

1. Seth¹ Noble, was born in Westfield, Mass., April 15, 1743, son of Thomas and Sarah (Root) Noble. He died September 15, 1807, in Franklinton (now Colombus), Ohio⁽⁷⁾.

He married first, Hannah Barker, November 30, 1775, in Maugerville, Sunbury Co., N.B. (7). She was born February 20, 1759, in Rowley, Mass., daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Palmer) Barker (6). She died June 16, 1790, in Bangor, Maine (6). The author of "The Barker Family Tree" shows Hannah's mother as "Sarah Stickney Palmer." Whether she was Sarah Stickney, widow of a Palmer, or whether Stickney was her middle name, is not clear.

After Hannah's death in 1790, Seth married second, Mrs. Reumah Emery, in 1793, in Bangor⁽⁷⁾. They had four children. After her death, he married third, Mrs. Mary Riddle, in 1807⁽⁷⁾, in Ohio, when he was 64. He died that same year.

Seth Noble was a Congregationalist minister in Westfield, Massachusetts. His paternal grandfather, Thomas Noble, was born in England, about 1632, and came to America about 1653. He married Hannah Warriner, November 1, 1660, in Massachusetts, and died in Westfield, Mass., January 20, 1704⁽⁵⁾.

Seth's father, Thomas Noble, was born September 10, 1696, in Westfield, Mass., married Sarah Root, September 1, 1722, and died February 18, 1775⁽⁵⁾.

When the settlers first came to what was then known as the Township of Maugerville, on the Saint John River in Sunbury Co., New Brunswick, in 1763, religious services were held in the homes of the settlers, led mainly by laymen, but by 1774 a church had been built, and the inhabitants turned their attention to hiring a minister.

At a meeting held by the subscribers to a bond for the support of the preached gospel among us at the home of Hugh Quinton in Maugerville, June 15, 1774, Jacob Barker was chosen chairman of the meeting, and it voted to give Rev. Seth Noble a call to settle in Maugerville, to give him a settlement (provided he accepted the call) of one-hundred and twenty pounds currency, to give him a yearly salary of sixty five pounds currency as long as he continued as their minister, to be paid in cash or furs or grain at cash price, and a committee comprised of Jacob Barker, Phinehas Nevers, Israel Perley, Deacon Jonathan Burpee, Hugh Quinton, Daniel Palmer, Moses Coburn and Moses Pickard, was chosen to "treat with Seth Noble."

At a subsequent meeting held by the committee at the home of Hugh Quinton on Wednesday, June 29, 1774, it was voted that, in addition to the salary, if Mr. Noble should accept their call, they would cut and haul five cords of wood to his house yearly so long as he remained their minister⁽⁸⁾. These were very generous conditions, and Mr. Noble accepted. He arrived at Maugerville later that year.

Two years later, when the Revolutionary War broke out back home in New England, Rev. Noble actively supported the patriot cause. At a public meeting held in the church in Maugerville, May 14, 1776, in which he was one of the leading spirits, several very disloyal resolutions were adopted. Jacob Barker Esq. was chosen chairman and a committee comprising Jacob Barker (Jr.), Israel Perley, Phinehas Nevers, Daniel Palmer, Moses Pickard, Edward Coy, Thomas Hartt, Israel Kinny, Asa Kimble, Asa Perley, Oliver Perley and Hugh Quinton, was appointed to prepare the resolutions which were subsequently adopted by the meeting. By the following year the British government in Halifax, having received reports of the disloyalty in Maugerville, sent a force to the Saint John River under Col. Gould where the inhabitants were compelled to take an oath of allegiance to King George III. A few of them, including Rev. Noble, had been so actively involved in supporting the revolution against the British that they felt it prudent to leave, fearing the treatment they might receive.

The following sketch, by G.O. Bent, published in *Acadiensis*, Vol. 7, No. 1, January 1907, paints a good picture of Reverend Noble, and is reproduced here in its entirety:

"As soon as the first English speaking settlers on the St. John River, at Maugerville, had established themselves, they followed their New England custom and organized a church. For ten years they had no settled minister, but, by 1774, finding themselves numerous enough and prosperous enough to support a regular minister, they extended a call in June of that year to Mr. Seth Noble to settle in the work of the ministry among them.

"Seth Noble, who received this call from the River St. John, was a native of Westfield, Massachusetts, a descendant of a Thomas Noble who came to the Massachusetts Colony about 1653 and settled at Westfield.† The house where he was born, April 15, 1743, built by his grandfather, Deacon Thomas Noble, in 1727, upon land originally granted the emigrant-ancestor, is still standing at Westfield, though not in possession of the Noble family for upwards of a century. With its plastered front, fourteen inch square hewn timbers, paneled partitions, wide boards, huge fireplaces, and chimney twelve feet or more square, the ancient mansion, now somewhat dilapidated, is an interesting relic of 'the old Colonial day.'

"Seth Noble's relative, the Reverend Oliver Noble, was contemporary minister at Newbury, Mass., where Seth, as his letters show, was well acquainted. Newbury and Newburyport (anciently the port of 'Ould Newbury,' set off as a separate town in 1764) were parts of the old home territory of most of the earliest St. John River settlers. There they traded and got supplies, and there they appear to have turned for a supply of the gospel.

"Seth Noble joined the Congregational Church at Westfield in 1770, but when or where he was ever ordained to the ministry does not appear to be known. Dr. J.G. Holland, in his 'History of Western Massachusetts,' published in 1855, refers to him as not a liberally educated man, but he was a divine of a good degree of talent, and some not unpleasant peculiarities.

"The terms offered Seth Noble by the St. John River settlers were liberal for those days. They were promptly accepted. He was duly installed in his first charge as minister of the Congregational Church at Maugerville - first Protestant church and minister of the St. John River - and the building of a meeting house was begun.

"He was no sooner fairly settled in his new ministerial office and dignity than, following further good old New England custom, he took unto himself a help-mate. He chose youth, and, evidently, beauty. Imagination might conjure up a very pretty story of the courtship and marriage, in this primitive settlement, of blue-eyed Hannah Barker, daughter of Joseph and relative of ruling elder Squire Jacob Barker, aged sweet sixteen, and the new parson, a handsome man of thirty-two. Their nuptials were celebrated November 30, 1775.

"But all was not to be sunshine and joy for Parson Noble. Troublous times loomed in church and state. The following letter, written by the Parson to a nephew at Westfield, who had spent some time on the St. John River, shows something of the stress of religious and political feeling at Maugerville.

Dear Kinsman:

I received yours of the 7th and 10th, with joy. Had you been more particular respecting the national difficulties, it would have been an addition to my joy. I have enjoyed a usual state of health. I took a bosom companion the last of November. She has been pressed down under a weight and burden of her sins, almost ever since we entered into that near relation, but I trust, within a few days past, has happily taken sanctuary in Christ, the only ark of safety.

There is at present a considerable shaking of the dry bones among us, and several have happily put on Christ, which is life eternal. Simeon Towns is daily rejoicing in the rock of his salvation. Asa Kimball and wife are brought out into marvelous light. John Watson was greatly troubled in mind during his absence. It was pressed upon him to return to this place, which he did with Capt. Lovet, and is now almost incessantly praising and adoring the lowly Jesus. Andrew Tibbetts and wife, Mr. Gellison's wife, Thomas Saunders, Sarah Coy, and Alice Potter seem under the preparatory work of the spirit...

My wife with myself desires to be remembered to you, to Mr. Granger, to your mother, and all my kindred and acquaintance.

From your friend and humble servant,

Seth Noble

Maugerville, 7th February, 1776.

P.S. I send this letter by Capt. Row, tho' it is uncertain whether he goes further than Machias. I shall expect you in the spring, if there is any passing. I should be glad to take Medad Noble till he is 21, except he should be greatly bent on learning a trade, and if he is, I will endeavor to get him a good place at Newbury Port. Pray advise with his mother and my brethern about it, and especially with him. If he and they think it best, pray bring him down with you. I will do as well by him as I would by my own. Mr. Saunders has done considerable labor on your land. We have had something of a cold season of late, though not colder than it is many times in Westfield. We have about eighteen inches of snow. Mr. Makin died soon after you went away but nobody since. Jeremiah Howland and Polly Buber were published last Sabbath, and Israel Esty and Salome Burpe. Josiah Whitney is married.

It seems to be still as to political affairs. If you could bring a Suffield dishturner, it might be a benefit to the person and to this place. A saddler is much wanted, for there have been near a dozen horses purchased here since you left us. There were sundry opportunities to set a passage from New England here last fall. We have a number of vessels lately come in from over the Bay. We have unanimously signed a paper, to join New England in the national struggle, and are making all possible preparations for war. The fleet and army that went from Boston to Halifax have sailed, we suppose, for England, though they pretended they were going to Quebec.

"The attempt of the Maugerville settlers, influenced largely by the Parson, to throw in their lot with their mother colony of Massachusetts, was frustrated by the arrival at the mouth of the river, early in May, 1777, of a British war vessel from Halifax, which quickly ended the 'rebellion' on the St. John River. The Maugerville settlers renewed their allegiance to the British Crown. Parson Noble and a few ringleaders signed an abject submission to the British, begging 'that no distinction be made as to pardon.' The Parson, however, not feeling sure of the treatment which would be accorded him by the British authorities, decided to flee. He left his wife and the place where he was so comfortably settled, and, narrowly escaping capture, it is related, made his way with Jonathan Eddy and some others, by the inland Indian route, to Machias, Maine.

"He was no sooner there than he turned soldier, and, shouldering a musket, started back for the St. John River, via Musquash Cove, the British vessel having departed from St. John. He was with John Allen's party in this effort to gain over the St. John Indians and strike a blow at the British Tyrant.

"The Parson as Soldier spent several weeks cruising on the St. John, and doubtless had an opportunity to visit his young wife at Maugerville, where she bore him a son, Seth, August 5, 1777.† She did not leave Maugerville to join her husband until the latter part of 1780.

"This raid on the St. John River, from Machias, necessitated an other British expedition from Halifax, which soon swept the river clear of the 'rebels,' and Parson Noble once more sought refuge at Machias, by the inland route, with the horde of Indians under John Allen. The Massachusetts record of revolutionary soldiers has the following:

Seth Noble, St. Johns. Private, Capt. Jabez West's Co.; enlisted May 17, 1777; discharged July 22, 1777; service, 2 mos., 5 days; company raised in Machias for service on expedition against St. Johns.

"He was at Machias when a British squadron, under Sir George Collier, made an attack and destroyed stores accumulated there, August 14-15, 1777, and the following Sunday preached a sermon on the event. He wrote a letter to General Washington, urging the importance of getting control of the St. John River and the Bay of Fundy, but Washington had too many other irons in the fire, and the British were strong at Halifax. Further efforts for the conquest of old Acadia were abandoned. Parson Noble took his departure from Machias, and his future warfare was confined within the limits of the Church Militant and a Struggle for existence.

"During the remaining years of the war he appears to have ministered at various places in New England, not far distant from Newbury. He was careful not to get too far down-east, within reach of British cruisers, as the following letter shows:

Woburn, June 7, 1777.

Honorable Gentlemen:-

I received an order for a mission to the eastern settlements, yesterday, by the hands of Col. Baldwin, but find its contents so much different from what I had expected, must decline the undertaking. I was informed the mission was to be on the River Penobscot only, but find I was misinformed. There are such a variety of islands, and other inhabitants contiguous to the water those seas are so much frequented by their cruisers, that I think it is too dangerous for a proscribed person to accept of. I suppose you are not unacquainted with the amazing scarcity of the necessaries of life in those parts. Add to this, the reward offered me, when laid out in provision or clothing, will not purchase more than one dollar would in 1775.

From a friend to those liberties which God and nature has bestowed on mankind.

To the whole Court.

"In 1784 Parson Noble wrote an extraordinary letter - a good specimen of old-time 'Yankee' audacity - to the church at Maugerville, claiming arrears of pay, etc. The brethern of Maugerville sent him a complete and well-rounded reply, which is printed in publications of New Brunswick Historical Society.

"In 1785 he received, as a Nova Scotia refugee, a grant of 300 acres of land at the new plantation of his friend, Jonathan Eddy, on the Penobscot River, and, in the spring of 1786, he appeared there with his wife and family, and met some of his old Maugerville associates, now refugees. His friends there and at the Kenduskeag plantation (Bangor) succeeded in getting a guarantee signed for a salary of 70 pounds, and engaged him as minister for the Penobscot River settlement. On September 10, 1786, under some spreading oak-trees, in the vicinity of what is now the corner of Oak and Washingtou streets, Bangor, he was installed, by Rev. Daniel Little, as a 'minister of the people' -the first settled preacher on that part of the Penobscot.

"There, for between eleven and twelve years, he led a severe and strenuous life. Times were hard and the people poor in those early days on the Penobscot. In 1786, the year in which Parson Noble started preaching the gospel there, the whole settlement signed a

petition to the 'General Court,' original of which is extant, asking to be relieved of their taxes, as they were unable to pay them. The Parson lived, at first, in a log house. He had no organized church, but preached about the country in barns, etc, and travelled by birch-bark canoe. An entry in his diary reads: 'Apl. 8, 1794. Fixed my canoe.'

"The Kenduskeag settlement received the name of Sunbury, doubtless bestowed either by Parson Noble himself or some others who went there from Sunbury County - the early name of the St. John River territory. This name the Kenduskeag settlement bore for several years.

"In 1790 the Massachusetts General Court was petitioned for the incorporation of this settlement as a town. The inhabitants had voted that it be called Sunbury. Parson Noble bore the petition to the Legislature at Boston in the summer of 1790, but instead of Sunbury, inserted in the petition the name of 'Bangor.' The Parson was a great singer, and said to have been partial to the old hymn-tune called Bangor. Dr. Watts' hymns were then being substituted in the congregations for the Psalms of David as so spiritedly rendered in the old Bay Psalter. The tune to Bangor was commonly sung to the inspiring words of the hymn called 'A Funeral Thought:'

Hark! from the tombs, a doleful sound.

"The Parson, who was considerable of a wag was liable to do odd things, especially when under the influence of a slight overdose of the favorite New England cordial of that day. Some ascribe this sudden change of name to an accident, but probably the Parson concluded that the name Sunbury flavored of the British Tyrant. Bangor the settlement became, and is now the city of that name. Incorporation was granted in February, 1791, and in 1792 Squire Jonathan Eddy issued the warrant to organize the town.

"While Parson Noble was in Boston on this matter, his wife, the blue-eyed Hannah Barker of Maugerville, suddenly died. A full reading of Dr. Watts' hymn would almost furnish a belief that the Parson had a prescience of his loss.

"The Parson found it very difficult to eke out an existence for himself and his family in those pioneer days on the Penobscot. He farmed, taught school, including singing singing-schools being then in great vogue - and had to collect his own salary wherever he could get it. About this time he appears to have become well-nigh desperate, and wrote the following letter:

Penobscot River, August 21, 1790.

Gentlemen:

Sundry attempts have been made for a settlement between the people and myself; but all to no effect. When I settled here I consented to accept 20 pounds less than what was really necessary to support my family, because the people said they were poor. Still, to relieve them of the burden, I have been at the expense to collect a great part of what has been collected. Very little thanks have I had for the trouble that I have been to. I was desired to draw a bond for the people to sign for my support, which was rejected, and another drawn (unbeknown to me) which hath deprived me of one-half of the sum proposed. I am willing to do in this and all cases, as I would be done by; but necessity compels me to say, I must have my pay.

I must further tell you I shall look to no other persons for a settlement, but that committee which covenanted with me on June 7, 1786 to give me 70 pounds annual salary. What you then did, is as binding as a note of hand. I am sorry to take any coercive measures; but I tell you again, I must have my pay immediately.

I am, gentlemen, with due respect, Your most obedient, humble servant,

Seth Noble

To the Committee.

"In 1791 he visited the place of his first settlement, on the St. John River, and spent part of the summer and fall of that year preaching and visiting old acquaintances on the river. He may have been taking notice again of the fair sex, tho he did not get his second partner on the St. John River, but in the Bangor district, where he wedded, in 1793, a widow Ruhamah Emery, who had been his housekeeper before she became wife. Despite his antipathy to the British Tyrant, he appears to have cast longing eyes toward the fertile vales of old Sunbury during his many years of wandering and deprivation. Tho he did not succeed in his various efforts to again establish himself there, he took his two young and only surviving sons, of his nine children, to the St. John, presumably in his visit or 1791. They were brought up by their maternal relatives at Maugerville or Sheffield, where they settled, and have numerous descendants in New Brunswick.

"By 1797 the Parson's living had become so reduced, with gossips' tongues a-wag, that he was compelled to leave the Penobscot. For a time he supplied various pulpits in New Hampshire. In 1799 he returned to his native place, Westfield, Mass., and for sixteen months remained among his kindred, and supplied a large list of pulpits in that vicinity. He is described as 'a man of great activity.' A mere list of the places where he preached and taught singing-school during his career would appear something like a gazetteer of New England. In 1801 he was installed as the first minister of Montgomery, Mass., a territory originally included mostly within the boundaries of his old home, Westfield. There he ministered for about five years, and had the usual difficulty in collecting his stipend in a new and poor settlement.

"In 1806, when 63 years of age, he struck out for what was then the 'far west,' Ohio. He was one of the refugees who received grants of land in the section of Ohio set of by the United States Congress for some revolutionists of Nova Scotia and Canada. Upon a part of this 'refugee land' stands the city of Columbus, the capital of Ohio. His grant was in Franklinton, now part of Columbus. There he built a cabin, and is said to have been the first Congregational or Presbyterian preacher in that part of the country. For fifteen months he preached at different places in Ohio. The last sermon he is known to have preached was at Franklinton, August 9, 1807, from Matt. xi, 28: Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. His earthly career came to an end at Franklinton, September 15, 1807, when 64 years of age, and his remains were interred there, but the westward sweep of civilization left no trace of the place of his sepulchre.

"A few months before his demise he had married in Ohio a third wife, a widow, Mary Riddle, who it is stated had been previously of New Brunswick.

"Of his grant of 640 acres in Ohio, which might have enriched his descendants, portions were disposed of for trifling sums. His sons, Benjamin and Joseph, resident in New Brunswick, probably never claimed their shares. Many of the largest of the sixtynine original grantees of these refugee lands, who were mainly of Cumberland County, Nova Scotia, parted with their titles for little or nothing. Some settled on the land, and doubtless have descendants in Ohio at the present day.

"Some who knew him have left interesting pen-pictures of Parson Noble, who was a man of lively parts, and considered by some of his parishioners as 'airy.'

"Mrs. Howard, a good lady who was his near neighbor at Bangor, has left record that the Parson was a very airy man, preached well, gifted in prayer, a good neighbor and a good gardener; a very industrious man, excellent in sickness, and very moral.

"William Hasey, one of the earliest settlers at Bangor, wrote in 1844:

Rev. Mr. Noble was settled in Bangor some six or seven years after I came here. He was a pretty good preacher, a most gifted man in prayer, especially on funeral occasions, he excelled. Indeed I

never heard his equal, so touching, so affecting. A most excellent singer. He could drink a glass of grog and be jovially merry. When out of the pulpit he ought never to go in, and when in never to go out. His religious friends had scruples of his vital piety, and after Mr. Noble went away, he wrote to Deacon Boyd, saying he had never experienced religion till after he left Bangor. A very handsome man, of middle stature, dark brown hair, quite a gentleman.

"From Williamson's annals, etc.:

Deacon Wm. Boyd has often talked with me about 'Parson Noble.' The Deacon who came to Bangor in 1791, says Mr. Noble was too light and frothy in his conversation, did not sustain the gravity of character becoming a minister, would drink a dram with almost anyone who asked him, laugh, and tell improper anecdotes. Yet in his religious performances he was able and pathetic - no doubt, pious as he was truly an orthodox and faithful preacher. He is described as a man thin-faced, spare, not tall, of light complection and of fresh countenance. He was active, smart and nervous. He preached with notes and sometimes they were pretty old. His head was covered with a remarkable, white, powdered wig.

"Thus may end these chronicles concerning a pioneer preacher in New Brunswick, New England and Ohio, who was an ardent hater of the British Tyrant, but a very genial person, and something of a sport."

Children of Seth & Hannah (Barker) Noble

MONCTON PUBLIC LIBRARY 644 Main Street

The Heritage Room is rich in the history of the local area. It houses the open-shelf non-circulating collection of South Eastern Branch. The Library's own non-circulating collection is catalogued on file cards. These two collections can prove a wealth of information for the genealogist.

The research Librarian can assist in the use of the catalogues available for ordering material from other institutions on inter-library loan. Thru this system material may be brought in free of charge from the provincial/national archives as well as other provincial libraries.

The micro-film room upstairs contains many rolls of film for public use.

CENTRE d'ETUDES ACADIENNES - UNIVERSITE DE MONCTON Main entrance Archibald St.

The Center for Acadian Studies at the University of Moncton is a central depository and study center for all matters regarding the Maritime Acadians in the reconstruction of their history especially of the period of the dispersion and resettlement c.1750 - 1800. A full time genealogist on staff will consult with visitors with their genealogical research as well as answer written queries.

The material at the Center consists of primary and secondary sources, of manuscript and printed matter. The primary sources are parish registers containing Acadian birth, marriage and death information. As many New Brunswickers have relatives in Quebec the Center has acquired copies of the printed marriage records for 200 Quebec parishes. Copies of most of the pre and post-dispersion registers for the Acadian parishes are available. Census records from the earliest 1671 Acadian to the 1891 Canadian census are available. In addition there are many official Acadian lists to provide important information. There are numerous books, periodicals, and newspaper clippings as well as manuscript materials by well known French authors.

The fullest advantage of the resources may be derived only by a personal visit. Researchers are encouraged to visit the center Monday to Friday from 8:30 5 pm.; Tuesday until 9pm. The archives are located on the second floor of the Champlain Library building on the University of Moncton Campus. In the basement of this building is located a small Acadian museum that is well worth a visit.

MONCTON AREA

Going outside of Moncton there are many other sources. At the Albert County Museum open during the summer months there is a limited collection on that area. In Hillsborough, the William Henry House, open during the summer months, houses the archival records for the Steeves Family and many family artifacts.

MOUNT ALLISON UNIVERSITY - Sackville, N.B.

Over the years rare books, newspapers, genealogies and other records have been collected in the University archives. The Library hours September to April are Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday 9am-12;1-4pm; Friday 9am until noon. May to August mornings only by appointment [506-364-2563]. A `borrowers card' is required to use any of the Library facilities.

THE BELL COLLECTION, a non-circulating collection housed in the Rare Book Room on the main floor, is catalogued. It contains books, pamphlets, articles, general histories, manuscripts, local church and family histories dealing with the history of the Indians, Pre Loyalists, Loyalists and Acadians in the Maritimes provinces. Also there are a number of cemetery transcriptions for Baie Verte, Buctouche, Dorchester and many other places in South Eastern New Brunswick.

The <u>Archives</u> houses college records from its founding in the 1840's. There are books to help researchers with their Yorkshire and Loyalist ancestry. Local histories are available for Botsford, Shediac Cape, Dorchester, Petitcodiac, and Sackville. The <u>WESTMORLAND COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY COLLECTION</u> contains many family histories as well as manuscripts of talks given to the society. <u>THE FORT BEAUSEJOUR COLLECTION</u> covers Albert county, the Chignecto Peninsula, Dorchester, Moncton, Sackville and Shediac with information on Acadians, New Englanders and Yorkshiremen.

In the library itself many old provincial newspapers can be read both in bound copies as well as on micro film. These date back early as the Wesleyan from Sackville in 1838 and The Morning News from Saint John in 1839. Early census and a limited number of micro filmed thesis on local families are in the library. Library hours September to April weekdays 8:20am to midnight. Summer hours vary.

LEGISLATIVE LIBRARY Fredericton

This Library in downtown Fredericton may also be of assistance to the family researcher. Although not a lending library the public is welcome to use its facilities during regular week day office hours. A partial listing may be found in Hugh Taylor's book A Checklist of Secondary Sources.

NEW BRUNSWICK PUBLIC ARCHIVES Fredericton

Located on the UNB campus between the bookstore and the Engineering building the current hours are Monday to Friday 10 am to 5pm; Saturday 8:30am to 5 pm. A knowledgeable and friendly staff is ready to assist the visitor with their problems. The county guides are valuable as to what can be found for each area of the province. At this time it might be wise to read Hugh Taylor's New Brunswick History; A Check List of Secondary Sources as well as Eric Swanick's supplement to this book. These books list the title, the number of pages and the location of several thousand books, articles and pamphlets of interest to the researcher. Having exhausted the sources listed in the county guides, one might wish to consult Robert Fellow's book Researching Your Ancestors in New Brunswick for additional sources listed under the section on archives. Bob, as is he known to thousand of researchers is an archivist on staff of PANB. The archives hold records of every imageable source.. Family Histories, Teacher's Petitions, The County Reference Collection with lists of immigrant and settlers; scrapbooks of family and local histories. The list goes on endlessly...one could spent days here scratching only the surface of the information available.

HARRIET IRVING LIBRARY UNB Campus Fredericton

The Archives and Special Collections division of the Harriet Irving Library is across the street from the archives. Located on the top floor of the Library, they are open Monday to Friday from 8:30 to 5 pm. The archives have copies of history thesis of interest to the genealogist as they frequently contain biographical information such as Ward Chipman: United Empire Loyalist. Card indexes in the archives/special collections section of the library give further clues of what is located there. The library has copies of ancient New Brunswick newspapers both in the original form and on micro film. These are available on Inter-library loan along with the reels of the Programme for Loyalist Studies and Publications', one of the most extensive Loyalist collections, containing records from the period 1784 to 1830.

NEW BRUNSWICK LIBRARY SYSTEM

This provincial system contains many wonderful sources in local areas. The <u>SAINT JOHN LIBRARY</u>, located in Market Square, is one of the oldest libraries within the province. It has acquired family and local histories; an exceptionally fine collection of old newspaper and other material; scrapbooks such as the David Russel Jack Scrapbooks dealing with pre-Loyalists and Loyalists as well as the W.O. Raymond series of scrapbooks. For those of us with American ancestry books are available describing the collections of Maine, Massachusetts and New York Historical Societies.

At the <u>ST. CROIX LIBRARY IN ST. STEPHEN</u> the Percy Rigby Collection and the James Vroom Papers, scrapbooks filled with local clippings, all contain excellent historical and genealogical data. Also found here is information on the near by area of Calais Maine as this area of the province was home to many of the early Loyalist settlers.

There are over 300 publications and manuscripts in the W.O. Raymond Room. For those with pre- Loyalist backgrounds it is interesting to note that a number of the descendants of the Sunbury county inhabitants moved to central and upper Carleton county about 1800. In the Raymond collection are assessment lists for as early as 1842 and 1843; a copy of the 1820 census for Madawaska Settlement as well as copies of Carleton Sentinel and the Woodstock Dispatch with published vital statistics. I believe the Carleton Branch of NBGS has added to the holdings of this library over the past few years.

Outside the provincial library system is the <u>OLD MANSE LIBRARY</u> at Newcastle which houses information of the Miramichi area. As well as local histories, books etc. there is material dealing with local families as the Miramichi Historical Society collection is housed there.

In general small community libraries are excellent places to search for information on your ancestors. The many small museums throughout the province also bear time spent searching thru their records and talking to their staff.

Researching outside the province is similar to New Brunswick. Community libraries and museums are rich sources of material.

FAMILY HISTORY CENTERS OF THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER DAY SAINTS

The Center in Saint John has very limited research hours - Thursday / Friday 10am-2pm; Thursday night 7 - 9 pm & also on Saturday. Researchers are encouraged to make use of the genealogical records & resources found in the center or available thru their loan system. The facility, open to everyone, only charges for photocopies or postage on interlibrary loans.

The Family History Library has records kept by Governments, churches, organizations & individuals including church registers, census, passenger lists, military records, land & probate records. Most of these records date from 1550 to c. 1910. These records include North America, Eritain, Europe, Scandinavia, Latin America, Philippines, Australia, China, Japan, India, Korea, New Zealand, South Africa, Sri Lanka Zimbabwe. All of these microfilms are described in the Family History Library Catalog available at the Center.

At the Saint John Center the following is available:

- Research aids...guides to the resources in FHC; how to research using their system; etc.
- Microfiche Reference Collection
- Family History Library Catalog
- International Genealogical Index [IGI File] contains over 120 million names of deceased persons; arranged by locality then alphabetically by name.
- Microfilm Collection: may be borrowed for the cost of the postage. There are over 1,000,000 rolls of film of vital records
- Accelerated Indexing Systems Data Base [AIS]: index of American census returns 1790-1850
- Family Registry:contains names and addresses of those researching various families wold wide.
- Ancestry's Red Book American State, County and Town Sources edited by Alice Eichholz

Reaching beyond our Maritime borders the sources are as numerous as the ones I have mentioned. I would recommend reading Researching Your Ancestors in New Brunswick Canada by Robert Fellows as well as Ancestry's Red Book by Alice Eichholz for American sources.

The Provincial Archives of Nova Scotia are found on Coburg Street in Halifax. A quick phone call will confirm the current hours of operation. Their holdings are similar to those found in the New Brunswick provincial archives but they also include the earliest of records for New Brunswick as we were once part of Nova Scotia. The archives publishes a pamphlet entitled Tracing Your Ancestors in Nova Scotia and a 700 page Inventory of Manuscripts. A valuable book to consult at this time would be Genealogical Research in Nova Scotia by Terrance Punch. The above mentioned books are available for consultation at the New Brunswick archives.

There are two major research places on Frince Edward Island - the Public Archives and the Prince Edward Island Heritage Foundation both located in Charlottetown. One should also look at the Land Registry Office as well as the Vital Statistics Branch of the Dept. of Health in the Charlottetown as some of their records date back to the late 1700's.

This data was compiled from the Commemorative Biographical Record of the Upper Wisconsin counties of Waupaca, Portage, Wood, Marathon, Lincoln, Oneida, Vilas, Langlade & Shawano by J. H. Beers & Company, Chicago, Illinois, 1895.

CHRISTY, John P. born 1 December 1830, New Brunswick, Canada; son of John and Parmelia (Quint) Christy, father born in the same province in 1801, and mother born September 1809 in the State of Maine; grandson of Jesse and Easter (Burpee) Christy; the grandfather was born in New Hampshire 1 August 1755, and went to Canada in 1762 with the first colony that settled along the St. John river; the grandmother, a native of the same place in NH, born 3 May 1759, also a member of the colony; John P. Christy married 1869, Francis MITCHELL, a native of N.B.; daughter of William & Anna (Doby) Mitchell. They remained in their native country until 1892, when, accompanied by their family, came to Wisconsin, locating in Merrill.

CHRISTY, Thomas born 13 August 1835, New Brunswick, Canada; a brother of John P. Christy; married 3 September 1868, in Canada, Helen WHITE, who was born in that country 23 June 1851, a daughter of Peter and Esther (Wiggins) White. In September 1881, he came to Wisconsin, locating at Wausau, removed to Scofield in 1885 remaining there about a year, when he came to Merrill and built his blacksmith shop where he employed five workmen.

GREEN, Darius E. born 1836 in New Brunswick, Canada; son of James and Mary (Plummer) Green; married 1879, Effie GARTER; daughter of James Garter.

KOLLOCK, Henry born 12 November 1828, New Brunswick, Canada; son of Shepherd F. and Mary Eliza (Taylor) Kollock, both natives of New Brunswick; married 20 March 1854, Permelia BARBER; daughter of Chester Barber.

LAWLER, Finn born 8 May 1845, Douglas, Northumberland Co., New Brunswick, Canada; son of John Lawler of same nativity; grandson of Patrick and Margaret (Finn) Lawler; grandfather was born in Queens County, Ireland.

McCROSSEN, James born 13 February 1829, Carleton, New Brunswick, Canada; son of Robert and Elizabeth (McCrossen) McCrossen, both of whom were of Irish birth and Scotch ancestry; married 4 July 1853, Cornelia A. JONES, daughter of J. H. and Nancy Jones, natives of New York.

MURRAY, A. B. born 12 May 1834, New Brunswick, Canada; son of William and Elvira (Bunten) Murray; father born 9 January 1811, County Down, Ireland; married 4 July 1861 in Ogdensburg, Wisconsin to Isabel WARREN, born 15 November 1841, Belfast, Maine; daughter of Mark and Abigail (Piper) Warren.

RAYWORTH, Ernest S. born February 1864, Westmoreland, New Brunswick, Canada; son of Robert and Hannah (Dobson) Rayworth, father born 1835, England and mother born 1840; grandson of Ephraim Rayworth; married 1890 in St. Paul, Minnesota to Maggie GLISPBEE, born in LaCrescent, Minnesota; daughter of John Glispbee.



Joanna Hincksman Hoare, widow of Charles Hoare, Jr., one-time Sheriff of Gloucester in England emigrated to New England with five of her children in 1640. In 1761, David Hoar, a fifth generation descendant, embarked with his wife and seven children from the port of Boston and landed on the shores of Cobequid Bay in the area of Onslow, Nova Scotia. About 1794, his youngest son, David Hoar, Jr., born 1753, moved to the nopewell area of Albert County, New Brunswick to found the New Brunswick branch of the Hoar family. This book outlines the early history of the pioneer Hoar family in North America.

STEEVES AND COLPITTS PIONEERS OF THE UPPER PETITCODIAC (1988) By W.S.Hoar

Acadians first farmed the marshes and intervales of the Petitcodiac River west of its great bend at Moncton. They were followed by the Pennsylvania Dutch, the Yorkshire settlers and the New Englanders. This book is devoted to the Pennsylvania Dutch and the Yorkshire settlers. For two centuries, the Frederick Branch of Heinrich and Rachel Stief's family, Pennsylvania Dutch arrivals of 1766, farmed a large acreage about eight miles west of Moncton. Robert Colpitts and Margaret Wade with their family came from Durham County, England with the Yorkshire immigrants; they settled on the Little River in 1783. Their descendants pioneered the lands along the Little and Pollett Rivers, two tributaries of the Petitcodiac. Descendants of Robert Colpitts still farm the original lands.

Where to start an ancestral search

Scotland

If you are seeking to trace genealogy, write to General Register Office for Scotland, New Register House, Edinburgh EH1 3YT, Scotland; you will be sent a brochure entitled, "List of main records in the custody of the Register General for Scotland and information regarding facilities for searching in the records and for the issue of extracts." The information includes all the records that can be searched, instructions for searches requested by mail and carried out by the General Register Office staff, and advice on compiling a family tree. Fees for searches and extracts are also listed.

The brochure will be invaluable to those planning a trip to Edinburgh because they can book ahead for the type of search required instead of leaving admission to the Register to chance.

There are two types of searches. A Particular Search, a search by a member of the General Register Office staff for a specific entry, can be done by mail. However, such a search can be undertaken only if sufficient identifying information is supplied. Full instructions are provided. A General Search is

a search, over any period of years for any number of entries, made by any member of the public aged 16 or older.

Along with records of births, deaths and marriages, it is also possible to get records regarding wills and other documents by writing to the Scottish Record Office, General Register House, Edinburgh EH1 3YY.

For records about coats of arms and genealogies write to The Lyon Office, New Register House, Edinburgh EH1 3YT.

England and Wales

For those interested in searching records of births, deaths and marriages in England and Wales, requests can be mailed to: General Register Office, Smedley Hydro, Merseyside PR8 2HH, England. Personal searches can be made at the Registrar General, St. Catherine's House, 10 Kingsway, London WC2B 6JP.

Ireland

Records of births, deaths and marriages in Ireland can be requested from: Registrar General, Oxford House, 49-55 Chichester Street, Belfast BT1 4HL, Northern Ireland, or Registrar General, 8-11 Lombard Street East, Dublin, Ireland.

GRAVESTONES

When you have the opportunity to travel to the area in which your ancestors lived, one of the first things you want to do is look for their gravestones. Much has been written about reading old gravestones that have been weathered for their importance lies in the verification of your ancestor. It can provide missing information on birth, death, spouse, children and names.

when I went to Norway eighteen years ago, I saw the grand headstone placed at my grandparents' graves. It provided their names and dates of births and deaths for both grandparents.

Imagine my surprise on a recent visit to that same cemetery to find only a simple flat stone that read "Holmberg" marking the two graves of my grandparents!

In this churchyard in Idd, Norway, the family is required to pay for the upkeep of the grave 20 years at a time. In addition, they are to maintain the grave by weeding around the stone, washing it and perhaps planting flowers in the spring. Flowers need regular watering each week and must be removed in the fall. Graves that are not cared for are cited.

Spoentgen

When the constant care becomes too much for the family, or there is no one to do it, the stone is removed. I asked my relative is this is the norm in Norway. Her answer was, "I have never heard any different."

In our circumstance, the remaining family members had removed the large stone and replaced it with the simple marker to make it easier for them. And they intend to remove the smaller stone when the current 20 year payment expires in order to eliminate the need to return to the church yard regularly. It was also learned that the graves of my great grandparents is unmarked for that very reason. The family had taken the stones away years ago. The graves can no longer be found.

The lesson is to become acquainted with local customs and don't assume they do things in the same way as we do them at home.
