

LETTER OF INSTRUCTION TO GOVERNOR THOS, CARLETON,

(Canadian Archives, Series C. Vol. 718, page 1.) (Duplicate No. 21.)

White Hall, 8th February, 1793.

SIR: C I have received the King's commands to signify to you his majesty's pleasure that you instantly take the necessary steps for raising and forming from amongst the inhabitants of New Brunswick a corps not exceeding 600 men.

to be divided into six companies, with the usual establishment of commissioned and non-commissioned officers; and his majesty is graciously pleased to allow you to command this corps, but without any pay in consequence thereof, and you are also to understand that neither yourself nor any other officer, to whom commissions shall be granted, are to be thereby entitled to any rank in his majesty's army, or to any half-pay in right of such commissions, whenever the corps may be reduced hereafter, it being his majesty's intention that the corps in question should be merely provincial and for the service of New Brunswick only, subject, however, at the same time, to the control and orders of the commander-in-chief of his majesty's forces in North America, or to such others as in his majesty's wisdom he may think proper to give. Should you be of opinion that you will not be able to complete six companies of one hundred men each, as above mentioned, you will in the first instance grant only such commissions as may be requisite for a less number of companies, and afterwards to increase the same to the full number of six, if your success in raising the corps warrants you so doing. I am likewise to signify to you that the commissions are to be granted to such only of his majesty's officers as are at present upon half-pay, and are now resident in New Brunswick, or in such other of his majesty's North America Governments as will permit of their immediate presence, and who will in consequence of what I have already mentioned retire again upon their half-pay upon the eventual reduction of the corps.

In appointing the officers for the above corps (exclusive of such whose names I shall herewith inclose, and upon whose appointment I have received the King's pleasure) his majesty relies upon your judgment and fidelity in selecting without favour or partiality such as from their military talents, character and good conduct, and their attachment to his majesty's person and government, will best promote the honor and credit of the service.

With regard to the pay and subsistence of this corps, it is his majesty's intention that it should be the same as is allowed to the regular established troops, and you will accordingly draw on the lords of the treasury for the levy money and subsistence of this corps in case of money not being sent to you from hence for that purpose.

Directions will be sent by this packet from his majesty's master-general of the ordnance for issuing out of the stores, now remaining at Halifax or New Brunswick, such arms and ammunition as you shall require for the corps in question. Clothing and such other articles as appear to be necessary will be sent as early as possible.

As it may tend to facilitate the speediest completion of the corps, I take this opportunity of observing that, whenever it may be judged expedient to withdraw the present order with respect to granting lands in New Brunswick, the services of such of the corps as are now without grants will be considered.

I rely, with confidence, on your being as economical as possible in respect to the levy money which may be granted. (and which should not, I conceive, exceed two guineas a man, the sum heretofore given on a similar occasion by the late Governor Legge in Nova Scotia, and also in respect of every other expense incidental to the service in question. In granting the levy money you will take particular care that as much of it as possible should be delivered to each private in necessaries usually worn by soldiers on service, independent of their clothing, etc.

You will likewise take this opportunity of maturely considering the best and most economical mode of subsisting the corps, and how far and upon what terms the same can be done within the Province under your government, particulars of all which you will communicate to me by the very first opportunity.

MEMORANDUM FROM THE WAR OFFICE, LONDON.

The Muster Rolls of the New Brunswick Corps, 1793-7, seem to show that the regiment in question was raised in 1793 and disbanded in 1797.

This, however, proves not to have been the case, for although the Regiment was raised in 1793, as shown by the evidence of the Muster Rolls, confirmed by the General Monthly Return, Canada, May, 1793, the fact that the Muster Rolls end in 1797 is really due to a gap in the series, since the Colonial Correspondence clearly shows that the Regiment was in existence down to August, 1802.

The history of this Corps can be traced in some detail from the Colonial Correspondence, New Brunswick, above referred to, from which it appears that the authority for raising it is found in a letter from the Secretary of State to Lieut.-Governor Thos. Carleton, dated 8th February, 1793. In his dispatch of 26th April, 1793, Governor Carleton states that he will proceed immediately with recruiting, and on 8th July, he writes that 200 men have already enlisted.

From this date to August, 1802, the Governor forwarded monthly returns of the state of the Regiment, and after that date there is correspondence relative to the disbandment of the Corps (which was superseded by the 29th Regiment), and grants of land to the members.

The General Monthly Return, North America, October, 1802, contains a note that the Regiment was finally disbanded the 14th August, 1802.

The New Brunswick Corps was raised again (after the renewal of the war) in 1803. It was now known as the New Brunswick Fencibles, and seems to have been connected with the 104th Regiment of the line raised in April, 1793. This later Corps existed down to the end of the war, 1816. Vol. 3, of the Colonial Correspondence, New Brunswick, containing the order of 8th February, 1793, for

raising the original Corps, in which its establishment and duties are set out at great length, can be inspected at the Public Record Office.

"The King's New Brunswick Provincials" is also referred to in two appendices to the 31st report of the Select Committee on Finance, 1798.

Pilasters, arches, pyramids, and cones, Turrets enriched with porticos and domes; In artless order, C formed by surge and spray, And crystalline-garnet hues their rich array: A dazzling cascade ground throughout the whole Strikes deep with pleasure the enraptur'd soul, Finis, 1798.

*These Falls, are 210 miles from the mouth of the river, and the great one is said to be 66 feet perpendicular. There are several others just below it, of different descents.



Bulging the border at the Jolicure Old Presbyterian Cemetery The Père Lachaise Sculpture - Dennis Gill

"Situated on the Jolicure Road ... this small cemetery has a very rich history." So wrote Eldon Hay in an article entitled "The Jolicure Old Presbyterian Cemetery," <u>Generations</u> (Fall 1994), 15. <u>That</u> article attempted to bring to light some of the past, the history - the fact that, for instance, the cemetery site was the setting for one of the first Covenanter churches in New Brunswick, erected in 1833. Before the building of the church, burials took place - among them Charles and Abigail Oulton. Their tombstone reads:

Charles and Abigail Oulton who departed this life her on the 8th of September 1826 in the evening and him on the 9th in the morning The difference between their deaths was five hours Him in the 82nd year of his age her in the 77th

The present-day chair of the cemetery committee is R.G. Douglas Oulton. He and several others are direct Oulton descendants - Brian Bowser, Emily Dixon and Stephen Oulton.

This present day story begins in early 1999, at the time when I, Eldon Hay, was chair of the cemetery committee. I received a phone call from sculptor Dennis Gill. At the time, Dennis was living in Dwight, Ontario. Halifax born, in 1950, Gill had lived in Jolicure from 1982 to 1990, then taught at the Nova Scotia College for Arts and Design in Halifax, before moving to Ontario. Dennis had never lost his affiliation with the geography and people of Jolicure, and he wanted to give something back to the community. Gill was interested in purchasing a graveyard plot in the Jolicure Old Presbyterian cemetery. The object of purchasing the plot was to place a sculpture on it. To secure partial funding for the sculpture, Gill had made application to the New Brunswick Arts Council. Preliminary arrangements had been made with Tingley Monuments of Amherst, NS, to fabricate the sculpture.

Later, in a letter to the cemetery committee, Gill expanded on his thinking and his objectives: "My vocation for the past twenty years has been that of a working sculptor. It represents for me a way to express my thoughts about a variety of human concerns and to make a social contribution by doing so ... When I lived in Jolicure in the 1980s I ... felt at home with my neighbours and with the landscape." Gill went on to explain that much of his work had centred upon the commemorative aspects of monuments and memorials. Previously, he had been awarded a federal government scholarship to study grave site carvings in Père Lachaise cemetery in Paris. That experience was intimately bound up with the sculpture Gill proposed for the lot in the Jolicure Old Presbyterian cemetery.

The local committee needed to do some homework about the Père Lachaise cemetery. Briefly, Father La Chaise was a French Jesuit, born in France in 1624, dying in Paris in 1709. Confessor to King Louis XIV, he was opposed to the use of persecution against the Protestants. He established an abbey in Paris about 1680; the land on which the abbey was situated became the first public cemetery in Paris when the land was expropriated in 1802. The name of the priest, La Chaise, seems to have become elided, and the burial ground is called the Père Lachaise Cemetery (though both spellings are utilized). The contemporary and much enlarged Père Lachaise cemetery is full of the rich and famous of the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries. As Gill wrote, "some of the world's most influential artists, writers, dancers, philosophers, scholars, scientists and theologians are remembered here." Among many others, Frédéric Chopin, Oscar Wilde, Edith Piaf and Gertrude Stein. Obviously, study and research in that cemetery had made a deep impression on the heart and soul of sculptor Dennis Gill.

Dennis himself wrote: "Graveyards are the places we return what has been the gift of human life. We do this to acknowledge both the sanctity of life and the belief in the transition to a hereafter. In doing so we additionally create a shadow community that for many is neither gone nor forgotten ... We choose stone, one of nature's most permanent materials to represent a belief in life everlasting and to announce to future generations, those who came before us." Further, "to be able to place the representation of Père Lachaise cemetery upon a plot within Jolicure cemetery, strikes me as a fitting tribute to the idea that even the greatest of human contributions all open and close upon this earth."

The cemetery committee was grateful for the offer by Dennis Gill: there was appreciation for Gill's desire to honour Jolicure, and for the spiritual nature of the proposal. There was also a recognition that the sculpture would

be around for a long time, with little or no maintenance required. On the other hand, there were concerns. How to effect the connection between the Père Lachaise cemetery in Paris and the location of the sculpture in the Jolicure Old Presbyterian cemetery? Whereas the conventional tombstone structure indicates that a person (usually from the area) is buried there; the proposed sculpture is different from the natural connection. The committee asked Gill for a response on that matter. Further, there was a request that his name be on or near the proposed sculpture - perhaps a small bronze tablet near the sculpture would help.

Dennis Gill responded to the committee's request: he shared their concern - the need to provide information that would allow suitable access to the sculpture entitled Père Lachaise. Dennis sent a statement which he hoped would help make clear the connection between the Père Lachaise sculpture and the Jolicure Old Presbyterian Cemetery. Gill proposed that the statement be on a marker or panel placed near the sculpture, of a size large enough to hold the statement. The panel would not compete with the sculpture, it would indeed offer an interesting contrast to the polished sculpture. And Gill's name would be included.

Dennis Gill's fully revised proposal: a sculpture and an interpretative panel - the sculpture's brief inscription would be in English and French, the longer panel statement would be in English only. The name D. Gill would be on both the sculpture and the panel.

Yet the restiveness remained; nay, it increased. Dennis Gill saw and sculpted a significant connection - through his own creative and artistic genius he was the living link between the Paris Père Lachaise and Jolicure Old Presbyterian cemeteries. But the committee had a difficult time making the connection. Committee members were not opposed to the sculpture itself, but a growing number were finally opposed to its being placed in the cemetery: in the view of the majority, the proposed sculpture did not do homage to the persons buried there.

Jolicure is a small community, the differences within the committee became well known - the matter never came to a vote. There was an impasse - appreciation for the offer, but the gift did not fit. Just then, a possible way out.

The land surrounding the Jolicure cemetery is owned by Thaddeus Holownia (a deed for the cemetery itself has never been located). Thaddeus Holownia is a well known New Brunswick photographer, with an international reputation (www.holownia.com). Holownia was a member of the cemetery committee. Moreover, the teen age children of Thaddeus Holownia and Gay Hansen had mowed the grass in the cemetery for some time. Holownia proffered an additional gift: the sculpture could be placed on his land on the immediate outskirt of the present graveyard.

When the committee met, the gift of Holownia was overwhelmingly and gratefully accepted; and Gill was likewise pleased.

In the summer of 1999, the work was done by Tingley Monuments; both sculpture and panel placed just beyond the line. One reporter noted that there were "two cemeteries side by side." Actually, although the border bulged at one point, the Père Lachaise sculpture and its accompanying interpretative panel sit seamlessly beside the original graveyard.

The matter seemed settled, and it was settled, until 2003: Then, a glitch.

Although some of the payment for the sculpture had been made, an amount remained; and Dennis Gill's circumstances did not permit the outstanding sum to be fully paid. The only option seemed to be - Tingley Monuments would remove the sculpture. Enter John Matthews, sales manager of Tingley Monuments. If at all possible, Matthews wanted to avoid repossession. He wondered if there might be some persons or group committed to maintaining the integrity of the sculpture. Dennis knew of Eldon Hay's interest; might Hay be approached to see what might be done? Matthews named a figure that would save the sculpture; Dennis agreed to pay part of that total sum.

Still a member of the cemetery committee, though no longer its chair, Eldon Hay consented to investigate, and consequently conducted a canvass. Rev. Kevin Stockall, some of whose forebears are buried in the Jolicure Old Presbyterian Cemetery, and rector of St. Paul's Anglican in Sackville, agreed to assist. Some dozen plus individuals were contacted: and the necessary funds were raised to secure the integrity of the Père Lachaise sculpture.

A description of the two – the sculpture and the panel.

The Père Lachaise sculpture is approximately 40" x 40", of polished black granite, roughly 8" thick, situated on its flat, on a bed of crushed rock. As noted, it is a scale representation of the geographic outline of the Père Lachaise Cemetery in Paris. On the flat of the sculpture, this inscription, in capital letters, reads:

PÈRE LACHAISE - 1803

THE OLDEST PUBLIC CEMETERY IN PARIS TAKES ITS NAME FROM THE PRIEST WHO ORIGINALLY ESTABLISHED AN ABBEY UPON THE SITE CIRCA 1680. BY COINCIDENCE THE GEOGRAPHIC OUTLINE OF THE CEMETERY BEARS RESEMBLANCE TO A MAN'S STYLIZED PROFILE.

PÈRE LACHAISE - 1803

LE PLUS VIEUX CIMITIÈRE DE PARIS TIENT SON NOM DU PRÊTRE QUI Y A AVAIT ÉTABLI UNE ABBAYE AUX ENVIRONS DE 1680. PAR COINCIDENCE LES CONTOURS DU TERRAIN DÉCRIVENT LE PROFIL STYLISÉ D'UN HOMME.

The interpretative panel. Directly beside the sculpture, it is an upstanding monument, the text sandblasted into the polished face of an undressed block of gray granite. The panel is 30" high, 28" wide, 5" thick at the top, widening to 20" at the base, on the ground. On the polished surface of the panel this inscription, in capital letters:

PERE LACHAISE - THE SCULPTURE

THE ORIGINS OF SCULPTURE ARE FOUND IN THE ART OF THE TOMB AND EVIDENCED IN ALL CULTURES IT IS TO THIS HISTORY OF COMMEMORATIVE GESTURE THAT MUCH OF MY OWN WORK PAYS HOMAGE AND SERVES TO CELEBRATE

THE DESIRE TO PLACE ART WORKS INTO THE WORLD OF THE LIVING IRONICALLY PERHAPS HAS FOUND ARTISTS OVER MANY GENERATIONS LOCATING THEM WITHIN THE GRAVE YARD.

MY SCULPTURE OF PERE LACHAISE IS AT ONCE A REPRESENTATION OF A CEMETERY AND BY COINCIDENCE THE PROFILE OF A MAN ALTHOUGH NOT THE LIKENESS OF FATHER LACHAISE FOR WHOM THE CEMETERY WAS NAMED

THE TURN OF THIS CENTURY WITNESSED PROFOUND CHANGES IN THE MANNER BY WHICH RELIGION ART AND SOCIAL POLITICS WERE TO BE PERCEIVED NEVERTHELESS ONE OF THE PRIMARY FUNCTIONS OF ART HAS BEEN AND CONTINUES TO BE A LINK BETWEEN THE PAST AND THE PRESENT TO SPEAK TO EACH NEW GENERATION IN THE LANGUAGE OF THE TIME ABOUT THE TIMELESSNESS OF THE HUMAN EXPERIENCE

As noted at the outset of this article, the Jolicure Old Presbyterian Cemetery has a very rich history. The Père Lachaise sculpture and panel add to that richness. Some day, come to Jolicure to see this remarkable work.

My Grandparents were British Home Children

I grew up not knowing my mother's parents. Only later in life did I even find their names – Harry Guest and Rose Blake, both were British Home Children.

Harry was sent from the Middlemore Homes in Birmingham, England on the SS Siberian in 1898 age 6 years and Rose was also from the Middlemore Homes and on the same ship, but in 1905 aged 10 years. They were both sent to work for a farm family in Harvey, York Co. NB. They never married, but in 1912 my mother was born. They both had to leave the farm they worked on, so Harry went to work for the railway and Rose was taken in by a Hebert family.

When my mother was born, Rose was not able to care for her and she was sent to a family near Saint John, NB, where she lived until her marriage. Sometimes she gave her surname as Guest and sometimes as the family name where she lived.

My mother would never discuss the circumstances of her birth or her parents, so after her death my search began. I knew that my mother's parents weren't married, but I had no idea that my grandparents were British Home Children

In the 1901 Census I found Harry living with a family in York County, NB listed as a 'lodger' age 5 from England, so this was a hint that he was a Home Child and I began to look for his records. After leaving the farm in York County he worked for the railway and in 1915 enlisted in the Army and was shipped to England. He looked up his birth mother and changed his 'next of kin' on his army records from a friend in York County to his mother Amy O'Boyle, Stourbridge England. He was sent to Europe and was killed in battle on 10/06/1916 age 24.

Finding Rose was a bit harder, but mostly by talking to people about my research I was referred to Muriel Price, who was a daughter of the Hebert family that took Rose in when she was expecting my mother. I found that the Hebert family and the local doctor helped her and found a placement for her child, my mother. These people also helped her to go to Boston, USA to train as a nurse and as far as I know she didn't see my mother again. Rose married and later moved to Nova Scotia and had a family and died there in 1971 age 77.

From several interviews with Muriel Price I found that Rose visited the Herbert family often and at one time returned to York County to nurse her benefactor when he was ill. When my family's home was being cleared out I found a picture of Harry and was also able to obtain a picture of Rose. My mother never knew her parents and as a result neither did I, so all my life I was confused as to who I was. After the research and getting the records from the Middlemore Homes I felt better. I have written the story in detail for my children.

The Bennison Family in New Brunswick

We need to verify that Edward Bennison, Sr., and his wife, Deborah Matilda Lunt, had their 10 children in New Brunswick after the Revolutionary War. Their first child, Robert Strong Bennison, was born on December 11, 1811 followed by 9 siblings.

Robert's brother, Edward Bennison, Jr., married Marion Barnes of Newfoundland, fathered 7 children, and then sometime before 1860, was perhaps forced to leave New Brunswick because of religious differences. This to me seems extraordinary. Unfortunately, we do not know the Bennisons church nor what the difficulties might have been. We do know that many of the Bennison family remained in New Brunswick and were found in the 20th century. My guess as to church attendance would be Presbyterian or Anglican.

We would greatly appreciate **anything** you might find on this family, including marriages, dates of death, cemeteries, etc. And, of course, why Edward, Jr. left for California.



McKnight/MacKnight DNA Report

By John Mills

As many of you are aware, DNA for genealogy purposes can be another tool to help you find your ancestors. Lately a good number of people have found it helpful. There is now a DNA study group for nearly every surname going. Some with only a few participants, and some with many. While DNA for legal purposes is quite precise, (and quite expensive), for genealogy, it is not as precise, and relatively not as expensive. That is, the more you spend the more precise it can be. For \$99.00 US you can get a 12 point test that will tell you if you are connected to your surname, but back to about the beginning of surname use, or about 14 generations. That is a long time. For \$189.00 US, you can refine the test to a 37 point test, and a possible connection to about 6 to 8 generations. For instance, if you can only trace your ancestors for 6 generations, and a possible distant cousin has a written record of his ancestry back 7 or 8 generations, you each can do a 37 point test, and if you match, you are quite certain you are connected to this distant family. Then the trick is only to find your Most Recent Common Ancestor (MRCA) in that time frame. However, you probably have narrowed the search down considerably.

The test itself is relatively simple. You order a test kit from the laboratory, rub the inside of your cheek with a Q-tip like swab for about a minute, then insert it into a small sealed test tube, repeat the process eight hours later, then send it back to the lab. In 4 to 6 weeks you will be notified of your results. You can do the cheaper 12 point test first, and upgrade later without another swab, just tell the lab to proceed, and send them your money.

Usually it is just males that are tested. That is, men pass down the "Y" gene to their sons, grandsons, etc., and the female the "X" gene to their daughters. Since surnames usually follow the male line, it needs to be a male test. You will understand that an adoption, or an extra-marital event, will present problems in the results. So, as alluded to at the beginning, it is just another handy tool for the genealogist. Now, what has DNA got to do with McKnights??

Two years ago, our cousin Warren MacKnight, hired a researcher from Scotland to see if we could get our roots back a little further. The researcher found very little of any records for Samuel McKnight of Dumfriesshire. So, we wondered about the Thomas McKnight, (b 1803, father maybe William), that came to Napan fourteen years after our Samuel, (this Thomas later removing to Ohio, USA), and who it is said was a relative. We thought that if there was a connection we might be able to have his records traced. Therefore we had a DNA test done from a descendant from each family. It turns out that they probably were connected, but only as close as their great-great grandfathers, that being their Most Recent Common Ancestor. (MRCA).

Then it was suggested that the McKnights of the Sussex NB area were looking for our Napan McKnights when they came to New Brunswick in 1836. However we find that their DNA is not even a close match.

We have twice asked this web page keeper to post our earliest known ancestor to go with each kit number, but for some reason he won't post them.

In summary, although we didn't get the hoped for results from our tests, we believe it will surely help other McKnight researchers down the road. We are glad to assist any McKnight research. The name "McKnight" is a good name. It means something to us all, and we are proud of it.

"By preserving and making this information accessible to the public online, we are opening a whole new segment of New Brunswick history to visitors and genealogical researchers in N.B. and around the world. This initiative is also another example of how the Provincial Archives continues to utilize technology to keep up with the growing demand for its services."

Both the research index and the full content of the newspaper extracts are available through the database. Various search functions have been designed for the system, including a full text search where users can search for a name and focus the results by identifying a place, a particular newspaper, a date or by suggesting a keyword.

"The Provincial Archives is honoured to present this valuable research on our website as a tribute to the late Daniel Johnson and to provide an important new resource for researchers," said Marion Beyea, provincial archivist. "It is hard to convey what a monumental undertaking the vital statistics project must have been for Mr. Johnson and what a unique and invaluable benefit it will be to researchers. Genealogical societies in the province are responding enthusiastically to the exciting prospect of having this information available."



The Associates of the Provincial Archives have spearheaded efforts to contribute to the costs of acquiring the rights to the Daniel F. Johnson database and making it available in searchable form. The Capitol, Saint John, Charlotte, and South East Branches of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society and a number of individuals have made donations to this effort. However the Associates are \$8000. short of their goal, and while they decided to go ahead with the launch of the database, they hope that contributions from the public will continue as they wish to replace the funding already advanced so they can fund other projects such as buying microfilm readers and other equipment, and important acquisitions – all to assist researchers using the Provincial Archives.

Connors Family Reunion Held - August 2006

Approximately 115 persons gathered in Grande Digue/Shediac, NB over the weekend of Aug. 5, 6, 7 2006, to honour their ancestors: Bryan Connors (O'Connor) and Mary Ann Fogarty, Patrick Connor & Ellen Gilfoil, James Connors and Sara Gath, Patrick Fogarty and Ann Gath and Columban Connors and Honora Fogarty who all came to Southeastern New Brunswick in the early 1800's.

A BIT OF HISTORY

Bryan Connors (O'Connor) & Mary Ann Fogarty

Bryan O'Connor was born in 1801 in Ireland. He came to Shediac from Kerry County, Ireland in 1825. Mary Ann Fogarty came to Shediac from Ireland in 1820 at age 8. They were married at Grand Digue Church on October 22, 1832. Their first home was a log cabin on the bank of the Scoudouc River as water was the main mode of travel. This land is still owned by the Connors' and is farmed by Joe and Charlie Connors.

When the road was opened for coach travel between Shediac and Dorchester it was called the Dorchester Rd.. The families living by the river, where they traveled by boat, moved up to the "Road".

They built a house of hewed lumber with birch bark for insulation. This house lasted over 100 years. The house occupied in 2000 by Vincent and Rita (Connors) Hickey is on the same spot as the old house. The "old house" was torn down in 1937 and a larger home built by Charles and Stella Connors and their family Mary, Rita, Bernadette and Joe. This house burned in the forest fire in 1946 and the present house was quickly built after the fire.

Mary Anne and Bryan Connors had 9 children: John, Eliza Ann, James, Thomas (O'Connor), Bernard, Jane Ann, Mary Ann, William and Catherine.

Bryan died at age 56 and was buried in Grande Digue Cemetery in 1857. Mary Anne lived with her son Bernard (Barney) on Dorchester Road. She died at age 86 after St. Joseph's Church was built in Shediac, where the family then attended church. She is buried in the Shediac Catholic Cemetery.

Patrick Connor and Ellen Gilfoil

Ellen and Patrick came to Canada in June, 1840 from Cork County, Ireland. She died at age 77. Patrick died at age 86. Both buried in Our Lady of Calvary Cemetery, St. Anseleme, NB.

We assume that they are not related to Bryan and Mary Ann as 2 of Patrick's children married 2 of Bryan's children and this would not have been allowed. They had 9 children: Thomas Patrick, Patrick, Mary Johanna, Michael James, Martin H. Margaret Ann, Ellen Helen, Bridget, and John.

Their grant of land is shown on the map adjoining the grant to Thomas Connors.

James was born in Ireland in 1792. He married Sara Gath. He died at age 84 and she died at age 66. They had 8 children: John, Julia, Mary Ann, Catherine, Johanna, Marceline, Eliza and Margaret.

They were married in Ireland. Patrick was a lumberjack in 1819. In the 1851 Census for Shediac Parish, Patrick Fogarty has already died, and his wife Nancy is a widow living with her 2 grown children. Two of her children living with her were born in Canada before 1829. She could have arrived in Canada at the same time as William Fogarty.

Note: The Nancy Fogarty on the land grant maps is surely Ann (Nancy) Gath who married a Fogarty and since he died, the land grant is in her name.

The grants to Patrick Fogarty and Nancy Fogarty are adjoining the grant to Colombe Connors.

Columban (Colombe) Connors and Honora Fogarty

Columban was born in 1782 in Ireland. He married Honora Fogarty. Columban and Honora arrived in Canada before 1832 because they were both witnesses at Bryan and Mary Ann's wedding. We do not have much more information than this. There are no records of them having any children.

There has been talk that Columban and Bryan were brothers. Mary Fogarty (deceased) had told us that she remembers hearing that the 2 brothers married the 2 sisters. There is 19 years difference in age between Columban and Bryan, and so we're just not sure how they are related. Perhaps some of you will take on the challenge of finding out just how they are related.

Johnston families in NB

I am writing to you in the hope that you can help me find some information on the Johnston family of Elmsville/Didgequash NB, whom I believe to be my great-grand ancestors. I got your name and address from the New Brunswick Genealogical Society web site. I have just recently joined this organization.


In 1902, my mother's father, Frederick Bubier of Hudson, Maine married Lillian Read of the Calais ME-St. Stephen NB area. Lillian listed her parents' names (on all three of her marriage certificates) as <u>ANNIE PULK and JOSEPH REED</u>. After searching extensively in the Calais and western New Brunswick, as well as Nova Scotia, I could find no Annie Pulk except for Annie Johnston Pulk. I also searched for a Joseph Reed but because of the commonality of the name, I had none in the right areas and plenty everywhere else. When I discovered this particular Annie Johnston on the 1880 US census living with her sister, Hannah Walley, in Portland, Maine, about four blocks from a Joseph L. Reed, I decided to pursue this possibility and when the census listed Hannah's husband, Charles, as a house painter and Joseph L. Reed as a house painter, I decided that this might be more than a coincidence. I then went to Frederickton and in the Archives, I found Annie's marriage certificate to Pulk that lists her 1889 residence as Calais and her religion as Salvation Army.

At this point, I believe that my grandmother, Lillian Read, was the illegitimate child of Annie Johnston and Joseph Reed. There is no record that Joseph and Annie ever married. When Annie married Mr. Pulk in 1889, she was five months pregnant with their first child and I believe that she abandoned Lillian to foster/asylum care as a young child in the Calais ME area to be with him, since Lillian herself displayed and repeated this behavior with her own husbands and children. Lillian is listed as a servant on the Grant farm in Patten, Maine, on the 1900 US Census, at age 16. Patten and Calais are about 100 miles apart so she obviously stayed in the area. I think I even figured out why she listed her other's name as "Pulk" on her marriage certificates...by the time Lillian was old enough to learn her "real" mother's name, it was, indeed, Annie Pulk.

Does any of this sound familiar? I know that there are a lot of Johnston families in NB and I am just taking a chance that these might be your Johnstons. Any help you could give me would be great. I have attached an ancestor tree that explains it better than I can. Thank you so, so much.




An example from the boother register of the Abbey Church of St. Mary at Sherborne, tells that William King and Dorothy Haynes were married 17 February 1616/7 in Dorsetshire, England. This book lists where this information was obtained. The article

goes on to talk about where they lived and worked and has a short tree of their children listing birth, marriages, and deaths.

I especially enjoyed seeing and reading the sources of where he got his information.

This is a well-put together book.

The Baptismal Registers of the



Exmouth Street United Church, Saint John NB, as

reconstructed by Grame F. Somerville. The Exmouth Street United Church was founded in 1857 and continued until 1978 when declining numbers caused the congregation to disband. On a cold winter's night in January 1965 an

overheated furnace pipe caused a serious fire which, among other things, severely damaged the three volumes of baptismal registers.

Normally, registers contain the child's name, parents names, dates of birth and baptism, mother's maiden name, the name of the officiating clergyman, and so forth. Regrettably, almost 800 Christian names were scorched off the pages, plus an untold number of entire lines of entries at the top and bottom of each page, as well as most minister's names.

Following the fire the then Clerk of Session, Frank L Ross, rewrote over half of the Registers making out what he could salvage from the ruined pages. However, he was not able to recover the 800 missing names.

Now, by cross referencing with other sources of vital statistics, recently made available to the general public, plus the help of many former members of Exmouth, it has been possible to reconstruct much of the Registers, and recovering 655 Christian names of those baptized.

Education In New Brunswick

"The One Room School" Part I St. Martins And Area, Saint John County

Introduction: We have been researching "The Early Years of the One Room School House" in New Brunswick.

It has been a project of much time and effort, but a labour of Love.

Love of discovering the schools that still exist; the ones that have disappeared; how they were built and where; by whom; the students who attended and their stories; the teachers who educated our youth in the early years of our Province.

A real bonus is finding family connections in the student and teacher records!

Information on the history of the "One Room School" can be found in the Archival Records of the Saint John Regional Library; the Provincial Archives in Fredericton; and publications such as the Book published by the Kings County Retired Teachers' Association in 1985.

This book, "Early Schools of kings County" is out of print, but can be found in the Archival Secton of our Libraries.

The retired teachers must be congratulated for contributing the Records, Student lists, Journals, Registers, School pictures and Documents for those schools that have closed. Some have been missed, their records lost, but those we have are very valuable as a window on the history of education in the Province.

Special merit to those who have rescued old records, such as Weston Black of St. Martins. As the story goes, Weston, who was a student at Greer Settlement School in 1913/14, found the Journals for the years 1881-1963 tucked away in his father's attic. Mr. Weston may have been a trustee of the old school.

"Shirley Marie (Dunlop) Verner has a special love for the one room schoolhouse, as she has lived in one in St. Martins since the age of five years.

The old "Hardscrabble Road "one room school on Orange Hill in St. Martins, District #2 is her home."

From Report on Burying Grounds in NB by Dr James Hannay 1908, originally prepared for the Government of NB and filed by him in the Public Archives of New Brunswick (PANB) in late 1908, later collected by the National Archives of Canada where the original 903 page report of many southern NB cemetery tombstone inscriptions or the microfilm of the original is currently available

"The necessity for a larger Cemetery near the city was forced upon the attention of the citizens early in 1847. The old burial ground within the limits of the city was about to be closed by law, and the ground near the Marsh Bridge, which exclusively belonged to the Church of England with a small area was rapidly filling up while the population of the city was gradually increasing. Under the circumstances a number of public spirited citizens, desiring to in the scheme all classes and denominations prepared and addressed a circular to the office-bearers of the several churches in the city, pointing out the crowded condition of the cemeteries then in use, and appealing to them to join in an effort to procure a larger one. All responded to this appeal except the Roman Catholics and Methodists, they having cemeteries of their own. The result was the appointment of a general committee to select a site and place the scheme on a business basis. After a lengthened and labored investigation of all the localities in the vicinity of the city likely to be suitable for the purpose the committee concluded to purchase seventy acres of land from Henry Gilbert, Esquire, forming part of the present site of the Cemetery. The price paid for this property was ten thousand four hundred dollars, a lot being reserved for each of the proprietors. A subscription list for stock in a proposed company was then prepared. Each share was placed at ten dollars, and in a very short time the stock was all taken up. A meeting of these stockholders was immediately held when twelve directors were chosen, who prepared a bill for the incorporation of the company, which was finally enacted by the Legislature of the Province on 30th March, 1848.

By the terms of this Act, it will be seen that the capital stock of the company was twelve thousand dollars which was expended in paying the purchase money of the property and in laying out and

improving the grounds. As lots were sold the stock was paid off and cancelled, and there is none of it now outstanding.

In the year 1897 the Cemetery was enlarged by the purchase of the adjoining property making the total area now to be one hundred and forty-four and a half acres."

Dr James Hannay, 1908

The following are the tombstone inscriptions recorded by Dr Hannay 1907 – 1908 in Fernhill Cemetery remembering that there are many more burials than disclosed by tombstones, including ongoing burials from 1908 to the present date, records of which are held the cemetery corporation and may be reviewed at their offices at the cemetery on Westmoreland Road, St John, NB.

Sacred to the memory of the Hon Ward Chipman for many years a member of the Provincial Legislature, HM Advocate and Solicitor General and sometime Recorder of the City of Saint John, afterwards one of the Judges of the Supreme Court and from AD MDCCCXXXIV (1834) – MDCCCLI (1851) Chief Justice of NB. He was the only child of the late Mr. Justice Chipman and died on the 26th Nov AD MDCCCLI (1851) aged 64 years.

In loving remembrance of Elizabeth, widow of the Hon Chief Justice Chipman and daughter of the late Henry Wright, Esq, Collector of HM Imperial Customs at St John, NB born Aug 30th 1792, died July 4th 1876.

This monument is erected over the remains of the Hon Ward Chipman, Esq who was born in the Province of Massachusetts Bay on the 30th July 1754 and died at Fredericton in this Province on the 9th February 1824. He was graduate of Harvard University and educated to the profession of the law. Retaining his loyalty to his Sovereign, he was obliged to abandon his native land on the evacuation of Boston in the year 1776. Having repaired to England the Royal Bounty bestowed on him in a pension in common with a long list of his suffering fellow countrymen. But a state of inaction being ill suited to his ardent mind, in less than a year he relinquished his pension and rejoined the Kings troops at New

York where he was employed in a military department and in the practice of the Court of Admiralty until the Peace in 1783. On the erection of this Province in 1784 he was appointed Solicitor General and continuing afterwards bore a conspicuous and most useful part in its affairs as an advocate at the Bar, a Member of His Majesty's Council, a Judge of the Supreme Court, and agent on the part of His Majesty before several commissions for settling disputed points of boundary with the United States until he closed his mortal career while administering the government of the Province as President and Commander-in-Chief during a vacancy in the Office of Lieutenant Governor. Distinguished during the whole of his varied and active life for superior abilities and unswerable (sic unswerving or considerable) zeal, for genuine integrity and singular humanity and benevolence, his loss was universally deplored and this frail tribute from his nearest connections affords but a feeble expression of the affectionate respect with which they cherish the memory of his virtues.

This Tablet is inscribed to the memory of Elizabeth, daughter of the late Hon William Hazen, widow of the late Hon Mr Justice Chipman, and mother of the late Hon Chief Justice Chipman, born in Newbury Port, in Massachusetts, 2nd June 1766, died at St John, 18th May 1852.

Entered into rest Thomas Boyne died August 31st 1896 aged 78 years.

G Gordon Boyne died December 16th 1907 aged 63 years.

Erected by his widow and daughter in memory of Noah Disbrow Esq who died April 19th 1853 in the 81st year of his age.

In memory of Amelia wife of Noah Disbrow died February 5th, 1881 aged 90 years.

In memory of Charles Drury Esq who was born at Bilbayhill in the County of Cork, Ireland, the residence of his ancestors on the 25th Oct 1782 and after serving his King and country most faithfully for 22 years as a Military, and 12 as a Civil Officer, died at Newlands, County of St John, NB the 24th Oct 1836 deeply lamented by a large family and numerous connexions (sic) to whom he was greatly and justly endeared.

In memoriam Frances Amelia wife of the late Charles Drury Esq and the last surviving child of the late Hon William Hazen died 31st August 1862 aged 75 years.

In memoriam Mary Drury eldest daughter of the late Charles Drury Esq died 1st January 1867 aged 54 years.

In memoriam Charles Drury eldest son of Charles and Frances A Drury born 9th October 1805 died 21st February 1880.

John Drury born 12th December 1808 died 29th May 1880.

Edward O'Brien Drury born 6th Nov 1816 died 29th May 1880.

In memory of the Hon Robert Leonard Hazen, QC, one of the Senators appointed by the Crown on the formation of the Dominion of Canada, Judge of the Court of Admiralty in the Province of New Brunswick, and for many years Recorded of the City of St John. Born Oct 15th 1808, died Aug 15th 1874.

Sacred to the memory of Sarah A Hazen wife of the Hon RL Hazen born April 2nd 1815 died Feb 2nd 1867.

Sacred to the memory of William Hazen, Esq, Treasurer of the Province and High Sheriff of this City and County, who was born at Newbury Port, June 28th 1768 and who died in this City February 11th 1816 after discharging with integrity and honor all his duties as a public officer and a private individual.

Sacred to the memory of Deborah daughter of the late Hon John Murray Esq and relict of the late William Hazen Jr Esq who was born at Rutland, Massachusetts on the 7th Sept 1771 and who died at the City of St John on the 25th June 1831.

Sacred to the memory of Robert Hazen a Major in his Majesty's 60th Regiment of Foot and third son of the Hon William Hazen born the 7th day of September 1775 died 17th July 1815.

Sacred to the memory of Mary, daughter of the late Munson Jarvis Esq, relict of Major Robert Hazen HM LX (60th) Regiment of Foot born March 31st 1775, died 18th September 1835.

Sacred to the memory of George fifth son of the late William Hazen Jr Esq who was born at Fredericton on the 9th Dec 1806 and who died at the City of St John on 9th April 1829.

Sacred to the memory of LeBaron Hazen, Esq, Barrister at Law, fourth son of the late William

Hazen Jr Esq, who was born at Fredericton on 21st September 1803 and who died at the City of St John on the 5th July 1836

Sacred to the memory of Johanna the beloved wife of Robert F Hazen Esq and daughter of the late Lieutenant Colonel Morris Robinson born at York, England 15th Oct 1804 died at St John 16th June 1853. Also of Robert Fraser Hazen, Esq son of the late Robert Hazen, Major in HM 60th Regiment of Foot, and grandson of the Hon William Hazen born Apr 19th 1803 died April 25th 1874.

Two Pennfield Loyalists and Their Antecedents

Editor's Note: this information came from Acadiensis January 1907 Volume VII, No1.

Rachel and Moses Doane

In the New York Genealogical and Biographical Record there has been in course of publication, by instalments, for the past three years, a list of the Loyalists of the American Revolution who settled within the boundaries of the present Province of New Brunswick. This list has been compiled by the editor of ACADIENSIS, and was offered to the "Record" largely in the hope that its insertion therein might cause enquiry to be made concerning some of the individuals mentioned, and their descendants, with a possibility of receiving in return other data concerning them in the times "before the war."

That this hope has not been without realization is evidenced by the fact that the following sketch, among others, has been received.

Soon after the appearance of the names mentioned above in the "Record," a letter was received from Mr. Alfred A. Doane asking for further data. Very little is obtainable, as their stay in New Brunswick must have been brief indeed. The only mention of them in New Brunswick history that the writer has been able to discover, is a short notice in Sabine's Loyalists of the American Revolution, Vol. II, p. 452, among the "persons who signed the Quaker Loyalist agreement to settle themselves on the River St. Johns in Nova Scotia," and in the "Roll of Loyalists, &c., settled in Belle Vue in Beaver Harbour, 10th July, 1784."

A somewhat extended notice of others of the name, but of the same connection will also be found in Sabine's work, Volume I, p. 382. From this last mentioned notice Mr. Alfred A. Doane has obtained some of the data for his interesting and valuable sketch.—EDITOR.

Rachel Doane and her son, Moses Doane, whose names appear in the "Roll of Loyalists settled in Belle Vue, Beaver Harbor, Charlotte County, to July, 1784," were from Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

The founder of the Doane family in America was John Doane, who came over to the Plymouth Colony about 1630. He was a deacon of the Plymouth church, and, with Capt. Miles Standish, John Alden, William Bradford, John Howland, Stephen Hopkins and William Gilson, was on the Board of Assistants to Governor Edward Winslow.

Daniel Doane, a grandson of Deacon John

Doane, joined the Friends at Sandwich, and in 1696 removed with his family to Friends' Colony, in Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

Great-grandsons of this Daniel were Moses, Joseph, Aaron, Levi and Mahlon Doane—five brothers—who, with their cousin and confederate Abraham Doane, formed the band known in the Revolutionary history of Buck's County as the "Tory Doanes," whose exploits have been the theme of so many newspaper articles and historical references during the last one hundred years.

The parents of those boys were of good estate, and they and their children of good reputation. They were members of the Society of Friends, and, by virtue of their Quaker principles, proposed to stand neutral when the war came on; but, because of their non-attendance on militia draughts, etc., and refusing to pay fines, they had their property sold and themselves harassed. They got inflamed with their patriot neighbors and the Revolutionary rulers, and as they found themselves subject to legal imposts and penalties, their sons set out to live in highways and hedges to wage predatory war upon their prosecutors for recovery of property, in their estimation, unjustly taken from them. They were young men of fine figure and address, elegant horsemen, great runners and leapers, and excellent at stratagems and escapes. They delighted to injure public property, but did no injury to the weak, the poor or the peaceful. They all participated in robberies of collectors of military and other taxes, prominent among which was the raid upon the county treasury at Newtown on the night of October 22, 1781. For this they were charged with burglary, and by proclamation of the court were ordered to appear for trial. Failing to do this, they were, by proclamation, published for the crime of outlawry, and a reward of £300 apiece was set on their heads.

One of those brothers, Joseph Doane, married his cousin, Mary Doane, and finally sought refuge in Welland County, Province of Ontario, where he died in 1844, leaving a large family. Aaron Doane was captured and remained a long time in prison, but was pardoned on condition of his leaving the country. He accepted the exile, and settled in Ontario, near his brother Joseph. Levi Doane and his cousin Abraham Doane were captured, on the 24th of September, 1788, were publicly executed on the common in the city of Philadelphia for the crime of outlawry, though the Legislative Assembly made an effort in their behalf. Mahlon Doane was captured and placed in prison, but broke jail, and his fate is not known. Moses Doane was the captain of the band. Forced by hunger, he, with others, ventured into the cabin of a confederate in Plumstead Township, where they were

surrounded by a party of fourteen, who had volunteered for the capture. Moses was seized and thrown to the floor, when one Robert Gibson, rushing into the cabin, shot Doane in the breast, killing him instantly. This was September 1, 1783. Gibson was suspected of being implicated with the Doanes in their ill-gotten gains, and it is supposed he shot Moses to close all evidence against himself. Moses' body was sent to his grandfather, Israel Doane, in Plumstead, who buried it in a secluded spot on his farm where stones marking his grave were to be seen until a few years ago. It is claimed that Moses Doane's wife was Rachel Tomlinson, the daughter of

Joseph and Margaret (Cook) Tomlinson. She, with her only child, Moses, Jr., appears with the Loyalists in Charlotte County, on the St. John River, in 1784. The son Moses was born January 22, 1781. His descendants claim that he "spent one year in Canada." It is understood that he lived with his uncle, Samuel Tomlinson, in Buck's County. He married, in 1808, Mary Comfort, daughter of John and Mary (Woolman) Comfort, of Falls Township, in Buck's County. About 1823 they removed to Wheatland, Munroe County, New York, where he died, February 5, 1861. They had three sons and four daughters.

Pioneer Families of New Brunswick

Ingraham

Benjamin Ingraham had lived in King's District, Albany County, New York, to which place he had moved from Derby, New Haven County, Conn., where he was born April 20, 1743. On April 8, 1771, he married Jerusha Barrett, and two children, Hannah and John, were born in New York, in 1772 and 1773.

Benjamin tried to get through the lines to join General Burgoyne's Army, but was captured and ordered to be imprisoned during the war. Fortunately for him, he escaped after four days' detention, and made his way to New York where he enlisted with the King's American Regiment. He served first as a private, and later as a sergeant in Captain Gray's Company. When he appeared before the Commissioners for Claims of American Loyalists, he brought a letter from Captain Clements testifying to the good esteem in which he was held by all the officers of the Regiments.

After their arrival in New Brunswick, two more children were born to Benjamin Ingraham, Ira and Ann. The eldest daughter, Hannah, moved to Ontario, and here recollections of the family's arrival on the St. John River in the autumn of 1783 have been published in the proceedings of the United Empire Loyalists Association of Ontario. She died in 1868 at the age of 97.

The Ingrahams received land with their regiment, but much of the land awarded the King's American Regiment was the rock strewn district above Pokiok, and the Ingrahams asked for land on the west side of the Keswick with the guides and pioneers. Benjamin also had Lot 16 on Mill Creek, below Fredericton, where the family lived until his death, when they sold the Mill Creek farm and moved to Bear Island.

Abijah Ingraham, a younger brother of Benjamin, had taken care of the latter's family until they were driven off their homestead in Albany County by the Rebel Committee. Abijah then joined the King's American Regiment, where he served as corporal in Captain Atwood's Company. He married Mary, daughter of Peter Mooers, by whom he had children: Charles, John, Nathaniel, Peter, Benjamin and Abijah.

(Editor's note: This is the fourth part in a series on Monckton township)

It is reasonable to state, without resorting to hyperbole, that the establishment of Monckton township owed more to the efforts of Anthony Wayne than to any other individual at the time. Wayne's accomplishments were many: he located and surveyed the township in 1765; he negotiated settlement terms with the government in Halifax; he met with John Hughes and his settlers to sign the Articles of Agreement in Philadelphia in 1766; he purchased and arranged for supplies in Halifax later that year; he attended numerous meetings with his fellow proprietors through 1766-67-68; he created a detailed map of Monckton township in 1767; and he conducted voluminous correspondence from 1765 to 1769. Of course many other individuals contributed to the founding of Monckton, notably the eleven families from Philadelphia, but it was Anthony Wayne's stellar efforts that made the dream of a new settlement on the Petitcodiac River a reality. When Monckton was founded in 1766, Anthony Wayne was 21 years old.

Wayne's activities were vitally linked with those of John Hall who accompanied the settlers to the Petitcodiac River, landing with them on June 3, 1766. Hall exerted himself in outfitting the settlement but his over-enthusiasm for the welfare of the settlers caused him to overextend his credit, as we have seen, thus compromising both the financial health of the settlement and his position with the other proprietors in Philadelphia.

One of those proprietors was Rev. William Smith, provost of the College of Philadelphia. Smith's group of speculators recruited Jacob Ricker and James Smith, two of the settlers whose descendants continue to thrive in New Brunswick and beyond. Another proprietor was Matthew Clarkson, a prominent Philadelphia surveyor and merchant whose group recruited four settlers including George Wortman. The Ricker, Smith and Wortman families intermarried with the others to create a huge and complex lineage of New Brunswick families that now spans 240 years and extends around the globe.

Another active participant in Monckton township was John Hughes, the Philadelphia merchant and provincial assemblyman whose friend Benjamin Franklin was also involved. Although Franklin resided in London through the early years of the project, his interest stimulated many of his Philadelphia friends to join the land syndicate. As early as 1763 Hughes had made contact with the devious speculator Alexander McNutt and proceeded to solicit potential settlers. Hughes' charm and organizational abilities were such that he enlisted no fewer than five of the eleven families who eventually sailed to the Petitcodiac River in April 1766. Today the descendants of Michael Lutz, Heinrich Stief, Matthias Sommer, Jacob Treitz and Charles Jones can trace their genealogy and their heritage to that important day in January 1766 when they met with John Hughes in Philadelphia to sign the Articles of Agreement.

Anthony Wayne was also at that meeting on January 27. His youth and inexperience notwithstanding, Wayne had spent the previous summer in old Nova Scotia working on the project as surveyor for the land syndicate. Arriving at Halifax on March 29, 1765 with McNutt and land partners Isaac Caton and Benjamin Jacobs, Wayne arranged to sail to Minas Basin and the Petitcodiac River to view the various townships available for settlement. He liked what he saw.

Back on the south shore of Nova Scotia on May 8, Wayne met Simeon Perkins, a Liverpool merchant who procured supplies and selected two local men to assist with the surveying. On May 13, Wayne signed an agreement with Thomas Miller and Peter Preston Pain to be his chain carriers or surveying assistants. By then, Wayne was apparently favouring the Petitcodiac site and was ready to conduct the required survey. Miller and Pain were each to be paid £3 per month.

Returning to Halifax from the Petitcodiac by July 5, Wayne composed a memorial to Governor Montague Wilmot requesting that the township be granted or reserved immediately so the families could be dispatched promptly and erect dwellings before winter set in. Impatient with the delay, Wayne suggested that the Philadelphia syndicate might choose to withdraw from the undertaking rather than "put themselves to any further Unnece[ssa]ry Expences."

Wayne may have been bluffing but his memorial appears to have had the intended effect. On the same day the council allocated 16 townships for Wayne to choose from: ten on the St. John River, one on the Petitcodiac, one near Digby, and four east of Halifax. Government procrastination continued, but by October Wayne had obtained a reserve of four townships, including "2 on Peticoodiack." Finally on October 31, the day before the Stamp Act came into force, two townships were officially granted to the Philadelphia land syndicate: Frankfort on the St. John River and Monckton on the Petitcodiac River. Their initial work completed, mid-November saw Wayne and his Philadelphia land partners sailing for home aboard the schooner Nova Scotia Packet, stopping at Boston on Nov. 18.

Two months later, on Jan. 27, 1766, Wayne met in Philadelphia with John Hughes and the Pennsylvania Germans he had recruited, to sign the Articles of Agreement. Smith and Clarkson likely signed with their own


recruits at the same time. For the proprietors, the venture in land speculation would soon test their collective powers of resolve. For the intending settlers, the commitment to test their farming abilities would translate into an experiment in survival.

The next three months must have been busy ones for all concerned. The settlers were soon to head into the wilderness to found a new colony and they had to be prepared for anything. Make no mistake: it was a wilderness by any standards and they knew it.

It was a particularly busy time for Anthony Wayne, too, because he courted Mary Penrose that winter and married her at the end of March. Then, leaving his new bride behind at Waynesborough, Anthony was back in Halifax that spring, arranging supplies for the settlers and petitioning the Nova Scotia council for better settlement terms (and more land). He spent the entire summer and most of the fall working on the project and likely travelled to the Petitcodiac River to see firsthand how things were progressing. He may have been there when the settlers landed on June 3. Wayne's itinerary in 1766 remains sketchy because much of the documentation is not extant.

That fall Wayne purchased 30 barrels of flour and 10 sheep for the settlers, agreeing to pay for the flour with a shipment of Burlington pork. Lastly he arranged for the supplies to be transported from Halifax to the Petitcodiac River in Mr. Allen's ill-fated sloop.

In 1767 Anthony Wayne continued working on Monckton township from Philadelphia and his home at Waynesborough in Chester County. On February 6 in Philadelphia, Wayne and the proprietors met at Israel Jacob's house in Elbow Lane to divvy up their township by lot. Using his surveying notes from 1765 and 1766, Wayne then constructed a fine and accurate map of Monckton delineating the various tracts allocated to each of the land companies plus Col. McNutt. Although the map did little good for the settlers who were struggling on the Petitcodiac River, the proprietors were making progress, at least on paper. Then on July 31 the proprietors met again, this time to deal with Samuel Weathered's letters demanding payment. By then they had settled only 60 of the required 500 persons specified in their grant. A later observation by William Franklin, son of Benjamin, succinctly describes the proprietors: "They seem to have taken a great deal of Pains in adjusting each Man's Share, &c. but not much in Settling the Lands."

Franklin, Hughes and Co. obtained the eastern-most lot in the township, beginning at Hall's Creek and running 2393 feet west to today's King St. in downtown Moncton.

Anthony Wayne's map of Monckton remained at Waynesborough, along with the papers and letters relating to his settlement activities. After his early death at the age of 51 in 1796, Wayne's estate passed through the generations of his descendants to the last living direct descendant in the 20th century, William Evans Wayne, his great-great-grandson.

Anthony Wayne had distinguished himself during the Revolutionary War, and his life attracted many biographers over the years. One author was Harry Emerson Wildes who, in 1941, compiled an extensive biography, Anthony Wayne: Trouble Shooter of the American Revolution. The first few chapters of his book are devoted to Wayne's boyhood and the Monckton settlement project. Relying on documents at Waynesborough plus others at the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, Wildes cobbled together an erratic account of Wayne's activities in the 1760s. Despite the distressing fact that his narrative often goes berserk, Harry Wildes drew the reader's attention to several documents he had examined at Waynesborough. One of these was Wayne's 1765 agreement with the two chain carriers; another was the July 5th memorial to Gov. Wilmot. Wildes also referred to the letters of Samuel Weathered, whom he assumed was Wayne's successor, describing his "six piteous letters begging for assistance." Where the evidence was lacking, Harry Emerson Wildes gave his imagination full rein, but these documents were undoubtedly seen by him in 1941. After that, those papers and everything else associated with Monckton, except the 1767 map, disappeared from Waynesborough.

Well, not exactly disappeared. About 1966 William Wayne, growing incapacitated, sold the estate to Orin June, a New York art gallery owner who had married a descendant of Anthony Wayne's sister. Mr. June immediately began selling off the estate piecemeal — furniture, artifacts, papers, whatever would fetch a good price. The chaincarriers agreement and the Wilmot memorial somehow found their way into the hands of a Chicago collector who later donated them to Houghton Library of Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts where they are today. Others of the Monckton papers went to William L. Clements Library at the University of Michigan. These included correspondence between Wayne and a Halifax merchant, Amesbury and Bard, regarding the 30 barrels of flour that Wayne purchased in 1766 and the Burlington pork.

Some of the Monckton papers, including Wayne's letters to Samuel Weathered, were sold to H.P. Kraus, a New York antiquarian dealer. Kraus recognized the international value of the papers and offered them to the National Archives in Ottawa. Correspondence and negotiations ensued, and the lot of nine items was eventually purchased by the Archives in 1972 for the princely sum of \$2000.

That might seem like a large amount of money, especially in 1972 dollars, but it is fair to say that the genealogical and historical significance of the material today is priceless. New Brunswick genealogists can be grateful that the director of the manuscript division, Robert Gordon, and his colleagues in Ottawa knew a rare find when they saw one.

As a consequence of Orin June's scattering of the Waynesborough papers, one of Wayne's letters to Amesbury and Bard is in Ottawa and the corresponding letters are in Michigan. Harry Emerson Wildes alluded to additional items at Waynesborough in 1941, some of which may or may not exist, then or now, none of which I have been able to locate after seven years of searching. The whereabouts of Samuel Weathered's six piteous letters is unknown.

The papers acquired by the National Archives in 1972 are Wayne's draft copies of the letters, the final copies having been sent to Weathered and the various correspondents. This fact will explain the apparent anomaly in Wayne's letter of March 3, 1768 naming the eleven settlers at Monckton. The letter is signed by Anthony Wayne, William Smith and Michael Hillegas, but all three signatures are in Anthony Wayne's own hand. The final copy, of course, went to Smith and Hillegas for their individual signatures.

Astute researches of Monckton history (or at least those who have read my book) will know that Michael Hillegas was not one of the original 22 grantees of Monckton township. Hillegas was a well-to-do Philadelphia musician and dealer in musical instruments, the son of a German immigrant. He was also involved in iron manufacturing, as were John Hughes and John Hall. In April 1766, desiring to participate in land settlements, Hillegas sent instructions to John Hall requesting he make observations on the St. John River that spring. A year later, when the Philadelphia syndicate ditched Hall because of his extravagant spending proclivities, Hillegas was there to fill the vacancy. Documentation is lacking, but it will be obvious that Michael Hillegas purchased John Hall's share in Monckton township.

Hillegas may have taken on a leadership role in the land syndicate, writing to Benjamin Franklin as late as 1769 attempting, without success, to revitalize the now-failed township project.^{vii}

Researchers of Monckton history who have taken the time to visit the Archives in Ottawa and examine the Wayne papers for themselves will have noticed another anomaly: Samuel Weathered wrote eight letters to Anthony Wayne, not the six described by author Harry Wildes. The final two letters arrived at Waynesborough early in 1769 but they didn't stay there. Wayne immediately forwarded them to William Smith for his perusal. Samuel Weathered

was still trying to collect his due, and Wayne expressed his doubts to Smith that the letters were worthy of any further action by the proprietors. The whereabouts of these final two letters is also unknown.

By the time Samuel Weathered wrote his last two letters to Anthony Wayne in 1769, the relationship between the Philadelphia proprietors and the settlers at Monckton had all but collapsed. Michael Lutz, Heinrich Stief and Jacob Ricker were in the process of moving downriver to Hillsborough, and George Wortman would follow soon after. John Hughes, who had invested so much time and money in the project, had left Pennsylvania for a customs job in New Hampshire and would die in Charlestown, South Carolina in a few short years. Anthony Wayne moved back to Waynesborough where he took over the farm, developed a tannery, and continued his surveying activities. In 1770 his wife bore him a daughter and in 1772 a son. Soon after, Wayne was elected to the provincial assembly and became a leader among the local patriots. Recognizing Wayne's dynamic abilities, some of which were evident in 1765 and 1766, George Washington would later appoint him General in the Continental Army. Less than a decade after his adventures on the Petitcodiac River, politics and rebellion had come to dominate the lives of Wayne and his countryfolk, and the little settlement at Monckton was left behind.

A description in 1769 of the settlers' hardship comes from Charles Baker, another young surveyor, who went to Monckton and talked with them:

I think it is a Very Great Pitty that they should be lett Suffer so much as they have done ever since they went there as they are a Set of the Best Setlers in them Parts[.] it has Surprised every one that knew them to see how they have lived since they went there Mostly on herbs which they geathered in the Marsh in the Spring &c. viii

Conference Speakers

David Bell

David Bell of Woodstock is on staff at UNB Law School (Fredericton) where he specializes in Colonial law and institutions. His earliest historical work was on the Loyalists. The second edition of *Early Loyalist Saint John* (1983) will appear in 2007. He has also written on Maritime Baptists and Anglicans as well as much on Maritime legal history. His most recent article was on an aboriginal harvesting case from the 1940s. The current project is an illustrated documentary history of the Diocese of Fredericton from the time of the Loyalist to the 1940s.

Summary of Presentation:

New York Stories, 1783

Loyalists trapped in New York City faced many troubles in the months leading up to the evacuation to Saint John. David will demonstrate there was a clear link between the politics of Loyalist New York and the political struggles of Loyalist Saint John. He will focus in part on the trials of individual future New Brunswickers (e. g., Solomon Ferris, Isaac Foshay, Joshua Lamoreaux, Absalom Holmes, Daniel Babbitt, John Segee, Joshua Booth, Cavalier Jouett, Elizabeth Lester, Sarah Wheeler, Diana Bush, Cairo & Pomphey).

Rick Crume

Rick Crume is a contributing editor for Family Tree Magazine, a regular contributor to Family Chronicle and Internet Genealogy magazines and a former contributing editor for NGS NewsMagazine. He is the author of *Plugging Into Your Past: How to Find Real Family History Records Online*.

Summary of Presentations:

Oh, Canada Online!

The Web abounds with resources for tracing your ancestry in Canada. Rick will point you to the best databases for Canadian cemetery, census, immigration, land, military and vital records, as well as local histories and newspapers.

British Intelligence: Smart Strategies for Tracking Down English, Scottish and Welsh Ancestors

Tracing your British ancestry doesn't require a trip overseas. Rick will tell you how to access the most important records, including church, census and probate records, from Canada.

Allen Doiron

Allen has been employed at The Provincial Archives of New Brunswick since 1979, and he is now responsible for a section that includes: Public Programs, Sound and Moving Images, Cartographic Records and Information technology. He received his BA major in History, minor in Geography from the Université de Moncton. In 1983 he completed a traineeship at the

Archives nationales de France in Paris. Allen is interested in Acadian and New Brunswick history and genealogy, and published a book in 1994 on the genealogy and history of the Doiron Family. Allen was born in Tracadie in the Acadian peninsula in northern New Brunswick.

Summary of Presentation:

Survey Plans and Land Allocation in New Brunswick as a source for Family History Research

Early settlers who arrived in New Brunswick faced the challenge of finding a place where they could settle and carry on with their new life. One of their highest priorities was to obtain a lot of land and gain a feeling of security. The Provincial Archives has, among the numerous documents they hold relating to the allocation of land, an extensive series of Survey Plans which constitute a great source of information on these early settlers. In this presentation Allen will provide an overview of the scope and content of this important cartographic collection. Allen will also use specific examples of these and other cartographic records to shows the type of information that can be found and how the plans can be used in the context of family history research.

John Elliott

John Elliott is a Certified Genealogist who has been actively involved in genealogy for over thirty years. His main area of interest is Kings and Queens County history and genealogy and New Brunswick Loyalists in general. He is the President of the Kings County Historical and Archival Society. He has transcribed and published Kings County Marriages, Volumes C and D. He has also published 4 Volumes of Gone But Not Forgotten, a record of cemeteries in Kings County, covering 9 of 15 parishes, and including transcriptions of more than 12,000 tombstones.

Summary of Presentation:

Finding the "Story" in Your Family History

John's goal is to give some ideas on fleshing out the "skeleton" of genealogical facts (names, dates, locations) with other details of our ancestors' lives. John will talk about locating and recording stories, pictures & details about our ancestors and fitting their lives into a context of the larger history of their communities and the world in which they lived. John will refer to many of the commonly used sources, but with an emphasis on mining them for more than the simple names and dates.

Mary McDevitt

Mary McDevitt, a retired schoolteacher, is the archivist for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saint John, New Brunswick. She has published We Hardly Knew Ye: St. Mary's Cemetery, An Enduring Presence, and co-authored An Honorable Independence, The Irish Catholic Settlers of Johnville, Carleton County, New Brunswick, written with her father, the late William Kilfoil, a former editor of Generations.

Summary of Presentation:

Roman Catholic Diocesan Archives

Mary will talk about the resources of the Catholic Archives in this diocese, speak on the subject of Irish immigration to the city and the evolution of the Irish Catholic community of 19th century Saint John.

David Walker

David has been researching his genealogy and family history for about twelve years. His ancestral trails include England, Scotland, Ireland, New England, and the Maritime Provinces of Canada. He has a keen interest in the use of computing technology, digital imaging and electronics, especially where they are of use in genealogy. He is a member of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society, Prince Edward Island Genealogical Society, United Empire Loyalists Association (New Brunswick Branch), British Isles Family History Society of Greater Ottawa and the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

Summary of Presentations:

Tracking New Brunswick Grandparents Using Canadian Sources from Coast to Coast:

Many resources were used by David to solve the whereabouts of grandparents and great-grandparents. The process and resources used to solve ancestral mysteries will be relevant to anyone. These included church, marriage census, Bible, cemetery, death, census, border crossing, and divorce records in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Ontario, British Columbia and Colorado.

Tools (not Toys) for the Traveling Genealogist

This presentation will illustrate the use of modern computer technology in ancestral research. David will demonstrate a wide variety of tools, including digital imaging (cameras and scanners), GPS (Global Positioning System), portable computers, PDA (e.g. Palm Pilot), and various software titles. Most of these tools are also useful at home. David will bring samples of all of the tools described in the talk.
