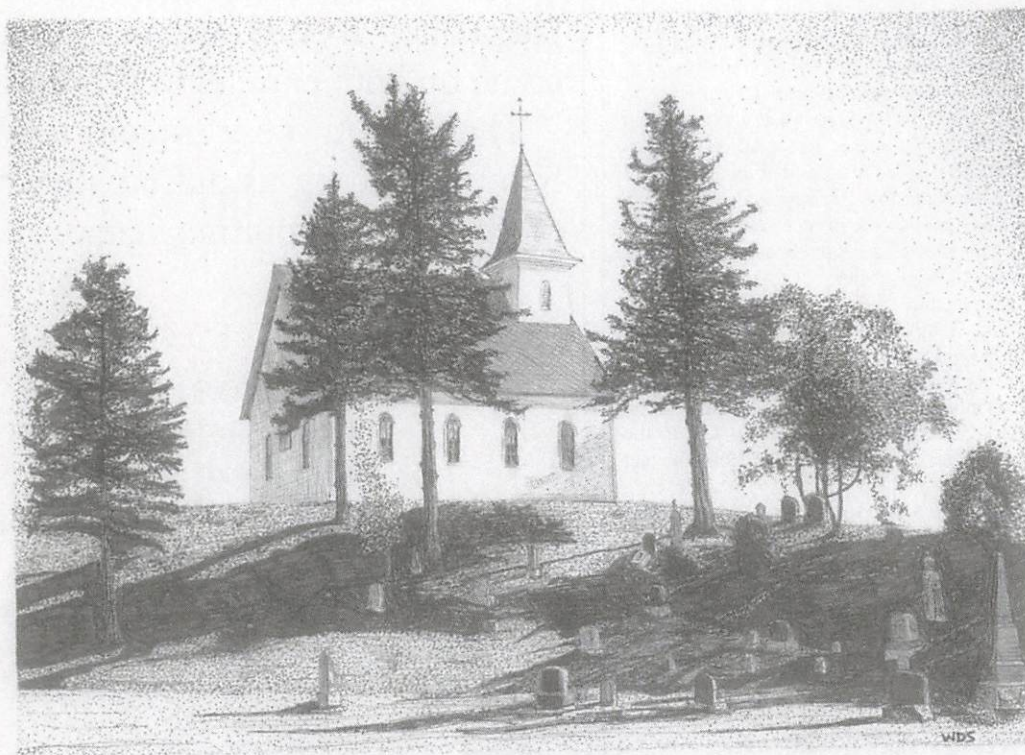


Generations

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Melville Church was built in New Kincardineshire (now known as the Scotch Colony) and was dedicated on January 1, 1878. The settlement was founded in 1873 as a result of the largest immigration, with the exception of the United Empire Loyalists, ever planned for New Brunswick.

The Golden Bridge, Young Immigrants to Canada, 1833-1939, by Marjorie Kohli; 480 p, illustrated, ISBN1-895219-90-X; published by Natural Heritage Books, Toronto, Cost: \$34.95.

"Some books are to be tasted, others to be swallowed, and some few to be chewed and digested."

These famous words penned so long ago by Francis Bacon jumped to the forefront of my thoughts as I became totally absorbed in a magnificent book recently released.

The Golden Bridge by Marjorie Kohli is destined to become a benchmark for family researchers with a home child ancestor. Kohli has meticulously chronicled the incredible story of the thousands of young "waifs and strays" who were uprooted from the United Kingdom and Ireland and shipped to Canada between 1833 and 1939 to be placed with families throughout the Maritimes, Ontario and Quebec, and as far westward as British Columbia.

Kohli's research and documentation incorporates extensive background detail on agencies and key organizers such as Maria Rye, Annie Macpherson, Thomas Barnardo and William Quarrier, along with lesser-knowns including Ellinor Close and Charles Young. An important chapter on Female Immigration examines the recruitment of domestic help and the transportation from the Poor Unions and elsewhere of women, often in their teens and 20s, but also including

widows. I was particularly touched by A Fegan Boy's Story, one of many interesting and informative appendices. Even the title of this book demonstrates its depth. It is gleaned from a statement made in 1915 by G. Bogue Smart, Inspector of British Immigrant Children and Receiving Homes. "To thousands of young people, emigration has been the golden bridge by which they have passed from an apparently hopeless childhood to lives of useful service and assured comfort, in this new land."

Supported by charts, passenger lists, photographs, clippings, precise reference notes, an outstanding bibliography and a comprehensive index, The Golden Bridge is a must-read and surefire re-read for genealogists and history buffs alike. Gabriel George Ludlow

Gabriel George,⁴ b. April 16, 1736; m. (Marriage Bond) Book 3, P. 279), Sept. 3, 1760, Ann Ver Planck (a niece of Daniel Crommelin and sister of Gulian Ver Planck and Daniel Crommelin Ver Planck), who was born Oct. 11, 1742, and died Dec. 13, 1822, at Carleton, N. B., aged 80. She is buried beside her husband in the graveyard there. After his marriage Gabriel George Ludlow retired to his country seat, which embraced 140 acres, at Hyde Park, near Hempstead, Long Island (an estate afterwards occupied by the celebrated William Cobbett), and was closely identified with public affairs in Queens County up to 1783. He was appointed Colonel of the Militia of the County, as well as a Justice of the Peace. He was a staunch Loyalist, and in 1776 became Colonel of the Third Battalion of Brigadier Gen. Oliver De Lancey's Long Island Brigade of Royal Americans. His battalion was stationed during 1777 to 1783 at Brookhaven, but was disbanded in Nova Scotia after the close of the war. He was appointed a Governor of King's College (afterwards Columbia College) in 1759 and resigned this honor in 1770. He and his brother, Judge George Duncan Ludlow, were included in the Act of Attainder passed by the Legislature of the new State of New York, Oct. 22, 1779. All their property was confiscated and, upon the British evacuation of New York, with nearly all other prominent Loyalists, they were forced to leave their native country. They sailed for England, where their privations were recognized by the Crown. They were both appointed members of the King's Council for the newly created Province of New Brunswick and were given lands in Carleton and neighborhood. Here they established new homes, and in December of 1784, they sent for their families. During the sea voyage from New York, the ship containing their wives and children was wrecked off Schoodick Point on the Massachusetts coast, but ultimately all were safely landed in their new homes. Gabriel George Ludlow was a member of the City Council of St. John, New Brunswick. He was first Mayor of St. John (1785 to 1795); Judge of the Vice Admiralty Court (1787 to 1803); President of the King's Council in New Brunswick (1803 to 1808). He was also appointed by the King, Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, which office he held until his death. Col. Ludlow built a substantial mansion in St. John, which was known as "The Old Government House." Here he spent the remainder of his life. He died at Carleton, N. B., Feb. 12, 1808, and was accorded a public funeral, in which the entire military garrison, ships of the Royal Navy, dignitaries of the Government and public bodies, as well as citizens of all classes, took part. He is buried at Carleton, and a tablet to his memory was also placed in Trinity Church, St. John. Children: 4 (Ludlow), 2 sons and 2 daughters, viz.:--

Elisha Nevers and Bershabe Green

The following may be of interest to descendants of Elisha Nevers and Bershabe Green, Pre Loyalist settlers on the St. John River.

I am aware of two books done on this family and have been in contact with both authors.

In both books, at the beginning, there is mentioned a daughter Martha born in 1731, but, she is not mentioned again in the books.

My great great grandfather was Elisha Nevers Woodman, so, I have done some research on the Woodmans, but more relevant is the fact my great aunt Glorana Price Fownes did a lot of family research in the early 1900's. This research is now in my possession.

Mary Isabella Woodman was 22 and living at home when her grand father died, so, she probably had intimate knowledge of her grand parents, aunts, uncles, brothers and sisters, which she passed on to her daughter as the following is from the files that were given to me.

Elisha Nevers = son of Richard and Martha –

Notes

Elisha Nevers served in the expedition against Cape Breton in 1745-6. He was an innholder in Boston in 1749, he seems to have come to Mauderville in 1765, but returned to New England.

Phineas Nevers was a physician who came to Mauderville in 1761. He was proscribed because of rebel sympathies. Wright reports that he married and had children John, Elisha, Bathsheba, Hannah and Samuel. The IGI reports that a Phineas Nevers and Elizabeth Corse of Deerfield, Franklin, Mass. had a son Phineas – baptised 15 Feb. 1746. This may, or, may not be the same family.

Samuel Nevers married in May 1763 Anna Berrill (born 4 Oct 1744, died 29 Jan 1830). Their children were Lucy, Elizabeth, Anna, Jane, David, Samuel, Nathaniel, Mary, William and Rebecca. Samuel and Jabez came to Mauderville in 1765, presumably with their father, and following their brother Phineas. Samuel and Samuel Jr. owned land, Mauderville in 1785.

James married Martha Nevers probably after 1775. I believe Martha was the daughter of Elisha Nevers. (Elisha Nevers was an original Conway grantee and James' first grandson was named Elisha Nevers Woodman.) I also believe that James' and Martha's son, James Jr. was born in 1778. (The daughter Martha Ann is known to have been born in 1780 and according to family tradition the boy was five and the girl three when James Sr. died. It is true that the girl was three when her father died in 1783, and very likely the boy was five at that time, so born in 1778 or late 1777.)

"James probably died as a result of an accident. In the summer of 1783 he was supplying the Loyalists with lumber and by September 30th, 1783 he had died and Dr. Ambrose Sharman acting on the behalf of "Martha Woodman, widow of James Woodman" signed a receipt for boards and shingles provided by James for the use of the Loyalists. Therefore, James died in August or September 1783. Martha later married Isaac Clarke."

Loyalists in the Connecticut 6th Regiment

In an article published earlier we reported that a soldier named William Wilmot Hawkins from Derby, Connecticut, served for a short time in the Connecticut 6th Regiment of the American Army during the American Revolutionary War and then deserted on 26 August 1777, later claiming to have joined the service of the British against the Americans.¹ Subsequent research has uncovered the Muster Roll of a unit of 43 Loyalists who served the British under the command of Capt. Phillip Bailey and were known as the Royal Fencible Americans (RFA).² This Muster Roll, taken in New York on 23 December 1777, lists Wm. Wilmot Hawkins and indicates he enlisted in the RFA on 27 August 1777. This is one day after American records indicate he deserted the Connecticut 6th Regiment.³

The complete list of soldiers appearing on the Muster Roll of the RFA at New York and their dates of commission or enlistment are as follows:

At the end of the RFA list is a notation that: "Srgt. Newman taken prisr. by the Rebels 17th Nov, Corpl. Johnson taken prisr. 19th Novr. & George Minn [or Winn] deserted 23 Nov."

The enlistment of William Wilmot Hawkins in the RFA one day after deserting the Connecticut 6th and the name of the Loyalist unit he joined, the Royal Fencible Americans, suggest the possibility that other men in the RFA may have also deserted American regiments. A cross check of the names and obvious variations of names of other soldiers on the RFA Muster Roll against the names of soldiers in the Connecticut 6th reveals six additional Loyalists who deserted the Connecticut 6th besides William Wilmot Hawkins. These are:

1. Samuel Brown deserted the 6th Regiment on 26 August 1777 and enlisted in the RFA one day later.⁴
2. Samuel Durand deserted on 26 August 1777 and enlisted in the RFA one day later.⁵ According to the Connecticut 6th Regiment Service Records, he was from Derby, Connecticut.
3. James Hooper deserted on 27 September 1777 and enlisted in the RFA the same day.⁶ He was from New Haven, Connecticut.
4. Elisha Lewis deserted on 26 August 1777 and enlisted in the RFA one day later.⁷ He was from Derby, Connecticut.
5. John Nichols was reported to have died in July 1777. A later entry in his Service Record indicates he deserted the 6th Regiment in August 1777.⁸ He was probably the John Nichols, Sr. who enlisted in the RFA on 21 September 1777.
6. William Peters was reported in the American records to have been taken prisoner on 20 September. A subsequent annotation indicated he had deserted without giving the date.⁹ He probably was the William Peters who enlisted in the RFA on 2 August 1777.

A cross check of the remaining names on the RFA Muster Roll against names of soldiers in other Connecticut regiments (1st through 5th and 7th through 9th Regiments) reveals only one other soldier who deserted one of these regiments to join the RFA. Gilbert Wilson deserted the Connecticut 3rd in 1777 and is likely the soldier by that name who joined the RFA on 4 October 1777.¹⁰ His actual date of desertion is not given in the records of the Connecticut 3rd Regiment. He was from Stamford, Fairfield Co., Connecticut.

The Service Records do not indicate where Samuel Brown, John Nichols, Sr. or William Peters lived prior to joining the 6th Connecticut Regiment that they later deserted.

It is interesting that three of the soldiers, William Wilmot Hawkins, Samuel Durand, and Elisha Lewis, were from Derby, Connecticut, when they joined the 6th Connecticut Regiment. All three deserted that Regiment the same day and all three enlisted in the RFA the next day. The short interval between the desertion of some of the men and their enlistment in the RFA suggests the possibility of recruiting efforts to entice soldiers to change loyalties. Perhaps the soldiers jointly became dissatisfied with something about the American Army and jointly reached the conclusion to switch loyalties. Since soldiers sometimes left their units for a period of time to tend to their farms and families, the unannounced absence of soldiers was common and the date and reason for their departure was not always known. However, since the units from which these soldiers deserted knew the exact date of their desertion, this suggests there probably was fairly good communication between opposing sides.

After the Revolutionary War, William Wilmot Hawkins moved to Pennfield, Charlotte Co. New Brunswick, as we reported in the first reference. Additional information about William Wilmot Hawkins' military service and his family has been reported in earlier issues of *Generations*.^{11, 12}

It is not known where many of the other men on the RFA Muster Roll went after the war. However, a listing of men and women titled the *List of Men, Women and Children of the late Royal Fencible American Regiment in the District of Passamaquoddy* shows that several of the other soldiers also moved to New Brunswick.¹³ This list was compiled on 2 July 1784 at LeTang [sic, actually L'Tang, which is now the L'Tang Peninsula about five miles south of present-day St. George, New Brunswick].

Names of soldiers appearing on both the 23 December 1777 RFA Muster Roll and the 2 July 1784 Passamaquoddy list are: Capt. Phillip Bailey, Malcolm Blair/Blare (as Malcolm Blayer), Samuel Browne (Brown), Wm. Wilmot Hawkins (as William Hawkins), James Hooper, Alexander Long, William Peters, John Ross, James Thompson, and John Travers (Traverse). In addition, a Phillip Corn on the Passamaquoddy Roll may have been Phillip Coomb who appeared on the December 1777 New York Muster Roll of the RFA.

We have shown that a number of soldiers in the American Revolutionary War served for a time in Connecticut Regiments of the American Army before deserting and fighting against the American Army in a unit of Loyalists known as the Royal Fencible Americans. We have also shown that a number of them went to Charlotte Co., New

Brunswick, at the end of the war. Finally, in some cases we have been able to identify the communities in Connecticut where the soldiers lived before settling in New Brunswick.

Although only eight of the forty-three soldiers on the RFA Muster Roll have been connected with soldiers on Connecticut regimental lists, the name of the unit they served in, Royal Fencible Americans, suggests that other RFA soldiers were probably from the American Colonies and may have served in American Army regiments before joining the RFA. We strongly suspect that further review of the American Army Revolutionary War Service Records of soldiers from other states would substantiate this hypothesis.

Editor's Note: The following are letters or emails received by the editor in the last few months.

I've enclosed Xerox copies of three documents that were found in my grandmother's house in Brooklyn Centre, Minnesota (a suburb of Minneapolis) when the house was remodeled prior to its sale sometime in the mid-1900s. The documents were inserted in a book that was found either in the attic or in a wall – I'm not clear on this. My mother gave them to me at the time they were found and I took little interest in them until I started researching my own family three earlier this year.

Two of the three documents are handwritten family records on lined notepaper; the third document is a handwritten prayer. During my own research, I've been able to determine that the families described in the documents are not related to my own family. The documents probably were placed in my grandmother's house prior to its purchase by my great grandparents, Isaac and Sarah Jane Littell – the house was about 15 years old when they acquired it in about 1900. At that time, the house was a farmhouse.

NOTE: I have placed a question mark enclosed by brackets in the text after any words about which I am uncertain. All documents are written on lined paper. Document #1 is folded over to the left. Document #2 is written on front and back. Document #3 is cut from a larger piece of lined paper. There is an oval-shaped embossed marking in the upper corner of document #1 and #3. Both are difficult to make out. The marking on document #1 appears to read, "LAREMONT MANFG CO". The marking on document #3 appears to read, "17 (??) CONTINENTAL". Document #3 is also watermarked with the partial word, "INENTAL", with the letter "L" much larger than the other letters of the word, and with the figure of a man, perhaps in military uniform with a sword, wearing a Scottish tam.

Pioneer Families of New Brunswick

Editor's note: There were over forty families in this series that were printed in the Telegraph Journal in 1943. They will be printed in Generations over the next few issues. Irene Keleher of Saint John, N.B. contributed them to the magazine.

The name Huestis offered so many chances for variations in spelling that it is difficult to figure out whether all the Loyalists of the name belonged to the same family or not. There was a Dr. Stephen Hustice, a lieutenant in Major Coffin's company of the King's American Regiment, who was a physician in Saint John and died 1788 or earlier. His widow, Charlotte Wiggins, married Rev. Oliver Arnold of Sussex.

There was a John Hustice or Hustace who received a grant of Lot 1,172 in Parrtown, and there was also a John Eustace of the 23rd Regiment with Lieut. Bliss at L'Etang, Charlotte County, in 1784, who settled at Beaver Harbor in April, 1786, but neither of these appears again.

Phillip Huestis, who had a grant of Lot 262 in Carleton and who built the second house in Carleton, had a grant of Lot 96 on the Hammond River, but found it so remote that he could not possibly move his family of small children there, and relinquished it for Lot 4 on the Belleisle. There was also a Robert Huestis, who had 50 acres on Kennebecasis Island and asked for additional land on Patacake Creek.

Lewis Huestis, born Dec. 13, 1751, in New York State, had Lot 1262 in Parrtown. He had married Mary Hunt in 1773, and had children:

John Hunt, married Fanny Atherton.

Martha, married James Guiou.

Ruth, married Benjamin Brymer.

Lewis, married Ann Carl.

Mary Hunt was probably a sister of John Hunt, a lieutenant in Captain Jonathan Williams' company of the Guides and Pioneers. Lieut. Hunt received a grant of 500 acres on Block 3, the grant to the Guides and Pioneers on the St. John River above the Keswick, part of which he sold to Lewis Huestis in 1789, and part to Calverly Craven in 1795. Lieut. Hunt died about 1796, and his estate was administered by John Hunt Heustis. The farm which Lewis bought from Lieut. Hunt he willed to his son, Lewis, as well as five lots on the Big Bear Island.

Mary Hunt died, and Lewis married again, Sept. 15, 1808, Sarah, widow of Capt. William Roden. By her he had two daughters: Ann, who married James Miller, and Sarah, who was a spinster at the time of her father's death in 1828.

In a curiously spelled petition which was found in the Legislative Library in Fredericton, Lewis Huestis, stating that he had served in the "Gids on Pinears" and that he had been a sergeant of one company with General Howe in Pennsylvania, asked a grant of Lot 30 on Block 3, which had been drawn by Captain "MacFarson," who was thought to have "bin lost in the truper on his Pasage to England." Lewis Huestis left his sons on the farms at Bear Island, above Fredericton, and moved to Saint John, where for a time he was keeper of the light on Partridge Island, and where he died. In 1803, his son Lewis asked for land in the parish of Wakefield, Carleton County.

BOWES - On last Sunday night, 14th Jan. 1860, in the 70th year of her age, Bridget, the beloved wife of Mr. Thomas BOWES, leaving a larger circle of friends and relatives to mourn their loss. Funeral to take place tomorrow, (Wednesday,) at 12 o'clock, noon, from her late residence on the Old Loch Lomond Road, when friends and acquaintances are respectfully invited to attend.

BOYLE - In Boston, on the 27th July 1869, Margaret, relict of the late James Boyle, Merchant, formerly of this City, aged 54 years. Funeral tomorrow, (Friday,) at 2½ o'clock, from the residence of her brother, Mr. Michael FINN, Peter's street,

BUCKLEY - On Wednesday, the 9th March 1870, Miss Margaret Buckley, aged 42 years, native of the Parish of (in-osh-nnen?), County Cork, Ireland. Funeral on tomorrow (Friday) at 2 o'clock from her late residence, corner of Duke and Carmarthen streets, when friends and acquaintances are requested to attend.

John Hamilton and his wife Catherine Kennedy, Restigouche County, NB Pioneers

FOREWORD

The authors of this report are all descended from John Hamilton and Catherine Kennedy. George Cook is a great grandson of their daughter Elizabeth. Margaret Loeffelbein is a great granddaughter of their daughter Catherine Ann, and Donald MacLean is a great grandson of their daughter Margaret.

The data used have been gathered intermittently over many years. George Cook undertook a comprehensive study of Arran immigrants to New Brunswick and in a supplementary project, he identified two and more generations of the numerous Hamilton families among them. His research provided a lot of the information in the Family Group Sheets appended. Margaret Loeffelbein copied the Kilbride Parish Register in its entirety, making its birth and marriage records available for careful study. She searched the records of many of the parishes of Ayr and Lanark, and gathered data about her branch of the family. Donald MacLean searched records at the New Brunswick Provincial Archives and at the Family History Library of the church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Saint John, New Brunswick. He also prepared the narrative and he takes sole responsibility for any errors in the interpretation.

INTRODUCTION

John Hamilton and his wife Catherine Kennedy emigrated from the Isle of Arran, County of Bute, Scotland to Blackland, Restigouche County (then part of Northumberland and later part of Gloucester County), New Brunswick in 1829. In that year, there was an exodus of Arran families to the shores of Chaleur Bay and to what is now Megantic County, Quebec. Most had been displaced through reallocation of land in their native island by the landowner, the Duke of Hamilton.

The system of land tenure on Arran and the changes in it which led to the forced emigration are described by MacKenzie (3) and McLellan (4). Traditionally, the arable land was divided into communal farms. Each had a principal tenant or tacksman who allocated work, collected annual rent from each family, and paid annual rent to the landowner. By 1775, communal farms numbered 99, mostly near the coast, and supported a total of 1,110 families. In that year, some division of farms was imposed, a program of substantially increasing rents begun, and a move toward individual tenants initiated. In 1815, a policy of increasing sizes of

individual holdings was adopted. As leases lapsed, that policy was vigorously pursued over the the next twenty years until the Duke's estate was divided into 458 family farms. Many of the former tenants became surplus population and were forced to emigrate.

Settlers from Arran began to reach the shores of Chaleur Bay as early as 1817 (7) and by 1829 many families were arriving. Most who came in the 1820's and 1830's were farmers evicted because they could not pay the greatly increased rents, but other economic troubles would seem to have caused the departure of John and Catherine Hamilton from their homeland. John was a weaver and initially his trade would have enabled him to earn high wages, but in 1807, the power loom was introduced into Scotland and by 1840, the hand loom had been replaced. Gradually, hand weavers found themselves without work and many were forced to emigrate, Hamilton-Edwards (2) p.24. It is likely that John and his family were among them.

FAMILY BACKGROUND

John and Catherine Hamilton came to New Brunswick from Kilbride Parish, the easterly of the two parishes of Arran. The old parish register for Kilbride does not record their marriage, although it records the baptisms of four of their six children of whom we are aware.

The several communal farms, listed above, on which John and Catherine resided, are now small communities.

The baptisms of Catherine Ann in 1808 and Elizabeth c1808 are not recorded by the Kilbride Parish register. (The register for the other Isle of Arran parish, Kilmory, was also searched.) Perhaps they were merely omitted as Hamilton-Edwards (2) mentions that old parish registers were sometimes carelessly maintained. But as John and Catherine had a propensity to move about, maybe the two daughters were born on the mainland. A search of many parish registers for Ayrshire and Lanarkshire failed to reveal records of them. Perhaps the records will be yet

found.

The only New Brunswick statistical data about John and Catherine, which we have found, are included in the 1851 census for the parish of Colbourne, Restigouche County. His age is given as 78 and hers as 77 suggesting birth dates of c.1773 and c.1774 respectively. But the authors have found that ages listed for individuals in the 1851 census are often several years in error and those data can be used for general guidance only.

Family history studies for Kilbride Parish are hindered by an unfortunate characteristic of that parish register. Although the records date from 1723, which is much earlier than many Highland parish registers, the names of the mothers are rarely included for baptisms before 1797.

Because there were few Kennedy families on Arran, Catherine can be identified with certainty despite the limitations of our data. She was a daughter of Daniel (Donald) Kennedy of Auchincarn.

In 1773, Donald Kennedy was the tacksman of the West Farm, one of the three farms in which the communal farm of Auchincarn had been divided, MacKenzie (3), p.364. He was apparently the son of Thomas Kennedy of Corrighills, Kilbride Parish, baptized February 18, 1724.

On October 27, 1763, Donald Kennedy was married to Catherine Nichol (McNicol), daughter of Alexander McNichol of Kilbride Parish, baptized in April 1743. Children resulting from that marriage, recorded in the parish register were:

Apparently Donald Kennedy had previously married Catherine Murchy in 1757. A daughter Isabel would seem to have been the only child of that marriage.

The parentage of John Hamilton was more difficult to determine.

The Old Parish Register for Kilbride records the following five baptisms of children named John Hamilton during the years 1769-1778.

John son of Alexander, shoemaker, May 17, 1769

John son of James, of Blairmoir, April 29, 1776

John son of John, of Knockenelly, October 26, 1776

John son of Patrick, of Mause, November 9, 1777

John son of James, of Mause, October 9, 1778

It is known that John born in 1769 was a businessman who emigrated to Dalhousie, N.B. in 1826, Cook, (1). The remaining four were initially considered to be possibilities. But Catherine's birthdate has been definitely established as 1771 and since the 1851 census suggests they were about the same age, it is highly unlikely that John would have been born as late as 1776.

It will be remembered that the two eldest children born to John and Catherine were named Mary and James. Since Mary was not named for her maternal grandmother, it seemed likely that she was named for her paternal grandmother, and it seemed likely that James was named for his paternal grandfather.

Between 1750 and 1780, six entries in the Kilbride Parish registers record the marriage of a James Hamilton, and in two instances the bride was named Mary. In 1762, James Hamilton married Mary McMaster and in 1768, James Hamilton married Mary Miller. It was postulated that one of those couples were the parents of our John Hamilton, but the Old Parish register for Kilbride could take us no further. The register for the adjacent Arran Parish of Kilmory was also checked but to no avail.

In those days, it was common for people to move to and fro across the Firth of Clyde between Arran and the adjacent mainland. Thus it was believed that missing records for the family could probably be found in old parish registers for the near-by county of Ayrshire. Searches were undertaken at the Family History Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in Saint John, New Brunswick. In all, records of eight contiguous parishes were read. The parishes and the years records began were: Ardrossan 1734, Dalry 1679, Irvine 1677, Kilbirnie 1688, Kilmarnock 1640, Kilwinning 1669, Stevenston 1700 and West Kilbride 1691.

Most of the old parish registers were read in their entirety for a concurrent family history project as well as for this study. But in some instances, reading was limited to years for which there might have been records to fill gaps between data which had already been found. It is believed, however that as far as this project is concerned, reading the registers for the eight Ayrshire parishes was exhaustive.

Initial success was the 1987 discovery of the record of the March 25, 1798 marriage of John Hamilton and Catherine Kennedy in the Parish of Stevenston. As Kennedy is primarily an Ayrshire name, it was thought that the record might be that of another couple. By the time of the search of the parish registers was finished, it was concluded that the record did in fact record the marriage of our John

and Catherine.

Availability of the 1987 International Genealogical Index (I.G.I.) at the Family History Library in Saint John led to the discovery of 1771 birth record of John Hamilton. He was in fact born to James Hamilton and Mary McMaster whose 1762 marriage in Kilbride Parish, Arran has been noted earlier. John was born in the parish of Irvine, Ayrshire on November 15 and baptized November 17, 1771.

Three additional children born to James and Mary are recorded in the Old Parish register for Irvine.

James born January 15, 1775

Susan born November 30 and baptized December 1, 1776

Margaret born August 27, 1779

James, born 1775, married Margaret Cumming, and they emigrated to Charlo, New Brunswick in 1830. They were accompanied by at least two members of their family, son James born in Kilmarnock in 1811 (11B) and daughter Mary born in 1819, Cook (1).

Perhaps there were children born on Arran to James Hamilton and Mary McMaster but because of the shortcomings at the Kilbride Parish register, this may never be known. Between 1745 and 1780, there were six marriages recorded in the parish, all between 1752 and 1768, with the groom named James Hamilton, and between 1762 and 1780., there were eighteen children born in the parish to James Hamilton. Clearly, without records which include the name of the mother, it is impossible to determine if the James and Mary marriage resulted in any children who were born on Arran.

McMaster was not a common name on Arran and only three children named Mary McMaster were recorded in the Kilbride register between its beginning in 1723 and 1800, and all three were born during the appropriate time period for our Mary.

Mary to John McMaster, schoolmaster, May 25, 1735

Mary to Alexander McMaster in Palister, February 3, 1740

Mary to Duncan McMaster, December 27, 1741

Apparently all survived to marry as the following marriages are recorded:

Thomas Hamilton and Mary McMaster, September 30, 1757

James Hamilton and Mary McMaster, July 17,

1762

John McCook and Mary McMaster, August 17, 1765

Since our Mary would seem to have been the second of the three to be married, it is probable that she was Mary, daughter of Alexander McMaster born in 1740.

In concluding this section, it should be recorded that our search for data about the Hamilton family included a review of the 1987 I.G.I. for the near-by counties of Renfrew and Lanark as well as Ayr and Bute. No entry could be found to supplement the data included above.

In New Brunswick

John Hamilton obtained, through a grant registered March 11, 1835, the ownership of 200 acre Lot 6 at Blackland, then in the parish of Addington, County of Gloucester (1). In that document, John is named John Hamilton Sr. and the reason behind that designation is interesting family history.

At the time, the appellations Sr. and Jr. meant older and younger but did not imply any family relationship between persons of the same name. There were at least four John Hamiltons among the pioneers in the area and one of them, a Dalhousie businessman, was known as John Hamilton Sr. On May 10, 1831, he petitioned the Lieutenant Governor for the lot at Blackland on which our John and his family had settled under the authority of the "ticket" issued to him as a settler. Our John learned that another person was attempting to obtain possession of his property, and although roads in New Brunswick were then in a very rudimentary stage, he travelled to Fredericton on foot, a distance of over 200 miles, to protect his interests. He succeeded. But perhaps it is significant that there was almost a four year interval between the John Sr. land petition and registration of the grant to John.

Within a few years, John and Catherine began to dispose of their property at Blackland. On January 18th 1838, they sold the western half of Lot 6 to their son-in-law William Cook for the sum of twenty two pounds and ten shillings. On October 18th 1841, they sold the easterly 50 acres of Lot 6 to their son William for the sum of fifty pounds, and on August 5th 1842, they sold to Peter Rigby of Dalhousie, the remainder of Lot 6 for seventy five pounds.

At least until this time, John continued to practice his trade as his occupation was given as "weaver".

On July 13th 1848, John petitioned for and subsequently obtained 90 acre Lot 25 in the second concession on the Charlo River about four miles from

his original grant. (A copy of that petition showing his copperplate signature is appended.)

On September 24th 1850, John and Catherine sold to their son William, Lot 25 for the sum of 40 pounds. That sale completed an exchange of properties as six days earlier John had purchased, for the same sum, from William and his wife Christine, one hundred acres which from the description would have to have been the eastern half of the "2nd tract" granted to James McPherson, also in the second concession. The listing of households, in the 1851 census for Colborne Parish, suggests that John and Catherine were residing there when the census was taken. At that time, both were listed as infirm.

The last record we have found of John and Catherine is the June 28th 1856 deed of their 100 acre property, to their grandson John Cook, which they sold for thirty pounds New Brunswick money. By then, John could no longer sign his name.

John and Catherine were dead by the time the 1861 census was taken.

FAMILY OF JOHN AND CATHERINE

Mary (1799 -)

Mary did not accompany her father and mother and her siblings to New Brunswick. The parish register for Kilbride Parish records, between 1817 and 1825, the marriages of four women named Mary Hamilton. It is probable that our Mary remained on Arran and that she was one of them.

James (1801 - 1873)

The 1851 census for Colborne Parish shows James coming initially to New Brunswick in 1829. On May 8, 1835, he purchased from David McNair, for the sum of twelve pounds, the forty three acres of Lot 7 at Blackland lying between the "Kings Road" and Chaleur Bay, and some time after his arrival in New Brunswick, he acquired Lot 6 at Nash Creek, about nine miles east of Blackland. By 1836, James was back in Scotland and in that year his father, through the authority of a power of attorney, sold that Nash Creek property on James' behalf to Charles Lindsay, a teacher, for the sum of twenty eight pounds.

In Scotland, James married his cousin, Catherine Kennedy, and their two eldest children were born there before he brought his family to New Brunswick in 1841 (12). James and Catherine made their home in Blackland the remainder of their lives.

In 1844, James purchased from Peter Rigby that

portion of his father's initial grant which Rigby had obtained from John and Catherine in 1842. In his will dated September 13th 1865, James bequeathed all his property to his wife Catherine and specified that, on her death, it was to go their son David (13).

Catherine Ann 1808-1880

A record of Catherine Ann's marriage, like that of her birth, has remained undiscovered. It is likely that she and her husband Hugh McKenzie, a native of Pictou County, Nova Scotia, were married by the Rev. James Waddell during his sojourn in New Brunswick. Mr. Waddell, another Nova Scotian who had studied at Pictou, began in May 1832, a two year ministry to the Presbyterian congregations of New Mills (including Blackland) and Bathurst (14). Although existing marriage records for the area (9) date from January 1832, no marriages performed by Mr. Waddell are included. Records of them are apparently lost.

Hugh and Catherine Ann were in Nova Scotia in 1833 as their eldest child was born there that year. The family was in Blackland by 1835 when their second child was born.

In 1837, Hugh purchased from Catherine Ann's sister Margaret and husband Angus McLean, the western half of Lot 9 at Blackland for the sum of forty five pounds New Brunswick money. There they made their home. In the winter of 1842, Hugh died tragically. He was caught in a blizzard, took off his coat and put it on his horse to protect the animal. He perished as a result. Catherine Ann stayed on the family farm the remainder of her life and raised her family there.

Elizabeth (c.1808-1863)

Elizabeth married William Cook who had emigrated from the Isle of Arran in 1829. They lived and farmed at Blackland having purchased 150 acres of Lot 6 which had been granted to her father. Following the death of her husband in 1853, Elizabeth and her children continued operating the farm. It remains in the family and author George Cook and his brother David are the present owners. It is also of interest that hewn timbers from the original Cook home were used to construct a utility building used by son William and later by a grandson Lesley. It stands today.

William (1812 -)

William was a tailor and a farmer. He married Christina Hamilton, of no known relationship, who

had come to Charlo from Arran in 1835, and like his parents, they moved several times during their married life. Initially they lived at Blackland on part of Lot 6 purchased from his parents. In October 1847, William and Christina sold that property to his brother-in-law William Cook and they moved to the second concession of lots at Charlo, near the lot on which Christina's parents had settled. In 1854, they moved to Eel River Cove in Dalhousie Parish following their purchase of the lower half of Lot E for the sum of fifty pounds. Financial problems beset William and he lost that property through a sheriff's sale in 1876.

In the last century, it was not unusual for deeds to go unregistered and no further property transactions are recorded for William and Christina. According to the listing of households in the 1881 census, it would seem that they were still living at Eel River Cove at that time and their son Hugh was residing with them. William and Christina are included in the 1891 census but they were living alone and they appear to have moved to Shannonvale, another Dalhousie Parish community.

Margaret (1815 - 1859)

At the age of eighteen, Margaret married Angus McLean who had come to the area as a small child in 1815. Initially Margaret and Angus lived on Lot 9, less than a mile toward Dalhousie from the Hamilton homestead) which Angus had purchased from his parents. In April 1839, Angus bought 208 acre Lot 1 of the "Blackland Estate" in Charlo from James McPherson Jr. for the sum of 60 pounds. Margaret and Angus lived there the remainder of their lives.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Information provided to author George Cook by his late aunt, Mrs. Myrtle (Cook) Maxwell and his late uncle Mr. Leslie Cook of Blackland is gratefully acknowledged. Three of their four grandparents were Hamiltons who had come with their parents to New Brunswick from Arran. Without the knowledge of Mrs. Maxwell and Mr. Cook about the Hamilton pioneer families, it is doubtful if any of the many Hamiltons, of the second and third generations, named Catherine, Elizabeth, Mary, Margaret, John, James or William could have been distinguished from one another.

Catherine, Mrs. Audrey Boyd of Lodi, California, is also gratefully acknowledged. She has undertaken research in Scotland and New Brunswick and results of her work have been available to the authors.

Notes on Conflicting Information about Andrew Sherwood and Martha Curry

I recently was given a copy of pages pertaining to Andrew Sherwood (UEL) and his first wife, Martha Curry, from Daniel Johnson's recent book on the Sherwood family¹, in hopes of resolving conflicting information I had accumulated over the years from other sources. In order to make some order of the various conflicts and their sources I decided to write them down to make analysis of the problem easier. This is the result.

Children of Joseph⁴ (Joseph³, Stephen², Thomas¹) Sherwood

Pickel² (p.6) says Joseph's children were Andrew, Justus, Adiah and Jonathan.

Mackenzie³ (2:610-613) says his children were Joseph, Joshua and Justus.

Hasbrouck⁴ (1:54) says one of Joseph's sons was Jonathan who married Phoebe Gerow.

Beyea⁵ (p.36) says Andrew, Jonathan, Justus and Adiah were brothers, but doesn't name their father.

Dickinson⁶ (2: 302-304) says William Thorne married about 1766 a daughter of Joseph Sherwood of Yorktown [then part of Cortlandt Manor] and named a son for his [Thorne's] brother-in-law Justus Sherwood.

Baird⁷ (p.442) says that this Joseph Sherwood was in Rye from 1741 to 1751, when he moved to Cortlandt Manor. He was still there in 1771. Other records⁸ show that in 1760 he was a Justice of the Peace, Treasurer, Pounder and Fence Viewer for the Town of Cortlandt Manor, and was on its tax list in 1779.

The Sherwood Genealogical Collection⁹, which is perhaps the most complete research on the descendants of Thomas¹ Sherwood, has no record of an Andrew⁵, son of Joseph⁴ Sherwood, nor of any other Andrew of the right generation.

Records of the Loyalist refugees who sailed from New York to New Brunswick in 1783¹⁰ show that Andrew and Justus both came with refugee unit 54 on the *Sally*, but that Jonathan came with unit 7 on the *Montague* and Obadiah [Adiah?] came with unit 36 on an unnamed ship.

Records of Loyalist claims¹¹ show that Adiah and Justus Sherwood were both from Cortlandt Manor, N.Y. and both submitted claims from Hammond River.

An extract from an unidentified document entitled "History of the Sherwoods" and relating Andrew Sherwood to be a "great, great grandfather to Gilbert Sherwood of the present time 1932" appears to be a digest of information similar to that in Beyea and Pickel, with one notable exception. It states: "The descendants of Justus Sherwood have a sort of foolish pride that causes them to claim no connection with us or any of Andrew's descendants."

Johnson (p.5 of Introduction, p.1) repeats Beyea's and Pickel's claims, but cautions that the connections of Andrew, Adiah, Justus and Jonathan Sherwood with each other and with Joseph are "tenuous". He says Andrew was born in 1738 and resided at Hempstead L.I. from 1741 to 1788. [It seems hardly likely that Andrew would have lived from age 3 in Hempstead if his father was the Joseph who lived after 1741, as noted above, in Rye and and Cortlandt Manor.]

In light of all the above evidence, I would say Johnson's caution is, if anything, understated. The ancestry of Andrew Sherwood, UEL is unproven and therefore unknown, as is his relationship with Adiah, Justus, and Jonathan.

Did Thomas¹ Sherwood come with the Pilgrims to Plymouth Colony?

Beyea (p.36) says Thomas was a Pilgrim follower of Brewster and Robinson at Scrooby, England who went to Holland and thence to New England.

Pickel (p.5) says he sailed from Ipswich in 1634 and landed at Plymouth.

"The Founders of New England"¹² says he and his family departed Ipswich "the last of April 1634" bound for New England.

Mackenzie (2:610) says they left Ipswich for Boston 21 April 1634.

Jacobus¹³ (1:548) says they came to Boston in the "Frances" April 1634.

Johnson says they departed Ipswich 10 April 1634 on the John Francis.

That Thomas Sherwood and his family left Ipswich in April 1634 is not in question. That he was a Pilgrim who came to the Plymouth Colony is surely in error. The Pilgrims came over in 1620 and a few years thereafter. In the very well documented history of the Pilgrims there is no record of a Sherwood in Scrooby, England or Leyden, Holland, or aboard the Mayflower or in the lists of inhabitants of the Plymouth Colony in 1623, 1627, 1634 and 1643¹⁴. His arrival in Boston is consistent with the large number of colonists who came to Boston during the "Great Migration" to the Massachusetts Bay Colony in the 1630's.

Notes on Conflicting Information about Andrew Sherwood and Martha Curry

The Wives of Thomas¹ Sherwood

Pickel (p.5) says his first wife was Alice ____ and his second wife was Mary Fitch.

Mackenzie (2:610) says his first wife was Alice Seabrook and his second wife was Mary ____.

Johnson (p.2 of Introduction) refutes both surnames. He says the wives were Alice ____ and Mary ____.

Jacobus (1:548) agrees with Johnson.

The erroneous surnames attributed to Thomas Sherwood's wives have long since been refuted in the literature. See for example *The American Genealogist*, 27 (1950): 156-159.

Ancestry of Martha Curry

Beyea (p.33) says she was a native of the City of Cork, Ireland who emigrated to New York with parents Richard and Martha Curry.

Pickel (pp. 6, 61, 62) says that Martha Currey (1739-1778) was a daughter of Richard Currey and Elizabeth Stivers who lived at Hempstead, L.I. until 1778. She married Andrew Sherwood in 1756. He transcribes the will of Richard Currey of Cortlandt, Westchester County, N.Y. dated 13 Feb. 1802, in which Currey bequeaths to (among others) "my daughter Martha's son Richard Sherwood", "the rest of my daughter Martha's heirs" and "my daughter Phoebe Sherwood". His sons Richard and Stephen are named as executors.

Mackenzie (2: 612, 613) says that Joshua⁵ (Joseph^{4,3}, Stephen², Thomas¹) Sherwood married both Martha and Phoebe Curry, leaving Phoebe as his widow. He noted that Martha was the daughter of Richard Curry.

Horne¹⁵ (pp.3-6) says Martha Currey, born c. 1748, was the daughter of Richard Currey (1709-1806) and Elizabeth Jones (c. 1712-1778), and she married John [not Andrew] Sherwood and had a son Richard. Richard Currey had another daughter Phoebe, born c. 1746, who married Joshua Sherwood. This Richard Currey was the son of Richard Currey (c. 1680-1722) and his second wife, Elizabeth Stivers. Both Richard Curreys were born in N.Y. He also tells us that Richard Currey and Joseph Sherwood were both appointed fence viewers in 1760 according to Cortlandt Manor Town Records.

Johnson (p.2) says that Martha Curry was both born in Cork, Ireland and daughter of Richard Curry and Elizabeth Stivers.

There are several inconsistencies in these accounts. The same Martha is unlikely to have been born 1739 and 1748 in Ireland to parents born in N.Y., to have been married to John, Joshua and Andrew Sherwood, to have had one mother (or perhaps mother and stepmothers) named Martha, Elizabeth Jones and Elizabeth Stivers. If born in 1748 she would not have married Andrew in 1756. Everything points to two or more Martha Currys. All that can be reliably said at this time is that the ancestry of our Martha Curry is unknown.

Burial Place of Martha Curry

Johnson says she died in N.Y and was buried at Smithtown Baptist Church [in N.B.], citing Dicks.

Julia Dicks, in a recent e-mail to me, denies being the source of that information. She believes that Martha is buried in N.Y where she died.

A memorial stone at the Smithtown Baptist Churchyard, of which I have a photograph, says that Andrew Sherwood is buried there, his [first] wife Martha Curry is buried at New York and his [second] wife Elizabeth Hampson McCready is buried at French Village.

I suspect a simple editorial error on Johnson's part. Martha is in all likelihood buried in N.Y. where she died.

Future Action

I intend to distribute these notes to other interested researchers who may have information that may resolve some of these discrepancies. I appeal to recipients to pass these notes on to other interested parties and to pass any pertinent information with appropriate citations back to me.

This list is compiled from information contained in Supplement No. 2, Annual Report of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, 1878, "Returns of Pilot Licenses, 1878". The spellings of both the family and given names are transcribed as found in the original documents. It is interesting to note that there were 44 licensed pilots in the Saint John District alone in 1878, and that they handled 258 barks and ships, 196 schooners, 109 brigs, and 8 steamers in that year; 40% were foreign (non British) owned. Miramichi District pilots assisted 240 vessels inward, and 241 outward in 1878, while the Restigouche District reported 29 vessels escorted between May 1st and September 17th of that year.

The Loyalist of Massachusetts

Editor's Note: This information is from the book "The Loyalists of Massachusetts Their Memorials, Petitions and Claims" by E. Alfred Jones. The book can be found at the Provincial Archives in Fredericton, NB..

Nathaniel Dickinson was a native of New England, settled on his estate at Deerfield, and because of his activity in opposing the rebel measures he was severely treated by mobs, who tied him up to be hanged and often threatened his life. In April, 1775, he fled for protection to Boston. He received the thanks of General Howe for killing a rebel at Bunker Hill; he remained with the British army throughout the war, serving in the Commissary General's department and frequently doing military duty and ever ready and willing to risk his life. For his loyalty he was named in the Banishment Act and his property confiscated and sold. His brother, Samuel, a warm loyalist, died at Deerfield, Massachusetts, in November, 1782, without a will. (A.O. 13/50; A.O. 12/10, ff. 188-195, 430-6).

With these memorials is a inventory of his personal estate, confiscated and sold by public auction, December 17, 1776, and the prices realised; several certificates relating to his property; and a certified copy of the expenses of the Deerfield Committee of Correspondence in selling his property, amounting to £298 16s and including £13 7s. paid to David Sexton for selling liquors at the auction. (A.O. 13/50)

According to his letter to Colonel Abijah Willard, dated form Carleton, New Brunswick, February 3, 1784, he valued his property at £25,000 in Massachusetts currency. (IB)

In 1786 he went to Deerfield to try to recover possession of his estate by failed.

This loyalist claimed £18,750 and was allowed £1,145. (A.O. 12/109). The property of his brother, Samuel, was in the possession of his sister (Hannah, wife of Colonel William Williams, a loyalist) and his claim for it was therefore, disallowed. (A.O. 12/61, ff. 54-5).

His grant of land in New Brunswick, September 14, 1784, is recorded in Book A at Fredericton.

Nathaniel Dickinson was the son of Samuel Dickinson and was born at Deerfield, October 7, 1734. (Sheldon, Hist. Of Deerfield, ii 713-4; Ex inform. Miss Emma S. Coleman).

John Lewis was appointed boatman at the Custom House, Boston, July 7, 1775. He left Boston with the British troops in March, 1776, for Nova Scotia, and thence to New York, where he bore arms as a volunteer in the Loyal Commissariat Volunteers, commanded by Major William Butler, who gave him a certificate of service. (A.O. 13/74) He was at Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1790. (A.O. 13/24).

The Diary of James Alexander Machum

1849, 1850, 1864

Jan. 7 1849

Mr. Wm. Burgess sen. aged 70 years, departed this life about 1 o'clock this evening - he will be buried in the burying ground on **Mr. Sharp's** place on the - 10th inst at 11 o'clock A.M. Sermon preached by the **Revd. Robert Temple**.

Jan. 18 (1849)

At Half past 4 o'clock P.M. **Elizabeth F. Inch** and I were joined in the bonds of wedlock at her father's, by the **Revd. Christopher Milner** - My Brother **James** and Miss **Sarah Ann Porter** being our attendants - There were about 60 persons in attendance. The day was clear and cold. On the 19th an exceeding cold day we, with a company of about 35 persons assembled at my father's where we remained till -the 21st Sabbath - when we went to her father's.

Jan. 31 (1849)

A **Mr. Johnson** who lived about 6 miles from **Gagetown** towards **Nerepis** went to **St. John** in the morning and at the same time sent two boys - the youngest being 10 years old - who were poorly clad - with a hand-sled to **Mr. Redstone's Mill** - a distance of 11 miles, for 35 lbs. Buckwheat flour. The day was very cold. - They got to **Mr. Redstone's**, got the flour and returned as far as a **Mr. Miller's** on the **Gagetown Road** where they went in and warmed themselves not having got any food from their leaving home - they left there and went some distance towards the **Oaknabog bridge** when the youngest began to get weary and faint and complained of being very hungry - he soon became unable to pursue his journey, when the elder brother undertook to get him and the flour both along but finding both more than he could convey at once - he would draw his brother a certain distance - then leave him and go back after the flour. Thus for a short time endeavoured to get homewards, but his brother, getting much overcome with hunger, fatigue and cold, began to perish in his hands notwithstanding all his exertions to prevent it - he then left the flour and started with his brother, and for some distance made all the haste possible by carrying him, but finding that he could not succeed in reaching a house before - to all appearance, he would be frozen to death, he laid him down upon the snow and then ran as fast as he could to the nearest house, **Mr. Brigg's** - when **Mr. B.** started and went back

along the road till he came to the frozen boy who was so stiff that **Mr. B.** could not carry him in his arms but had to carry him on his shoulder like a billet of wood he took him to **Mr. Waggoner's** where his mother had arrived in search of them and the boy being placed on his mother's lap gave two or three gasps and expired - Oh the anguish of heart the poor mother must have experienced! What troubles, trials, vexations, disquietudes, privations and distresses poverty brings upon its victims! This circumstance ought to be enough to draw forth sympathy from the breast of every humane and rational being. And to teach them that they should never neglect to give some nourishment to travellers, if in their power.

Feb. 15 (1849)

Moved into my own house - a beautiful day - I brought my trunks & moveables over from father's on Saturday 10th this being Thursday.

Feb. 17 (1849)

Old **Mr. Daly**, aged 75 departed this life - he was buried at the **Nerepis Church** - the **Revd. James Sullivan** preached the funeral sermon.

Feb. 27 (1849)

At 1/2 past 11 o'clock P.M. a fire broke out in **King Street St. John** and burnt until 5 o'clock next morning consuming all the buildings from a store on the **King's Square** known now as **Ansley's** flour store to **King Street** and then down **King Street** till **Germain Street** where its progress was stayed at the brick building belonging to **Mr. Moses Vernon**. It was supposed to originate from a bad chimney or stove pipe.

There is a rumour, said to be true, that a man from **Mill Stream** or **Sussex Vale** was returning from **St. John** with his horse and sled having 2 barrels of flour with him and was, arrested by two men who maltreated and abused him and then, after tying him fast to a tree (a very cold day) conveyed with the two barrels of flour leaving the horse and sled in the road and it was not till several hours afterwards that he was discovered, almost perished, yet having just strength enough to relate the circumstances of him being in that position, and on him being brought to the fire, he survived only a few minutes.

The Diary of James Alexander Machum 1849, 1850, 1864

Mar. 13 (1849)

Another destructive and calamitous conflagration took place this night in **York Point**. It is said that not less than 150 houses were consumed, turning about 800 families out of house and home. The part burned was the filthiest place in the Province of N.B. and chiefly inhabited by Papists.

Mar. 17 (1849)

Died at his own residence, **Nerepis**, about 9 o'clock A.M. **Mr. George Armstrong** age 72 years leaving a large circle of relations and friends to lament their loss. **The Revd.-C. Milne** attended the funeral, and read a sermon upon the the 30th chapter of Job, the 23 ver. "For I know that thou wilt bring me to death and to the house appointed for all living" There were a great attendance, some say not less than 300 - there were 28 teams affording conveyance from the house of mourning to the cemetery at **Mr. Thos. Graham's** - Buried on Monday, Mar. 19th, 1849.

Mar. 17 (1849)

Died at her father's residence, **New Ireland, Mary**, eldest daughter of **Mr John Matthews**, aged about 15 years -

May 18 (1849)

Died at his father's residence - below **Isaac McKeells**, eldest son of **Mr. Jas. Smith** a young man - about two months ago he had a fit of sickness occasioned it was thought by exposure to wet and cold together with oppressive labour - causing a spitting of blood, but he seemed to recover and got quite smart, till of late he took a swelling in the throat which broke, and as he was pacing the floor he asked for a draught of water which he drank and he had no sooner swallowed it, washing downwards some of the pus of the swelling than he fell on the floor a corpse. How uncertain is the life of man.

May 19 (1849)

Mr. Peatman Sen., Long Reach, Departed this life, about 3 weeks previous he and his daughter, a young girl, came out to Jerusalem in a waggon and as they were returning, beyond **Andrew Hamilton's**, the horse, becoming frightened by some part of the harness, giving away, thereby letting the carriage run against him, ran off, and the old man, losing his balance, fell out with his head upon some stone, mangling and bruising him most dreadfully - the young woman made out to keep in the waggon and the horse was stopped before he went far. **Dr. Peters** attended him. I heard that his skull was fractured considerably

June 15. (1849)

There has been and still is a very great drought, the atmosphere is uncommonly full of smoke being at sometimes so that persons half a mile distant cannot be discerned. On the eve of the 16th there was a little shower which cleared the air of the smoke and cooled the earth - July 20th the drought is still very great. The earth parched up causing the grass to be very short. On the 21st a little rain.

June 13. (1849)

Father had a house raised the dimensions of which are 36 by 26 and a kitchen at one end 18 by 16 feet - **Mr. Robert Letts** has agreed to do all the carpenter work of the same,

June 16. (1849)

Mr. Archibald Crawford Sen. died of dropsy. He lived without being married.

July 12. (1849)

Orange Lodges Nos. 4, 41 & 99, met at the Methodist Chapel, Jerusalem to whom the **Revd. James Taylor** preached a most excellent and appropriate discourse from Psalms 60.4 "Thous hast given a banner to them that fear thee, that it may be displayed because of the truth." After which a collection of 7/6 was taken for Mr. T No. 41 then escorted Nos. 4 & 99 to **Polley's schoolhouse** on their way home and then returned to **Mr. N. Inch's** and took dinner. After dinner part of No. 41 went to **Mrs. Holder's** in respect of her son who had gone to Canada, and she not being home but at **Mrs. Thos. Harrison's**, they went up there and walked twice round his house and then went down to the school-house and separated, after having spend the day (which was very warm and pleasant) in a very pleasant and agreeable manner. A great number of the brethren met in **St. John** and when going from **Indian Town** to **St. John** through **York Point** they were attacked by the Papists with stones and brick-bats on the street in front of two houses in which were a crowd of Papists with fire arms which they used, as well as they could, endeavouring to destroy the Orangemen, but thanks be to Providence, without much effect, only wounding two or three whereas there were large numbers of them, the Papists, killed and wounded - the Orangemen having noticed their intention to attack them, before they left Indian Town procured all the weapons of defence they could. They came off victorious as, providentially, they always do. There were only three Orangemen wounded by balls one of whom was considered dangerous. Whereas, the most

authentic account received, estimate the number of Papists killed besides a great many wounded to be at least 30 - The protecting arm of Omnipotence is exhibited, most clearly, in the preservation of the Orangemen in this instance. Thanks be to the Great I Am.

Sept. 19 (1849)

Mr. John Short, after an illness of only one week departed this life, aged 85 years, in the blessed hope of a glorious immortality - Seven years ago the 10th May last his first wife died aged 81 years since that time he (the deceased) married a **widow Weldon**, but they not living very agreeably for a while after marriage separated, and did not live together again.

Nov. 22 (1849)

Elizabeth, wife of **Mr. Wm. Reid**, (Reid?)

Schoolteacher, departed this life after an illness of only a fortnight of three weeks (dysentery). She was sensible to the very last minute and died without a struggle in full assurance of a glorious and blessed immortality. She was interred at **Little River**, the **Rev. B. Merritt** preached on the occasion from Rev. 14.13. "And I heard a voice from heaven saying, Write, blessed are the dead that die in the Lord. Yea, thus saith the Spirit for they rest from their labours and their works do follow them."

July 23 (1849)

A son of **Mr. Robt. Bulyea**, aged about 13 years, was kicked by a horse, yesterday evening, in the bowels, of which he expired this morning. How uncertain is our mortal existence!

The above diagram is a representation of circles and their position with regard to the Sun, on, Aug. 23rd 1849 at about 1 o'clock, P.M. as near as the eye could discern, as also their comparative magnitudes as near as I could judge. The circle of which the Sun was the centre was very brilliant, more so than any of the others: inside this circle appeared an ellipse. The circle whose circumference cut the sun ought I think be a little larger, say half an inch in radius, than I deem they would pretty nearly, represent their apparent or relative magnitudes.

It was truly the most singular appearance that I ever beheld. It was magnificently grand, showing very evidently the great wisdom of omnipotence.

The cause of circles being seen about luminaries is owing to the state of the atmosphere which is sometimes rare and sometimes dense.

Mar. 15 (1850)

Mrs. Mary Hoyt, relict, died at her son-in-law's **S. Short, Long Reach**, after but a few hours illness - She was buried at **Oak Point**, **Revd. J. Bartholomew** preached the funeral sermon.

At the time of the greatest scarcity during the **Siege of Derry** horse-flesh was sold for 1/8 per lb.; a quarter of a dog, fattened by the bodies of the slain Irish (beseigers) for 5/6, a dog's head 2/6, a cat 4/6, a rat 1/0 a mouse 6, Greaves by the lb. 1/0 Tallow 4/0 - Salted hides 1/0 and other things in proportion, their drink was water mixed with ginger and aniseseeds.

Feb 9 (1864)

Jas. W. Hutchinson died aged 16 yrs. on the 10th. **Isabella** aged 2 yrs, on the 12th, **Mary Jane**, aged 9 yrs, on the 16th, **Sarah Ann** aged 11 yrs. all of scarlet fever and rash. By the same disease **Robt. Brittain** had 3 died the eldest of whom was about 5 years. By the same disease. **Wm. Wallis** had 1 died aged about 9 yrs.

Feb. 26 (1864)

By the same disease **John Inch's Eliza** aged about 6 yrs.

Feb 25 (1864)

Of dyptheria **Mrs. John Kennedy** aged 26 yrs, left one child

Mar. (1864)

Died of Scarlet -Fever **Charles, 3rd son of John Inch**, aged about 4 yrs.

Apr. 15 (1864)

Old Mrs. Holder died aged 96 3/4 years.

Apr. 20 (1864)

Richard Folley (Polley?) died aged 84 years - he died rejoicing in hope of eternal glory.

Apr. 19 (1864)

Wm. McCutcheon married, to **Sidney Boyle** by **Revd. Theophilus Richey** It had been very cold for about a month past wind most from N. to E.

May 10 (1864)

Sam Machum's son William Jas. died of scarlet fever, aged 14 months, 20 days

May 11 (1864)

Sam Machum's son Samuel Alfred died of scarlet fever, aged, 39 months, 7 days (both buried in one grave)

The Diary of James Alexander Machum 1849, 1850, 1864

May 12 (1864)

George Lyon Sen. and his son **William** were both buried in one grave - on the 6th inst. they were both hurt at a raising by a bent falling backwards upon them

May 19 (1864)

Mrs. Hannah Jackson died, aged 84 years

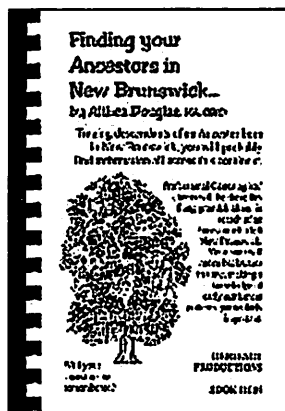
May 17 (1864)

A **Mr. Botsford Vail** of **Kingston K.C.** was killed by lightning and was found by his wife sitting under a bush. These two verses I composed and sent to be inserted after the death of Sam's two children:

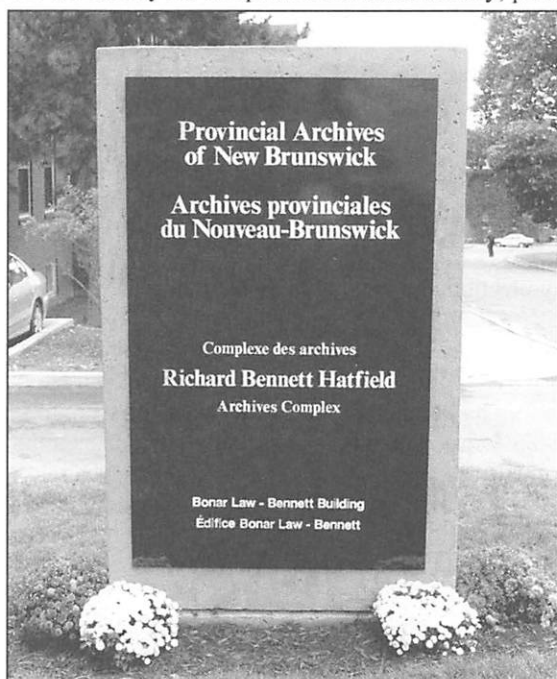

The Richard Bennett Hatfield Provincial Archives Complex Dedicated



On Friday, September 26, 2003, the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick officially opened its new, state-of-the-art facility for the province's documentary, pictorial, and electronic heritage.



Named in honor of Richard Bennett Hatfield, the 25th Premier of New Brunswick, the Provincial Archives

Complex combines the original Bonar Law-Bennett Building which has housed the Archives Storage Facility. The Provincial Archives Complex is located on the campus of the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton.

The Bonar Law-Bennett Building, the University's former library houses the Search Room, galleries for special displays, and administration offices. The Archives Storage Facility provides over 5000 square metres of new record storage space. It will hold approximately 30 kilometres of records! Special climate-controlled storage is provided for microfilmed records, moving image records. The renovations and new construction of the Archives complex took over one year and cost \$5 million.

The facility was officially dedicated by New Brunswick Premier Bernard Lord, Fredericton West M.L.A. Brad Green, and Bruce Hatfield, the nephew of Richard Hatfield. Premier Lord pointed out that Richard Hatfield had been New Brunswick's longest serving Premier, serving seventeen years from 1970

to 1987. Premier Hatfield, he said, played a significant role in the shaping of the Province.

The younger Mr. Hatfield, in an emotional speech, spoke of his late uncle's love for the people of New Brunswick. He said that, although the Hatfield family had not actively sought this dedication to his uncle, they considered it a suitable tribute to Richard Hatfield's memory.

Over 200 invited guests, including representatives of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society attended the dedication of the new facility and the reception that followed.

The repository is -- essentially a huge fire-proof, environmentally-controlled safe. The architect met the challenge of humanizing a 10,000 square foot pre-cast concrete box that was over 3 stories tall, respecting the architecture of the Bonar Law-Bennett building, choosing a similar material palette including red and orange brick, glass block, and sandstone details. The strings of horizontal orange brick between the pilasters on the exterior symbolize the levels of shelves in the storage vault, while the alternating courses of vertical brick correspond to the individual document boxes in their organized rows. The wide overhanging roof of the storage facility shelters the upper cornice, which is clad in a band of interlocking metal tiles and huge carved sandstone medallions which spell out ARCHIVES and ARCHIVES - a bilingual crown which is both an indicator to the public of the building's function and an enormous logo.

It resembles a Greek temple - classical, important, and substantial, certainly a structure that conveys the value and permanence of archives.

Biography - Richard B. Hatfield



Richard Bennett Hatfield was born in Woodstock, N.B., on April 9, 1931. He was exposed to politics in his early childhood since his father, Heber Hatfield, served as mayor of Hartland and represented the riding of Victoria-Carleton in the House of Commons from 1940 until his death in 1952.

Raised in Hartland, Richard Hatfield was educated at Hartland High School and Rothesay Collegiate School. He attended Acadia University and graduated in 1952 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He obtained his Bachelor of Law degree from Dalhousie University in 1956. Admitted to the Bar of Nova Scotia in 1956, he practised law for six months in Truro, Nova Scotia.

During 1957-58 he served as executive assistant to Gordon Churchill, the federal Minister of Trade and Commerce in Ottawa. He returned to Hartland in 1958 to assume the position of sales manager for Hatfield Industries Ltd., the family potato chip business.

In 1961 he was elected to the Legislative Assembly in a by-election and he was re-elected in 1963 and 1967 to represent Carleton County.

On June 14, 1969, he was chosen Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party of New Brunswick. In the general election held on Oct. 26, 1970, he led his party to victory over Louis Robichaud's Liberal Party. On Nov. 12, 1970, at the age of 39, he was sworn in as the 25th person to serve as Premier of New Brunswick. His Progressive Conservative government was re-elected in 1974, 1978 and 1982, for a total of four consecutive terms spanning 17 years, which makes him the longest serving premier in New Brunswick's history.

Hatfield was defeated in the 1987 general election, the reign of his Progressive Conservative government coming to an end with the loss of every seat in the Legislature. Following the loss, he resigned as leader of his party. On Sept. 7, 1990, he was appointed to the Senate of Canada by then Prime Minister Brian Mulroney. Richard Bennett Hatfield died in Ottawa on April 26, 1991, at 60 years of age.

During his terms as premier, Hatfield's accomplishments were many, both on the national stage and at home in New Brunswick. At the federal level, he played a very active role from the Victoria Constitutional Conference in 1971 to the Meech Lake Accord in 1987. He was dedicated to the promotion of national unity, and he played an important role with his support of the patriation of the Canadian Constitution and the establishment of a Charter of Rights and Freedoms. His efforts led to the inclusion of the right to minority language education and a clause regarding equalization in the Constitution Act, 1982. He strongly supported amendments to the Indian Act for the purpose of reinstating the right to equality of Aboriginal women in Canada. On April 17, 1982, following the proclamation of the Constitution Act, 1982, he was sworn in as a member of the Queen's Privy Council.

Hatfield was a strong believer in regional cooperation and he was a founder of the Council of Maritime Premiers and the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission. He also played a very active role in relations with Quebec and the neighboring state of Maine as well as the other New England States.

His contributions to his home province are highlighted by his work towards equality among the French and English-speaking people of New Brunswick. His government consolidated the Robichaud program of Equal Opportunity and implemented the Official Languages Act. He is credited with giving more political recognition to

Acadians and he played a major part in solidifying the relationship between the Acadian people in Atlantic Canada and their English-speaking neighbours. He supported strongly the establishment of Le Village historique acadien, and le Centre Marin de Shippagan. School boards were reorganized based on linguistic lines and the government constructed centres scolaires-communautaires to ensure that francophone minorities in mainly anglophone cities would have access to education in their own language. During his tenure as premier, the structure of the Université de Moncton was changed to ensure the continued presence of campuses in all three of the francophone regions of the province. The Act Recognizing the Equality of the Two Official Linguistic Communities in New Brunswick will remain an important part of the Hatfield legacy.

In the health field, his government implemented a major program of construction of new regional hospitals was undertaken in Saint John, Fredericton, Campbellton and Moncton where the existing Moncton City Hospital was extensively renovated and the Dr Georges-L-Dumont was built with both a regional and provincial mandate to serve the francophone population. The highly innovative Extra-Mural Hospital program was also instituted.

The period featured major construction projects such as the nuclear power plant at Point Lepreau and the Province participated in major urban renewal projects including Market Square in Saint John.

In 1975, he spearheaded the establishment of New Brunswick Day and in 1984 he commissioned a new coat of arms (armorial bearings) for New Brunswick to coincide with New Brunswick's bicentennial. He was responsible for the creation of the Youth Council of New Brunswick, the Premier's Advisory Committee on the Arts, the Advisory Council on the Status of Women, and the Premier's Council on the Status of Disabled Persons.

He was responsible for New Brunswick's membership in the Organisation Internationale de La Francophonie, an Association of French speaking nations, which New Brunswick joined in 1977 and for the twinning of New Brunswick with Le Département de Vienne in France, the area where most Acadians originated.

His political reforms include the Political Process Financing Act, the Public Purchasing Act, the Crown Construction Act and the Right to Information Act. Smaller single-member ridings replaced multi-member ridings thus bringing elected representatives closer to their electorate.

He was a director of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews and an honorary member of both the executive of the New Brunswick Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society and the Provincial Council of the Boy Scouts of Canada.

He received honorary Doctor of Law degrees from the four universities in New Brunswick and an honorary Doctor of Political Science from the Université Sainte-Anne in Nova Scotia. He received the honorary title Chief Rolling Thunder from the Micmac-Maliseet Nations, the Canada-Israel Friendship Award and (posthumously) the Leger Comeau medal from la Société Nationale de l'Acadie.

His interests included travelling, throughout Canada and the world, and heritage preservation, as he was an active participant in the Carleton County Historical Society. This latter interest was revealed early in his career. In his very first speech in the Legislative Assembly as an MLA, he proposed the establishment of a committee to direct renovations to the decor and furniture of the Legislative Assembly Building. The 1980s restoration and refurbishing of the historic 1882 Legislative Assembly chamber was a testament to his commitment to heritage preservation.

He was an admirer and recipient of various works of art and a promoter of Canadian artists and their work. As a result of his wishes, the Senator Richard Hatfield Memorial Fund was established by the Beaverbrook Art Gallery in New Brunswick. The fund supports both the acquisition of Canadian works of art by the Gallery and the outreach program, which enables the Gallery to share its collection with schools and with other galleries across the province. Richard Bennett Hatfield was invested into the Order of New Brunswick (posthumously) in 2002 by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

From Ballyshannon to New Brunswick

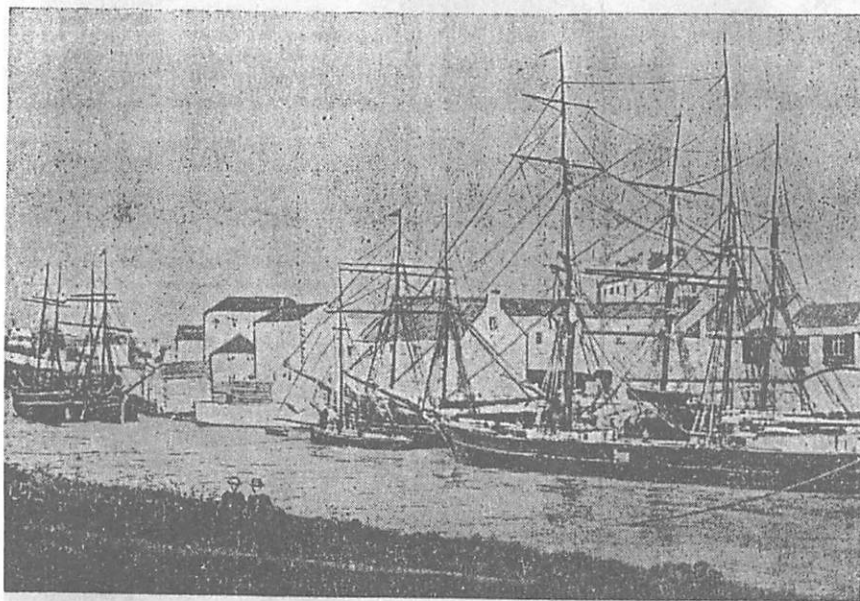
Recently, however, a group of interested persons in our own locality have come together and formed the 'Ballyshannon Local History Society'. I, myself,

Bringing it all back home



When Ballyshannon man John Cronin published an article in a Canadian magazine some months ago, he inadvertently re-opened emigration links first forged in the mid 1850's when Donegal folks left for the new frontier on the cargo sail ships which once lined the quay at Ballyshannon.

In those days, John Myles Ltd. operated from the Mall Yard, with shipping quarters at the Old Bond Yard. He quickly brokered a thriving timber trade with Canadian firms and it was not uncommon to see vast sailing ships like the Viking crawl up the estuary laden with tonnes of finely planed timber.

Nor was it unusual to see local people gazing quietly from the decks of these ships as they breezed away from the quay, ushering them to the new world, the unknown.

'Generations', a publication based in New Brunswick, Canada, ran an article concerning these emigrant sail ships which transported many Donegal migrants to the Canadian province.

Since he published the article, John Cronin has had a number of letters from Canadians whom, it seems, are highly aware of their Donegal ancestry.

'My great-grandfather, John Green, was a master mariner and came from Ballyshannon', wrote Janet Reed from St. John, New Brunswick.

NAMED SHIP "THE ROCK"

'I understand the Rock was his home and we always thought that his was the name of the ship but I have no proof of this', she continues.

John Cronin subsequently traced her lineage to Jim Green, from

Lurgan, Rosstown, who believes that his home is the original Green household. The family, however, did own several houses on the Rock.

Mr. Cronin also received a letter from Leonard Cooper, Fredericton, who sought information on a Bogle family who originated in Mountcharles.

Again, the historian successfully tracked the Canadian's relatives and last week he wrote to Mr. Cooper informing him that he had cousins in Mountcharles and Belleek.

He has maintained regular correspondence with both parties and firmly believes that a large number of New Brunswick residents, particularly those from the St. John area have direct links with Ballyshannon and nearby areas in South Donegal.

New Brunswick, formerly part of Nova Scotia, grew up around shipbuilding and lumbering. In the nineteenth century, thousands of people scattered themselves around the province after arriving on the sail ships.

A quarantine station was established at St. John.

NO RECORDS

Despite considerable efforts, all attempts to unearth accurate records on sailing charters from Ballyshannon quay have failed. It is impossible to estimate how many left.

But the letters John Cronin received has convinced him that Ballyshannon and St. John should develop official relations.

The above picture captures the quay on an average day around 1885. The most prominent ship is the Viking. It is now obviously defunct as a trading port but its structure is basically the same and it is interesting to think that for many people, the quay was the last they saw of Ireland, as they drifted somewhere distant with the musty smell of timber still heavy in the air.

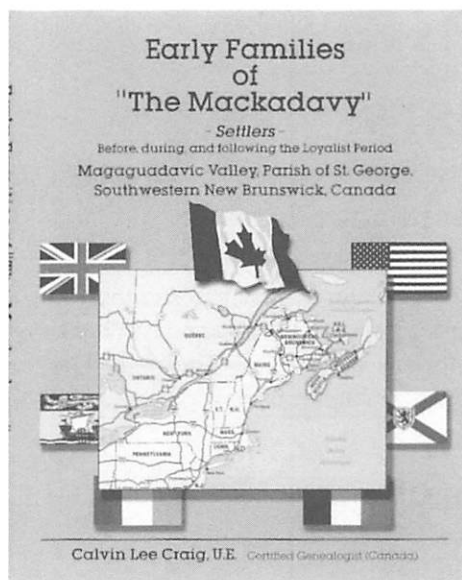
