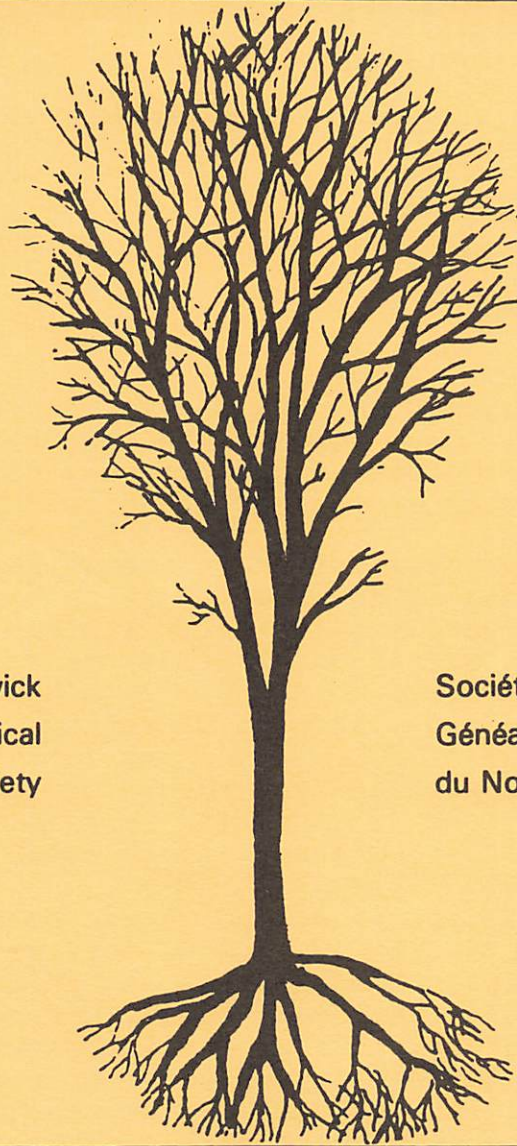

Season's Greetings

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CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

Christmas customs have been collected from every corner of the globe reflecting the rituals of our ancestors.

Legend tells us, in far away Germany in the year 1605, Martin Luther remembered the story how the Christ Child would appear in the forest sitting under a tree while the stars twinkled thru the branches and decided to take a tree home to delight his children. Early records tell us British Royalty were celebrating Christmas with the use of trees by 1800. By 1850 the tree had become decorated with handmade ornaments and each bough proudly bore a candle at its tip. Queen Victoria discovered this delightful custom and shared it with her family, thus beginning its long trek with the early settlers to our country. Here the garlands of popcorn, cranberries and rose hips along with the paper chains were added to the tree. Thirty years later tinsel, angel hair and electric lights had been added by the more well-to-do folk in the cities.

While the church bells chimed the Christmas story over Windsor Castle, Queen Victoria distributed gifts of beef, coal and clothing to the hundreds of poor and needy. Portions of beef decorated with sprigs of holly became an annual feature - Boxing Day was born; a day unknown to our neighbours in the States since it is a British tradition.

A rushed and hurried

gentleman, Sir Henry Cole, designed the first 'greet' in 1843 to save time in sending hand written notes to his many friends at Christmas. Early Christmas cards used red-breasted robins in the snow, winter scenes, and churches as popular motifs. Forty years later the advice the post office was giving was to 'mail early' !

Many of the well known and loved writings of the season were written in the 1840's. Clement Moore wrote 'A Visit from Saint Nicholas' for his children in 1822 but it was not until 1848 that it was published. Still today 'Twas the Night Before Christmas' is read and loved by everyone.

In the early 1840's Charles Dickens wrote 'A Christmas Carol'. Other historic Christmas works appeared as late as 1939 with the creation of 'Rudolph, The Red-Nosed reindeer.'

As a poor Mexican boy walked along the dusty road to the church, wondering what to give to the Christ Child, he noticed some weeds and picked them. Laid on the altar, the weeds miraculously changed into the Flor de la Noche Buena or the Flower of the Holy Night. Today this is the beautiful red poinsettia. In more recent years research has added white and pink poinsettias to the list of fast selling seasonal flowers.

Father Jean de Brebeuf, a Jesuit missionary to the Huron Indians in 1641, wrote the

first Canadian Christmas carol setting it to a popular French tune. The Huron Indians built a tiny chapel of cedar and fir branches in honor of the Baby Jesus. Even those from a distance came to sing 'The Huron Carol' & hymns in praise of the newborn Child. Father Berbeuf later was killed by the Iroquois becoming the first Canadian martyr.

The beloved carol, Silent Night, was composed in Austria by Franz Gruber as the village church organ had broken & music was needed for the Christmas Day service. Originally it was played on a guitar. Many other carols have interesting stories behind them. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote 'The Bells on Christmas Day' while recovering from depression suffered from the loss of his son in the Civil War.

St. Francis of Assisi put together a living Christmas scene of Jesus' birth to remind the people of the true meaning of Christmas. The wisemen's gifts to the Christ Child was the beginning of the tradition of parents giving gifts to their children. There is no Biblical proof that there were only three wisemen but it assumed there were three since the three gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh were given.

The 'Kissing Bough' has its roots deep in pre-Christian times. Ancient Scandinavians believed mistletoe would cure many ills

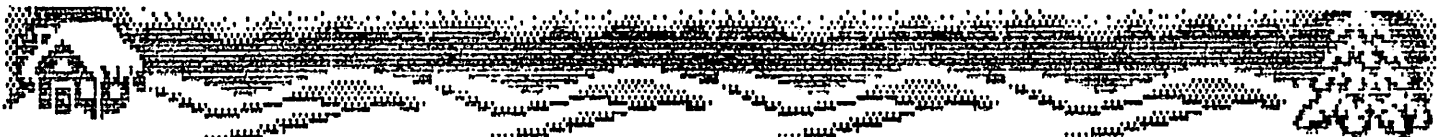
as well as reconcile enemies meeting under it. It was a 'plant of peace' which led to the custom of kissing under it. The kissing bough was made of loops of greens, decorated with apples, candies and candles. From its base would hang a sprig of mistletoe.

In the windows of the small thatched-roof cottages of Ireland a lighted candle was placed to guide Mary and Joseph to a home where they would be welcome.

Many of my festivities are rooted in century-old rituals. The tree adorned with tiny white candles in their ornate silver holders and Victorian hand-made ornaments are reminders of my Yorkshire and German ancestors. As the white candles flickered in Great Grandmother Sarah's tiny Irish cottage in 1817; still today they continue to glow in my windows at Christmas time. As I gaze at the cup and saucer Sarah used to sip her tea, I wonder what stories she could tell of Christmas of long ago. Perhaps I am still using some of her recipes to create the festive meal.

As the Christmas season approaches let us not get lost in the hurry-scurry of the times but let us take time to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas taking the time to relax and enjoy it with those we hold dear.

SARAH (McCULLY) HAYWARD and MARY (HAYWARD) McLELLAN'S OBITUARY
From the "Weekly Record," Sussex, N.B., 4 May 1894

Many obituaries in newspapers published in the 1700s and 1800s fail to give the names of parents and children of the deceased, and sometimes do not name spouses. However, this 1894 obituary gives a fairly detailed inventory of ancestors and descendants, as well as some family history, which is refreshing for we family tree climbers. (Transcribed by George H. Hayward, Fredericton, N.B., 21 Jan 1991 - no known relation to the Hayward family of the Sussex area in New Brunswick).

It becomes our melancholy duty this week to chronicle the departure of two of the oldest and most respected inhabitants of this vicinity. Sarah, widow of the late David Hayward, died at Penobsquis Thursday, 19th April, 1894, aged 93 years and 5 months; and her sister-in-law, Mary McLellan, died the following day at "The Knoll" at the age of 90 years and 10 months. It is not often that two so closely connected spend more than four score years in the same locality and then expire at so nearly the same moment.

Mrs. Hayward's father, the late Samuel McCully, of Dutch Valley, and her mother, whose maiden name was Sarah Hoar, were both born in Onslow, Colchester Co., N.S., of American parentage. The former's ancestors came from the north of Ireland; the latter was of a Scotch family, which had settled for a season in Connecticut. Mr. & Mrs. McCully were born on 6th Feb., 1764, and 6th Oct., 1775, respectively, and were married on his 30th birthday (just 100 years ago last winter) at Onslow, and had one or two children, when they removed to Hopewell, Albert Co., N.B., then commonly called Shepody. After residing near the Cape about 18 years, they sold their farm to Paul Robinson and removed to Sussex. Here they lived for three or four years in the old Ansley house near the Upper Corner, and then purchased from George Jefferson Pitfield, grandfather of William T. Pitfield, of Sussex, and of Ward C. Pitfield, of St. John, the east half of lot 56, being the farm in Dutch Valley now occupied by Robert McCully, J.P.

Mr. Samuel McCully was closely related to the McCullys of Truro, N.S., and of Chatham, N.B.; the first of the connection to settle in the latter place being his nephew. His own family were as follows:

1. Elizabeth, born 8th Dec., 1794, married John McCready, farmer, of Little River, near Rothsay, a brother of the late William McCready, of Penobsquis. She died 14th February, 1876, leaving no children.

2. Catherine, born 13th November, 1796, died unmarried, 6th February, 1879, at Cornhill, Kings Co., where she had for some time made her home with her sister, Mrs. Stockton.

3. Mary, born 11th December, 1798, married 25th July, 1832, John Manning, of Smith's Creek, died December, 1878. Besides two children who died young, Mrs. Manning left one son, J. Alfred, now of Washington Territory, U.S., and one daughter, Mrs. Samuel Hardy, of Worcester, Mass.

4. Sarah, the subject of this notice.

5. Samuel, born 27th Nov., 1802, was a farmer, and lived at the Portage. He married Mary E., daughter of the late Gilbert L. Stockton of Smith's Creek. She died 31st March, 1874, aged 67 years, and he died 12th August, 1876, at the age of 74. They had 3 sons - John W., William S., of Cornhill, and Lester, of the Portage.

6. Abigail, born 29th Dec., 1804, married 17th March, 1831, Witham R. Stockton, of Cornhill, and died in Sept., 1886. He died 22nd May, 1856. They had seven sons and one daughter, viz.: Ebenezer, of Cornhill; Andrew H, of Goshen, A. Co.; Ezra, of Cornhill; Lester, of Anagance; William, formerly of Cornhill, now

deceased; Albert, who died unmarried; and Samuel, of Newtown. Their daughter, Sarah, married her cousin, Wm. S. McCully, but died 26th Sept., 1875, aged 38.

7. [The newspaper article does not have number 7]

8. Hopeful, born 6th June, 1809, married Thomas W. Coates, of Newtown and had seven children, viz.: John, who lives in Boston, civil engineer; James C., residing on the homestead at Newtown; Arthur, died in Nevada; Herbert, also of Boston; Sarah, married Isaac Coy, of Collina, Kings Co. Two other sons died young. Mrs. Coates died at Boston 24th Dec., 1884; Mr. Coates was born 12th Sept., 1809, and died 8th March, 1884.

9. A daughter, who died in infancy.

10. Robert, born 8th October, 1815, in the old Ansley house, married Lavinia Clark, of Hopewell, N.B., resides on the homestead at Dutch Valley, and has the following family, viz.: Susano (sic), married Gilbert Wilbur, Esq., of Shediack; Silas C., unmarried, living with his father; Oscar J., of Moncton, physician; Alonzo D., of Sheffield, Methodist minister; Frank A., of Moncton, barrister; Clement, of St. John, druggist.

11. Lucy, born 19th August, 1821, unmarried, lives at Smith's Creek.

Sarah was born 19th November, 1800, at Hopewell. Having removed with her parents to Sussex, she married 25th January, 1821, David Hayward, the eldest son of her father's nearest neighbour. Of his family some account is given below. They lived for two years with Mr. Hayward's father, who then bought for them from David Sinnot, grandfather of J.A. Sinnot, Esq., of Apohaqui, that fine farm of 500 acres at Smith's Creek, now occupied by Mark Thompson. The deed is dated 2nd December, 1822, so that they doubtless removed thither in the winter of 1823. Here Mr. and Mrs. Hayward lived together for 47 years, models of piety, industry and thrift. Their family comprise:

1. Mariam, born at Sussex, 25th July, 1822, married 7th March, 1840, to James W. Nowlan, Esq., of Smith's Creek. She died 7th November, 1842, leaving one daughter, Louisa M. Nowlan, now living in Boston; also a son, David, who died when about 2 years old.

2. Susanna, born 29th August, 1824, married 26th October, 1846, William Warwick, merchant, formerly of St. John, but latterly of Lawrencetown, N.S., where he died 25th October, 1890. They had two children - Orlando H. Warwick, merchant, of St. John, N.B., and Minnie, wife of W.F. Linton, of Truro, N.S., with whom Mrs. Warwick now resides.

3. Abigail, born 14th February, 1827, married 12th June, 1851, James W. Nowlan, Esq. They have had the following family, viz.: Oscar L., living in Minneapolis, U.S.; Celia E., married Cyrus B. McCready, of Apohaqui; H. Tilley, married Anne Scovil, lives in Boston; Hedley V., died of scarlet fever when two years old; Edwin C., now living at Smith's Creek; Rozell H., married and living in Seattle, U.S.A.; Laura E., now living at Smith's Creek; Helen Ida, died 6th December, 1884, aged 19; Eva Irene, died 25th June, 1889, aged 20.

4. William Henry, born 10th September, 1829, married 21st April, 1857, to Augusta M., daughter of the late Zachariah Parlee, Esq., of Smith's Creek. They have one son, Harvey P., in business with his father, Princess street, St. John, N.B.

5. Elizabeth, born 10th January, 1835, married 4th February, 1856, to John Murray, Esq., of Penobscuis, N.B. Their family include: David H., with the Thompson-Houston Electric Co., Schenectady, N.Y., married 31st Dec., 1856, to Agnes A., daughter of the late William Keith, Esq., of Havelock, Kings county, N.B.; Ada S., married 17th June, 1885, to Leonard Allison, barrister, of Sussex, N.B.; Nettie A., living at home; Irvine E., with Abner Smith, of Sackville, N.B.; Lizzie A., married 8th June, 1893, to Geo. T. Baskin, merchant, of McAdam, N.B.

6. Samuel, born 11th April, 1838; married 10th September, 1873, to Margaret A.,

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daughter of the late James Ryan, Esq., of Millstream, Kings Co., N.B. They have no family. Mr. Hayward is the head of the well-known hardware firm doing business at the corner of King and Canterbury streets, St. John, N.B.

Mr. & Mrs. David Hayward removed in March, 1870, from the farm which had been their home for nearly half a century, to spend their declining years at Penobsquis. It was not, however, till 29th September, 1886, after they had enjoyed 65 years and 8 months of wedded life, that they were called upon to part. A severe illness after her husband's death seemed to indicate that she would soon follow him. But she recovered, and for several years was able to attend the services of the church they had both loved so deeply and so long. Finally, however, her faculties began to fail, by reason of successive attacks of paralysis; and though suffering comparatively little pain she grew gradually weaker, and at last the weary wheels of life stood still.

Mrs. McLellan was a sister of David Hayward, above mentioned. Their grandfather, William Hayward [should read Henry Hayward], had been an officer in the British army, and came, after the peace of 1783, to Nova Scotia. Here he received the grant of a large tract of land, but family tradition is not clear as to whether this was in the vicinity of Halifax or of Windsor. It is agreed, however, that Mr. Hayward found it so rocky as to be practically worthless; and that afterwards, when its location had proved valuable for building purposes, his descendants endeavored to make out their title to it, but failed in doing so. Mr. Hayward, with his sons George and William, lived several years in or near Windsor, but removed to Hopewell, N.B., very early in the present century. He died soon after, as did also William, Jr., [Jr. should be ignored] who had been married, but left no family. The elder son, George Griffith Hayward, born while his father was in the army, and christened in St. Paul's, London; had previously married Abigail, daughter of Capt. Copps, of Lower Hopewell, by whom he had two or three children before they removed to Hopewell.

In March, 1811, however, after about ten years residence in the latter place, then generally known as "Shepody," Mr. Hayward sold his farm to Mr. Clark, grandfather of Mrs. Robert McCully, and removed to Sussex. Here he bought from Philip Force and his son William, lots 57 and 58, of 200 acres each, comprising the farms of Orin Hayes, Harry Hayes, Edwin Anderson and Sylvester Anderson. The Forces were Loyalists from Pennsylvania. They had made considerable improvements, as may be inferred from the fact that Mr. Hayward paid then £850 for their land, stock and utensils. They got the "Nigary Fever," as it was called; and saying they would "never lay their bones in this d---d cold country," they removed to Ontario, as did also several others from Sussex about the same time.

Mr. G.G. Hayward lived on the site of Mr. Harry Hayes' residence. He and his wife were members of the Wesleyan church - to which indeed his father had belonged in England. He was mainly instrumental in procuring the first regularly ordained Methodist minister settled in Sussex, the late Rev. Michael Pickles, to be sent out for that purpose by the English Conference, and he also contributed largely to the erection of the first Methodist church building in Sussex. This was the building now located near the Sussex Railway station, and used as a butter and cheese factory and for the Dominion Dairy School. It was built in 1830 on a site yet to be seen in Mr. Haslam's meadow near the bank of the burying ground brook, and was occupied till the present Methodist church at Lower Corner was erected, about the year 1865, on the site adjoining Mrs. Jeffries' residence. Mr. George G. Hayward died 24th November, 1856, aged 83 years, and his wife died 13th March, 1860, at the age of 82. They had the following family, viz:

1. David, born 14th January, 1799, married 25 January, 1821, Sarah, 4th daughter of Samuel McCully. He died 28th September, 1856, as above.

2. Humphrey, born in 1801; married 1st Sarah Graves, who died 13th February,

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1835, aged 35, and was buried with two young children in the old burying ground by Charles Anderson's, at Penobsquis. They had also the following children: (1) Mary, married John Humphreys, of Petittcodiac; (2) George, married Charlotte Wilson, lived at Petittcodiac and St. John; (3) Kitty, unmarried, lives with her sister Mary at Petittcodiac; (4) Emma, widow of Henry Davidson, Esq., of Portage; (5) Hanford, married Fannie Kinnear, lives in Clinton, Mass.; (6) Sarah, married Gilbert Davidson, com. merchant of St. John. Humphrey Hayward married 2nd Hannah Ketchum, of Portage, but had no children by her. He died 18th September, 1854, on the Haslam farm, which he rented after Xenophon Cogle's death. Prior to this he had lived chiefly at Portage. He was buried at Sussex.

3. Mary, the subject of this sketch.

4. Catherine, born in 1805, married Isaac Cleveland, of Penobsquis, who lived on the farm now occupied by Edwin McCready, and had a mill there by the Second bridge. Having been severely injured in a dispute with a neighbour about a spring, he removed to St. John. He died 10th April, 1864, aged 65, and is buried at Penobsquis. Their family comprised, in addition to several who died young: (1) Ann, married John Freeze, formerly of Penob-squis, died at Calgary, N.W.T.; (2) Abigail, married Mr. Calhoun, of Hopewell; (3) Isabel, married Dr. Doherty, of Kingston, Kent Co. [probably should read Kings Co.], N.B.; Bartholomew, married 1st a Miss Smith of St. John, 2nd, Sarah Wallace, sister of the late J.C. Lamb, of Sussex. He lived formerly in Sussex and Hampton, but is now in Boston; (5) Charlotte, married Clinton Davidson, of Moncton; (6) Xenophon, married and lives in U.S.; (7) Susan, married George Jardine, formerly of Moncton, now in U.S.; (8) George, formerly of St. John, now also in U.S.

5. Henry, resided where Orin Hayes now lives. He died 5th February, 1877, in his 69th year. His wife, Fanny Parlee, died 11th May, 1883, age 71. They had three children, viz: (1) Sarah, wife of James Titus, Esq., of Hampton, formerly of Sussex; (2) Mary J., married Hiram B. White, died 30th October, 1862, aged 27, leaving two daughters; (3) Frances Leggett, married Geo. H. Barnes, died 24th December, 1875, aged 38 years, leaving no children.

6. William, born December 25th, 1810, in Hopewell, was a miller and lived at Hagarty's Mill; married Sophia, daughter of Dr. Peter Guimarin. She died 10th November, 1847, aged 37. She and three young children died of ship fever. They had also lost 3 others of tender age; only three attained maturity, viz: (1) Abigail, married Robert A. Hagarty, formerly of Dutch Valley, lately of Barnesville, Upham; (2) Matilda, died when a young lady; (3) Eliza, married Alfred Hagarty and removed to Ontario. Mr. William Hayward married 2nd, May Hagarty, by whom he had no children. He died 10th March, 1881, aged 70.

7. Abigail, married Rev. Michael Pickles and died 10th June, 1833, in her 20th year. Her infant son, Geo. Fletcher, is buried with her.

8. Sarah, died 8th December, 1830, in her 15th year.

9. Jane, married William Pugsley, Esq., formerly of Sussex and Bloomfield, Kings Co., now of St. John (North). Their family include: (1) John, died unmarried in California several years ago; (2) Abbie married Dr. John Smith, dentist, of St. John; (3) Gilbert R. of St. John, N.B., barrister; (4) Daniel, of St. John (North), dentist; (5) William, of Rothsay and St. John, barrister; (6) Julia, died 9th October, 1875; (7) Josephine, married R.B. Humphrey, Esq., merchant, of St. John; (8) Jennie, married Gaspard Tapley, lumber dealer, of St. John (North).

10. Isabella, married 1st Dr. David McLellan, who practised at Anagance and also at St. John. They had one son, David Theodore, who died in California about ten years ago; also a daughter who died in infancy. After Dr. McLellan's death she married the late Joseph Cogle, of Anagance, by whom she had no family. She died in the autumn of 1881, aged 58. Dr. McLellan died about 1st August, 1860, and is buried near Petittcodiac. Mr. Cogle died 25th Oct., 1871, aged 52.

Mrs. Pugsley is now the sole survivor of this large family. Only she and Isabella were born in Sussex - the others in Windsor or Hopewell.

Mary, the third child and eldest daughter of Geo. G. Hayward and his wife Abigail, was born 21st June, 1803. She believed that she was born at Windsor, N.S., which was also the birthplace of her brothers David and Humphrey. She married, 7th February, 1820, Xenophon Cogle, son of Joseph, the 2nd son of Col. John Cogle, a Loyalist from Vermont. They liv (text missing) Corner, Sussex, where they kept inn on the site of Mr. Walter McMonagle's residence. In March, 1840, they sold that property to the late Hugh McMonagle, Esq., and removed to the farm afterwards owned by Mr. Maxwell Suear? and Mr. John Marvin, and now occupied by Mr. John J. Haslam. Mr. Cogle was very enterprising in business, most affable and gentlemanly in manner, and in his day one of the wealthiest and most influential men in Sussex. He suffered severe injury by a fall in the City of St. John, and after a protracted illness he died quite suddenly at his residence 19th April, 1853. He had been born on the 30th of March, 1800.

Their family were as follows: 1. George, born 4th November, 1820, died 8th October, 1823; 2. Albert, born 3rd November, 1822, died 1st January, 1823; 3. Frances Charlotte, born 26th Oct., 1823, married 21st July, 1842, to the late Edwin A. Vail, M.D., M.L.C., who died 31st July, 1885, aged 68. She died 2nd December, 1862, leaving issue: (1) X. Herbert Vail, barrister, St. John, died 4th February, 1882, aged 38; (2) Helen, wife of O. Roswell Arnold, Esq., of Sussex; (3) William E., physician, of Sussex, died 4th June, 1874, aged 26; (4) Alice, wife of Edward Hickson, Esq., recently of Bathurst, N.B. 4. William Johnston, born 22nd April, 1826, died unmarried, 7th June, 1850; 5. Edwin, born 16th August, 1828, married 11th September, 1851, Frances Foshay. He practised many years as a physician at Oromocto, N.B., died 26th February, 1870, and was interred at Fredericton. His widow, and one daughter Maud, now reside in Washington, D.C. Dr. Cogle had also one or two daughters who died in infancy. 6. Sarah, born 3rd Dec., 1830, died 1st August, 1839.

Several years after Mr. Cogle's death, his widow married Thomas McLellan, of Londonderry, N.S. He was a brother of Dr. McLellan who had married her sister Isabella, and an uncle of the Hon. A.W. McLellan, late Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia. He was somewhat eccentric, and being advanced in life, did not live many years after their marriage, and she returned to Sussex. Here in the midst of a large circle of relatives and friends, she spent the remainder of a long and eventful life. It was of the utmost interest to hear her reminiscences of the old farm at "Shepody" with its wide marshes and the long dykes on which she used to walk and watch the ships sailing up the bay; the magnificent view across to Dorchester and down to Grindstone Island; the solemn awe produced on her mind by her grand-father's funeral; the beautiful orchard with its old French apple-trees, under which her brother David dug for the gold he dreamed had been buried there; the passage up the Petitcodiac and the journey in sleds from "The Bend" to Sussex along roads so drifted that she and her mother both became seasick. Her recollections of Sussex, as it was from fifty to seventy-five years ago, were also particularly distinct and valuable.

Notwithstanding her advanced age, she enjoyed comparatively good health until about February, 1893, when she suffered a slight attack of paralysis. With the approach of summer, however, she almost entirely recovered and was again quite well during the fall and early winter. With the approach of spring, however, her strength began to fail, and she passed peacefully and deeply regretted by all who knew her.

Also transferred were certain related historical vital statistics records held by the Registrar General's office in Toronto, including, for example, direct clergy returns for BMDs and registration of deaths of Ontario residents overseas during and immediately following World War II. These special series for the most part do not have indexes.

There are significant gaps in the BMD Registration records, especially in those dated between 1869 and the late 1890s, which arose from failure to register vital events during this period. (See the journal Families, Nov. 1990, Vol. 29 no. 4, pp. 224-225, for details.)

Subsequent transfers of later registrations will occur annually according to formal records schedules. For the time being, Vital Statistics records dated later than the above dates are still in the custody of the Registrar General. If you seek information from these later records:

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Penobscot Loyalist Timothy ROIX /ROAX/ROAK/ROURKE - - -
A Partial Identification

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The Penobscot Loyalist family of Roix is memorialized in various ways in Charlotte County, New Brunswick. For example, there are Roix Roads in the Parishes of St Andrews and St Patrick and there is a Roux Pond in the Parish of St George.

But who was the family of Roix whose memory is perpetuated by these geographic place names?

We know of no books or manuscripts detailing this Loyalist family. Nor is the name Roix found in the records of the District of Maine in the pre-Revolutionary War period. The index of the Charlotte County Register of Deeds indicates that for this family one should consult entries for Roix, Rourke & O'Rourke, possibly suggesting an Irish lineage. Correspondence from the Charlotte County Historical Society in 1988 suggested that Timothy Roix/Rourke was prehaps of the group who went from Halifax, N.S. to Penobscot during the War to rebuild and strengthen Fort George. And there is a brief reference to Widow Mary Huntley, nee Roix, in a major manuscript on the Munson family of Scarborough & Machias, Me. & St George, N.B.⁽¹⁾, which identifies this young widow, who m. (2) Robert Munson, as a French girl.

From two extant listings of Penobscot Loyalists dating from 1783 and 1784⁽²⁾ we are told that the family of Roix, therein spelled Roax, consisted of three family units: those of Timothy Sr, consisting of two persons over ten years of age; John, consisting of four persons over ten & four under ten; & Timothy Jr, consisting of two persons over ten & three under ten, some fifteen persons in all.

Examination of Lincoln & Hancock County, Maine data indicates that Timothy Roax/Roake/Rourke Sr actually had resided for some years prior to the Revolutionary War in that part of "Penobscot" then generally called Majabagaduce, and more specifically in the area which became the Town of Brooksville. Lincoln County deed, Vol 18, pg 178, specifically places Timothy there in 1773, at which time he purchased the right of Benjamin Howard to a tract of land commonly called Old Neck, lying upon the Bagaduce River. However there is other evidence which indicates that Timothy was one of a handful of squatters already residing in Brooksville when the area was formally opened for settlement in the early 1760s.⁽³⁾ Timothy sold his lands in Majabagaduce in January 1784.⁽⁴⁾

Timothy Roake and Margaret McCarty, then both of Georgetown, Me, were married there 19 Aug 1747. The births of two children of this marriage are recorded in Georgetown: Catrin, 19 July 1749 and John, 30 Nov 1750. The marriage of a Katherine Rouk with John "Canda (?)" on 21 April 1767 is also recorded in

Georgetown.^{'5'} A John Consdon with a wife Catherine lived on land abutting that of Timothy in Brooksville in 1783 and are believed to be Timothy's daughter and son-in-law. Only one other child is known to have been born to Timothy and Margaret: Timothy Jr. The date and place of birth of Timothy Jr is not known to the authors.

We have yet been unable to establish the parentage of Margaret McCarty or to establish with any certainty that of Timothy Sr. However, Timothy Sr was possibly the youngest son of Thomas⁴ Ruck (Samuel², Thomas¹) and Mary Clark born in Boston, Mass. 27 July 1721. Thomas was a mariner of Boston. He and his wife were numbered among the Proprietors of Pemaquid, the land in and around Georgetown. One, and perhaps both, of Thomas' daughters settled around Georgetown.^{'6'} There is some evidence that Timothy Roak was a soldier stationed at Georgetown prior to his marriage there. Thus, circumstantial evidence tends to support the suggestion that Timothy Roak was a son of Thomas Ruck. However, evidence to confirm this relationship has, to date, eluded us. An alternative possibility is that Timothy was a member of one of the several families of Irish immigrants who founded the town of Cork, Me. around 1718. Due to subsequent Indian uprisings, this town, near present day Bath, was abandoned and the residents scattered, some to Georgetown.

It appears most likely that Timothy Sr and Margaret did have but two sons. Only two sons are revealed on the lists of the Penobscot Loyalists and in early Charlotte County deeds. Review of Maine data does not suggest any other sons who might have remained there.

We have yet to find a marriage record for John or Timothy Jr, or recorded births for any of their respective children. The maiden name of John's wife Sarah is unknown to us. With six children in 1783, it appears they must have married by the mid-1770s. The wife of Timothy Jr was Hannah Gray, dau of Andrew & Lydia (Brown) Gray.^{'7'} Lacking birth records, we must draw on alternative data in any effort to reconstruct their families. The 1784 "return" of the Penobscot Loyalists and various Charlotte County deeds are the primary sources for this alternative data.

The 1784 Penobscot Loyalists listing, while helpful, nevertheless presents certain analytical problems with regard to the Roix/Roax family. The list, made after arrival of the Loyalists at St Andrews, separately lists men, women & children, with the latter further broken down as to those over ten and those under ten. There is no consistent relationship in the order of appearance of names on the respective lists, thus making it impossible on the basis of the lists alone to match husbands with wives or either of them with their respective children.

For Roax, the 1784 list correctly records the three male heads of household, but only includes the name of one woman: Sarah, the wife of John. (The wife of Timothy Jr, Hannah, also

certainly removed to N.B., and the wife of Timothy Sr, Margaret, was living in 1783.) There are three Roax children over ten listed: Bryan, Bryant & Sarah. And there are four groupings of entries of Roax children under ten - - even though there were only two Roax households with children! Those under ten named were James & Elinor; Timothy; Susannah & Abigail; and William, Margaret & Hannah.

It is possible that the latter two named, rather than being children under ten, were rather the wives of Timothy Sr & Jr, and recorded under the wrong heading. Making this assumption would reduce the total number of children to nine, which is the total recorded, but unnamed, on the 1783 enumeration of Penobscot Loyalists. However there is evidence that John did have a dau Margaret [the widow (Roix) Huntley is called Margaret in the baptismal record of her son John Roix Munson^(e), not Mary as the Munson manuscript states], and it is likely that Timothy did, then or later, have a daughter Hannah, named after his wife. Thus the entries are inconclusive as to whether the Hannah & Margaret listed were adults or children.

Moreover we suspect there is an error in the listing of children over ten, specifically the inclusion of both a Bryan and a Bryant. Only John had children over ten in 1783. It is doubtful he would have had two sons of such similar names. Timothy Jr's wife was born after 5 Oct 1757, the date of her parents' marriage, and is believed to have married Timothy Jr only c1778. Moreover, in 1791, Timothy stated that he then had six children, all under 11 years of age ⁽⁹⁾. Thus we believe it most likely that Bryan and Bryant is a double entry for the same person. Furthermore we find no record of a Bryan/Bryant Roix/Rourke subsequently in N.B. We believe it is possible this child was actually named John Bryan(t) and called by his middle name to distinguish him from his father. (One of John's younger children was called by his middle name, perhaps to distinguish him from a cousin of the same first name).

Making the assumption that there was only one male child over ten reduces the number of children named on the 1784 list to ten, implying the birth of one more Roax child between 1783 & 1784, or possibly reduces the number of children to eight, if we assume Hannah & Margaret were adults misrecorded, rather than children. This latter assumption would imply one child might have died in the several months between the 1783 enumeration and the 1784 return, or simply that one or more names were inadvertently left off the list.

We will return to the Penobscot Loyalist listings shortly. Let us look briefly now, however, at selected Charlotte County deeds, for the genealogical information they provide.

Deed, Book C, #24, pg 24, records the transfer of land in St George from John Sr to "my sons" John Roix Jr and Timothy in 1802.

Deed, Book Q, #78, pg 78, is an 1832 surety deed from Richard Rourke to Henry Rourke, being land Richard inherited by will from his late father John Rourke.

A subsequent deed in 1833, Book M, #273, pg 324, from Richard Rourke to William H Rourke refers to the preceeding deed between the two parties, making it evident that Henry & William H are the same individual. The relationship between Richard and William Henry is not stated in any of the deeds. However, as they owned abutting properties, Richard's obtained from his father, suggests that they were most likely brothers.

Thus the above deeds assist us in identifying three, and probably four, of John's sons: John, Timothy, William Henry and Richard.

We have found no deeds through which Timothy Jr explicitly identifies any of his children. However, deed, Book F, #171, pg 264, records the transfer of land in St George in 1820 from Timothy & his wife Hannah to six male Rourkes: James, William, Andrew, David, Charles, & John. It is reasonable to conclude that these six males were their sons.

Viewing jointly the data recorded in the Penobscot Loyalists lists and the Charlotte County deeds suggests the following concerning the children of John & Timothy Jr:

--It is evident that the children over 10 on the 1784 list were John's, i.e., Bryan/Bryant (poss. being John B.) and Sarah. It is similarly evident that the Timothy under ten was John's.

--James & William of the 1784 list apparently were children of Timothy. These were the names of the first two males named in his 1820 deed and implicitly were his eldest sons. As James appeared on the 1784 list in a grouping consisting of himself and an Elinor Roax, we conclude that Elinor was also probably a child of Timothy's. Assuming Timothy & Hannah had in 1784 only the three children enumerated the previous fall, James, Elinor & William would account for all of Timothy's children at the time they removed to St Andrews. This assumes the three additional children of Timothy & Hannah were born between 1784 and February 1791, by which time they had six children. One of these was apparently Andrew, the third named Roix male named in the 1820 deed, who was born c1790, based on his age in the 1851 census. If the order of names on the 1820 deed is according to age, as was customary, then the other two children born between 1784 and 1791 were necessarily daughters. Apparent sons David, Charles & John were evidently born after Feb. 1791.

--Of the remaining children on the 1784 list then, all girls --Susanna, Abigail, Margaret & Hannah -- at least three clearly were daughters of John. The fourth was apparently born after the 1783 enumeration of Penobscot Loyalist families, and could have been a dau of either John or Timothy Jr. Which of the four was the infant is not clear from the record. In February 1791, John deposed that he then had ten children¹⁰. His son Richard is

known to have been born after this date, in c1793. The other names listed above would account for eight of John's ten children in 1791 and, with Richard later, suggests that he & Sarah had eleven children in all. The two other children of John were apparently born during the period 1784 to 1791.

Timothy Sr, John & Timothy Jr all received land in the Penobscot Loyalist Grant of 1784.^{'11'} Timothy Sr is recorded to have drawn farm lot #4 on Bocabec Cove and to have received town lot MI 2. John drew farm lot #26 on Oak Bay and received town lot MI 3. Timothy Jr drew farm lot #59 on the St Croix, but is said to have received no town lot. However, there is a mix-up in the recording of the distribution of the town lots as between Timothy Sr and Jr. A subsequent deed makes clear that it was Timothy Jr who received town lot MI 2.^{'12'} It is unclear why his father did not also receive a town lot.

Timothy Sr sold his 100 acre farm lot #4 in April 1790.^{'13'} His wife did not co-sign, and had possibly died before this date. The 1790 deed is also the last reference we find to Timothy Sr. As he was believed to then be about 70 years of age, we speculate that he may have died shortly after this date.

The record is somewhat unclear as to whether John made any serious attempts to develop his Penobscot Loyalist lands or whether he removed soon after his arrival in New Brunswick to the Mascarene sector of the Parish of St George. For certain, John sold his town lot to his brother Timothy in August 1784.^{'14'} There is also some suggestion in the records that John declined to accept Oak Bay farm lot #26 which he drew in the Penobscot Loyalist lottery. This conclusion may be based in part upon his statement in his 1791 Memorial ^{'15'} that, "being unprovided with land" he had applied for lands in the Mascarene. However John was the obvious owner of record of lot #26, for he sold that land, together with the improvements thereon, in 1817.^{'16'} John had settled in Mascarene prior to Feb. 1791, at which time he petitioned for additional land, stating that the 120 acres that had been granted him the previous September was insufficient to support his large family. He ultimately appears to have received both lots 30 and 31.

In 1802, John sold lot 31 to two of his sons. John's last recorded deed was that of 1817. His wife did not co-sign. Charlotte County deed, Book Q, #78, pg 78 indicates John left a will. However, we have been unable to locate the probate of that will. We believe it most likely it was recorded in Probate Book B, which is now missing. We thus lack knowledge as to John's date of death. We believe his death probably occurred in the early 1820s.

Timothy Jr, it appears, may have initially intended to remain in St Andrews. In addition to the town lot granted him, he early on acquired the two adjacent lots. He sold his farm lot on St Croix Bay in 1785, but at approximately the same time bought lot 51 and half of lot 50 in St Andrews. Timothy sold his

three town lots in St Andrews in 1786, however. Then in August 1787 he sold his farm lot #51 and sold his half of lot #50 the following February. He indicated he was living on the latter half lot as of the date of that deed '14'.

It is obvious Timothy Jr also had removed to the Mascarene section of St George prior to Feb. 1791. In his petition of that date, requesting that he be granted lots 32 & 33, rather than lot 34 which had been granted to him in Sept. 1790, Timothy indicated he had already built a house on those lots and cleared upwards of three acres. The dates of death of Timothy and his wife are unknown to the authors. However Timothy Jr may have been living as late as 8 May 1833, when a Timothy Rourke sold one half of lot 33 in the Mascarene settlement.¹⁷ This deed was acknowledged by a witness in December of that year, possibly signifying that Timothy had died in the interim.

The authors had initially hoped to include in this article further discussion of the children and grandchildren of John & Timothy Jr. Space has become one constraint in that regard. More importantly, though, the information we have been able to gather on those generations is uneven and spotty. We plan to continue our research in an effort to augment the information currently in hand on those generations. We Hardly Knew Ye

St. Mary's Cemetery: Insights into the Irish Catholic Community of Saint John at mid-century

Nineteenth century New Brunswick society was utterly transformed by the arrival, during the first half of that century, of tens of thousands of Irish immigrants. The trickle of immigration during the early years quickly accelerated to a steady stream, and from 1840 to 1850, an inundation.

The bulk of those immigrants were funnelled into the province through the port of Saint John. Though countless thousands passed through the city in search of greener pastures, thousands of others stayed on. By mid-century, half of the heads of households in the Loyalist City were, in fact, Irish.

From the start, Irish immigration to the city had been a dual stream of Catholic and Protestant, and though, in the beginning, they shared to a certain extent, the antipathy of the native population, Irish Protestants were more easily assimilated into the overwhelmingly Protestant environment. Any cultural similarities that Irish Catholics shared with their Protestant countrymen were unable to transcend religious differences, and a separate Irish Catholic community took root. By the time St. Mary's Cemetery opened in 1853, a distinct, well-defined Irish Catholic culture had evolved in Saint John. St. Mary's Cemetery is the legacy of that culture, and as such, mirrors not only the social and economic structure of the society, but reflects as well, their values, beliefs and traditions. Though the Cemetery contains the graves of many once prominent citizens, for the most part, the people who are buried there are ordinary men and women, with no particular claim to fame, but whose offspring still comprise a major portion of the population of modern day Saint John. Indeed, the "genealogical trails" of untold thousands of Irish Canadians and Irish Americans lead eventually to the windswept knoll where the tombstones of St. Mary's stand guard over little pieces of Ireland.

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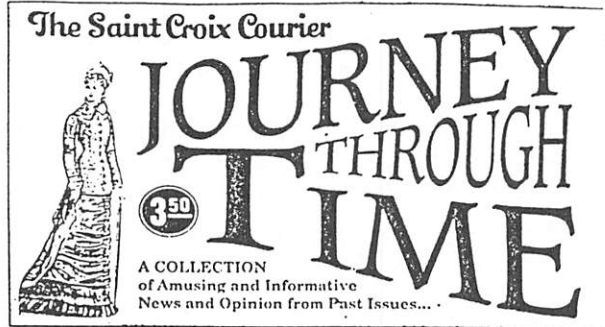
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Miscellaneous Marriage Records

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BEYOND YOUR FAMILY TREE

What do you do once you have completed your family tree? There you are with your notes turned into neat typewritten sheets and you desperately want to share your knowledge with others. You've worked hard to produce something meaningful, have spent months, perhaps years, tracking down those elusive great-greats. You have a right to be proud of your efforts and to want to share them.

Family history publishing is almost always self-publishing, since your market is limited to a very specific interest group. To be realistic, just how many people would want to know about your ancestors? Only those who are related. Don't despair, there are plenty of avenues for seeing your marvellous efforts in print that won't cost you an arm and a leg.

PHOTOCOPYING

Simply photocopying your material and placing it into duotang covers can preserve your family history. You can advertise in the periodicals of genealogical societies that you have published such a work and perhaps sell some copies to interested parties in such a manner. This will help to defray your printing costs.

Don't forget to offer copies to both local libraries and genealogical libraries. You may be able to offer assistance to someone who is vaguely related in a sideways or direct way. Many researchers check libraries for sources of information, so make sure your booklet has your name and address to make it easy for people to contact you. Immortalizing your ancestors in print also gives you a chance to leave something behind for succeeding generations in your family.

FAMILY NEWSLETTERS

You may wish to consider starting a family newsletter, depending on how many contacts you have developed during your research. Publishing one's own family history as a newsletter has become increasingly popular. This may even generate more interest from those distant cousins you haven't managed to get in touch with yet.

Many family organizations now publish a bulletin of the history and genealogy of a single surname. However, the chances of finding yourself linked to an existing newsletter are minimal. If you do find another person publishing a newsletter about your family, you could consider becoming a contributor, thus avoiding duplication. If you already are a member of a family organization, finding subscribers for the newsletter you may want to start may be relatively easy. Your membership list simply becomes your mailing list.

With no established organization to back you up, you could try inserting queries for your newsletter in the periodicals of the genealogical societies of which you are a member. Another way is to write directly to all the people with a particular surname found in your telephone directory. If you have contacts in other cities, you could ask those people to provide you with such a list from their directory.

GENEALOGICAL PERIODICALS

Another alternative is to send your material to the periodical of your provincial genealogical society or to approach a national

genealogical periodical. Your societies are constantly in need of material for publication. While editorial needs differ, they'd like to see what you have.

You can make your article mean something to a broader spectrum of people by including notes on your ancestor's neighbour. Perhaps your ancestor was active in some organization or was instrumental in founding a village. Giving a short history of this organization or village gives your piece a wider interest range and is more likely to attract the attention of an editor. As well, many of our ancestors were quite mobile, and their story may appeal to more than one genealogical periodical.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

No matter which method you choose for publication, always be careful to document all your information. Otherwise, years from now you may get a letter from an obscure cousin asking for your source for a particular piece of data and finding it may be next to impossible.

When I talk about documenting your research, I mean not only recording accurate information but also citing your sources in written form so that others can easily and quickly locate a particular piece of information. This involves showing the obvious: author's name and title of work, page number of piece of information, date, and publisher, and also including the exact source of this work, i.e. a library, archives, etc. and that particular institution's reference number.

In our search into the past, our forebears are too often merely names. Frequently, in our attempts to 'get back' as far as we can in our family quest, they mean nothing more to us than a link with a preceding generation. However, your ancestors could mean more. A family record should be more than just the facts and statistics which make your ancestors one-dimensional paper characters, rather than real living people. A family record is about people - what they did and how, where and why they did it.

Those all-important anecdotes and bits of family folklore which are passed down over the generations are important to family histories. Preparing a short biographical sketch for each of your ancestors is where these anecdotes and family folklore fit in. These are fascinating tidbits that will make your family history more interesting, and your forebears seem more like people, not merely statistics.

If you are lucky enough to find some, old family photos add pictorial interest to any family history and can make your ancestors come alive. Photos can also trace family resemblances. Where did your sister's curly hair come from when everyone else in your immediate family has straight hair? Where did those long, lanky frames of the male members of your family come from? Besides giving your readers a break from pages of typewritten material, old family photos may answer some of those questions for you.

Whichever route you take to getting your masterpiece in print, all your tasks will seem very rewarding when you finally do see your great work published! You'll have achieved something. Your manuscript will benefit future generations once it is formally in print and ensconced in an archival depository or library somewhere. It will also please you--the person with the patience to unravel and follow all the clues to produce the end result.

BOOK REVIEW

A HEBRIDEAN HERITAGE Myra M. Hoar and William S. Hoar, Tangled Roots Press, 3561 West 27th Ave., Vancouver, B.C. 260 pp. 1991. Price \$12.50 plus one dollar postage.

Myra M. Hoar was born in Scotland and emigrated with her siblings and parents, Angus and Bella Mackenzie, from the Isle of Lewis to Ontario in 1924. William J. Hoar, her husband, was born in New Brunswick of pioneer forebears. They met while post graduate students at the University of Western Ontario and have lived in Vancouver for many years.

Their book, about Mrs. Hoar's family and life on the Isle of Lewis, is divided into three parts, each with an excellent list of references.

Part One includes notes on the geology and geography of Lewis, a succinct and informative account of the origins of the Scottish peoples, and a brief history of the Island to 1844.

Part Two describes changes on Lewis from the end of Seaforth domination until the departure of the Mackenzie family for Ontario. The evolution of a society from feudal to modern is related through the lives of grandparents, parents, and other family members as well as Mrs. Hoar's own happy childhood. She has vivid memories of life in the seaport town of Stornoway and crofting communities during the first World War and a few years that followed.

Part Three is a genealogical account of the family from the late eighteenth century to the present.

The text is enriched by many family letters and some splendid illustrations.

In the Foreward, the authors state "This book is written for descendants of Hebridean emigrants who may be interested in the land of their ancestors, more specifically for the descendants of Angus and Bella Mackenzie". This Hebridean descendant believes the book could have wide appeal to readers interested in social and family history.
