## York Co. Marriages

A surname- and chronological-index for 65 marriage licences, held in the UNB Archives, has been sent to the Provincial Archives for the information of New Brunswick genealogists. These marriages took place mainly in Stanley, between 1880-1899 (and one in 1910); other licences are for marriages which took place in St. Mary's Parish, Douglas Parish and misc. others. The licences were part of the papers of the Rev. James Scott Mullan, Presbyterian minister based in Stanley.

This list is compiled from information contained in Appendix No. 2, Annual Report of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, 1878, "Schedule of Fishery Officers in the Dominion of Canada, 1878". Fishery Officer appointments were made under the Fishery Act (1868) and were of two types: Fishery Overseers (o) were instructed to act ex officio as Magistrates, while Fishery Wardens (w) had no authority to exercise magisterial powers. In 1878 the average salary of an overseer in New Brunswick was slightly more than \$100 per annum, and a warden was paid on the average slightly less than half of that. ## **Diseases**

Diphtheria:

From the Kings County Record, October 20, 1893:

That dread disease diphtheria, is raging in a number of settlements around Sussex. We are informed that the schools in Piccadilly, Cedar Camp, and Mount Hebron are in consequence closed. Thus far it has played terrible havoc in several families. Mr. T. Murphy of Cedar Camp, has lost four children, two of whom were grown men; J. Murphy, one; Mrs. Sullivan and her daughter died this week. In Picadilly, Mr. Brown lost one child; Mrs. Mary Murphy departed this life on Sunday morning, her remains were interred in Wards Creek Cemetery under the direction of Father Byrne. The priests, doctors, and undertakers were kept busy. We are told Father Byrne attended seventeen cases one day last week. The people in those settlements are truly to be pitied, for they have to attend the sick and dead themselves; a nurse should be appointed to attend them for they cannot attend themselves.

This news item could be reproduced with different names in many communities of the day and be just as valid. Many children died of diphtheria.

August 2, 1898: In the U.S., 400,000 people are sick with typhoid annually, of these, 40,000 die. The 1900 population of the U.S. was 76 million.

Other Hazards: These include: Appendicitis, cholera, small pox, pneumonia, child birth, drowning, influenza, farm accidents often involving horses. Penicillin: Not discovered until the 1940's.

Physicians: Often not called. When called, not very helpful by today's standards.

## A Reid Family

George Reid was born about 1785, probably in Scotland, but it is unknown when he came to Ireland. He married Elizabeth Buchanan around 1808 in Ireland. She was born 9 Nov 1789 in Londonderry, Ireland. The name Reid means "Red" in the Scottish language. George was a weaver by trade, and an Orangeman. This couple came to New Brunswick, as well as their children, over a period of time in the 1830's and settled in Carleton County. This is a classic story of immigration; the eldest son coming first, followed by the second son; then the third; then the fourth, with the parents coming together with the youngest son coming next; followed by the second-youngest son last. Their only daughter did not come until much later.

Elizabeth Bachanan had two brothers already in N.B. when her first son arrived. They were John and James Buchanan. John and his wife came in 1823 or 1824, and settled in York County, where they are buried, in a cemetery near Pokiok. Their headstones read John Buchanan died 6 March 1864, age 71 years, a native of County Derry, Ireland, and his wife Margaret Cochrane, died 15 December 1859, age 64 years. This cemetery also contains McGirrs who are closely tied to the Reids and also come from Ireland.

John Buchanan's land petition, dated 1825, included William McGirr and James Buchanan. John and William were married, but James is single and his name is crossed out. This may have been because James did not arrive in N.B. until 1825, and may not have been there when the petition was granted. On 23 Aug 1854, John Buchanan purchased 330 acres of land located in the parish of Prince William, York County, in the Lake George settlement, rear part of the lot twelve, beside property owned by Alexander Moody. This is likely where he and his family made their home.

James Buchanan married Elizabeth Dwyer on 2 August 1827, ceremony being witnessed by John Buchanan. At that time James was listed as living in Sheffield, York County, where he may have been working. By 1851, James and his wife had settled in the parish of Simonds, in Carleton County. They had five children: Elizabeth married Thomas G. Toms, Mary married Isaac Perkins (Centreville was originally know as Perkins Corner), Marjery married George West, James Junior married Lydia Yorke and were the parents of the Carleton County Buchanans, and Sarah (Sally), who married David Fitzgerald. These families all lived in the Centreville area.

Since these families began coming to Canada before the potato famine in Ireland, which drove many out of that country, they may have paid their own passage and were not sponsored, except by each other-hence the different arrival dates for the family. It is unknown just why they came to Canada; cheap land, overcrowding, or religious freedom, or all of these things. They first settled at Bear Island, York County, but moved to Carleton County later. Because there were no roads, the settlers used the rivers and streams. The Preaqu'ile stream which flowed through Centreville was used to float logs to the St. John River. Travelers from this stream to the St. John River, and on down to the port of St. John, where there were boats going to the coastal towns and cities of Eastern United States, and to Nova Scotia.

George Reid's 110 acre grant of land was in Tier 4, Lot 9 south, located just at the top of the hill, leaving the village of Centreville, on the Williamstown road. It was adjacent to his son Daniel's and backing onto the farm of John Toms, in Long Settlement. John Toms' son, Tomas G Toms, married Elizabeth Buchanan, a niece of George and Elizabeth Reid.

It is unknown just where George and Elizabeth Reid are buried. It may be in the old cemetery just below Centreville, known as the Old Williamstown Cemetery. This belonged to the Old Williamstown Methodist Church, which burned years ago. As well as the Reids, who are buried there, there are Starrats and Pages, all original settlers.

George and Elizabeth Reid had six sons and a daughter, all born in Ireland: John Wesley, William, Daniel, James, Robert, and Thomas, and their daughter Eliza.

1) John Wesley Reid and wife Margaret may have been married in Ireland. Her maiden name is unknown. They came over to N.B. in 1831.

However, since their first child was not born until about 1835, it is possible that they were married in York County after they arrived. He was the first of the Reid family to arrive in N.B., coming presumably to join his uncles John and James Buchanan. John and Margaret had nine children: four girls, Elizabeth. Sarah Jane, Mary Ann, and Marjorie all married and settled at Millville, York County. As well as a son George D. Reid and his family settled there. The 5th daughter, Margaret, married Gilbert Corey and lived in Centreville. She died, age 33, leaving six children, all of whom were raised by her sisters in Millville, except the oldest boy, Judson, who stayed in Carleton County. A son, John Henry, married and lived in Hartland. Another, Robert, married Mary Ramsay. Mary's sister Elizabeth came to visit her in Centreville. met Robert's brother, William Alexander, and they married. The Ramsays were children of Benjamin and Margaret Ramsay, and were all born in Fort Kent, Maine, but baptized in the Andover, N.B., Anglican Church. One of the Ramsay

sons married Eliza Reid, cousin of the above boys and granddaughter of Daniel Reid.

2) The second son was William, who came to N.B. on 20 June 1834. There is a family bible, the possession of his granddaughter in Lynn, Ma. that says that William was born in Cumber, County of Londonderry, Ireland, on 16 March 1813. In 1842, he exchanged his property in York County, plus 48 pounds, for 200 acres in Carleton County, owned by Bernard Carrol. At this time he was still single and lived in Prince William, York County. This property was across the road from his father, George, and brother, Daniel's holdings. On 8 April 1848, he married Eleanor Ann (Elly) Leith, daughter of Gabriel Leith and Ann Campbell. Gabriel Leith came to N.B. from Ireland in 1818, and received a grant of land in Sunbury County on the Rushagonish Stream, when he was a single man. In 1824, he married Ann Campbell, who was born in Sunbury County, Parish of Blissville, about 1806. This family moved to Greenfield, Carleton County, between 1826 and 1835. There were 10 children in the family, the oldest Elly, being born in Blissville, in 1827. Three of the Leith girls married three Reid brothers.

William and Elly Reid had 12 children, all born in the Parish of Simonds, Carleton County, N.B. They are buried in the St. James Anglican Church Cemetery on the Knoxford Road in Centreville. Two children died in infancy, 4 moved to Lynn, Ma., 2 to Western Canada, and 4 remained in the Centreville area. The youngest daughter married Col. Lee Kennedy, who owned and ran the tavern/hotel in Centreville, before it was buried.

3) Daniel was the third son. He and his wife, Mary Gallagher, were married in Londonderry, Ireland in Dec. 1845, and arrived in N.B. in May 1846. Daniel was granted 110 acres in Tier 4, Lot 9 North, Carleton County, beside his father's grant. This was in 1843, as his 4th child was born at Bear Island, York County, on 12 May 1842, and the 5th child, 29 Mar 1844 in Carleton County. Daniel and Mary had 8 children, 5 of whom lived at Centreville, 2 in Knoxford, and one died young. Their son James, had 6 sons who lived in Upper Knoxford, and raised their families there. Their son John, had 3 children, one a daughter who married a Ramsay boy form For Kent, brother of the Ramsay girls who married John Wesley Reid's daughters. James and John Reid donated land on which was built the Upper Knoxford Church.

Daniel and Margaret and a daughter who died young, are all buried in the Old Williamstown or Pioneer Cemetery below Centreville. Daniel died at age 60, as the result of being kicked by a horse.

4) James was the 4th son. He came to N.B. in

May, 1836. In 01 Sept 1842, he married at Prince William, York County, to Sarah McGurr, daughter of William McGurr and Jennie Cochrane. Sarah McGurr's brother, Ritchie McGurr, was married to Mary Buchanan, daughter of John Buchanan, and niece to Elizabeth (Buchanan) Reid. Ritchie McGurr's daughter, Sarah, married James L. Reid, son of Daniel Reid. The McGurrs (also spelled McGirr) came to N.B., probably in 1824, so Sarah, who was born around 1826, may have been born in York County, N.B. James and his oldest child, son Richard, received grants of 50 acres each, in Tier 4, but across the Presqu Ile Stream from Centreville and near Long Settlement. Richard Reid married Annie Holmes, whose mother was another daughter of Gabriel Leith's, Mary Leith.

James and Sarah had 6 children, and Sarah died in 1880. However, I do not know where they are buried. Richard's wife died just after their first child was born, and he never married again. His daughter married and moved to Lynn, Ma. Another son of James', William, married and had 10 children, nine of whom moved to Maine. I have been unable to trace the rest of this family, but I believe they all moved to Maine.

5) Robert was the fifth son of George Reid. He came to N.B. in 1841. He was the last of the boys to arrive, his parents and other brothers being already here. However, his sister, Eliza, and her family, were still living in Ireland. The census says that he came in 1841, but there is a possibility that he came in 1840, with his parents and his brother, Thomas. Robert married Margaret Leith, Gabriel Leith's daughter, on 31 Mar 1851.

On 25 March 1850, Robert bought, for 25 pounds, the south half of Lot 9, Third Tier, from his brother William and his wife Eleanor. This couple had 8 children, all of whom lived in Centreville, three of whom did not marry. One of Robert's grandsons was Mr. Jack Reid, who knew most of the older generation, and collected much information on the Reids. His mother was Knox, and it was her uncle, George Knox, settled in Knoxford, and is who Knoxford is named after. Robert and his wife, Margaret, are buried in the Old Williamstown Cemetery.

6) Thomas was the 6<sup>th</sup> child. He came to N.B. with his parents in 1840. They settled on the land grant of 110 acres in Tier 4, Lot 9 south, beside his brother Daniel, and backing on to the grant of John Toms, whose son, Thomas G. Toms married Elizabeth Buchanan, daughter of James Buchanan, and niece of Elizabeth (Buchanan) Reid. John Tom's grant was in Long Settlement. On 15 July 1862, Thomas married Elizabeth Leith, another daughter of

Gabriel's. Gabriel lived with this family until he died in 1874.

Thomas and Elizabeth had 8 children. In 1896, they moved to Maine to live with their son T. Havelock Reid, who had moved there in 1894 and married in 1895. Three of their children lived in Maine, three in N.B., and of the other two, one died young, and the other is unknown. Thomas and Elizabeth Reid are buried in Pierce Cemetery, Mars Hill, Maine. Havelock Reid, their son, was married three times. His first wife, Mary Millicent Gee, died leaving 6 children, the baby only a month old. This child, Helen Berneice, was raised by Havelock's sister Mina, wife of John Cougle, of Bloomfield, N.B. Mina and John Cougle had no children of their own, but had adopted Russell Cougle. Helen Berneice (Reid) Stokoe, was in attendance.

7) George and Elizabeth Reid had only one daughter, Eliza, who married Thomas Kennedy in Ireland. This couple, together with seven children, came to N.B. in 1853, aboard the "Mary Ann". They had three children born in N.B. later. Thomas was born about 1813 and died between 1881 and 1891 in

N.B., Eliza was born about 1818 (although her age changed with each census), and died after 1891. This family originally settled near the Reid families, but later moved to Riverduchute, in Wicklow Parish. I do not know exactly when this couple died. Or where they are buried.

The Kennedys had many descendants, living in Victoria and Carleton Counties, and through Northern Maine, and as far away as Arizona.

For further details on the above families, I have compiled and published books on each of the children (7), and one each on the Buchanans and Leiths. These books are in the library of the Carleton County Chapter of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society, at the Hartland Library, in Hartland, N.B. I have also submitted 3 books on Esteys – Book I, history and background; Book II, Charles Lothrup Estey of Knoxford and his descendents; and Book III, Endicott Estey (Charles Lothrup's father), and his descendents. Besides the above-mentioned books, I have submitted to the Library a book on the Carleton County Schrivers and another on the Withers/Carruthers families.

Through the spirited and unwearied exertion of the people of the Parish of Kingston, the framing of the said House was compleated and on this day erected - a verry good Fraim in due order, without any misfortune happening, to the encouragement and satisfaction of all present, concluding to proceed to inclose and cover the same as fast as their circumstances would admit."





## **Homestead Maps For Sale**

There were a number of unusual New Brunswick and Nova Scotia County maps produced from 1862 to 1888 which have since come to be known as Homestead maps. Unlike most maps, which are concerned only with geographical features, homestead maps were produced to show home and business locations, with the owners identified. This was done by actual survey of whole counties including both townships and rural areas, making them very useful for anyone researching names or doing a family history. With a homestead map you can see who was living where, what other family members lived close by, variant name spellings, distance to town, work, church and school, actual size of communities including ones that no longer exist, old road locations etc..






Homestead Maps were originally published by companies like H. F. Walling, A. F. Church and Roe & Colby, and are currently being reproduced in small quantities by Paul Anderson, Rare Books & Maps, of Moncton. They are available full size up to 6 ½ long, or as Details; cropped sections just showing your area of interest. (Details have larger type for easier viewing, and being smaller than the full size maps they are easier to frame) You can see a bit of what these maps look like from the samples shown on these two pages. Some of the full size maps include up to 14 insets of towns and townships, each slightly enlarged to allow easier viewing than the originals. Towns can also be printed separately and are nicely frameable. Also available are Bird's Eye Views of some Canadian and American towns and cities. They were hand

sketched in great detail from about 1860 to 1890. Bird's Eye's do not show home ownership however.

### **Book for Sale**

I am providing advance notice of a new publication as only a limited number will be printed. I have compiled military biographies on 1,320 men who enlisted in World War I from Victoria and Carleton Counties New Brunswick. Much of my information came from The Woodstock Despatch, The Carleton Sentinel and the Observer. The information was gleaned from notices of enlistment, casualty lists, returned soldiers and letters sent by soldiers home from England and the front. This was supplemented by military enlistment lists, log books. Also used were the Attestation Papers from the National Archives Website and the records of the Canadian Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Other biographical and historical books were also consulted. Although I cannot assume that I have 100% of the soldiers who enlisted (there being no master list) I believe that most have been included in this work. A large number of the enlistees came from Birmingham, England and may have been amoung the children sent out in the late 1890's. The next of kin provides valuable clues to their connection with local families or those abroad. I anticipate the resulting book may be upwards of 700 pages in length. I intend to have perfect binding with a hard cover.

Given the high expense of publication only a limited number of these books will be printed. Tentatively, I expect the book will be available for about \$70 to \$80 plus postage and handling from Saint John, N.B. Also I hope to have it ready by Nov. 11th, 2003. ### **Tuberculosis**

Contributed by Gerald Bell

Notes on Tuberculosis taken from the Kings County Record of the 20's. Called "consumption" in older documents. "7855 people died in Canada in 1923. Several other diseases have high death rates, but the average death caused from these is between the years of 50 and 60. The average age of those dying from TB is: Males 37 years and females, 33 years.

In 1925, there were 405 deaths from TB in New Brunswick. About 60% of school children of N.B. are infected with TB before the age of 15. In all probability, 90% are infected by the age of 25. Each and every one then is suitable soil for the development of TB.

Why then does approximately one in eleven die of TB?

Because the disease TB is dependant upon the amount of germs entering the body and the resistance of the individual. The germs lie inactive in practically the whole population, hovering as a menace ready to spring into active disease once the resistance has been lowered by poor living conditions, poor food, disposition, overwork, worry or sickness.

The first two years of life, the time of floor crawling, show a heavier death rate from TB than at any other two year period. The bovine TB germ comes from cows which are suffering from TB and reaches the child through milk. As a large number of milk cows suffer from TB, milk from such cows may infect our children unless the milk is pasteurized or boiled to kill the germs. Probably 10% of TB deaths in children under five years are due to the bovine germ and 61% of the cases of TB glands are caused by infections from cattle.

Mr. Tisdale Lyon, of Sussex, King's County, as he was driving his horses and wagon to St. John (there being no snow) something getting wrong about the harness he stopped to fix it, And while he was in the act of fixing the harness, the horses started, he fell, and the wagon wheel passed over his neck which broke it, which caused instantaneous death. How uncertain is life!

Feb. 8. (1848)

Mr. Zebulon Connor was married to a daughter of Mr. Gabriel Worden, all of Greenwich K. Co.

Feb. 9 (1848)

Mr. Thos. Golding, (George and James's father) was going to St. John, a long with a Mr. Price, for a load of hay, and when they stopped at Mr. Elias Flewelling's to feed he, Thos. Golding, had been drinking, an old practice, they left there and while going down the Kennebeccacis River, Price asked Golding if he was cold, who replied, he was. Price then told him to wrap himself up in the horse blankets. He drove on to Robinson's, where they leave the ice, when Price went to get off the load, and taking the blankets off of Golding to see how he was, Alas! Melancholy to relate, the vital spark had fled, he was a corpse! He was about 70 years of age.

Feb. 16 (1848)

Mr. James Golding was married to Miss Eliza Ann Dunham, both of Hampstead by the Rev. James A. Smith.

Feb. 17. (1848)

Mr. Robert Douglas married to- Miss Hannah McOuchie by Thos. T. Hewlett, Esq. both of the Parish of Hampstead, Queens County. They were published twice on Sabbath and once on Tuesday night last, but the Squire would not marry them without license, as to be published legally is on three successive Sabbaths, Robt. went to Gagetown and had to give 7 dollars for license.

Mar. 9. (1848)

Mr. Thos. Wellington Carpenter married to Miss Elizabeth Slip, 3rd daughter of James Slip Senior. - A very rainy day.

#### March 15. (1848)

Mr. John Inch junior and Miss Jane Porter of Long Reach, was married at her father's residence by the Revd. Mr. Cooney, Methodist Minister. Alex Mackinnon jun. and Elizabeth F. Inch were attendants, and there were about 10 couples present.

#### Mar 22nd. (1848)

Mr. Wm. Armstrong a police-man of Portland, St. John, N.B. was married to Miss Margaret Woods of Nerepis Petersville Queens County.

#### Mar. 23. (1848)

Mr. Thomas Graham of Nerepis was married to Miss Thompson of Carleton St. John.

#### Mar. 23. (1848)

Mr. Samuel Vallis was married by Thos. T. Hewlett Esq. to Miss Elizabeth Ann Lawry, both of Hampstead, Queens County.

#### Mar. 31. (1848)

Mr. Isaac T. French moved his family from Jerusalem Settlement to Carleton St. John, intending this ensuing summer to remove from thence to Canada.

#### March 8. (1848)

Mr. William Short of Hampstead, Q.C. was married to Miss Kezia Jordan of Jordan Mountain Kings County.

#### <u>April 5.</u> (1848)

A Fatal Accident. As old Mr. Crozier, of Summerhill, was chopping in the woods, being alone, a large limb- of an old poplar, fell upon him, which rendered him senseless, he, however, recovered, and was able to shout loud enough to make one of Mr. Sutton's boys bear him, who came to his assistance, and endeavoured to get him home, but failed he then went for Mr. Jas. Russel, who came and carry him home, he was then bled immediately, but he departed this life about 6 hours after he received the wound he was about 70 yrs. of age.

#### May 2. (1848)

Died in Jerusalem, infant, aged about 6 or 7 weeks, of Wm: Billings and was interred today at Riecker's hill.

#### June 8. (1848)

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There was a boy of Mr. Thos. Selfridge's climbing a tree for amusement, and after he had ascended to

some height he came to an old limb, which projected from the trunk, upon which he seated -himself, having his legs a straddle it, - it broke - and sad to tell - the ' end of the part attached to the tree caught him in the abdomen, and ripped him so that a large part of his bowels gushed out - A man was immediately despatched for the Doctor (Doctor Peters) - who, when he came, which was about 10 or 12 hours afterwards said, that he could not do anything that would be the means of saving the boy's life, as a mortification had already taken place, neither could he, had he been present at the moment the accident occurred, have saved the boy's life, he died about 30 hours after - aged about 8 years.

#### June 12 (1848)

This is the District Orange Lodge Meeting for Queen's held At **Gagetown** at **Mr. Phillips.** There were about 50 persons in attendance everything went on very harmoniously and agreeably there was no grievances to be laid before the 3d Lodge only **Jacob Palmer** had previously been expelled from No. 23 And he made his appeal to be tried over again And by the decision of a Committee who heard the statements made relative to the case - his expulsion for 1 year was confirmed, and if his conduct should be satisfactory to the Members of the Lodge from which he was expelled, during this year then it was their option to accept or refuse him.

#### July 12 (1848)

The Orangemen of Lodge No. 41 started, with some of No.4, from Mr. Nat. Inch's between 6 & 7 o'clock in the morning, and went out to Oakpoint where there were 6 Lodges assembled and very great concourse of spectators - Rev. C. Milner preached a sermon to them from Ps. 133.1. "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" The discourse, to say the least of it, was not appropriate to the occasion at all; there was nothing said relative to Orangmen or Orangeism in the whole excepting at the very last he had the Book of Rules and he said 'that he had perused it and that it was ' in accordance with his mind in supporting the Queen and the Protestant religion, he also referred to the late attempt to raise a rebellion in Ireland which he said. he thought was prevented by that body, (or Orangemen) that were located in Erin, We all left there (Oak Point) at ½ past 3, in the P.M. and came together to Edgett's, No. 41, then took the Mountain Road and arrived at the lodge room about half past 7 - We then had a sumptuous dinner. The day was extremely fine, though pretty, warm and spent with a great deal of pleasure, harmony and decorum attended all the proceedings. There were, I judge,

about 150 to 170 Orangemen together. And a more temperate, steady, and respectable body of men is seldom seen.

#### Aug. 8 1848 (1848)

I was sleeping at Mr. Nathaniel Inch's and I dreamt that I was at Mr. Joseph Moore's and it appeared to me that the day of judgement was approaching - I thought I saw fire, as an immediate forerunner passing from East to West accompanied and followed by a great tempest. Yet it appeared to me that (or at least the impression on my mind was) the end of all things would take place as soon as this harbinger would complete a revolution round the globe which I thought could not be long, the velocity was so great. I felt considerably concerned and agitated about my own condition, and was earnestly engaged in appreciation that I might be received among those who would be eternally happy. - the air was very tempestuous and the clouds and the atmosphere were all in the greatest possible commotion and nature, to all appearance, was fast receding. Every object presented a scene of melancholy - However the time for all things to pass away did not come so soon as I expected and the air and clouds began to assume a more serene aspect and I thought I said to those then present that the end was not yet. And I thought I then heard some voice saying that the earth would make five annual revolutions ere the final dissolution of things shall take place. I then awoke and thought it was a dream, yet the impressions that it left upon my mind was not obliterated for many days.

#### Sept.12th. (1848)

I started from father's, this afternoon, to go to Fredericton to the Training and Model School. and got as far as Little River, and attended on 0. Lodge at Mr. W. Leeds. The next night I embarked on board the Steamer F-ton, at Mr. Cases at 12 o'clock, and got into F.-ton at half-past 8 next morning. That evening I lodged with Mr. Weeks with whom I agreed to Lodge during my residence in Fredericton – 10/ per week.

#### Sept. (1848)

The potatoe crop has failed more this year, than ever it was known to fail in-any year-previous - There is scarcely 1/5 part of them fit to use, and in fact, there will, to all appearance be but few preserved fit for seed. The grain crop, especially the oats, is tolerably good, although the Buckwheat is, in some measure, blighted. The hay crop is very abundant. And the season, for the most part, was very favourable to secure the hay; but the harvest weather has been very fickle, and consequently much of the grain has had to

remain out a long time.

#### Sept. 16 (1848)

At the present, the weather is chilly for the season, having a little hoar-frost at night.

A CURE FOR DROPSY -1 oz. Jalap; 2 'oz. Cream of Tartar; ½ oz.Nitre; One large table spoonful of Ginger, all mixed in 1 pint of the best Holland gin; then let stand for 24 hrs. Take a wineglass every night before going to bed: always shaking it well and drinking the dregs. The above has been said to prove effectual when in first stage.

#### Sept. 30 (1848)

An affair of honour or rather dishonour came off this morning on the College-road, Fredericton. A few lines will describe the whole affair. There was a man named Jones, who came to Fredericton some years ago with some regiment in which he had a commission which he sold, and married a Miss Street - A few months ago it was discovered that he and a Miss Odell were very intimate, so much so, that they were frequently discerned together in a grove belonging to her father as late as 11 or 12 o'clock at night - the result was such that she went to the States to endeavour to escape calumny; and also her brother sent a challenge to Jones about that time which he then did not think proper to accept, but went to England, it is said, and has returned and accepted the aforesaid challenge; Jones chose his brother in law Mr. Alfred Street for his second, and Odell chose a Mr. Pennefeather for his. They then went out to a reserve road near the King's College to discharge the contents of their pistols at one another. Odell, I understand, fired rather the first which did not touch Jones who then fired his pistol into the air - so ended the great combat of love and dishonour.

#### Oct 14 (1848)

I walked from Fredericton to Mr. George Donald's, Pennyock, and returned on the 15th by riding to Fredericton with the Revd. Mr. Jaffreys.

#### Oct 6 (1848)

A most melancholy accident! Brs. Hugh Cameron and Abbott went out this morning into the woods in the vicinity of the Oaknabog each taking his gun with him for the purpose of shooting partridges. They went on through the woods till they came to a certain clearing where lived a farmer with whom they stood awhile conversing. And Cameron, who had a double-barrelled percussion gun, well loaded with shot, on attempting to cross a fence near where

Abbott and the farmer were standing, placed the butt of his gun, which was a short one, on a pole of the fence near the bottom, which projected a little,, having his right hand placed upon the muzzles and bearing considerable weight thereon it slipped off which brought the triggers in contact with a lower pole which together with his weight caused the caps to be so suddenly and forcibly bruised upon the tube that they ignited and sad! Oh most sad to relate! the loaded piece was discharged, the contents passing through his right hand, thence, by taking three buttons of his vest, and tearing the bosoms of both his shirts lodging a few shots in his breast, almost the whole load of both barrels entered his throat passing out at the back of his neck. He instantly fell a lifeless corpse! He was interred in the cemetery near Mr. McAlpine' on Sabbath, the 8th, according to the order of the Loyal Orange Association. Revd. Mr. Nobles preached the funeral sermon Mon. from Heb. 12.25, 1st Clause, and it was considered that not less than five hundred persons were in attendance. Oh! the uncertainty of frail mortal life! little did he expect when he left his father's that ere he returned (which he intended to do about noon of the same day) he would be numbered among the pale nations of the dead; and have to appear in the immediate presence of Almighty God to give account for the deeds done in the body and then to receive that most decisive sentence! that will unalterably fix his state for -aye, either in infinite happiness or infinite misery and torment! How exceedingly important it is to be always ready for the summons of Death! for it oft comes in an hour when we least expect it.

#### Oct.20 (1848)

Died at Rushagonish, Martha, wife of Mr. Thos. Jones, leaving a family of 2 children. She had been lately confined. - She was daughter of John and Nancy Hutchinson of Jerusalem, and was a pious youth.

#### Nov.- 6th (1848)

At a Loyal Orange Soiree held in the Lodge Room in Fredericton at which there were 102 persons present. Mr. Geo. Anderson presided. The tables presented a most sumptuous appearance, having all-sorts of cakes, pies, tarts, &c. that were necessary to gratify the sight and satisfy the palate - After all had received tea and the tables &c were removed, the Revd. Mr. Tupper, Baptist Minister and Orange Br. was called upon to address the assembly upon the occasion of the present Convention, which he did by slightly touching upon the great deliverance

from the gunpowder plot on Nov. 5, 1605, the good that Orangeism has done in this Province, and then in warm and pathetic language, expressed the delight and satisfaction which he enjoyed by belonging to such an honourable and praiseworthy Institution, also that belonging to the Orange Association did not retard or embarrass him, in the discharge of his ministerial functions or duties, that there was nothing in the cause of orangeism to lead any person's mind from the principles of religion, and concluded by sincerely hoping that the ranks of Orangemen may still continue to rapidly increase with God-fearing men. The next that spoke was.Jas. Taylor Esq. M.P.P. who expatiated at some length upon the present disturbed state of affairs in Europe and the corruptions, cruelties, and superstitions of the Papal Church; And then concluded by referring to the great amount of good done by Orangeism in the Province of N.B. in surpressing rioting Papists in different sections of the same.

The following persons were successively called upon to speak, which they did, but advanced nothing of very great importance, or that was very amusing,, except some laughable anecdotes that were related. Their names were Brothers Harding, Wilson, Kindred, and one from Nova Scotia, name unknown. Then there were several-Constitutional songs sung, and about 11 o'clock, the meeting was dismissed when many went away, as well as myself; but a great many stayed and had fiddling and dancing which, I understood, they kept up till 4 o'clock in the morning -: thus, the first Soiree at which I was ever present, passed off, and that most pleasantly too - N.B. The tables were set and furnished by Br. Francis Cheney, Confectioner. for which he received 1/6 a-piece - About 10 o'clock the dessert came on, which consisted of apples, raisins, and different kinds of nuts.

#### Nov. 9 (1848)

There was a snow-storm to-day, and the ground in Fredericton was covered to the depth of about 4 or 5 inches, which made a very good sleighing. The air is also pretty cold.

#### Nov. 13 (1848)

The river at Fredericton was frozen over so that on the 14th persons walked over upon it and for 5 or 6 days the weather was very cold indeed for the season. And now, the 22nd inst. it is still frozen so that the people cross in safety. Above Fredericton, about 6 or 7 miles, there were a

man and boy drowned at the same place and time on the 18th inst. Steam-boats, however can get up as far as the **Oromocto** as yet.

Nov.20 (1848)

The following persons attending the Training and Model School, F'ton viz., Messrs.. Isa Wallace, Jas. Dixon, Wm.Johnson, Jonas Clarkson, Jno. Cutten, Wm. King, Duncan McDougal, Donald Livingstone, Thos. O'Kane, and myself, assembled in Mr. d'Avrav's (Principal of the Training and Model School) for to submit to the necessary examination to obtain a The questions were first class Certificate. written, by Mr. d'Avray on a sheet of paper and handed to us, the aforesaid teachers, for us to solve on paper and then present the same to him. There were a great many questions. commencement was to define a right, an acute, and an obtuse angle, a parallelogram, a rhombus, a rhomboid, an oblong, and a trapezium; Then followed several propositions, viz. 2nd, 3rd, 1lth, 29th, 34th and 46th of the 1st Book of Euclid, which had to be described and demonstrated, then followed 6 questions in Algebra producing simple equations, then to name and define the general properties of bodies. To define a syllogism and give an example, To explain the cause of high water on the side of the earth. to the moon. That is, why there are two tides in 24 hours in every ocean at the same place. And lastly to describe a traveller's route from Gibralter to Paris, thence to Antwerp, thence to Vienna. thence to Geneva. thence Copenhagen, thence to Rome, thence to Athens, and thence to St. Petersburg.

While the rector appears to have submitted some of the marriages for inclusion in the Westmorland County Marriage Registers, the following were omitted. Affairs with Old Houses, Personal Stories About Preserving Heritage Houses in Nova Scotia, ed Pat Lotz, paperback 9"x 6", 195 p; ISBN 1-55109-295-6; co-published by Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia and Nimbus Publishing, \$19.95.

Those who know me are familiar with the passionate, sometimes bitter fight waged and lost to save the Peter Combination Lock building on Church Street, Moncton in which I was involved with other staunch advocates for several years.

It is my personal opinion that genealogy and preservation of our built heritage are inseparable.

The struggle to save, restore and preserve buildings is quiet but consistent, and New Brunswick is well represented. On the national level, Jim Bezanson of Saint John is the current and able board chair of Heritage Canada, for example. Heritage Canada is a credible national voice which champions the saving of old buildings ... endangered lighthouses, for one.

Yet, despite the loss to parking lots of too many of our old buildings, there are also many inspiring success stories. Affairs with Old Houses chronicles 16 varied, candid triumphs of preservation and is a delightful read, as well as a trove of miscellaneous Maritime genealogical tidbits. Pauline Carter was inexplicably drawn to an old house in Pleasant Valley, Colchester. As a youth she had discovered some old papers stuffed in a tea box ... the hand-written will of her grandfather which that lead to her discovery that her father Clarence was adopted. That launched a seven-decade genealogical search ... sound familiar? Turns out that old house in Pleasant Valley was the birth place of her father, born out of wedlock in 1888. This taboo of Victorian morals was intended to be forever kept secret. And it might have been, but for Pauline's fascination with an old house. Her story of the Dartt-Carter house is as much about genealogy as it is about old houses. The Richmond House in Windsor, N.S. is another good example of the genealogy connection. From the early 1800s, the two-storey clapboard Georgian homestead was home to several families (Clarke, Haliburton, King, , MacNeil, MacDonald Maxner and Singer among them) before it was bequeathed in 1976 to the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia. From the Dickey House in Amherst, the Doggett House in Truro, the Lennox Inn in Lunenburg to the Stone House in Port Hood ... you will be hard pressed to put this book down and will revisit it often.

Clyde F. Macdonald has done it again.

The Pictou County, Nova Scotia judge with a longstanding passion for history and genealogy has produced yet another well-researched book destined to be a lasting essential text and reference. Sunny Brae, A Village Since 1802 is Judge Macdonald's latest contribution. Launched late last year, this 405-page paperback chronicles his home village where he traces ancestry to Scottish immigrants William Cumming and Catherine Fraser. In an easy-to-follow chronological format, Macdonald presents his exhaustive research of Sunny Brae, known successively for its first 70 years as Upper Settlement, East River, then Fraser's Mills, then Pleasant Valley. From 1872 onward the village located about 18 miles upstream from New Glasgow on the East River was recorded and known as Sunny Brae (Brenna Hawina, in Gaelic.)

Photographs and important graphic illustrations in this book are both plentiful and pertinent. The well documented, well sourced volume deals in depth with people, their industry and their milestones, as well as their important social and cultural institutions and events. I was particularly intrigued by a controversy in 1875 over whether an organ in the Presbyterian church was a blessing from God or a curse of Satan. One elder stated he would never vote to have placed in the sanctuary "a box of tin whistles and if it is to come to instrumental music, then give me the bagpipes."

In 1912, another social tempest swirled ... this time involving a clergyman who snubbed his nose at a law, which prohibited the use of the new-fangled automobile on certain days of each week. All profits from the sale of this book are assigned to the Pictou County Roots Society.
