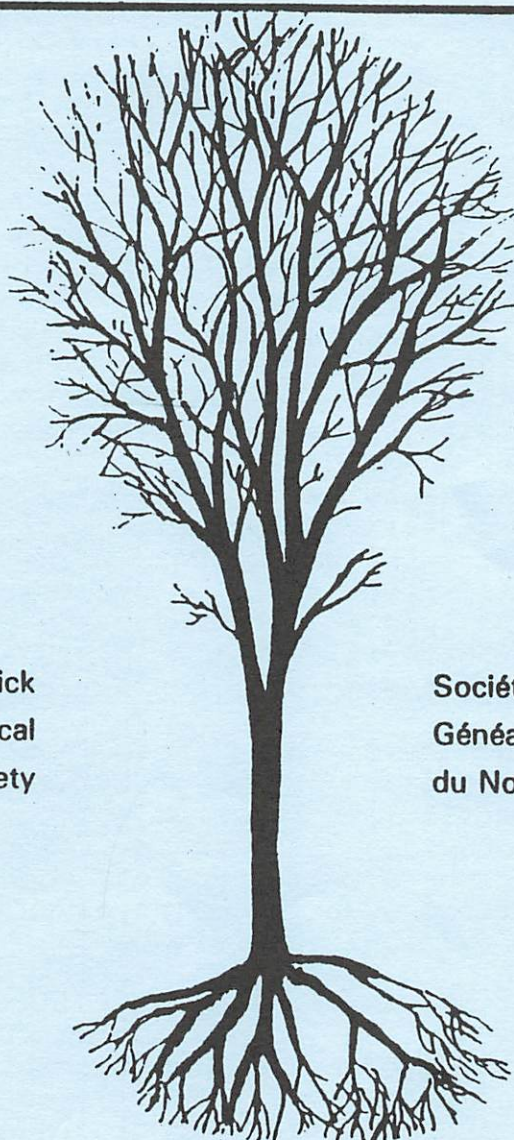

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From the Editor's Desk

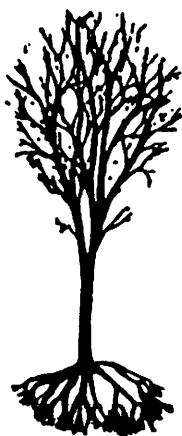

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Pioneer Preacher - Rev. Seth Noble

(Continued from previous issue)

12. Hannah³ Barker Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born December 30, 1810, at Sheffield, Sunbury Co., N.B., daughter of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble. Her death date is unknown, but she was living in Bridgewater, Maine, in 1876.⁽²⁾

She married **John Ackerson**, January 25, 1827, in Carleton Co., N.B.⁽¹⁾. He was born October 20, 1800, at Sheffield, son of Jacob and Catherine (Mills) Ackerson. He died November 18, 1859, probably at Bridgewater, Maine.⁽²⁾ His surname was recorded in the Carleton Co. marriage records as "Acker," but the surname on both his parents and his grandparents tombstone in the cemetery at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., is "Ackerson."

Hannah moved with her family from Sheffield to Lower Brighton when she was about three years old. She lived there for about 19 years, then in the Parish of Wakefield for 19 years. The remainder of her life was spent in Bridgewater, Maine.

At the age of 12, John Ackerson moved with his family from Sunbury Co. to Lower Brighton, where he resided until 1832 when he moved to the Parish of Wakefield, Carleton Co., then in 1851 he moved to Bridgewater, Maine.⁽²⁾

George³ Seth Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born January 15, 1812,⁽¹⁾ probably at Sheffield, Sunbury Co., N.B., for his parents are said to have moved from there to Carleton Co. about 1813, son of Benjamin and Susannah (Currie) Noble. He died April 19, 1891, and was buried in the cemetery in Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B.⁽⁴⁾

He married **Ann "Nancy" McKinney**, August 4, 1835, in Carleton Co., N.B.,⁽⁵⁾ probably at Lower Brighton. She was born about 1812, daughter of Michael and Christianna McKinney. She died April 18, 1886, and was buried in the Lower Brighton cemetery.⁽⁴⁾

They lived at Lower Brighton. George was a farmer.⁽³⁾

14. Joseph³ Barker Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born August 4, 1815,⁽¹⁾ probably at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., son of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble. His death date is unknown.

He married **Florine McGraw**, October 24, 1836, in Fredericton, N.B.⁽²⁾ She was born about 1814, in New Brunswick, daughter of Amelia Turner who married a Mr. McGraw, and granddaughter of Holden and Jennet (Hutchinson) Turner.⁽⁴⁾ Her death date is unknown.

Joseph Noble was a Baptist Minister.

15. Enoch³ Barker Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born August 17, 1818,⁽¹⁾ probably at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., son of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble. His death date is unknown. He probably died at Blaine, Maine, for he was living there in 1880.⁽⁵⁾

He married **Margaret McGraw**, June 25, 1840, in Carleton Co., N.B..⁽²⁾ She was from the Fredericton area in York Co., N.B., daughter of Amanda Turner who married a Mr. McGraw, and granddaughter of Holden and Jennet (Hutchinson) Turner. Margaret was a sister of Florine McGraw who married Enoch's brother, Joseph Noble.⁽³⁾

Enoch and Margaret Noble removed from Carleton Co., N.B., to Blaine, Maine, where they operated a farm.⁽³⁾

16. Theodore³ Harding Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born September 26, 1820,⁽³⁾ at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., son of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble. He died October 2, 1898, at Bristol, Carleton Co., N.B., and was buried in the cemetery at Lower Brighton.⁽³⁾

He married first, **Martha J. McGee**, March 16, 1848, in Carleton Co., N.B..⁽¹⁾ She was born about 1828, daughter of George and Rhoda (Shaw) McGee of Lower Brighton.⁽⁴⁾ She died April 17, 1867, at 39 years of age, and was buried in the cemetery at Lower Brighton.⁽³⁾

He married second, **Cynthia Marsten**.⁽⁵⁾⁽⁶⁾ She was born about 1843.⁽⁵⁾ The names of her parents and her death date are unknown.

17. Rebecca³ Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*), was born May 13, 1823,⁽¹⁾ at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., daughter of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble. She died in 1919, and was buried in the cemetery at Lower Brighton.⁽⁴⁾

She married **Reubin Robinson**, April 3, 1852, in Carleton Co.⁽²⁾ He was born November 18, 1818. His father's name is unknown, but his mother was Sarah (Thomas) Robinson, who married second, John Duncan Dickinson, when Reubin was about eight years old. He died January 21, 1899 in his 81st year, and was buried in the cemetery at Lower Brighton.⁽⁴⁾

Reubin and Rebecca Robinson lived at Lower Brighton. He was a farmer.

18. Issachar³ Currier Noble (*Benjamin², Seth¹*) was born December 25, 1825, at Lower Brighton, Carleton Co., N.B., son of Benjamin and Susannah (Currier) Noble.⁽⁵⁾ He died September 30, 1872, at Hodgdon, Maine.

He married **Caroline Thomas**, November 18, 1851, in Carleton Co. She was born about 1824, in New Brunswick, probably in Sunbury County before her parents moved from there to Rockland, Carleton County, daughter of Benjamin and Mary (Hayward) Thomas. I have no record of her death date.

Issachar and Caroline are shown in the New Brunswick census of 1861 living in the Parish of Brighton, and the U.S. census of 1870 shows them living at Hodgdon, Maine, with six children, so they removed from New Brunswick to Maine between 1861 and 1870. They lived there the remainder of their lives, and Issachar died there in 1872. Caroline probably died at Hodgdon also.

Issachar was probably named for Issachar Currier, whom I believe was his maternal grandfather.

Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers 1784-1879

In 1982, the Vital Statistics Committee of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society commenced a project to extract births, marriages and deaths from New Brunswick Newspapers. Five volumes were published before the disbandment of the Committee two years later. The project was continued privately by Daniel F. Johnson commencing with Volume 6.

The parameters of the project were broadened to include coroner inquests, suicides, murders and executions. Also included were tax lists, burials, passenger lists, foreign reports of Maritime natives in the gold fields of California and Australia or studying law and medicine at New York and Edinburgh. For example, the series contains accounts of the native men who fell on the American battlefields during the American Civil War, or died from steam boiler explosions on the river boats, as well as Maritime sailors reported as lost at sea. Biographies, notices of missing persons, successful applicants for mates and master certificates are discovered as each column of the paper is scanned. Given the regional nature of New Brunswick Newspapers particular attention is given to natives of P.E.I., Nova Scotia and Maine. Also included is any reference to the movement of people within the Province such as doctors setting up a practice or Ministers being inducted into a local church.

Each volume is individually indexed by full name. The set, which now covers a 95 year time period collectively contains 240,000 name references. Copies are cerloxed so that the pages lay flat when the reader wishes to make transcriptions.

The Lower Brighton Cemetery is located beside Highway 105 on the Bank of the Saint Johnb River, 6 miles south of Hartland and 5 miles north of Grafton, N.B.

The Cemetery is on top of a high cliff or bluff on the East side of the Saint John River with a vertical drop of 130 feet to the River below. The Edmunston to Woodstock Railroad of Canadian Pacific Railways ran between the Saint John River and the foot of the cliff. Between 1910 and 1938 three Rows or more of Graves slid down onto the railroad track and into the river. Sometime around 1937-1939 there was a revetment built on the face of the cliff, which stopped future slides.

Some of the dates and names in this list are not the same as on some of the gravestones, this is true of most of the wives names, as they are listed as _____ wife of _____, also the researcher changed some of the dates to match those found in diaries or wills.

There are as many unmarked graves in this cemetery as there are marked ones.

"Connections" Conference - 1993

"A special occasion for Genealogists With New Brunswick, Canada roots"

If the strong early response is any indication of the numbers of genealogists who will attend the "Connections"-1993 Conference, then 1993 may very well see the largest gathering of New Brunswick genealogists in the history of our Society. In the six weeks following the distribution of fliers in the Summer Issue of "Generations", sixty-five members replied. It is expected, as researchers return from their summer vacations, that the numbers will begin to swell.

The site chosen by the "Connections" Steering Committee of the host Saint John branch for the seminar is the University of New Brunswick Saint John Campus, Saint John, N.B. The campus is within a few minutes drive of the Rockwood Park Golf Course, Cherry Brook Zoo, and driving range.

A number of activities are being planned before and after the conference. Although arrangements are currently under way, special tours of Canada's oldest city will precede the afternoon registration. Saint John has many points of interest such as Market Slip where the Loyalists first landed in 1783. The Old Loyalist Burying Grounds contain many of the earliest stones. The site of old Fort Howe provides a vantage point to see and photograph Saint John. Much of the city's uptown architecture has remained the same since the Great Fire of 1877 while other structures such as the Old Loyalists House dates back to a colonial time period.

Among the confirmed key speakers for the seminars is Dr. Ralph Crandall, head of the New England Historic Genealogical Society Library of Boston, Mass., author of "Shaking Your Family Tree" and popular lecturer at previous New Brunswick seminars. Another confirmed key speaker is David Bell, known to many as the author of "Early Loyalist Saint John". Concurrent sessions will host a number of well known interesting speakers on a wide variety of genealogical topics.

Through organizational displays, computers, etc. every effort will be made to acquaint visitors with New Brunswick records both private and public. Tables will be provided in display areas for individuals who have family charts, books, three-ringed binders. Identification badges will be color coded by New Brunswick County in which an ancestor settled. Organizational tables will be set up on a County Basis as well and color co-ordinated.

Visitors will also have an opportunity to speak directly with certified genealogists and others with qualified backgrounds either through panel discussions or private consultations as time permits.

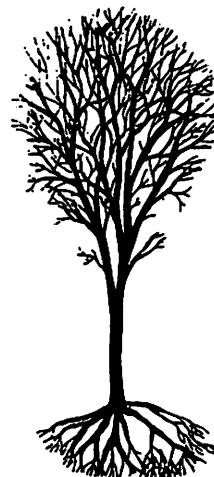

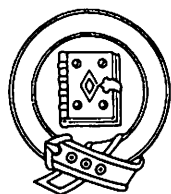

- An alphabetical directory which lists family names sent in to us by researchers along with an identifying time period and place. Each entry refers you to the name and address of the contributor.
- A way to discover relatives anywhere in the world who are researching your family and to exchange information.
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- Each edition contains only the entries submitted to us immediately prior to publication. The entries are not carried over to the next year unless they are resubmitted. Thus each edition is completely different.

Instructions: Surname Entries

A SURNAME/FAMILY NAME:

- Variations of surnames *must* be treated as separate entries — do *not* use brackets.
- First names will only be permitted with common surnames. (Insert surname first — see sample 7.)

B TIME:

- Use only whole years (abbreviated as in sample 7).
- 17th Cent. is unacceptable.
- PRE means any time before that date
- S means that decade (as in 1850S)
- ALL means any time period
- + means any time after that date
- C means circa (approximately)
- No other abbreviations are permitted.

C CITY/TOWN/CANADIAN OR US TOWNSHIP/ CANADIAN OR US COUNTY:

- Spell it out in full (Use ST. for Saint.)
- For Canadian and US counties and townships, use abbreviation CO or TWP. (see sample 2)

- Two cities/towns etc. may be entered on the same line if they're in the same Province/State etc (see sample 4)

D PROVINCE/STATE/BRITISH OR IRISH COUNTY:

- Up to three areas may be entered in abbreviated form on the same line provided that if a city/town etc. is also given, it relates to the first area given (sample 3)

E COUNTRY:

- A maximum of two may be entered per line (use abbreviations). The first must relate to any town/city or province/state given. (see sample 7).

1993 GRD:
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The Saint John River "Planters"
(A Letter from the Past)

(The following submission by Alan W Ulrich can best be described by his letter) -ED

To the Editor of GENERATIONS

About the year 1762 a group of men and women, primarily from Essex County Massachusetts, came to the St. John River and settled in what is now Maugerville, New Brunswick but which at that time was part of Nova Scotia. Lured to the St. John River by a government in Halifax eager to populate the country with English settlers after recently winning these lands from France, these "Planters" were promised generous grants of land.

Many of these Planters were the great-grandchildren or gr,gr-grand children of Puritan emigrants to Massachusetts Bay 130 years earlier. As the population of Mass. increased, land became scarce and family homesteads tended to be passed on to the eldest son leaving siblings to farm on less desirable land. At the conclusion of the French and Indian War many New Englanders were eager to leave for more desirable lands in Nova Scotia. Doubtless some of these early settlers saw military duty on or near the St. John and confirmed governments accounts of desirable lands.

These early settlers maintained strong links with their relatives and former homes in New England. Much of the early trade on the St. John was conducted with merchants in Newburyport, Mass. It is not surprising therefore that when war broke out between the colonies and England, the loyalties of many of these settlers were sorely tested.

I came across the following letter in the Archives Dept. of the New Brunswick Museum in July, 1991. The author takes issue with the popular notion that many of these Planters aided the American rebels and mentions a number of N.B. families. The letter concludes with an interesting story of smuggling which many present day New Brunswickers may draw parallels to.

I have been as faithful as possible in transcribing the letter, copying punctuation, spelling and underlining as it appears in the original letter. Thanks are offered to the New Brunswick Museum who have given permission to publish this letter, restricting it to a one time basis.

Dear Sir,

Accept my sincere thanks for your thoughtful present - the Genealogical Chart of the Perley family; this kindly act, and the few words for the first time exchanged between us on "Arbour day" emboldens me to address you on a matter wherein you as well as myself cannot but be interested.

In 1868 a paper published in Boston called "The Canadian", Thomas P. Peabody Editor was put in circulation here; I became a subscriber - it was short lived; but lived quite long enough to sow broadcast in our land, matter that to the uninitiated is but too suggestive of disloyalty on the part of the grand old pioneers of 1762-3, the voluntary exiles from their comfortable New England homes, who came to this then wilderness land to make it a home for themselves and their posterity.

You too may be in possession of the very article that I am about to introduce; but being uncertain of this I must, in order to say what I want to say, quote largely therefrom, and perhaps make my story long, and maybe a tiresome article to peruse, unless you are gifted with a more than ordinary share of patience.

The Editor in introducing the subject, is kind enough to say: "Some loyal descendants of the older New Brunswick families, will be surprised to read the rebellious proceedings of their ancestors". Says too: "We extract the following from the archives of Massachusetts, preserving the orthography of the original". Then follows:

"Whereas the inhabitants of the River St. Johns in the county of Sunbury and Province of Nova Scotia, being regularly assembled on the 14th day of May 1776, did then and there make choice of us Jacob Barker, Phins Nevers, Israel Perley, Daniel Palmer, Moses Pickard, Edward Coye, Thomas Hart, Israel Kinney, Asa Kimball, Asa Perley, and Hugh Quinton, a committee in behalf of the inhabitants of sd. County, to make immediate application to the Congress, or Genll. Assembly of Massachusetts Bay, for relief under the present distressed circumstances, and to consult on some measures necessary to be taken for the safety of the inhabitants."

"Now know ye that we the Committee above named constitute Messrs Asa Perley and Asa Kimball, agents to sd. Congress or Genll. Assembly to present our Petition. lly. Chose Jacob Barker Chairman. 2ly. Chose Jacob Barker, Israel Perley, Phins Nevers, Esqs. and Messrs Daniel Palmer, Moses Pickard, Edward Coye, Thomas Hartt, Israel Kinney, Asa Perley, Asa Kimball, Oliver Perley and Hugh Quinton a committee to prepare a draught proper for proceedings of assembly."

The concluding words of this paragraph I presume means the petition to Congress refered to in a foregoing paragraph which must be a string of resolves, running from "lly. to 8ly." I will only copy "2ly." as that seems to express the substance of the whole 8 resolves: 2ly. "Resolved that

tyranny ought to be resisted, in its first appearance. We are convinced that the United Provinces are just in their proceeding in this regard." The whole signed by the committee named, certified by: "Israel Perley, Clerk, dated Maugerville on the River St. Johns, May the 21, 1776."

Then follows instructions to their delegates to Congress, Messrs Asa Perley and Asa Kimball: "Memorandum by desire of the committee: Represent the conduct of the indians, that Genl. Washingtons letter set them on fire, and they are plundering all people they think are torys, and perhaps when that is done, the others may share the same fate, we think it necessary that some person of consequence be sent among them".

Then it is stated that Messrs Perley and Kimball went on their mission and were well received by the Mass. Legislature in session; as will be seen by the following extract from the Journals of that body:

"In General Court. The Committee of both Houses to whom was refered the Petition of Jacob Barker etc. county of Sunbury in the Province of Nova Scotia, beg to report by way of resolve, that the Commissary general be, and is hereby directed to deliver, one barrel of gunpowder, three hundred and fifty flints, and two hundred and fifty weight of lead; from the Colony stores, to Asa Perley and Asa Kimball, for the use of their consituants etc. etc. Jer. Powall, per order, consented to 26th June 1776".

All who have read these proceedings, doubtless pronounce them rebellious; even descendents of the parties named, who are not in the secret. I admit I felt anoyed although there was nothing new to me in this revelation. I had heard the story in substance any number of times within the last 65 years up to 1835, as it fell on mine, and many other eager ears from the truthful lips of a venerable and venerated grandparent - Elizabeth, relict of Hugh Quinton aforesaid, my grandfather.

My grandfather I never saw, he died in 1792, his widow, clear headed, and possessing an astonishingly active and retentive memory: healthy in mind and body, and even active on foot to the last, died in 1835, aged 94 years. She was a fine sample of the old Puritan stock, of which she was a worthy descendant; a religious and good woman, as any of the many good ones, who came to this wilderness at and about the time she did.

Did this worthy woman ever impeach any of signers of the memorial aforesaid with rebellious motives? No Never! She always maintained that what they did was an act forced upon them in their defenceless state; The only chance, as it then appeared, to escape an impending and fearful calamity; a frightful indian raid threatend; to all appearance, seemed imminent.

A clever ruse she always deemed it, to so tickle the ears of the Rebel congress as to induce that body to hold back their indian Allies who were being hounded on to the slaughter of our defenceless people; The bait took they gained time - in time they trusted British aid would come - come it did, they were not disappointed.

That this is evidently the true construction to be put on the proceedings of our people, appears evident by what crops out in its earliest stages. They declare they "meet to consult on measures necessary to be taken for the safety of the inhabitants, and for relief under present distressed circumstances". What means all this? Hear their "instructions to their delegates to Congress - represent the conduct of the Indians, they are robbing etc. etc."

To confirm this view of the case we have only to consult the Journal of the celebrated Col. John Allan; This worthy, a Scot by birth, was found in 1775 inciting the "Mic=Mac" indians to join the St. John indians to take and hold this country for the Rebels. The Govermt. at Halifax offered a reward for his apprehension; he fled, and made his appearance in Boston in the Autumn of 1776 - mark the time. On Washingtons recommendation he was

commissioned a Col., and Superintendant of all the eastern indians. In this capacity he seems to have found his way to the St. John river in the early summer of 1777. 43 men in whale boats composed his force.

He however did not come with the boats, but seems to have found his way to "Aukpague" by some safer rout, when he established his headquarters, and spent his time negociating with the French, and indians, but appears to have failed in all attempts to win old "Piere Toma" to his side. His boats got on the river, but their crews got little rest there British bull dogs were at their heels.

Allans Journal commences at "Aukpague" June 10th 1777. There is no intimation in that whole record, from the 10th of June aforesaid, to that of the 14th of July - which indicates his final exit from the River - that any of the crew while sympathizers with rebellion tendered him either countenance or support in any way. His record of the 11th June, says something about having Messrs Hazen and White prisoner. It does not appear though that they were long retained as such; and that a "ship belonging to the British King had arrived at the mouth of the River". On the 25th he mentions having heard Mr. I. Perley had arrived on the river, from Halifax, I understand from the context, sent a boat to bring Mr. Perley up; "Mr. Perley informed that Mr. Franklin is appointed Govt. agent for indians at £300 per ann. slary - that Govt. would send 10,000 men to reinforce Howes Army &c. assembled the Merecheete tribe" and informed them of news brought by Mr. Perley; 27th sent two indians in a canoe to convey Mr. Perley home same day records a skirmish which occurred some time before between his men at the mouth of the river and boats crew of the "Brittains" as he calls them; that one of his Officers complains that "Mr. Barker Jr." caused some of their proceedings "two days delay, ill usage &c." - that "Messrs Hazen and Simonds jeered his officers &c." - that the Kings ship "Vulture 34 guns; the "Milford" frigate; "& sloop Gage" were about - indeed trouble seemed to thicken hourly about this time.

Allan seems to have ventured down to Mougerville on the 29th of June - fifteen days before his final exit from the river, and the winding up of his most inglorious campaign: Says "Stopped at Mr. Perleys, had much conversation with him; as "also at Capt. Quinton's, who had a severe reprimand for speaking against our proceedings on the river". Here the gallant Col. does not condescend to enlighten us as to the subject, or result of his "much conversation" with Mr. Perley, nor whether Quinton bore his reprimand meekly; tradition says he was not in a meek mood just then, nor as choice in his language to this accredited representative of Rebeldom, as that gentleman had a right to expect, from one who only a little ago had been before Congress by petition seeking relief "under distressed circumstances."

What appears singular too in this case is that no one appears to have tendered Allan a greeting on his arrival or even to say good-by when he left. One would suppose that if only for the munificence of Congress in donating "a barrel of gunpowder, 350 flints, 250 weight of lead," these ingrates should have manifested some show of gratitude towards its representative. Doubtless he had pictured to himself a gallant array of men in arms, to meet him on his arrival here; ready and anxious to expend the gift of Congress in hurling death and destruction on the hirelings of the tyrant of Britain. But let us consider, did that right royal gift of Congress ever reach here? - I never heard that it did!!

I heard last fall that a descendant of Allan was here making some talk about his ancestor's doings here; well there may be something clever in what he performed, but regarding his journal I am free to admit that my limited ability is unable to come at the point. He found himself in hot water all through the piece. On the 6th July he records a narrow escape from the clutch of "Britons" as he is pleased to call them, - 12th at a place he calls "Meductic" - 14th doing his level best to escape; some 50 of the "Tyrants" soldiers at his heels. From that time we loose him - he made his way by Eel River and Schoodic Lakes to the land of the brave and home of the free - Peace to his ashes!!!

Hugh Quinton and his wife were natives of New Hampshire; Hugh came on to this river with an exploring party sent by the Govt. of Mass. in 1761, went back to N.H. and married the same year. Came here again in 1762 with his wife and a party some 20 or more among whom were James Simonds, James White, Samuel Peabody, Francis Peabody, his wife and family. this party landed here on the 28th August 1762 - not in May, as Hon. M.H. Perley has it - nor was there soldiers in old Fort Frederick as he states when this party went into it; as all the females and most of the males did. I have undoubted proof of my date of this landing; and I affirm that the fort was unoccupied on the 28th Augt. 1762.

Hugh Quinton had a farm in Mougerville, took it among the first who settled there. lived there until about 1775, when he removed his family to the place still occupied by one of the name, W. A. Quinton M.P.P., his great grandson - parish of Lancaster County St. John.

I intended to have closed this already long and tiresome epistle with the last sheet, but at the risk of being thought an egotist and bore, I must add something further. Hugh Quinton I have said removed from his Mougerville farm about 1775, but as long as he held that property he did some farming there, and visited the place many times each year attending to his business. This may account for his being there when Allan had the "much conversation with Mr. Perley", and administered the "repremand" as we are told to "Capt. Quinton" - now as to the title, it is a designation he had to the day of his death; acquired through being in the earliest days of the settlement of Mougerville chosen as Captain of a company of volunteers formed there to be called out at any time when required; wandering bands of indians sometimes gave trouble. I have many a time read the document certifying this appointment, signed by James Simonds, Israel Perley, Francis Peabody and others. This paper and others I neglected to take possession of when my grandmother died, and young thoughtless vandals of my brothers family destroyed them.

Hugh Quinton and some five or six other families, residing in the Lancaster settlement were three times robbed, during the Revolutionary War, of every moveable article they possessed, clothing bedding &c. and furniture they could not remove handily, the wretches wantonly destroyed it. These thieves were rebel blaguards from about Machias - came to some convenient landing on the shore of the neighbourhood in small vessels or whale boats.

One at least of these plundering expeditions took place prior to Allans advent on the river; and one certainly after; for there are circumstances connected with their last fleeing, that fixes the time it took place, to have been in 1778; after the Block house was put on Fort How, and soldiers there, who came to the rescue of the plundered district, a little too late to save it from the lousy depredators. I speak of them thus, for in every house, or about it somewhere, their cast of clothing was found alive with vermin; they had thrown off the filthy rags, and arrayed themselves in such clothing as they had stolen.

I must come to a halt at once, or dear knows how far I shall run on. Excuse the rambling and probably blundering production of

P.S. - I omitted to ask as I intended about a Mr. Charles Perley, whose acquaintance I made quite early in life, as early perhaps as 1820. In those days it was almost a religious duty for most persons in business to do something in the way of smuggling: Tea, Tobacco, &c. - quantities of these I have time and again seen concealed under my fathers barn; it was built at the foot of a hill, or enough on the rise, to leave a place under the thrashing floor of not less than 8 feet on the down hill side, the whole length of the building; this was often filled with boxes of tea, barrels of rice, nuts, &c. &c.; while the horse manure heap outside would be increased, would swell in a night to double the size it was the day before. The Messrs Daniel and Frank Leavitt, Lewis Burns & others had an interest in the business. Mr. Charles Perley came one night with some others for a load from this reseptacle; father sent me to drive the horses and a great heap of tea. I remember Mr. P. with three others went ahead over the ice on South Bay to Musquito Cove, and I followed with my team and cargo, which they unloaded very rapidly into a boat at the cove.

There was a Francis Perley too that I sometimes saw on these occasions - he married a Miss Fanny Carmona whose family were our next door neighbours the farm where Mr. Thompson now resides in Lancaster. I had many a chat with Charles, - The Hon. Charles Perley in after years; in my manhood he always remembered the boy of 13 who followed his lead over the ice. There are 4 or 5 Charles in the 6th generation; which is the Hon. Charles?

As I have got into the vein again, I may as well scrawl on until I fill up the paper. The chart claims Israel, the son of Israel Perley, born on the Riv. St. John at Maugerville Jany 10th 1765, as the first child born of European parents in Maugerville which is in Sunbury County, this doubtless is all right, I will not dispute it; and yet it will not be hard to prove that there was another of European descent born in Sunbury County on the 28th of August 1762 - James Quinton, son of Hugh & Elizabeth Quinton was that other one; born in Fort Frederick which was in Sunbury County.

Hugh Quinton had four sons and four daughters, two elder sons were sea fareing men, Ship Masters out of this port for nearly 30 years - eldest, James, died in the West Indies; John, next, wrecked and lost in this Bay; David died in youth. Daughters all married and lived to old age - their descendents can be numbered by hundreds. My father Jesse, born 1778, died in 1826 left seven sons and two daughters, myself the eldest of the family; one brother and one sister still on the footstool. I was born October 27th 1807, able to take my "trick at the helm" yet, and weigh 225 lbs; a synopsis of family history you will observe, in return for your Chart. I hope you will be as pleased with it as I was with your gift.

I revere the names of those good pioneers of our country who came here it may be said, to pave the way for the "Loyalists" who followed; - All the cry now, while our old friends are hardly noticed. But I trust some one in time, will come forward and publickly do justice to the memory of the Barkers, Burpees, Christys, Coys, Estys, Easterbrooks, Hartts, Nevers, Perleys, Pickards, &c. - Thomas & Jesse Cristy were my grandmothers brothers; the Pickards, her cousins; another, John Mason, my grandfathers brother-in-law; - Simonds, White, and Peabody his friends through life; and I should not err much in saying more than one Perley might be named in the same category.

SEARCH & EXTRACT SERVICE

"Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers"

What is the Search & Extract Service?

The computer scans the same files as those used in the preparation of the series "Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers" and extracts those entries containing the key word specified by the researcher. For example, the key word may be any SURNAME ie. Keirstead, McFarland; any PLACE ie. Woodstock, Shediac; any occupation ie. barrister, sheriff. The researcher simply selects the key word and which individual volumes of the above series are to be searched.

What is the series "Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers"?

This series of publications is the cumulative result of a project commenced ten years ago to extract births, marriages and deaths from all New Brunswick newspapers. The parameters of the project were expanded to include a broad spectrum of items including coroner inquests, melancholy accidents, executions, murders, suicides. Also included are shipwrecks, biographies, passenger lists, native Maritimers receiving an education abroad or falling in a foreign field of battle. Every column is scanned for mention of family reunions, anniversaries and any obscure item of genealogical interest. At present the series contains 48 volumes covering the time period from 1784 to 1879 cross-referenced by over 250,000 names.

What is the fee for the Search & Extract Service?

The advance minimum fee is \$20 which covers the search and the first 5 pages of information generated. An additional fee of \$3.00 is charged for each page of information generated in excess of 5 pages. Each page is laser printed 10 pt. font of letter size (8 ½ by 11) and will be cerloxed bound with covers.

Will there be new volumes published in this series?

Yes, a new volume of Vital Statistics is published every second month, generating over 30,000 new cross-references yearly. A standing order mailing list will be established for researchers who would like to continue the service on an annual basis.

Genealogical Notes

Descendants Hear Mill Owner's Lament Evening Times-Globe, Thursday, Aug. 6, 1992

Newcastle - Grethe Jones Fesler and her son Robert, sat spellbound Tuesday night as John McKay sang his version of The Jones Boys. The song, which McKay learned from the late Nick Underhill, tells the tale of Johnny and Jimmy Jones and their mills at Jones' Brook near Newcastle in the 1800's. The mill paid so poorly that Jim and Johnny's brother Richard left the Miramichi for Bayfield, Wisconsin in the 1850's. He had a son, John Wesley Jones, who had a daughter Grethe. She grew up in North Dakota, but moved east when she went to college. She married Robert Fesler, Sr. and the couple live in Scituate, Mass. Their son Robert lives in Dresden Maine where he designs computerized accounting systems for small businesses.

Grethe walked into Newcastle Town Hall about a half hour before curtain time on Tuesday night and someone introduced her to festival singer Marie Hare. "Your kidding." Hare said, "That's my father's father who built the mill." To put it another way, Grethe's paternal great grandfather built the mill; that is Grethe and Marie are second cousins. On the way up, the Fesler's met another long lost second cousin, 94 year old Jim Gillis of Moncton and grandson of Jimmy Jones in the song. Marie introduced them to her cousins once removed, Doris Nowlin Brown and Trudy McKay Taylor, to other relatives on the Jones side. They all descend from John Jones Sr. and Elizabeth (Rowe) Jones.

Certification

The Genealogical Institute of the Maritimes is a non-profit organization established under the auspices of the Council of Premiers in 1983. Besides being a regulatory body, the Institute is seen to have an educational role in upgrading the professional quality of family history research in the Maritime Provinces. At present, the Institute offers two programmes, viz.: Genealogical Record Searcher GRS(C) and Certified Genealogist CG(C). The (C) indicates Canadian Certification. The first step in applying for accreditation involves a point evaluation

system dependant on education, experience, publications and involvement in the field of genealogy. Work samples, as defined by the programme, are submitted for objective evaluation by three examiners. Successful applicants will proceed to a written examination and oral interview. The process can take up to a year as the volunteer members of the Institute meet only a few times annually. For more information write: Genealogical Institute of the Maritimes, P.O. Queens County Roots

Although Queens County is one of the counties which does not support a branch of the N.B.G.S., the pursuit of genealogy there is alive and well. The Society maintains a genealogical library with a volunteer staff. In addition, they operate a Museum at Gagetown (Curator: Jean Shannon, Gagetown, N.B. E0G 1V0) and are presently restoring the old Court House. Their next meeting will be held Friday October 2, 1992 at 8 p.m. at the Women's Institute Hall at Cumberland Bay. Members receive a Newsletter five times a year for yearly dues of \$5. Membership is open to all. The Treasurer is Mrs. Myra D'Acoust, Jemseg, N.B. Canada E0E 1S0.

New Appointment

David G. Bell, Professor of Law at U.N.B. Fredericton, well known to New Brunswick Genealogists as the author of "Early Loyalist Saint John" and nominee of the N.B.G.S. for the L.A.A.C. (Library & Archives Advisory Committee) was recently appointed to the Board of the New Brunswick Museum. Prof. Bell, is well acquainted with the holdings of the Library Archives Section of the Museum. This department for several years has suffered financial and staff cutbacks due to the apathy of former Board members. The restricted space available for researchers, the lack of complementary genealogical information are two factors which have decimated the

attendance and use of records at the Museum Archives and Library. The New Brunswick Museum Archives predates the establishment of the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick by 37 years. Consequently, during that time period, it was the sole recipient of private manuscripts and books donated by individuals. Some records pre-date the arrival of the Loyalists. The manuscript is a conglomerate of smaller collections such as Ganong's works, applications and genealogies of New Brunswick's first Loyalist Society members - children and grandchildren of the Loyalist, business and private records of many New Brunswick families. The collections fill an entire storey of the building. The Museum Library possesses perhaps the largest Canadiana publication collection in the Atlantic Provinces. Today very few researchers visit the New Brunswick Museum Library & Archives. Mr. Bell's appointment to the Board therefore is most welcome.

Loyalist Studies Programme

The Harriet Irving Library at the University of New Brunswick is a repository of Loyalist resources which is unique in Canada. The Loyalist Microfilm Collection is a special collection on microfilm of North American colonial and early Canadian primary sources from approximately 1760-1840 and the early years of Loyalist Settlement.

The Collection was begun in the early 1970's by the Canadian Committee of the International Programme for Loyalist Studies and Publications. The Canada Council provided the financial support in this country. The University of London, the City University of New York, the American Antiquarian Society and the University of New Brunswick were the institutions involved in an international agreement to identify, list and microfilm all Loyalist primary sources in the three countries. The Canada portion of the project ended in 1976 and approximately 700 reels of microfilm were deposited at the Harriet Irving Library. In 1982 the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada awarded a three year grant to expand the Loyalist Microfilm Collection and the Library's resources which support Loyalist research. The additional purchases made possible by these grants and by private donors have further confirmed the role of the Library as the main

Loyalist research centre in and for Canada. At present the Collection contains approximately 3000 reels of microfilm and 700 microfiche. The Collection is arranged by five categories of material: Church Records and Registers; Military Records; Papers of Families and Individuals; Public Records; Societies and Special Collections. User Fees

Bruce S. Elliott has forwarded a report on the National Archives Researcher's Forum. Bruce is a Professor of History at Carleton University, Ottawa, Ontario and notes in his letter: "The most important section in the enclosed report is the one on user fees." He further urges that we get word out as widely as possible. Prof. Elliott shares a deep concern about the issue of user fees and may be contacted at his home address 881 Smyth Road, Ottawa, ON Canada K1G 1P4. According to the Report dated March 1992: The second meeting of the National Archives of Canada's Researchers Forum was held in Ottawa on March 6, 1992. This advisory body was established by the National Archivist, Jean-Pierre Wallot, in 1991 to provide user comment on NA operations and policies. It held its first meeting April 17, 1991. Bruce S. Elliott was appointed to represent the Canadian genealogical community.

User Fees The National Archives has been under intense government pressure to implement full cost recovery for services provided. The governing principle is that services utilized by specialized segments of the population rather than by the entire population should be revenue generating. A report is being drafted outlining the services the N.A. currently provides and making recommendations as to the fees that should be charged. It is certain that photocopying costs will rise substantially, but other likely possibilities include fees for entering the building and fees for consulting with archivists. The National Archivist stated last year there would never be an entrance fee charged to researchers, but it appears that the current fiscal climate has changed the situation. The income from user fees will not remain with the institution itself but

will go to the consolidated revenue fund of the federal government and be directed, in part, toward deficit reduction. Students will likely be exempted from entrance fees, and academics will pass the costs along to granting bodies, so it is genealogist as members of the general public who will likely bear the brunt of this. Incidentally, it is expected that 'full cost recovery' means that photocopy charges will include a proportion of the costs for maintaining and cleaning the building, etc."

It is announced with regret that opening hours at the National Archives and National Library in Ottawa are to be reduced from 24 hour, 365 day time frame. Beginning March 30, 1992, they will be open to researchers with passes from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. seven days per week. Staff hours will remain as before.

A New Search & Extract Service

Any researcher who has used the "Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers" can well appreciate the time and labor involved in scanning and extracting information from this 49 volume series. With over 300,000 names cross-referenced covering a 96 year period following the arrival of the Loyalists, even with the use of a photocopier, the researcher's work may extend for several days. For those researchers who neither own a set of these publications nor have access through a local library or archives, there is good news. A new computerized service has been launched to provide the information contained in the series in exactly the same narrative style with accompanying newspaper references. A search may be conducted for any specific surname, place or occupation that appears in this series. ie. Digby, Florenceville, Tobique, etc. occupations ie. mason, barrister, etc. Laser printed pages will be regular letter size (8 1/2 by 11) in 10 point font size and bound with cerlox binding. Each year six new volumes containing over 30,000 names are published.
