Guide to the Holdings of the Public Records Division, Public Archives of Canada Part 1

The Public Records Division has custody of the historical public records created by the various departments and agencies of the government of Canada and of its direct predecessors. It should be noted, however, that the following pre-Confederation records are in the custody of the Manuscript Division:

Executive Council of Upper, Lower and United Canada (RG 1); Provincial Secretaries of Canada East and Canada West (RG 4 and RG 5); Pre-Confederation records from the Governor General's Office (part of RG 7); British military records (RG 8); Legislative records of Upper and Lower Canada (part of RG 14).

Historical public records normally come to the Public Archives through the operation of the records management program in each department. The Division's holdings now fill about sixty thousand linear feet of shelf space.

Registration/Search Rooms

Persons wishing to consult the holdings of the Division must register first at the registration desk on the third floor. Those who have a valid registration card issued by either the Manuscript Division or the Archives Library are automatically registered with the Public Records Division. The finding aids to our holdings are in our office area on the seventh floor (room 701), where they may be consulted during office hours. Archival specialists are available to assist researchers in obtaining their references.

The material is actually requested at the circulation desk in the main search room on the third floor. This search room is used by the clientelle of the Manuscript Division and the Archives Library, as well as the Public Records Division.

The Organization of Our Holdings

The holdings of the Division are organized into a number of "record groups". A "Record Group" (usually abbreviated as "RG"), can most easily be defined as any body of records of the federal government or its predecessors that are organizational or functionally related by administrative continuity. In practical terms this usually means that a separate record group is created for each department, branch, or agency which maintained a separate and self-contained registry system. The records in each group are organized in a manner that most nearly reflects the evolving administrative structure of the creating department, branch, or agency.

Inventories

The contents of our record groups are described in inventories, each of which contains a summary description of the various series that together make up the groups. The Division is in the process of revising and publishing its inventories. A list of those currently available in printed form appears in appendix 4.

Finding Aids

The inventory will refer the researcher to more detailed finding aids, which are:

- 1. Contemporary finding aids, produced at the time the records were created. These exist for older series and are usually in the form of detailed registers and indexes to the registers. They are located either in the Divisional reference area or in the stacks, alongside the documents themselves. In the latter case, the finding aids must be requested at the circulation desk on the third floor.
- 2. Shelflists or other detailed list, which may be found either on the shelf with the inventory or in filing cabinets in the Division's office area.
- 3. Card indexes to registry files, located in the card drawers along the wall inside the entrance to the Division.
- 4. Computer-produced keyword indexes, located on the shelves with the other finding aids in the Division reference area.

How to Request Records

Researchers wishing to consult records should complete a request slip indicating the record group (RG) number, the series (if necessary), and the volume number. In the case of one group (RG 24), the actual file number must also be indicated. Specific instructions as to how each group should be ordered will be found at the front of each inventory, together with information as to the location of the records (i.e. whether they are in the main Archives Building or in a satellite location). Archivists in the Division are available to assist researchers in completing request slips.

Access to Records

Access to most records in our custody is governed by the government access policy, which means that access to most records less than thirty years old is subject to the prior permission of the transferring department. Our staff will assist researchers with problems concerning access. Specific information concerning access restrictions will also be found at the front of each inventory.

Tiny Problems: Genealogical Sources in Monaco

Mention the Principality of Monaco to most people, and the first thing that comes to mind are visions of Princess Grace, the Monte Carlo casino and gran prix auto racing. Indeed, in many respects, public awareness of this tiny principality far exceeds that which might be expected for a small nation of 30,000 inhabitants huddled on 465 acres of land. In terms of geographic area, Monaco would make a poor sized farm in many areas of Manitoba.

The history of the Monégasques extends back to ancient times when it was settled by Phoenician seamen. However, Monaco did not become an entity unto itself until the thirteenth century when it came under the authority of the famous Grimaldi family of Genoa. Prince Ranier III, Monaco's present ruler, is the thirtieth member of the Grimaldi family to rule this tiny oasis on the Riviera.

Monaco has alternated as a protectorate under France, Spain, and the now defunct kingdom of Sardinia. It has been completely independent since 1911, although, in the event of a vacancy in the crown, Monaco would become a part of France.

Undoubtly few Canadians trace their roots to Monaco. This article is for that small number of Canadians of Monégasque descent and for the many others who wish that they were.

ARCHIVES
