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## Sir John A. Slept Here

If you're travelling along Route 11 in northeast New Brunswick during the summer months, Inch Arran, the municipally-owned park in Dalhousie is a good place for picnicking or overnight camping. Rockhounds, bird watchers, and water sports enthusiasts will find lots to interest them there. You may choose to take advantage of the fine modem facilities: the heated pool, the playgrounds, tennis courts and minigolf. A walk along the sandy beach is also a relaxing change after driving. If you do decide to set up your tent or trailer, you'll he able to tell the folks back home that you and Sir John A. Macdonald spent your holidays at the same place.

Inch Arran, the name chosen for the hotel, is a story in itself. In I 829 a group of Scots left Lamlash on the Isle of Arran on the brig Corsair commanded by Captain Hamilton. The vessel landed at Dalhousie and there Hamilton eventually acquired a fine stretch of land with a magnificent view of the dark hills of Quebec's Gaspé Peninsula. Here he built his new-world home on land he called Inch Arran. "Inch" is used with local place names in Scotland and Ireland to indicate a small isolated piece of land such as a meadow, hill or island. It was from Arran, the bonny isle on the west coast of Scotland, that the shipload of MacMillans, Curries, Hamiltons, McNeishes, Nichols and others sailed in 1829 during the Highland Clearances. The lairds had chosen to raise sheep instead of clansmen. But it was, perhaps, a fair wind that brought the islanders to northeast New Brunswick. There, in Dalhousie and Campbellton, in New Mills and Charlo, they lived in peace and increasing prosperity beside their French, Indian and Irish neighbours. The forests provided timber for local use and overseas trade. The bay provided a bountiful harvest of fish.

In the early days, the coastal settlements were linked to the rest of the world mainly by sea routes. Later a stagecoach brought passengers and mail along the shore from the Miramichi to Campbellton. During the 1860s there was much discussion and not a little controversy about the proposed route of the Intercolonial Railway, but Sandford Fleming eventually succeeded in winning support for the route along the North Shore. The first train from Halifax arrived at Quebec on July 6, 1876, but, unfortunately, the port of Dalhousie had been bypassed. A spur line was completed into the town from

Dalhousie Junction in 1884 in time for the opening of Inch Arran House which was advertised as one of Canada's finest summer resorts.

The Inch Arran was a three-storey wooden building with all the comforts demanded by Victorian summer visitors. There was a wide verandah running all the way round the main building to a length of one-fifth of a mile, a perfect place for a quiet stroll or an afternoon rest. Inside, there were 136 airy guest rooms and a dining room that could easily accommodate 200. There were no bathrooms in the hotel or running water. Guests found it to be a homelike place with appetizing food and those who visited once usually returned.

Sir John A. and Lady Macdonald visited Inch Arran several times. In 1888 they spent most of July and August at the seaside resort. Prior to leaving Ottawa that summer, Sir John had been treated for an abscessed tooth: his jaw was swollen and he was scarcely able to speak but, by early August, he was reported in good health and enjoying the fair weather of New Brunswick.

However, the business of government could not stop altogether while the Old Chieftain enjoyed his holiday, and he continued his correspondence with Sir Stephen and other associates. If it were absolutely necessary to confer with the Canadian prime minister during his summer holiday, then a trip to Dalhousie was required. One gentleman who had travelled all the way from Australia to Ottawa to promote the trans-Pacific cable project discovered that he had to wend his way down to Inch Arran House in order to see Sir John A. Macdonald.

Financial problems forced the closure of the Inch Arran Hotel from 1896 to 1907 when it was refurbished and reopened by John E. Deans and once again became a popular resort. Once more there were garden parties on the lawn and the Dalhousie Literary Society could enjoy refreshments in the Inch Arran parlours. In the second decade of this century the Inch Arran was patronized by many guests from as far away as New York, Boston, Montreal and Toronto. Whole families with maids and children's nurses arrived to spend the summer. On July 4, 1914, there were enough American guests at the hotel to organize an Independence Day dinner at which the Canadian minister of trade and commerce, Sir George Foster, proposed a toast to U.S. President Wilson after which, on behalf of the

Americans present, a Harvard professor asked all to rise and drink the health of King George V.

Sir George and Lady Foster were regulars at the hotel. Indeed, the summer season officially began with Lady Foster's arrival in late June. Throughout the summer she was the Grande dame attending all special events at Inch Arran. By early September, 1914, when the closing card and dancing party was held, the Great War had already begun in Europe. Still, the tensions on the other side of the Atlantic seemed far removed from the Bay of Chaleur. The music of the Dalhousie Orchestra drifted across the calm water; the spacious hall and drawing room were decorated with goldenrod, ferns, and sweet peas; guests were presented with individual programs and enjoyed dancing until midnight when refreshments were served. Plans were made for a return visit next year. In the summer of 1915 entertainment at the Inch Arran took a new twist. Afternoon teas were held to aid the Red Cross. The spacious verandah was decorated with evergreen, flags and bunting and Lady Foster presided over the tea table. Hotel guests assisted with arranging flowers and attending to the candy sales to raise money for extra comforts for soldiers. The afternoon teas were attended by many from Dalhousie and Campbellton.

Evening concerts were held in the large Inch Arran parlours. The Union Jack and flags of allied nations decorated the hotel interior. After the instrumental duets, readings and vocal solos, the chairs were removed and dancing began. Ice cream and coke were served on the verandah and proceeds from the events went to the Red Cross.

Throughout the First World War, patriotic dances were held regularly at the Inch Arran. So popular were these dances that even a sudden summer storm did not deter the auto parties that brought young and old out for an evening of entertainment. The Inch Arran drawing room would be filled to capacity and hostesses at refreshment booths would be busy dispensing tea and sweets.

If you had been sitting in the shadows of the Inch Arran verandah on an August evening in 1917, you could have listened to the splendid contralto voice of Miss Bonnie Boyce, lately arrived from an engagement in New York. "Mon coeur s'ouvre à tu voix" brought loud applause from the crowd in the drawing room. Afterwards, a bouquet of roses was presented to the glamorous singer.

You might have been joined on the verandah by the proprietor's daughter, just back from nursing duty overseas. She could show you copies of poems written by young soldiers in French hospitals. Kate Simpson-Hayes, poet and journalist, would be there too. She had chosen the serenity of the Inch Arran to work on her latest book. Down on the beach a group of young people were taking advantage of the silvery light of the rising moon for a romantic late swim before changing and going into the drawing room in time for dancing.

The 1918 season was said to have been the most successful since the days when Sir John A. and other celebrities spent the summer in Dalhousie. On Dominion Day the Great War Veterans' Association sponsored a dance at the hotel. The war was almost over and changes were in the offing.

In the summer of 1919 there was no longer a need for fund-raising teas and patriotic dances. The halcy-on days when families with servants could spend the whole summer by the sea were giving way to more egalitarian times. The ladies in dresses of chiffon and silk, and the gentlemen who gathered after dinner on the verandah of the Inch Arran were growing old.

The final chapter in the story of the Inch Arran Hotel was written on April 7, 1921 when the building was destroyed by fire. Sparks from a disconnected stovepipe ignited the wooden structure, Older residents of the area recall that the fire burned all day – chairs, pillows, and even chamber pots were thrown from upstairs windows and anyone who wanted a few souvenirs simply carried things away. There was still enough ice on the Restigouche River for people to travel from the Quebec side by horse and sled to view the fire.

More than fifty years have passed since the old hotel burned and today the Inch Arran Park offers pleasant surroundings for a family holiday in the style of the 1980s. When the sun goes down and campers gather around a fire for hot dogs and toasted marshmallows there are a couple of local stories that have to be retold. There's a tale of pirate treasure hidden along the coast and the eerie account of a phantom ship which may appear in advance of a storm. And then, if your imagination is in good working order, you may catch a glimpse of the Old Chieftain himself, off for a stroll along the beach. He thought it was a fine place for a holiday and chances are you'll agree.



## **Edward Winslow, Loyalist**

Edward Winslow, army officer, politician, judge, office holder, and author; b. 20 Feb, 1746/47 in Plymouth, Mass., son of Edward Winslow and Hannah Dyer; m. Mary Symonds, and they had at least 14 children; d. 13 May 1815 in Fredericton, N.B.

Edward Winslow was the direct descendant of the first Edward Winslow to settle in North America, who arrived on the *Mayflower* in 1620 and became the valued deputy of Governor William Bradford of Plymouth Colony. Members of the family continued to serve Plymouth Colony and later Massachusetts Bay Colony in a variety of posts at the local, provincial, and imperial levels. Our subject, "Ned" Winslow, was imbued with this tradition of public service from his earliest years. He grew up in a great mansion, overlooking Plymouth Rock, which his father had built to entertain the social élite of Massachusetts. After graduating from Harvard College in 1765, Winslow

began to follow in his father's footsteps as a local official in Plymouth, and served as naval officer, registrar of wills, and clerk of the Court of General Sessions. He also moved conspicuously in the governing circles of tory Boston. At one time he devised an elaborate system to reorganize the chaotic provincial records which won the approbation of Governor Thomas Hutchinson, and in 1769 he was a prime mover in the establishment of the Old Colony Club, an organization devoted to memorializing the founders of Plymouth Colony. When in 1770, at the age of 23, Winslow was asked to deliver the public address celebrating the 150th anniversary of the landing at Plymouth Rock, he could fairly believe that his career was launched.

Two shadows threatened these bright prospects. One was a heavy load of debt. The family's lavish style of life far exceeded the money available, and these "old debts" would hamper Winslow's ambitions for the rest of his life. Even more ominous was festering public discontent with the Massachusetts colonial government. A tory since birth, Winslow responded to radical criticism with an intense partisanship that was characteristic of his personality. His authorship in 1773 of the "Plymouth Protest,"

condemning the Sons of Liberty as a "sett of cursed, venal, worthless Raskalls," may have been admirably loyal but it was also reckless. Likewise, by refusing to cooperate with the Plymouth County Convention and by organizing a private tory police company to maintain order in Plymouth, Winslow eventually made himself so "obnoxious" to his countrymen that he was stripped of his public offices, and in October 1774 "the Great Mob..... hunted me from the Country...."

When hostilities broke out on 19 April 1775 Winslow rushed to fight with the British regulars at Lexington. Commended for valour by his commander, Lord Hugh Percy, he continued to serve the army in a paramilitary capacity throughout the rebels' eight-month siege of Boston; during this time he was appointed by Lieutenant-General Thomas Gage collector for the port of Boston and registrar of probate for Suffolk County. In early 1776 Winslow made the painful decision to leave his family and his native land and go with the British troops to Halifax, N.S. There, on 30 July, he was commissioned muster master general of the loyalist forces in North America with the provincial rank of lieutenant-colonel, a post he held until the end of the war. The appointment stirred his love of display: informed that no particular uniform was prescribed, he ordered one "with a blue coat, scarlet cape, and a scarlet lining with plain white buttons." Later in the summer he accompanied the troops under General Sir William Howe to their new base in New York.

The American revolution brought real suffering and deprivation to the Winslow family. Eventually his aged parents, his two maiden sisters, and his own young family had to abandon their beloved Plymouth and huddle as indigent exiles in the garrison town of New York, totally dependent on Edward and the British army for their future. Their distress pained Winslow deeply. Yet the war also brought Winslow's personal talents and sensibilities into juxtaposition: brilliant gallantry, his organizational flair and his sympathies all expanded and found new purpose. His periodic visits to the loyalist army units and his work with the muster rolls and pay sheets brought him into frequent contact with the men of the regiments and he established a close bond with all ranks of loyalist soldiers. Like them, he deeply resented British favouritism, to rebel deserters, "scoundrels who have just emerged from the very center of rebellion," over the steadfast loyalist corps. Like them, he based his hopes on the outcome of the war. And like them also, he increasingly blamed Great Britain for the frustration of those hopes: "There has been such a damnable series of treating & retreating - pidling, Conciliating - & commissionering that fighting (which is the only remedy for the American disorder) has been totally suspended." The loyalist troops' disdain for British timidity reached its height with General Sir Henry Clinton, who provoked Winslow's most scathing comments: "The Stupor which seem<sup>d</sup> to seize his Excy. & which nothing short of a Supernatural event can rouse him from - effectually prevented any military enterprise."

Except for an exciting and successful series of coastal raids on Rhode Island, directed by Edmund Fanning, during the summer of 1779, Winslow spent most of the war monitoring muster rolls. At the end of hostilities, he had but little choice as to his future. He could not go to Massachusetts where he was legally proscribed. Family debts and responsibilities kept him from taking the preferred course to England where the best jobs lay. He thus reluctantly accepted Sir Guy Carleton's suggestion that he go to Nova Scotia as an agent for the loyalist regiments and lay out lands for the 6,000 troops and their families who would eventually follow.

After having settled his own family in Granville, N.S., in early 1783, Winslow worked assiduously to get the best possible situation for himself and his loyalist troops. He cultivated the friendship of Governor John Parr and other Halifax officials; but, while these gentlemen proved willing to share their table with Winslow, they clung tight to their power over land grants. In particular, they resisted Winslow's determination to settle his loyalist regiments and their families on a single block of land because they understood that realization of this plan would in effect establish a separate, potentially competitive political community within Nova Scotia.

The rebuffs of the "Nabobs of Nova Scotia," as he later called them, simply spurred Winslow on. He abandoned his original plan to settle his troops in peninsular Nova Scotia and, in company with several other loyalist officers, began to explore the possibilities of the north side of the Bay of Fundy. When they reached the Saint John River valley, where many loyalist refugees were already encamped, they knew they were home. The bounteous natural resources of the river valley coupled with its

great distance from Halifax immediately appealed to the loyalist officers. And it was there in July 1783 that Winslow made his provocative suggestion that the area north of the Bay of Fundy be partitioned from Nova Scotia to become a separate loyalist province, "& if it does it shall be the most Gentlemanlike one on earth."

Winslow's proposal singles him out as the prophet of the future province of New Brunswick and remains the most distinctive contribution of his long career. The structural elements in his suggestion were not, however, entirely new. The need for a separate loyalist province to serve as a haven for those supporters of the British cause who could not return to their former homes in America had long been recognized by the British government and an abortive attempt to meet it was made in 1780 when the northern portion of what is now Maine was designated the province of New Ireland. Moreover, the policy of resettling the loyalist troops in British North America along regimental lines, so that they could be easily called up again if the need arose, was first suggested by Sir Guy Carleton. Winslow's key contribution was in combining the idea of a separate loyalist province with Sir Guy's wish to keep the loyalist military organization intact and in affixing these concepts to a particular site the northern region of Nova Scotia, centering on the Saint John River valley.

Underlying Winslow's proposal were a number of ideological assumptions which he shared with many of his fellow loyalists and which were vitally important to the development of New Brunswick. Two of these were epitomized by his vow that the new province would be "the most Gentlemanlike one on earth," First and foremost, it was to be a loyalist province, governed by the valiant exiles with no concessions to the Acadians, Indians, or "old inhabitants" already living in the area. Secondly, its leaders were to be members of the loyalist élite, the officers and gentlemen whose impeccable backgrounds and long experience in colonial affairs would enable them to establish a model government. Thirdly, the active support of the British government was assumed. By appointing firm loyalists to the chief positions, by supporting such key social institutions as education and the Church of England, and by reserving the West Indian trade for her colonial subjects, Britain was to lay the social and economic foundations of the new province. Finally, Winslow foresaw a competitive relationship with the United States. He dreamed fondly of the day when the very cream of American society, disillusioned by their faltering republic and deprived of their vital West Indian trade, would move north and settle in his projected province. This theme of ultimate revenge provoked Winslow's most famous prophecy (words now engraved in bronze in the Centennial Building at Fredericton):

Yes - by God! we will be the envy of the American states... When the people of the neighboring states shall observe our operations. When they see us in the enjoyment of a regular system of Government - protected by the mother Country - not sad'led with enormous taxes and compare their state with ours, Will they not envy us? Surely they will. Many of their most respectable inhabitants will join us immediately.

To realize his goal of a separate loyalist province, Winslow communicated his proposals and his hopes to numerous colleagues in Nova Scotia and Great Britain. The project won ready assent among refugees frustrated by lack of employment and difficulties in obtaining land grants, and an intricate. year-long political struggle crashed between the advocates of a new province and those wishing to retain the political integrity of Nova Scotia. This campaign is known in Canadian history as the partition movement. Winslow was only one of several protagonists in the struggle, but he was an important one. His most significant conquest was Brigadier-General Henry Edward Fox, the commander-in-chief of British forces at Halifax and brother to the powerful British politician, Charles James Fox. In July 1783, through the agency of his good friends George Duncan Ludlow and Ward Chipman, Winslow was appointed Fox's secretary and he met with the general in Halifax that August. Chipman had sternly admonished Winslow to "be a man of business, indulge your convivial penchant with caution," and Winslow clearly took the hint. Fox not only became his warm friend but joined his own ambitions to Winslow's plans for the new loyalist settlements, at one point seeking the governorship of the proposed new province for himself. Among other important allies whom Winslow helped organize in favour of partition were the Penobscot Associated Loyalists, the community of Maine timber merchants who had emigrated en masse to St Andrews in order to remain within the British navigation

system; several key leaders of the loyalist refugee groups who were settling along the Saint John River, such as Amos Botsford, Gilfred Studholme, and George Leonard; and William Hazen, the most prominent of the pre-loyalist settlers.

The second key task that Winslow performed during the partition movement was to gather information regarding, the economic and political condition of British North America and transmit it to London. This information was used by his loyalist colleagues and their supporters to convince the imperial government not only of the need for a separate loyalist province but also of its viability. The political arguments advanced to support their cause centred on the inability of Halifax to govern the distant settlements across the Bay of Fundy. Wartime promises of a separate loyalist establishment were also emphasized, as was the incompatibility of the refugees with the inhabitants of Nova Scotia, many of whom had supported the American revolution. Unspoken, but surely not unnoticed by London, was the welcome relief a new province would offer in providing jobs for some of the loyalist placemen who had been besieging Whitehall since the onset of the war. The economic arguments supporting partition emphasized the natural resources of the area. Winslow and his colleagues sent to London detailed estimates of the timber, fishing, and agricultural potential of the proposed new colony. These were used to convince the British government that the area had a solid economic base and could look forward to a brisk supply trade with the British West Indies.

The partition movement did not, of course, go unopposed. Governor Parr and the Nova Scotia Council used their influence to belittle the need for a separate province, which would diminish their political jurisdiction and present a formidable rival in London, the loyalists having many highly placed friends there. Halifax officials, moreover, held immense tracts of unoccupied land in the Saint John River valley and the Cumberland area; these would, they knew, fall forfeit if a new government took over the northern region. Resistance came as well from within the proposed new province. Along the Saint John River a majority of the old inhabitants and many dissident loyalist soldiers and refugees clustered around the lawyer Elias Hardy in order to oppose partition and express their desire to remain part of Nova Scotia. Basically, these men resented the way in which Winslow and the other loyalist agents had favoured themselves and their allies in the distribution of lands, and they did not wish to see this exclusive officer group permanently established in power. Yet despite the strenuous opposition, the campaign organized by Winslow and his colleagues, and backed by powerful English friends, proved decisive. On 18 June 1784 the Privy Council approved the establishment of the province of New Brunswick, expressly to provide all adequate refuge for the "great number of Your Majesty's Loyal Subjects," and in September of the same year the Great Seal was passed, bearing the significant motto Spem Reduxit ("Hope Restored").

Unfortunately for Edward Winslow his labours for the new province were not capped by a personal triumph. At the last moment Fox declined the governorship of New Brunswick and Winslow had no other such patron in England. As he saw it, all the lucrative posts went to a "pack of heavy ass'd pensioners living in England," while those actually working out in the new settlements had to settle for high-sounding, low-paying appointments. "The assault on St. James," he noted bitterly, "was more successful than the assault on St. John." Nevertheless, Winslow's actual appointments in New Brunswick were prestigious. A member of the Council and surrogate general of the province since its inception, he became deputy paymaster of contingent expenses for the army in 1785, judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas for York County, commissioner of the New England Company in 1791, muster-master of the King's New Brunswick Regiment, secretary to the international boundary commission in 1796 and 1 798, and deputy surveyor of the king's woods in 1806. Thus he did have considerable public influence. In his first years in New Brunswick he made imaginative contributions to public policy, among them his suggestions regarding the accoutrements Governor Thomas Carleton's dignity would require: "He shall have an elegant house - a Church a State house - an assembly room - & a playhouse if he pleases." Such fancies were soon stilled by the economic necessities of pioneer New Brunswick and Winslow's own state of personal indebtedness. "Blast Poverty -'tis a devil incarnate," he fumed in 1786, and in 1792 he regaled John Graves Simcoe with the inability of new, sparsely settled colonies to support men of education and refined sensibilities in public life. Winslow's frustrations over the brutal economics of the frontier were shared by many of New Brunswick's loyalist élite, with the result that "our Gentlemen have all become potato farmers & our Shoemakers are preparing to legislate."

Winslow's deep commitment to public life had therefore to take a back seat while he concentrated his energies on farming in order to support his wife and children, two sisters, and three household slaves. Yet he never lost faith in the province he had helped establish. Two visits to prosperous New England in the 1790s produced much nostalgia but no change of heart. And his most notable publication, the "Tammany" letters published in the Royal Gazette and New-Brunswick Advertiser in 1802, was an extended denunciation of his fainthearted comrades who were deserting New Brunswick for lusher pastures. Winslow characterized those returning south as "a few giddy eccentric and discontented characters [who] ... meanly skulked into the United States ... there they have become literally hewers of wood and drawers of water and ... they are compelled to consider the most meritorious actions of their lives as the most atrocious offences which they ever committed." Those who had left for Upper Canada were "not quite so culpable" but were "influenced by the same extraordinary caprice."

Ironically, relief finally came to Winslow not out of his services to New Brunswick but from a brief wartime contact. In 1804 he was called to England to justify his accounts as deputy paymaster of contingencies, and while he was there his old military commander, Lord Hugh Percy, now Duke of Northumberland, arranged for his appointment to the New Brunswick Supreme Court. When the appointment was made in 1807, the fact that Winslow was not a lawyer upset the local bar and Lieutenant Governor Carleton, but he himself was grateful for the opportunity to put his affairs in order at last. In 1808 Winslow served briefly as president of the province

and courageously disobeyed his instructions in order to disband a mutinous militia in time for spring planting. His deep-seated resentment of the United States surfaced anew during the War of 1812, and he prayed that Great Britain would finally give the Americans "the chastisement which they so richly deserve." He died in 1815, pursued to the grave by his twin nemeses, debt and gout. His wife and several children survived him. In 1816 the New Brunswick House of Assembly granted £100 apiece to Winslow's two unmarried daughters in recognition of his "numerous services" to the province.

Winslow's correspondence is the single most important collection of loyalist personal papers in Canada. By times erudite, passionate, vitriolic, and high humoured, his letters vividly record the drama of the loyalist exodus to British North America as well as the minutiae of daily life in early New Brunswick. Winslow could pierce an opponent with a phrase. Thus Elias Hardy was a "pettifogging notary public." Richard John Uniackc "a great lubberly insolentrish rebel," and the waspish Jonathan Odell" a High priest of the order of Melchisedec." Mainly, however, Winslow's rhetoric reflects his enormous zest for life and his profound love of humanity. The climate of New Brunswick had "all the marks of virginity about it. It breaks wind furiously - spits a little - but we continue to manage it." And the disputatious New Brunswick Assembly was simply another "Lilliput," composed of "fellows here who three years agoe did not know that Magna Charta was not a Great Pudding." As for himself, Winslow confided, "If I was to be transformed into an instrument of musick ... I would chuse to be a fiddle because it would require some skill and taste to play upon me." Winslow certainly was a finely tuned instrument, not adept at clearing a wilderness, but admirably suited to civilizing and cultivating a community of people.

This cemetery is located on Rte. 102 beside the Burton Courthouse, near the bridge over the St. John River at Oromocto, in the Parish of Burton, Sunbury Co., N.B. Stones No. 001 to 158 are on the right of the service road which runs through the centre of the cemetery; Nos. 159 to 255 are in the old section on the left of the road immediately inside the gate, and Nos. 256 to 339 are in the new section on the left beyond the old section.

Tombstone inscriptions were read in rows starting on the far right of the cemetery as you enter the gate. Adjacent stones have adjacent numbers, ie., stone #6 is adjacent to stone #7, etc.

Here is an item from Benjamin Franklin's *Pennsylvania Gazette* of Jan. 2, 1750: Just imported from London, in the fnow Friendfhip, Captain Walter Sterling, and to be fold by James Burd, At his ftore on Carpenter's wharff, opposite to William Coleman's, the following goods, viz: Ozenbrigs, ftrip'd duffields, blankets, ruggs, bearfkins, broad cloths, womens petticoats of fundry forts, worsted caps double and fingle, womens worsted hose, mens superfine rolling ditto, mens cotton and thread ditto, mens fcarlet knit breeches, red and black hair shagg, womens fcarlet and cloth coloured short cloaks, mens filk caps, writing paper, Scotch linnen, coloured handkerchiefs, ditto white with blue borders, half yd. wd. blush and white persian, mohair and buttons, coloured threads, Scotch white thread, (and it goes on and on).



## Books



Althea Douglas, in her introduction to *Here be Dragons!*, said that as a child in New Brunswick she learned that "Upper Canadians" were rich industrialists and bankers from Montreal and Toronto who had exploited the Maritimes ever since Confederation.

When she moved to Toronto she found that not everyone there was rich and that many of the bankers were Maritimers. She also learned that Ontario was once called Upper Canada, then later, Canada West, which was not the same thing as Western Canada.

This is a booklet that grew out of a series of onepage explanations about such things as place names, spelling of names, literacy, townships and land divisions, and on and on.

The past is a foreign country. Genealogists who travel in time will find this guide book helpful. Like the apocryphal "Here be Dragons" warnings on old maps, it will advise researchers where trouble may lurk when they delve into Canadian roots.


Here be Dragons! relates to all parts of Canada. Consider the westerner whose grandfather left Nova Scotia, the American whose family 'came from Lower Canada', or the researcher trying to locate the lost cousin who 'went to Rupert's Land' – places with obsolete or, even worse, the same names, present real problems.

Researchers will find advice on changing social customs, common knowledge that is now forgotten, migration patterns, and the splits and mergers that formed today's religious denominations.

People have always consulted the Hudson's Bay Company's records for personal information, Long before the Company established an Archives Department, parents and wives wrote to the Company Secretary for the fate of their distant loved ones. 

Strays! An Index to the OGS Strays Project, Vol. 1

The concept of collecting "strays" began in the British Isles. In 1975, the British Federation of Family History Societies set up a National Strays Index and has been collecting

strays for the benefit of its member groups since then. The Ontario Genealogical Society has been collecting its own strays for some time, many of these being submitted to it by other genealogical societies with whom it has an exchange. OGS has sent British strays to England for many years and has also sent to Australia, New Zealand, the United States and other places in the world, as the "strays" project spreads.

A Stray is defined as a person who is described in a record of an event as being from, or connected with, a place outside the area in which the event took place. For example, someone born in one place dies in another and the event is reported in a local newspaper, or their birthplace is noted on the tombstone or listed on the death registration. That person has "strayed" from their place of origin. This record becomes more useful when it is repatriated to that place of origin.

Strays are collected to provide help to family historians in finding missing family members. Over the years, many people lost touch with family members and their whereabouts was unknown. The object of this booklet is to make available a list of those strays that have been collected by OGS so far. The persons listed all have their origins in Ontario but have "strayed". Some only moved within the counties of Ontario; others moved further afield. This volume contains over 1800 names and is to be the first in a series.

Maryland Loyalists in the American Revolution, a new book by M. Christopher New

An untold story from America's first Civil War! Maryland Loyalists in the American Revolution tells the story of Marylanders who couldn't engage in the passionate re-

bellion breaking out all around them. Although many were nearly as disillusioned with English rule as their rebel counterparts, the Loyalists held their ground and refused to join in an armed conflict with the mother country. More than three hundred Eastern Shore men joined the First Battalion of Maryland Loyalists, a Provincial red-coated regiment raised in 1777.

In this first book ever devoted to the subject, Maryland Loyalists in the American Revolution delves into the lives of the officers and soldiers of the unit and examines their motives for not defying England's authority. Among the colourful cast of characters are Lieutenant Colonel James Chalmers, a wealthy Kent County planter known for writing Plain Truth (a rebuttal to Thomas Paine's "Common Sense"), and Philip Barton Key, the uncle of Francis Scott Key and a future U.S. congressman! The rest were fishermen, farmers, merchants, and deserters from Washington's army.

Their tale is tragic. They were ill-used by the British high command and shipped off to Florida to fight England's enemy, Spain. Many lost their homes and jobs. They were banished to Nova Scotia and some died in a shipwreck in Canadian waters. Their thoughts and reasons for siding with England were brushed aside, their regiment seldom mentioned, their struggles and hardships forgotten.

Using many previously unpublished documents, muster rolls, and letters, the author examines the words and deeds of these forgotten Marylanders. The book is neither an indictment nor an apology for Maryland's loyalists; rather, it portrays their point of view – and the heavy price they paid for it.

M. Christopher New, a Baltimore native, is a filmmaker and writer, and a self-confessed anglophile.

Niche Publisher Caters to History Buffs

For those of you who always seem to be working on a new project, be it your memoirs or the history of your family, there is finally an answer to that ageold question: Now I've written it, what do I do next?

Patricia Chapman, a book editor with more than two decades of experience in several countries, has established a new kind of publishing company. Called the Heritage Press, it is dedicated to producing professional-quality publications in very small print runs.

"There is a definite need for this type of publishing," says Chapman, "especially during tough economic times."

"Traditionally, authors of local or personal histories stood very little chance of having their books accepted for publication by the major publishing houses – not because their writing was poor, but because the subject material was simply too specialist to warrant commercial-size print runs."

In today's tough economic climate, the competition in books is even more intense. And the books that suffer most are the worthy ones with the narrowest commercial appeal.

"The sad thing is," continues Chapman, "that many very competent people are putting a great deal of time into producing wonderful books on the minutiae of Canadian history, but these works never see the light of day."

"Often, they are typed and photocopied with a flimsy paper cover. If the author is lucky, the book will be read by a few family members before it falls apart. It will never make it into libraries or the hands of other researchers."

So she and her family established the Heritage Press, initially in New Zealand, where it has been going strong for twenty years, and now in Canada, from Patricia Chapman's home in the small town of Stouffville near Toronto, Ontario.

To show what can happen when a book is properly published, she cites the case of one family memoir, called *Escape from Vienna*, published in New Zealand in the mid-1980s. She found that same book being used by a Canadian university student late last year!

"If Escape from Vienna hadn't been properly published it would never have been listed in Books in

Print and picked up for use in a university course on the other side of the world," she says. Chapman wrote to the author, and received a delighted note in reply.

Family history may not have a wide commercial appeal, but it is most definitely of historical importance. Writers and historians rely heavily on such works for their own research and having these books published and listed in *Canadian Books in Print* is an important first step.

## Newspaper Research at the National Library of Canada

The National Library of Canada has an excellent collection of Canadian newspapers in microfilm and microfiche formats. The Library's Reference and Information Services Division can supply information about titles, dates and library locations for newspapers. However, we do not undertake searches for birth, marriage or death notices or obituaries in newspapers held by the National Library. Newspapers in microform format are available for consultation onsite, or for interlibrary loan by arrangement with a public, university or special library. We will lend a maximum of twelve reels at any one time.

The National Library's newspaper collection is not comprehensive and therefore the holdings of other libraries and archives may need to be consulted. Genealogists can determine which newspapers existed for a particular place and date and in which libraries they are held, by consulting sources such as the ULCN: union list of Canadian newspapers. ULCN is a microfiche publication which provides information about newspaper holdings of the National Library and other Canadian libraries. Many libraries have a copy of ULCN as well as other useful sources. Researchers with access to the Internet can search the online catalogues of numerous Canadian and foreign libraries. For example, the online catalogue of the National Library's collection is available at the following address: http://www.nlcbnc.ca/catalog/ecat.htm.

Genealogists who are unable to undertake newspaper searching themselves and yet who need to make extensive use of the National Library's collections, may be interested to know that we can supply a list of researchers who, for a fee, will conduct a search. A copy of this list can be obtained from the National Library of Canada, Reference and Information Services Division, 395 Wellington St., Ottawa, ON, KIA ON4.

## Some URL's of Interest to Genealogists

Compiled by Fred Bartlett

A connection to the Internet provides the genealogist with thousands of sources of information at home. This list contains a small percentage of addresses available.

Most of the available information is from secondary or tertiary sources. Consequently, the Internet does not replace primary sources of information. However, copies of original documents are starting to come on line and will undoubtedly become quite common with the availability of high resolution scanners and digital cameras.

Some of the addresses listed have not been opened and may not be in operation. A tip on resolving bad links which return a file not found error, like: "File Not found. The requested URL /~leverich/canada.htm was not found on this server. 404 Not Found. The requested URL /~holwell/gene-txt.htm was not found on this server."

- Try trimming the URL (Uniform Resource Locator) down to end just after the user id or the part following the tilde, e.g. http://www.smartlink.net/~leverich adited to http://www.smartlink.net/. This can be done in the browser 'location/goto' box at the top of the window. Edit and hit enter. You will probably go to the user's index (home page). This will usually provide a path to a new page where the desired information can be located.
- If the file called for had been removed, but the information is still intact, it can be found in the default index page.
- One may receive an error message if the URL site is very busy. Try to reach the address at another time.

The above number, 1557, must not be taken to mean the total number of deaths from cholera in the summer of 1854. The above list is a merge from three cemeteries and the Board of Health, thus there are many duplications. For example, the Source of Information (FH 417) for number 1556 is for a Charles Young age 29 whose date of record is Aug 9 according to Fernhill Cemetery who also report he was buried in lot 417. The Source of Information for number 1557 is BHP which is also for a Charles Young age 32, residence High Street, whose date of record is also August 9. Is it the same person? Probably so because

High Street was in Portland. Thus this is one of the 266 pairs of names (which is explained in the seventh paragraph on the third page of this article) which make up the above 1557 names. The purpose of numbering the lines is to enable researchers to do their own matching of names. There are probably more than 266 pairs of lines.

As I said in the introduction to this article: "It is my opinion the actual number of deaths from cholera in Saint John from mid-June to mid-September may have been no more than **eleven hundred (1,100)**. I see nothing to substantiate any larger number."

### **Brother's Keeper for Windows**

A tip for those who are using Brother's Keeper, Version 5.2 for Windows. Did you know that when you are entering the death date you found on Aunt Mary's tombstone last summer, or that you got from some other source, and it tells you that she died 21 Oct 1870, aged 78 yrs., 7 mos., and 14 days, you can quickly calculate her birth date. Press F2. A "Compute Birth Date" screen will appear. In the four boxes, enter (1) her death date, 21 Oct 1870, (2) her age in years, 78, (3) her age in months, 7, and (4) her age in days, 14, then click the "Compute birth date" button. Her birth date, 14 Apr 1791, will appear in the "Born" box. Remember the date and press "Close." The "Compute Birth Date" screen will disappear. Enter the birth date in the appropriate box on the "Edit person" screen.

### How to research N.B. records at home

Write to The Provincial Archives of N.B., P.O. Box 6000, Fredericton, N.B., E3B 5H1, and ask for a County Genealogical Guide for the county in N.B. where your ancestors lived. The Guides list the material that is available on microfilm, such as marriage, church, probate court, land and other records, with reel numbers for most items. Once you know the reel number, go to a library near you that has a microfilm reader and ask it to borrow for you from PANB up to 3 reels at a time, which the library may hold for up to 21 days while you review them. Census records for the years 1851/61/71/81/91 and 1901 are available on inter-library loan from The National Archives of Canada, 395 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0N3. You will need to specify the County, the Parish and the year, or the microfilm reel No.

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# Some Early Estabrooks Families

by George H. Hayward

The Estabrooks family came to New Brunswick from England via Massachusetts. Joseph was the immigrant ancestor in North America. He arrived in Boston in 1660 from England. Sgt. Elijah, a disbanded soldier of the old Coloniel army, one of Joseph's great grandsons, was the first of the Estabrooks family on the Saint John River. Here is some history of the family in Massachusetts and the early generations in New Brunswick. This information has been taken mainly from Florence C. Estabrooks' Genealogy of the Anglo-Dutch Estabrooks Family of The Saint John River, New Brunswick, published in 1958. The book cites few sources, so researchers should verify the data whenever possible.

1. Joseph¹ Estabrooks was born in 1640, in Enfield, Middlesex, England, son of, perhaps, Joseph A. Estabrooks. He died September 16, 1711, at Concord, Mass., and was buried there. (1)

He married Mary Mason, May 20, 1668, at Watertown, Mass. She was born December 18, 1640, daughter of Capt. Hugh and Esther Mason, of Watertown.<sup>(1)</sup>

Concord, Massachusetts, the first home of the Flemish Estabrooks family, was founded in 1635 by a group of colonists under Rev. Peter Bulkeley, who came from England expressly for that purpose. They purchased six square miles of land from the Indians, with the present Monument Square at its centre.

On the eastern side of Monument Square there is a hill. On the hill, the colonists built their first church, and located their burying ground. Against the side of the hill, they built their rude shelters for the first winter.

Joseph Estabrooks arrived in Boston from England in 1660. His brother Thomas may have come with him, or perhaps he came later. Their father in England may have arranged that Joseph's share of his estate should go toward his education, while Thomas should have the means to buy and equip a farm.

Joseph received a preparatory education for college in England, and entered Harvard soon after his arrival in America, graduating in 1664. He was made a freeman at Cambridge, Mass., May 3, 1665. In 1667, he was ordained as colleague of Rev. Peter Bulkeley, minister of the church in Concord, and on Rev. Bulkeley's death, in 1696, became pastor of the church, continuing in that office until his death at age 71.<sup>(1)</sup>

His salary at Concord was £80, of which half was to be paid in money and the remainder in grain. On the 12th of March, 1681, the town voted "that every householder that hath a team shall carry yearly one load of wood to the minister; and every other householder or votable person shall cut wood one day for the minister; and that the wood be equally divided to the ministers as the selectmen shall appoint." (1)

On his death, the Boston *News Letter* of September 18, 1711, reported: "This day was interred in Concord the Rev. Joseph Estabrook, minister of the gospel in said town for about 44 years (and many of them was colleague of the famous Mr. Bulkeley). He was eminent for his skill in the Hebrew language, and a most orthodox, learned and worthy divine; of excellent principles in religion, indefatigably laborious in the ministry, and of holy life and conversation." (1)

The church in Concord in which Rev. Joseph preached was on the hill near the centre of the old burying ground. It was the one first erected by the colonists. After his death, the congregation decided to build a larger, more convenient edifice; so down near the Square, in 1712, they built the beautiful colonial building which was to witness some of the most stiring events of the Revolutionary War.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married second, Hannah (Leavitt) Loring, August 25,1693.<sup>(2)</sup> She was daughter of John Leavitt,

of Hingham, Mass., and widow of Joseph Loring.(1)

Joseph bought a farm in Lexington in 1693. It was near the Green on the Lexington-Concord Road. He was a prominent citizen. He commanded a military company, and was town clerk, treasurer, assessor, selectman, and representative to the General Court. He was also engaged to teach the first man's school in the town.

Their son, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, had a slave, Prince Estabrooks, whom his son, Benjamin<sup>4</sup> inherited. Prince, and Benjamin's son, Joseph<sup>5</sup>, were present at the fight on Lexington Common, April 19, 1775. Prince, who is said to have had outstanding courage and ability, was wounded. Joseph had a narrow escape, and aided in carrying the wounded to his father's house nearby. His father, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, had taken Joseph's wife and small children to a safer place about a mile away.<sup>(1)</sup>

Florence Estabrooks does not make it clear in her book which of Joseph's children were by which marriage. However, Joseph and Millicent were married in December, 1689, and she died in March, 1692, about 17 months following the birth of their son Joseph, so she could not have been mother of more than two children, and perhaps only Joseph as set out below.

- 3. Elijah<sup>3</sup> Estabrooks (*Joseph*<sup>2</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>1</sup>) was born August 25, 1703, in Lexington, Mass., son of Joseph and Hannah (Leavitt) Estabrooks. He died December 1, 1740, in Sherborn, Mass.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married **Hannah Daniel**, October 1, 1724, in Boston, Mass. [Boston Marriages, 1700-1751, p. 119]. Thomas Prince, a Presbyterian Minister, performed the ceremony. She was born April 6, 1702, at Sherborn, daughter of Robert and Hester Daniel. Robert was son of Samuel Daniel, and grandson of Robert Daniel who settled in Watertown, Mass., prior to 1636.<sup>(1)</sup>

The place of residence for this family between 1724 and 1734 is unclear. There is a tradition on the

Saint John River in New Brunswick that their son, Elijah, was born in England about 1727, and that the father brought his family back to North America in 1730, and lived in Rhode Island.<sup>(1)</sup>

Mrs. Elizabeth (Watson) Estabrooks, wife of Abraham, great grandson of Elijah and Hannah (Daniel) Estabrooks, "Aunt Betsy Abe" to the family, established a fruit business in Saint John, N.B., and lived nearly one-hundred years, remaining alert and keen to the end. Her early married life was spent on a farm at Swan Creek, Queens Co., N.B., near Upper Gagetown, property of John, her father-inlaw, who was son of Elijah and Mary (Hackett) Estabrooks. Aunt Betsy Abe was full of Estabrooks tradition, and declared that she knew more about the Estabrooks family than they knew about themselves. She said Elijah, son of Elijah and Hannah (Daniel) Estabrooks, was born in England. (1)

Elijah and his family possibly lived in Rhode Island from about 1730 to 1734, when he removed to Sherborn, Mass., where his wife's family lived, and where his sister, Hannah, lived also. He died, intestate, in 1740, and his assets were meager. His relatives in Sherborn, and in particular his sister Hannah and her husband, Joseph Frost, looked after his family.<sup>(1)</sup>

His widow, Hannah, remarried February 9, 1743/44, to **Joseph Burrell**, of Newbury, Mass. He owned a house, and a ship building business, in East Haverhill (Rocks Village), where they lived. Her children Samuel, Elijah, Submit, and possibly Hannah Estabrooks, lived there with them. (1)

- **4. Elijah**<sup>4</sup> Estabrooks (*Elijah*<sup>3</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>2</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1727, probably in England, son of Elijah and Hannah (Daniel) Estabrooks. He died before August 11, 1796, and was buried in the Garrison burying ground at Jemseg, Queens Co., N.B.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married first, Mary Hackett, November 14, 1750. The marriage took place in Haverhill, Mass., but was recorded in Salisbury, Mass. She was born August 1, 1728, in Salisbury, daughter of Ebenezer and Hannah (Ring) Hackett. Her family were ship builders. She died in New Brunswick, in 1778.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married second, Sarah (Hammond) Oakes, December 17, 1778. She was baptized October 21, 1739, at Marblehead, Mass., daughter of Philip and Mary (Sweetland) Hammond. When she married Elijah Estabrooks, she was widow of James Oakes, who died at Gagetown, N.B., in 1778.

Elijah was in Capt. Israel Herrick's Company, Col. Jedediah Prebble's Regiment, during 1758, stationed on Lake Champlain, and fought at Ticonderoga, N.Y. He was discharged November 7, 1758. He reenlisted, April 6, 1759, and was sent to Halifax, N.S., where he remained until November 25, 1760. During this time, he became a Sergeant. His family remained in Boxford, Mass.<sup>(1)</sup>

He got home from Halifax December 15, 1760, and during the next 2½ years made preparations to remove his family to the Saint John River. Governor Lawrence, of Nova Scotia, was urged by the Lords of Trade and Plantations in England to settle the lands on the Saint John River which were vacated by the Acadians with people from New England. This resulted in a settlement at Maugerville, Sunbury Co., N.B., in 1763, by about 80 families, most of them from New England. (1)

Elijah, however, took his family first to Halifax, then to Cornwallis, N.S., where he intended to leave them until he had made preparations for them on the River, which was a wilderness. He apparently went up the Saint John River in the spring of 1763, and finding the lot he had drawn in Maugerville flooded, he returned to Cornwallis. During the next two years, he explored other areas, but remained in Cornwallis. On the 18th of October, 1765, he entered the employ of Simonds, Hazen and White, who operated a trading post, a fishery, a fur trade, and other businesses, at Portland Point (Saint John, N.B.).<sup>(1)</sup>

Eight years later, in 1773, he made an agreement with William Hazen and James Simonds to settle in the Township of Conway, at the mouth of the River, where the City of Saint John is now located, Hazen and Simonds guaranteeing him 250 acres of land. An old population return, dated August 1, 1775, shows that he had cleared and improved seven acres, and built a log house. His lot was No. 5, next to the ship building plant. The lot next to him, No. 6, was

owned by his son-in-law, Zebedee Ring.

The first act of aggression in Saint John after the outbreak of the Revolutionary War occurred in August, 1775, when a party from Machias, Maine, entered the harbour in a sloop. They burned Fort Frederick, and captured a brig in the harbour which was loaded with provisions for the British troops in Boston. The raids were repeated several times later. The inhabitants were terrorized, houses were looted, and some burned. In May, 1777, John Allen, one of the most determined American sympathizers, set out from Machias with 43 men for Saint John in four boats. They spent several days on the River, and took Simonds, Hazen and White prisoner, later releasing them.<sup>(1)</sup>

After that experience, Simonds moved up the river to Sunbury Co., where he built a log house and lived for nine years. Elijah Estabrooks removed from Saint John also, to Gagetown, in Queens Co. On June 30, 1783, a survey party sent up the River from Saint John by Maj. Guilford Studholm, to record who was in possession of lands, recorded for Gagetown: "Elijah Estabrooks has a wife and eight children, a log house with two rooms, and about twelve acres of land cleared. Came from Cornwallis about 16 years past; settled at the mouth of the river and says he was drove up by the rebels."

For the Township of Conway (Saint John), the Studholm report recorded, July 8, 1783, "Elijah Estabrooks settled in consequence of an agreement with Hazen and Simonds. Cleared and improved about seven acres of land, and built a log house, which is now fallen to decay, said Estabrooks moving up river on account of the danger of his situation. He lived on it eight years." (1)

When the Loyalists arrived in 1783, there was a lot of competition for land. Some of the old inhabitants had no deeds, or titles that had never been recorded. The new arrivals had records searched, and when they found old inhabitants without sufficient title, they attempted to gain possession of their lands. This caused confrontations, and in some cases, riots, and a few belligerents were put in jail.<sup>(1)</sup>

This likely prompted Elijah and his family, including two married sons, Ebenezer and Joseph, to move from Gagetown in 1787 across the Saint John River to the Parish of Cambridge, in Queens Co., near Jemseg, where he was granted Lot #32 on the Jemseg River, 58 acres, January 13, 1787. Ebenezer was granted Lot #25, 61.5 acres, and Joseph Lot #26, 114 acres, nearby, on the same date [N.B. Dept of

Natural Resources, Crown Land Grant Index].

He remained hale and hearty there to the last. His grandson's wife, Mrs. Abraham Estabrooks, said that he used to tell tales of old times to his grandchildren. She said there were two things that he prayed for. One was that he should never be sick. The other was that he should die at his work. He used to pound grain in a mortar for chickens. One afternoon after working for a while he lay back in his chair and covered his face with his hat. His grandchildren, who were playing around him, thought he was sleeping, but when they went to waken him for supper, they found that he was dead. (1)

5. Elijah<sup>5</sup> Estabrooks (Elijah<sup>4</sup>, Elijah<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Joseph<sup>1</sup>) was born May 16, 1756, in Haverhill, Mass., son of Elijah and Mary (Hackett) Estabrooks. He died September 6, 1825, and was buried at Upper Gagetown, Queens Co., New Brunswick. (1)

He married **Mary Whittemore**, in N.B. She was born in 1761, daughter of Hezekiah and Mary (Chamberlain) Whittemore. She died May 13, 1824, in N.B.<sup>(1)</sup>

They lived in the Parish of Canning, Queens Co., N.B. On the 15th of September, 1800, Elijah was ordained pastor of the Baptist Church at Canning, then Waterborough. He worked his farm during the week, to feed and clothe his large family, and was a

pastor on Sunday. Historians say he was universally beloved and respected in his community.

**6. Ebenezer<sup>5</sup> Estabrooks** (*Elijah*<sup>4</sup>, *Elijah*<sup>3</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>2</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>1</sup>) was baptized in Boxford, Mass., August 28, 1759, son of Elijah and Mary (Hacket) Estabrooks. He died about 1851 at his home in Jacksontown, Carleton Co., N.B.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married first, Maria Fletcher, before 1783. She was a daughter of David Fletcher, an army officer who went first to Westmorland Co., N.B., then moved with his family to Sheffield, Sunbury Co., N.B. She died before 1814.

He married second, Charlotte Ann Lounsbury, October 4, 1814. She was born about 1782, daughter of John and Sarah (Dingee) Lounsbury. She died about 1860.

Ebenezer settled first on Gagetown Neck, Queens Co., but was dispossessed by the Loyalists in 1785. He received a grant of ½ of Lot 25 on the Jemseg River in Queens Co., 65½ acres, January 13, 1787 [Crown Land Grant Index], but by 1796 he was

living at Lakeville in the Parish of Sheffield, Sunbury Co.

He was one of those who signed the covenant of the church at Waterborough, Queens Co., October 20, 1800, on the occasion of forming a Baptist Church there. On the 25th of December, 1813, Ebenezer and some others asked to be dismissed from the Baptist Church in Canning, Queens Co., to join in forming a Church in Fredericton. This was the creation of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church there.

On the 8th of November, 1816, Ebenezer was granted Lot 7 at Farmerston in the Parish of Wakefield, Carleton Co., 300 acres, where he lived the remainder of his life.

They lived first in the Parish of Sheffield, Sunbury Co., but in 1797 he bought land near Swan Creek in the Parish of Burton from James Webber, where they lived. It was here that his father died. He continued to purchase land in that area until he had a large holding. He occasionally acted as an itinerant Baptist preacher, travelling around the country on horseback.

9. Hammond<sup>5</sup> Estabrooks (Elijah<sup>4</sup>, Elijah<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, Joseph<sup>1</sup>) was born January 29, 1783, near Gagetown, Queens Co., N.B., son of Elijah and Mary (Hacket) Estabrooks. He died in 1864 at Amity, Maine.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married first **Rebecca Glasier**. She was a half sister of Beamsley, Benjamin and Stephen Glasier. She died about 1816, at Lincoln, Sunbury Co., N.B.<sup>(1)</sup>

He married second Catherine Glasier about 1817.(1)

Rebecca, Stephen and Benjamin Glasier were among those who signed the covenant of the Baptist Church at Waterborough (Canning) in 1800.<sup>(1)</sup>

Rebecca was probably somewhat older than her husband. The Glasiers owned a large section of land in the Parish of Lincoln, Sunbury Co., and evidently gave Rebecca a small property there. Their children were born and grew up in Lincoln. Hammond was probably employed in the Glasier lumbering operations.<sup>(1)</sup>

After Rebecca died, Hammond and four of his sons removed to Amity, Maine, south of Houlton, and took up farming.<sup>(1)</sup>

Marriages, 1872-1921 (75 years since date of the event)

Births will be added in the spring of 1997, and cover the years 1872 - 1896, making them available 100 years since the date of the event.

The database is an index, and if you find your subject of interest, the following will be included:

Deaths: Name (first and last), age at death, date of death, place of death, registration number, B.C. archives microfilm number, and Genealogical Society of Utah microfilm number.

Marriages: Name (first and last), registration number, B.C. archives microfilm number, and Genealogical Society of Utah microfilm number.

The Archives will not respond to requests for copies of the registration certificates, but will allow you to copy from the microfilm at the Archives.

She also said that Henry Hatt, a Loyalist who had been with the Royal Fencible Americans, may have been grantee of Town Lot 11 in St. George, 1 Nov 1784, although the Dept. of Natural Resources Crown Land Grant Index lists him as Henry Hall. However, a List of Men, Women and Children of the Late Royal Fencible American Regiment in the District of Passamaquoddy, dated at Letang July 1784, lists Henry Hatt, Mary Hatt, and one child over 10, John Hatt.

# From the President's Desk

In January, I was invited to speak at the Annual Meeting of Saint John Branch. The programme committee asked me to talk about how the New Brunswick Genealogical Society and the Branches interact. Because I have been quite involved in the work of the Society for about seven years and because there have been reports on the activities of the provincial body, it hadn't occurred to me that there might be members who didn't know how the branches and NBGS operate constitutionally. As I prepared for the talk, I realized that there is not a great deal of information on how the society began. Perhaps I didn't know where to look. Members responded with typed sheets run off on a gestetner with the pages stapled. In a short time a larger and much stronger stapler had to be purchased and then by issue seven, in February 1981, there was a printed version, with the tree as the logo. The name Generations began with the June 1983 issue, volume 16. The editors of Generations 10, which was a compilation of material found in the first 10 issues, stated that "the information contained in this and all issues of *Generations* is timeless" and to me *Generations* is the wonderful glue that holds the society together, besides being a record of information gathered.

The popularity of *Generations* is shown in much of the correspondence that comes on renewal forms for membership, in queries and in letters to me. Just recently a letter to me renewing an acquaintance from thirty years ago from members Richard and Ruth Gillians, Ruth wrote "I must extend congratulations to all connected with the N.B. Genealogical Society and *Generations*. Obtaining the information on my ancestry was made possible by membership."

It is wonderful to hear good things from our members and I once again thank the present editor, George Hayward, and all the previous editors for their very great dedication to the society. I think perhaps the society could periodically feature an article on past editors and past presidents and other past executive members for the record. The 20th anniversary of the society is fast approaching (1998). If any member has photos, articles or any information on the activities of both the society and the branches over the 20 years, please send copies to secretary Sherrill Carter so we can mount an exhibit or do a book for our birthday. Ideas for this celebration would be welcome from our members.

By the time you receive this copy of *Generations* Heritage Day will have come and gone. I hope you had time to reflect on your personal heritage and what your work will mean to future generations.
