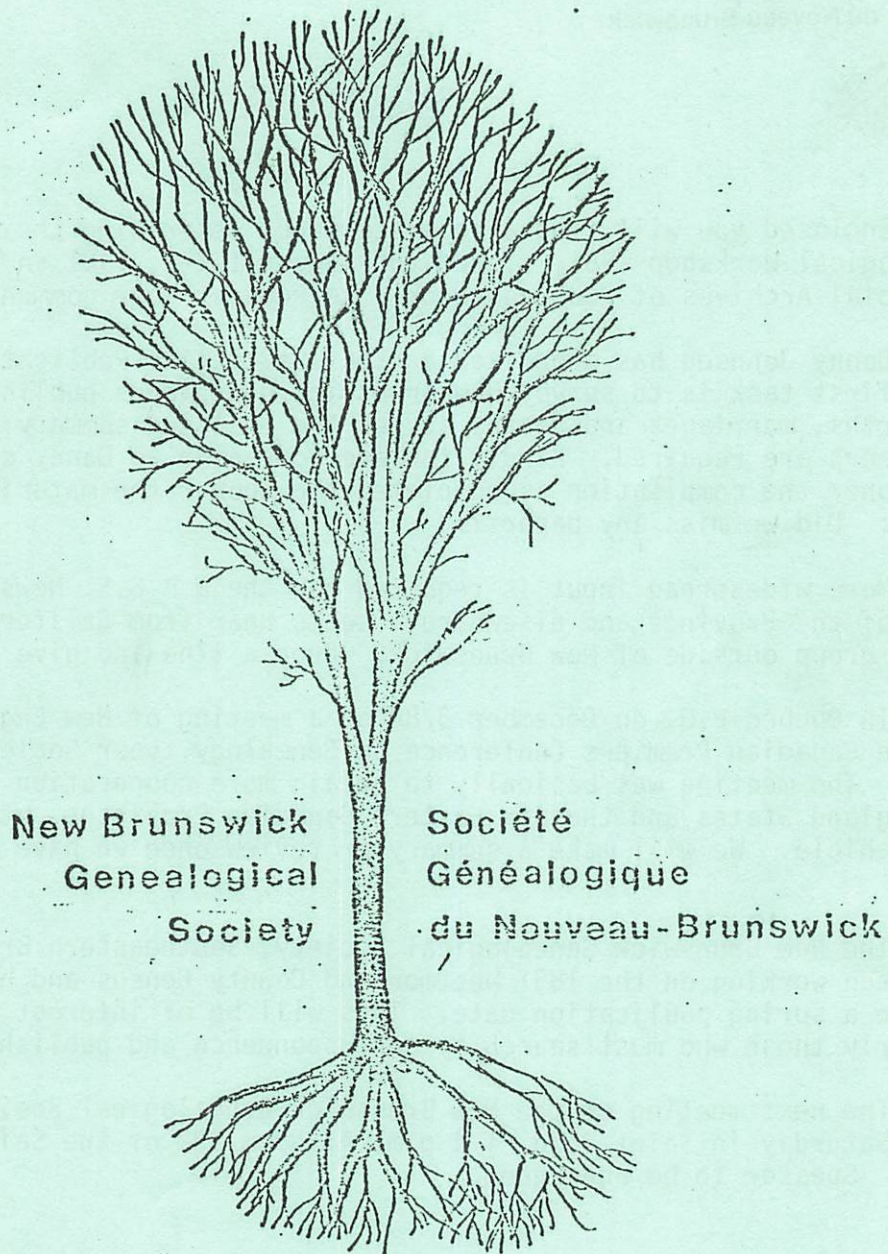


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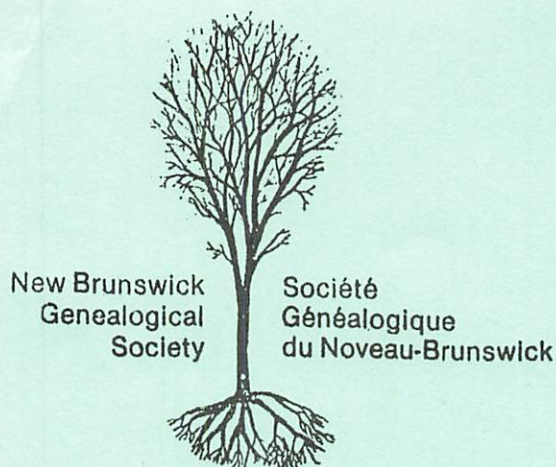

In Quebec P.Q. on December 3/80 at a meeting of New England Governors, Eastern Canadian Premiers Conference on Genealogy, your Society presented a brief. The meeting was basically to obtain more cooperation between the six New England States and the six Eastern Canadian Provinces, utilizing genealogy as a vehicle. We will make a summary or review once we have some more feedback.

The New Brunswick Genealogical Society, Southeastern Branch (Moncton), have been working on the 1851 Westmorland County Census and hopefully will achieve a spring publication date. This will be of interest to all, particularly those who must search by correspondence and published material.

MRS. MARY CAVALIER H. JOUETT, a disease of the heart, at her residence in St. Mary's on Sunday morning, the 11th inst., after a short illness. Mary, wife of Cavalier H. Jouett, Esq., in the 50th year of her age, leaving a deeply afflicted husband and family to mourn the loss. (N. B. REPORTER Jan. 15, 1847)  
CAVALIER H. JOUETT, buried Jan. 20, 1854 - Church of England burying ground, Westmoreland Road, age 62- occupation Landing Surveyor Treasury. He owned property on Brussell's St., Saint John, which was offered for sale in 1826. In 1823, he was a free-man of Saint John and City Clerk. Cavalier had a son Charles Henry Jouet who married Mary Ann Brady. Charles was a sea captain and died about 1851.

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KINGS CO. LOYALISTS by Sharon M. Dubeau -----

BETTS, AZOR: from Westchester Co., New York. In 1775, he was living in New York City. At one point during the War, he was imprisoned for carrying evidence to the British, and sentenced to die. He served first as a Captain-Lieutenant with the King's American Regt., then as a surgeon with the Queens Rangers. He arrived in New Brunswick, May 1783, and received a grant on the eastern side of the Kennebecasis River (Rothesay Parish) in 1784. He was, in 1787, a claimant to the British government for losses suffered in America. By 1796, he was residing in Sussex Vale; and by 1799 had removed to Digby, Nova Scotia, where he died in 1809. His widow Gloriannah died at Saint John in 1815 (aged 68) and is buried in the Old Burying Ground.

DOSTWICK, ISAAC: born 1760 Stamford, Connecticut, the son of Meredith and Hannah (Hanford). He married Tamson Cable, in 1782 at Smithtown, Long Island, New York. He was first granted a townlot at Parrtown, and in 1784 he received a lot on the southerly side of the Saint John River, in the Long Reach, Kingston Parish. He died at Kingston in 1808; his wife Tamson died there in 1814 (aged 50). Their children were: 1. Mary (1783- ), 2. Hanford (1785-1865), 3. Hannah (1787-1871) m. Jesse Raymond, 4. Sarah (1789-1820), 5. Clarissa (1789-1816) m. Daniel Crawford, 6. Thomas (1793 - ), Jared (1794-1857), 8. Ann (1797-1882) m. George Prince, 9. Jane (1800-1887) m. Wm. Whetting, 10. Hiram (1802-1853).

CHALONER, WALTER: from Newport, Rhode Island, he had been the sheriff of Newport Co. In 1782, he was a deputy commissary of prisoners in New York. He first received a town lot at Parrtown in 1784 and became a Freeman of Saint John in 1785, admitted as a gentleman. In a grant of 1784, he received a lot on the northerly side of the Hammond River (Hampton Parish) and by a grant of 1786, he received land on the northwesterly side of Belleisle Bay (Kars Parish). For a time, he was a Justice of the Peace for Kings Co. He died in Saint John in 1796; his wife Ann died there in 1808. Both are buried in the Old Burying Ground. Their children include: Ann, John - died 1827, Benjamin, Walter, Hannah m. ---- Foster, Elizabeth, died 1814.

CRAWFORD, James: from Pound Ridge, Westchester Co., New York, the son of John who died in 1773. In 1775, he was living in North Castle. He joined the British on Long Island in 1777 and served with the Guides and Pioneers Corps. He went to New Brunswick, May, 1783, and settled first at Burton. In 1784, he was granted a lot on the southerly side of the Long Reach in the Saint John River, Kingston Parish. He was a claimant to the British government, in 1787, for losses suffered in America. He died in Kingston Parish in 1830 (aged 87); his first wife Rachel Benedict died there in 1817 (aged 70). Their children include: Stephen, Agnes, James, Joel, Benjamin, Daniel, Robert, Rachel m. Hamlin Bradley.

FAIRWEATHER, THOMAS: from Norwalk, Connecticut, the son of Jedediah. During the war, he fled within the British lines at Long Island, for safety. He was first granted a townlot at Parrtown and in a grant dated 1784, he received a lot on the

eastern side of the Kennebecasis River (Rothesay Parish). He died in 1825 (aged 76); his wife Diborah died in 1799 (aged 45). Both are buried in Trinity Anglican Churchyard, Kingston. His second wife Elizabeth, died at Norton in 1846 (aged 79). His children include: James (b. 1798)

GORHAM, JONATHAN: born in 1740 at Stamford, Connecticut, the son of George and Hannah (Banks). In a grant of 1787, he received land on the northwest side of Oak Point Bay, in the Long Reach of the Saint John River (Greenwich Parish). He was among the founders of the first Anglican Church, built at Oak Point in 1790. During the War of 1812, he was active in the militia, training soldiers. He was the proprietor of a popular tavern. He died at Oak Point in 1824, his wife Mary Watters died there in 1822. Their children were: 1. William (1783-1841), 2. Phoebe (1787 - ) m. Walter Moore, 3. Lydia (1791 - ) m. Benjamin White, 4. Elizabeth (1796-1820) m. Dennis Collins, 5. Daniel (1799-1876).

GRAY, WILLIAM: born 1729, from Westchester Co., New York. He was a shoemaker and tanner by trade. In 1777, he was forced to take refuge within the British lines in New York. He was a captain of a militia company of Loyalist refugees, who arrived in Saint John in August of 1783. He settled at Maugerville. By a grant of 1786, he received land on the southeasterly side of Belleisle Bay (Springfield Parish). He was a member of the Springfield Baptist Church in 1803, and later became a magistrate of Kings Co. He died in 1825. His children included: Justus, James and Abraham.

HOYT, ISRAEL: born 1743. A shoemaker from Norwalk, Connecticut. He was imprisoned in 1777, for his Loyalist sentiments and subsequently went within the British lines at New York for protection. He arrived in Saint John, Spring 1783, aboard the ship 'UNION', accompanied by his wife, four children over ten and two children under ten. By a grant of 1784, he received land on the northerly side of the Kennebecasis River, Kingston Parish. He was appointed a Vestryman in the first church established in Kingston, Spring 1784. In 1787, he was a claimant to the British government for losses suffered in America. He died in Kingston in 1803. Two sons also died there: Israel Jr. (ca. 1776-1800) and Samuel (ca. 1776-1860). All are buried in the Trinity Anglican Churchyard.

MARVIN, JOHN: born 1757, from Norwalk, Connecticut. He arrived, unmarried, at Saint John, Spring 1783, aboard the ship 'UNION'. By a grant of 1784, he received land on the southerly side of the Saint John River in the Long Reach, Kingston Parish. He died at Springfield in 1830; his wife Grace died there in 1841 (aged 76). Both are buried at the Trinity Churchyard. Their children include: Josiah (b. c. 1787), Silas (b. c. 1790), Samuel, (b. c. 1792), and Philo.

PEATMAN, DANIEL: son of Daniel who was born ca. 1739 in Germany. Daniel Jr. born ca. 1765 at Staten Island, New York. By a grant of 1787, he received land on the northwesterly side of Oak Point Bay in the Long Reach of the Saint John River (Greenwich Parish).



He married in 1800, Nancy Gorham, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Whitney). He died in 1849; his wife died in 1864 (aged 89). Both are buried at St. Pauls Anglican Churchyard, Oak Point. Their children were: 1. Norris, 2. Charles (b. c. 1803), 3. Henry, 4. Mary Ann m. John Belyea, 5. George (b. c. 1811) 6. Sarah (b. c. 1811) m. William Smith, 7. Harriet m. William Harrison.

PICKETT, DAVID: a weaver from Stamford, Connecticut, he was declared an enemy to his country in 1776 and was subsequently banished. Later that year, he left his home and joined the British on Long Island. He arrived at Saint John, Spring 1783, aboard the ship 'UNION', accompanied by his wife, three children over ten and four children under ten. By a grant of 1784, he received land on the northerly side of the Kennebecasis River, Kingston Parish. He was appointed Church Warden in the first church established in Kingston, Spring 1784. He became the Treasurer of Kings Co., and was later a Justice of the Court of Common Pleas. He died in Kingston Parish in 1826 (aged 84); his wife Sarah died there in 1832 (aged 92).

RAYMOND, SILAS: from Norwalk, Connecticut, the son of Samuel (d. 1783) and Mary. He arrived at Saint John, Spring 1783, aboard the ship 'UNION', accompanied by his wife, three children over ten and one child under ten. By a grant of 1784, he received land on the northerly side of the Kennebecasis River, Kingston Parish. He was appointed a Vestryman in the first church established in Kingston, Spring 1784. By trade, he was a house carpenter and joiner. He died in Kingston Parish in 1824 (aged 76); his wife Sarah died there in 1821 (aged 75); and his mother Mary died there in 1793 (aged 96).

SPRAGG, CALEB: from Fishkill, Dutchess Co., New York. He served with the Loyal American Regt. during the War. He was a captain of a militia company of Loyalist refugees who arrived in Saint John in 1783. He was first granted a townlot at Parrtown in 1784, and by a grant of 1786, he received land on Belleisle Bay (Springfield Parish). His wife was Ann, daughter of William and Leah (Gillies) Harding. He died in Springfield Parish in 1812 (aged 82). He had seven children including: Caleb, Elijah, Richard, a daughter who married Jesse Gillies and a daughter who married Caleb Davis.

STOCKTON, RICHARD: born 1733 at Flushing, New York. He was a Major with the New Jersey Volunteers during the War, and in 1777 was taken prisoner. He married Mary Hatfield of Elizabethtown, New Jersey. With his wife, four sons and three daughters, he settled in Sussex Parish, while one son and two daughters remained in the U. S. He owned a salt distillery at Plumwescop and was at one time a magistrate of Kings Co. He died at Sussex in 1801. His children include: 1. Andrew (1760-1821), 2. Phoebe (1761-1821), 3. William (1764-1841), 4. Mary Ann (1768 - ) m. John Barberie, 5. Samuel (1774-1848) 6. Jane m. Peter Cogle 7. Richard.

WHEATON, EPHRAIM: from New Jersey, then Connecticut. By a grant of 1786 he received land on the southeasterly side of Belleisle Bay, Kingston Parish. He died in Greenwich Parish in 1832. His third wife was Mary London. His children included: Joseph (1788)

Seth, Ann m. Timothy Shaw, Sarah m. John Shaw, Charles,  
Elizabeth m. William Erb, Samuel, James, Hannah, David, Mary Jane.

#### BIBLIOGRAPHY

Over the past few years, I have spent a great deal of time collecting data from widely varied sources to compile biographical sketches about the Loyalists. I have not attempted to list all of those sources here, as my bibliography would be longer than my submission! Listed below are only a few of the major printed sources used. Many primary sources, such as cemetery transcriptions and church records have also been used in my research.

Boston, March 13 - The British Sheriff from St. Andrew's (Nova Scotia) has taken with an armed force, a Mr. Tuttle, formerly a lieutenant in the American army, from his house on Moor Island, in the bay of Passamaquoddy, and conveyed him to St. Andrew's jail, where he was confined a considerable time; their court have repeatedly fined the inhabitants of those islands for refusing to obey when summoned as jurymen. In a late instance Capt. Dunn, their high sheriff for Charlotte County, with David Owen, esquire, one of their principal magistrates, and four men, armed with muskets, pistols, etc. in a hostile and violent manner, went on Frederick Island, and attempted to break open Mr. Delesdernier's house to search for property they said belonged to a British subject. The master of the house opposing them, armed with an ax, prevented their succeeding on the house; but they finding a cow on the island, forcibly carried her off with them. Mr. Delesdernier is the collector of the customs in that island for the United States. It is hoped Lord Dorchester will not countenance such proceedings. 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JOHN CAMPBELL

John Campbell, aged 76 years, died at his home in this city on Thursday, August 18, from the effects of an injury received some time ago. The funeral was held this morning from the Catholic Church, Rev. Fr. Lynch conducting the services. The deceased was a native of New Brunswick coming to Minnesota in 1855 and locating

at St. Anthony. Some eighteen years ago he removed to this county and has ----- following the business of lumbering and farming. The deceased leaves a wife and seven grown children, three of his daughters and one son being in attendance at the funeral. His brother, Joseph Campbell of St. Michaels, Wright County, arrived in the city yesterday and was with him in his last hours. (The Brainerd Dispatch - August 19, 1898)

The subject of the obituary (JOHN CAMPBELL) was listed on the 1851 Census of Blackville, N.B. as eldest son in the household of Angus Campbell and his wife Margaret, born in New Brunswick in 1823-4. Although the record of his baptism has not been located, his sisters and brothers were shown to be the children of Angus Campbell and Margaret 'Pratt'. Margaret was the daughter of JOHN DRAUGHT and SARAH MACPHEE. John's brother, Joseph Campbell of Wright County was known to Victor Draught who still lives in Wright County. The 1860 Census for Wright County shows John and his wife Mary A. and son Angus living next to Angus C. On the other side lived James McDougal and his wife Catherine. Marriage records in St. Michael Roman Catholic Church, in the same county, show that she is the daughter of the same couple, Angus Campbell and his wife. Also in the neighborhood is Michael Kinna and his wife Sarah, another daughter. Michael was born in Ireland, but his parents came with him, when he was a baby, to settle in Blackville where their other children were born. His parents were James Kinna, also spelled Cana, or Kenah, and Ann Ryan, whose father was Col. John Ryan.

Others in the same neighborhood of Wright County who were from New Brunswick were Thomas Dean and his wife Lovina, William Dean and his wife Mary, William Foster and his wife Elisabeth.

Mrs. Gaffney writes, "I recently got some information on a JOHN ROSS who was a ship owner, therefore probably a ship's master, or captain. This one is a Tory-Loyalist whose ship was burnt at the dock in Wilmington. It mentions that he resided in Campbellton, Cumberland Co., N. C. Now in the same town there was also an Angus Campbell whose memorial I had seen. Obviously not the one born only in 1775 in Scotland, but it can never be entirely clear where each person went, or when, or for how long."

(Editors note - my great grandfather was Andrew Nicholas Campbell - 1833-1913, and although his tombstone, which is found at Caverhill, York Co., N.B. says he was born in Prince Edward Island, Census returns for 1851 have him as being born in New Brunswick (Richibucto) and his parents born in Prince Edward Island.

He had a brother James, and a sister, Mrs. Margaret J. McMurdo, who were from the Montrose area of Prince Edward Island. Andrew married in 1870 to Agnus White of Bird Settlement, York County, N.B., the daughter of George and Agnus (White) White, of Kenfrewshire, Scotland. In all probability, Andrew's wife was also born in Scotland. Agnus was born in 1849 and died in 1928. Children of Andrew and Agnus Campbell were Colin, Frank, Archibald, Scott, Alexander (Sandy), and two babies (unnamed) who died shortly after birth, as well as Walter, who married Renie Nason of Hainesville)



CARDIGAN CEMETERY & NORTH CARDIGAN CEMETERIES - corrections-  
contributed by Andrew Gunter--

"Dear Sirs - I was much interested in the records of the Cardigan and North Cardigan Cemeteries in issue # 3 of your newsletter, I had copied a few of the stones in both the cemeteries about 5 years ago. When I compared my copies with yours, I found several errors. When I later visited Fredericton, I visited the cemeteries and found quite a few errors..."

Mr. Gunter's corrections follow for the Cardigan Cemetery -

- The cemetery is located across the highway from a house occupied by the Baptist Church, not Mr. Stairs.
- In memory of Agnes, beloved wife of Thomas F. Stickles, who departed this life Aug. 15, 1894.
- At Rest, Sydney V. Stickles 1906-1928
- In memory of Thomas died 12 March, 1818 (faint I say 1843, A.G.) aged 21 years. Also Elizabeth died 28 May
- In memory of David Melchior son of Benjamin and Martha Richards died Nov. 14, 1839, aged 6 yrs. 5 mos.
- In memory of David Griffiths died Aug. 17, 1864 aged 82 years. Also his wife Rachael died Apr. 4, 1866 aged 82 years. Emigrated from Pembroke, South Wales in the year 1819. Anna died Sept. 1826 age 6 years, daughter of David and Rachael Griffiths...
- In memory of David Saunders died Jan. 8, 1851 aged 80 years. For me to live is Christ to die is gain. Also his wife Elizabeth died Mar. 2, 1852 aged 84 years.
- In memory of L. Jane Evans wife of Benj. J. Evans 1833-1927
- D. Gordon White born Sept. 19, 1885 died Sept. 17, 1915.
- In memory of Mary Ann daughter of Benjamin & Letita Evans, who died June 5, 1870 aged 17 years 3 mos. 8 days.
- George A. White, died Sept. 10, 1821 (or '24) aged 81 years. Native of Renfrewshire, Scotland, and his wife Ann died Dec. 29, 1828 aged 77 years. (Footstone F.A.W. - this footstone could belong to Francis A. Wise.
- William Sanson died Mar. 14, 1876, aged 84 years. Native of Somerset, England. Also his wife Mary Nichols...
- William S. Steen, born June 10, 1885, died Oct. 20, 1917. His wife Mary born Apr. 27th, 1864, died Nov. 18, 1932.
- Broken Stones - in memory of William Smith, died July 26, 1878, aged 65 years. (Next to this, buried in ground) Amy (Smith?) died Aug. 18, 1879 age 4 years & 6 mos. Hannah (Smith??) died Apr. 27, 1880 age 10 years and 9 mos.
- In memory of Francis A. wife of James Wise, died Jan. 21, 1889, also footstone F. A. W. (When I copied this stone about 5 years ago it was broken and in four parts. Found in bushes near Thomas White's stone in 1980.

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PRESERVING FAMILY HISTORY MATERIALS .... Extremes in temperature and humidity quickly damage historical materials. These materials should be removed from attics, basements and garages and stored in well-ventilated places. A temperature of 70 degrees Fahrenheit and humidity of 50 percent is ideal. Guard against insects, as cockroaches eat glue from book bindings and termites devour paper. Papers should be stored flat instead of folded. Staples, rubber bands and transparent tape should be removed to prevent stains.

Nitrate-base film, the flexible cellulose type most photographers used until the 1940's, will catch fire easily, especially in a hot attic. (Reprinted from the Newsletter of the WHITE BEAR LAKE GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, Nunc, 1980, Vol. 2 No. 8)

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NEW STYLE - GREGORIAN CALENDAR ... Started 1582. Calendar dates then ahead of actual time by 10 days. Adopted by Roman Catholic countries.

Britain does not accept until 1751. Time discrepancy now 11 days.

Act of Parliament in 1751 decreed:

- \* Sept. 2, 1752 would be followed by Sept. 14, 1752.
- \* New Year's day would be Jan. 1, for 1752, and each year thereafter.

When 11-day adjustment took place in 1752, calendar looked like so: Aug. 30, Aug. 31, Sept. 1, Sept. 2, Sept. 14.

Double-date example: Geo. Washington born Feb. 11, 1731. Calendar change made him 11 days older. George rectified by changing date to Feb. 22.

NOTE: Feb. old style was 11th month of year, hence birthdate was Feb. 11, 1731. In new style calendar, Feb. being 2nd month, birthday becomes Feb. 22, 1732.

Birthday written Feb. 22, 1731-2. Double dating occurs only for

- Alexander Campbell: Died at his residence in the Parish of Blackville on the 10th inst. Mr. Alexander Campbell in the 43rd year of his age leaving a wife and seven children to mourn their loss - Chatham Gleaner, October 21, 1850

- Alexander Campbell: died suddenly on the 29th ult. in Dalhousie, New Brunswick at the advanced age of 79 years, shortly after recovering from a severe illness in which he ever expressed his readiness to obey his Masters call, Alexander Campbell, Esq., formerly of Bodeque House, Prince Edward Island. He was here respected for his many estimable qualities, none of which were more conspicuous than of the law of kindness and good will to his fellow man. Chatham Gleaner - November 22, 1856

Married June 15, 1909 to Miss Pearl Dick, daughter of Stephen Dick, Esq., of L'Etele, N.B.

First elected to the House of Assembly on January 9, 1950. Retired in 1952.

Children: Stephen Afton, mill worker; Lydia Mildred, married a Mr. Allen; and Rhoda Jean, married a Mr. Palmer.

- Campbell, John, 1762-1832. Born at Balle, Graigash, Argyloshire, Scotland. Educated in Scotland.

Emigrated to New Brunswick and settled at St. Andrews. One of

the original grantees of 1784. Engaged in mercantile business. Justice of the Peace and Judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas.

Married Elizabeth who died August 1814, age 44 years.

First elected to the House of Assembly at the General Election of October, 1819. Sat one session and parliament dissolved due to the death of King George III. Re-elected at the general election of June 1820, and sat until dissolution of Parliament in 1827, at which time he retired.

Died August 9, 1830 at St. Andrews, age 68.

To his liberality and enterprise, the town of Chatham, the most populous and important on this side of the province owes, in a great measure, its rise and progress, and hence, he has long been emphatically called the father of the settlement. He was a man universally respected and beloved by the rich and poor, the young and old.

- At Sheffield, died on the 26th of November, 1841 at the advanced age of 86 years, Mr. James Taylor, leaving four sons and three daughters. He was a native of the State of New York and was one of the first Loyalists that came to this Province.

- Died at Fredericton on the 2nd of February, 1842, the Reverend Frederick W. Miles, Minister of the Baptist Church, youngest son of the late Colonel Elijah Miles of Maugerville.

- Died at Sheffield, on the 15th February, 1842, Mr. Abijah Palmer, aged 80 years. He was an old and respected inhabitant, and one of the first settlers of this province.

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March 6, 1905 (Monday) The Village of Burton has been saddened by a fatality at that place on Saturday evening which has cast a gloom over the whole locality. Towards dusk on Saturday evening, Miss Julia May Lyons, the 10 year old daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Nathaniel Lyons left the home of her parents to go to the well, about 50 yards distance, to get a pail of water. Her parents watched her go to the well and were alarmed when they saw her slip on the incline leading to the mouth of the well. The water and snow had made a very slippery place and the little girl was thrown head first into the wall. There was not more than about a foot and a half of water in the well, but the poor little girl had gone head first through the thick ice that almost covered the mouth of the well, and was unable to extricate herself. Mr. & Mrs. Lyons at once hurried to their daughters side when they saw her fall, but by the time they got there, life was extinct. Besides her almost heartbroken parents, three young sisters, Carrie, Minnie and Addie and one brother Thomas survive. For the family, the most sincere sympathy is felt by all. The funeral will take place tomorrow (Tuesday) afternoon at 1 o'clock from the residence of the deceased's parents, and Rev. Mr. Dibblee will officiate, the arrangements being in the hands of Robert Adams.

But the Board (or any certification program) can only serve New Brunswick if genealogists skilled in New Brunswick sources, whether they live in the province or not, apply for certification. Any province-wide or state-wide certifying body would be in competition with the Board for Certification of Genealogists, and I believe Colonel Smith has stated well the advantages that the Board would have over any local body.
