. However, his characterization of the lot as small appears to be an understatement. As previously indicated, Daniel purchased a 400 acre lot in 1791. In March 1796 he purchased a second lot of 200 acres (Char. Co. Deed, Book B, pg 466). Later that year Daniel and his wife did sell 200 acres of their first lot of land to James Ash (Char. Co. Deed, Book B, pg 459). Nevertheless, at the time of his Memorial, it appears that Daniel still possessed 400 acres. This could be termed small only in the context that Daniel then had six sons, one of whom was already married and a second married shortly thereafter. A few months after executing his Memorial Daniel sold the 200 acres he had purchased in 1796 (Char. Co. Deed, Book D, pg 129).

Daniel Lee's 1810 Memorial for a grant of 300 acres of land was approved. The land granted was situated on the east side of the River Magaguadavic about 18 miles above the upper settlement on the river and about a half mile above the Fredericton Road, so called. In a subsequent deed, executed following Daniel's death, the 300 acres granted him were further stated to include among its bounds portions of both the River Magaguadavic and the Testaquack River (Char. Co. Deed, Book O, pg 36). From the descriptions, it is evident that the area granted Daniel was that which subsequently became known as Lee Settlement.

We have yet to find any record of the death of either Daniel or Martha. Unless the following reference is to Daniel Lee Jr., which we think unlikely, Daniel was living in July 1829, at which time he was named executor in the will of James Ash. He was also living in early September 1830 when that will was probated. However he had died prior to 10 October 1830, at which time several of his children sold their respective shares in their father's land to their brother Joseph. From this record, it would appear that Martha predeceased her husband.

Children of Daniel & Martha () LEE:

In his 1810 Memorial, Daniel deposed that he had nine children living and that three others had died. Of the surviving children, he stated three were daughters and six were sons. He specifically stated that the two oldest boys were Robert, age 26, and James, age 20 years and some odd months. Two other sons were stated to be between 15 and 19 years of age.

At the time of the U.S. census of Maine in August 1790, Daniel's household consisted of himself and his wife, two sons under 16 and one daughter. Based on the Memorial, it is evident the two sons in 1790 were Robert and James, the latter an infant at the time, and can presume that one of the surviving daughters was born between Robert and James. As we will show later, this daughter was Rebecca, born c1785. Given that six years lapsed between the births of Robert and James, with only one known birth in the interim. it seems likely that the birth of one or more of the deceased children occurred during this period. Unfortunately neither the names nor sexes of the deceased children are known.

The names of Daniel & Martha's other children, except for Daniel Jr, are provided to us in two deeds involving the disposition of Daniel's land following his decease (Char. Co. Deed, Book O, pgs 36 & 37 respectively). These deeds also provide us the names of the daughters' spouses and the christian names of the sons' wives. It is evident from the first of these deeds that Daniel and Martha had one more surviving son after the date of the 1810 Memorial, for a total of seven surviving sons. The 1851 census of St George further aids us in establishing the approximate timing and order of births of the children. Seven of the ten surviving children of Daniel & Martha are readily found in that census. However, as two of the three children missing in 1851 were daughters, we are not able at this time to precisely place these females on this family tree.

The data we have on the family of Daniel & Martha Lee suggests the following concerning their children:

1. Robert, b. c1784, prob. in Plantation #2, Maine. (The 1851 census of Saint George lists N.B. as the birth place of both Robert & James. This seems unlikely as, as previously discussed, there is evidence their parents resided in Plantation #2 from at least 1783 until after August 1790. Rebecca's birth, which occurred between the two boys, is said in the 1851 census to have occurred in Me.) Robert married Mary () prior to 1810, at which time he had two children. In July 1814 it was reported that Robert was 30 years old and had four children (Memorial of Robert & James Lee, 1814, N.B. Land Grants). This Memorial involved the confirmation of the grants of land received in conjunction with their father in 1810, plus requested they be granted various nearby small islands in the river. Robert and Mary were living with their son John in 1851 and were aged 67 and 66 respectively.

Children of Robert & Mary () Lee:

a. Robert Jr., b. c1809, m. Jane Waltman Oct. 1832 (Char. Co. Marriage Register, Book A, pg 408). They had four sons and one daughter in 1851.

- b. Daniel 3rd, b. c1809, m. Amy Waltman Aug. 1830 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book A, pg 235). They had three sons and four daughters in 1851.
- c. Jacob, b. c1812, m. Elizabeth (Eliza) Waltman 29 Oct. 1835 (Johnson, D.F: Vital Statistics from N.B. Newspapers, Vol. 6, item 646). In 1851, Jacob had one son and two daughters. Jacob d. 17 Dec 1885 (The Bay Pilot).
- d. A child, b. c1814, poss. a James. Daniel Lee "Jr" and wife Amy sold land in St George to Robert, Jacob and James Lee in 1855. Three of these four are clearly sons of Robert Sr. We do not find this James in the 1851 census of Charlotte County.
- e., f., & g. Presumably there were children born to Robert & Mary between 1814 & 1822. Their names and numbers are unknown. We have assumed there were prehaps three such unidentified children. These prob. included Deborah, who m. Charles Stewart in 1833, and Mary, who m. Stillman Rhodes in 1834 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg. Book A, pgs 606 & 731 respectively). These Lee girls were quite definitely the daughters of either Robert or James.
- h. John, b. c1822, m. Elizabeth A. Williamson 1 May 1845 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book B, pg 138). They had one son and three daughters in 1851.
- i. Poss. Richard, b. c1825, m. Margaret Beatty 12 Dec 1848 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book B, pg 208). They had one son in 1851. (The presumption that Richard was possibly a son of Robert is based solely on the fact that he was enumerated in the 1851 census on the same page as Robert and several of his sons.) He was prob. the Richard in Calais, Me. in the 1900 census in which he stated he was b. April 1825.
- j. Nathaniel, b. c1826. Unm. in 1851.
- k. Solomon, b. c1829. Unm. in 1851.
- 2. Rebecca, b. c1785, prob. in Plantation #2, Me. M. Samuel Sprague. Her age is listed as 66 in the 1851 St George census. Her name is given variously as Rebecca and Elizabeth in Deed O, pg 36, op. cit.
- 3. James, b. c1790, prob. in Plantation #2, Me. M. Hannah () after 1810 and before 1814. In the 1814 Memorial previously cited, it was stated that James was then married and had two children. James & Hannah were both living in 1851 and were aged 60 & 71 respectively.

Known children of James & Hannah () Lee:

- a. James Jr, b. c1812, m. Mary Ann (). James Jr & Mary Ann sold two parcels of land to S. Seelye in 1850 (Char. Co. Deed, Book W, pg 50). James Jr does not appear in the 1851 census of Charlotte County.
- b. Paul, b. c1814. Lived with his parents in 1851. That household also included a daughter-in-law Mary Ann, who presumably was either the wife of Paul or (widow?) of James Jr; a grandchild Hannah Cox, age 15, presumably indicating that James Sr had at least one daughter; and three grand-children named Lee, ages 4, 6, & 11, presumably the children of either Paul or James Jr.
- c. Prob. Sarah, who m. James Cox 28 Dec 1830 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book A, pg 244). See above under James for a probable daughter of Sarah.

4. Edward, b. c1791, either in Plantation #2, Me., or St George, N.B., m. prior to 1826, Elizabeth Ash, dau of James & Eleanor (Ash) Ash. (In the "Ancestry of James Ash", op. cit., we erroneously stated that Elizabeth had married a James Lee. That statement was based on the death certificate of one of Elizabeth's daughters, Martha (Lee) Swan, in which her father's name was incorrectly listed as James. Further examination of that original record indicated that Martha's maternal grandfather's name was entered on her death certificate, rather than her father's. Subsequently, a town clerk, recognizing that an error had been made, changed the last name to Lee, but left the first name as James.

"Edmund" Lee and his wife Elizabeth were parties to the Oct. 1830 deed, op. cit., transferring their interests in Daniel Sr's estate to Edward's brother Joseph. In an 1838 deed (Char. Co. Deed, Book Q, pg 460), in which Robert Ash sold his ½ interest in the undivided lots he inherited with his brother Nathaniel from their father James Ash, there is as one boundary reference "Land deeded to Edward Lee." This reference is to land deeded to Elizabeth Lee by her father James Ash in 1826 (Char. Co. Deed, Book I, pg 416). Edward and Elizabeth sold this and one other lot in November 1847 (Char. Co. Deed, Book U, pg 662).

We have been unsuccessful in locating data on Edward & Elizabeth during the period 1847 - 1859. They are not listed in either the 1851 census of Charlotte County or the 1850 census of Maine (nor the censuses of several other states we have checked). In August 1859, Elizabeth, then a widow and "at present in the Parish of Saint George", sold all her undivided interest in a lot of land running from the Western side of the River Magaguadavic to the Digdeguash Lake and any other heirship property left by her father James Ash. Elizabeth was living with her daughter Martha (Lee) Swan in Charlotte, Me. in 1860.

Children of Edward & Elizabeth (Ash) Lee: (Only Martha below is proven; the others are probable, based on location.)

- a. Martha, b. 10 Sept 1833, St George, m. (int) 11 Nov 1848 in Calais, Me., to Ebenezer Swan Jr of Charlotte, Me., d. Charlotte 29 Jan 1917.
- b. Prob. John, m. Ann () in 1859 in Carroll Co., Illinois. He enlisted in Co. A, 15th Maine at Charlotte, Me. in Oct 1861, d. 14 Nov 1863 at Brazos Santiago Island, Texas (U.S. National Archives pension certificate #842097). John Lee, then of Lowell, Kent Co., Michigan, sold land in Charlotte, Me. in 1856 to Ebenezer Swan Jr's brother Solomon (Washington Co. Deed, Vol. 101, pg 475). (Note: A woman in Madawaska, Me. also filed a pension claim as widow of John. This claim was disallowed. Interestingly, though, her two oldest sons were named Edward and Daniel.)
- c. Prob. Joseph. He stated in 1907 that he was b. 6 Feb 1840 in Charlotte, Me. He also enlisted in Co. A, 15th Maine during the American Civil War. He m. (1) in 1877 Ann (), who shortly thereafter became ill and died in the poor house a year or so later; he m. (2) Elizabeth J Watson 30 March 1879 in Kent Co., Michigan. Affidavits in support of Joseph's pension application were provided, among others, by three of Ebenezer Swan Jr's siblings (U.S. Nat. Archives pen. cert. #791885). Joseph died 14 Oct 1914 at Sand Lake, Michigan.
- d. Prob. Edward, who being of Charlotte, Me., m. Minerva Scott in Calais, Me. in 1864.

- 5. Daniel Jr, b. c1794, St George, m. Abigail (). We have yet to identify any children of this couple. In 1818, James & Eleanor Ash sold 500 acres of land to Daniel Jr (Char. Co. Deed, Book E, pg 442). In 1851, a nephew Joseph, age 9, resided with Daniel Jr. Daniel & Abigail were 57 & 46 respectively in 1851. Abigail d. before 1861. In the 1861 census, Daniel, age 67, had a wife Mary, age 19. Daniel d. after 1871, in which year he and Mary were 78 and 28 respectively.
- 6. John, b. c1801, St George, m. Hannah Cox 14 Aug 1828 (Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book A, pg 162). In 1851, John, 50, and Hannah, 46, had four sons and three daughters living with them. These were probably their only children, as the oldest was 23 and the youngest was six.

Children of John & Hannah (Cox) Lee:

- a. John, b. c1829. b. Martha, b. c1830, m. 25 Oct 1849 James Ash.
- c. Mary Ann, b. c1833. d. Charles, b. c1835. e. Joseph, b. c1838.
- f. Susan, b. c1841. Daniel, b. c1845. He is prob. the Daniel Alan said by descendants to have been born in Eastport, Me. 23 Dec 1844, m. Migail Olivia Garnet, and d. 29 Dec 1929 in Elmcroft, N.B.
- 7. Joseph, b. c1803, St George, m. Hannah Stephens 14 Aug 1828 (Records of St Mark's Anglican Church, St George). In 1851, Joseph & Hannah had four sons and three daughters living with them.

Known children of Joseph & Hannah (Stephens) Lee:

- a. Daniel, b. c1833. b. Israel, b. c1835. c. Susan, b. c1840.
- d. Thomas, b. c1842. e. John, b. c1844. f. Martha, b. c1846.
- g. Hannah, b. c1848.
- 8. Susannah, m. Joseph Dudley. Not enumerated in the 1851 Charlotte Co. census.
- 9. Hannah, m. Thomas Baley (Bailey). Char. Co. Mar. Reg., Book A, pg 90, lists an 1825 marriage of an Anna Lee to a James Baily. This is almost certainly Hannah & Thomas. They are not enumerated in the 1851 Charlotte County census. (As mentioned previously, we are unable to precisely place Susannah & Hannah in the listing of the children of Daniel & Martha Lee. Both were b. before 1810. One or both may have been born during the period 1795 1800, when a gap in known births occurred. If not born then, it is most likely they were born between 1804 & 1810. Hannah's marriage in 1825 suggests she was born during the latter period.
- 10. Nathaniel, b. after 1810. He is not listed in the 1851 Charlotte Co. census. He was urmarried in 1830 when he sold his share in his father's estate. He is probably the Nathaniel Lee in Calais, Me. in 1850 & 1860 with a wife Margaret. They had the following children in 1850: a. Mary J., 20; b. Susan, 18; c. David, 16; d. Daniel, 12; e. John H, 11, f. Abigail, 7; and g. Cordelia, 3.

Poly Gleaner Vital Statistics Office Will Provide Genealogical Statements

Effective immediately, the Province's Vital Statistics Office is offering a new service — providing genealogical statements of birth, marriage and death, Health and Community Services Minister J. Raymond Frenette announced.

"The government has repealed the \$25 fee charged by Vital Statistics for genealogical research and has set a standard fee of \$15 for new, long form birth, death or marriage certificates," the minster said. "The certificates will be of particular interest to people who

are trying to trace their families' histories."

Mr. Frenette said the statements will contain more information than current birth, marriage and death certificate. "The information will help link people in a family during various generations and is most valuable to both amateur and professional genealogists," he said.

For example, a genealogical statement of particulars about a birth would give the birth dates of the parents, their occupations, and the name of the attending physician at the birth.

A marriage statement would give the names of the parents of the bride and groom, their dates and places of brith, plus the occupations, the birthplaces and birthdates of the couple, and the name of the person who married them.

A genealogical statement of particulars about a death may provide information about parents and occupation of the deceased, the name of the funeral director and the place of interment. In all instances, the information is only available if it is on the original record.

100 Years And Older

Public Will Have Access To Vital Statistics Records

Health and Community Services
Minister J. Raymond Frenette and
Tourism, Recreation and Heritage
Minister Roland Beaulieu Thursday
amounced an agreement has been
reached between the two departments
to provide public access to Vital Statisties records that are 100 years and
older. The service will be available
through the Provincial Archives as of
Jan. 1, 1991.

"The records will be made available nicrofilm format to members of the neral public at the Provincial Archime." Mr. Beaulieu said. "Records will

also be made available through interlibrary loan."

The Vital Statistics Branch of the Department of Health and Community Services will, however, continue to be responsible for the issue of certificates required on these records.

"This service will be of particular interest and benefit to individuals and groups interested in geneology," Mr. Frenette said. "An individual could, for example, have confirmation of the wedding date of his or her greatgrandparents or of their respective date of birth."

The office of vital statistics has re-

sponsibility for collecting, recording, tabulating and registering births, still-births, marriages and deaths. The office also issues certificates on a fee basis. Certificates can only be issued for births, marriages and deaths which occurred in New Brunswick.

The Provincial Archives, on the other hand, ensure the preservation of permanently valuable public and private records having a bearing on the history of New Brunswick.

New Brunswick VITAL STATISTICS BRANCH RECORDS

LATEST DEVELOPMENTS OF THE CLANS OF IRELAND OFFICE

The movement to organize the Clans of Ireland is now well estableshed, with 24 clans having declared that they will hold international rallies of their own families, in their own counties.

Along with this, a further 28 clans have been organized and many others are in the process of forming committees throughout the country.

This is in preparation for the week-long International Festival to be held in Dublin in 1992, and incorporating an International Rally of all the clans on the Hill of Tara, Co. Meath-the ancient centre of the High Kings of Ireland.

The new fully-staffed "Clans of Ireland Office" at 2 Kildare St., Dublin 2, is the centre of the new clan movement. It is being backed financially by Borde Failte-The Irish Tourist Board-and the Heritage Section of the Department of the Taoiseach (Irish Fremier) Charles J. Haughey.

Close liaison has now been established with the leader-ship of the clan movement in Scotland, which held major successful International Clans of Scotland festivals in Edinburgh, in 1977, 1981,1985 and 1989. Lt. Colonel H.V. Patterson, chief executive of the Clans of Scotland Trust, in Edinburgh, is helping with the Irish planning and many Scots, with their bands and warpipes are expected at the Dublin Festival of 1992.

Rory OConnor, chieftain of the OConnor (Kerry) Clan, is heading the revial of the Clans of Ireland movement. He says: "This is a major development with cultural, social reconomic and tourist spinoffs. My own motivation and interest is mainly cultural

The Clans Movement is being parallelled by another major plan, "The National Genealogical Project". to assist Irish people from allover the world to trace theor roots. Thirty research centres are being set up throughout the country, and a computerized system is being established, on which it is planned to have programs with all available Irish records, relevant to searching for family origins.



The Robinson Family By Helen N. Battleson

Descendants of Christopher Robinson, a 1666 immigrant to Virginia, held their first annual reunion last June at "Hewick," the ancestral home built in 1678 near Urbanne, Va.

Helen Nichols Battleson, the family historian, notes that her husband's ancestor was William Robinson, who was a brother of Beverly Robinson, a colonel in the King's Loyal American Regiment. From his line, Mrs Battleson tells us, came Bir John Beverly Robinson, first baronet of Toronto and later chief justice of Upper Canada.

After the Revolutionary War, Beverly Robinson was appointed to the Council of New Brunswick but never came to the colony. He did not resign until his son, Beverly, Jr. was ready to take up the father's appointment. Beverly, Jr. occupied several government posts in New Brunswick and was a colonel in the 104th Regiment.

Mrs Battleson has supplied further information on the Robinson lineage, taken from the book "Colonial Families of the Southern States of "merica":

HON, JOHN ROBINSON, (3-2), of Middlesex Co., Va., b. 1683; d. 1749; was a distinguished member of the King's Council, and its President; he was also Acting Governor of the Colony, 1740; a staunch supporter of the Established Church; m. 


