Henry Josiah DeForest (1855-1924)

A Largely Forgotten New Brunswick Born Artist

H. J. DeForest was a rare example of a New Brunswick born artist who was able to devote himself to his chosen passion of landscape painting and find a ready market for the sale of his creations throughout most of his adult life. Unfortunately, that market was not in his home province. Henry was born in N.B., travelled extensively throughout Europe and Australasia in the late nineteenth century, settled into the arts establishment in Vancouver, and died in Calgary. Interestingly, from a genealogical perspective, several important details about his life have been subject to widespread misinformation, some even emanating from Henry himself. While the principal objective of this article is to raise Henry's profile and highlight his contributions to the arts, I will also strive to clarify a few of these genealogical facts and provide insights into the United Empire Loyalist and New England Planter family backgrounds of Henry and his wife Ruth. The story comes complete with several hints of intrigue and a fascinating dive into the genealogical resources of multiple provinces. I will defer most of the family history details to the second half of the article.

I first learned of Henry J. DeForest in 1980 when I purchased one of his modestly priced oil paintings at a Sotheby's Canadian art auction in Toronto. I fell in love with that painting which led to

a 40 year effort to learn more about his life, his art and yes, his ancestors.

An Introduction to the Art of H.J. DeForest

Henry was first and foremost a landscape painter whose chosen medium was oil paint on canvas or board. He was born in 1855 in pre-Confederation New Brunswick in the heart of the Victorian age. A study of his artistic output throughout his career suggests that he was constantly striving to capture the "true to nature" grandeur and magnificence of the scenery he was painting³. Arthur Mowbray made the following commentary on Mr. DeForest's work in a 1916 newspaper review - "... exhibits examples of what is no doubt a mature style. His drawing is good, and his color effects enjoyable. A little more freedom of handling would greatly improve these pictures; they appear to us a little too precise, though as transcripts of actual scenes they no doubt have an accuracy that the impressionist is apt to lose. They would reproduce admirably as color illustrations to a work on B.C. Scenery."4

He loved travelling to some of the most beautiful and often remote areas of the world where he would prepare sketches and paintings for future refinement. In 1881 he and his wife Ruth went on a hiking trip in Switzerland and south-eastern France and carved the names of the mountains and passes which they climbed into Alpenstock walking sticks which have been preserved in the Museum of Vancouver⁵. In 1887 through 1890 he travelled extensively throughout Australia and New Zealand and in 1893 settled briefly in Vancouver before travelling to Europe for two more years. Returning to Canada in September 1896 he again settled in Vancouver. During his life he travelled to and painted scenes as geographically diverse as Niagara Falls, the Yosemite Valley, the Kilauea volcano in Hawaii and many of the great mountain ranges of the Canadian north-west and New Zealand. He was a contemporary of many of the great French impressionists and would likely have been exposed to their work while studying in Paris in 1896. Henry also featured in some of the same exhibits as Emily Carr in Vancouver in the period 1909 through 1912. Despite these influences he

rarely strayed from his adherence to the strict lines of nature and perhaps shared the prevailing view in London and Paris art establishments of the decadence of the new patchy landscape style. History has shown us that this reluctance to adopt a less literal style may have undermined his chance for a more lasting place in art history.

Bernard McEvoy was an influential member of the early Vancouver art scene and editorial writer for one of Vancouver's leading newspapers - The Province. He wrote the following in a 1910 Opportunities Magazine article – "When he had secured all the elementary training that Canada could give him, he started for London in 1879, where he took full advantage of study at South Kensington, fol-

lowing it up with further courses in Paris and Italy. During a prolonged tour that lasted until 1882, he saw most of the great masterpieces of the world, and stayed long at the principal artistic centres." ⁶ Several sources have also asserted that he studied with J.D. Moultray in Edinburgh and at l'Académie Julian in Paris ⁷.


The 1894 painting titled *Moonlit Lake* displayed below captures some of the essence of H.J. DeForest for me. I interpret this as Henry portraying himself sitting alone on the remote shoreline of a wilderness lake sketching the scene before him with mountains in the background. I am a sailor so the fact that he introduced a sailboat in the middle distance provides further appeal.

While the vast majority of Henry's paintings used mountain scenery as subjects, the following 1895 maritime themed painting titled *Seascape* from the collection of the New Brunswick Museum reflects some of his maritime roots. Maritime province scenes which he painted included Digby


Gut (twice), the Brown Flats on the St. John River, the Beach at Portsborough, Back Bay in Clifton, Germantown and I am sure many more yet to be re-discovered. I encourage any readers who have access to any of his paintings to reach out to me (graham {dot} segger {at} gmail {dot} com).

Another of my favourite DeForest paintings is the following 1901 scene of the Middle Bonnington Falls on the Kootenay River, BC. Henry described the Bonnington Falls as the "Niagara of the West"¹⁰. Unfortunately hydro electric damming of


the river obliterated this waterfall shortly after he painted it. This was one of at least three paintings of the Kootenay River which he produced, including a commission for the president of the Bonnington Falls Power Company¹¹.

A more typical example of his body of work would be the following black and white image of a painting titled *A Rugged Corner of Jervis Inlet* which was exhibited at both the 1906 Canadian

National Exhibition, Department of Fine Arts curated by the Ontario Society of Artists in Toronto and the 1906 Dominion Exhibition in Halifax curated by the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts.

Henry also attended and had one of his paintings exhibited at the World's Columbian Exposition (aka Chicago World's Fair) in the summer of 1893 14.

If I had a personal criticism of Mr. DeForest's work it might be that there is often a feeling of detachment between the painter / viewer and the scene portrayed, particularly in his later works. It was also relatively rare for him to include human figures in his paintings, and seldom indigenous people. A partial list of public institutions where his art is preserved is contained in the endnotes¹⁵.

The Life of a Turn of the 20th Century Landscape Painter

In Henry DeForest's time sustaining oneself as a full time artist would have been a difficult enterprise, as it still remains today. Emily Carr spent a large portion of her life running a boarding house and most of the Group of Seven had jobs as graphic designers. How then did Henry DeForest manage to devote much of his life to travel, study and full time painting? It is unlikely that he would have had significant personal family funds to rely on as his mother was widowed when Henry was six and though she remarried four years later she went on to have two more children to support. When I determined that Henry had married a significantly older widow in 1879, and immediately left for extended travel and study in Europe, I could not resist the impulse to examine the Probate records of his wife's former husband John Wood (1824-1872). Sure enough, a reasonably substantial estate had been left to Ruth (Newcomb) Wood. See later section titled Henry's Wives for more detail and references.

Henry may have received early support from his wife's estate but he showed himself to be a savvy marketer of his artistic output and diligent in the production of his craft. While living in New Zealand in 1889-1890 he produced well over one hun-

dred sketches and paintings, some of which he sold as commissions, some through retail outlets and most through an innovative personal Art Union lottery system 16. He received the permission of the Colonial Secretary to sell tickets which would entitle the holder to receive at minimum one 8 inch by 12 inch oil painting (likely a rough field draft) with a chance to win one of several much larger and more valuable canvases. He held one auction in Nelson, NZ on the South Island in September 1889¹⁷ and another in Auckland on the North Island in November 1890¹⁸. During the 1890 sale Mr. DeForest reported that a book of 25 tickets had been stolen from his studio which was located in Room 102 of the Victoria Arcade Building 19. Vancouver newspapers in both 1894 and 1902 also reported on Art Union sales by Mr. DeForest in that town²⁰. Despite all of the wonderful paintings of the rugged beauty of New Zealand created by Mr. DeForest the only entry he received in what may be the authoritative reference book on nineteenth century New Zealand painters was - "De Forest, H. J. - A Canadian [?] who painted in Nelson in 1889"21.

After a decade of travel the DeForests returned to New Brunswick in September 1891 and settled into a quiet life in Taylor Village near Moncton where Henry spent the year working full time on his oil paintings. In September through November 1892 Henry introduced his work to the New Brunswick public for the first time in a series of public exhibitions. These were held in Dorchester, Sackville, Moncton, Petitcodiac and St. John followed by exhibitions in Montreal and Ottawa the following January and April²². The St. John exhibition at Berryman's Hall was extended to ten days and on Saturday, 19 November 1892 the "teachers and children of the various schools were admitted at the reduced rate of five cents, boys in the morning, girls in the afternoon"²³.

Mr. DeForest was by most reports a sociable man, though perhaps a little elitist. Wherever he settled he was quick to join various clubs and fraternal organizations. He also played the organ and both he and Mrs. Ruth DeForest were excellent singers, not surprising perhaps given their Maritime roots and the Fowler and Burnett families' musical traditions. There are reports of him singing at a benefit for the Young Men's Institute in Nelson, NZ in April 1889²⁴. In 1903 and 1904 the Maritime Provinces Association in Vancouver had over 700 members and Mr. DeForest sang and

gave recitals during at least two of their large gatherings. He was a very active member of fraternal organizations such as the freemasons²⁵ and also the Knights of Pythias, Crusader Lodge No. 12. There can be little doubt that these connections would have been beneficial to his art sales in that day and age.

Henry was also a member and often a director or officer of many of the early arts organizations in Vancouver including the Arts, Historical and Scientific Association (AHSA - forerunner of the Museum of Vancouver), the Arts & Crafts Association, the Royal Agricultural and Industrial Society Exhibition at New Westminster, the Vancouver Studio Club, the Vancouver Photographic Society and the British Columbia Society of Fine Arts²⁶. He was also responsible for hanging the paintings for some of the large B.C. provincial art exhibitions in the early years of the twentieth century.

Henry was one of the founders in 1894 and the initial Secretary of the AHSA and the museum it founded. In 1905 he was appointed the first Curator of the museum housed on the third floor of the Carnegie Library Building²⁷, a post he held for many years. Henry also donated or loaned a number of paintings and other artifacts from his travels to the museum²⁸, including his coin collection. Three times during his tenure as Curator there were night time break-ins which resulted in the theft of coin collections which were on loan to the museum.

In Canadian census forms of 1901, 1911 and 1921 Mr. DeForest was enumerated in Vancouver and indicated his stated profession to be "artist"²⁹. He also listed himself as such in annual Vancouver City Directories at least nine times in the years 1894 through 1915³⁰. He supplemented his income by teaching art classes, sometimes doing so in more distant communities such as Nanaimo. Mr. DeForest frequently embarked on extended summer sketching trips throughout the British Columbia back country.

Setting the Genealogical Facts Straight

There are two significant recurring contradictions with H.J. DeForest's genealogical record. One relates to his year and place of birth and the other to the spelling of his surname. The generally acknowledged authoritative works for researching Canadian artists of his style and period were written by William Colgate (1923), Albert Robson

(1932) and J. Russell Harper (1971)³¹. A history of New Brunswick artists was also published in 1967 by Tweedie, Copswell and Stewart³². All four of these resources list H.J. DeForest's year of birth as 1860, some say in St. John and some say in Rothesay, N.B.. It appears likely that the three later books relied on the initial Colgate work as a reference for the year of birth. The Government of Canada's "Artists in Canada" website entry³³ and the National Gallery of Canada's artist index card also provide the incorrect 1860 year of birth.

I have not found a birth registration for Henry Josiah DeForest, but his baptism was recorded in Hampton Parish, Kings County, New Brunswick on 24 June 1855³⁴. Henry "I." DeForest was reported as six years old on the 1861 Canadian cen-

sus in French Village, NB and the birth month and day of 5 Feb are reported on the 1901 Canadian Census and his 1924 death registration³⁵. Given the Hampton baptism, it is likely that he was born closer to Rothesay than St. John and that is what was reported in one of his obituaries. I've so far been unable to locate an 1851/52 census return for his parents.

The variation in the spelling of his last name is a little more difficult to understand as Henry himself was complicit in disseminating some of the differences. Between 1889 and about 1910 he signed most, but not all, of his paintings as "H.J. DeForest". Thereafter, and occasionally before, he used the form "H.J. de Forest".

There is also debate about whether there should be a space before the "F" and are also numerous examples throughout the historical record of double "rr" being used in his surname. In one perplexing example a booklet co-authored by Henry included his name spelled with both single and double "r" in different sections of the publication 36. Inexcusably, J. Russell Harper in his 1971 book Early Painters and Engravers in Canada uses the "DeForrest" spelling even while citing as his sources Robson and Colgate, who had the spelling correct. I've also encountered index and auction entries using spellings as diverse as DeForist and Frost. This confusion about the spelling of the name has dogged the family right from their early land grants in New Brunswick.

Many researchers also claim that Henry spent the last three years of his life in Banff while in fact he was living in Calgary during that period, but did rent a small summer home on Beaver St. in Banff during July and August of 1921³⁷.

Most sources also contain an error with respect to Henry's first wife's surname. Ruth J. Newcomb's maiden name is often assigned a final "e" which does not exist with her ancestors or her early genealogical records (see later Newcomb section).

Henry's Wives

Henry married twice, both times to 45 year old women, which goes a long way toward explaining why there is no record of any direct offspring. A significant difference between his two marriages is that the first time³⁸ he was 21 years younger than his previously widowed spouse, Ruth J. (Newcomb) Wood and the second time³⁹ he was 21 years older than his spinster spouse, Grace Porter Franks (1875-1967)⁴⁰.

It is always tricky trying to decipher the social and moral nuances of periods so long past, but there is at least anecdotal evidence which indicates that both of these marriages were the catalysts for significant life changes for the DeForests. Immediately after his first marriage in 1879 Henry and Ruth left N.B. and never settled permanently in the province again (they did return for just over a year in 1891-92). After his second marriage in 1921 Henry moved almost immediately from Vancouver to Calgary. Henry's 1879 marriage to Ruth is not currently documented in the NBGS Family Profile for Ruth (Newcomb) Wood and her father Barnaby Newcomb⁴¹. Ruth was a Methodist and Henry an

Anglican. He once wrote of the Church of England that "life is scarce worth living beyond its pale" and he was an active member of Anglican churches wherever he lived.

Ruth Newcomb had married Captain John Wood (1824-1872) on 17 Jun 1854 and together they had five children between 1855 and 1869⁴². Unfortunately, the last four died as infants and the eldest, Herbert H. Wood, died in 1875 at the age of 21⁴³. John Wood was a successful ship captain and merchant who died of that common generic term "consumption"44. He died intestate but a probate inventory signed off by the two older brothers of Ruth and John (bondsmen and appraisers) one month after his death shows that he had a substantial estate of \$7,935.90⁴⁵ which included a house and mercantile business. The probate file also contains one sour note relating to the distribution of this estate. Lovett Mortimer Wood (1858-1914)⁴⁶, a nephew of John, filed a Citation with the Probate Court in 1879 against Ruth claiming that he should be an heir to the estate. Lovett, son of John's younger brother Isaac Wood (1830-1865) was orphaned in 1865⁴⁷ and is enumerated as living with John and Ruth Wood in the 1871 census in Hopewell, Albert County, N.B. 48. A reasonable assumption would be that Lovett was taken in by John and Ruth after the death of his own parents and with the death of so many of John and Ruth's own children he was perhaps treated as part of the family and hoped for a share of the estate. With John Wood dying Intestate, Mortimer's chances of success would not have been high. His application came the same week that Ruth married Henry J. DeForest in St. John and the Citation claims that Ruth was leaving the province for Boston that week. As speculated earlier, the size of the estate may explain how Ruth and Henry were able to finance their extensive global travels and studies in Europe and Australasia over the following ten years. Ruth, who went by the nickname "Bird or Birdie", was also a fine singer, whist player and active in the Women's Canadian Club in Vancouver. She was quite infirm in her final years and has been reported to have been blind. Ruth died on 17

Nov 1919 at the age of 87. Her estate was valued at \$5,305.46⁴⁹ with Henry as the executor and beneficiary.

It was eighteen months after Ruth's death when Henry married Grace P. Frank(s) in Vancouver. Sadly Henry and Grace had only three years together as he died in 1924⁵⁰. Grace did not re-marry and died in 1967. As with Henry and Ruth, there are some variations in the spelling of Grace's surname. Her birth registration and her family's early census records use "Frank" but her 1921 marriage certificate and her headstone use the spelling "Franks".

Henry, Ruth and Grace are all buried in the masonic section of Mountain View Cemetery in Vancouver and share the same headstone⁵¹.

Henry J. DeForest's Youth

Henry Josiah's father, Josiah Fowler DeForest (1821-1861)⁵², recorded his profession as blacksmith when he married his first cousin⁵³ Anah Jane Fowler (1824-1906)⁵⁴ on 25 Sept 1850⁵⁵. James and Anah had six children between 1851 and 1860. only two of whom survived (Henry Josiah DeForest and James Fowler DeForest Jr.). Handed down DeForest family stories tell of Anah's distress at having to watch several of her children die of scarlet fever. James F. died from complications after being kicked by a horse he was shoeing when Henry J. was six years old and his mother Anah and her two sons then moved in with her father Josiah Fowler (1794-1870) on the north side of the Hammond River in French Village, Kings County⁵⁶. Four years later in 1865 Anah married George Harding Burnett (1805-1898), a farmer, singing instructor, and widower from Norton, Kings County⁵⁷.

The painting below is a very early example of Henry Josiah DeForest's work and is believed to be a scene on the Kennebecasis near where he grew up. Note the fish traps to the left, indicative of a tidal environment.

Sometime between 1871 and 1876 Anah and George Burnett moved to Maccon, Cumberland Co., Nova Scotia near Amherst, N.S. 59. Henry has been reported as attending the Sackville Academy though I've not yet been able to confirm this fact. He has described living and working in Petitcodiac in 1876 where "he was called upon to assist with musical entertainments" and was a regular attendant at the Anglican Church⁶⁰. I'm not sure how Henry met Ruth (Newcomb) Wood, but she was also living at the top of the Bay of Fundy at the time of their marriage. Throughout Ruth and Henry's marriage they visited periodically with their DeForest, Burnett, Newcomb, Wood and Fowler relatives, including Henry's younger brother James Fowler DeForest (1857-1934)⁶¹ and two half siblings George Burpee Burnett (1866-1958) and A. Maud S. J. (Burnett) Chapman (1868-Aft. 1921). These visits often punctuated their various international travels.

The DeForest Ancestors

Initially I was able to link into a few NBGS Family Profiles and public family trees⁶² to help focus my research on Henry's ancestors. Henry J. helpfully documented a five generation DeForest male ancestor chart as supplied to him in 1892 by his cousin George A. DeForest of Jersey City Heights,

NJ⁶³. It read Henry Josiah DeForest, son of James Fowler DeForest, son of Henry DeForest, son of Nathan DeForest, son of Ephraim DeForest the Loyalist. Another helpful resource has been family history charts prepared in the 1960s by John Rutherford Heron (1897-1983) based on extensive family interviews and research64 as well as at least one family bible detailing the family of Henry DeForest (1790-1866). My own research is generally consistent with these accounts of Henry's descent from Ephraim DeForest (1742-1827)⁶⁵ and his son Nathan DeForest (1765-1840)⁶⁶ but it is important to note that I have not yet proven all the details to a genealogical proof standard which I am totally comfortable with. This is particularly so as it relates to exact dates of birth. Researchers have been somewhat handicapped by the absence of baptism records in Kings County prior to 1816. The descent has also not yet been proven through an accepted claim to the United Empire Loyalists Association of Canada though such a claim is currently being researched and Henry's 2 x great grandfather Ephraim is listed on the UELAC Directory of Loyalists. Ephraim is profiled in The Revolutionary Soldiers of Redding, Connecticut as a member of the Loyal Association of Reading, is on the ship's list for the Union Transport, 1783 as a shoemaker from Reading⁶⁷, Connecticut⁶⁸, has several Revolutionary War claims for loss Memorials, and is well represented in the British Headquarters Papers, New York City 1774-1783 (Carleton Papers). He was allocated a lot on the north side of Kennebecasis Bay, Kings County (just north-west of the northern tip of Long Island) on 27 Jan 1786⁶⁹ and his name also appears on nine other N.B. land petitions between 1785 and 1791. One of my reasons for writing this article is to solicit further assistance from those who have more fulsome primary evidence relating to the descent from Ephraim to Henry Josiah. I'd be happy to write a sequel to this article when such documentation emerges.

Most people have eight great grandparents. Because Henry's parents were cousins, he had only six. All six of those grandparents were born in the USA and arrived in New Brunswick in the post Revolutionary War period. One set was Ephraim's son Nathan DeForest on this wife Anah (Hoyt) DeForest (1767-1849), daughter of Israel Hoyt. Another set was Gabriel J. Fowler (1757-1832), son of Josiah Fowler (1715-1808), a proven Loyalist, and Gabriel's wife Jane (Hatfield) Fowler (1751-1840). The final set of great grandparents was James Fowler (1758-1802)⁷¹ and Rachel (Hart) Fowler (1765-1838).

Ruth Newcomb and her New England Planter Ancestors

Ruth (Newcomb / Wood) DeForest also descended from one of the early families of the Maritimes, specifically the Newcomb family which arrived in Cornwallis in 1769 to occupy lands recently vacated due to the deportation of the French Acadians. I have used as my initial source for information about the Newcomb family the encyclopedic book by John Bearse Newcomb titled Genealogical Memoir of the Newcomb Family⁷².

While Henry J. DeForest is not documented in the 1874 version of this book, his marriage to Ruth (Newcomb) Wood in 1879 is included in the revised version of 1923⁷³. I appreciate that the Newcomb book is by no means primary evidence, but the scope of the research and the depth of the commentary suggest that it was assembled in a diligent manner from family sources. The revised version also benefits from almost 50 years of scru-

tiny and updates to the original. What follows is a brief summary of a few pertinent details about Ruth's family culled from the Newcomb book.

Ruth's parents were Barnaby Holmes Newcomb (1805-1884) and Lavinia Freelove Calhoun (1809-1861). Barnaby was born in Cornwallis, N.S. but moved to Albert County, N.B. when he was 20 to work in the shipbuilding trade. Lavinia was from Albert Co., N.B. and they eventually settled on a farm in Shepody near Hopewell Hill. Barnaby was a direct descendant of Deacon John Newcomb (born 1688 on Martha's Vineyard-died 1765 in Cornwallis, NS) and his son John Newcomb (1720-1788) who were both original grantees of Cornwallis, Nova Scotia in 1769⁷⁴. The Newcombs were prominent members of the Lebanon, Connecticut (20 miles east of Hartford) community before relocating to Cornwallis. The descent then runs through Joseph Newcomb (1751-1832) to Andrew Newcomb (1781-1876) to Ruth's father Barnaby Newcomb (1805-1884). The significance of Barnaby's first name is worth dwelling on for a moment. His great-grandmother Mercy Barnaby (1730-1776), wife of John Newcomb (1720-1778), was born in Plymouth, Massachusetts and was descended from Richard Warren who arrived in America on the Mayflower and Robert Bartlett who arrived three years later in 1663 on the Anna⁷⁵ and married one of Richard Warren's daughters.

Conclusion

While we have seen above that Henry J. DeForest appears to have a wealth of Loyalist ancestors in his tree, he was perhaps trumped by his wife Ruth, who might have been eligible to apply for membership in the General Society of Mayflower Descendants⁷⁶.

My hope is that this brief overview of Henry J. DeForest's life, art and family history will help to resurrect an interest in the paintings of this New Brunswick native son. The canvases he has left behind constitute a colourful and historic record of the grand landscapes of British Columbia, New Zealand and many other parts of the world, including the area around the Bay of Fundy.

The Story of Belmont

Ray Tanton, contributed by Sandra Clark

Belmont included properties in the Belmont Road of present day Ketepec, part of Saint John NB

Mr. John Stevens received a grant of land from the crown in 1743 (sic? 1783?) consisting of about 700 acres. He lived in the part now called Tumblein on the old Quarry Road, leading through the underpass, continuing back to the limestone quarry, crossing the swamp with a well built portion of good road, mostly built with rock from the quarry. Across the highway from the underpass, and down near the water there was a lime kiln in operation for many years.

Mr. Stevens sold fifty acres of this land to Messrs Brown and Anderson who established a ship yard. The sheds where the ships were built were situated near what later became lot 16 of Belmont. The blacksmith shop was near lot 74, for much scrap iron was found there. The company built two houses on what later became lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 and two more on lots 63 and 64. This was in about 1838.

After years of operation the shipyard property was sold to Mr. Ned Sutton, a native of Sussex, England, the father of Walter Sutton. He in turn sold it to Dunn and Company, an American firm who operated a mill at South Bay. Walter Sutton was born in 1877 and married Hattie May Jones. Dunn and Company also bought the Ketepec mill, owned by Sutton and Jewet situated near to where the Ketepec Marina was built later. Allie Gregory who married Addie Louise Sutton, daughter on Ned, became manager of the mill and later owner along with Mr. Jewett. Allie Gregory was a brother of Mrs. Colby Smith. In 1874 Mr. Stevens sold the balance, 650 acres, to Mr. Bonnel.

Mr. C. B. Lockhart was a clerk at the A. C. Smith Co. store and later became part owner, but because of family differences it was decided to buy out Mr. Lockhart's interest. In 1910 Mr. Lockhart bought the ship building property from Mr. Allie Gregory for \$2500 knowing that Mr. O. B. Akerly and Mr. Mott were interested in it. He subdivided it into lots with Mr. Gilbert Murdock as surveyors. In 1911 he sold it to Akerly and Mott for \$3500, retaining the shore lot, (the Baxter lot) and lots 44, 45, and one half of lot 43. He had previously sold lot 29 to Mr. Olston. Mr. Akerly named the subdivision, Belmont after the town where his wife

came from in Massachusetts, a town of nearly 29000 people between Waltham and Arlington. Mr. Akerly repaired one the Brown Anderson houses on lots 1 and 2 at a cost of \$500 and lived in it using the other house for a barn and storage shed until it was torn down.

Mr. Akerly sold this house and lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 to the K. B. M. Outing Association in 1922. They enlarged the veranda and used the house until it burned down in 1934. They rebuilt it the same year. Murray Long, Mr. Marshall, and Mr. Denniston were very active on the club in the early days, while Gerald Lawrence helped with sports activities. I should mention here that the street lights for the community were paid for with donations by the people. Ray Tanton and Ernie Handren looked after replacing the burned out bulbs until they were taken over by the Civic Hydro. In about 1939 Ray Tanton and Ernie Handren collected money and purchased a water pump, placing it near the top of the hill at the corner of lot 65 with copper pipe leading to the spring, below, that had been contained by a concrete wall. Previous to this the people dipped pots or pans into the spring to get water. Soon everybody had their own well and water system.

Lot 26 had been originally intended for the club house and park, but because those on nearby lots felt that it would become a noisy nuisance, Mr. Akerly built on it himself and sold it to Mr. Norman Ralston, manage of a life insurance company. He then built a house on lot 7 where he lived. Mr. Akerly and Evelyn had three sons and two daughters. Sons were; Serg Mjr Harold who was killed overseas in the first World War in August 1914 (See Note below). Bert was a traveller for Weston's biscuits, while Claire was a baker. The daughters were; Reta, Mr. LeRoy Armstrong; and Eileen, Mrs. Harry McFarlane. Mr. Akerly continued to sell lots until none were left.

(Note - per Commonwealth War Graves Commission website, Harold Gladstone Akerly died August 8, 1918. He is buried in Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery, Somme, France.)

All spellings are as printed in the *Gazette*.

Births (B), marriages (M), and deaths (D) are indexed. Brides are indexed by both maiden and married surnames. Where indicated, names of husbands, wives, and parents have also been included.

Abbreviations used: son of (s/o), daughter of (d/o), wife or widow of (w/o), and child of (c/o).

The Gazette only carried one line for some of these entries but others have several lines or even several paragraphs. Check carefully as occasionally the same event is recorded in two different places of the same issue.

Children of William L. Kaley and Hannah (Kelley) Kaley

This is part of a continuing series on the sons and daughters of the Bull Lake settlers.

EFFIE JANE KALEY (1872-1963): Effie Jane Kaley was born at Lake George, Prince William Parish, York County, New Brunswick, 27
July 1872. In 1876 she moved with her parents to Maplewood, Southampton Parish, York County.
As a child she attended the Maplewood School. She moved again with her family to Bull Lake Ridge c. 1888.

Effie Jane Kaley was married at Houlton, Maine, USA 07 January 1896 to Thomas Francis Troy Jr., son of Thomas Francis Troy Sr. and Eleonora (Nowlan) Troy of Laurencetown, Galway, Ireland and Woodstock, New Brunswick.³

From time to time Effie visited her family at Bull Lake, sometime for an extended period.⁴

Effie was a popular homemaker⁵ who raised her family on Richmond Street, Woodstock, New Brunswick. Her children included: Ada Helen (1896-1920) who married Estrabrooks: Charles Ernest Troy (1897-1977) who married Jennie Franklyn Keetch; Orval Francis Troy (1899-1983) who married Goldie M. Hynes; Thomas Earl Troy (1902-1942) who married Ivy May Stairs, and had a son Donald Eugene Troy⁶; Velma Grace Troy (1904-1943) who married George Gray; William Louis Troy (1907-1954)⁷ who married Marguerite Elizabeth Neal; George Frederick Troy (1910-1976) who never married; Hannah Katherine Troy (1912-1980) who never married; Clarence Edgar Nolan Troy (1915-1993) who never married; and Alice Genevieve Troy who married Steven Vincent (1917-1998)Dempsey.

Thomas Francis Troy Jr. died as a result of a highway accident near Jacksontown, Carleton County, 11 June 1932⁸ and was buried in the Methodist Cemetery, Woodstock.⁹ About 1957 Effie entered the Lewis Nursing Home, Canterbury, York County, New Brunswick, where she died of cerebral hemorrhage 03 April 1963.¹⁰¹¹ She was buried beside her late husband in the Methodist Cemetery, Woodstock.¹² Effie Kaley's genealogical line continues through her numerous descendants.

GILBERT KALEY (1877- 1967): Kaley was born at Maplewood, Southampton Parish, York County, New Brunswick 27 July 1877. As a child he attended the Maplewood School. 13 He moved with his family to Bull Lake Ridge c. 1888 and attended the Grantville School. 1890-1892. 14 On 30 August 1922, at the age of 45, he entered the USA through Houlton, Maine indicting no US contact but his Canadian contact was Mrs. Tom Troy of Woodstock, N. B. 15 Gilbert never married. He lived at Bull Lake and was a farm laborer and woods worker in New Brunswick 16 and Maine for most of his adult life. About 1965 he entered the Harper Nursing Home at Jacksonville, Carleton County, New Brunswick where he died 19 October 1967. The was buried in the Methodist Cemetery, Woodstock. Having no children, Gilbert Kaley's genealogical line ended upon his death.

MABEL KALEY (1879-1950): Mabel Kaley was born at Maplewood, 10 December 1879. As a child she attended the Maplewood School. 18 She moved with her family to Bull Lake Ridge in 1888 and attended the Grantville School, 1890-1894. 19 In 1899 she had a son, Merle Wilfred Kaley who. as a child, went by the name of Merle Cleghorn and Merle Stirling. (As an adult he took his mother's name, Kaley). Mabel married Alex Tapley 20 June 1906²⁰ and lived at Clarkville. They had no children. In later years she lived at Bull Lake with her brother Ed Kaley. Mabel died 28 February 1950²¹ and was buried in the Methodist Cemetery, Woodstock.²² Kaley's genealogical line continues through the many descendants of her son Merle Wilfred Kaley.

EDGAR KALEY (1883-1966): Edgar Kaley, and his twin sister Margaret (Maggie) Kaley, were born at Maplewood 30 March 1883. He moved with his family to Bull Lake Ridge c. 1888 and attended the Grantville School 1890-1897. He never married. He lived at Bull Lake and was a woods worker and a sawmill worker most of his

adult life.²⁵ He lived and worked in the woods in New Brunswick and in Maine.²⁶ He also worked in British Columbia for a short time in 1912.²⁷ He was a Trustee of the Bull Lake School in 1939 and 1940.²⁸ Ed died at the Orchard Nursing Home, Pinder, 20 November 1966 and was buried in the Methodist Cemetery at Woodstock.²⁹ Having no children, the genealogical line of Edgar Kaley ended with his death.

MARGARET (MAGGIE) KALEY (1883-1970): Margaret (Maggie) Kaley, and her twin brother Edgar Kaley, were born at Maplewood 30 March 1883. She moved with her family to Bull Lake Ridge c. 1888 and attended the Grantville School, 1890-1898. As a young adult she performed domestic work in Woodstock. As a goung adult she performed domestic work in Woodstock. As a dat the time of the 1901 Census she was working in Woodstock, living at her sister's (Effie) Mrs. Tom Troy. On 11 May 1904 Maggie married George William Frederick, blacksmith, of Canterbury, York County, New Brunswick. They lived at Canterbury, where Maggie was a homemaker.

Their family, (all adopted), included: Catherine Frederick, Dalton Frederick, Joseph Keith Frederick (?-1996), who married Ann Marie Hourihan and Margaret Mary Frederick, who married Cedric Joseph Cavanaugh. Later in life Maggie (Kaley) Frederick and her husband lived on Franklin Avenue, Woodstock. George W. Frederick died 01 September 1951 and was buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, Canterbury. Maggie (Kaley) Frederick died 22 July 1970 and was buried beside her late husband. Since all her children were adopted, the genealogical line of Margaret "Maggie" (Kaley) Fredericks ended with her death.

WILLIAM B. KALEY (1887-1914): William B. Kaley was born at Maplewood 07 November 1887. He moved with his family to Bull Lake Ridge c. 1888 and attended the Grantville School 1892-1901.³⁷ He never married. He died at Bull Lake of typhoid fever 05 March 1914 and was buried in the Methodist Cemetery, Woodstock.³⁸ Having no children, the genealogical line of William B. Kaley ended with his death.

P. Grant, who pronounced the wounds sufficient to cause death. Deceased is survived by his wife; six sons. Orval, Houlton, immigration officer in charge of Richmond port of entry, and Charles, Earle, George, William and Edgar, of Woodstock; three daughters, Mrs. Velma Gray, Grafton, and the Misses Katherine and Elizabeth at home; one sister, Miss. Annie Troy, Woodstock, and one brother, James, North Vancouver. He was 61 years of age and was born in Tipperary, Ireland, coming to New Brunswick in his youth.

Downton Abbey and its Predecessors

An Unusual Genealogical Legacy Mark W. Gallop

The period drama, *Downton Abbey* was televised in Canada between 2011 and 2015 but public interest is coming back to a boil with a muchanticipated movie version in the fall of 2019. Minutes into the original episode we met the fictional Earl of Grantham, his wife, mother, and three daughters (but no sons) and learned of the death of his heir presumptive in the sinking of the Titanic. We were then plunged into discussions of wills, inheritance laws, and cousinships. No wonder genealogists get such enjoyment from these costume dramas.

Do you remember the spark that ignited your interest in your family history? Was it a birth? A death? A conversation with a relative? Perhaps it was an episode of *Who Do You Think You Are*? or *Ancestors in the Attic*? The *Downton Abbey* series reminded me of my start, at the precocious age of eleven.

Downton Abbey comes from a long line of miniseries which usually sweep across several generations of an upper class family. The genre started with *The Forsyte Saga* from the BBC in 1967. The series was such a success in North America that it was credited with launching "Masterpiece Theater" on PBS in 1971. The success was also noted in Canada and the CBC commissioned a multi-episode drama based upon the novels of Mazo de la Roche (1879-1961), one of Canada's best-selling novelists of the twentieth century but now largely overlooked.


The Whiteoaks of Jalna told the story of Philip and Adeline Whiteoak and their descendants over the course of a century. (As a genealogical aside, de la Roche is said to have taken her characters' names from the tombstones in a cemetery near her home in Newmarket, Ontario.) Jalna was the name of the Whiteoak family's fictional estate. De la Roche told their saga in sixteen books published

between 1927 and 1960. The CBC took thirteen episodes and a two million dollar budget to do so. Despite this funding and the screenwriting skills of the novelist and playwright Timothy Findley, *The Whiteoaks of Jalna* was not a critical success. Too many characters and frequent flash-back sequences left audiences and critics confused and unimpressed. Perhaps as a counter to this, CBC launched a substantial marketing campaign, including support material.

It was the marketing material rather than the series itself that started me off as a family historian. The TV Times supplement that accompanied each Saturday's newspaper included a Whiteoak family tree. (see next page). This intrigued my eleven-year-old self and I not only clipped and saved the chart but used my coloured markers to create a tree of my own family with names, dates, and relationships helpfully provided by my grandparents. I matched the Whiteoak format right down to the colour-coding: a red dot for a blood relative and a blue dot for married-in. The pack-rat archivist in me still has both of these documents.

Building on this simple sketch, I gathered family information, photographs, and artifacts through my teens and into adulthood, taking advantage of the interest of older relations who provided anecdotes and details dating back into the nineteenth century. I quickly discovered that my family stories were every bit as interesting as the fictional melodramas. But my genealogical files weren't quite finished with *The Whiteoaks of Jalna*. The star of the series was the legendary Canadian actress Kate Reid (1930-1993) who played Adeline Whiteoak, the family matriarch. At a certain point I learned that she had a place in my own family tree. She was married for a time to my grandfather's first cousin, the Nova Scotian actor Austin Willis (1917-2004).

Art DeWolfe and Barbara Pearson

Art DeWolfe and Barbara Pearson have been working on creating one complete plot plan from 5 old plot plans for Salt Springs Community Cemetery. Art of Salt Springs has created the map of the all the plots and Barb has doing the research for each plot. There are about 200 plots in 13 rows. They plan to create a booklet for the cemetery. Some excerpts will be published in this and future issues of Generations.



Row # 8 Plot # 45 - No stones - May be 5 burial plots of 2 families in this row between Plot #44 of John Carson and that of Edwin R. Allaby Plot #46 by fence.

1. Isaac Allaby Sr. was born about 1793 in Saint John, St. John Co., NB and died 18 Dec 1875, age 82 in Salt Springs, Kings Co., NB. He is buried in Salt Springs in the family plot.

(Buried at Salt Springs Cemetery where 2 sons, 2 grandsons, with their wives, and 3 great grandsons are buried - reference: Allaby family history).

His parents were Issac Allaby and Sarah (Lesstin no proof of name) of Long Island, NY (No marriage certificate) Burial after 1812 unknown location. (Per ongoing research by Allaby family.)

He married Sophia Frances Wood on 4 March 1815, Burton, Sunbury Co., NB.

2. Sophia Frances Wood Allaby was born about 1795 in Burton, Sunbury Co., NB and died 24 Dec 1873, age 78 in Salt Springs. She is probably buried in Salt Springs (No proof)

Her parents were Daniel Wood and Ann Morgan of French Lake, Sunbury Co., NB. They are probably buried Woodside Cemetery, French Lake. (No proof)

- 3. Son William Allaby was born about 1816 in St. John Co., NB (No proof) and died about 1816 infant Unknown. He was buried about 1816 possibly Salt Springs family plot.
- 4. Son Issac Jr. was born about 1817 in St. John Co., NB and died after 1851 in Salt Springs, Kings Co., NB (Exact date unknown). He is probably buried family plot Salt Springs (No proof)


Obituary of Alice Lucinda Davidson (Hosford) Allaby - 1856-1933

Kings County Record - 15 Jun 1933 - The death of Mrs. Alice Allaby occurred at the home of her cousin, Mr. John Hosford, at Barnesville on Sunday morning May 21st, after a few days illness of double pneumonia. Mrs. Allaby who was 75 years of age, was the last surviving member of the family of the late Mr. & Mrs. William Davidson of Hanford Brook, and spent most of her life at that place. 


The funeral will be held from the home of Mrs. Roy Campbell this afternoon at 2 o'clock, with ser-

History of Simonds, Carleton Co., NB.

by Clark A. McBride, 1950, edited by George H Hayward, 1994

Clark A. McBride, "A History of Simonds," from *The Observer* (Hartland, N.B.), 6 Apr 1950, with additions in square brackets by George H. Hayward, 1994.

This narrative of Middle Simonds (Carleton County, N.B.) will include a list of the families in the year 1890 commencing at the home now occupied by Bradford Craig [and his family], immediately above the little Presque Isle Stream, and going up along the river about three miles to the Ebbett homesteads. It can be vouched for as substantially correct. If there are any errors they are unintentional corrections are invited.

The two focal points of Middle Simonds in the years before 1890 were (I) the village, now disappeared, just below the point where Campbell's Ferry was located. It consisted of a large, for those days, tannery, several stores and homes, a blacksmith shop, and a Methodist Church; (2) the Mills Landing at the old William Mills Hostel where the river boats landed with passengers and freight before the days of the railroad. Many residents of the old Simonds were opposed to the proposition of having the railroad run through their farms, and so the line was surveyed on the other side of the river. In those days Simonds was one of the most prosperous communities along the St. John River, and had the railroad been built on the western side of the river, it might well have rivaled the largest communities of the county.

- 1. C.M. Sherwood Mr. Sherwood kept a general store in addition to farming. His two daughters were Ida and Lena. About 1890, perhaps a little earlier, Mr. Sherwood moved to Centreville and established a larger store.
- 2. John H. Raymond A highly respected, intelligent and prosperous farmer, he was generous, kind-hearted and deeply religious. His sons were William, Woodbury, Randolph and Rice. The latter three migrated to the United States in early manhood. His daughters were: Kate (Boyer), Fide (Plummer) and Cassandra (married name unknown). [John Raymond was born in Simonds in 1838, son of Newman and Mary (Shaw) Raymond. He married Sophia Jane, daughter of Elisha and Mary Ann (Phillips) Shaw, December 10, 1857. He died 20 Dec 1885, and Sophia died 18 Oct 1900. Their children were: William N., born about 1859, married Augusta Parsons; Blanche born in 1861, died 26 Oct 1878, aged 17 yrs., 8 mos.; Catherine "Kate", born about 1863, married Herbert N. Boyer; Fide, borh about 1865, married Mr. Plummer; Woodbury, born about 1867; Cassandra, born about 1870, married Clinton H. Gray; Randolph, born about 1872; Rice, born about 1875.]
- 3. William [Newman] Raymond [was born in 1859, son of John and Sophia (Shaw) Raymond. He died in 1937.] Like his honored father, he became one of the substantial citizens of his community. He

married [Augusta], a daughter of Rev. [Joseph and Sarah (Larlee)] Parsons, a distinguished Free Baptist Minister, and maintained one of the finest farms along the river. He left a record of integrity and usefulness. His son, John, graduated from Acadia College and is now a successful professional man in Ontario. Mabel, his only daughter, married [Elroy] B. London and now resides in Andover, Connecticut, where Mr. London carries on a prosperous farming career with two sons and a daughter living nearby. [William and Augusta also had four children that died young: Winnifred, died 26 Feb 1888, aged 7 mos.; Ruth, died 30 Apr 1894, aged 6 weeks; Ralph, died 4 Jan 1899, aged 15 mos.; and a baby boy, died 28 Apr 1900, afed 11 days.]

- 4. Odbur Shaw Married Miss [Irena] DeWitt and lived a quiet, dignified life. They had one daughter, Bessie, who married Mr. Doll Foster. Her daughter married Barry Fowler, and they still live in one of the three Shaw homes, all close by. [Odbur Shaw was born about 1865, son of perhaps Amos and Lydia (Kelly) Shaw. He died 2 Dec 1922. Irena, his wife, was b. about 1866, daughter of Ezekiel and Irena (Shaw) DeWitt. She died 4 Sep 1914. In addition to Bessie, they had a daughter, Verna Shaw, who married J. Halbert Belyea.]
- 5. Nathaniel Shaw Married Miss Hattie Ebbett, sister of Edmund Ebbett, and lived in the old Shaw homestead. Both died in early life. The old homestead burned many years ago. [He was a son of Amos and Lydia (Kelly) Shaw.]
- 6. David Shaw Married Elsie Colwell. They moved to Detroit, Mich. Two sons survive, Arthur and Albert. [He was born in 1870, a son of Amos and Lydia (Kelly) Shaw. He died in 1936. Elsie was born in 1867, a daughter of John P. Colwell, and died in 1933. Both are buried in the Simonds cemetery.] The old homestead burned many years ago.
- 7. James Christian His parents came to Canada from the Isle of Man in the Irish Sea. He married a Miss Davis and reared a family of five children. He carried on a lumber business in addition to farming. His son, Guy, deceased three years ago, lived in the old homestead on the hill. William D. married Minnian Munroe and they now live in or near Chicago. John married Miss Margaret Hallett and is well known as a genial clerk in the Hartland Farmers' Store. Maude married Kenneth Dunscombe and lived in Roslindale, Mass. Lillian married Albert Briggs and is now a widow residing in San Francisco, California.
- 8. Dudley Munroe Married Carrie Bishop of Lower Perth and lived in the home on the hill overlooking the long reaches of the St. John River -a place beautiful in situation for many years. His only daughter, Minnian, married Wm. Christian. This home burned some years ago and is now replaced by the Allison Shaw home.
- 9. Elijah Shaw Another home on the hill, beautiful for situation. Mr. Shaw married a sister to James Christian. They reared two sons, Allison and Harley, and three daughters: Annie married Earl

Camphell and lived in Peel until recent years. Since becoming a widow she has lived in Simonds. Nettie married and lives in Maine. Lulu married Byron Raymond and lives in Robinson. Maine.

10. Charles Colwell - Mr. Colwell was a carpenter by trade. He purchased the old tannery which used to be located below Campbell's Ferry and from the salvaged lumber built the house located at the foot of the road leading up to the Elijah Shaw homestead. He married Bessie, a daughter of John Kelly. They left Simonds many years ago and lived in British Columbia. One son, Glen, of Hartland survives.

11. John Kelly - A splendid type of citizen and a stalwart Christian. He had two sons, one of whom, Frank, became a school teacher and later went into business. One daughter married a Mr. Jones, an American. After the early death of Mr. and Mrs. Jones their four children made their home with their grandparents. Their names were: Ensley, Bert, Laura, and Nellie. It is believed that Laura is the only surviving member of the family and she lives on the Pacific coast. A daughter of Mr. Kelly, Bertha, married a Mr. Lang of Boston. The site of the old Kelly homestead is now occupied by two small but beautiful dwellings, those of Mrs. Guy Christian and her mother, Mrs. Woodworth, widow of the late Rev. J.S. Woodworth.

12. William Mills - Mr. Mills kept an inn at "The Landing". He was one of Carleton County's best known citizens. He had a keen sense of humor and was a friend to old and young alike. He teased the boys and girls and in his own mind had a suitable mate for one and all. His only daughter, Cassandra, married Mr. Sanford Ingraham who established a prosperous tannery a little below. Their only daughter, Viola, now the widow of Harry Shaw, survived and lived in the old homestead.

13. John P. Colwell - Married [Lavina, a daughter of Elisha and Mary Ann (Phillips) Shaw.] They came originally from the Grand Lake Region. Mr. and Mrs. Colwell were among the most highly respected and dearly beloved families of Simonds. They were devoutly religious members of the Baptist Church. They maintained a fine orchard on the flat adjoining the district school (still in existence) and many a boy and girl now grown old themselves will recall how generous they were with their luscious fruit. [John and Lavina had nine children: Charles B., married Bessie M. Kelly; Shepard E., never married, died in early manhood; J. Ambrose; John R.; Elsie Anna, married David W. Shaw; Caroline Augusta, married Holland Smallie; George L., married Augusta Day and removed to B.C; J. Albert; Wilbur Scott, married Bertie McLean, and removed to B.C.

14. George E. Foster - A highly respected citizen - Deputy and later High Sheriff. Perhaps no man ever became better known than Mr. Foster in the entire county. His son, Sheriff Albion became his worthy successor and at one time represented the county in the Canadian Parliament at Ottawa. His funeral, conducted by the Masonic fraternity at the old home, was one of the most impressive and memorable events of Simonds up to that time. Donald W., the younger son, married but died in rather early life. The daughters were Edna, Annie, Bessie and Maude. Edna and Bessie (Toots) still survive, living

in Massachusetts.

15. Webster Ross - Mr. Ross married Annie Foster. They left Simonds in the 90's for B.C. Mr. Ross, now deceased, was a fine person. His widow, now married again, lives somewhere on the Pacific Coast. The old homestead has had a succession of families from that of Mr. Boyd, then a Mr. Stoddard and others.

16. Frank D. Rideout - The old Rideout homestead first occupied by Thomas, then Daniel, then Frank, then Wilmot, and finally by Judson Rideout, still remains in comparative good repair. Franklin Rideout married Amanda Harmon, daughter of Arvard Harmon of Peel. Daniel Rideout, father of William and Franklin Rideout, and seven sisters, died in 1874. After the death of his first wife, he married the widow of John E. Shaw who later became the wife or Rev. George W. Orser. Franklin Rideout moved to Peel about 1890 to take possession of the large farm of Mr. Harmon. His large family of sons and daughters became well known in Carleton County. Flora married Charles Manzer of Woodstock: Reuben remained on the old farm until his death about four years ago. Wilford recently deceased, became a successful school teacher and spent the largest portion of his life in the Prairie Provinces; Clarence migrated to British Columbia after serving in the Boer War and in the First World War: Clyde, becoming one of Hartlans's best loved citizens, recently deceased; Dalton was killed in the First World War: Aubrey became a teacher in Saint John: Arlie A. died in manhood after a most promising career as a wholesale potato dealer; Clifford, now lives in Hartland and Fred lives in Peel. Miss Pauline Rideout, now owner of the old homestead, also lives in Peel.

17. Wilmot B. Rideout - bought from his Uncle Frank the old Rideout homestead but later sold to Judson Rideout and purchased the Maurice Day homestead in Somerville. He married Lillian Ross of Peel and raised a family of two sons and five daughters, all living but scattered and now living in N.B., Maine, Mass., and N.Y.

18. William C. Rideout - Married Lydia Annie Bishop, Perth, June 30, 1868. He built a new house about 1870 on the upper portion of the homestead. His sons were Wilmot, Judson and Frank C. Daughters were Mina (Mrs. Owen B. Manuel); Effie, twin sister of Frank (Mrs. William S. Parent); Della (Mrs. Murray R. Cluff); Annie (Mrs. Roy B. Hagerman). Mrs. Rideout died Feb. 2nd, 1905, after which William Rideout sold his farm to Judson S. Rideout, his son, and went to British Columbia where he married Mrs. Martha Forshay. He died Jan. 8th, 1924, and his body was brought home for burial. Other family, only two are now alive; Mrs. Mina Manuel and the Rev. Frank C. Rideout of Newton Centre, Mass.

19. William Palmer - Mr. and Mrs. Palmer came to Simonds from Grand Lake. They were substantial citizens and devout Christians. His son, Harvey C. Palmer, never married. The daughter, Addie, married Samuel Couilard, a school teacher. They had one son, Harrison, who died in 1904 in early manhood. It used to be said that Mr. Palmer purchased the first mowing machine in Simonds, manufactured in Ohio and consequently called "Buckeye" after the

state in which it was made. This is the home now occupied by Clarence O. Rideout, son of Judson.

- 20. George Hatfield Mr. Hatfield married Emily Holmes. His first business was that or a shoemaker, and he was an expert workman. He became postmaster, and conducted a country store where almost anything from a fish hook to a barrel of flour or the material for a new dress could be bought. He was friendly to children, a genial and generous neighbour and a citizen with enlightened convictions. His only daughter, Dora, became the wife of George Raymond. His sons were Stanley, Russell, Burrell, William, Archie and Heber H. All are now deceased excepting the youngest son Heber, who has given a good account of himself, both as a businessman and as the town's representative at Ottawa.
- 21. Hiram Raymond A stalwart Christian man and preacher of considerable ability. He lived an exemplary life and left behind him a notable legacy of good deeds. He left behind him too the testimony of a man who firmly believes in another life beyond the storms of this earth. "Being dead, he yet speaketh" of better things.
- 22. George Raymond A diligent farmer who was dignified and quiet as a neighbour. In later life he erected a new home near to the Adventist meeting house. Many of the older people will readily recall his friendly smile and his cheery greetings, back of which was as kindly a nature as ever breathed the breath of life. His daughter Helen, and the only son, Paul, are still residents of Hartland and Simonds.
- 23. Daniel Shaw Little is remembered of Mr. Shaw and his wife. His son, Hanford, never married but was a well-known resident of Simonds for many years. The only daughter, Jane, died many years ago.
- 24. Aaron Shaw Mr. Shaw was a good citizen and a faithful farmer. His son, Dean, left the old home and built a home on a sightly spot on a hillside overlooking the river. The only daughter, Tillie, like so many others, went to Boston and remained there since early womanhood.
- 25. William Ross Mr. Ross was blind in 1890 but a dear old man with many friends. His sons were Webster, Herbert and Harry. Herbert married Mamie Upton of Centreville, learned the insurance business, migrated to Vancouver and became a prosperous citizen. Harry married Minnie Moorse, a daughter of Lebaron Moorse of Connell. All are now deceased.
- 26. Putman Shaw Putman and his wife, Ellen, were good, kindly neighbours during their lifetime. They raised two sons, Horace and William, and several daughters, among whom were Ida and Effie. Horace married Carrie Ebbett, a music teacher. The others moved to Maine. It is not certain if they are still in the land of the living.
- 27. Allen Shaw Mr. & Mrs. Shaw were substantial members of the community. Their oldest son, Alva, migrated to Montana. Oscar, the youngest son, still lives on the old homestead and has a family of his own.
- 28. Charles Ebbett Mr. Ebbett lives on a high hill. Likewise he cherished high and devoted thoughts. He was a deacon of the Baptist Church and was one of a few men who made the new building possible after the old meeting house, half a mile above, went into decay. He gave the land upon which the building was constructed. A son, Harley, and a daughter, Ethel, died early in life. His daughter, Mabel, is now a nurse in Worcester, Mass.
- 29. Mrs. Versie Shaw This gracious lady was a Sunday School teacher

remembered by many boys and girls of old Simonds. She was true blue and loyal through and thought. Her sons were Harry, who spent many years in the Klondike and returned to marry Viola Ingraham, mentioned heretofore. Mrs. Shaw became the wife of Edmund Underhill quite a number of years before her demise. The second son of Mrs. Shaw was Roe, who became an artistic painter and moved to Massachusetts.

- 30. Joseph Shaw The present writer is not familiar with the record of a couple of families of Upper Simonds of the 1890's; but it is believed that Joseph Shaw was the father of Frank and Millard Shaw and of Dora who married E.C. Barnett. Elisha and Lynn Shaw were, it is believed, born and reared in Simonds. They both made fine records in life. Elisha became a blacksmith in Hartland. Lynn married May Campbell, went to southern California and became a prosperous garden farmer.
- 31. Mr Brooks Mr. Brooks lived back on the hill some distance north of the old Baptist meeting house. He was a staunch member and exemplified the Christian virtues in his everyday life. A son migrated to Boston. Relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Brooks, Bessie and Ernest Cox, made their home there for many years,
- 32. Mr. Guerrier Norville was the oldest son, and John the youngest. The writer knows so little of this family that he does not dare to venture in any exposition.
- 33. Thomas Underhill Quite a large family was raised in this home, including a pair of twins, but again the writer dares go no further.
- 34. Mr. Raymond The writer recalls two excellent sons, Byron and Wilbur, and a beautiful daughter, Pearl. Byron married Lulu Shaw.
- 35. Mrs. Elizabeth Raymond Mrs. Raymond had a son, Rainsford. Later she moved to a home near to the Hatfield store till the time of her death. Her son predeceased her by several years.
- 36. Marvin Shaw Mr. Shaw was a brother to Aaron Shaw. He raised a family of boys, the older of whom were Carl and Lewis.
- 37. Melvin Ebbett Melvin Ebbett and his lovely wife were among the finest residents of old Simonds. They were hospitable to everyone and had no enemies. They had a son, Aubrey, I think. The daughter, Jennie, was a lovely girl. She married Hartley Boyer of Hartland and they moved to Vancouver, B.C., where they still live.
- 38. Edmund Ebbert Mr. Ebbett spent a number of years in the west as a miner. He was a friendly, likeable man and a genial neighbour. One daughter, name unknown, married a Mr. Mitton,
- 39. Whitfield Ebbert -He married a Miss Thoms and it is believed they had two daughters, names not known,

And so our narrative comes to a close. Never has a community boasted of more genuine and wholesome citizenry than the Middle Simonds of 1890. The same God who made these fine characters of long ago is able to preserve their souls and bring them forth in His Own good time to full fruition of their fondest hopes. They have passed into the Great Beyond but we must remember that the tomb is not a blind alley. It is a thoroughfare - it closes with twilight to open with dawn. That, indeed, is the unconquerable spirit with which we face the future years with whatever those future years may bring.

Brunswick by February 1912.⁶ She married John Bertrum "Jack" McIntosh, son of Donald Angus McIntosh and Alice Elizabeth (Barry) McIntosh.⁷ Their children included: Eveline Elizabeth Esther (McIntosh) Bustard⁸ (1912⁹-2011); Vera Alice (McIntosh) Sewell¹⁰ (1916-1995); ¹¹ Lorne James McIntosh (1918¹²-2003); John Robert McIntosh (1919¹³-1984) and Myrna Alma (McIntosh) Pomeroy¹⁴ (born 1936).

Guy Ruben Carpenter farmed at North Richmond for the rest of his life. He died 17 September 1970

and was buried in the Saint John's Anglican Cemetery, Richmond Corner, N. B. His wife died in 1983 and was buried beside her late husband. 52

On 29 April 1937 Alfred A. Craig and his wife Eva Ethel Craig sold Garnet Otis Carpenter and his wife Marion Julia Carpenter two lots on Queen Street, Woodstock identified as Lot C and Lot D. To pay for this purchase Garnet and his wife borrowed \$1,000. at 6% interest from Perley G. Strong who took out a mortgage on these properties. This mortgage was discharged 20 December 1944. 61

Garnet Otis Carpenter died 22 November 1970 and was buried in the Rockland Cemetery, McAdam, York County, New Brunswick. Marion died 04 July 1999 and was buried beside her late husband. 63




