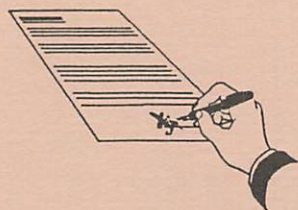

Compiling and Publishing Your Family History

by George H. Hayward

Editor's note: George Hayward, a member of Capital Branch in Fredericton, N.B., and a member of the Genealogical Institute of the Maritimes, has published books containing census, marriage and cemetery records, and several family histories. He has also written articles for this publication, and during the winter of 1992 he taught a non-credit course at the University of New Brunswick on compiling and publishing your family history. He has now agreed to share his publishing experiences, and some of the material he used in his course, with readers of *Generations* in this column. It will continue in the next two issues.

Introduction

This will be a "how to" column, directed mainly at the novice. Its purpose will be to outline how to produce a properly written genealogical article, or family history, and how to get it published, economically. Some of the topics that I will cover are: Some reasons for compiling a family history; Numbering systems; Selecting a title; Coats of arms; The first draft; Conflicting information; Citing sources; Use of illustrations and charts; Typing and Typesetting; Proofreading; Indexing; Printing and binding; Cost; etc., not necessarily in that order.

Some reasons for compiling a family history

A lot of people derive a great deal of pleasure from research, but it is the sharing of our findings with others that is the real joy of genealogy. To share is the greatest gift we have, and what better way to share the results of our research than to publish an article or a family history.

It is unlikely that any other person has garnered as much material as you have on your subject. You are probably the best authority on your research, and the best person to compile and publish it.

If you do not compile and publish the material you have collected, future genealogists will have to duplicate the work you have already done.

Your writing can add to present knowledge, or correct errors; but so many researchers have, when they reached an advanced age and could no longer write, left a collection of unorganized papers which their heirs have thrown away because they could not understand their content.

State your purpose!

Before you start, state your purpose. Great advantages accrue to writers who state their purpose before they write. If every phase of your

writing is done with your overall purpose in mind, your composition will have continuity and clarity. Stating your purpose will not insure success, but experts in every field agree that stating a purpose is always a necessary step. Your purpose will set parameters for your work, and it will allow you to select material which relates to your project.

Examples of purposes for genealogical writings

1. "Trace the descendants of Henry and Pheobe Jones, in all lines, to the present generation."

This is a very ambitious project, and since it might be difficult to trace all the descendants of an early ancestor, a more practical purpose might be to trace all lines for three or four generations.

2. "Trace the descendants of Henry and Phoebe Jones, in some lines, to the present generation."

Most genealogists find it impractical, due to loss of records, migration of some lines to distant geographical areas, etc., to trace descendants in all lines over several generations, and opt instead for the descendants in known lines.

3. "Trace your own ancestry, in all lines, to about 1600."

Many people put a lot of emphasis on their own surname. All individuals in your ancestry are important and interesting, not only those bearing your surname, and it can be rewarding to write about all of them.

4. "Establish your immigrant ancestor's parentage and place of birth."

Some writers start with a chapter on an ancient family that was prominent in Europe in the sixteenth century, followed by a chapter on a proven immigrant ancestor of the same surname in North America. The implication, if not the claim, is that the immigrant ancestor was a descendant of the prominent European family of that name. This serves no useful purpose, and should be avoided.

5. "Correct some previously published error."

This is a worth-while purpose, but remember that the next error that needs correcting could be yours. This is not to say that correcting errors should be avoided - firmly, clearly and without insult.

Some people think that anything in print is better than nothing. This is, of course, not so. Errors, untruths, and fabricated lines, once published, are very difficult to overcome. Errors tend to multiply because one researcher often uses

data published by another.

Remember too that information contained in a professionally printed, hard bound volume is no more reliable a source than a tattered handwritten notebook.

Data recorded by a clerk in an official marriage register, or a name entered by an enumerator in a census return, may also be inaccurate. Good researchers will always try to corroborate data they find in one place with data from another source.

Genealogical computer software

During the past ten years, home computers have become wide-spread, and there has been a proliferation of software designed for use by genealogists. What those of you whose goal is to publish a family history needs to ask is whether a computer and one of these software packages will produce a product that satisfies you.

I am certainly not an expert on the software programs, and have not examined enough of them to know in detail what each of them can or cannot do. However, I am computer literate, more or less, and I have read reviews on many of the software packages. My general impression is that the strength of these programs is in manipulation of data; sorting and searching, and in producing relational lists and charts. Many of them, perhaps most, in my view, do not produce good looking text reports, either in terms of text enhancements (underlining, bold face type, superscript numerals, etc.), or fonts. Also, only a few will produce text reports that conform to the New England Historical and Genealogical Society Register System.

My advice to those of you who are planning to buy software for the purpose of organizing genealogical data, and are planning to publish a family history later, is that you ensure, as best you can, that it will give you an end product that is reasonably satisfactory to you.

Some software programs will allow you to send the data to a word processor, where you can edit the text. In that case, you will want to know that the text output from the genealogy software into the word processor is in more or less the format that you want to see in your printed book. Otherwise the genealogy software is of questionable value to someone whose goal is to publish a family history.

Personally, I prefer a word processor for compiling a published genealogy. You can manipulate text, provide text enhancements, set

the margins and use proportional fonts to improve the appearance of your text (provided you have or have access to a printer that will print text enhancements and handle proportional fonts), all of which most genealogy software packages will not do.

Computer interest groups

One thing you can do with your genealogy software is communicate with other researchers, either by exchanging genealogical data on diskettes through the mail, or if you have a modem, electronically. Also, for those of you who don't know, there are several genealogical computer interest groups around the world. There are interest groups affiliated with genealogical organizations, with computer clubs, and genealogical software user groups. Generally there is a membership fee, and generally their purpose is to provide members with opportunities to learn and to provide a forum for information and experience exchanges.

Genealogical databases

There are also a number of genealogical databases from which researchers can obtain data, either on diskette, CD-ROM (compact disk), or by downloading from a bulletin board. Generally there is a charge.

Numbering systems

Why a numbering system? A numbering system adds clarity to a compiled genealogy. When each individual is identified by a unique number, the identity of that person is always clear to the reader. In some early North American families, every couple had a Martha or a Jane or a Samuel or a John, and sometimes there were several Marthas or Samuels in the same generation, which can be confusing unless each individual is identified by a number.

Some numbering systems to avoid

Bear in mind that we publish, not for ourselves but for others, so it is better to select a numbering system that readers will understand over one of personal preference.

Don't invent your own numbering system for a published genealogy!

Avoid a system that uses letters, in which your most remote ancestor is "a"; the first child is "aa"; the second child is "ab"; the third child, is "ac"; the first child of "ac" is "aca" etc., until you reach a

seventh generation child who might be "acaegab."

Avoid combinations of numbers and letters that result is a seventh or eighth generation number like: "2Bc(12)EE4d4d1."

Avoid any system that requires readers to study it at length.

Avoid a system that does not permit readers to quickly find an individual's parents or children by reference to the assigned numbers.

The outline system, where each descendant generation is indented five or more spaces on the page, is wasteful and costly in that, for the younger generations especially, only a portion of the page is used, which greatly increases the cost of printing. There is also the problem of trying to follow Roman and Arabic numerals and upper and lower case letters through several generations.

Some recommended numbering systems

There is no single "correct" numbering system that writers are obliged to follow, but over a long period of time, three systems have emerged as most favored by professional genealogists:

- The Register System.
- The Henry System.
- The Ahnentafel (or Sosa-Stradonitz) System.

Explain your numbering system.

1. Regardless of the numbering system you select, be certain that you understand it yourself, and be sure that you explain it for your readers.

2. You should not expect that even a knowledgeable reader will find your numbering system easy to understand.

3. The numbering systems I will recommend in this column are understood by most active genealogists today.

Descendant or ancestor?

1. As soon as you decide on your purpose, then decide on your numbering system.

2. Of the three systems, your purpose will dictate, more or less, which system you select.

3. If your purpose involves descendants (i.e., if you plan to begin with a remote ancestor and work forward to yourself), you will probably want to use the Register System or the Henry System.

4. If your purpose involves ancestors (i.e., if you plan to begin with yourself and work back in time to remote ancestors), you will probably want to use the Ahnentafel System.

5. The Register and Henry Systems can be used

for multiple lines of descent through several generations, but the Ahnentafel System cannot be used for this purpose.

Some general comments about numbers

1. The family members should not be assigned reference numbers until just before publication. Otherwise, if you need to insert a newly discovered family member at the last minute, it will create the need to reassign reference numbers from the point at which the new family member was inserted to the end of the book.

2. A good plan is to chart at least the early generations, and preferably all generations, as an aid in assigning reference numbers and to insure no one is left out. I often include a chart in the book, with reference numbers. It is useful for those who want to quickly follow their direct line back. (See Figure 1)

The Register System

1. This, or a modified form, usually meets the needs of most writers.

2. It provides an excellent format by which to arrange information and number individuals.

3. This system has been used in The New England Historical and Genealogical Register for many years, is simple to understand, and is known by a large reader audience.

4. The most remote ancestor being discussed is assigned the Arabic numeral "1."

5. Children are listed in columnar form and lower case Roman numerals are used to indicate their order of birth.

6. Linking Arabic numerals are used to identify the children who will be presented later in the genealogy. Assuming that your family history commences with Henry and Phoebe Jones, who are fictitious ancestors, the numbers would be assigned as follows.

Example 1

1. **Henry¹ Jones** was born in Fredericton, New Brunswick, March 22, 1810, son of Calvin and Henrietta (Smith) Jones. He died July 2, 1880, in Fredericton, and was buried in the old Loyalist burying ground there.⁽¹⁾

He married Phoebe Brown, June 3, 1832, in St. Paul's Wesleyan Church in Fredericton. She was born May 30, 1811, at Burton in Sunbury Co., N.B., daughter of Hezekiah and Hephzibah (Smith) Brown. She died in Fredericton August 6,

1885, and was buried beside her husband in the old Loyalist burying ground.⁽¹⁾

(In this third paragraph, you would write an account of Henry Jones.)

(In this fourth paragraph, you would write an account of his spouse, Phoebe (Brown).)

(In this fifth paragraph you might write an abstract of the last will and testament of Henry Jones, if you located a will during your research.)

- i Darius, b. 4 Aug 1833, d. 21 Nov 1834.

[Note: The first child, Darius, died at age 1 yr. & 3 mos., and nothing more will be written about him. Therefore, no linking arabic numeral is placed in front of his name. A lower case roman numeral is assigned to Darius, however, to indicate his order of birth.]

2. Reumah² Jones (Henry¹) was born in Fredericton, New Brunswick, July 2, 1835, daughter of Henry and Phoebe (Brown) Jones.⁽¹⁾ She died August 24, 1906, in Fredericton, and was buried in the Rural Cemetery there.⁽²⁾

She married Asa Dow, March 29, 1857, in St. Paul's Wesleyan Church in Fredericton.⁽¹⁾ He was born May 23, 1834, at Dow Settlement, in the Parish of Canterbury, York Co., N.B., son of Zebulun and Salome (McArthur) Dow.⁽³⁾ He died in Fredericton February 16, 1902, and was buried in the Rural Cemetery there.⁽²⁾

(In this third paragraph, you would write an account of Reumah (Jones) Dow.)

(In this fourth paragraph, you would write an account of her spouse, Asa Dow.)

(In this fifth paragraph you might write an abstract of Reumah's last will and testament, or that of her husband.)

[Note: Following Reumah and Asa Dow's family in your genealogy, you would write about the Simon and Ida Jones family, #3; then the family of Dinah Dow and Elias Moore, #4; then the family of Andrew & Jessie Dow, #5; etc.]

Multiple Marriages

When a person had more than one spouse, each one should be presented separately. If Henry Jones (Example 1) had been married more than once, his second wife should be shown in a separate paragraph immediately following his first wife, with marriage date and place, birth and death date, etc., and following the fourth paragraph you would write an account of her. A third wife should be shown in the same way following the second wife. Children of each marriage should be listed separately. If Henry Jones had been married twice, his list of children might look like this:

Children of Henry & Phoebe (Brown) Jones

- i Darius, b. 4 Aug 1833, d. 21 Nov 1834.
- 2 ii Reumah, b. 2 Jul 1835, m. Asa Dow.

Children of Henry & Ada (Coy) Jones

- 3 iii Simon, b. 7 Jun 1837, m. Ida Dow.

Superscript numerals

In Example 1, the superscript numerals (Henry¹ and Reumah²) denote generations, Henry the first generation and Reumah the second generation. These are helpful, especially in large family histories covering several generations.

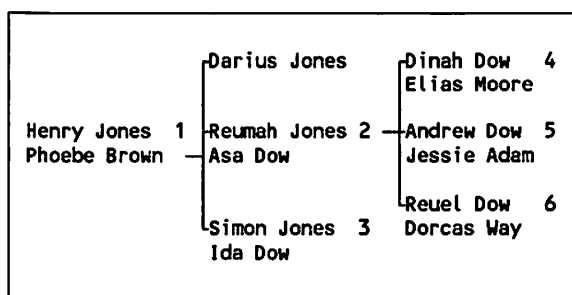

Line of descent

In Example 1 (see the previous installment) in the account of Reumah Jones and Asa Dow's family, Reumah's name was followed by the given name of her father, printed in italics and enclosed in parentheses, thus: **Reumah² Jones (Henry¹)**. This is an abbreviated method of showing a descent in successive generations from your most remote ancestor. Interpreted, it means that Reumah was of the second generation, daughter of Henry Jones of the first generation.

When marriages change surnames, we treat them like this: **Dinah³ Dow (Reumah² Jones, Henry¹)**, meaning Dinah Dow of the third generation who was daughter of Reumah Jones of the second generation who was daughter of Henry Jones of the first generation.

Not all genealogists use this feature, but it is a quick reference for readers who do not know from memory the names of their ancestors for several generations back. Some can be long. My line of descent from Thomas Green, for example, looks like this: **George¹¹ Hayward (William¹⁰; Clarence⁹; William⁸; Frances⁷ Nevers; Nathaniel⁶; Samuel⁵; Bathsheba⁴ Green; Samuel³; Thomas²; Thomas¹)**

The Henry System

1. This system derives its name from Reginald Buchanan Henry who used it for his well-known "Genealogies of the Families of the Presidents," (Rutland, Vt.: The Tuttle Co., 1935).

2. Your most remote male ancestor is number 1. His first child is number 11 (one-one, not eleven). His second child is number 12 (one-two); the fifth child of 12 is 125 (one-two-five), and so on.

3. Any number larger than 9 is placed in parentheses, so the twelfth child of the third child of your most remote ancestor would be number 13(12) (one-three-twelve).

4. Children are listed in columnar form, preceded by their individual number.

5. A plus sign is placed in front of the number for any child about which information is to be presented later in the genealogy.

6. Some writers insert a period after each set of three numerals, simply to make long strings of numerals easier to remember, for example: 146.512.436 instead of 146512436.

7. With this system, relationships can be determined by comparing one individual's number with another. For example, individuals numbered

123 and 124 are brothers, sisters, or brother and sister; individuals 1235 and 1246 are first cousins; while 12463 is a first cousin once removed of 1235; and 123 is an uncle or aunt of 1235.

8. Using the same Henry and Phoebe (Brown) Jones family that we used in the last installment, changing only the numbering system, our family history would look like this:

Example 2

1. **Henry¹ Jones** was born in Fredericton, New Brunswick, March 22, 1810, son of Calvin and Henrietta (Smith) Jones. He died July 2, 1880, in Fredericton, and was buried in the old Loyalist burying ground there.⁽¹⁾

Who do you include?

When your purpose is to trace some or all of the descendants of a remote ancestor, how will you deal with the daughters who marry into other families?

There are no hard and fast rules, but some genealogists would not include, for example, the Jones daughters in a Jones family history, the assumption being that someone else will compile and publish a family history on every surname and that the families of the daughters will be included with their husband's family.

Other genealogists include the immediate family of the daughters, as I have done in Examples 1 and 2 for Reumah Jones and Asa Dow, but do not write an account of the daughter's children.

The choice rests with the author. If you want to include some or all of the descendants of your ancestor, both male and female, it is quite alright. A couple of points to consider are whether you have accurate information on the lines you intend to include in your family history, and whether a family history has already been compiled on the family one or more of the daughters married into.

If you plan to published more than one family history, you should try not to duplicate information that is in one book in another. Instead, refer readers of one book to another of your books, or to a book by another author, for a line that is in another book.

The Ahnentafel (Sosa-Stadonitz) System

1. This system is widely used throughout the world by genealogists. It was invented in 1676 by Jerome de Sosa, a Spanish genealogist, and revised in 1898 by Stephane K. von Stadonitz.

2. The person whose ancestry is being recorded is number 1. His or her father is number 2. His or her mother is number 3. A father's number is always an even number twice his child's number, and a mother's number is always an odd number twice her child's number plus 1. For example, the father of child number 20 is number 40, and the mother of child number 20 is number 41 ($20 \times 2 + 1$). Likewise, the father of child number 40 is number 80, and the mother of child number 40 is number 81 ($40 \times 2 + 1$).

3. Most people are familiar with its use on pedigree charts, except that many charts do not carry the numbers to infinity but instead start with number 1 on each successive chart.

4. This format works best when one line of ascent is being traced through several generations, or when your purpose is to trace the direct ancestry of an individual in all lines.

5. See Figure 2 and Example 3 below.

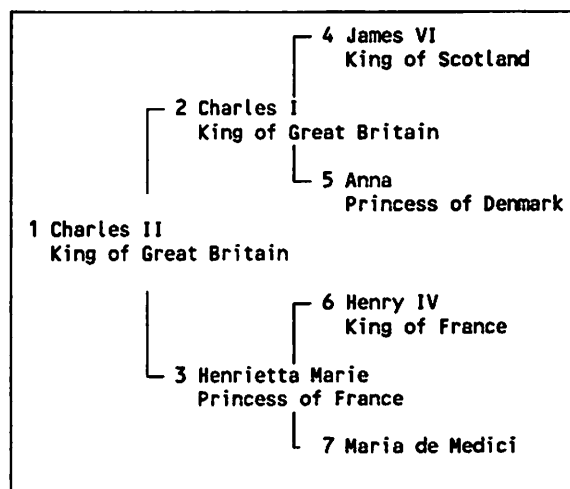

HISTORY OF MY FAMILY
by
Edna V. (MacIlroy) Forcht

Early in 1992, Mrs. Forcht sent a manuscript to *Generations*. Unfortunately, it was too large to be included in our newsletter as it had been submitted. With her permission, portions of her work will be included as they are made ready. This work begins with the old world ancestors of John Yerxa and James & Daniel Gerow, who were Loyalist settlers in New Brunswick, then progress through one of the New Brunswick lines, that of John Yerxa's daughter, Hannah, who married John MacIlroy.

THE DUTCH ANCESTRY OF JURCKSE, STORM AND DeREVIERE FAMILIES

It has taken many years of patience and persevering research by persons in the New York area to trace the Jurckse family back to Paulus Jurcksen prior to Abraham, the fourth generation.

Most Dutch family names were changed with each generation; frequently, with many and various spellings. Also, if they moved from one location to another, the name was often changed. When the name changed from Dutch to English, the Dutch "J" became a "Y" in English. As the Dutch "J" or "TJ" has the same sound as the English "Y".

JURCKSE

In Westchester County, New Netherland, New York State where many of the Yerxa ancestors lived, the various spellings found include: Jurckse, Jurks, Yerkes, Yorkse, Yourx, Durkse, Jurckzen, Yurksea. As yet, the Yerxa links in the Netherlands have not been verified extensively, although it is felt that the Jurckse's had their "roots" in Fresia - probably the western part.

Darlene Yerxa visited New Amsterdam in 1980 and picked up possible sources of additional information in the following address: Westfriese, Geneenten, Nieuwesteen I Post Bus 603, 1620 AR Hoorn 02-2090-31234.

Johannes Jurckse or Yerkes came to Nova Scotia in 1783. The following year, the province became separated from Nova Scotia and became New Brunswick in 1784. The spelling of his name at that time became Yerxa.

The first mention of Yerxa in the New World was in 1657 when Paulus Jurcksen was mentioned in court minutes at Fort Orange:

(From The Court Minutes of Fort Orange and Beaver Whck, by Van Laer, Volume II, Page 178, dated March 18, 1657 at Fort Orange)

Paulus Jurcksen, Plaintiff, against Cobus Teunissen, Defendant, for default.¹
Egbertjen, wife of Teunis the mason, default, Plaintiff, against Jan Goew and Paulus Jercksen default Michael Rombouts, Plaintiff, against Polus Jerksen, Defendant.

The Plaintiff demands payment of three (3) beavers. The defendants admit the debt and promise to pay it within the space of eight (8) days. The court orders the defendant to pay according to his promise.

From earlier records of Albany Nororial papers, Volume III, dated 1660-1696, and edited by N. Van Laer in Albany in 1918:

"April 11, 1673, at Albany, New York by me, Paulus Jercksen and Albert Jansc [...] signed as witness the contract of a sale of a farm at Claverack between Jan Tyssen and Reyndert Adriaensen, both of whom made their mark "Y".

STORM - de RIVIERE

The Storm Family has been traced back to Dederick Storm in the [...] of Altena. Born about 1390, he had two sons, Jacob who was mayor of Delft, Holland in 1474, and Hugo who was born in Delft in 1400. The father of the Storm family in America was Dirck, born in 1630 in Lyden, Holland. Dirck married Maria Van Montfoort, in St Gertrude's Church in Den Bosch. Their first child, Gregoris, was born in Den Bosch as was their son, Pieter. Their third son, David, was born in Osch. This family of five sailed from Amsterdam, Holland on August 21, [...] aboard the ship, *Devos*, known as the "Fox". The voyage lasted six (6) weeks and ended with their arrival in the city then known as Nieuw Amsterdam. The name Storm is Nors in origin and has remained unchanged for about 675 years.

Upon arriving in New York, New Netherlands in 1662, Derrick Storm turned to inn keeping in New Amsterdam. He was a precentor of the Brookland and Flatbush Churches and a farmer in New Lots, around Bedford, Long Island. In 1691, he was made Clerk of Sessions for Orange County, New York. In 1697 he moved to Phillips Manor in New York which is now Tarrytown. In 1715 he was selected to make up a Church record from memoranda kept by Abraham de'Rivier. The record was for the Dutch Church in Phillipsburg and the Dutch Church for in Cortlandt Manor. These two churches consolidated about April 21, 1697. His listing comprised 319 names of children, their parents and sponsors. Derrick Storm died in Tarrytown in May or June of 1716. There were nine children.

The first son, Gregorus, married Ann Geltche Van Dycke who bore him a son, Jan, in 1704. Jan married Rachel de'Riviere whose second daughter, Engeltje of the fourth generation, born in 1730, married Abraham Jurckse.

Indications at the Storm Family Crest was reflected in a field by a ship at sea under storm sail. The Crest, the helmet of a knight with the visor closed, afronte surmounted by eagles' wings with a motto, "Vertouwt", otherwise translated, "In God we Trust".²

It would appear that Rachel's father, Abraham, had married twice. First, to Rachel Van Weert; and secondly, in 1705 on November 6, to Wentje Crantje Harrickson who was baptized in 1684. She was the daughter of Eunis Crantje Harrickson who was baptized in 1684. Yoentje was also a daughter of Eunis.

THE HUGUENOT ANCESTRY OF GIRAUD/GEROW SICORD - ANGEVINE - COUTANT FAMILIES

History of Our French Huguenot Ancestors, starting with the Gireud's, otherwise know as Gerow. Also, Sicard and Angevine Coutant:

The French Huguenots came to the New World in the 1680's and 1690's to escape religious persecution. As early as 1525, a religious reform movement had begun in France and the first adherents burned at the stake. Until 1572 when an estimated 50,000 Huguenots were killed in St. Bartholomew's Day Massacre, intimate and war and peace existed between the religious beliefs. In 1598, the Edict of Nantes granted religious and political freedom to all. It was revoked in 1685. In a course of a few years, in the 1780's, more than 400,00 Huguenots fled France for other countries in Europe and America. All our French ancestors had settled in New Rochelle, New York by the 1690's.

SICORD/SYCARD

From French government records, Ambrose Sycard (1) lived in Mornac which was a small village near Rochelle and the Atlantic coast. He was in France in 1631. In the 14th Century, his family also lived there. He was a Saunier, which is a worker in the salt marsh. He had a wife and six children with whom he fled in 1681, leaving a vineyard estimated at 40 pounds.

Amoise Sycard (1) came to America and died in 1690 or 1701 in New York City. A son, Daniel Sycard (2), born in 1672 in France, married Katherine Woertman of a Dutch family. He prided himself on

spelling his name 16 different ways on the Register of Baptisms in New York French Church. Their daughter, Katherine Secart or Secord or Sicard, born October 10, 1704, married Daniel Giraud (2) born in New Rochelle, New York, 1697. He died at Cortlandt Manor in Westchester, New York in 1756 or 1757. He was one of the founders of the Trinity Church in New Rochelle, New York.

Sicard family documents exist which show that in the reign of Louis X of France, a certain Marquis de'Sicora, was a marshal of His Majesty's household. A son of this Marquis embraced the Protestant religion as did younger branches of the family.

During the persecution of the Huguenots, many of them suffered at the stake and the family estate situated at LaRochelle was confiscated. Survivors escaped the massacre of St. Bartholomew by flight to England, along with many other noble families. Eventually, five brothers emigrated to America where they settled in New York, purchasing large tracts of land, founding New Rochelle, and engaging in lumbering. On the breaking out of the Revolutionary War, the family divided. The loyalist changed their patronine to Sicord by placing the prefix (D)'Sicor at the end of the name. These brothers, afterwards known as kingsmen, losing in common with all the loyalist their vast properties and estates, emigrated to New Brunswick, again engaging in lumbering and milling operations. Some of the descendants are to be found there today.

The Sicord's settled first at Oak Point, Kings County, New Brunswick on the St. John River. Three of them, James, Gilead and Carmel Sicord came later to the Kennebecasis Valley and settled on both sides of the River. Kennebecasis River is a tributary of the St. John River.

Two of the Sicord brothers and their sons moved to Canada West (Ontario), following the Revolutionary days. Among those who settled in the Niagara District was James Sicord. His wife, Laura (Ingersoll) Sicord was the heroine of the War of 1812. James Sicord had been severely wounded at the Battle of Queenstons Heights and was very ill. Laura learned of the American plans to capture Colonel Fitzgibbon and his detachment of soldiers, including Indian allies at Beaver Dam.

In the month of June, 1813, she walked from her home at St. David through the enemy lines by a circuitous route of about 20 miles through the woods and warned the Colonel of the intended attack. With the information given him by Mrs. Sicord, he formed his plans and saved his country.³

ANJOUVINE - COUTANT

The Anjouvine family is believed to be from Angers, Dutchee of Anjou, France, from about 1550, originating with Louis Anjouvine who was born in 1632. He married in 1658 to Margeurite Chalons and was a glassmaker. Their son, Zachariah Angouvine, was born in La'Rochelle, France in 1664. Zachariah was a tailor who first married Anastasis Baptiste in La'Rochelle, France in 1684. They fled from their home in France in order to escape the persecution. On their way, their baby boy died and in Belgium, Anastasia died and was buried at Antworck. Zachariah emigrated to America and remarried to Mary Naudin, daughter of Andre Naudin. Zachariah died in December of 1739 in New Rochelle, New York, Westchester County. He is very likely to have been buried in New Rochelle.⁴

Elizabeth Anjouvine, daughter of Zachariah Anjouvine and Mary Naudin, married Jean Coutant, who was born in New York, 1695 and died in New York, 1749. Elizabeth Anjouvine was born in January 1701 or 1702 in New York City. Jean Coutant was a member of the French Church in New Rochelle, New York.

A daughter, Elizabeth Coutant, born 1723 or 1729 in New Rochelle, New York married Daniel Gerow (3) who was born March 26, 1725 and died January or February, 1791 at New Marlboro, New York. Elizabeth Coutant Gero died in February, 1816 at Plattskill, New York. They had five sons and seven daughters, Katherine Giraud or Gerow, baptized in the Trinity Church, New Rochelle, New York, who married Johannes Jurckse (John Yerxa) in 1751 in New York.

GIRAUD/GEROW

A Giraud family is recorded as residing in Poitiers or Poitou, France as early as 973 A.D. It is not

known when Daniel Giraud (1) arrived in America. His name appears in the French Church Records July 17, 1699.

When our Huguenot ancestors were preparing to leave France, they left their homes brightly illuminated. The tables were set with care and all the good things that they would have if they were expecting a number of guest. This was done to deceive the spies.

They were obliged to leave almost everything they possessed. They could only take small things of value which could be converted into money. They left candles in golden candlestick burning throughout the house.⁵

Daniel Giraud (1) was a French Huguenot who, with other Huguenots, fled from France because of religious persecution and took refuge in England. According to family tradition, at the time Daniel left France he was living in La'Rochelle. He was probably in England for a period of time before coming to America.

The date that Daniel Gireau (1) arrived in America is not known. Presumably, in California in 1688. His name first appears on the records in the French Church in New York City in July, 1699 when he was Godfather at the baptism of Nadelaine Roy, daughter of Jean Roy.

On March 11, 1699 or 1700, Daniel Giraud (1) was on the list of persons naturalized by Royal Letters Patent, Westminster. He had apparently returned to England to take the Oath of Allegiance.

Daniel Giraud (1) was one of the early settlers of New Rochelle, Westchester County, New York. Other Huguenot settlers of New Rochelle, whose descendants became closely associated with the Giraud family, were Ambroise Sicard, Jean Coutant, Zachariah Angevin and Kean Chadaine (Chadeayne). These names appear on the Huguenot Memorial Stone in New Rochelle.

FIRST GENERATION

Daniel Giraud (1), who was born in 1664 or 1665 (Arthur Girow's notes), died before August 10, 1757 in New Rochelle, New York. He was married to Jeanne (last name unknown) who was born in 1666 or 1667 in France (Arthur Girow's notes). Their children were Daniel Giraud (2) born in 1697 in New Rochelle, New York and died in 1756 or 1757; Andre Giraud (2) born in 1699 in New Rochelle, New York, and died about 1770; and Benjamin Giraud (2) born 1807 in New Rochelle, New York.

In 1710 Daniel Giraud was one of the trustees appointed for building our Church in New Rochelle (Trinity Church). Daniel apparently left New Rochelle sometime after [....] and went to New York City.

The original spelling of the name was Giraud. In old records, you will find the name spelled in several different ways: Jero, Jeroo, Gero, Gerow, Jarro, Gireau and Geero. About 1751, the spelling Gerow begins to appear.

The family of Andrew Gireau (2) continued to use the spelling "Giraud."

SECOND GENERATION

Daniel Giraud (2), born 1697 in New Rochelle, New York, married in 1824 to Catherine Secord (3) who was born October 10, 1704 and died after May 11, 1771. She was the daughter of Daniel Sicord (2) and Catherine Woertman who resided in New Rochelle in Courtlandt Manor, New York. Their family was: Daniel (3) born 1725 in New Rochelle, New York; Jeanne (3) born 1729; Marie (3) born 1731 or 1732; Andre (3) born 1733 or 1734; Benjamin (3) born March 6, 1739; and Isaac (3) baptized in 1742 at the French Church on New Rochelle, New York.

In 1755, Daniel Giraud (2) bought a farm in Cortlandt Manor where he had been living; probably as a tenant farmer.

THIRD GENERATION

Daniel Giraud (3), the son of Daniel Giraud (2) was born in New Rochelle, Westchester County in New Rochelle, Westchester County, New York on March 26, 1725. He was baptized in Trinity Church in New Rochelle. Daniel (3) became a tenant farmer at Cortlandt Manor about 1747 or 1748. This farm was later purchased by his father, Daniel (2). Records indicate that Daniel (3) remained at Cortlandt Manor until

1781. He had come into possession of the farm upon the death of his father.

Daniel (3) Gerow, son of Daniel (2) and Catherine Sicord Gerow, born March 26, 1725 in New Rochelle, New York died February, 1791 in new Marlborough (Plattskill, New York). He married about 1747 to Elizabeth Coutant, daughter of Jean and Elizabeth Angevine Coutant, born February 19, 1729 in New Rochelle. She died in 1826 in Plattskill, Ulster County, New York at 97 years of age. Children of Daniel (3) and Elizabeth (Coutant) Gerow were:

William (4) born January 17, 1748 or 1749. He married February 10, 1774 to Esther Chadeayne and had three sons and six daughters. He lived and died in Plattskill, New York on June 20, 1832.

John (4) was born January 2, 1750 or 1751 and baptized as John Giraud on July 24, 1751 in New Rochelle at the French Church. He married Elizabeth Palmer in 1769 and had seven sons and six daughters.

James (4) born September 14, 1754 was baptized as James Giraud May 28, 1755 in New Rochelle at the French Church. He married Sarah Coombs and had three sons and six daughters. He settled on Long Island and the Saint John River in New Brunswick about July 1783. He lived and died in Queens County, New Brunswick.

Daniel (4), a ship builder of Saint John, was born about 1758 (?). He married Hannah Golding and had four sons and five daughters. He also settled in New Brunswick and died in Houlton, Maine June 18, 1835 where his son, Solomon, had settled in 1830.

Elias (4) was born September 4, 1762. He married Elizabeth Coutant (his cousin) May 30, 1785 and had six sons and six daughters. He lived and died in Plattskill, New York where he and many of his descendants are buried in the Friend's Burial Grounds. A descendant, General Leonard T. Gerow, of World War II settled in Virginia.

Catherine (4) was baptized in Trinity Church in New Rochelle, New York. She married John Yerkes (Yerxa) and later died in Keswick, York County, New Brunswick, Canada.

Deborah (4) was born between 1762 and 1767. She later married James Denton on March 18, 1799 and died in 1853 in Denton Valley, Tennessee.

Esther (4) was born in 1783 and married William Clark.

Sarah (4) married first, Jacob Russell; and second, Isaac Brown.

Jane (4) married James Coutant.

Mary (4) was born in 1767 and married Adolphus Shuart.

Sometime between 1781 and 1784, Daniel Gerow (3) and members of his family moved to New Marlboro (Plattskill) Ulster County, New York.

Daniel died probably in January or February, 1791. He and some of his family were probably buried in a small family burial ground on his property.

Elizabeth Coutant Gerow, widow of Daniel (3), died in 1816. She stated in her will that her property was to be divided among her seven daughters and she named her son, William, and Peter Coutant as executors.

Search And Extract Service

Since 1784 (one year following the arrival of the Loyalist refugees) New Brunswick (Canada) newspapers have become the basic source of genealogical information. The history of our ancestors are reflected in these pages. Almost every event involved people from all walks of life, whether they be prominent business or religious leaders or sailors and shoemakers. The names of ordinary people arose during periods of epidemics, immigration, and political change. The religious papers contain extensive obituaries of farmers and their wives. The county papers contain notices of relatives now living abroad who visit their native New Brunswick families. There are accounts of men lost at sea. Marine examinations identify masters and mates of the schooners that sailed from New Brunswick ports. This information (and more) is in addition to the birth, marriage and death notices normally found in the newspapers. In the past, this treasure mine of genealogical data was virtually inaccessible to the researcher. In order to identify an ancestor, the genealogist required the knowledge of a specific date or would spend countless hours scanning newspaper after newspaper, page after page. For those researchers who lived far, the cost of hiring a researcher was just too exorbitant.

Currently (1992) fifty volumes of **"Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers"** have been published. Genealogical extractions from 45 New Brunswick newspapers published from 1784 to 1880 have been cross-indexed by over 250,000 names. Although the published series may be found in over forty libraries across North America, it was available only by purchase. Although each volume is indexed countless hours may be spent by the researcher using this published series while scanning each index and manually extracting entries. Each year six new volumes are published, generating over 30,000 new cross referenced names annually.

As the **Search And Extract Service (SAE)** and **Vital Statistics From New Brunswick (Canada) Newspapers** series both utilize the same computer files, the information gleaned from this service is an exact duplicate of the extractions which appear in the published volumes. Therefore, the SAE service provides the same narrative or data as it first appeared in the newspaper. Also the original newspaper reference follows each entry extracted.

- * **Surname** (Although some variations in spelling may be accommodated by the computer search. In other instances a new search may be necessary.
- * **Place** (Extracts may be retrieved by the name of a specific geographical area ie. (country) "Australia", "Ireland"; (town) "Digby" (Nova Scotia), "Newcastle" (New Brunswick)
- * **Subject** ie. "barrister"; "loyalist"; "Methodist", etc.

The advance minimum fee is \$ 20 which covers both the cost of the search per key word and the first five (5) pages of information generated by the computer. An additional fee of \$3 is charged for each page generated in excess of five pages. Each page is laser printed 10 pt. font (8 1/2 by 11) and bound. You also have the option of choosing either a global search of all the volumes or selecting specific years by volume numbers.

"Connections" Conference - 1993

"A special occasion for Genealogists With New Brunswick, Canada roots"

If the strong early response is any indication of the numbers of genealogists who will attend the "Connections"-1993 Conference, then 1993 may very well see the largest gathering of New Brunswick genealogists in the history of our Society. In the six weeks following the distribution of fliers in the Summer Issue of "Generations", sixty-five members replied. It is expected, as researchers return from their summer vacations, that the numbers will begin to swell.

The site chosen by the "Connections" Steering Committee of the host Saint John branch for the seminar is the University of New Brunswick Saint John Campus, Saint John, N.B. The campus is within a few minutes drive of the Rockwood Park Golf Course, Cherry Brook Zoo, and driving range.

A number of activities are being planned before and after the conference. Although arrangements are currently under way, special tours of Canada's oldest city will precede the afternoon registration. Saint John has many points of interest such as Market Slip where the Loyalists first landed in 1783. The Old Loyalist Burying Grounds contain many of the earliest stones. Much of the city's uptown architecture has remained the same since the Great Fire of 1877 while other structures such as the Old Loyalists House dates back to a colonial time period.

Among the confirmed key speakers for the seminars is Dr. Ralph Crandall, head of the New England Historic Genealogical Society Library of Boston, Mass., author of "Shaking Your Family Tree" and popular lecturer at previous New Brunswick seminars. Another confirmed key speaker is David Bell, known to many as the author of "Early Loyalist Saint John". Concurrent sessions will host a number of well known interesting speakers on a wide variety of genealogical topics.

Through organizational displays, computers, etc. every effort will be made to acquaint visitors with New Brunswick records both private and public. 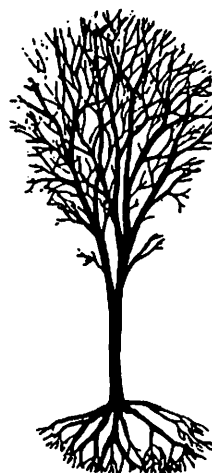

A FIGHTING CLAN by Malcolm Sutherland

Due for publication by John Donald, Publishers, Edinburgh in the Spring of 1993, 'A Fighting Clan' describes the contribution to Scotland's (and later Britain's) naval and military history made by Clan Sutherland, over the period 1250 to 1850.

Sutherlandshire, the second most northerly county in Scotland, was largely inhabited by the members of two clans - Sutherland and Mackay. After years of skirmishing between themselves and with their neighbours, formal regiments were raised in the county during the civil wars in the seventeenth century. Later, William, 17th Earl of Sutherland raised men to help in containing the 1745 Jacobite uprising, and in 1759 the 17th Earl's son raised the 1st regiment of Sutherland Fencibles. Further regiments of Sutherland Fencibles were raised by William Wemyss, a grandson of the 17th Earl, in 1779 and again in 1793. In 1800, Wemyss raised the 93rd Sutherland Highlanders, later to become the 2nd Battalion, the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Many Sutherland officers served in these regiments.

'A Fighting Clan' outlines the history of Clan Sutherland from its early beginnings to the time of the highland clearances in the nineteenth century. During six centuries, some 290 members of the Clan held commissions in British regiments and a further 35 held commissions or warrants in the Royal Navy. Detailed research has been made into the careers and genealogy of all these men. There are numerous interesting characters amongst them: for example, Alexander Sutherland (1491-c.1519), a son of the 8th Earl, who tried to seize Dunrobin Castle - the seat of the Earls - from his half-sister, Elizabeth, and ended up by having his head chopped off and impaled on the castle tower; Kenneth Sutherland, 3rd Lord Duffus (1679-1732), who was a Captain in the Royal Navy, but took part in the first Jacobite uprising, lost his commission, title and lands and fled to Russia where he became an Admiral in Peter the Great's navy; and Kenneth's grandson, James Sutherland (1747-1829), who, when adjutant of his regiment, eloped with his colonel's young wife.

Sutherland officers fought in the Wars of Scottish Independence, the Anglo-Scottish Wars, the Thirty Years' War, the English Civil Wars, the American Revolutionary War and the Napoleonic Wars. They fought at Bannockburn (1314), Blenheim (1704), Culloden (1746), Minden (1759), Yorktown (1781) and La Coruña (1809), to name but a few major battles. Others fought in India, Burma, South Africa, West Africa and the West Indies.

'A Fighting Clan' will be of particular interest to members, or descendants of members of Clan Sutherland. But there is also much to interest the general student of military and naval history, and of Scottish genealogy. The book will be illustrated with numerous plans, diagrams and photographs of some of the prominent members of the Clan.

One Search for Ancestors

When I first became interested in genealogy, the earliest Wright ancestor I could name was my great-grandfather, Joseph Wright of Millstream, Kings County. I knew his name because my father, Eldon Jesse Wright, son of John and Hannah (Belding) Wright, had told me years before that his Grandfather Wright's name was Joseph, and I had written it down. And so the search began.

The 1851 Census for the Parish of Studholm, Kings County showed a Joseph Wright, age 49, with his wife Abigail and seven of their children, including their son John. I knew this was the correct Joseph Wright family because I recognized in the children's names aunts and uncles I had heard my father speak of. The Kings County Marriage Register records the marriage of Joseph Wright and Abigail Parlee on December 4, 1823.

My next step was to search for Joseph Wright's land petition. In this petition, dated December 14, 1822, he stated that he was then twenty years and five months old, that he was born in the Parish of Norton, and that he had lived in the Parish of Sussex for fifteen years. (The Parish of Studholm was not set off from the Parish of Sussex until 1840.)

In order to find some clue to the name of Joseph's father, I decided to search land records from 1806 to 1809 to see if I could find a Wright who had disposed of land in the Parish of Norton and acquired land in the Parish of Sussex during that time period. I found that on November 21, 1808 William Wright of the Parish of Sussex sold to Ephram DeForest the western half of Lot #38 in the Parish of Norton. (Kings County Land Records, Book J1, pp. 22-23) William Wright had purchased this same property from Ralph Hait on July 15, 1801. (Kings County Land Records, Book G1, p. 301)

On January 23, 1807 William Wright was one of the inhabitants of Norton who signed a petition requesting that a jail be built for Kings County, (PANB, RS24, p. 10)

We therefore know that a William Wright owned property in the Parish of Norton during the time Joseph Wright would have been born and was still residing there in January of 1807, but that by November of 1808 he was a resident of the Parish of Sussex. It seems very likely, then, that William Wright was Joseph Wright's father.

On December 11, 1809 William Wright was granted Lot #41 on the Millstream. I have been told that in the early days of our province, people often homesteaded on vacant land and started to clear it for farming, and then used those circumstances to convince the authorities that the land should be granted to them. If this is true, it is quite possible that William Wright was occupying Lot #41 before it was officially granted to him.

The New Brunswick Courier of January 23, 1841 reported the death of William Wright of the Parish of Studholm, age 77. Major Markham's Scrapbook in the New Brunswick Museum makes note of the death (p. 31) and adds:

Two William Wrights, father and son, came to N. B. with the Loyalists; as this William was born in 1764, he was undoubtedly the son. His

father, William Wright, was born in New York Province and settled on the Kennebecasis River in 1783.

My next step, then, was to look at published histories of the Loyalists, and I found that Captain William Wright and his son, William Wright Junior, of Loyalist Company #15 arrived in Saint John on the ship "William" in the summer of 1783. (David G. Bell, Early Loyalist Saint John, pp. 25, 80, and 255; and Esther Clark Wright, The Loyalists of New Brunswick, pp. 80, 245, and 345)

Further evidence that the William Wright of the Millstream was a Loyalist is found in the House of Assembly Petitions for 1838. (PANB, RG2, RS24) Petition #151 is from William Wright of the Parish of Sussex requesting a pension; in it he states that "your petitioner . . . is now nearly 78 years of age," and he goes on to outline his military service in the Revolutionary War. This petition was made January 17, 1838. Although the obituary stated that he was 77 in January of 1841 (which would indicate he was probably born in 1763) and the petition stated that he was nearly 78 in January of 1838 (which would indicate he was probably born in 1760), I believe these two are the same man. I am inclined to accept the age he stated himself in his petition as the accurate one, but in all likelihood we will never be certain of his birthdate.

Now, after at least twenty years of genealogical searching, the earliest Wright ancestor I can name with certainty is my great-grandfather, Joseph Wright of Millstream, Kings County. I have continued to seek information on William Wright Junior and Captain William Wright though, because I am convinced they are Joseph's father and grandfather. The evidence points that way, but there is no concrete proof; however, one of the joys of genealogical research is the constant hope that some day, somehow, that little scrap of information I need will come my way.

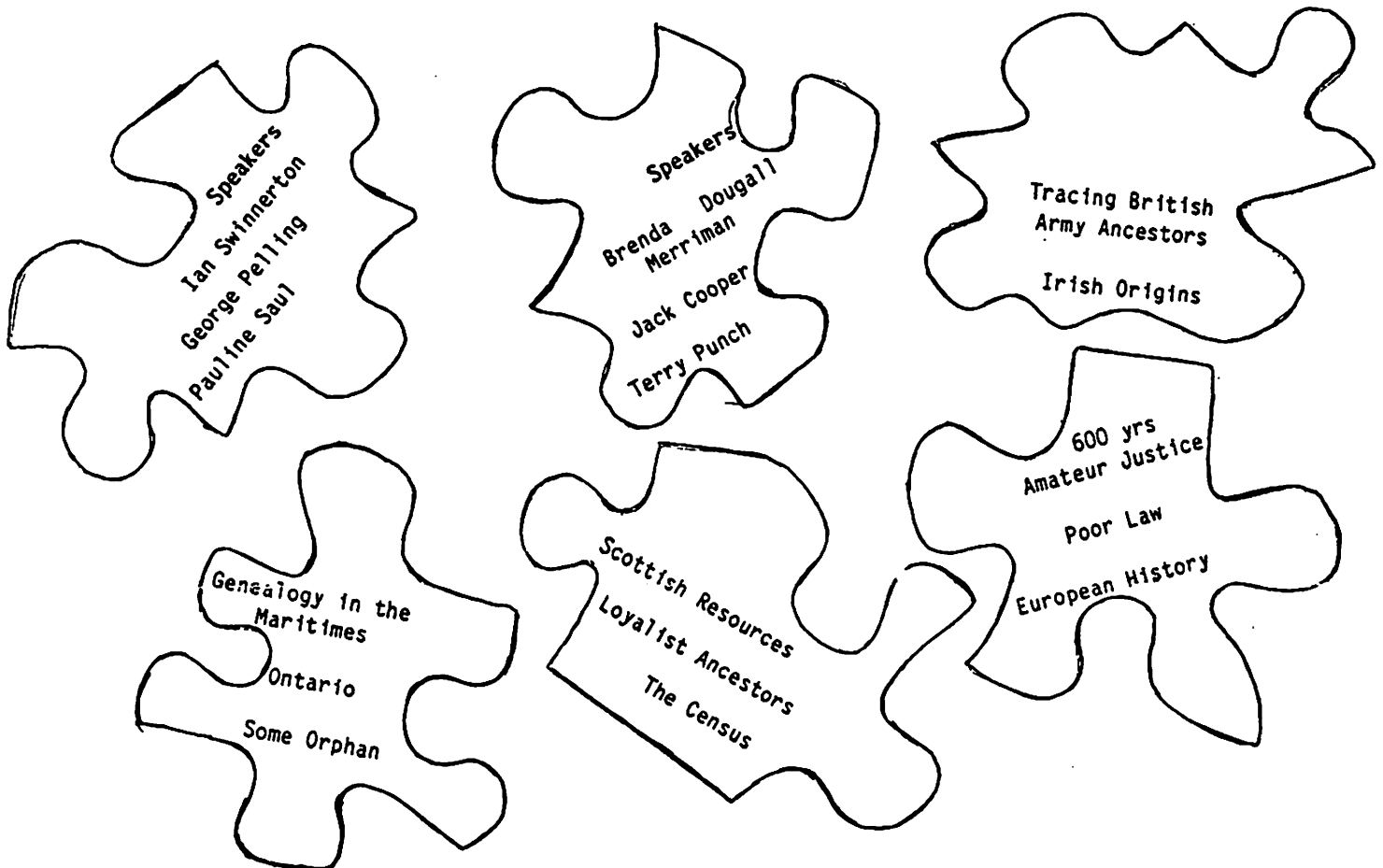

ELLIS FAMILY

On the weekend of July 31, August 1 & 2, 1992, more than 200 descendants of William Ellis and Mary (Casey)? gathered at the Canobie Women's Institute Centre for the first time. The reunion was deemed a great success. Family members came from as far away as British Columbia, although many live in the Bathurst area.

A book prepared by Mrs. Wilma Murphy and Mrs. Irma F. Downing gives a complete and detailed account of the family line. This book is available for ten dollars (\$10.00). Both Mrs. Murphy and Mrs. Downing have accumulated much information on the Ellis families of the Bathurst and New Bandon areas. For further info one may contact Mrs. Irma F. Downing, ID #2088 at P. William Ellis bought land in Salmon Beach in 1827. His descendants are today living on the land. It is believed William Ellis to be one of Edward Ellis' sons. Edward's son Francis Ellis is to have been the first Irish settler of the New Bandon area. He is to have immigrated from Ireland around 1816 -17, with 17 families. Many of Francis' brothers and sisters also settled in Youghall near Bathurst.

Francis Ellis did not stay in New Bandon. He sold his land which was granted to him (1831) and moved to Cochocton, Ohio, in 1832. I am fortunate in that I have a photograph of Francis Ellis' and his wife, Margaret's grave stone.

There is still a lot of work to be done and there are a lot of unanswered questions. I am working on the 17 families who immigrated with Francis Ellis. Through these families I have been able to gather information.

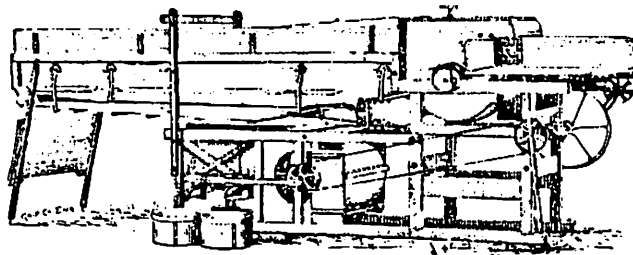

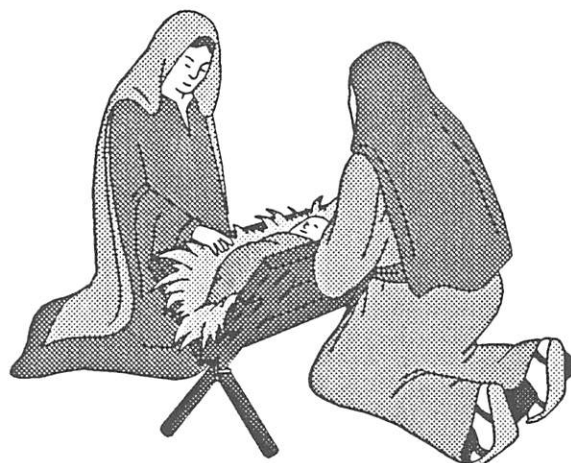
