



- 2) contain no statements that are false or misleading;
- 3) ensure a regard for public safety and shall not depict situations which might encourage inappropriate, unsafe or dangerous practices; and
- 4) conform to public standards of taste and decency.

- 1.3 Placement - Advertising shall not be placed by the Society in any publication or media program that discriminates in its content on the basis of race, sex, language, religion, marital status, family status, source of income or age. Advertising that appears in any publications of the Society shall not discriminate in its content on the basis of race, sex, language, religion, marital status, family status, source of income or age.

- 1.4 Application of the Policy - Where any doubt exists as to the application of the policy, the President of the Society shall decide.

2. Advertisements in MGS publications shall be directly relevant to members of the Society.

3. 3.1 All advertisements shall be subject to the approval of Editorial Advisory Board of the Publications Committee.

- 3.2 Where doubt exists as to the appropriateness of any advertisement, the president of the Society shall have the right to deny its publication.

4. All revenues from advertising shall go directly to the MGS.

## **COPIES OF ONTARIO CENSUS MATERIALS IN WINNIPEG DEPOSITORIES**

This article is intended to serve as a preliminary inventory of Ontario census and ancillary materials held in Winnipeg depositories. The survey has included the collections of the Provincial Archives of Manitoba (PAM), the Legislative Library, and the libraries of the two universities. I am much indebted for assistance from the curators in the preparation of this report.

The present notes supplement in some respects an article by Eric Jonasson entitled "Using Census Records in Your Research" which appeared in this journal Vol. 2 No. 3 1977, pp. 53-57.

As far as is known, all surviving originals of Ontario census returns are held by the Public Archives of Canada (PAC); and it appears that all of these materials up to and including those for 1881 have been microfilmed. PAC has been routinely releasing films of these records after 100 years have elapsed, and in some cases earlier.

The films listed in the 1981 Catalogue are all available through interlibrary loan. It is stated on p. xi that:

Microfilm may be borrowed for use, three reels at a time, by any library or other institution which has a 35mm microfilm reader and participates in the interlibrary loan arrangement. Requests for loans must be submitted by the borrowing institution on authorized forms to the Public Archives of Canada, 395 Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, K1A 0N3.

Moreover, copies of many of these films are available for purchase, information on which appears on p. xii of the Catalogue. An attempt has been made in this article to list all such copies in Winnipeg collections; but due to ongoing acquisitions it will always be best to refer to the card catalogues of the various libraries. Finally, the interlibrary loans services may be able to provide information regarding newly-released films.

It should be noted that the Ontario Genealogical Society has produced card indices to personal names in some census returns. By late 1979, indices to the 1851 censi of Carleton County (ca. 20,000 cards) and of Bytown (ca. 2500 cards) had been completed (see The Archivist, vol. 6, no. 3 1979, p. 11). Enquiries regarding the indexing project might be addressed to the Society.

At least one census has been published, namely: 1861 Census of Charlotteville Township, Norfolk County, Canada West (Seattle, Washington: Seattle Genealogical Society, 1973). 107 pp. plus index; maps, notes, bibliography. (This can be ordered from the Society for \$10.00).

There follows a chronological listing of all known copies of census materials available in this city:

#### CENSI OF 1842 - 1871

It appears that only one library in this city, that of the University of Winnipeg, has copies of any of this material; it is housed in the Periodicals Department on the second floor. A word of warning is in order here: these films may be borrowed by faculty members, and frequently are; it is advisable to telephone the department on the day of a planned visit to ensure that the desired film is actually in; and to reserve it for that one day for use in the library.

I have been unable to determine with certainty whether this material constitutes the whole of the census returns for the time period covered, or whether it was originally released in the form in which it is now organised, that is to say, in two series.

There is a finding aid to at least part of the material, published by PAC as Finding Aid 300. I have not seen an entire copy of this; but a finding aid available at the University of Winnipeg for the first series may be a photostat of part of it. No finding aid for the second series is to be found there.

All of the boxes themselves have unfortunately been relabelled in such a way that the PAC reel numbers are sometimes obscured. Reference to the PAC Catalogue, however, should resolve any doubt as to the identity of a film. It is always these reel numbers, and not the present box numbers, which should be used in any citations of these records.

#### First Series

This consists of 42 reels of film released by PAC in 1977. The boxes, labelled "Census returns ... for Ontario counties of Glengarry, Grenville, Leeds, Peel, Stormont & York for the years 1842, 1851, 1861, 1871", are in the catalogued microfilm drawers, filed as Mic HA 747.06A2.

Two copies of the aforesaid finding aid have the same call number and are shelved on top of the microfiche cabinets.

It should be borne in mind that the returns of 1842, which list only the heads of households by name, have not survived for all townships in the counties of Grenville and York.

### Second Series

This consists of 49 reels of film, numbered 1a and 1 - 48, released by PAC in 1969 - 1975. The boxes, labelled "Census returns: Canada West census, 1842 - 1861; Ontario census, 1871" are in the catalogued microfilm drawers, filed as Mic HA 747.06A24.

As stated previously, there is no finding aid specifically intended for this series available at the University of Winnipeg. It has thus proved impossible to include an authoritative list of contents; and it was felt that an attempt to reconstruct one might prove misleading. However, the PAC Catalogue should suffice for most purposes in locating the requisite film. A determination of all films pertaining to a particular county can be constructed by consulting the listings for its constituent townships.

### 1881 CENSUS

This was released by PAC in 1979, the portion for Ontario occupying 57 reels numbered C-13226 - C-13282.

## BOOK REVIEW

**GNADENTHAL, 1880-1980.** Prepared under chairmanship of Jacob P. Redekopp. Published by Gnadenthal History Book Committee, Box 267, Winkler, Manitoba R0G 2X0, c1982. 232 pp., cloth. ISBN-0-88925-386-2.

One of many community histories issued in the past decade as western Canadians celebrate the municipalities, towns and villages whose beginnings date from the first wave of European settlement. A unique characteristic of this history is its representation of a series of village societies striving to preserve a way of life - the Dutch who settled in 18th Century West Prussia on the marshy deltas of the Danzig, their descendants who migrated to Chortilza, Molotschna or Fürstenland Colonies in southern Russia, and finally those who migrated to Manitoba.

Gnadenthal itself was settled twice. In 1880, some twenty young men broke ground on the West Reserve for exclusive Mennonite settlement west of the Red River to establish a new community. During 1920-24 all but one family emigrated to Mexico, due to conflict with the provincial government over the issue of public schooling and provincially certified teachers. Following a general exodus, a new influx of settlers arrived in 1924. Gnadenthal, Manitoba, became the new home for the population from Gnadenthal, Barataria Colony, Russia. It is this second group which celebrates its community history in religion, education, agricultural development, social and cultural achievements from 1924 to 1982.

For those without personal ties to the community, interest will lie in the social history, accounts of village administration, settlement experiences, agricultural innovation, specialized institutions which reflect a particular way of life transported from the old land and adapted to the new. Well documented, well mapped and illustrated, the volume's one serious flaw is its lack of an index. For the specialized reader this will prove a handicap.

A copy of this volume has been added to the MGS Library.

## COLLECTING FAMILY STORIES

Everyone enjoys a good story. Among the members of any family, stories take on a special significance. Handed down from generation to generation, stories become part of the family tradition. Unfortunately, hundreds of the best are lost over the years, simply because no one takes the time to collect and record them, the meat and muscle on the bare skeleton formed by the family names and dates.

Recorded carefully by the genealogist, stories flesh out the mental picture of distant relatives, of renowned or not-so-renowned ancestors. Stories can reveal characteristic traits along the family line, to the point where resemblances of youngsters to oldsters produce the comment "that's just like Uncle Charlie!" or "Grandmother Penny all over again!"

The gathering of stories becomes a truly fascinating game, to be carried on and savoured with relish over the years of exploring both print records and personal reminiscences. Anecdotes lend spice to a published family history. Much of the laughter at a family reunion builds up over tall, and then taller, tales.

The collector needs to keep an eye and an ear always at the ready because stories turn up everywhere. First sources are living relatives with reminiscences of "Aunt Mary's ginger snaps" or "young George's near miss with a fast freight." With the current use of small tape recorders it is easy to preserve the exact turn of phrase in the authentic voice of the story teller. Time is required to establish a mood and set the speaker at ease while the tape is running, but results can be rewarding.

Where some people freeze or become self-conscious when tape is used, it is advisable simply to make brief notes during an interview, notes which are to be re-written and expanded in peace and quiet before memory of the session can be forgotten by the interviewer.

Whatever method is used, the keynote is casual conversation in an informal setting with inconspicuous note-making. A few old photographs with one or two anecdotes will serve to establish suitable common ground and "prime the pump." Given time and gentle prodding, some of the best stories will come from the one who states at the start that he or she knows nothing worth telling - until you strike a responsive chord with a yarn from your own store.

Paper sources may be dusty diaries or a bundle of personal letters reflecting life as it was in pioneer days, during the Depression, or even back on an immigrant ship. Often the alert searcher can locate relevant materials in a local newspaper report of an accident, an award presentation, a court trial, complete with names, dates and a full array of minute detail.

Occasionally, a formal social history text describes vividly the customs and dress of one specific community in the exact spot or neighboring to the community which nurtured your earlier ancestors. An appropriate excerpt from the printed

text, including copyright permission, may be requested from the publisher. A judicious adaptation of general information on ancient times to weave a tale around a known ancestor identified in that place and time may read like the proverbial reporter's tale, including the use of "allegedly" and "a usually reliable source"! Create one or two stories of your own – with appropriate precautions, of course.

Stories are best accumulated, each on a separate sheet of paper or on a 5" x 8" file card. Always include a note on the source in sufficient detail for formal acknowledgment at publication time and any necessary back checking. Preliminary arrangement, as the collection builds, may be according to the teller's name, the subject's name, or by broad topic, - e.g., adventure, fishing, school, Christmas. Initially, stories will probably be a part of whatever notes are taken during a search or an interview. However, it is good practice to transfer special items for the story collection into the story file at the earliest opportunity. At the same time, any polishing or re-writing should be carried out while the teller, or the print source, is fresh in the collector's mind. Thus, you can best preserve the appropriate tone for each tale.

Standards for such editing need to be established early by determining your objectives. What do you really wish to accomplish? Do you want to preserve the authentic tale as originally told, warts and all, perhaps two or three versions of the same incident? Do you plan to polish just a little to enhance the original and avoid possible embarrassments or conflict? Are they to be a mixture of "sweet" and "sour"? Have you decided to handle all the stories as first person or third person accounts, or will you mix the two? Perhaps it is your intention to gather a group of tales as they might be told by a grandparent who treasures old memories and shares them with children or young people beside a fire?

Once the first dozen or so are assembled, and your purpose is clearly established, the collection can grow endlessly over the years - a genuine family album. Be prepared. For every one you use you may acquire two others, yarns you will be told about someone in the family or about the teller, with the proviso that "it must not be included in the book." Honour that commitment. All those tidbits in confidence are the personal possessions of the keen collector - more, much more than you have permission to publish, or to repeat. Secret stories are all part of the game, and more than half the fun.

## The Coat of Arms —

### A VISIBLE LINKAGE BETWEEN PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE GENERATIONS

Having always been fascinated by the beauty and historic significance of heraldry, it was for years my desire to establish a heraldic tradition in my own family through the acquisition of a coat of arms.


I was delighted in 1975 when a letter arrived from a mail order firm in Eastern Canada, offering to provide me with the Schoch coat of arms. I completed the order form and returned it immediately with the required cheque attached. Two or three weeks later, I held proudly in my hands "my" heraldic bearings. This mailing also contained an offer for a heraldic wall plaque. Needless to mention, I ordered two of these. Alas, when they arrived, to my amazement the plaques bore an entirely different design than the originally received emblem. I knew then that someone was taking advantage of me and promptly returned the plaques to the mail order firm.

Upon further study of the subject of heraldry, it became obvious to me that this ancient and honorable cultural heritage is frequently misunderstood and abused. Few people seem to realize the fact that a coat of arms is usually granted, certified, registered, or otherwise recognized as belonging to one individual alone, and that only his direct descendants with proven lineage can be recognized as eligible to inherit the arms. It is highly inappropriate for one to locate the arms of another person sharing the same surname, and to simply adopt and use these arms as one's own. Such infraction of armorial regulations and customs constitutes a flagrant abuse of arms which no knowledgeable and honorable person would intentionally commit.

Having absorbed this new knowledge concerning heraldry, I virtually resigned myself to the sad fact that I would never be able to display my own coat of arms. However, early in 1982, an interesting newspaper article drew my attention. It contained information about a Heraldic Artist and Consultant in Toronto. Following an exchange of correspondence, he agreed to accept me as a client.

After researching all current and historical Schoch coats of arms, he came quickly to the conclusion that I could not claim eligibility to any one of these. He then offered to design my own heraldic bearings which subsequently could be registered with the American College of Heraldry. After four months of correspondence, exchange of information regarding ancestral background and review of conceptual designs a new coat of arms was created, satisfactory not only to me, but also to all members of my family who were to become the rightful bearers of these arms. A black and white rendition of these armorial bearings is here reproduced.

Not less important is its blazon or technical description which, like a chemical formula, specifies each and every part of these arms in traditional Anglo-French terms. As example, the following blazon is applicable to these particular heraldic arms, with more commonly used terms shown in parenthesis:



Argent (white), charged per pale (perpendicular) in full length a fir tree with three branches on each side Vert (green), supporting in Chief two shields: in dexter (left), Or (gold), three stag-antlers Sable (black), for Württemberg, and in sinister (right): Or, an eagle displayed Sable, armed and langued Gules (claws and tongue red), bearing on his chest the cross-over-crescent Argent, for Silesia. In upper base between the second and third fir branches, in dexter a bear rampant (standing up) Sable, langued Gules (tongue red) for Berlin, and in sinister a maple leaf Gules for Canada. Above the shield is placed a Helmet with a Mantling Vert doubled Or and a Wreath Or and Vert, and set thereon for Crest, Luther's symbol Proper between two wings Vert, and in an Escrol below the shield this Motto "Always Trustworthy".

The next important step was the registration of the arms. I had a very pleasant experience in dealing with Dr. David P. Johnson of the American College of Heraldry in this regard, who was extremely helpful and accommodative. I had decided to register the heraldic bearings for my father and his descendants, including my brother and his children, as well as myself and my children. Therefore, three generations would immediately become the rightful bearers of these arms. Following three months of correspondence and processing, I eventually received a beautiful handlettered and handpainted document of antique parchment, about 18" x 24" in size, confirming the registration. The registration was subsequently announced in the College's publication THE ARMIGER'S NEWS.

As the College is prepared to assign a representative for the creation of a pleasing, meaningful and technically correct design, one may contact its office directly to undertake the entire process. The address is:

The arms registration fees, including design development, amount presently to \$150.00. Several family members may be registered on a single document. The College also offers a membership which is assessed at \$25.00 annually and provides subscription to its quarterly publication THE ARMIGER'S NEWS. However, membership is not a requirement for the registration of arms, nor does one have to register a coat of arms to become a member.

It should also be noted that the College registers coats of arms which have been granted by offices of arms in other nations. Included are both arms borne by individuals and those borne by institutions.

Another service provided by the College is the registration of the ancestral lineages of member armigers through its Genealogical Registrar. The lineages are subsequently also published in THE ARMIGER'S NEWS. While the College's primary focus is naturally on the heraldry of America, its membership and interests are international in scope and it welcomes membership and registration of arms from persons residing outside the United States. Quite a few notable Canadians are members and have their arms registered by the College.

For nearly a thousand years the Western World has evidenced increasing interest in and use of armorial bearings. Many are surprised to learn that coats of arms are more widely used today, and that more new arms are designed and recognized today than at any previous time in history. The ancient armorial tradition would certainly have become extinct long ago were it not based in more than the early utilitarian purposes of medieval warfare and the sealing of documents. The bearing of heraldic arms suggests philosophical undergirdings related to the influence of arms upon the solidarity within the family, the sense of place and belonging they offer to the individual, and upon the encouragement of a lifestyle based on honor and the recognition of the responsibility for service to others.

Such arms serve as a subtle but constant reminder to descendants who bear them of their continuing responsibility to lead lives of honor and service and thereby to bring even greater honor and recognition to the family arms. For the coat of arms proudly represents an active and present relationship between members of a family and a visible linkage between past, present and future generations. The arms then represent continuance and endurance and provide a strong and lasting symbol for family unity. Arms serve to encourage a sense of interdependence which strengthens the family structure. The arms shared by members of a family are a heritage of "belongingness", promoting the ideal of a family joined together and inseparable in spirit.

Armorial bearings contain a quality of intangibility which is most significant to the family. Lands, monies and properties may be lost because of economic changes, wars and other disasters, leaving ensuing generations without inheritance. However, a coat of arms is a recorded design of identification which is fully able to survive change and loss. It can even endure a dormant period only to be reclaimed by rightful descendants at a later time. At the armiger's demise, he leaves an armorial estate to his descendants throughout all future generations. It is a legacy which can never be depleted, devalued, lost or stolen; rather, the arms of just and honorable persons singularly increase in their meaning, significance and value as they are taken up and borne by those descendants in each generation who proudly claim their birthright by registering to bear the ancestral arms.

## THE FEDERATION OF FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETIES

Since September 1983 I have been officially appointed as the liaison officer between the Federation of Family History Societies centred in Britain and M.G.S. These responsibilities evolved over the past two years when I began selling the publications Colin Chapman first introduced to M.G.S. members at the 1981 Seminar.

As the title of the Federation suggests, membership is only granted to societies, not individuals. The Federation promotes the study of family history in many ways. Some methods include: publishing informative booklets; encouraging members to index the genealogical records of their particular county or province and organizing two conferences each year. The publication of the journal in the spring and fall is planned to coincide with the conference.

Any M.G.S. member visiting Britain is encouraged to attend either the F.F.H.S. Conference or the local seminars organized by the individual Family History Society. Some people from Manitoba may wish to represent M.G.S. at the Council meeting. The next spring F.F.H.S. Conference will be held from April 13 - 15, 1984, at Canterbury in Kent.

# **Municipal Records:**

## **AN ESSENTIAL PART OF MANITOBA'S HISTORICAL MOSAIC**

A mosaic can be defined as a picture which is created by joining together minute pieces of different coloured glass, stone, etc.

A historical mosaic is a picture created in much the same way. Every person, every town, municipality or district, every organization or institution, leaves a record of existence and activity.

The historical mosaic of Manitoba can only be made whole by the study of its component parts. Only then can a complete, colourful picture of the past have meaning for the present.

The lives and activities of the Indian peoples can be recreated through examining artifacts and relics discovered in burial mounds and in long forgotten campsites. The life of the fur trader can be rediscovered through studying abandoned forts, company and personal correspondence, diaries. Settlers and pioneers have left diaries and letters, traditions and artifacts which interpret life in early Manitoba. Social organizations and churches have preserved the story of cultural and spiritual contributions made to community life.

And municipal records reveal how local governments were established, developed and maintained.

Municipal records reveal a picture of society: the political, economic and social structure in which people live. Since the late 1870's, provincial legislation has required certain records be kept.

The Manitoba Towns Corporation Act(1879), Section 163, requires "the Secretary-Treasurer shall be the keeper of all books, registers, plans, maps, archives and other documents and papers, which are either the property of the corporation, or are produced, filed and preserved in the office of the council; and he shall not divest himself of the custody of these archives except with the permission of the council, or under the authority of a competent court."

The consequence of such a broad and ambiguous definition - "books, registers, plans, maps, archives and other documents and papers" - led inevitably to mountains of paper and enormous housekeeping tasks.

In 1955, the Municipal Act was amended to specify exactly what documents should be retained in perpetuity, and what documents could be destroyed after certain time had elapsed.

Section 98(1) of the Municipal Act deals with the Retention and Destruction of Records. Schedule I details the documents and records to be retained permanently.

Through examining the list of Schedule I documents, a picture of the political, economic and social structure in which people live emerges. Let's take a look at this list and find out what these historical documents can reveal.

Audit Reports: reveal the complete financial history of municipal corporations. Such reports include tax rates and tax revenues; revenues from other sources; expenditures, capital and operational; current municipal cash positions.

Other facts may be revealed. The February 18, 1879 minutes from the R.M. of Westbourne contain the following remarks from the auditor: "In submitting our report of the financial standing of the municipality, we have pleasure in bearing testimony, upon the whole, to the neat and careful manner in which the Treasurer has performed his work...but we found the books in a state which has added greatly to our labour, we beg respectfully to suggest that he be instructed to have his books balance, and a balance sheet made out by the end of each year thereby greatly expediting audit work." A gently worded rebuke!

General and subsidiary ledgers, and General Journals: reveal detailed financial information, background to the audit reports.

Assessment Rolls: reveal the complete records of how tax dollars are spent. Periods of high/low tax levies, and records of tax collection indicate the economic climate of the times.

Tax Sale Records: reveal lands sold for unpaid arrears of taxes, disclose land eventually redeemed by owners or acquired by municipal corporations. Such records serve as historic economic indicators.

Minutes: reveal the ongoing business of local government. "Moved that the clerk be requested to write the Local Government asking them for a reply to the petition of the council for assistance towards improving the main highway leading through this community." (Town of Gladstone, July 14, 1978). Road maintenance, a common and continuing problem throughout the Province and the years!

Committee Reports: reveal recommendations of committees to council on issues of the day. "Committee on Grassy River Bridge reported having let repairing of same to R. Innes for \$15.00 which was now completed to satisfaction." (R.M. of Westbourne, April 8, 1881). A century later, repairs are still being made, but not for \$15.00.

By-laws reveal local policies. Regulatory by-laws restricting activities and adopted for "the good and welfare of the community" present a picture of the moral, ethical tone of the times. Have a look at the following:

Revised By-law number 12, April 14, 1894: To fix the time and place for voting on "A By-Law to prohibit the Rural Municipality of Saint Laurent from receiving Liquor Licence Moneys" - how times have changed!

Revised By-Law Number 5 of the same date concerns itself with community health.

"To prevent any person or persons from leaving exposed the dead carcass or carcasses of an animal or animals. WHEREAS it is necessary for the public health to prohibit any person or persons within this municipality from leaving exposed, unburied or unburned the carcass or carcasses of certain animals which die of disease or otherwise. Be it therefore enacted by the Municipality of Saint Laurent, etc." Strict penalties are included as subsections.

Obligatory by-laws detail the appointments of officials, etc., and are a source of interest. Revised By-Law Number 1, dated January 21, 1882 of the Municipality of Saint Laurent reads:

"The following persons are appointed to fill the respective offices for the coming year: William George Hunton, Clerk, Collector and Assessor at a salary of \$90.00, \$20.00 and \$25.00 respectively. Alexander McLeod, Treasurer at a salary of \$25.00". Readers will be pleased to know that by 1909, by-laws disclosed that Mr. Hunton's annual salary as Clerk rose to \$125.00.

Municipal Plans: reveal the pattern of community land uses. Municipal services - sewer, water, street and sidewalk paving programs, all public works projects undertaken for the "good and welfare of the community" are recorded.

Permits: reveal the status of growth. Through examining building permits, the boom and bust cycle vs. steady or declining economic development is disclosed.

Vital Statistics and Cemetery Reports: reveal information about the people. Births, marriages, death records document the cycle of life. Since 1979, the responsibility for monitoring birth, marriage, death records has been transferred to the Department of Community Services and Corrections, Vital Statistics Branch.

List of Electors: reveal eligible resident voters and non-resident property owners.

Schedules II to V specify documents which may be destroyed after the lapse of specified time periods. An examination of the Schedules reveals that such documents provide background information to documents specified for retention in Schedule I.


The Municipal Act, Section 145(2) provides for access to these historical documents. To quote The Act, "With the approval of the council, as shown by a resolution thereof, the clerk of a municipality shall produce for the examination of any person, on his demand, as provided in subsection (1)\* any other record or document of the municipality in the possession of, or under control of the clerk."

In the past century plus, municipal documents have resided in vaults, attics, storage areas in municipal offices. Some have been victims of natural disasters such as floods and fires. Others have been victims of neglect, or indifference. The majority have been maintained and carefully preserved to present a social, economic, political picture of community life, essential to Manitoba's historical mosaic.

## AREA MAP




