

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Revolutionary War Rebel - Dr. Phinehas Nevers

The Nevers family of New Brunswick is pre-Loyalist. Elisha Nevers and his wife Bathsheba Green, with their sons Phinehas, Samuel and Jabez, settled in the old "Township of Maugerville" on the Saint John River, in Sunbury County, about 1765. The old Township comprised the area now known as the Parishes of Maugerville and Sheffield, in Sunbury County, and included Oromocto, Middle and Mauger's Islands.

Phinehas Nevers was born at Leicester, Massachusetts, 19 June 1726¹, and removed from there to Brunswick, Maine, about 1752. From Brunswick he came to the Township of Maugerville about 1764/65, where he was granted Lots 11 and 13 on Oromocto Island 31 Nov 1765².

Phinehas' wife was Mercy, daughter of William and Sarah (Sprague) Green. She was born 18 Aug 1731, probably at Malden, Massachusetts, although it was about that time that her family moved to Leicester, a small town west of Worcester, Massachusetts, and she may have been born there.

Mercy's father, William Green, was born in Malden in 1683. He was son of William Green who was born in Malden in 1661, and his wife Elizabeth Hills; grandson of William Green who was born in England in 1635, and his wife Elizabeth Wheeler; and great grandson of Thomas Green who was born in England about 1606, and his wife Elizabeth, who came to America about 1635 and lived in Ipswich before moving to Malden, Mass.³

Mercy's mother, Sarah Sprague, was born in Malden in 1685. She was daughter of Samuel Sprague who was born in Malden in 1662, and his wife Sarah; granddaughter of Lt. Samuel Sprague who was baptized in Boston in 1631, and his wife Rebecca Crawford; and great granddaughter of Lt. Ralph Sprague who was born in England about 1599, and his wife Joanna Warren, who came to America about 1630 and lived in Malden, Mass. 8

Phinehas himself was a medical doctor, probably the only resident physician in the early years of the Maugerville colony. He was also a politian and a military man. He was returned a member of the Nova Scotia House of Assembly for Sunbury County in 1768 (New Brunswick being part of Nova Scotia until 1784), and he was one of the first magistrates in Sunbury County⁴. In Maugerville, he was a member of a committee chosen 15 Jun 1774 by the newly established

Congregational Church to approach Rev. Seth Noble, a Westfield, Mass., clergyman, with an offer to become their pastor⁵.

Seth Noble was a political activist (as many of the Congregationalist ministers in New England were at that time), and in Maugerville he continued to minister to both the spiritual and political needs of his congregation. When the Revolutionary War broke out in 1776 Parson Noble wrote to the Massachusetts Assembly and offered the services of the Maugerville citizens for the cause of American liberty ⁶. Phinehas Nevers was closely associated with Rev. Noble, and was a member of one of his committees in Maugerville which, on the 14th of May, 1776, adopted among others a resolution that read:

Resolved that it is our minds desire to submit ourselves to the government of Massachusetts Bay and that we are ready with our lives and fortunes to share with them the event of the present struggle for liberty, however God in his providence may order it.⁵

But bitter humiliation was in store for the Maugerville committee members. The Nova Scotia government, in May 1777, sent a force to the Saint John River under Col. Gould where the inhabitants were compelled to take an oath of allegiance to His Majesty King George III, or leave the country. Col. Gould, on leaving the river, took with him to Halifax Israel Perley, who had been clerk of the committee, but Jonathan Eddy, a native of Norton, Mass., who had attempted to capture Fort Cumberland in 1776, in company with Rev. Seth Noble and Dr. Phinehas Nevers, escaped and reached Machias, Maine, through an inland route.⁴

In Machias, Col. John Allen was organizing an expedition for the purpose of taking and holding possession of the Saint John River on behalf of the Continental Congress. Jonathan Eddy and Phinehas Nevers joined him. The expedition left Machias on the 30th of May, 1777, and reached the Saint John River June 2nd. Col. Allen went up the river six miles above Fredericton, where he established himself. He hoped he could maintain a position on the river, but when word of his presence reached Halifax it brought the British forces down upon him. He and his expedition were then compelled to retreat to Machias, going by way of Eel River, twelve miles below Woodstock, to the St. Croix lakes.⁴

When the British fleet attacked Machias, in

August, 1777, Phinehas Nevers was present and acting as Lieut. Colonel in Jonathan Eddy's Regiment. Soon after that Dr. Nevers was in Boston where he wrote a letter, dated 18 September 1777, thanking the Council and House of Representatives of the State of Massachusetts Bay

"for the Honor you did me in appointing me Lieut. Colonel of the Battalion intended to be raised under the command of Col. Eddy, and more especially for your late appointment as Lieut. Colonel over the troops ordered to be raised for the defence of Machias."⁷.

But for some reason, the troops apparently were not raised, and Col. John Allen in a letter to the General Court, 12 Oct 1777, said Lieut. Col. Nevers had not yet arrived and he doubted he would raise his men before the time was out. A month later, 18 Nov, Col. Allen was still waiting.⁷

Later Dr. Nevers and some of his family were living in what is now the City of Bangor, where he received a grant of land as a refugee from Nova Scotia during the Revolutionary War, and where he pursued his medical profession.⁷

John Nevers was administrator of his father's estate in Bangor, where the Dr. died in October, 1785. An inventory of the estate includes one thousand acres of wild land granted by government on the east side of the Penobscot River; a dwelling house, unfinished; a barn frame partly covered; some medicines, and a few other items. The inventory does not reflect the estate of a wealthy man.⁷

Phinehas' son, Samuel Nevers, remained in Maugerville, and his widow, Mercy Nevers, returned after his death to live near Samuel there. His son John Nevers also returned from Bangor and lived in the Parish of Douglas, York County, N.B., and some descendants of his son Elisha Nevers lived at Prince William, in York Co., New Brunswick.

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John Holmes¹ of Beaver Harbor, New Brunswick, Canada By Theodore C. Holmes⁵ 41 Woodmont St., Portland, Maine, 04102

In my family, the earliest Holmes ancestor I have been able to trace is John Holmes¹. My first knowledge of this forebear came from a book of genealogies for the area in New Brunswick where he once lived. The volume states that he was born in Ireland in 1776 and that his mother was a Rutledge¹.

For the past few years I have searched for more information, trying to find out where he came from; the names of his parents, a record of his death and where he was buried, etc. So far, I have been unsuccessful.

I have chased down a number of clues which exist in family letters and there are a few family legends. One story says that John Holmes lived in Ireland where his father bought linen for the Crown. His mother died and his father married again. John didn't like his stepmother and ran away to sea. His ship came to America and he met his future wife while going ashore for water on the coast of Maine. Another version of the legend is that his family moved from England to Ireland where his father was employed, John enlisted in the Royal navy and deserted ship while in Canada. Although such tales may or may not be true, they add interest to the family story.

An obituary and biographical sketch of a grandson of John Holmes states that he was a native of Ireland and an early settler of Machias, Maine . An old family letter claims that another grandson, my grandfather Maurice Holmes, declared that John Holmes came from Northern Ireland and the New Brunswick census of 1851 for Charlotte County tells that his national origin was Irish.

I have John Holmes¹, family Bible which was published in 1798. In it, handwritten on a blank page, is the date of his birth which appears to be, December 25, 1774. The last digit in the handwritten year of birth in the Bible is not perfectly legible. This date; however, differs from the birthdate given in the book of

genealogies. In the Bible, no hint is given as to his national origin although his last name is spelled "Holms," without an "e."

A major obstacle in searching for more facts about this man have been the many John Holmeses I find wherever I look. For example, the Federal census for Maine for the year 1800 lists nine John Holmeses, four of them in Washington county, where he may have lived. The 1798 Direct Tax list for Massachusetts contains three John Holmeses for the Machias, Maine area and the Register of Deeds office in both Machias, Maine and St. Andrews, New Brunswick, Canada, include deeds and records of land transactions between a few John Holmeses and other parties.

Several Holmes families moved from Scarborough, Maine to Machias, Maine in the 1760's and old Scarborough church records dating back to the 1740's contain John Holmeses, but I haven't yet been able to make a connection. Early marriage records for Machias, Maine, also include John Holmeses, none of whom seem to be my ancestor.

An old account book for the Columbia, Maine-Machias area, "Ledger A-1769," contains the record of a "John Holms" who from 1783 to 1786 was purchasing corn, flour, milk, pans, rum, a "speling book," one half interest in "afishing boat," etc. from a trader named John Bucknam. This John Holmes may have been the father of my ancestor. Furthermore, my ancestor's future father-in-law, Andrew "Angus" McDonald had an account in the same book.

The earliest authentic record in Maine that I have found for John Holmes¹ is his marriage intentions with Lydia McDaniel

whose last name in other documents is sometimes McDonald. (Maybe because in the Scottish clan system McDaniel is a family name and McDonald is the clan name). Their intent to marry was recorded on January 13, 1798 in the town books of Columbia, Maine. 13

Although I have found no evidence of their marriage, other records show that John Holmes¹' wife, Lydia, was the daughter of Andrew "Angus" McDonald and Anne (Hicks) McDonald. They were settlers at Pleasant River in the early 1760's. Pleasant River (now Columbia, Maine), is near the coast and about twenty miles west of Machias, Maine. 15

According to the 1851 census for Charlotte County, New Brunswick, John Holmes went to New Brunswick around 1800. Day books, family letters, gravestones and genealogies indicate that he and his wife, Lydia, raised a family of eight children in the town of Beaver Harbor, New Brunswick. It is said that they lived near the sea in a cove called Back Beach. A few survivors of a Quaker colony were also living in the town at that time.

I have discovered little about the personality of this ancestor, although a family letter says that he was called "Irish Jack" and was very stubborn — so stubborn that he would stand in the middle of the road when a horse and wagon came along and would make the driver turn out for him. Day book records of his purchases at island trading places in Passamaquoddy Bay reveal that he liked a drink of rum and it has been written that a grandson once went with him to Eastport, Maine in his boat.

I am quite sure that John Holmes was a fisherman. Accounts in the old day book records confirm that he was trading fish for goods from 1818 to 1823 at two different trading stations on the islands of Pope's Folly and Indian Island in Passamaquoddy Bay. Some of the items which he received in exchange for cod fish and scale fish

were: meal, rum, pork, tea, tobacco, molasses, boys shoes, "Sundry goods." "Sett Cupps and Saucers," rigging and nails."

In my search, I have also reasoned that he may have been the son of a Loyalist who emigrated to Canada after the Revolutionary War since many of the original settlers in that part of New Brunswick went there after the conflict as followers of the Crown. The National Archives of Canada has military records for several John Holmeses who served with the British during the Revolutionary War, 19 and the Department of Natural Resources for the Province of New Brunswick has land grants which were acquired by a few John Holmeses. 20

An 1843 petition for land at Beaver Harbor by a John Holmes reads:

"To His Excellency Sir W.M.G. Colebrooke, K.H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick. The Petition of John Holmes Humbly Sheweth

That he is a British Subject, and desirous of purchasing for actual settlement 100 acres of Crown land situated as follows:

In Pennfield, Charlotte County and being the ungranted lots nos. 23, 25, 26, 27, 40 and 41 in the extent of Ten acre lots at Beaver Harbor and to adjoin lands located to Peter McCurdy there being no improvements thereon. Agreeably to the Regulations passed in Council on the 11th May 1843.

And as in duty bound will ever pray. (signed) John Holmes."21

The above petition no doubt was submitted either by my ancestor, John Holmes, or his son, John Holmes. Lot number 23 was originally granted to a William Holmes but it appears that he never claimed it nor occupied it; therefore, it probably reverted to the Crown. Land grant records at the Department of Natural Resources for the Province of New Brunswick, reveal that, in 1852, my greatgrandfather, Lewis Holmes acquired some of these lots: nos. 25, 27, 40 and 41. Lewis Holmes was the husband of Mary Cross,

daughter of Christopher Cross and granddaughter of Elias Wright one of the directors of a Quaker colony at Beaver Harbor in 1785.23

A few years ago I discovered that replicas of town records existed for the Parish of Pennfield, New Brunswick, for the years 1820 to 1822. Beaver Harbor is located in this Parish. The old papers contain a property valuation for citizens in the Parish who were liable for taxes. My ancestor, John Holmes, is named in them and his property in 1820 is described as four acres of cleared land and one cow. His assessment for taxes appears in other pages of the document and his name is among a list of citizens of the parish who are liable for their share of statute labor on a town road.

Lydia, wife of John Holmes¹, died at Beaver Harbor in 1844. She was buried in a cemetery in Pennfield. A gravestone marks her burial place and the epitaph reads: "The memory of Lydia wife of John Holmes who died Feb. 10, 1844 in the 62nd year of her age."

John Holmes¹, seems to have lived his final years with his daughter, Catherine (Holmes) Foley², and her family in Pennfield²⁵. According to a genealogy book²⁶, he probably died in 1859 but I have not found an official obituary, place of burial nor gravestone.

Although a relatively poor fisherman, owning but "Four acres of land and a cow," the wealth of this ancestor, John Holmes', seems to have been his family since among his descendents are pioneers in manufacturing, doctors, sea captains, engineers, college professors, statisticians and librarians.

My hope is, that one day another relative or descendent will continue the search for answers to the unsolved mystery of my "number 1" ancestor.

Just Another Cemetery That Time Forgot

The location of the old Wark Family burial ground in lower Andover, Victoria County was known (until now) to only a few people. The property, more recently known to local inhabitants as the Luke Cotê property, appears to be a grant of land originally granted to David Wark. (David Wark appears on the cadastral map but his name is not listed in the Crown Land Index Book). The burial ground is not easy to pinpoint. Generally speaking the farm is some distance from the junction of the lower Andover road exit to the Trans Canada Highway. Proceeding northward from this junction following the Trans Canada, the searcher must turn on the first dirt road to the right. This dirt road runs the extent of the Cotê property ending near the driveway to the house. The grave site is nearer the T.C. Highway, on the right side of the dirt road. It is nestled behind a small knoll heavily bushed and completely overgrown with thorns. Although the last death recorded on any stone was 1930, the site has escaped vandalism and the white slab stones are in excellent condition, having some natural protection from wind and rain. Only one of the eight gravestones has fallen, presently lying flat with face upward. The inscriptions on this stone are clear. The stones form a horseshoe pattern. Interested researchers, before visiting this site, should obtain permission of the owner as the cemetery rests on private land. It is interesting to note that stone #3 was engraved by J.& R. Milligan. If the stone had been engraved and brought up river from Saint John in 1846, it may have been brought by steamboat as far as Woodstock, but it would have then been necessary to use tow boats, probably horse drawn, to bring the stone the remainder of the way.

Land Petitions show that David Wark and his son John moved to Andover Parish, then part of Carleton County in 1825 where they purchased a milling operation from Robert and William Murphy. According to the 1851 Census for Lower Andover or Tomlinson Settlement, James, Jacob, Martha, Lilly Ann, John and Joseph Wark arrived in New Brunswick in May 1823.

The Grangeville Cemetery sits behind the Grangeville United Baptist Church, some five miles outside Harcourt. Although most of the fifty-five stones present at the time of transcription date from this century, a relatively large number offer no indication of maiden names for married women. 

St. Mary's Cemetary: Insights into the Irish Catholic Community of Saint John at mid-century

By MARY KILFOIL MCDEVITT

Ninessenth century New Erunswick society was utterly transformed by the arrival, during the first half of that century, of tens of thousands of hish immigrants. The tricke of immigration during the early years quickly accelerated to a steady stream, and from 1840 to 1850, an inundation.

The bulk of those immigrants were funnelled into the province through the port of Saint John. Though countiess thousands passed through the city in search of greener pastures, thousands of others stayed on. By midcentury, half of the heads of households in the Loyelist City were, in fact, Irish.

From the start, Irish immigration to the city had been a dual stream of Catholic and Protestant, and though, in the beginning, they shared to a certain extent, the antipathy of the native population, Irish Protestants were more easily assimilated into the overwhelmingly Protestant environment. Any cultural similarities that Irish Catholics shared with their Protestant countrymen were unable to transcend religious differences, and a separate Irish Catholic community took root. By the time St. Mary's Cometery opened in 1853, a distinct, well-defined trish Catholic culture had evolved in Saint John. St. Mary's Cemetery is the legacy of that culture, and as such, mirrors not only the social and economic structure of the society, but reflects as well, their values, beliefs and traditions. Though the Cemetery contains the graves of many once prominent citizens, for the most part, the people who are buried there are ordinary men and women, with no particular claim to fame, but whose offspring still comprise a major portion of the population of modern day Saint John. indeed, the "geneelogical trails" of untold thousands of Irish Canadians and Irish Americans lead eventually to the windswept knoll where the tombstones of St. Mary's stand guard over little pieces of Ireland.

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BOOK REVIEW

"Tracing Your Scottish Ancestors"

What, I can hear you say, yet another "trace your family history" book; no, not just another, for Kathleen Cory has a new approach to helping us with our family history. She takes us carefully through the Statutory Registers, Censuses and OPRs at New Register House, explaining as she goes, how each of the three prime sources has varied over the years. This is followed by an introduction to the source material to be found in the Scottish Record Office (for a detailed insight to the SRO see Cecil Sinclair's book) and a summary of other sources.


The main narrative section of the book ends with an assortment of chapters covering, Names, Heraldry, Clans and Tartans, Present Day Relatives and finally a Question and Answer Section. I found in each of these chapters either a little gem of information or else the explosion of a long held myth. Both the beginner and the experienced will find something useful among the illustrations. For me it was the Sheriff Court Commissary Index.

The second part of the book is devoted to Appendices containing a Glossary, the usual list of addresses of Archives, Libraries etc, an exhaustive list of Parishes giving their Counties and Commissariots, a Book List and sample forms for recording your work. While the book list may be a little selective, the Parish list with its counties and commissariots is truely comprehensive and it alone would make the book worth buying, providing, as it does, all the parish numbers and commissariots where testaments of parishioners of each parish have been confirmed, with in all cases the earliest date of a confirmation in each commissariot.

The final part of the book is an easy step by step guide to get the beginner well on his/her way.

Mrs Cory and her team have produced a book which is both user friendly and yet of value to the beginner and the experienced alike. I personally would have bought it for the parish index alone. It bears the hallmark of the experienced practitioner and lecturer and I feel that it could well become the standard primer for the family history researcher in Scotland.

The Other Chesapeake Affair

Many Maritime historians have heard of the famous capture of the Chesapeake during the War of 1812-14. However, few recount the tale of the 'other' Chesapeake during the American Civil War. During the struggle between the Confederacy and the Union, thousands of Maritimers eagerly volunteered their services in both armies. Saint John newspapers were careful to take a diplomatic stance. The ports of Saint John and Halifax were important trade centres for the Union commerce and those Confederate privateers who succeeded in running the Union blockade.

By 1863, the port of Saint John had become an important ship-building centre and a centre of world trade. It was here that a number of clandestine meetings were held at a house on Charlotte St. in the community of Lower Cove. In attendance were a number of young men from Carleton, a community situated on the west side of the St. John Harbour. Addressing the group was Capt. John Parker. He wanted twenty men to go to New York to capture a vessel on behalf of the Confederate States and that they enter the Confederate service at that very meeting. John Ring of Carleton, who was in attendance, questioned the authority of Capt. Parker for such an undertaking. A letter was produced and read aloud purportedly having been signed by Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States. At the subsequent trial, Dr. Luke P. Blackburn of Natchez, Mississippi, an intimate friend of Jefferson Davis, confirmed the signature and recognized the official seal of the Confederacy. Two other residents of Carleton, Charles Watters and James Trecarten, were in attendance but chose not to embark on this course. Incredibly, others decided to join and a number sought passage for New York.

According to the testimony of Captain Eben Locke of Shelburne, N.S., Capt. John Parker was, in reality, his brother, Vernon G. Locke, who had left Shelburne about twenty years before when still a boy. Vernon Locke had resided in the United States ever since. His family was then believed to be residing in Fayetville, North Carolina. In the summer of

1863, Vernon G. Locke, alias Capt. John Parker, commanded a Confederate privateer Retribution anchored at Nassau. Parker instructed Lieut. John Clibbon Braine to proceed to New York with Lieut. H.A. Parr, 2nd Lt. David Collins, Sailing Master, Tom Sayers (later said to be George Robinson) and others.

On December 4th and 5th, 1863, the steamer Chesapeake lay at Pier 9 in the North River, New York State. A few years before, the vessel had been named Totton, but had adopted the name Chesapeake when it was rebuilt. The owner was H.B. Cromwell and over the previous 17 months, the vessel had plied between New York and Portland. Chesapeake had taken on a large cargo of wine, cotton and other produce. Capt. Isaac Willett who commanded the Chesapeake, a resident of Brooklyn, N.Y. and seaman for 30 years, was been master of the vessel for 17 months. The steamer left port on Saturday, 5th at 4 o'clock in the afternoon with her crew (including stewardess) of 18 and passengers.

At 12 o'clock Sunday night, Daniel Henderson, Engineer of Portland, Maine, had completed his 'watch' and retired to bed. About an hour and a half later, he wakened to the smashing of the lower panel of his door and was confronted by four men with pistols pointed at him. He was handcuffed and locked in his room. Capt. Willett was wakened by Chief Mate Charles Johnston who informed him that Orin Shaffer, the second Engineer, had been shot. While attempting to raise the body of Shaffer, several shots were fired at the Captain. He made his way to the Pilot House where he was taken prisoner and handcuffed by Lieut. H.A. Parr. Chief Engineer James Johnson who had emigrated from Ireland to the U.S. fourteen years previous retired from the engine room at 12 o'clock. Wakened by the report of pistols, hastened to find the body of Mr. Shaffer. He grappled with Collins, but was shot by Brooks in the chin. Following the seizure of the steamer, Shaffer's body was thrown overboard. It was reported in the Saint Andrews Standard (27 January 1864) that Shaffer was a native of Nova Scotia, Henderson, who described Shaffer

as a stout able man, age 45, nearly six feet high, however, testified that Shaffer was born up the North River, State of New York.

Capt. Willett estimated that the Chesapeake was then about twenty miles N.N.E. of Cape Cod. Braine ordered the vessel to Grand Manan, N.B. It was navigated by a fellow passenger, Robert Osburne. The land first sighted was Mount Desert east of Portland. Maine. The steamer proceeded along the coast to Seal Harbour, Grand Manan. Braine, accompanied by a few others, went ashore, but returned in a few hours. He ordered Capt. Willett to vield the coasting licence and permits for the cargo and money the Captain had collected for his party, in all \$ 87. The captain was taken aft and the vessel proceeded to Saint John.

Capt. John Parker, arriving in a pilot boat, took command of the Chesapeake. With the pilot boat in tow, the vessel steamed to Dipper Harbour. Here all the passengers and crew were put on board the pilot boat, except two engineers, James Johnston and Auguste Striebeck and three fireman, Patrick Connor, Mr. Tracy and Mr. Murphy. The party in the pilot boat consisted of Capt. Willett, Daniel Henderson, three boys, four sailors, the stewardess and five passengers, one of whom belonged thirty miles back of Saint John. The other four passengers belonged to Maine. The sixth passenger. Robert Osburne remained on the steamer. The steamer towed the pilot boat about six miles before letting go. The Captain landed in Saint John about 4 o'clock on Wednesday morning. He obtained a boat from a large ship near Partridge Island and landed ashore with four of his crew and two passengers.

The Chesapeake continued its course to Shelburne, N.S. where it arrived about 9 o'clock Thursday under the charge of Capt. Parker. Chief engineer James Johnston was placed in charge of the engine. Some of the Chesapeake's cargo was traded for coal and wood. After four or five days Braine left the vessel, never to return. The steamer proceeded to La Have and then to Sambro, N.S. Capt. Parker journeyed to Halifax returning with a schooner full of coal, two engineers and two firemen.

On December 17th, the Chesapeake was discovered by the American gunboat Ella and Annie about four miles inside Sambro and about half a mile from shore. Capt. Parker was informed by a pilot named Flinn. With no time to build steam or scuttle the boat, the Chesapeake capturers made a hasty retreat. James Johnson, immediately hoisted a flag of American colors. The gunboat, commanded by Lieut. Nichols, came alongside and boarded the steamer. On that morning, the British Schooner Investigator was at anchor in the same harbour. According to the captain, John E. Holt, Master Mariner of Halifax, N.S. -

About an hour after a boat with an armed crew started from the Elia and Annie and came alongside my schooner. [I] was below when they reached my vessel, but came on deck on hearing the noise they made coming on board. When I reached the deck. I found six or seven armed men there at work, opening the hatches of my vessel. I then asked one of them, who appeared to be an officer, to show me his authority.; he struck the pistol which was in his belt and said that was his authority... They then took away as prisoner one of the men of the Chesapeake, who was asleep in one of the cabin berths and a large quantity of trunks and baggage and other articles which had been put on board my vessel by some of the men of the Chesapeake and left the vessel... That about half past 11 o'clock I sailed from Sambro harbour in the said schooner leaving the two steamers there. I did not at the time know the name of the man who was taken from my vessel, but I have since been informed that his name is John Wade. (Morning Freeman, Dec. 29th, 1863)

Hon. George Talbot, the U.S. District Attorney for Portland was appointed to represent the U.S. Government case in Vice-Admiralty Court. Warrants of arrest were issued for three of the Chesapeake capturers, David Collins, who had been commissioned a Lieutenant by Capt. John Parker, Linus Seely of Carleton (St. John Co.) and James McKinney on a charge of conspiracy of Piracy on the High Seas. The Case of David Collins et al was to be investigated before Humphrey T. Gilbert, Police Magistrate of City and County of Saint John and Arguments before His. Honor Justice Ritchie. This was the first case which had arisen in New Brunswick under the Treaty of Extradition of 1842.

On 2nd January 1864, the New Brunswick Courier reported that Lt. David

Collins and Private McKinney were arrested by Police in the house of Mr. Wade (father of John Wade) at Loch Lomond (St. John Co.) on Sunday on application of J.Q. Howard, American Consul in accordance with the provisions of the Ashburton Treaty. Hon. John H. Gray appeared on behalf of the Confederate States as counsel for the prisoners. The St. John Globe of same date, reported that Linus Seely, who had come over from Windsor, N.S. in a schooner Wednesday, was arrested in Carleton. On February 24th, 1864, Justice Ritchie committed the accused men to gaol until they were to be handed over to U.S. authorities. However, following further arguments by respective counsel, the judge ordered their immediate discharge.

The Chesapeake 'pirates - John Wade escaped from his captors in Halifax, N.S.; According to St. Croix Herald reprinted in the Courier (12th March 1864) McDonald was arrested in Bangor, Maine on Friday.; On 21st Sept. 1865 the St. John Globe provided an account of the drowning of George Robinson off Tufts Cove, Halifax Harbour, N.S. Robinson was said to belong to St. Stephen; The Courier (12th March 1864) reported the departure of Lt. Parr from Richmond.; Braine eluded all Police efforts to capture him. The Courier 2 Jan. 1864 reported:

On Tuesday information was conveyed to this city that Braine was at Truro, on his way to Halifax from St. John; and when the train arrived in the evening it was instantly surrounded by a military guard and strong police force, but after a minute examination and close scrutiny of the passengers, it was evident Braine was not amongst them."

Subsequent newspaper reports reveal that Braine arrived safely in Wilmington. In September, 1866 the Morning Freeman announced that Braine had been arrested in the U.S. The New York Post in November 1866 which described Braine as a rebel pirate, stated that he returned to Richmond (Virginia) where he was promoted to position of master. Afterwards he went to Havana to capture New York steamers Wyoming, Evening Star and Roanoke. On 16 August 1867 the Morning News provides an account of Lt. Braine - It appears that he was arrested at Savannah where he had been engaged in business and had been since kept without trial in the Kings

County Penitentiary. He complained that not one of his southern friends have been to see him and that he was destitute of money to pay counsel to urge his case. The Morning News of June 5th, 1868 records an application by Braine for release on bail in order to procure evidence to prove he was acting as a commissioner of the Confederate Government. The application was refused on the grounds that the bail was too small to secure his attendance for trial.

Linus Seely returned to his native Saint John. He died in Hospital 5 May 1875 having been gunned down on Sheffield St. a few days earlier by Archibald Rogers following an argument in a tavern.

On December 9th, 1869 the Morning News reported: The steamer Chesapeake, the crew of which figured so conspicuously here during the late American War, has taken the place of the steamer Chase on the route between Boston, Halifax and Yarmouth.

R E John Pace has also ascertained that another ancestor, Darius Pace was the first of the family to set foot in the Maritimes, being among the V United Empire Loyalists to land in Nova Scotia I (then including New Brunswick) in 1784. E The first New Brunswick connection was made by Darius's son Fred who settled in the Kingsclear W area He and his wife, Sarah Belyea are both buried in St. Pater's Cemetery, Springhill, N.B.

Other related families include: Edmonds, Henson, Walling, Mac Eachen, Clouter, Kitchen and Woodsun.

Photostatic reproductions of a number of family documents enhance Mr Pace's work and the names' index adds to its usefulness.

The work has been accepted by the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

BRIGHAM YOUNG'S BIRTHPLACE AND PROGENITORS By Leatha Sisson

In reply to the questions in the December, 1989 issue of Generations, concerning Brigham Young, a Mormon Prophet, I wish to submit the results of my research on this subject.

Brigham Young was born 1 June 1801 at Whittingham, Widdham County, Vermont, U.S.A.. He was the son of John Young and Abigail Howe. Jehn Young was born 6 March 1763 at Hopkinton. Middlesex County, Mass., and fought in the Revolutionary War all right but on the Rebel side. His name appears on the list of Hopkinton men who registered for 6 months raised agreeable to resolve of June 5, 1780, returned as received of Maj. Joseph Hosmer, Superintendent for Middlesex County, by Justin Ely, Commissioner, dated Springfield; also, descriptive list of men raised to reinforce the Continental Army for the term of 6 months, agreeable to resolve of June 5, 1780, returned as received of Justin Ely, Commissioner, by Brig. Gen. John Glever, at Springfield, July 7, 1780; age 17 years; stature 5ft.3in; complexion, light; engaged for town of Hopkinton; marched to camp July 7, 1780, under command of Capt. Dix; also list of men raised for the 6 months service and returned by Brig. Gen. Paterson as having passed muster in a return dated Camp Totoway, Oct. 25, 1780; also pay rell for 6 months men raised by the town of Hopkinton for service in the Continental Army during 1780; marched July 4, 1780; discharged Dec. 15, 1780; service 4 mes. 22days, travel (200 miles) included''

He married 1st, 31 Oct. 1786, Abigail (Nabby) Howe, daughter of Phineas Howe and Susannah Goddard, born 3 May, 1766, Hopkinton, Middlesex County, Mass., she died 11 June 1814-15. He married 2nd, Hannah Dennis, of Tyrone, Steuben County, N.Y.. He died 12 October, 1839.

His children were; 1 Nancy bern 6 Aug. 1786, Hepkinten, Middlesex Co., Mass., 2 Fanny born 8 Nov. 1787, Hepkinten, Mass., 3 Rhoda bern 22 May 1789, Hepkinten, Mass., 4 Jehn bern 22 May 1791, Hepkinten, Mass., 5 Nabby bern 22 April, 1793, Hepkinten, Mass., 6 Susannah bern 17 June 1795, Hepkinten, Mass., 7 Jeseph bern 7 April, 1797, Hepkinten, Mass., 8 Phineas Howebern 16 Feb., 1799, Hepkinten, Mass., 9 BRIGHAM bern 1 June, 1801, Whitingham, Windham County, Verment, 10 Leuisa bern 26 Sept., 1804, Smyrna, Chenange County, N.Y., 11 Lerenze Dew bern 19 Oct., 1807, Smyrna, Chenange County, N.Y..

Brigham related how difficult it was for the family after his mother died and how he learned to make bread, wash the dishes, milk the cows, and make butter. He remembered learning to help his father clear timber off new land and cultivate the ground, also logging and driving team summer and winter, not half clad, and with insufficient food until his stemach would ache. Then

he was apprenticed to a furniture maker and house painter. He was honest as he later went into business for himself, for example, he refused to dilute the linseed oil used in making paint in order to compete with those who did.

A daughter of Brigham Young's related to the Utah Genealogical and Historical Magazine editor the following; The picture that comes to my mind of my father is the time of evening prayer, the entire room taking on the soft mellow tones of the dark red wood. Seated at a large circular table in the centre of the room is our beloved father. Calm, majestic, his eyes and smile beam with loving watchful care over us all. His wives and children are grouped around the sides of the room, each in his or her own place. Father converses with one and then another, asking about an absent child, or one of the children who has been ill; and then quietly he says, 'Let us pray, '' and we all kneel down and listen to his dear voice as he petitions our Father in Heaven to bless all of us.

I wonder if those who have condemed Brigham Young for having more than one wife were aware of the fact that he was not breaking the laws of United States at that time but later the Congress of U.S. passed laws against that doctrine. See; Encyclopedia Americana under his name, also check records of Congress.

In a General Conference of the Church on 6 October 1890. pelygamy was efficially abolished by the Church and since that time has not been approved by the Church leaders and if members practise it or commit adultery and refuse to repent they are excommunicated from the church. I know that fact to be true. Once they are excommunicated they may do those things but are in no way members of the church and the church is not responsible for their actions. My husband and I have served as fulltime missionaries and as Temple Workers and attended training sessions by General authorities and worked under their direct supervision and held responsible positions and assingments and know the doctrine of the church and can truthfully say we are always taught to obey the laws of the land/. One of the Articles of Faith of the Church is: We believe in being subject to kings, presidents, rulers, magistrates, in obeying, honoring, and sustaining the law. Also we believe in being honest, true, virtuous, chaste, benevelent, and in doing good to all men.

The State of Utah, Department of Administrative Services, Division of archives & Records Service, replied to my inquiry concerning their records of Brigham Young with quotes from a book entitled; Brigham Young: American Moses, by Leonard J. Arrington, published by alfred A. Knopf, New York, 1985, which includes a Chronology Of Events In The Life Of Brigham Young, some of these I list as follows:

According to William H. Seward, U.S. Secretary of State under Abraham Lincoln, America never produced a greater statesman than Brigham Young.

Following are some interesting facts about him compiled in Dictionary of American Biography:

He was President of the Mormon Church for 30 years, the longest in Church History.

He not only led the saints in their great exedus from Nauvoo, but also directed the colonization of the Mountain West and brought thousands of colonists from through-out the world to settle the west.

He established the provisional State of Deseret in 1849; it became a territory in 1850, and the State of Utah in 1896. He was the first governor of the Territory of Utah, serving 8 years.

He established institutions of learning, including what later became the University of Utah and the Brigham Young University. He built countless roads and canals, and founded numerous social, economic, and cultural institutions, and supervised the building of extensive telegraph lines and railroads.

He planted an experimental farm to determine which crops would best flourish in Utah. His work in crep irrigation set patterns for generations to come. In 1984 the Chairman of the Church History Department at Brigham Young University, Prove, Utah, began plans for a separate symposium including travel to historic sites in New England, the birth place of Mormonism. In 1985 a group of Professors of the University flew east and chartered a Greyhound bus to take them to Fox Islands, Rockland, Me., Boston, where they toured the Freedom Trail, Franklin Hall, Boylston Hall, some lectured at Philip Brooks House on Harvard Campus, and many other historic sites and on to Vermont to find first hand information on the birth places of Joseph Smith and Brigham Young and many early members of the church.

I have obtained permission to use part of their report of findings as published by the Department of Church History at Brigham Young University in 1988, entitled; 'Regional Studies in Latter-day Saint Church History- New England.'' I have selected the fellowing:

The Youngs made the move from Hopkinton, Mass., to Whitingham, Verment in January 1801. John Young paid \$100. for land and built a cabin on the site. They had relatives in that area so historians assume they lived with them until the cabin was ready.

They found a menument on what is supposed to be the spot of Brigham Youngs birth cabin, erected before the turn of the century and that postcards of the monument were around in 1900. The inscription on the stone reads, 'Brigham Young, bern on this spot 1801, a man of much courage and superb equipment.' It is recorded that John Young lived on the five-acre lot of land on Town Hill, owned by his brother in law, Joseph Mosely. The said Hill also known as Brigham Young Hill and the above mentioned Monument is placed 0.2 miles up Brigham Young Hill, west of Brown's General Store and the U.S. Post Office, which are at the bottom of the hill on the Vermont State Highway 100. The former site of Whitingham Centre has become Town Hill Memorial Park. Here in 1950 another Monument was erected in honor of Brigham Young, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, The inscription on this monument reads as fellows; CHURCH LEADER- COLONIZER- STATESMAN

Born in town of Whitingham, Vermont, June 1, 1801. Leader of Mormon Pioners from Nauvoo, Illinois to the Rocky Mountains, arriving in the Valley of the Great Salt Lake July 24, 1847 Second President of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, serving from December 27, 1847 until his death at Salt Lake City, Utah, August 29, 1877.

His statue occupies a place in Statuary Hall, National Capitol, Washington, D.C.

One grave, on Shepody Bay, near Hopewell Hill, Hopewell P., Albert Co. N.B. in a corner of a pasture, above Highway #114, and the railway, overlooking the marshes; on land now owned by Lord and Francis Tucker. Henry Hayward is buried there.

He was buried on a "knoll" on his own land. Gravestone is still legible. The inscription reads:

Distance from United Baptist Church, Goshen, along Upper Goshen Road is 2.2 Kilometres, in forest, above road embankment on left side. Gravestones were flattened (from logging operations) and buried in undergrowth.



We, (Lucille Hayward of Montreal, Que. and) myself (Eunice M. Franks - nee Hayward) assisted By Mr. and Mrs. C. Babcock of Goshen, located eight grave markers (only six legible). We dug them out, propped them against trees, cleaned and outlined inscriptions and took pictures. We recorded the inscriptions, and drew a plan. The graves are roughly in rows. There may be others.
