PROBLEM CORNER

This quarter, most of the "corner" will be devoted to one problem, since it is a fairly complex one which most Manitoban genealogists have to deal with sooner or later.

Question: Alan Breakey of Bragg Creek, Alberta, writes: "I have tried to obtain information from the Manitoba Department of Vital Statistics but have met with no success. They seem to require that I fill out a form containing the very information that I am seeking before they will give out any information. Needless to say, I find this a little perplexing and I am wondering how this dilemma can be resolved. In essence, I would like to find out how one can get access to government genealogical data when one has only a few concrete 'leads'." (underlining ours)

Answer: The short answer is, "So would I", and so would many other M.G.S. members. We have nearly all experienced similar frustrations in trying to obtain information from Manitoba's Vital Statistics Branch, and some feel that Manitoba shows a greater passion for secrecy of such data than most other jurisdictions.

To give a specific response to your question, we would need more details. In general, of course, they can provide only documentation related to births, marriages and deaths that occurred in Manitoba since 1882, and early years' data are incomplete. You must provide them with the name of the person for whom information is sought, and as much additional information as possible. They do NOT do SURNAME searches, even for unusual names in restricted areas. But, even if you do not know the exact year or location of the event, they will do searches of the files province-wide for \$15 for a 5-year period, and \$1 per additional year.

Two conditions on these searches sometimes cause problems. One is that, except for death certificates, the searcher must be a descendant or relative (or the authorized agent of one) of the person whose records are sought, and the other is that records of persons still living can be made available only to those persons or their authorized agents. The former is a minor problem for most genealogists but the second can be more serious, especially for families that were separated when children were very young, and the searcher may not know whether his parents (grandparents, uncles, etc.) are still living.

The requested procedure here is that the searcher attempt to get a death certificate first. Since the year and place of death aren't known, this could cost \$60 or more and still be fruitless, and is virtually impossible for a woman whose name may have changed through (re-)marriage prior to her death.

A more common problem, however, is that records are found for two or more persons with the name given for the period and area searched. In this case, the V.S. Branch will not give out either or any of them until you can prove which is your ancestor. This may be the Catch-22 situation suggested by Mr. Breakey, when you have to give them the information before they will give it to you. At present, the only solution is to attempt to obtain more information on the individual in question from other sources (for example, the 1891 census), and then get back to the person who did the search at the V.S. Branch and try to make a match with one of the persons found. Be sure to ask, as well, how many persons fitting the name and data given were found, so that you will know the size of the problem.

In the long run, there must be a better way, so we contacted Ms Marjorie Kreton, Director of Manitoba's Vital Statistics Branch (Department of Community Services), 104 - 401 York Ave., Winnipeg MB, R3C OP8, to get their point of view. She advised that providing information to genealogists is a recognized function of the Branch, although a tertiary one, after a) recording and preserving the records and, b) providing certificates for legal purposes. Most of what we perceive as excessive secrecy derives from the Manitoba Vital Statistics Act, the legislation governing the operations of the Branch, and these acts do vary from one province to another.

She noted, however, that at a recent "Uniform Law Conference" of provincial Attorneys-General, a uniform Vital Statistics Act was drafted and recommended to all provinces. If or when Manitoba adopts this, it will partially resolve our difficulties for the earliest records, since it provides that all records over one hundred years old will be transferred to the Provincial Archives and be made available to the public.

Ms Kreton also clarified a practical problem that they have, and the reason that genealogical searches cost more than legal searches, viz, that records for most years prior to 1900 are not indexed; most are arranged by municipality, but even where that is known, such searches are time-consuming. They do not have the personnel available to index these, and have not been successful to date in getting students for this purpose on summer employment programs. She did suggest that if the M.G.S. were able to get funding for someone to do such a project, that a cooperative arrangement could probably be worked out.

All this may not provide much immediate help to Mr. Breakey, but it does show at least two ways in which the M.G.S. and its members may be able to improve the situation: 1) by urging the Hon. Roland Penner, Attorney-General, and Hon. Muriel Smith, Minister of Community Services, to amend the Vital Statistics Act to eliminate the excessive secrecy requirements, at least to bring it in line with the proposed "uniform" Vital Statistics Act; 2) by developing a project in cooperation with the V.S. Branch for indexing the pre-1900 records. Rumour has it that a resolution relating to this has been proposed for the M.G.S. Annual Meeting January 30, 1987.

In general, the attitude of the V.S. Branch toward genealogical research seems to be more positive than some of us might have thought, and we can also be encouraged by the fact that Ontario Vital Statistics Branch has established a Genealogical Research division. Let us hope that each province recognizes increasingly that, in the long run, the most important values of the data that they preserve are for genealogical and historical research.

PASSENGER LISTS UPDATE. Word has been received from the Public Archives of Canada that the project for indexing the ships' passenger lists, mentioned in the last "Problem Corner", has collapsed and no new indices are available. We'll try to get more information for the next Generations.

BRANCH HISTORIES

HISTORY OF THE BRANDON & DISTRICT GENEALOGY SOCIETY (1978 - 1986)

A growing interest in personal genealogy, in branches and twigs of the Family Tree, stems from the rootlessness of large segments of society. People who no longer identify with a place, a neighborhood or a church congregation, all want the security of belonging. The success of Alex Haley's quest in "Roots" added fuel to the fire.

Two Manitoba Genealogical Society (M.G.S.) members, Mrs. Ruth Tester and Mrs. Gertrude Gross, both seasoned "Ancestry Hunters", decided to do something about forming a local Genealogy Society. On Wednesday evening, 11 January 1978, 42 people attended a public meeting at the Agricultural Extension Centre, Brandon, Manitoba. Mr. Eric Jonasson, President of M.G.S., contacted by Mrs. Tester, attended as guest and advisor.

The original petition for permission to organize was signed by Ruth Tester, Gertrude and John Gross, W.L. and Doris Tomasson, E. Jonasson, Goldwin and Meta McCulloch, Joseph and Marla Gross, Thelma Potter, Mrs. Gilbert Phillips, Gary Palmer, D. Tapp, Nancy J. Simmons, Irene Shand, Jean M. Harvey, K. Smith, and granted by E. Jonasson.

The newly named Brandon & District Genealogy Society agreed that an interim executive hold office until September 1978, when an Annual Meeting would be held. The first Executive covered a varied range of occupations and life-styles. BLAIR LOREE, as President, farms a thousand acres or so with his son at Justice, Manitoba. His records take him back to 1675 to a Huguenot ancestor in France. First Vice President RUTH TESTER's interest began in 1930 with information from her father, Harry Cater, Mayor of Brandon. She now has information back to 1760. GERTRUDE GROSS has served for several years as a researcher of ancestry for the Mormon faith. BARRY REILLY, a teacher in the Brandon School Division, was chosen as Second Vice-President. JEAN HARVEY, a minister's wife, became Secretary. She has done considerable work on Ontario and English records. GARY PALMER, as Treasurer, is researching Mormon ancestry. At the first meeting of the Branch on 1 February 1978, a Program Convenor, PHYLLIS LONG, researching in Canada and England, was added.

Blair Loree and Ruth Tester were interviewed by Kaye Rowe for the Brandon Sun issue of 27 January 1978 to introduce the new group. By March, 39 members had joined the Society and the Brandon Branch.

A start-up grant of \$54.00 was received from M.G.S. Branch news would be included in the publications "Generations" and "MGS News". Branch fees were set at \$1.00 per year (now \$3.00). M.G.S. fees were \$7.00 (now \$15.00). The first few meetings were spent documenting needs of members at a Beginners' Class. Local sources of information were compiled by Barry Reilly. Gertrude Gross outlined source information available through the Mormon Church.

At the June meeting plans were made for about 14 members to start on Cemetery Transcribing under Ruth Tester's direction. This project has gone ahead over the succeeding years until most of the cemeteries within easy driving distance have been transcribed. At our request, a large map of Brandon Cemetery was placed at the Main Gate with information available at the Caretaker's home. In 1980 a grant was received from New Horizons to defray the cost of car expenses and supplies.

December 1978 began a tradition of having a Christmas Dinner Meeting with members, relatives and friends at the Agriculture Centre. Also in June each year, Meta McCulloch of Souris has graciously opened her home to us, to have a picnic on the lawn for the last meeting before the summer break.

Under the direction of Tom Stacey in 1981 and following years, with the exception of 1983, a Genealogy Course has been part of Brandon University's Continuing Education Course. Members give what help they can on a one-to-one basis on two evenings. Gertrude Gross, as part of the course, explains the IGI at the Mormon Church. The Branch has been host to the Annual M.G.S. Seminar twice, in 1982 at the Ag Centre and in 1986 at the Brandon University.

The Ag Centre continues to be "home" for the Branch, as a meeting room is supplied free of charge. However, we are attempting to set up a library. After checking out all other possibilities in the city, Tom Stacey and Eileen McFadden came to an arrangement whereby we have been allocated space in the Brandon University Archives Building. With a grant from the Heritage Foundation, a good deal of work has been done. With the help of a staff of two, so far 1900-1920 BMDs have been carded and the computerized indexes are in the works. Future plans include work on the Library/Archives, Cemetery transcriptions, the Brandon Presbyterian Church records being worked on by Jim Wall, and continuous recording of current Brandon Sun obituaries.

In nine years we have had an interesting variety of speakers on such topics as Photography, Adoptive Children, Manitoba archives, LDS records, Scottish History, Compiling a Family History, Early Life in Manitoba, to name a few. We appreciate the help received from our members and M.G.S. people. Tom Stacey has appeared on our behalf on radio and TV. Ruth Tester, Blair Loree, Phyllis Long and Meta McCulloch were also on TV programs. Blair and Betty Loree worked on an Oral History program, the tapes of which can be heard in the Brandon Public Library.

CURRENT 1986 EXECUTIVE

Gertrude Iris (Shine) Gross (#122), Past President.

I was born 19 January 1923 at Fort Frances, Ontario, the eldest in a family of four, two girls and two boys.

My father, James Orville Shine, came of Irish ancestors who were part of the Peter Robinson Settlers in Peterborough County, Ontario, in 1825. Descendants in our line moved from that area to Huron County and Rainy River District, Ontario.

My mother, Ethel Christena Bastedo, came of Spanish and Dutch ancestors who were in the original group of United Empire Loyalists coming to Cataraqui, Ontario in 1783. Our branch of this family spread to Niagara Peninsula and Burlington, Ontario, and Estevan, Saskatchewan.

I received my schooling in Fort Frances, Ontario, and graduated from the School of Nursing, McKellar Hospital, in Fort William, Ontario. Shortly after, I married John William Gross of Winnipeg, Manitoba, and raised seven children, 6 girls and 1 boy.

I have been engaged in personal genealogical research for twenty years and am a past president and, with Ruth Tester of Brandon, a founding member of the Brandon & District Genealogy Society.

Tom Stacey (#496) President.

Tom is a native of Montreal, Quebec, with family roots there since 1870, a mixture of English/Irish/Scottish. Tom is married with two children and two grandchildren, and employed as an instructor in the Department of Psychology at Brandon University.

With an interest in genealogy going back to his youth, when he recalls asking relatives how old they were and where they were born, Tom has been concentrating on this interest for the last 10 years. He became associated with the Brandon Branch in 1979, served $2\frac{1}{2}$ terms as President and is currently Branch Archivist.

While currently researching England and Scotland, Tom's main interests are computer applications in genealogy and compiling family group records for Westman area. He has authored some articles and appeared on TV and radio and is now involved with a project to record Births, Marriages and Deaths in the local newspaper.

Ken Hyndman (#924), Vice-President.

Ken joined the Brandon Branch of M.G.S. in 1984, having become interested in genealogy after finding a number of old letters and documents in the family's possession from previous generations. He farms with his brother 22 miles north-west of Brandon. His area of interest is eastern Ontario, going back to Ireland on one side and England, Scotland and Ireland on the other side.

Alvaretta "Reta" McMannis (#143), Secretary

I was born on a farm near Oak River, Manitoba, second of six daughters of William and Annie (Butterworth) McMannis. After High School in Rivers, I spent four years in the R.C.A.F. Women's Division in Ontario. In 1945 I put away my medals (EBGO and Bar) and went to Brandon College. After completing a couple of other courses, I spent the next twenty years in the Accounting Depresent of Procter & Gamble in Vancouver and Winnipeg. Presently I am a Volunteer at the Brandon General Hospital.

My father's people came to L'Avenir, Quebec by sail from Ireland in 1832. My mother was born in Leeds, Yorkshire, England and came to Canada before World War I. I joined M.G.S. in 1978 and have worked mainly on cemetery transcribing since then.

Myrtle Grieve (#499), Treasurer

Myrtle was born in Deloraine Memorial Hospital, Winchester Municipality, Manitoba. She is the daughter of Thomas Richard Grieve and Mary Isabella Wallace. She attended Berry Hill Rural School and Medora High School. Myrtle did housework in farm homes in the district of Medora before moving to Brandon in 1967. From 1969 to 1982 she worked as a Dietary Aide at Fairview Home Inc. She is presently doing volunteer work at the Assiniboine Centre and Prairie Oasis Senior Centre.

Myrtle started in genealogy work to learn more history of her grandparents, great grandparents and their families. She is interested in the following ancestral lines: BELL, ELLIOTT, GRIEVE, INGRAM, RINN, RICHARDS, DALGLEISH, JOHNSTONE, OGILVIE, McFARLANE, WALLACE, PHAIR and PAISLEY.

Ruth Tester (#46), Special Projects Founding Member

Ruth Cater was born and lived all her life in Brandon. She is the eldest child of Harry William Cater and his wife, Eliza Jane Heal. Her father came from Norfolk, England in the late 1880s and purchased the Pump Manufacturing Co. of the late Mr. Reisberry, which he operated for some 50 years until his death. Her mother came with her family from London, England after the turn of the century. She had been trained as a dressmaker and remained in Brandon working while her family moved onto a farm in the Maryfield, Saskatchewan area. The Cater family consisted of three daughters and two sons, Ruth being the only one still living in Brandon. Ruth's husband, Albert Tester, also from England, died very suddenly several years ago. A son and his wife and two children live in Toronto.

Ruth is one of the founding members of the Manitoba Genealogical Society and in 1978 contacted Eric Jonasson and asked him to come to Brandon to talk to interested people about forming a group here. As a result, we formed the first Branch of the Manitoba Genealogical Society. We have recorded over 80 cemeteries in this area of Manitoba and copies have been supplied to M.G.S., the Provincial Archives and Brandon Public Library.

Merle Flynn (#1038), Publicity

Merle was born at Isabella, RM of Miniota, Manitoba, the third daughter and fifth child of a family of seven born to Ralph Arnold Phillips and Hazel Rose Reid. She went to school in Foxwarren and Isabella. Married to George Flynn of Birtle, they have three children: Dawn, Deborah and Douglas, and seven grandchildren. George Flynn was a Navy man, later farmed and worked at the Birtle Collegiate. He and Merle are now superintendents at Winnipeg House, a Seniors' complex in Brandon.

The Phillips and the Reids both came from the Ottawa Valley area of Ontario, to Brandon. George Phillips (wife, Emma Norton) was a tinsmith. Merle's interest in genealogy began when her daughter was born, with a family tree in her baby book, and later through a search of Military Records from Ottawa covering members of the military in her family.

THE DAUPHIN BRANCH OF MANITOBA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The Manitoba Genealogical Society (M.G.S.) was organized in 1976 under the leadership of Eric Jonasson. Those joining prior to July 31, 1976 became known as "Founding Members." Founding Member Jean Tucker, of Dauphin, thought it would be useful to her community to have a Branch of M.G.S. to help struggling family historians. She set about contacting the local newspaper and radio station. An article in the Dauphin Herald written by John Halliwell after interviewing Mrs. Tucker in February 1978, sparked some interest which encouraged her to continue the effort. She contacted CKDM's Helen Henderson, who in turn publicized her request to have interested persons contact her.

On September 19, 1979 a meeting of those interested persons was held at the Dauphin Public Library for the purpose of forming a Branch of M.G.S. It was necessary to have the signatures of at least 15 people on a petition in order to have Branch status given to the new organization. The following are the "Founding Members" of Dauphin Branch:

Meetings were held monthly at the library. Because of the increased use being made of the microfilm reader-printer, the Director of Parkland Regional Library had the machine moved to the Public Library at the request of Dauphin Branch of M.G.S.

On November 10, 1979, Eric Jonasson came to Dauphin to address the fledgling group. His topic was "Collecting Biographical Material for Your Family History" and he related a number of ways in which information in local newspapers could be of great assistance to researchers. This motivated the Dauphin branch's efforts toward indexing death notices and obituaries in early local newspapers as well as current ones. This project, coordinated by Jean Tucker with assistance from Eleanor Anderson and Evelyn Ayers, has been an on-going and valuable project. It has been referred to often in order to answer queries from people whose ancestors once lived in this area.

The next project undertaken by the Dauphin Branch was trasncribing the Riverside Cemetery and, later, a number of smaller cemeteries in the Parkland region (Keld, Kosiew, Fork River, Valley River, Laurier, Kinnesota). In May 1980, Mr. and Mrs. Mack Cyluck came to Dauphin to instruct the group on methods for cemetery transcribing.

Over the past seven years, the Dauphin Branch has attempted to bring in new members by setting up displays at library, shopping mall, Allied Arts building, and Fort Dauphin Museum. Help to new family historians has been provided through conducting workshops and inviting interesting and informed speakers to address meetings, including Gordon Dodds of Provincial Archives; Del Snodgrass, local historian; Stella Hryniuk, Professor of Ukrainian Studies at University of Manitoba; Ruth McDormand, retired librarian; Eric Jonasson, Ruth Breckman and Flo Cox of M.G.S. This year we have started an adoption plan. Seasoned family historians will "adopt" a beginner for a few months to help him or her get started on family history research.

In 1983 Faye Hickey made arrangements for a group of Branch members to go to Salt Lake City, Utah to spend a week doing genealogical research at the LDS Main Library. This was a highlight event for Dauphin Branch.

Another highlight event was Seminar '84 which was held at Dauphin. Our Branch does not have a large membership, so everyone had to give their very best effort to make the Seminar the great success it was.

WINNIPEG BRANCH HISTORY

In November, 1978, twenty-nine members of the Manitoba Genealogical Society (MGS) petitioned the Council of the Society for permission to organize themselves into an official Branch of the Society. The first president of this group was Susan Cote, who was elected and served in 1979.

Others who were elected and served as President of the Branch were Bill Cottrell 1980, Madeline Cyluck 1981, Florence Cox 1982-1984 (now Past President), and Margaret Sheridan, 1985-1986 and re-elected for 1987.

During the year 1979-80, a Beginners' Workshop was organized. This course was held twice per year, spring and fall, and continued for twelve weeks each session. Fourteen members attended the first course. Cemetery transcribing began at St. John's Anglican Cemetery at the same time, and this has continued throughout the city and the province as a Special Project of the Society to which the Winnipeg Branch have lent their support. Quite a large collection of transcribed cemeteries is now housed in the library of MGS at 167 Lombard Avenue. A translation service through the Ukrainian Cultural Centre also was set up during this time. This assisted members with the translation and interpretation of letters and documents in foreign languages.

In the beginning, the Branch met at various places in the city until space for meetings and the library was generously provided at the Teachers Library and Resource Centre, 1180 Notre Dame Avenue. When the Society was required to move from the Resource Centre, the Branch again met in various places in the city until they could arrange for space at the Museum of Man and Nature. The Branch now holds its meetings every third Thursday, September to May, in the Classrooms of the Museum.

From an inaugural membership of 29, membership has grown to 88 in 1980, 121 in 1981, and approximately 157 in 1986. Our membership fee began at \$2.00, was increased to \$3.00, and now remains at \$5.00 for 1987.

In 1980, the members of the Branch supported MGS with a project to gather information from obituaries in the Winnipeg Free Press, the Winnipeg Tribune, andthe Winnipeg Sun, and from many rural papers, and transfer this information to computer cards. This project covers the time period 1880 to the present and is ongoing.

Many organizations have given us assistance over the years: the University of Manitoba, the University of Winnipeg, the Ukrainian Cultural Centre, Hudson's Bay Company Archives, Provincial Archives of Manitoba, the Manitoba Historical Society, Winnipeg School Divisions, Church of Latter Day Saints Library, Winnipeg Public Library, Elizabeth Dafoe Library, to name but a few. They have provided us speakers and counsel in many ways.

Our branches from Dauphin and Brandon must not be overlooked for their contributions to our meetings and seminars. Our members and the members of MGS should be credited also; they are the roots that support us as we reach out into the community, to seek and share our common human existence.

As we compiled this brief history of the Winnipeg Branch, one name appeared in the minutes from the inaugural meeting to the present time. That person has served as councillor, recording and corresponding secretary, treasurer, vice presient, president, past president, and is still going strong! You will find her in the MGS office most days, willing to help whenever, wherever she can. Thanks to Florence Cox for her dedication to the Manitoba Genealogical Society and, in particular, to the Winnipeg Branch. We would not exist without you!

FOUNDING MEMBERS

BIOGRAPHIES

ERIC JONASSON, M.G.S. #1

Eric Leonard, son of Victor Otto Jonasson and Eileen Margaret Dipple, was born in 1948. He was married in 1974 to Elizabeth Cazakoff, daughter of John Cazakoff and Marion A. Chutskoff of Kamsack, Saskatchewan. They have two children, Erin and Kristjan, both born in Winnipeg. Eric was raised and educated in St. James-Assiniboia, where he presently resides.



Eric became involved with genealogy in 1968 when he received a family history on one branch of his father's family which his great-great-grandfather had commissioned shortly before emigrating to Canada from Iceland in 1881. This piqued Eric's curiosity and prompted him to research further into this aspect of his heritage, which was later extended to include his mother's French-Canadian and German-Canadian background. His wife, Elizabeth, has Russian-Doukhobor ancestry.

The Manitoba Genealogical Society was founded in June 1976 through the efforts of Eric Jonasson, who was chosen as its first President at the inaugural meeting, a position he occupied until the end of 1979. During his tenure of office, Eric was involved with virtually every aspect of the operation of MGS. Liz Jonasson was the first Corresponding Secretary and later became Recording Secretary and Chairman of Special Projects. Eric coordinated the 1981 Seminar.

Eric has written over 70 articles dealing with historical and genealogical themes, is a contributing editor to a number of genealogical periodicals, and has published three books: Tracing Your Icelandic Family Tree (1975), The Canadian Genealogical Handbook (1976, rev. 1978), and Untangling the Tree (1983). He has lectured across Canada and the United States on genealogy since 1978.

Eric was employed in the mapping industry for almost 12 years and established his own company in 1975. In 1979 Eric entered the publishing field on a full-time basis and is presently owner/operator of Wheatfield Press, Winnipeg. He has been involved with the Icelandic cultural community in Manitoba and has served on the boards of the Manitoba Historical Society and the Red River Valley Heritage Society. He was recently elected as a School Trustee for St. James-Assiniboia School Division.

IRIS M. G. ROSSER (WALKER), M.G.S. #11

Iris was born in Vanguard, Saskatchewan. Her mother, Gladys (Gunn) Walker had come from England on the "Virginia" in May, 1906, to Crystal City, Manitoba with her mother, aunt, uncle and cousins. Her father, J. E. Gunn, had arrived in 1903. The Gunn family moved to Val Marie, Saskatchewan, 90 miles south of Swift Current, in 1911. Iris was educated in Saskatchewan and the States and in 1936 married John Rosser, who had come to Canada from Pontypridd, Wales in 1928.

In 1941, because of the depression and drought, they sold everything and left the farm, heading east in a half-ton truck with 2 young children. Close friends in Selkirk, the Railtons, encouraged John and family to stay and try for a job at the Manitoba Rolling Mills. Within five weeks, John was able to get work and find a house. Iris still lives at the same address in Selkirk. John passed away in 1983.

Iris and John had 6 children, 5 boys and a girl. Iris now has 20 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren. They fostered 13 children, including one little Eskimo baby.

Iris's mother was extremely interested in genealogy, and the family talked a lot about where they came from. Iris went to Milwaukee and Racine, Wisconsin, traced her family back to 1635 and found a book, "The Walkers of Plymouth Colony" about one branch of the family who left England on the "St. Elizabeth."

Her grandmother's family, mostly Pennsylvania Dutch, have been traced back to early 1700 with recent exciting leads. Both great grandfathers fought in the American

Civil War. Iris was able to interest some cousins and they put together a masterpiece of information with encouraging new and exciting leads. Iris's maternal grandmother was born in Nottingham, England. Her grandfather was English and Welsh and Iris has traced these families back to the early 1700s, visiting England and Wales once.

Friends in Winnipeg, Madeline and Mack Cyluck, were interested in genealogy and heard Eric Jonasson on radio or TV. They, along with Iris, arranged to meet with him and helped to lay the groundwork for the formation of M.G.S. They subsequently attended the inaugural meeting in June of 1976. Iris was charter member #11. She signed up as the first Librarian and contacted other organizations for examples of what systems were most rewarding to use, as well as ideas on what books, etc., should be acquired, and what policies might be adopted for use of the library by members.

In addition to genealogy, Iris works as a volunteer in a Public Library, and enjoys quilting, baby sitting, reading, visiting the elderly, and being librarian for her LDS Church, serving members in Selkirk and surrounding area. She has held a valid First Aid & Home Nursing Certificate since 1957, and also holds a certificate covering Home Care requiements, one of the first to be issued to Home Care Workers in Manitoba. She was a charter member of local CAMR, formed in 1956 in Selkirk and served over 10 years, and is now an honorary member.

PAT THOMASCHEWSKI (DRYDEN) M.G.S. #16

I was born in Huntsville, Ontario in 1938 and after the war we moved back to the farm in Domain, Manitoba. I have two younger sisters.

I attended grade schools in Domain, Ste. Agathe and Sanford. After two months at Success College I worked for the CN Telegraphs in Winnipeg.

In 1958 I married Frank Thomaschewski and we settled on the family farm in Starbuck. I help with all aspects of the farm and am chief combine operator during harvest.

We have three children and four grandchildren. I have worked at various jobs over the years: parts person at Chabot Imperial in Elie; Teacher's Aide; taught Driver Education and owned and operated Pat's Driving School. At present I have been a councillor for the R.M. of Cartier for nine years. I'm vice president of the Domain Legion Branch 208 where I've been an associate member for 12 years. I have served on various United Church committees as well as singing in the choir. As a founding member of MGS, I have been involved in a few committees, vice president and for a couple of months as president.

At present, I'm researching four families in Ireland, Scotland and Norway. My interest in genealogy began when I saw an advertisement about the founding meeting of MGS and attended.

Marilyn became a founding member when she was living in The Pas and saw Eric Jonasson on TV. As a child she became curious about her grandparents and ancestors as she listened to stories at family gatherings. She became a full-fledged genealogist when in the fall of '69 she wrote a letter to England and received an overwhelming reply. With the help of a friend, she constructed the necessary charts and forms. Since then, she has been putting the flesh on the skeleton, and has written family histories on her mother's paternal branch, both her parents, and also her husband's family. She has also transcribed Dominion City Cemetery for M.G.S.

The oldest of five children, Marilyn was born at Virden and lived in Manitoba all her life. Her parents were born and raised in Elkhorn. Her paternal grandfather came to Canada from England, joined the army and went back to England for WWI, returning with a bride. Her mother's parents, originally from Scotland and England, came to Manitoba from Bruce County, Ontario. They settled at Lippincott, near the Saskatchewan boundary.

Gerry is a Founding Member of MGS. He saw a notice in the paper and attended the first meeting and has been active ever since, serving as Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Councillor, Education Chairman, 10th Anniversary Co-chair, and has organized a number of seminars.

Born in Vista, Manitoba, Gerry is the only son of Dorothy and Harold Brown. His grandparents on both sides homesteaded in the Rossburn area. The Browns came from Niles, Ohio and England. The Cormacks came from Scotland as a result of the potato famine. The two Stitts who came to Manitoba were members of the family that named Stittsville, Ontario. There are now over 278 Stitts in Manitoba, at last count. The Cope ancestors came to the Russell area from Antrim, Ireland.

After taking teacher training at Brandon University and teaching school for a few years, Gerry studied Library Science in Kalamazoo, Michigan, and is now Chief Librarian for the Winnipeg School Division.




