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Part I

PIONEERS OF KINGS COUNTY

Among the first settlers of Sussex and vicinity, Kings County, N.B., was the Freeze family. According to Howard Trueman's 'THE CHIGNECTO ISTHMUS' published in 1902, on March 16, 1772, William Freeze, Sr. sailed from Liverpool, England, aboard the 'Duke of York' and after a voyage lasting six weeks, four days, arrived at Halifax, N.S. The Freeze family were among the first emigrants of Yorkshire, England, to come to the Atlantic Provinces.

William Freeze Sr. remained but a short time at Halifax. It was supposed that the vessel in which he took passage for England was lost at sea, as his family never heard from him again.

Accompanying his father aboard the 'Duke of York' was William Freeze Jr. and his wife, the sister of George Bulmer who arrived shortly after. William Jr., a mason by trade, settled on a farm at Amherst Point, N.S. Cyrus Black wrote in 'The History of the Black Family' in 1885, "They lived upon the farm now owned by the Keillor brothers and other adjoining lands, a large area being marsh. The marsh at that time grew grass of inferior quality, and it was almost universal opinion that it was destined for nother better."

Following the death of his first wife, William Freeze, on June 2, 1791, married Jerusha, widow of David Stone of Sackville, N.B.

In 1801 the Freeze family moved to Upper Sussex (Penobsquis), N.B. Trueman provides the following account of their journey: "It is said that Mr. Freeze and his two sons started in a small boat for Kentucky. When they got as far as the mouth of the Petitcodiac River they turned their boat up the stream, going with the tide up the river. Leaving the boat they plunged into the forest and tramped for some distance. At last they concluded they had lost their way and were not likely to reach Kentucky on that route.

"After some consultation, the father climbed to the top of a tall tree, and from this altitude the rich interval lands of the Upper Kennebecasis were in full view. 'There is a valley,' said Mr. Freeze, 'and there is where my bones are to be laid.' Here Mr. Freeze obtained a grant for himself and his four sons; viz., Samuel, William, John, and Charles. In his will of January 18th, 1812, William names two daughters, Miriam, wife of Matthew Fenwick and Mary, wife of Thomas Black. H.A. McArthur writes in 'The History of the Freeze Family', "William and his second wife are buried in an old cemetery on the McQuinn farm at Penobsquis. His tombstone says that he died in 1812, aged 67 years."

William, son of William and (Bulmer) Freeze, petitioned in 1825 for 200 acres of land in Sussex Parish. Howard Trueman provides the following description: "William was a great reader and student. He was very fond of mathematics, and it is said that sometimes when he and his boys would go to the field to hoe, he would take a stick and mark on the ground a mathematical figure, and then demonstrate it for their benefit. The dinner horn would sound, and no potatoes had been hoed that morning." His children included William, George, Edwin, Mary, Ann, Josiah, Sherman, Vina, and Jerusha. George Freeze married Almira McCready, April 3, 1851; Edwin married Hannah Hall November 16, 1843; William married Margaret Ryan April 3, 1834; Josiah became a teacher, but died about 1847; Sherman married Hannah C. English November 13, 1847, and had the following children: Edward W., Ann, Elizabeth, Mario, William, Jerusha, and Margaret.

Howard Trueman describes John, a son of William and (Bulmer) Freeze: "John was a fine singer and took great pleasure in giving singing lessons to the young in the neighborhood. The Freezes could all sing, and most of the men were handy with mason tools which led some to say that the Freezes were all born with the mason tools in one hand and a notebook in the other." John Freeze married Nancy Snider. Their children included: Charles married Ellen Hopper; Samuel married July 18, Sarah E. Morton; John married May 24, 1845 Ann Cleaveland; Elias married Isabel Freeze, and Sarah married Elijah McLeod.

Charles, son of William and Jerusha(Stone) Freeze, according to Trueman, was a great reader and very fond of history. "He was eccentric in some ways and would take long journeys on foot. He did not take kindly to railway travel, and his nephews like to tell about his planning one day to go by rail instead of walking; but going to the station

before the train arrived, he said he "couldn't be detained" and started away on foot." Charles married Susan McGready. Their children included: Ansen, married Elizabeth Miller; Harvey died 1904; Isabel married Elias Freeze; Rachel married George Harper; Edmund married Jane Anthony; baby girl.

Perhaps the best known of the Freeze family was Samuel, son of William and (Bulmer)Freeze. Samuel was born May 31st, 1778 at Amherst, Cumberland County, Nova Scotia, and probably was with his father on their journey to 'Kentucky'. He was first elected as Conservative representative for Kings County to the General Assembly in 1819. Though defeated twice, 1820 and 1830, he retained his seat in all other elections until his death April 4, 1844. Grace Aiton in "The Story of Sussex and Vicinity" noted: "Samuel built the first brick house on his property so substantially that it lasted almost a century. As a Member of the Legislature, he took his duties so seriously that on one occasion he strapped on his snowshoes and made his way across country to attend the mid-winter sessions at Fredericton."

Samuel had a family of 21 children - 7 by his first wife Margaret, daughter of William Wells of Point de Bute, N.B. They included: Polly married Thompson Trueman, Jane married Henry Chapman, Miriam married George Ryan, Betsy married George Chappell, Margaret married Stephen Chapman, Susan married Lewis Wells, Milcah married Richard Carter.

Nine children by his second wife Bethia, daughter of Allen Wager (a Loyalist formerly of Morris County, New Jersey), namely, Eliza married first to William T. McArthur, second to James Edwin Johnson, Emma married Robert McArthur, Lavisa married Caleb McGready, Hiram married widow Noah, Maria married Alexander McLeon, Almira married Seth McLeod, Alfred Freeze. Samuel died early, and Abner married Elizabeth Morton.

There were six children by his third wife, Margaret Scott, namely, Howard Freeze, Caroline married Nelson McLeod, Brougham married Emma McLeod, Loretta married Douglas Morton, Harris married Nellie Belsh, and Samuel Nelson Freeze.

According to 'The Weekly Record', Sussex, N.B., November 18, 1898, "Samuel N. Freeze (son of Samuel and Margaret (Scott) Freeze) was born in the old brick house, now owned by Byron McLeod, Penobsquis, on 15th February 1831. The advantages of getting an education were then few and the subject of these remarks was obliged to travel a considerable distance for the purpose of attending the district school, in which he must have studied diligently, as he in subsequent years was sufficiently informed to transact business in a very satisfactory manner. His father dying in 1844, young Samuel was obliged to take charge of his father's business which prepared him at an early age to transact business. After attaining his majority he worked a few years in the Albert Mines where he was greatly liked, and on leaving was offered the position as foreman, but concluded not to accept. On his return to his native County, he drove the stage between Saint John and Moncton for a few years, after which he was appointed Deputy Sheriff by Sheriff Earl. The latter dying in the early part of 1863, a pretty active canvass was made for this office by no less number than 45. Mr. Freeze received the appointment 25th February 1863.

Samuel married Sarah Jane McLeod in 1861. Their children were Frederick, Samuel, Bliss, and two daughters.

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JACK'S 'BIOGRAPHICAL REVIEW' is an excellent source of information for the genealogist both in and out of New Brunswick. It contains information on hundreds of prominents in N.B. during the last century. Biographies in many cases contain much genealogical info, and in some cases, such information goes back to the 17th century. It is available at the Provincial Archives and the New Brunswick Museum, as well as the Legislative Library in Fredericton, and many community libraries.

## NOTES ON EARLY SUNBURY COUNTY SETTLERS

The following notes are very rough, but do provide substantial information on some early York and Sunbury County families. They were given to me in a very disjointed form some years ago, and do not, in all cases, provide a lot of necessary information, but perhaps it will be of some help to some of our members.

DANIEL BROWN - 1816-1869, married Susan Ackerson 1829-1900. Their children were Norman O., 1853-1932, married Annie Cox; Theodocin, 1854-1933; M. Newton 1856-1940, of Boston; Guilford D., 1858-1946, of Boston; Byron W., 1860-1945, lived in Carleton Co., N.B.; Laura A., 1862-1887; and Bruce D., 1866-1948, of Westfield, Maine, U.S.A.

Daniel's father was Jonathan Brown, 1770-1839. His wife Rebecca Cogswill was born in 1783, died 1867. Their children were: David 1804-1859; Rebecca 1806-1863; Sarah, born and died in 1809; Elizabeth 1811-1889; Esther 1813-1893; Daniel(above); Gilbert 1819-1902; James, born and died in 1821; and Margaret 1824-1862.

### NOBLE FAMILY -

Thomas Noble I, 1632-1704, came from England and settled in Westfield, Massachusetts.

Thomas Noble II, 1666-1750

Thomas Noble III, 1695-1775

REV. SETH NOBLE, 1743-1807, born in Westfield, Massachusetts, came to Maugerville, N.B. and married Hannah Barker, who was several years his senior. When the Revolutionary War broke out, the Rev. Noble returned to Massachusetts and served in the American Army. He, at one time, preached in Bangor, Maine, and it is he who is said to be responsible for naming that town.

Their children were: Seth 1777-1793; Sarah 1785-1836; Joseph 1783-1869; and Benjamin 1787-1860.

BENJAMIN NOBLE married Susan Currier in Fredericton, N.B. Their children were: Hannah, born Dec. 30, 1810; George, born Jan. 15, 1812; Joseph, born Aug. 14, 1815; Enoch, born Aug. 11, 1818; Harding, born Sept. 25, 1820; Rebecca, born May 13, 1823; Isaacher, born Dec. 25, 1825; David, born Feb. 18, 1828; and Eliza, born Aug. 7, 1831.

Hannah Noble married John Ackerson. Their daughter Susan married Daniel Brown(above mentioned).

### ACKERSON FAMILY -

John Ackerson married Hannah Noble on January 25, 1827. Their children were: Katherine 1827-1865; Susan 1829-1900; Jacob 1831-1855; Benjamin 1833-1849; George, born 1836; Thomas 1838-1851; Harding 1841-1906; John L. 1843-1922; Joseph 1849-1920; Doris Byron 1852-1925; Hannah 1854-1921; and Charles 1857-1926.

"... Re your queries in the N.B. Genealogical Soc. newsletter of April 1980, the following is an extract from the Sherwood and Pickel Genealogy by W.U. Pickel.

Thomas Sherwood "The Pioneer" b. 1586 sailed from Ipswich, Suffolk, England and landed at Plymouth, Mass. in 1634 with his wife Alice and part of his first family. In 1648 we find him settled in Fairfield Co., Conn. His will proved in 1655 contains the names of the following children:

1. Thomas m.(a) Sarah Wheeler, children Thomas and Sarah; (b) Ann Tumey, children Ben, Sam and three girls; (c) Elizabeth Cable, children Isaac and Phoebe.

2. Jane. 3. Tamsen. 4. Margaret. 5. Sarah. 6. Hannah. 7. Rose. 8. Rebecca.

Thomas Sr. married secondly to Mary Fitch, daughter of Thomas Fitch and Anne Reeve, Essex Co., England. Their children were: 9. Stephen. 10. Matthew. 11. Mary. 12. Ruth. 13. Abigail. 14. Isaac.

Stephen Sherwood married first to Rebecca Tumey. Their children were: (1) Stephen Jr. 1667-1713, Fairfield & Rye, N.Y.; (2) Joseph Sr. 1669-1748; (3) Daniel, 1715, Fairfield, Connecticut; (4) Mary 1696, 2nd wife of Daniel Burr; (5) Nathaniel 1672-1733 - 9 children; (6) Jabez 1704, Greenwich, Connecticut, unmarried; (7) Jonathan, Rye, N.Y.

Stepehn Sherwood married second to Hannah Jackson and lived at Fairfield and Rye, N.Y. Their children were (8) Samuel, 1743; (9) Andrew, 1735, Rye, N.Y. his son Dan; (10) John, 1731, Rye, N.Y.; (11) Ruth, married Nat. Merritt, 3 sons and one daughter.

Joseph Sherwood married Elizabeth Bloomer, Rye, N.Y. Their children were: (1) Joseph Jr., sold land in Rye in 1751 and bought Cortland Manor, living there in 1771; (2) Elizabeth, married Sam Purdy, at Rye, N.Y.; (3) Phoebe, married Gil Bloomer at Rye, N.Y.

Joseph Sherwood Jr. m. ? Children were: (1) Andrew 1738-1823 m.(a) Martha Currey, 1741-1778, she died in N.Y., seven children born there. Home robbed, they fled to the British lines in 1778, there a child was born and the mother died. (b) Widow McCready at Hampton, one child Phoebe Fugsley. (2) Justus 1742-1826 born Cortland Manor, N.Y. (3) Adiah, m. came to N.B. but returned to U.S.A. except for a married daughter. (4) Jonathan m. came but returned to U.S.A.

Justus m. Sarah Clark 1743-1794. Children were (1) Mary b. 5 July 1764, d. 12 Feb. 1766 (2) Elizabeth b. 26 May 1767, d. 14 Oct. 1847 m.(a) Weeden Fowler, (b) Jesse Gillies; (3) Ruth, b. 11 Jan 1769, d. 6 Jan. 1794 m. Col. David B. Wetmore, Judge; (4) Deborah b. 7 Dec. 1770 m. Col Caleb Wetmore; (5) Sarah b 11 July 1773 m. ? Fowler; (6) Justus Jr. b. 10 Mar 1775; (7) Rachel b. 1 Mar 1777 d. 1841 m. Josiah Wetmore; (8) Jacob b. 23 Mar. 1779 m. Elizabeth Clark; (9) Joseph b. 2 Mar. 1781 d. June 1793.

Justus Sherwood of Cortland Manor, N.Y. fought on the British side and came to Saint John, N.B. with his family on the 18 May 1783. He received Lot No. 783 on east side of the harbor, and later Lots 2 and 3, twenty miles from Saint John at the mouth of Hammond River. He sold these to McCready Bros. after the death of his first wife. In 1796 he married the widow Ann Griffith. Their children were: (10) Charles, b. 23 Feb. 1797; (11) Stephen b. 7 Aug. 1798; (12) Sophia b. 21 April 1800 m. Thomas Malony; (13) Frances b. 23 Mar. 1802 m. Isaac Munger; (14) William b. 30 Sept. 1804 m. Sarah F.; (15) Adiah Jr. b. 7 Mar. 1807 m. Elizabeth Hill..... "

FLOWER - reply to query - George Hayward

".... This is in response to your query in the New Brunswick Genealogical Society Newsletter No. 4, April 1980 regarding Gilbert Flower who died after 1835 in Queens County, N.B.

Your Gilbert Flower and my Gilbert Flowers may not be one and the same, but the name is so similar that it may be of interest to you.

In her 'Genealogy of the Anglo-Dutch Estabrooks Family of the Saint John River, New Brunswick' by Florence C. Estabrooks, Saint John, N.B., 1935, she indicates that Sarah Jane, daughter of Zebedee Ring & Mary(Williams) Estabrooks, b. 20 May 1845, d. Jul.1915, married Gilbert Flowers. Zebedee & May Estabrooks lived at Swan Creek, Sunbury County, N.B. The only additional information given is the names of Gilbert & Sarah Jane Flowers' children: Rose, Priscilla, Stephen, George and Alice.

If Gilbert Flowers was approximately the same age as his wife, he may have been a younger man than your Gilbert Flower.

Alice, daughter of Gilbert & Sarah Jane(Estabrooks) Flowers, was born at Burton, Sunbury County, N.B., 6 Sep 1879, and died at East Brighton, Carleton County, N.B., 21 Apr 1927. She married, 30 Mar 1898, Horace E. Shaw, and they were my wife's paternal grandparents.

I am enclosing a booklet containing 21 pages of genealogy, the Family Record of Horace E. and Alice(Flowers) Shaw, which I prepared in 1974. All those listed are, of course, descendants of Gilbert and Sarah Jane(Estabrooks) Flowers. If you find there is a connection between your Gilbert Flower and my Gilbert Flowers, it may be useful to you..."

CLINCH - reply to query - Helengrace Lancaster Brown

"...Subject: A wild guess, no basis in fact, ANSWER to Query Q59 by addressee (George Hayward) page 24, New Brunswick Genealogical Society Newsletter #4, April 1980: Where did Ann and Rufus Clinch and ch. live after 1831?

Any possibility at Lancaster River? (Post Office 1847-1869), to delineate the limits of the Lancaster Mill Company.

Lancaster River became the East Branch of the Musquash River.

The town was called Ivanhoe, probably named by the Lancaster Mill Co. in association with names chosen from Scott's books for lakes in that region, chosen by M.H. Perley. Ivanhoe became Clinch's Mills, named after Charles F. Clinch, postmaster there 1885-1914. Musquash is east on the coast from St. George and 15 miles SW of Saint John, N.B. Ref: Geographical Names of New Brunswick by Alan Rayburn, 1975.

CHARLES HARRISON, Honorable - Born 1792 at Cambridge, Queens County, son of Lieutenant James Harrison(1748-March 15, 1805), a lieutenant in the Loyalist forces, and his wife Charity Cowperthwaite of a Loyalist Quaker family from Pennsylvania.

Harrison was educated at the Cambridge Public School, where he located and engaged in farming. In 1847, he moved with his family to Mauderville and resided there until his death. He married Mary Burpee, daughter of Jeremiah Burpee and wife Betsey Stickney.

He was first elected to the House of Assembly as a member for Queens at the general election of June 1827 with the Hon. Harry Peters. Re-elected at the general election of 1830 by acclamation and sat as a member until the dissolution of the Legislature in 1834 when he retired. On the 21st of February, 1849, he was called to a seat in the Legislative Council of N.B. and continued as a member of that house until 1874 when he resigned.

He died on 8 May 1879 at Mauderville and is buried in the old Congregational Cemetery in Sheffield. His wife died April 20, 1877.

James, the father, was a native of Antrim, Ireland, who emigrated to South Carolina in 1767. At the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, he sided with the Crown and with his brother Charles Harrison(1747-March 14 1800) enlisted in the New Jersey Volunteers. In 1777 he became an ensign and on May 28, 1778, a Lieutenant in the 3rd Btn. He served during the War under General Sir Henry Clinton, and at its close came with the regiment to Saint John, N.B. He was retired on half pay and settled on a grant of land at Cambridge.

He married on 9 April 1789, to Charity Cowperthwaite. He died at Cambridge on 15 March 1805. His brother Charles also settled in Queens County.

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"Subject: Suggestions for Newsletter -

1. CLIPPINGS RELEVANT TO MOREHOUSE FAMILY - from scrapbooks kept by Dr. Oscar Emery Morehouse, August 5, 1857 - January 1, 1935, member of the New Brunswick Legislature from 1910 to 1917 - now in possession of Eugene Campbell.

MARRIED - At Christ Church Cathedral, Fredericton, on Feb. 16th, by Rev. Sub-Dean Street, Oscar E. Morehouse, M.D., and E. Maud Burt, daughter of Henry Burt, Esq., all of Upper Keswick.

September 17, 1912 - REV. L. B. MCKEIL DEAD AT FAIRVILLE St. John, N.B., Sept. 17 - Rev. L. B. McKel, one of the oldest Anglican clergymen in the diocese died at his home in Fairville, a St. John suburb, this morning aged 71. He leaves three sons and three daughters. The deceased was for 47 years a clergyman and was for a number of years stationed at Burt's Corner. One of his daughters was the first wife of Dr. O.E. Morehouse, M.P.P.

January 27, 1934 - VITAL STATISTICS FOR MONTH - On account of the cold weather and condition of the roads, Dr. O.E. Morehouse was unable to come to Fredericton last night for the meeting of the Fredericton Sub-District Board of Health and as a consequence no meeting was held. The statistics as given out by the secretary, Mrs. E. M. Farrell, show 22 births, six marriages and 16 deaths.

O. E. MOREHOUSE DIES IN HOSPITAL - Jan. 1, 1935 - Dr. Oscar E. Morehouse, 77-year-old life-long resident of Upper Keswick, York County, died at Victoria Public Hospital here early today, the ninth anniversary of his appointment as district medical health officer. Dr. Morehouse's six-month leave of absence from that office, after which he was to retire, expired yesterday. He had been in failing health for some time, but his fatal illness was of only a few week's duration.

Dr. Morehouse had an active public career, both in municipal and provincial affairs. Born at Upper Keswick on Aug. 5, 1857, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Elisha Morehouse of that place. He turned his hand to many activities in order to earn his medical education, which culminated when he graduated with the degree of doctor of medicine from McGill University at the age of 32 in 1889.

Dr. Morehouse returned to Upper Keswick where he carried on his duties as a country doctor until appointed health officer for the western district of New Brunswick, which includes the counties of Victoria, Carleton, York and Sunbury and the City of Fredericton, on Jan. 1, 1926. At that time he succeeded the late Dr. J.A. Wade, of this city, who was the first medical health officer for that district, under the present act which came into effect in 1918. Dr. Morehouse carried on those duties until July 1 last when he was granted leave of absence on account of ill health.

For several years, Dr. Morehouse was a member of the York County Council and for one served as warden of York County. In 1910, in a by-election as a supporter of the Flemming government he was elected to the Legislative Assembly and in the general election of 1912 he was re-elected, retiring in 1917.

An ardent sportsman, at one time he was president of what was then known as the York-Sunbury Fish and Game Protective Association, and he maintained on his own property a private trout pond which was kept well stocked. He was chairman of the local board of health before the present Health Act came into existence and among his duties under the act were included the chairmanship of the Fredericton sub-district board of health. Included in these duties also were health lectures given by him at the Provincial School here.

He was a member of the York-Sunbury Historical Society, Ltd., and was active among the Independent Order of Foresters.

Surviving are his wife, one daughter by a previous marriage, Mrs. O. Branscombe of Moncton, and two sons and two daughters, Dr. Oscar Morehouse of Montreal, and Rupert, a student at the Fredericton High School here; Mrs. Charles Barter, Saskatchewan, and Evelyn, a nurse-in-training at Montreal; as well as three brothers, Albert of Burt's

r, Horace of Houlton, Maine, and Avery, of Zealand Station.

Morehouse was born in the old homestead which had been located at Zealand. The one of two on the same original granted land, had been built by Daniel Morehouse, Dr. Morehouse's grandfather, around 1810. It had remained in the family, either in the Brewer of the Morehouse line, until 1961, at which time it was torn down. The last owners were Archie and Aletha(Brewer) Campbell. The property still remains in the Campbell family.

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# NOTES ON THE LAWRENCE FAMILY OF AMERICA ---

Concerning your ancestors, New York Herald (c.1900) by Mrs. Clara H. Manning.

LAWRENCE HERALDRY - The coat of arms illustrated above is that of the Lawrence and described by Burke in his "General Armory" as Lawrence of Ashton Hall and county Lancaster; Prior's Court and Sevenhampton, county Gloucester; Fisbury Wilts; Crich Grange, county Dorset, and St. James', county Suffolk; descend Robert Lawrence, of Ashton Hall, who accompanied Richard I to the Holy Land fame at the siege of Acre, obtained for his arms, "Ar, a cross reguly gu. turbot, ar. tail upward."

Motto - Quaero, invenio. Sir Robert Lawrence, of Ashton Hall, in Lancas was the first ancestor of the family that we have any knowledge of. He Richard Coeur de Lion in his famous expedition to Palestine, where he d self in the seige of St. Jean d'Acre, in 1119, by being first to plant cross on the battlements of that town, for which he was knighted by K' also received a coat of arms, the impression of which is still preser appended to a document of William Lawrence, in 1680, and of Richard These seals can be seen in the Surrogate's office, New York City. prominent in England. Sir John Lawrence, the ninth in descent from owned thirty-four manors, the revenue of which was £6,000 per annu

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a gentleman usher of King Henry VII, he was outlawed and died in exile in France without issue. Ashton Hall and his estates passed to his relatives, Lord Monteagle and Gerard. The Washington and Lawrence families are connected by marriage.

Sir James Lawrence married Matilda Washington in the reign of Henry III. One Henry Lawrence, of distinction during Cromwell's time was born in 1600, entered Emanuel College, Cambridge, 1622, was a member of Parliament for Westmorland in 1641, but withdrew when the life of the King was in jeopardy from the independents. He contributed much to the setting up of the Protector, for which service he was made Lord President of the Protector's Council, being also one of the Lords of the other House. He married Amy, daughter of Sir Edward Peyton, Bart., of Iselham, in Cambridgeshire. From 1631 to 1636, he leased his estates to Oliver Cromwell, his second cousin. He was a member of Parliament for Hertfordshire, 1653-1654, and for Colchester borough in Essex in 1656, and the same year was president of the Council. Following the family to America, we find three brothers, John, William and Thomas Lawrence, ancestors of the family in this country. These brothers, as well as the above mentioned Henry Lawrence, were descended from John Lawrence who died in 1538, and was buried in the Abbey of Ramsay. The three brothers emigrated in 1635, coming in the ship Planter, and landed at Plymouth, Mass. In the following year John and William, with sixteen others, obtained the patent of Flushing, Long Island, and in 1655 the three brothers obtained possession of a tract of land in Newton, L.I., and were mentioned as patentees of that town. We find on the seals appended to the wills of the brothers the same coat-of-arms as that upon the tomb of Henry Lawrence.

#### LAWRENCE GENEALOGY in America - - -

- 1st, THOMAS LAWRENCE came from England in 1655. Settled in Newton, Long Island, and died there in 1703.
- 2nd, his son JONATHAN, no record of death
- 3rd, his son JONATHAN, married MARY BETTS of Newton, Long Island, no date of death. His will is dated May 13, 1752. He settled in Rockland County, New York in 1749, and died there.
- 4th, his son JONATHAN, Captain in American Army, Commissioner to superintend building of Fort Washington and was at battle of Monmouth. Married Elizabeth Vankleek. No date of death. Afterwards a merchant in New York.
- 5th, his son THOMAS, married Sarah Smith, was settled in Ulster Co., New York in 1775.
- 6th, his son EDWARD, born in Ulster Co., died in Illinois.
- 7th, his son EDWARD S., born in Ulster Co.

JOHN LAWRENCE, the eldest of the three brothers mentioned previous, who emigrated to this country, was born at Great St. Albans, Hertfordshire, England, in 1618, coming over in the ship Planter, N. Travis, master, in company with Gov. Winthrop, Jr., and landing at Plymouth, Massachusetts, in 1635. He removed from there to Ipswich, where after residing some time, he removed to Long Island. He became, in 1644, one of the patentees of Hempstead, on that Island, under grant from the Dutch governor, Kieft. He was also in 1645, one of the patentees of Flushing, on the same island, under grant from the same governor. Moving in 1658 from Long Island, he settled permanently at New Amsterdam. In 1663 we find him appointed by Gov. Stuyvesant, one of the commissioners to treat with the general court at Hartford, in relation to the boundaries between New England and the Dutch provinces. He was appointed, in 1665, one of the first aldermen of New York, on its incorporation under Nicholls, the first English governor after the conquest. He was also appointed, in 1672, mayor of the city of New York, and in 1674, one of his majesty's council, in which office he continued, by successive appointments, till 1698. He was then appointed mayor in 1691, and in 1692, judge of the supreme court, in which office he remained till his death in 1699.

JAM LAWRENCE, the second brother, was born at Great St. Albans, Hertfordshire, in England. He embarked, together with brother John, in the ship Planter, in 1635, for America. He was, in 1645, in the 22nd year of his age, associated with him as one of the patentees of Flushing, on Long Island, in which town he resided during the remainder

of his life. His correspondence during the years 1642-3, with Gov. Stuyvesant, may be found among the archives at Albany. He was the largest landed proprietor at Flushing, and seems to have been a gentleman of affluence; his sword, plate, and personals alone, being valued at \$4,430 sterling. His inventory of his estate is on file in the surrogate's office, city of New York, recorded in 1680. He was a magistrate under the Dutch government at Flushing, in 1655, and also held, under the English government, a military commission. He was also in the magistracy of the north riding of Yorkshire, on Long Island.

William's second wife was Elizabeth Smith, daughter of Richard Smith, the wealthy patentee of Smithtown, on Long Island. The year after the decease of her husband (first), William Lawrence, in 1680, she married the Hon. Philip Carteret, proprietary governor of New Jersey, removing thither with her young children. She gave name to Elizabethtown, in that state. On her marriage to the Hon. Philip Carteret, Mrs. Lawrence reserved to herself, by an instrument in writing, the right of disposing of the lands left her by her first husband, to such of her children by him as she should select. She selected her second son Joseph, conveying to him, the valuable property lying upon Little Neck Bay, in the township of Flushing, Long Island. He was intimate with Lord Effingham, who had married his wife's sister, and who commanded a British frigate, at that time anchored in the offing opposite his mansion, which he frequently visited. His grandson was named in compliment to this earl.

William's first wife was Deborah Smith, a daughter of Richard Smith, patentee of Smithtown on Long Island. She was the younger sister of Elizabeth, her husband's father's second wife.

THOMAS LAWRENCE, the youngest of the three brothers who emigrated to America, did not come over till after his two brothers, John and William. He together with these two brothers, in the year 1655, obtained possession of a tract of land in Newtown, on Long Island, being mentioned as patentees in the patent of that town, granted by Governor Dongan in 1686.

Thomas subsequently purchased the whole of Hell Gate neck, then consisting of several valuable farms, extending along the East River, from Hell Gate cove to Bowery Bay. He died at Newtown, Long Island, in 1703. This branch of the family supported the revolution in England, in 1686, which occasioned the removal of Sir Edmund Andros from the governorship of Massachusetts. His son William was appointed one of the "Committee of Safety" by whom the government of the colony was administered, and soon after one of the "Council of the Province", which office he held from 1702 to 1706, under a commission from Queen Anne. Another son, John, together with his brother Daniel, was a cornet of dragoons, and in 1698 was appointed high-sheriff of Queens county.

JOHN BROWN LAWRENCE, soon after the revolution, was elected treasurer of the State of New Jersey. He subsequently removed to Canada where he died. He was a lawyer by occupation. He was a son of Elisha and Elizabeth (Brown) Lawrence. Elizabeth was a daughter of Dr. John Brown. Elisha was born in 1701 and died in 1793.

Elisha was a son of Elisha and Lucy (Stout) Lawrence.

- DE GRAAF -  
(Grasse)

This patronymic is common in Holland, generally spelt with a diphthong, as follows, Graef. The name signifies an earl or count.

There was a Cornelius de Graef, free lord of South Poelsbrook, burgomaster of Amsterdam, in 1656. Also, a John de Graaf, governor of the Dutch island, St. Eustatius, the first foreign magistrate who acknowledged the independence of the United States after the Revolution. His portrait is now hanging in the state house in Concord, New Hampshire. An allusion to this individual may be found in Botta's American Revolution, vol. ii, p. 331.

A branch of the family emigrated to New Netherland and settled at New Amsterdam, as a merchant. His only son, CLAAS, established himself as would be considered at that early day, far in the interior of the country, on the navigable waters of the Mohawk, on a point of land which he denominated DE GRAAFEN HOFSTEDE, about a mile from the city of Schenectady, on the same side of the river. This land he obtained by patent from Gov. Andros, some time between the years 1670 and 1680. The name has not spread much. Descendants of the first emigrant, reside mostly at and in the vicinity of Schenectady and Amsterdam. Some are at Syracuse, and in Montgomery and Schoharie counties, and they are found, on the female line, as far as Philadelphia, New Orleans, Michigan, also at Fort Plain on the Mohawk.

1890, May 16, Friday - News has been received of the death at Chico, California, of Elder George Garrity. Deceased preached for fifty years and baptized many hundreds in the course of his work. His earlier ministry was in connection with many who afterwards joined to form the Free Christian Baptist body, of which his brother Reverend E. Garrity became a minister, though he held aloof and subsequently joined the Disciples of Christ. He was born 80 years ago in Sunbury County, and there he married his first wife, a sister of Senator Glasier. He labored extensively as an evangelist, in various sections of the Province, and for fifteen years previous to the St. John Fire, held his pastorate in that city. His widow, formerly Mrs. Jones of Keswick, and 2 daughters survive him.

1894, October 5, Friday - Mrs. Glasier, wife of the late Senator died at her home in Lincoln yesterday from chronic bronchial trouble. She had been seriously ill for about a fortnite. She leaves a son and one daughter. The funeral will take place at 2:30 on Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Glasier was a sister of Elder Garrity, at one time in charge of the Church of the Disciples of Christ in St. John. She was well-known and generally esteemed by her large circle of friends.

1830 - William Frederick Harrison, born at Sheffield.(Ref: BIOGRAPHICAL REVIEW)  
William Fredorick Harrison, a wholesale grocer of St. John, was born at Sheffield, Sunbury County, N.B., in 1830, son of the Hon. Charles and Mary (Burpee) Harrison, his mother being a daughter of one of the earliest settlers of Sheffield. The Harrisons first settled in Virginia about 1670; and it is from this branch of the family that William Henry, ninth President of the United States, and ex-President Benjamin Harrison are descended. The first member of this branch to achieve notoriety was Benjamin Harrison, father of William Henry Harriston, who in 1781 was elected Governor of Virginia. Nearly a hundred years after this portion of the family came to Virginia, in 1767, two brothers, Charles and James Harrison, came out from County Antrim, Ireland, to join the descendants of the first settler; but at the time of the Revolutionary War Benjamin Harrison with his family sided with the Americans (he being one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence), while Charles and James remained loyal to the British side, and obtained commissions in the imperial army under Sir Henry Clinton. In 1783 these two brothers came to New Brunswick with the Loyalists; and in the following year Charles Harrison was appointed Lieutenant Colonel of the militia of Sunbury County by Governor Thomas Carleton, and with his brother James settled at Sheffield. Charles died

unmarried; and James married Charity Cowperthwaite, a Quakeress from Philadelphia, and died in 1806, leaving five sons and four daughters, one of whom was Charles Harrison, the father of the subject of this sketch.

William Frederick Harrison came to St. John in 1851. He, with Mr. Price, established the carriage factory now carried on by Price & Shaw. A few years later he withdrew from the firm to enter into partnership with his brother, Jeremiah Harrison, and the two carried on a large wholesale provision business until a few years ago, when the partnership was dissolved.

Mr. Harrison married a daughter of the late Lieutenant Colonel Tupper, of Woodstock; and they have five children now living - Charles, William, Laura, Bertram, and Walter.

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1820, April 12, born, David Tapley, at Sheffield (Ref: BIOGRAPHICAL REVIEW)  
DAVID TAPLEY, late Police Magistrate and Judge of the Civil Court, Portland, was born in Sheffield, Sunbury County, N.B., April 12, 1820, son of David and Hannah (Fletcher) Tapley. He was descended from James Robert Tapley, a mariner and Loyalist, who was a native of Providence, Rhode Island. While in Cork, Ireland, James Robert Tapley married a Miss O'Brien, who was a grand-daughter of a lord. He came to New Brunswick with his bride, and settled upon a tract of land in Sunbury County, where he was engaged in farming for the rest of his life. He died at the age of forty-five, and his wife survived him many years. He was the father of six children; namely, William, John, David, Ann, Mary, and James.

David Tapley, Sr., Judge Tapley's father, was born in Sunbury County in 1791. In early life he was a farmer, but, moving to St. John in 1847, he there carried on a lumber business until his death, which occurred November 30, 1869. He was a firm believer in total abstinence. He married Hannah Fletcher, a native of Nova Scotia, and was the father of nine children, namely: David, the subject of this sketch; John, a lumberman, who died in Saint John; February 16, 1893; Mary, who died at the age of fifteen years; Robert, who went to Australia in 1853, and is now living in New Zealand; Archibald and Daniel F., who are prominent business men of St. John; Hannah, widow of Shadrack Holly; Ann, widow of George F. Brown, who died August 1, 1897; and Elizabeth, who is unmarried. The mother died in 1866.

David Tapley, the subject of this sketch, acquired his education in the common schools. He worked upon a farm until of age, when he moved to St. John and engaged in surveying and the general lumber business. He continued in these employments until 1856, when he was elected to the Legislature from Sunbury County. He was re-elected the following year, and served as a member for that county continuously until 1861. He was the author of a bill reducing the number of the jury in civil cases in the Supreme Court from twelve to seven men. After the expiration of his second term he was repeatedly solicited to be a candidate for re-election, but declined. He remained on his farm in Sunbury County three years, at the end of which time he accepted the appointments of Police Magistrate and Judge of the Civil Court, Portland. These offices he filled with marked ability. In 1876 he began the study of law, and, having passed a creditable examination, he was admitted to the bar in October of 1880. In politics he supported the Liberal Party. He was made a Mason in Union Lodge, St. John, and was a Knight Templar. He was a member of the Church of England and a Vestryman of St. Luke's Church, Portland(now a part of St. John), and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He died July 18, 1895.

On November 19, 1841, Judge Tapley was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Ann Dalton, daughter of Samuel Dalton. He was the father of seven children, of whom two survive: Frederick, of St. John; and Horace, who married Cora Reynolds, of St. John, has three children, and resides in Nashua, N.H. He was educated in the public schools of St. John and at Oromocto. In 1870, he entered the office of the Intercolonial Railroad Company, St. John, and is now freight agent. He is a member of Albion Lodge, Knights of Pythias.

He attends St. Luke's Church. On June 3, 1874, he married Miss Mary Elizabeth Barnhill, daughter of Alexander Barnhill. They have five children - Ella McNutt, Frederick Bryan, William Guy, Margueretta, and Alexander Barnhill Tapley.

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Dear Mr. Campbell: I find the New Brunswick census of Kings and York Counties recently published to be a most useful tool for researchers, but I think the compilers made a grave mistake by omitting the page numbers of the original on which the names are found. When one finds the same surname on the same page, there is generally a relationship.

One should also list gravestones by lots and proximity to one another, as persons related, of the same name or another name, are often buried in the same general area of a cemetery. Yours sincerely, Donald P. Wright. P.S. The census records edited by Mr. Fellows and the one published by Mr. Hayward do contain the page numbers. D.P.W.

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1. James Earl Ray, born January 5, 1928, in Jackson, Mississippi, was a member of the Black Panther Party and was involved in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on April 4, 1968. He was convicted of the murder and sentenced to 99 years in prison. He was later paroled and fled to London, where he was living under the alias of Eric Starvo Galt. He was captured in London in 1969 and returned to the United States. He was sentenced to death by hanging in 1971 but was later commuted to life in prison. He was released from prison in 1991 and died of cancer in 1994.
