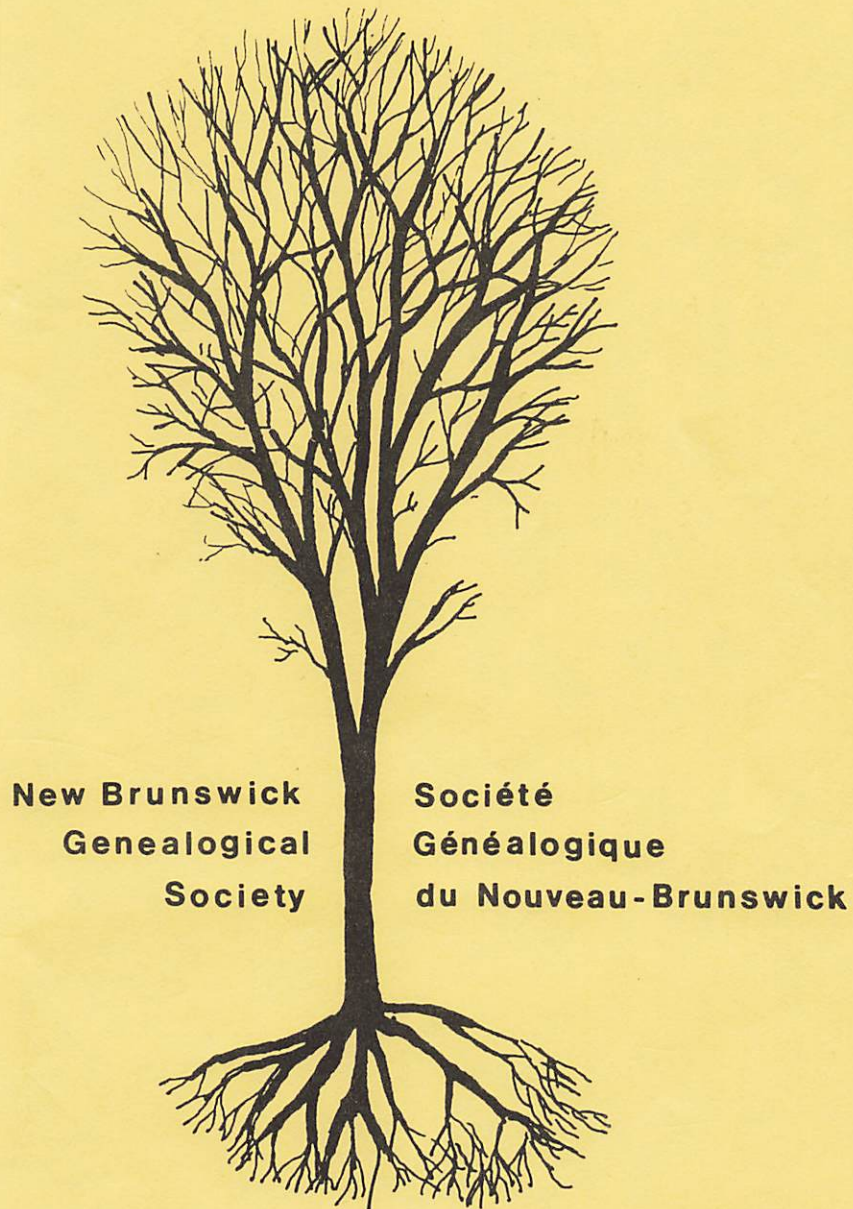

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BRIEF HISTORY OF THE QUAKERS WHO IMMIGRATED TO NOVA SCOTIA
(Contributed by Martha Ford Barto)

From the beginning of their history in America the members of the Society of Friends, commonly called Quakers, had been victims of suspicion and persecution. They were accused of being disloyal to the Crown because they refused to do military service and opposed the levying of taxes for war purposes. For the same reasons, two generations later, when disloyalty to the Crown would have commended them to popular favor, they were accused of loyalty.

The Philadelphia Friends were suspected of being loyal before the British forces occupied the city and the men were carried off to inland places and kept under watch until the close of the war, while the women and children were left exposed to insult and robbery. Joshua Knight, a man of some prominence, who lived in Abington, with some of his fellow-sufferers, had sought British protection in New York. Apparently at his suggestion, a meeting of Friends was held there early in June 1783, at which time arrangements were made for going to Nova Scotia (New Brunswick) and a month later the following advertisement appeared:

"Notice is hereby given to those of the people called Quakers who have entered into an agreement to settle together in Nova Scotia, that they were requested to meet at the house of Joshua Knight, No. 36 in Chatham St. a little above the Tea-Water Pump on seventh day next, the 5th day of July, at four o'clock, afternoon, in order to conclude upon some matters of importance to them and those who mean to join the above mentioned body are requested to call at No. 188 Water Street between the Coffee-House Bridge and the Fly Market and have their names entered as soon as possible. New York, July 2, 1783.

At this meeting the list of subscribers was drawn up as follows:

"We whose names are herewith subscribed do agree to settle ourselves on the river of St. Johns in Nova Scotia."

NO SLAVE MASTER ADMITTED

Forty-nine men signed this agreement.

A Return of the Company of Loyalists and Quakers who embark for the River St. John in Nova Scotia, for whom Samuel Fairlamb, John Rankin, and George Brown are appointed agents:

The list gives the names of sixty-four subscribers with their families, including the names on the agreement above.

A group of thirty-one Loyalists called Anabaptists requested and did embark with the Quakers 29 Aug. 1783.

The ship that carried the Quakers and Anabaptists to St. John was the "Camel" arriving in the province from New York the 15 September 1783. The company was sent down to Beaver Harbour. The town at Beaver Harbour was to be called Belle View or Bellevue. An old map in the British Museum shows fifteen streets and about 950 lots in the town proper, with large tracts laid out in farm and garden lots beyond.

But Belle View, or Penn's Field, as it was named by the Quaker colonists was not a town on paper only. There were 145 lots included in the original grant; shortly after its foundation, the number of inhabitants was estimated at 800.

It is obvious many more people moved into the area during the next few years. There was a great deal of uncertainty of title to land, and records show many people leaving the area as well. In a petition for land dated 8 September 1785 signed by twelve members of the Anabaptist Company residing on Campobello Island, they state they arrived in the province 15 September 1783 from New York, and have not yet drawn any land. These twelve were included in the company that went to Beaver Harbour with the Quakers.

In the summer of 1786, a committee of the Friends of Philadelphia made a visit to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to investigate the condition of the Friends who had settled there. Their report was given March 1787 to the Philadelphia Meeting for Suffering. The report shows great suffering among the people. Many of their people had married "out of meeting" and were thereby disowned. Many of the company had removed to other areas.

Records show that within a few years the Quakers had married into the Anabaptist families. This is probably the reason there was no longer a Quaker colony.

"Privation and suffering had fallen upon the little colony. We have earlier evidence of this in the following extract from a letter written from St. John by Mather Byles, jr. (son of the rector of Trinity), to Col. Edward Winslow, dated Aug. 2, 1787."

"I don't know whether you recollect the two Quaker gentlemen who were here last year as preachers from Philadelphia. In the course of their tour they visited Beaver Harbour and observing the great poverty of the settlers, they on their return raised a subscription among the Quakers and with the produce of it purchased and shipped a donation of 240 barrels of coarse flour and Indian meal with some other necessities to be distributed among them. It has arrived safe and will probably save large numbers of them from starving. Of all the private actions that ever have fallen under my observation, I recollect none so extensively benevolent, so genuinely disinterested. To make use of an expression of your own, it puts one in mind of the times when Human Nature stood upon its legs."

"What little wealth the Friends had taken with them, when they were driven from their Pennsylvania and New Jersey homes, had been long since exhausted in their sojourn in New York and their struggle with the hardships of the New Brunswick wilderness. The town at Beaver Harbour, like other Loyalist towns, had arisen in the expectation of a trade that never came. And yet they had remained, and kept up their struggle and perhaps tried to hope for better times. But the end was near. A forest fire swept over the place in 1790, leaving only one dwelling house, that of Elias Wright. The Meeting house was destroyed of vital records. A few of the inhabitants, including the family of Joshua Knight, remained or came back to rebuild their

dwellings at or near the old sites; but Pennfield was no longer a Quaker colony, and the highways and landmarks of today bear no relation to the plans of the old town of Belle View."

New Brunswick, earlier included in the Province of Nova Scotia, became a separate province in 1784. The county of Charlotte was established by warrant of Governor Carleton dated at Saint John, on the 4th of June 1785.

PREFACE

The records of the families coming into New Brunswick following the American Revolution are not well documented, and difficult to locate.

It has been my purpose to locate and compile as much information as possible on the early generations of some of these families. A listing of my sources follows. This genealogy is not complete. It is carried to a point where research into later, available and more complete records could be searched more easily and thereby completed. Every effort has been made to compile this genealogy with accuracy. If omissions or errors are found, that can be corrected, please advise me and note your reference. When reference is made to another family genealogy, these are located at the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick and the New Brunswick Museum.

KNIGHT GENEALOGY

The ship "Camel" embarked from New York and arrived in Saint John, New Brunswick (Nova Scotia in 1783) on 15 September 1783. Along with the Quakers on board were a group of Anabaptists. Upon the arrival of the "Camel" at Parrtown (Saint John) the ship was at once sent down to Passamaquoddy and the passengers disembarked at what they had chosen to call Bellevue. This was Beaver Harbour; later the area was called Penn's Field after William Penn who led the Quakers to America. In 1783 a British officer writing from Nova Scotia said, "The Quakers are well established at Beaver Harbour and have given the little settlement the name of Penn's Field."

In the summer of 1786 a group of Friends(Quakers) was sent to Beaver Harbour to report on the condition of the Quakers settled there. The report given in March 1787 in Philadelphia shows "many members had removed from Beaver Harbour, many had married 'out of their faith' and were disowned." The report shows "John, son of Joshua, his wife Euphemia, daughter of John Loughorough, and their child Margaret", "Joshua, Sarah his wife, and their son Joshua", "Caleb Paul, concerned in a sawmill, his wife Priscilla is the daughter of Joshua Knight."

There are few early records left of Beaver Harbour. In a forest fire that swept through Beaver Harbour in 1790, the Meeting House and all the records were destroyed.

In Loyalist records we find Joshua of Pa. went to Beaver Harbour, John of Pa., a guide, went to Beaver Harbour.

Joshua had once been disowned from Quaker Meeting in Pa., 30 June 1777, "for being a committee man and repairing arms". Ref. Abington monthly meeting minutes 1774-1782 pg 92, 115.

A list "A Return of Persons Belonging to the Friends Company of Loyalists who have drawn their lands at Beaver Harbour" shows: Farms... Sarah Knight and Priscilla Paul #21, John Knight #46 and #7, Joshua #109 and #33, Joshua Jr. #48.

A list of those who have drawn their lots (probably town lots); Joshua Knight, Joshua Knight Jr. 16 September 1784. Joshua Sr. had a grant of 189 acres as shown on map noting grants, Joshua (did not say Jr. or Sr.) had lots of 325 acres and 310 acres.

On a town plot of Beaver Harbour are John Knight lot #7, Joshua Sr. #10 and #17 and #33 and Joshua #48.

PAUL GENEALOGY

The Paull family lived in the town of Ilminster, Somerset, England from early Tudor times. An Ilminster directory of the Tudor period (1485-1603) lists N. Pall, Rd. Pawle, Nicholas Palle as taxpayers during the reign of Henry VIII.

At the time of the Spanish Armada among the 100 "able-boddied men who are shottmen and pykemen from Ilminster" are Richard Pawle, Sr. and Stephen Pawle.

Generation I

1. William Paull was a resident of Ilminster in the sixteenth century. In 1587 he married Maria Meyer, formerly of Oberrhein, Germany, whose family was one of those brought from Germany to Somerset because of their skill in cloth-making, particularly serge. William was himself a "Clothier" and bought cloth from the local weavers for sale in London and other central markets. The Taunton Serges were highly regarded during the period.

Generation 2

2. John, son of William and Maria, resided in Dolishwake one and one half miles from Ilminster. John was also a clothier.

3. William, son of John, was married by a Justice of the Peace, James Strong, to Mary Townesind, at Ilminster, Tuesday, October 23, 1665. A record of this marriage appears in the Strong Register in Ilminster.

William was a serge-maker and Church Warden of the Ilminster Church during the reign of Charles II.

Generation 4

4. Joseph, son of William and Mary, was the immigrant to America from whom our branch of the family is descended. He was born July 14, 1657. On May 2, 1680 he married Margaret Roberts of Barliscome in Cullumpton, Devon. They lived in Ilminster from 1681-1685, where Joseph carried on his trade of serge-maker. Although Joseph's father, William, was not, so far as we know, a Quaker, Joseph was probably converted to this faith by his father's brother, Thomas Paull, who was a leader of the English Quakers. Thereafter Joseph was socially ostracized by other members of the Paull family. In the list of twenty-five witnesses to his Quaker marriage, the name of Paull does not appear.

Issue:

Several circumstances probably contributed to the migration of Joseph Sr. to America. In the first place, the woollen industry in Western England declined greatly during the latter part of the seventeenth century and Joseph's business was impaired. Furthermore, and this was probably more important to him, it was during this period that the Duke of Monmouth carried on his rebellion against the Catholic James II. Because the Quakers refused to join the rebels, they suffered great persecution. The records show that during the Monmouth Rebellion four Pauls were executed, among them Thomas, Joseph's uncle.

For a few days Joseph himself was imprisoned with other members of his Quaker Meeting when rebels broke into a Quaker service. This short prison term had far-reaching results, for while in prison Joseph purchased from a fellow prisoner, Edward Bliman, 250 acres of land in Pennsylvania which had been granted to the said Edward Blinman by William Penn. The following record appears in the Recorder of Deeds Office, Philadelphia, Book C 2, Vl. 3, pp 1 ff.:

"Edward Blinman of the Parish of Shepton Mallett in the County of Somerset, clothier, to Joseph Paul of Ilminster in the County afore-said, sergemaker, for 250 acres in Pennsylvania."

At this point the final "L" in the Paull name was apparently dropped by Joseph. It does not appear again in the records.

In September, 1685, Joseph with his wife and two children, Joseph Jr. and Anne, sailed for America from Bristol, on the ship Unicorn. Their journey took about three months and they arrived in Philadelphia in December of that year. Joseph purchased more land near Frankford Creek, 90 acres, on June 2, 1686, on which he built a log house. "Glenfield Farm" was the name of this property and was so known for many years. He carried on his trade of serge-maker and became a prosperous and influential citizen. In 1687 he was elected a member of the General Assembly in Philadelphia. The records show that in 1693 he was assessed in Oxford Township, Pa. to the amount of 100 pounds. Only two in the township were assessed more.

In the records of the Quaker Meeting in Philadelphia is the account of Joseph's expulsion from the Quaker Meeting for two years. His wife appears to remain in good standing and eventually Joseph was reinstated. The cause

of this expulsion is not recorded.

The only existing letter written by Joseph is preserved in the Friends' Library, Devonshire House, London (ms. portfolio 24, No. 11). It was written when he was 30, from Philadelphia to a friend in Somerset, England, in a careful, fine hand. It is headed, "Pennsylvania, Oxford, neare Philadelphia, the 9 day of the 7 month 87. Dear Friend D.C." One paragraph of the fairly long letter follows:

"I and my wife and family have had but little sickness, blessed be God. We like the country pretty well, although indeed we have met with more than ordinary exercises concerning our servants, yet through the goodness of the Lord unto us we are contented.

"It is a plentiful country of corn, and considering the youngness of it, of other things also.....

"Our love to my sister, Mary Paull. Soe with our dear Love to thee and thy wife I remain they loving friend Joseph Paull."

Three more children were born to Joseph Sr. and Margaret, in Oxford Township, Pennsylvania. (Now a part of Ward 35, Philadelphia)

Joseph Sr. made his will in Philadelphia in June, 1717, and died in the same year. His will is on file in the Register's Office, Philadelphia.

5. Joseph Jr. married Elizabeth Roberts, daughter of Peter Roberts originally of Chester, England, who had also migrated to America. The marriage took place in Philadelphia 28 March 1709. They lived in Oxford County, on an estate purchased and willed to Joseph Jr. by his father. Later Joseph Jr. purchased an estate of 430 acres in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, on which he never lived but which he willed to his son. This latter homestead has been in the Paul family since that time. Joseph Jr. died in Abington County in 1747. The children of Joseph Jr. and Elizabeth were:

James' will is dated 1790, in which year he presumably died, aged 80 years. James was a prosperous farmer. The property and tax lists of the County of Bucks for the years 1779-1787 list James as owning 300 acres of land and horses and cattle. He was Constable of Bucks Co. in 1750.

It is during the period of the Revolutionary War, with its struggle between the Tories who were loyal to the Crown and the rebellious Whigs, that the chronological record of the descendants of Joseph Paull, Sr. divided. One branch, namely, Jonathan, Caleb, and probably another brother, fled to Canada. In brief the events which precipitated the migration to Canada of the Paul brothers were as follows:

In the list of persons who have actually drawn their lots we find Thomas Paul above the name of Jonathan Paul-Beaver Harbour-1784. Thomas drew lot # 58.

In the records in Fredericton, Prov. Archives, we find a Thomas Paul among others on a petition on 15 Jan 1785 Beaver Harbour concerning their land.

In the list of the N.Y. Loyalists is the name of Thomas Paul. List compiled by William Kelby in 1917, Librarian of the N.Y. Historical Society 1893-1898.

"Loyalists of New Brunswick" by Esther Clark Wright.... William Paul to St. George.

Thomas and William Paul could have been related to Jonathan and Caleb Paul.

Certain of the sons of James and Mary, listed directly above, were loyal Tories. One record states that John and Caleb were members of a group of young Tories who, in retaliation for many wrongs done them and their families by the Whigs, and led by the five Doane brothers (famous in the annals of this period) went about the countryside by night destroying property. Their most famous exploit, recorded in all the histories of Bucks County, was the robbery of the Bucks County Treasury in Newton, Pa. on the night of October 23, 1781. John and Caleb "sons of James Paul of Warminster" waited in the Wrightstown schoolhouse in the neighborhood while the robbery was carried out, and shared the booty of £1307 in paper. Another brother, whose full name is not given in the records: "..... Paul was sentenced in 1782 to die as a spy. He was confined in the camp of Lafayette. The evening before the day appointed for his execution he escaped."

During the Revolutionary period thousands of British subjects, loyal to the Crown, migrated to all parts of Canada, particularly to Nova Scotia, which then included New Brunswick, and to Ontario.

- 7. Jonathan settled in "Woodland", across the harbour from Beaver Harbour. He was a shipbuilder. He burned to death in his home, family legend says he was murdered.

Jonathan is among those signing an agreement to settle on the River St. John in N.S. dated New York July 2, 1783. A list in 1784 of persons who have actually drawn their lots at Beaver Harbour shows Jonathan Paul lot # 56, in this record he is marked absent. In The Loyalists of N.B., Esther Clark Wright gives Jonathan, Beaver Harbour and St. Stephen. It is possible that he was at the time the list of land drawn in St. Stephen.

Records do not indicate if Jonathan came to Beaver Harbour as a married man or as a single man. As the Quaker Meeting House was destroyed with all records in the forest fire of 1790 there is no record of Jonathan's marriage if it was performed in N.B.

Joshua and Elizabeth lived in St. Andrews, N.B. and in 1830 he was a Justice of the Peace. Joshua bought the Wolves Islands in 1832 from James Paul, his cousin, son of Jonathan. Joshua and family removed to the islands. Joshua and Elizabeth, before their deaths, removed to the home of their daughter Julia Ann Wright in Beaver Harbour, where they died.

Family legend claims Joshua and Elizabeth bought the Wolves Islands and removed there to live because of the feelings of Elizabeth's parents. Elizabeth's parents did not approve of her marriage to a Quaker.

Joshua's family do not appear on the early census probably due to the Islands' distance from Beaver Harbour and the difficulty for the person taking the census to go there.

In 1893, Wallace Matthews of Campobello, N.B. removed a bottle containing the poem quoted below from a chimney of the old homestead there. The house had been dismantled piecemeal by thieves. It had been written by Julia Ann Paul one evening while the family were gathered in the old homestead on the island. The poem was signed by each of the company and placed with a lock of hair of each in the bottle, then hidden in the kitchen chimney. The poem is dated Nov. 13, 1858.

Kind friends do not destroy me,
For I bear upon my breast
The names of those who place me here
Long years ago, to rest.

Yes, they kindly place me here,
You see the pains they took
To give to my poor self alone
This quiet little nook.

They were a youthful, laughing band
With spirits high and free;
They were united by true friendship
And lived in harmony.

They had me as their trusty friend
Their names thus safe to keep,
That future ones might think of them
As 'neath the sod they sleep.

There is no cemetery on the Wolves Islands as such, but there are two unmarked graves: Joseph S. Stinson, father of Elizabeth Paul and James Stinson, and a sailor whose body washed ashore.

The winter of 1981 witnessed a significant increase in the indexing, cataloguing and arrangement of collections at the Archives, resulting from a Job Creation Strategy Program sponsored by the provincial Department of Labour. In the Public Records Section considerable work was accomplished in the records of the Executive Council, Chancery Court, Probate court, Department of Agriculture, Jails and land petitions. Activity in the Cartographic section consisted of the cataloguing of several hundred previously inaccessible maps and architectural drawings. The major accomplishment in the Audio-Visual section was the archival arrangement of the photographic items in the Moncton Times and Transcript collection, as well as the identification and description of several sound tapes of oral history projects. In addition to the above, progress was made in the arrangement of many manuscript collections, in the microfilming of documents, and in conservation.

Summer projects sponsored by the Archives include surveys of archival resources in the Newcastle-Chatham and Dalhousie-Campbellton areas, and a survey of judicial records of the province.

Events of interest to be hosted by the Archives in the near future will be the 1981 International Genealogical Workshop, August 1-3, and the Atlantic Association of Historians annual conference, October 2-4.

Beginning 1 July 1981, the Archives will be opening on Saturdays, 8:30 to 4:45, with limited staff. Wednesday evening service will cease.
