### LIFE IN A CLOSE-KNIT FAMILY

Editor's Note: The following is taken from the book, Je Me Souviens — A Family Remembrance, by Albert BOISSONNEAULT and is reprinted here with his widow's permission. Mr. BOISSONNEAULT's book is in the AFGS Library.

Because of the closeness of the family homes, and the necessity of finding companionship in walking distance, my grandparents played a large part in the lives of my sisters and me.

My Pepère (grandfather), Ludger BOUCHER, was at heart a farmer. though also a mason and bricklayer by trade. The small farm that he owned at St. Edmond, Quebec was not very productive, sitting as it did on the rocky soil near the foothills of the Laurentian Mountains. In those days there was very little transportation in the Province of Quebec (around 1915) and that added to the impossibility of his railing enough cash to support the farm. The extra milk and cream from seven or eight cows was sold to a local dairy and from that source a little cash was received. The creamery could convert the milk to cheese or butter since it had the ability to ship those products to Montréal, a distance of some 50 miles. My grandfather could grow almost all of the family food except for sugar, tea, coffee, and flour. Sometimes even the coffee was ground from grain grown on the farm. The dew times I tried it, I found it not too bad. When I spent summers at the farm, my sisters drank milk, as there was always a lot of it around. Pepère had about 30 chickens so eggs were also plentiful. Every year he raised a pig which was killed in the fall; of course I was back in Lowell by then.

After a few years spent on the farm, Pepère BOUCHER's cash would be gone and he would sell his animals and machinery and move his family back to Lowell. There he would return to the trade of masonry and begin accumulating another bankroll. When Pepère's pockets were heavy enough, he would happily head north to his true love, his farm in Canada, and start the cycle anew. (This is why the birthplaces of my aunts and uncles alternated between Canada and Lowell. Though my mother was born in Canada, she spent most of her years in Lowell, as did her brothers and sisters.)

His last trip back was in 1918; in 1922 he was finally forced to give up the farm and remain permanently in Lowell. At that time, the only child whom he had to help with the farm chores was my youngest uncle Fred; he was then about 18 years old and wanted to come back

to Lowell, his birthplace. In any event, the work on the farm was just too much for only two men to handle.

My grandfather was a very mild man, sober and industrious. I never saw him drink any liquor except for New Year's Day (Le Jour de l'An). On that day all of his children and grandchildren who lived in the Lowell area would come to receive his blessing, and old French Canadian custom. One or two of his sons-in-law would bring a little whiskey. and they would all have a drink or two and play cards. Meanwhile my grandmother and my aunts would prepare the dinner. We usually had roast pork, roast beef, and a good sized ham. Accompanying the meats were vegetables and potatoes, and, still a traditional ethnic favorite, tourtière (French meat pie.)

My grandfather could not read books but could read playing cards and loved playing whist. He also greatly enjoyed smoking his pipe while seated at rest in his rocker. My grandmother BOUCHER was also illiterate but she was kind, cheerful, and charitable. Her pleasures were her family and her church, where she attended mass every day, rain or shine. Since she lived in back of the church on Moody Street, all that she had to do to attend was to cross the street. I never knew her to go to any store or to do any shopping. While I lived with her I did all her errands. She cooked. washed for a large family, and later on took care of me when I had no other place to go but the orphanage. I was an added burden but she gave me as much love as she gave to my aunts and uncle. Though she knew nothing of politics. geography, literature, etc., she was a great lady. She believed in her church and she

practiced what her church preached — Memère Boucher had an overpowering faith in God

Like everyone else, I am sure that she must have had bad days but as far as I could determine while I lived there, she kept any troubles she may have had to herself. Memère was very good to me, perhaps because she also had been an orphan. Her mother had died when she was 12 years old and she had married at the age of 14. Of course, at the time that she took me in, I was not yet an orphan, just an eight year old boy, made prematurely adult by tending to my invalid mother during my father's absences.

Thomas BOISSONNEAULT, my paternal grandfather, was a very different sort of person. He had come to Lowell from Canada, probably around 1870, and had stayed there permanently. He was employed as a street cleaner for the City of Lowell, a job which he had performed for probably 50 years. The old man started to work for the city before it had a retirement plan. When the city workers finally managed to obtain a retirement plan, he was almost 70 years old and too old to become part of it. He would not quit until the City of Lowell passed a special bill that gave him a little pension. City officials thought the old man would quit but he kept on coming to work and doing his job until the city finally came through with a small pension. Of course when he was hired, around 1885, there were many horses making regular deposits on Moody Street, which was his scene of action. Up and down that street the old man went with his broom and shovel. pushing a cart with a barrel and a scoop

attached to the barrel. He would sweep the horse manure into a pile, swing his scoop down, brush the manure into the scoop that was attached to the barrel and swing it up to empty the contents into the barrel. By the time he retired in 1935, there were few horses left in Lowell.

Moody Street served as the neighborhood playground and I spent much time there. Although it was quite a long street, it seemed to me that the old man had his eye on me every minute of every hour. A stern man, he often paddled me, especially when I was caught littering the street. Knowing how strict my grandfather was, the other boys in the neighborhood would often egg me on to throw cans into the street. Invariably I would be caught and would have to suffer the consequences. Under the watchful eye of my grandfather though, it was difficult for me to get into any serious mischief, he was my guardian angel with a vengeance.

(Truthfully I have to admit though that I may just possibly have had a devilish streak in my boyhood days. That confession I am forced to make, since my Aunt Eva has reported to my wife that I used to torment Sister Léontine by dumping rubbish over the lot whenever she sent me out to empty the wastebaskets. Please remember that today I am a totally different person.!)

Because my BOISSONNEAULT grandparents lived across the street from us, I saw both of them every day, though rarely visiting them on Sunday afternoons. My grandmother was not a very friendly person. She had little time or patience with any of her grandchildren and I do not remember her ever giving

me a cookie or anything else. All I really know about her is that she went to Mass every day at 8 a.m. where, as an altar boy serving at the Mass, I would see her. Both of my BOISSONNEAULT grandparents were stern and somber people, very different in personality from that of my father, who, with his happygo-lucky ways, could have been a changeling.

I know very little about the childhood of my father, who was the youngest member of his family. He attended a parochial school on Merrimack Street, known then and now as St. Joseph's College, but I do not believe that he ever attended high school. His first job was in a tannery, a hard and dirty task, scraping and dving leather. By the time he and my mother married, he was working for the Boston and Maine Railroad as a brakeman, a more respected occupation. Because of his work, he was very often away from home. I remember as a little boy going to the railroad station with my mother and seeing him for a few minutes while the long, exciting train stopped briefly at the station on its trip from Boston to White River Junction. Vermont. I don't remember my sisters being with us that day. Since they would have been very small, they probably stayed with my grandmother BOUCHER while we took this walk.

My BOUCHER grandparents and all their children were deeply religious Catholics. Even though it was not customary to say grace before meals, a religious observance was held following the supper meal. After the dishes were washed and dried, before any of my aunts or uncles would go out for the evening, everyone in that home, even

visiting friends, would kneel down and say the Rosary. This was a common custom in all of the French Canadian families in those days. I was never at the home of by BOISSONNEAULT grandparents at meal time so I do not know if this ritual was performed there, but I imagine that it was.

On those long ago Sundays there was very little to do in Lowell but to visit relatives. No one had an automobile in those days, so usually my parents and we children would go and visit my Uncle Tommy, who lived across the river in Pawtucketville, about one mile from our home. Uncle Tommy was a peddler of fruit and vegetables, who made a reasonable living visiting homes with his horse and wagon and selling his foodstuffs to housewives. a common practice of that time. His small house sheltered his wife and large family of 11 children (three sons and eight daughters). Uncle Tommy was a lot of fun but Aunt Maria was quite the opposite and had little patience with her brood. For her, Sunday was a day of rest and relaxation and when two grown-ups and three extra children descended on her, it must have been dismaying, to say the least.

My uncle also owned an old-fashioned, hand-cranked ice cream freezer so we were pretty sure of a treat when we went to his home. He would usually bring out the freezer, gather all the ingredients together and throw them inside the freezer, fill the outside with crushed ice, pour in some rock salt and start hand cranking. Of course he had many volunteers for this tedious chore since his boys and some of his girls would argue for the privilege. We three were much too young to join in the squabble. After

what appeared to be an eternity of turning the crank, the container would be opened, and voila! we had ice cream We were ready for that feast long before the feast was ready. We would form a disorderly line and wait expectantly for uncle Tommy to spoon the rich smooth creation into our dishes. Ice cream was a real treat in those days and both young and old heartily enjoyed it. Usually it was plain vanilla, though occasionally he made chocolate. Believe me. we weren't fussy. like some children today who only like certain flavors. Around 5 p.m. we would return home. That was the moment that Aunt Maria probably enjoyed the most; of course she was left with a mountain of plates and spoons to wash and dry but she had plenty of girls to lend a hand.

We never visited my Uncle Willie, who was also a peddler. His two sons were George (now living in Chicopee) and Arthur, who died some years ago. Their home in Dracut was about six or seven miles from the outskirts of Lowell. It was too far to walk and there was no transportation on Sundays. I only went to his home once and that was on the occasion of his death, I believe in 1917. We never visited my father's sisters, although they only lived across the street. We went to my BOISSONNEAULT grandparents once or twice as far as I can remember.

Uncle Willie did give our family its first automobile ride around Lowell, only a few days after he had bought a Dodge Touring Car. Needless to say we were all thrilled, but the excitement was short lived. During the first week that he owned the car, a local undertaker, while driving a big limousine, struck and

killed a little Greek girl. The victim was the first person killed by an automobile in the Lowell area and the accident caused a great deal of unrest in the Greek community. The catastrophe upset my uncle so much that he returned the car to the dealer, afraid to drive it for fear of another such tragedy. A year later he died, never to learn how commonplace such automobile fatalities would become. When his widow had to find work, my cousin George also went to the orphanage.

After I started school, I remember that on a few marvelous Friday afternoons at the close of the school day. my mother took me to the railroad station where my father would let me travel with him on the train to White River Junction. He even had the engineer take me in the locomotive's cab, which was a great thrill for a seven year old boy. After arriving at White River, he would have a layover of six or seven hours before he could board the next train going south to Boston. In those days White River junction was a big railroad terminus. All of the railroad men in the area either started or ended their run there, and had to wait for connecting trains to continue their trips. Most of them stayed at the Junction House, and old country hotel, right next to the train station. The hotel was operated by a man called Colonel Wheeler, who was always very nice to me. Whenever I went there with my father, the Colonel would always give me a big slice of apple pie and ice cream, accompanied by a large glass of milk, fresh from the farm. In those days, milk was not pasteurized or homogenized; it had all the fat contents and nutrients that milk should have, but it was very different in taste from today's

milk.

My father did errands for the Colonel in Boston, bringing him things that were at that time hard to obtain in Vermont. Perhaps the Colonel treated me as a way of repaying my father for those favors. My father spent his spare time at the Junction House, playing poker with the railroad men or with anvone staying at the hotel at the time. My father was a very good poker player and did not often lose. There was no shortage of players among the many salesmen (called drummers in those days) travelling from one place to another; of course they too had to wait for trains coming and going. The Junction House was convenient for travellers since it was open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Back in Lowell, I went to school at St. Joseph's College for a few years. I do not remember too much about this time, which was at the beginning of World War I. I do recall that every Saturday evening there would be a rally at the City Hall, about four blocks from my grandmother's home, where patriotic songs would be sung by those assembled there. I think that was my first real introduction to the English language, since we spoke French both at home and at school. Lowell was so heavily populated with French Canadians that it was easy to live and shop there without knowing English. It was necessary for my Father to use English on the railroad but my mother did not learn English until she was in the sanatorium, struggling with tuberculosis.

Lowell's French-Canadians did not celebrate many holidays except for religious holy days. Quite a few Civil

War veterans were still living as well as many Spanish American War veterans. and the Memorial Day Parade was a graphic and well-attended commemoration honoring veterans of those two wars. The Independence Day celebration began the night before, with the shooting off of fireworks, then legally used by private individuals. The noise went on all night long, and when I went to bed I would hear the popping until I dropped off to sleep. On the morning of July 4th. the chimes of St. Anne's would wake me and during the day there would be a carnival on the South Common, with rides. balloons, popcorn, and hot dogs (no hamburgers then). I would feast on the ice cream and popcorn, and ride on the Merry-Go-Round. Later at night there would be fireworks but by then I was safe in bed. It was a great day in our lives

I don't remember celebrating Thanksgiving. Perhaps the mills did not close for that day as it was not then a national holiday.

On Christmas Eve we would all attend Midnight Mass, and after Mass we would all go to the home of my BOUCHER grandparents for the Reveillon (Awakening). There would be all kinds of food, which would be meat pies (tourtières), sausages, bread, cakes, pies, and ginger beer that had been made by my grandmother. It was very good. Most of my aunts and their husbands were there except those whose families were too little to leave alone.

My uncle, Adolphe BRASSARD, would always sing *Minuit Chrétien* (O Holy Night) in French as it was originally written. He was a basso, with an excel-

lent voice. Although he would have already sung it at the Midnight Mass he would willingly repeat it at this little gathering. When he was through sinoing, there were few whose eves were dry. Uncle Adolphe could sing that beautiful song like no one else I have ever heard. Whenever I hear it at Christmas, even after all those years, it brings back some great memories and I am not ashamed to sav that I have to wipe my eyes. My Uncle Adolphe sang only in Church or at parties, and would never sing for money with one exception: a few days before Christmas he would accompany other choristers in the nightly singing of Christmas carols in the rich neighbors of Lowell. Those who heard the beautiful caroling would be moved to donate money, all of which was used for the poor in the parish Many destitute families had a much happier Christmas because of that choral group.

When everyone had eaten their fill from the groaning table, all would go home. No gifts were exchanged at Christmas, as it was a strictly religious holiday among the French Canadians at that time. Gift were given on New Year's Day (Le Jour de l'An).

New Year's Day was family reunion day. My BOUCHER aunts, uncles, and cousins would all gather at my grandparents' home. On that day the whole family would ask my grandfather for his blessing, an old Canadian custom. My pleased grandfather, with tears glistening in his blue eyes, would give us his blessing, after which we would happily sit down to a big dinner. My aunts would cooperate in bringing different meats, cakes or pies so that all of the cooking did not have to be done by my grandmother. After the meal the grown-ups would play cards and we young ones would gather around the piano. One of my aunts would play and there would be a lot of off-key singing but it did not matter, a good time was had by all. About 8:00 p.m. the party would start to break up as everybody had, to go to bed.; the mills started working at 7:00 a.m. so they were all early risers.

We children would usually receive a few small gifts on New Year's Day. I remember that in 1919 I received a set of trains, mechanical of course. Included were the engine, tender, and three passenger cars, with about 10 feet of track. Although it could in no way compare with the electric trains of the future, I had a great deal of fun with that little train. Another toy that I received was a little hand cranked electric generator. It had two small cords, one on each side and each cord had a metal holder on its end. If you were holding them when someone turned the crank, you would feel a slight electric shock. I have never seen another one of these toys since that time.

### JOSEPH GRAVELINES AND THE LEWIS & CLARK EXPEDITION

Editor's Note: The following article was first published in JMS in December 1979.

On the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark expedition, many articles and books appeared relating the history of the expedition and the stories of the men who participated. It was one of these articles that brought Joseph GRAVELINES to our attention. Although little has been written about him, it appears that Joseph GRAVELINES contributed much, indeed probably more than anyone realized at the time, to the safety and success of the expedition.

The purpose of the present article is to introduce Joseph GRAVELINES. Our research is ongoing and the eventual goal is to produce, both for scholars and the GRAVELINE family, a complete account of his part in the expedition. I am particularly interested in the details of what transpired during his visit to Washington with Chief Ankedoucharo, and of his subsequent dealings with the Arikaras after the chief's death.

Long before the date of the Louisiana Purchase, Thomas JEFFERSON had considered sending an American expedition through the territory. While it

was designated as a scientific expedition, another goal was to gain knowledge concerning the wealth which could be extracted from the region, since a growing fur trade was transforming the upper Louisiana Territory, particularly along the Missouri River basin, into an economic asset. Thus, in early 1903, while Napoleon was commanding the respect of Europe, he foresaw that the retention of France's last main possession in the New World was a tenuous one. The Louisiana Territory was, after all, bordered on the north and south by his enemies, the British and the Spanish. Unwilling to enhance their empires, he decided to sell the Louisiana territory to the fledgling United States.

Shortly after President Jefferson commissioned the Lewis and Clark expedition, it was determined that if the venture was to succeed it was essential for good relations to be established with the Indian tribes of the area. Indeed the need for continued and good relations with the Indians was recognized as sufficiently vital so that the expedition came to be seen as a diplomatic mission as well as an economic and scientific one There was an obvious necessity to engage men who were friendly with the Indians, and who understood their customs. One such person was Joseph GRAVELINES, a descendant of French colonials.

Gravelines, whose father and grandfather had been engaged in Mississippi and Missouri River commerce for almost 100 years, was established as a merchant and trapper-trader, probably in the employ of the Missouri Company, along the Missouri at the time that Lewis and Clark encountered him. He lived among the Arikara, a tribe bordering the Sioux nation in the north central Dakotas.

These Indians followed primarily agricultural pursuits, and lived in stationary villages, unlike their nomadic neighbors. Their lifestyle attracted the other plains tribes for several hundred miles around.

Gravelines, before the time of the expedition, had established a good relationship with the Arikaras, and had become adept at speaking their language. He was experienced at bartering with the visiting tribes for the hides of buffalo. deer, and elk which were plentiful in the area. and for the furs of such river animals as beaver and muskrat. It is probable that he also used the bartersystem to acquire living quarters, as resident fur traders customarily resided in the poleand-brush frame lodges used by the Arikaras. Gravelines' situation, necessarv to the success of his own business, also was made to order for the diplomatic purposes of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Here was a man who not only lived with the Arikara and knew them well, but also, because he bartered with the other Indians who traded with the Arikara, had a certain familiarity with tribes who lived farther west. Furthermore, he was no doubt in a position to

supply Lewis and Clark with geographical information about the area

Lewis and Clark signed Gravelines on as a guide and river pilot. "Mr. Joseph GRAVELINES, an honest, discreet man and an excellent boatman in employed to conduct the keel-boat as its pilot." Apparently he was well established in his trade up river, for the expedition journals record meeting tow of his trappers on the journey. He traveled with the expedition along the Missouri as far as central North Dakota, where they established their 1804-05 winter camp among the Mandan and Minnetaree Indians.

Immediately Gravelines' role changed from boatman to diplomat. Making peace among warring tribes was of prime concern to Lewis and Clark since it would foster a favorable atmosphere for trade and, more importantly, would insure a secure return journey should the expedition survive the trek over the Rocky Mountains.

Staging an impressive council three days after the arrival at the 1805-05 winter camp, Lewis and Clark and Gravelines persuaded the Mandan-Minnetaree delegations to go to the Arikaras and resolve their differences. Later, Gravelines, assisted by two of the French boatmen with the expedition, was sent to assist with the negotiations.

In early April 1805, the expedition departed their Fort Mandan to proceed westward. The previous year, their largest vessel (a keel boat fifty-five feet in length, eight feet wide, and capable of carrying ten tons), after descending the Ohio River in 1803, had served them

well for the ascent of the Missouri to the Mandan country. Mow, since the upper Missouri was unnavigable for this large a vessel, the captains decided to send the keel boat back to St. Louis. On 7 April 1805, the expedition proceeded westward in six small canoes and two large pirogues. On the sane date the keel boat. under the command of Corporal Warfington, departed downstream toward St Louis When Gravelines returned to the Fort Mandan winter establishment from his negotiations with the Arikaras, he was engaged as a boatman and pilot for the keel boat by Lewis and Clark, who were not to see him again until September 1806, when they crossed paths traversing the lower Missouri River.

President Jefferson, at the outset of the expedition, had instructed Lewis and Clark to persuade the chiefs from the Missouri tribes to travel to Washington. Gravelines, acting as an interpreter, agreed to accompany one of the Arikara chiefs to the capital. Jefferson's scientific and diplomatic interests, as well as his concern for the expedition, undoubtedly caused him to hold extensive conversations through interpreters. The necessity for this interpretation at a formal audience must have given Gravelines frequent occasion to meet with Jefferson. Gravelines' familiarity with Indians and their customs no doubt made him invaluable in this capacity.

Gravelines' value as an interpreter, however, probably was secondary to his value as a diplomat. Ankedoucharo, the Arikara chief who came to Washington with Gravelines, was unaccustomed to the habits of his hosts, and died. How to explain the death of a chief in the

white man's country was a serious problem. Indeed the fate of the entire expedition may have rested with the handling of the matter, as it was necessary for Lewis and Clark to return through Indian country. Had the Indians decided to turn against them, American history undoubtedly would not read as it does. Thus Gravelines, to whom the problem was assigned, became a far more important figure in the history of our country than he knew. An article in the U.S. Department of the Interior collection on Lewis and Clark mentions the deterioration of relations between Indians and whites after the Lewis and Clark expedition. It also states that Joseph GRAVELINES was ill treated when he arrived in the Spring of 1806 with the news of Ankedoucharo's death. Nevertheless, the point is made that the Indians were friendly to the expedition. Therefore it is safe to assume that Gravelines' mission was at least temporarily a success.

At this time we know little about Joseph GRAVELINES after the Lewis and Clark expedition. We suspect that he did not remain long with the Arikaras. Indian hostility to the whites increased as the white man claimed Indian lands and introduced disease against which the Indians had no natural immunity. Even fur traders were no longer welcomed.

It is important to realize the specific and significant contributions which Joseph GRAVELINES made to the success of the expedition. He helped to pave the way through Indian country for the progress of the expedition. He made it possible for the expedition to return safely through these same Indian areas by means of his diplomatic efforts with

the Indian chief in Washington. After the death of Ankedoucharo, he was chosen by President Jefferson to deliver his speech to the Arikaras and to console them for the loss of their chief. He successfully handled a situation that could have resulted in large scale warfare and

the ruin of the expedition. That he succeeded in these important missions is evidence of the fact that Joseph GRAVELINES is another of the little known heroes who contributed so much to the early development of our country and American history.

### DOMINA JALBERT

Domina Clophase JALBERT was born on 5 December 1904 in St. Micheldes-Saints, Quebec; the 17th of 21 children of Onesime and Celestine (GOUGEE). When he was four years old, his mother made him a kite out of bits of scrap material and showed him how to fly it. The JALBERT family at that time faced the same dilemma as other *Quebecois* families of that time: they were a large family with little money. The simple homemade kite was one way to keep the children busy and out in the fresh air, and started something that was to bring fame to Domina.

The JALBERTs came to the United States when Domina was four years old, and settled in Woonsocket. He attended St. Anne's School and, like many of his contemporaries, ended his education in the sixth grade to go work in the Guerin mills of Woonsocket. In addition to his full time job in the mill, he also ran errands for local merchants. Still interested in kites, he asked his employers to use longer string on their bundles so that he could use the excess to make kites. Domina was often seen at Barry Field flying his kites.

In his spare time he was an altar boy at St. Anne's and belonged to the parish gym where he discovered a love for athletics that would have a great influence in his life. He specialized in track events and joined the YMCA, where he won medals in 1922 and 1923 for fall and winter events. In 1927 he went to Ottawa to help celebrate Canada's Diamond Jubilee. On his way, he stopped in Joliet Ouebec to offer his assistance where an airplane had crashed. By this good deed he met Claude STERLING. the chief pilot at the Nicolas Beazly Airplane Co. of Marshall, MO. As a reward for Domina's act of charity, Mr. Sterling offered to give him free flying lessons. He became one of the first 1,000 U.S. residents to earn an aviator's license. and was a barnstormer with a flying circus for several years.

Returning to Woonsocket in the mid-1930's he found work as a laborer at the Ouonset Point Naval Base in Rhode Island; where he started working his way up the ladder. In 1933 he placed second in a 20-mile walk in New York City sponsored by the Walkers of America. They called themselves the Bunioneers because they all had bunions. From 1935 to 1939 he was the Athletic Director at Mount St. Charles Academy in Woonsocket. By the end of this period in his life he had won thirteen cups, 120 medals, and countless other trophies; and gained fame as the toe-heel walking champion of the United States.

In 1939 he was employed by the U.S. Rubber Co. in Naugatuk, CT. This company had been awarded a contract to build barrage balloons for the government. He became their chief rigger and later worked as a field representative. travelling throughout the country demonstrating the balloons in conjunction with war bond promotions. It was during this period that he started to study the static versus dynamic forces on flying objects. He experimented on kites, balloons and aircraft, using different fabrics and materials. This work led to the invention of the Kytoon, which became a standard piece of rescue equipment for aircraft downed at sea

In 1949 Domina went to work for the Dewey Almy Chemical Co. of Cambridge, MA, helping to develop designs for air-sea rescue equipment. He later formed his own company, Jalbert Aerology, to continue this work. His numerous inventions during this time include a multicell parachute; a wing-type gliding parachute, the Ram-air canopy used by the Army's Golden Knight parachute team; the Kytoon, a combination kite and balloon still in use in aerial surveying, crop dusting and communications; and the dolly spinnaker, a sail used by the Stars and Stripes to win the 1987 America's Cup. He also designed kites


for radio antennae and the world's largest flying kite, with a surface area of 3,640 square feet.

In 1964 he founded the American Kiteflyers Association. That same year his first Kytoon test vehicle became a part of the Smithsonian Institute collection. In 1985 he became one of only five Americans to be awarded the Federation Aeronautique Internationale's Gold Medal, considered to be the world's greatest honor in parachuting. He was the only American to be selected unanimously for the award. He was also recognized by the Museum of Technology in Paris, France and the Smithsonian Institution for his lifetime achievements. In 1988 he was elected to the Rhode Island Heritage Hall of Fame, and to the Woonsocket Hall of fame in 1990.

In 1932 Domina married Elizabeth BECKER and they had one child, Dorothy, before Elizabeth's untimely death in 1935. In 1943 he married Emma BOURCIER of Woonsocket. They had one child, a son, Paul, in 1945. In 1950 the family moved to Boca Raton, FL where he continued his work. Domina JALBERT died in Boca Raton in June 1991.

An executive who passed a mental hospital on his way to work used to stop every once in a while to watch one of the inmates going through the motions of winding up and pitching an imaginary ball. A friend asked the executive what he found so interesting about the man's performance.

"Well," said the executive, "if things keep on going the way they are, I'll be there some day catching for that guy, and I want to get on to his curves."

### A MYSTERY UNRAVELLED

My brother and I have a large loose-leaf book containing the names of unconnected persons bearing the family name CHRÉTIEN (CHRISTIAN). Until recently, one of those names we carried for years was Hypolite CHRÉTIEN. A now-misplaced source indicated that he was a Huguenot in Louisiana, where some place or monument was named for him: Chrétien Point.

This name teased us for many years. In June 1993, the newspaper France-Amérique, published in San Francisco, CA, carried a brief article calling attention to the opening in Paris of the offices of a new society dedicated to connecting French descendants in Louisiana with their continental "cousins." The following month, while in Paris, my brother and I decided to pay them a visit. We were well received by the management who were somewhat surprised to hear Americans speaking French so fluently. After introductions and details about our interest, we were ushered into the fledgling library. Only belatedly did the organizers of the society realize that they could not pursue their stated purpose without the medium of genealogy, and therefore of a genealogical library. It was in this small library that we discovered a new world of books

dealing with Louisiana, and in particular, Southwest Louisiana Records, an ever growing collection of volumes, one of several series compiled and published by the Rev. Donald J. HEBERT.

In the very first volume of this work (which begins in 1756), we found the birth and the Roman Catholic baptismal registration in Louisiana of a certain Hypolite, along with brothers and sisters. In addition, the parents were clearly identified: Joseph, the father, was "from Canada," and the mother, Josephte-Magdeleine SONNIER, "from Acadia." After our return home, we set about studying our holdings on the CHRÉTIEN/CHRISTIAN families, descendants of three pioneers: Michel, Vincent, and Jacques, to see if we could locate this Joseph CHRÉTIEN.

We believe we have identified him as the youngest child of François and Marie-Louise-Angelique MIGNERON (MILLERON), born on 12 April 1725 at Trois-Rivières, in the line of Vincent CHRÉTIEN.

In June 1994, the Travel section of the New York Sunday Times invited readers to visit Louisiana, detailing some of its charms and history. Additional information could be obtained from a

number of groups, whose addresses were provided. This article prompted us to go all out in searching for Hypolite CHRÉTIEN, starting with a letter to the Louisiana Travel Bureau Six weeks passed, with no word from Louisiana. Then one day a large envelope arrived. with the intriguing return address: Chrétien Point Plantation. Our request had been forwarded to Mr. Louis CORNAY, owner of the property. He thoughtfully included several booklets, newspaper clippings and a few pages from a book on the history of the plantation. For whatever reason, all of them agreed in stating that Hypolite and two of his brothers had emigrated from France. They were following an oral tradition, taken at face value, apparently unaware of the works of Rev. Louis HEBERT, who gave evidence to the contrary.

In July 1994, we returned to the offices of L'Association France/Louisiane in Paris, in order to verify our previous findings and check all other sources available. After our return to the States, it was clearly time to contact the Rev. HEBERT himself. He was very charming on the telephone and very helpful in providing us with oral and written details to clarify and expand our own finds.

A note in Volume 1 of his Southwest Louisiana Records indicates that the marriage of Joseph CHRÉTIEN and Josephte-Magdeleine SONNIER took place in Paciutiak in Acadia. Having studied other documents and maps, we believe the correct spelling of the town is *Petit Coudiac*, in New Brunswick. Judging from the birth date of the eldest child, the marriage took place between 1765 and 1768. We may never find written proof, given the political and social upheaval of the *Grand Dérangement*.

We have presented copies of our findings to Mr. CORNAY so that he can have a more exact picture of his property's background, and a more solid foundation for the history given in the brochures for *Chrétien Point Plantation*, now a bed-and-breakfast establishment. We hope that he will be able to locate living descendants of this family so that we can give them their rightful place in our large dictionary of Vincent CHRÉTIEN

An unexpected visit to a Paris library gave us more precise details about an unknown individual in Louisiana, son of an equally unknown immigrant from Canada about whom we knew only his date of birth, and the names of his parents. The result is that Hypolite CHRÉTIEN, previously unknown and unconnected in our files, is now identified and placed.

We believe that our findings offer a needed correction to erroneous history. In addition, an experience such as this unraveling of the mystery of Hypolite CHRÉTIEN gives a certain zing to our research and encourages us to welcome new challenges with determination and optimism.

Only a fool would stand in the way of progress.

## JOSEPH-GABRIEL COTE A MYSTERY SOLVED

Voila! The mystery marriage of Joseph-Gabriel CÔTÉ and Hélène ROBIDOU has been solved at last, thanks to my new friend and "remote cousin," Carol A. Turner of Menlo Park, CA. She's a French-Canadian who grew up in Biddeford, ME and a fellow member of the AFGS.

Carol and I met in March, 1994 at the New England Regional Genealogical Conference in Manchester, NH and had dinner together. When I sent a postcard of the *Ile d'Orleans* to tell her that my twin sister of Walnut Creek, CA and I would be attending the San Diego National Genealogical Conference in May, she phoned and we arranged to meet there. We enjoyed attending the French-Canadian lectures, eating our meals together and comparing ancestors. Afterward, she planned to spend a week in Salt Lake City and offered to research this marriage. I was dubious of her chances for success because, with much help, I had twice searched the AFGS Library, the Côté book, written letters to other Côté researchers; and had queries published in Lost in Canada, the American-Canadian Genealogical Society newsletter, and the National Genealogical Society newsletter - all without success.

Recently, Carol called me excitedly from a pay phone in Salt Lake City, where she and her husband had researched and discovered the "lost" marriage record of Gabriel CÔTÉ and Marie-Tonette MICHELON/LORANGE, whose 1790 marriage in Contrecoeur, Quebec was found earlier by Leon Asselin. (This couple were the parents of my great-great grandmother, Josette CÔTÉ.)

Carol had found on microfilm a copy of the marriage contract between Joseph CÔTÉ, son of Joseph and of Therese HUOT; and Anne JOBIDON, daughter of Louis and of Anne TOUPIN; in the parish of l'Ange-Gardien in 1740. Obviously, the old French handwriting of the priest was misread, so that a Helene ROBIDOU could never be found. (I had often wondered if it could be JOBIDON and had used it as an alternative in queries; but Joseph CÔTÉ is such a common name. it was difficult to trace.) Carol verified her findings through several Canadian record books and also located the baptismal record of their son. Gabriel, who was born in St. Augustin-des-Maures in July 1759. This parish is just west of Quebec, and the family may have moved there to escape the impending invasion by Wolfe's troops.

# FRENCH AND BELGIAN IMMIGRANTS TO WOONSOCKET, RI

Since most of our French ancestors came to the United States by way of Canada, we tend to forget other groups of French immigrants who made significant contributions to the history of our country. Among these are the Huguenot refugees driven out of France because of their religious beliefs; Acadian refugees forcibly resettled in Louisiana by their English conquerors, and the French who directly colonized Louisiana. These are well documented in our history texts.

There is one aspect of French immigration to this country that is almost completely ignored by historians. It is this group that is the subject of this article.

After the Civil War, the United States experienced an industrial boom. The factories that produced goods for the Union war effort quickly converted to peacetime production, bolstered by the need created by this country's post war westward expansion.

New England, rich in the water power needed to run the mills, expanded its manufacturing capacity so quickly that a serious labor shortage was created. This problem was soon alleviated by our grandparents and great-grandparents who saw an opportunity to better themselves by working in the textile mills of New England. While immigration from Quebec had started in the 1820's, and by 1865 there was already a significant French-Canadian population in the northeast, tens of thousands more suddenly streamed across the border to find work here. They went to Manchester, NH; to Lowell, Lawrence, Fall River and New Bedford in Massachusetts; to Thompson and Putnam, Connecticut; to Providence and Pawtucket in Rhode Island; and to points in between. And they came to Woonsocket . . .

Woonsocket was especially fortunate in that the Blackstone River snakes through the center of the city. The Blackstone, from its source in Worcester, MA, drops almost 800 feet in its short run to where it joins with the Providence River in Rhode Island. This drop gives the Blackstone a tremendous water power potential, and made Woonsocket an ideal site for the textile industry. Entrepreneurs recognized this and took advantage of it. Mills were built on both sides of the river - mills that needed laborers. Our forebears recognized the opportunity and came to Woonsocket fast and in such numbers thatWoonsocket became "Little Canada" in northern Rhode Island. The French language was as commonly heard on the streets of Woonsocket as it

was in Montreal

Incorporated as a city in 1888, by 1894 Woonsocket had its first French Canadian mayor, Aram J. POTHIER. Aram POTHIER was an exceptional man. He was born on 26 July 1854 in St. Jean-Chrysotome, Quebec. At the age of ten he left Canada with his parents, but returned to complete his education. Upon graduation from Nicolet College in 1870, he returned to Rhode Island to start his career. We will skip the details of POTHIER's life for now and save this for a future article.

In 1889 and again in 1899, the Governor of Rhode Island appointed him as Rhode Island's official delegate to the Paris Trade Exposition. At this time, France had a well-established textile industry in the Alsace-Lorraine region, centered in and around the cities of Roubaix and Tourcoing. This spilled over the border into Belgium, where the industry had established itself in and around Verviers. French industrialists had also established branch plants in Luxembourg, Switzerland, and Italy. The French manufacturing methods used at the time were far superior to the English method being used in the United States. It was the goal of Rhode Island's political leaders to bring some of that technology to the state, and POTHIER was assigned that task.

On his first trip, he met with Belgian manufacturer Joseph GUERIN. Thus began not only a professional relationship, but a close personal relationship that extended to the grave: Both families are entombed in the Pothier Mausoleum in Woonsocket's Precious Blood Cemetery.

GUERIN was already familiar with Woonsocket, having been sent here in 1871 by his employers to investigate commercial opportunities. POTHIER convinced Joseph GUERIN that his future was in Woonsocket.

**GUERIN** arrived in Woonsocket in 1892 and formed the Guerin Spinning Company on East School Street, eventually expanding to other mills on Social Street. Other entrepreneurs soon followed. The LEPOUTRE family of Roubaix formed the Lafavette Worsted Company on Hamlet Avenue, followed by Charles TIBERGHIEN's French Worsted Mills across the street a few years later. By the time that the economic crash of 1929 ended the industry's expansion, there were ten major French companies with mills in Woonsocket, plus many smaller companies.

With all of this manufacturing capacity came the need for labor again. Many residents of Alsace-Lorraine and nearby Belgium saw their opportunity. Woonsocket was a place where their language was commonly spoken, where their culture was understood, and where their experienced labor was needed. Add to that, the political unrest in Europe in the early years of this century. and Woonsocket again became a magnet to French-speaking people. While most of the mill owners were prevented by French law from becoming permanent residents here, the majority of the immigrants stayed and became productive members of the community.

I have identified over 1550 individuals who came to Woonsocket from

Belgium and France to work in this city's textile mills. A list of these people, with short biographies, begins in this issue of *Je Me Souviens*, and will continue in the next issue.

## GEORGE NAPOLEON GIRARD

Editor's Note: The following article was taken from Representative Men and Old Families of Rhode Island, Volume III; published in 1908 by J.H. Beers & Co. of Chicago. These books were apparently a paid Who's Who of prominent Rhode Islanders of that period, and were probably published for their snob appeal among the elite of that era. With that in mind, this biography should probably be taken with a grain of salt, however the genealogical information it contains is invaluable. The family of George Napoleon GIRARD was chosen for inclusion in this issue because of his importance in the French-Canadian community of northern Rhode Island at the turn of the century. Following this biography is a straight line genealogy of our subject researched by Raymond DESPLAINES

George Napoleon GIRARD, paying teller of the Producers National Bank at Woonsocket, R.I., who is interested in other business enterprises in that city, was born at North Bloomfield, Mass., Feb. 11, 1871.

The GIRARD family is of French extraction, the original home of the family having been at Bordeaux, France. There were four brothers. Early in the eighteenth century three of these landed

in Canada, while the fourth, Stephen, remained on the vessel, which went on its way to Philadelphia, where Stephen GIRARD landed and where his name is held in high esteem to the present day. A great marble pile, dedicated to philanthropy, commemorates his memory in that city.

One of the brothers, Louis Antoine, with his wife, Marie Anne BRUNEAU, landed in Canada and settled at l'Ile aux Oies (l'Isle d'Orleans? — Ed.), with their children: Louis, Abraham, Joachim, Francois and Marie. Soon after they went to Quebec, where Francois became well known. The family afterward lived at St. Hyacinthe. Louis Antoine GIRARD, the settler, was born in France in 1741.

François Xavier GIRARD, son of Louis Antoine, was born in 1776 and after the family moved to Quebec he became the carrier of messages for David COURROY, Agent for the King. For his faithful services in this capacity, he was given a grant of land on the Isle of Sorel, and tradition states that the parchment on which this deed was written was accidently destroyed in an unusual way. It must be remembered that at that early day, parchment was in general use in place of window glass. A sheet becoming broken, the wife of

François, in searching to mend the break, as became a good and careful housewife. found the one which suited her purpose and used it, not knowing that she was thus destroying a very valuable legal document. This resulted in her husband losing the grant of land. Later he moved with his family to St. Hyacinthe, where the rest of his life was spent. He was married Marguerite to LASABLONIERE at St. Hyacinthe, Sept. 29, 1796, and they had these children: François, Louis Antoine, Joseph, Jean Baptiste, David, Marie, Lisette and Clemence. Louis Antoine GIRARD, the second son of François Xavier, was born in 1801, and attended the parish schools in the neighborhood of his home. He grew up to agricultural pursuits, and thus spent a long and industrious life. He died in January, 1894, at the age of ninetytwo years. He was a devout member of the Catholic Church, and was a supporter of the Liberal party for many years. His children were: Ulderic, Louis, Mathilde, Napoleon, Rosa, Vitaline, Joseph and Exilda.

Napoleon GIRARD, son of Louis Antoine, was born on his father's farm, was educated in the local schools and remained in Canada until 1868, when he came to the United States. He located first at Worcester, Mass., but later moved to North Brookfield, where he was employed in a shoe shop, for the firm of Batchelder Brothers, and there he spent five years. He then went back to his native land and engaged in farming there until the close of his life in May, 1901. He was a consistent member of the Catholic Church. In political matters he supported the Liberal party.

Napoleon GIRARD married

Adeline GOBEILLE, born at St. Hyacinthe, daughter of Francois GOBEILLE, and they had these children: George N.; Wilfred J., who is engaged in business at San Francisco, Cal.; Roseline, who died young; Stanislas J., also of San Francisco; and Corinne, a beautiful young lady and college graduate, who died in young womanhood.

George N. GIRARD was about five years old when he accompanied his parents on their return to Canada. There he was educated at the Holy Cross College, and remained at home until 1889, when he was eighteen years old. Then he returned to the United States and located at Woonsocket, R.I., where he found employment as a clerk at \$4.50 per week, and the larger part of his salary went for board. After eight months he started in with W. F. NORTON to learn the trade of carpenter and joiner. at which he spent three and a half years, after which he went to Quebec and became bookkeeper for the Bell Telephone Company, but he found himself too much of an American to take kindly to other ways, and shortly afterward returned to Woonsocket

In the fall of 1893 Mr. GIRARD accepted a position in the Producers National Bank, where for the past fourteen years he has faithfully performed service, being promoted until he was made paying teller. In July, 1899, he started into the insurance business, in partnership with J. W. TRINQUE, which partnership was dissolved in 1903. Since then Mr. GIRARD has continued the business alone, and represents some of the most important companies of England and the United States. These are the following: Boston, of

Boston; Fire Association, of Philadelphia; Fireman's, Newark; Germania, New York; Girard, Philadelphia; London Assurance, England; National, Hartford, Conn.; Royal Exchange, England; Traders & Mechanics Mutual, Lowell; Westchester, New York; Williamsburgh, New York; Equitable Life, New York; and Travelers, Hartford.

Mr. GIRARD was married at Woonsocket, June 12, 1895, to Rosina E. GOBEILLE, daughter of Augustin GOBEILLE, of Woonsocket. They have three children, viz.: Leonard, Blanche Alice and Corinne.

Mr. GIRARD was a close friend of the late Dr. Joseph HILS and was chosen in his will as one of his executors. He is a member, with his wife, of the Church of the Precious Blood. He belongs also to St. Jean Baptiste Society and is a member of the Alliance Nationale, the Artisans Canadiens Français and the Forestiers Franco-Americain.

# THE MAKING OF A FAMILY TREASURE

Maybe over the years one has collected old family photos, family heirlooms, old watches, old jewelry, quilts or maybe old tools. Whatever there might be that you have collected and it has sentimental value to you, reminding you of some loved one or another, is important. But, what can you do to insure that others might know of their importance to you? Also, you might want to share these singular items with other siblings or loved ones. How does one go about doing this?

Although time consuming, my suggestion is to videotape these items into a meaningful history of your family. It is well worth all of the work. It is so gratifying to flip through the years now and see how our lives have been formed and nurtured and developed. Here's how my wife and I did this seemingly insurmountable task.

- 1. Collect photos and other memorabilia in one place.
- 2. Arrange these items in the order they are to be filmed. Photos were placed chronologically as best as could be. Other items, i.e. watches, quilts, etc. were set aside and made readily accessible when needed.
- 3. Set up lights and equipment in an area

which will be free of disturbances for an extended period of time. We did not use a photo copy stand. Instead we improvised with a metal typing stand, using magnets to hold in place, photos to be videotaped.

- 4. Each photo or item was recorded for about 7 to 10 seconds at most. One could do this longer if you were giving a simultaneous narration, which we did not. I placed an item or photo on the stand and my wife would film the item. For over 150 items, it took about 7 hours.
- 5. Computer graphics were incorporated for titles and ending shots. Other markers along the way were handwritten in calligraphy and were inserted as the videotaping progressed. These markers included chronological markers, family markers, or high-lighted important events, such as weddings.
- 6. Lastly, copyright free music was dubbed over the videotape.

Although each family would certainly have its own treasures to be depicted and cherished, here are some of the items I included in my family video:

#### Father:

- Coat of arms of SPAETH

family.

- Pedigree chart of family.
- Maps of Alsace-Lorraine, birthplace of father.
- Pictures from books or brochures of places in Alsace relative to family.
- Picture of traditional Alsatian costume for a man and woman.
- Birth documents extracted from French records dating back to 1847.
- Marriage document of grandparents, denoting their signatures.
- Letters of recommendation from my grandfather's employer before he came to the United States.
- -- Naturalization document of Grandfather SPAETH, dated 1889 in Pittsburgh, PA.
- Old photos of father and his first wife.
  - Photos of his dogs and cars.
- Father's signature as inscribed on an envelope.
- Inspirational poem by Gothe taken from an old diary of my father's written in his own hand.
- Father's pocket watch, tie clip, hairbrush and white silk scarf, which was used for the backdrop.

#### Mother:

- Coat of arms of the THERRIEN family.
- Pedigree chart of the family.
- Maps of Quebec and Acadia, where ancestors lived.
- Pictures of the homes of early French Canadian settlers.
- Picture of a King's Daughter.
- Pictures from the story of Evangeline and the cover of a beautiful

- leather-bound copy.
- 1871 map of Alburgh, Vermont, with ancestor L. TERRIO noted on the map.
- Wedding photo of grandparents showing bride and groom with best man (groom's brother) and maid of honor (bride's sister).
- Old photos showing my mother at various stages of her life.
- News article detailing fact about 1918 flu epidemic, in which many of my mother's family died, including her father.
- Book jacket of *Lyddie* by Katherine Paterson. This story uncannily parallels my own mother's life.
- My letter to the author of this book.
  - Author's response.
- Photo of the house, still standing, where my mother and her siblings were born in Alburgh, VT.
- Picture from a book showing Alburgh's main street in 1909, a dirt road, with one car on it. Family tradition says that grandfather THERRIEN owned the first car in Alburge. Could that be his?
- Mother's jewelry, what remained after a theft in my home.
- Mother's recipe for Irish soda bread, which she had handed down to my wife.
- Mother's signature in her beautiful, graceful handwriting.
- Closeups of her embroidered needlework.

#### Other relatives:

Not wanting to stop with just my parents, we went on to videotape photos of my mother's siblings and their families. There were not many of these, but it acknowledges their existence.

We also videotaped photos of my brother and sisters and myself as we were growing up. Some other items included here were:

- A lock of my sister's hair, after her first haircut.
- A greeting card painted by me which was given to my mother on the occasion of her birthday.
  - Other art work of mine.
- A poem written by me about certain places and family members.
- Photos depicting graduations, military service, acting performances, cars, houses, pets, etc.

#### America's family photo album:

Other photos included which are important but tend not to fit into any category were examples of the photos I had sent to the America's Family Album exhibit during the bicentennial, which are now housed on Ellis Island. One can now go to Ellis Island and call up these photos on a computer screen by family name. Each of these photos detail the family name, country of origin, date of arrival, date and place of photo. It was one way I felt my family could be remembered for posterity. Pictures here represent the following families: SPAETH, THERRIEN, MAGLIARI, and HUNTING. By sending in these photos I was able to chronicle my parents, my maternal grandparents, by siblings and their offspring, my own small family and my wife's family.

#### Scenics:

Other photos that were included in the videotape production were scenic photos and postcards which depict the area in which we live, the beautiful Hudson Valley of New York.

When this video was made in the summer of 1993, *Poetic Justice* was the big film in movie houses across the country; but for me, my home video has been a big success. It was shown in only a few relatives' homes in the U.S. and Canada, and received with "wild acclaim." I have tried in many ways to honor my parents and perpetuate their memories and that of their families. This videotape does it in a way that I could never do before. I didn't get an oral history while they were alive, so this was the next best thing.

It is important to show it off, not to brag, but so others can know how important is the family bond; and too, how important is each individual who makes up the family. Also, it was beneficial to me in that many people in the old photos who were unknown to me then were identified later by others viewing the video. Moreover, copies can be easily made and distributed to those who wish it.

I only wish that I could give one to my mother and father.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

#### Janice Burkhart, Librarian

The Library Committee is delighted to announce that the Reel Friends campaign has been an outstanding success. On behalf of the entire Society. I would like to thank all those members who donated so generously to this effort. Their names are listed elsewhere in Je Me Souviens and their names are also displayed on a beautiful. permanent plaque at the Library. It means a lot to the Library Committee that so many members support the special projects that we sponsor from time to time. With the limited funds available from dues, we would never be able to purchase the wonderful resources that we have accumulated over the years. Books, fiche and film are very expensive but it is important for us to do our best to purchase these new materials as they become available to us. Thanks to the wonderful support of our members. we can proudly boast of a wonderful and updated library that the entire membership can be proud of.

The Massachusetts birth and death films for 1870-1895 have been ordered and hopefully, by the time you read this report, they will have arrived at the Library. This is an important new purchase. We now have the microfilms of the births, marriages and deaths for that state for the years 1870 to 1900. We are currently investigating the possibil-

ity of adding Massachusetts births and deaths for the years 1842 to 1869. This will complement the marriage data that we already have in our microfilm collection. We are also investigating the possibility of purchasing similar microfilm from New Hampshire and Maine. Please remember that we now have the ability to make paper copies of our microfilm and fiche records. If you are unable to come to the Library to do this yourself, this service is available for a fee.

A special *Thank You* goes to the Woonsocket Harris Library for their donation of two microfilm reader/printers. With our growing collection of film, these two machines were needed and are very much appreciated.

We have had a very busy publishing year. Our success in the sales of our books has made it possible for us to publish other books. Please watch your mailings for announcements as we introduce many new volumes. These books will be fine additions to our Library and also to your personal libraries.

We now have a printout of the births of Blackstone, MA through the year 1995. These records were obtained through the efforts of AFGS member Lucile McDONALD. We have also copied the records of Blessed Sacrament of Fall River, MA; St. Michael of Swansea, MA; St. Paul of Blackstone, MA; Our Lady of Good Help of Mapleville, RI; and the DePardo Funeral Home of Woonsocket, RI. Roy's Funeral Home of Worcester, MA has been printed and bound, and is now available for sale. The deaths of Peterboro, NH and the marriages of Swansea, MA are new additions to our publications of civil records.

Another addition to our shelves are several early transcription records of Rhode Island cemeteries. We are currently working on our Blackstone Valley Heritage Corridor project. For this we are gathering genealogical material from all the cities and towns in the corridor from Worcester. MA to Providence. RI. These include Worcester, Millbury, Grafton, Sutton, Upton, Northbridge, Douglas, Uxbridge, Millville, Hopedale, Mendon, and Blackstone in Massachusetts; and North Smithfield, Smithfield, Lincoln, Central Falls, Woonsocket, Cumberland, Pawtucket, and Providence in Rhode Island. We are using the vital records that we have in the Library as a starting point and we will be adding church, cemetery, and funeral home records for as many of these locations as possible. To accomplish this very ambitious task, we need help. We need volunteers in the following areas: copy microfilm records at the Library, computer data entry, and copying of original records. Most importantly, if you know individuals who could grant us permission to copy original records, would you be willing to approach them for us? We also have research projects to do at local libraries and town halls. This could be your chance to get involved in the inner

workings of the AFGS and make some new friends.

Our obituary, bride, and milestone projects continue to grow weekly, thanks to all the loyal members who continue to clip, paste, copy and catalog this information. Please keep up the good work. If you have obituary information on family members, you might want to make a copy and send it along to us. If you would like to join us in this project, just clip out the articles from your local newspaper and send it along to us. If you live nearby and would like to join Noella and her crew working on the final steps of this project. please let us know. We are currently compiling an index to all our obituary books. When we complete Volume 50. we will offer the index for sale. I think this will be a great research tool, and we will be able to make copies of individual obituaries on request.

Paul DELISLE and Roger BEAUDRY continue to mastermind the cemetery project. We hope to be able to publish the Woonsocket cemeteries late next year. The computer program used in this project has been installed on our Library computers and we are one of only four libraries in the state to have the complete statewide project files. Our computer files in other areas of genealogy are also growing, thanks to Roger BARTHOLOMY and his committee.



## The Joy Of Giving .... PCs



Do computers, like people, slow down as they get older? No, but it sure seems that way! Today's software places greater demands on equipment. That, along with higher expectations, nifty options, and tax depreciation, feeds "upgrade fever".

But, while we're preoccupied with when to upgrade, and to what, an important question is often

ignored...what do you do with the old equipment? Some of our members just pass it down the ladder to other family members, or to those whose demands aren't as great as those who are upgrading. The trouble is, many members often can't find anyone who can use the older machines. Some software companies allow users to donate older versions of their programs, but it's best to check with the vendor.

Whatever you do, do not let your PC sit in a closet gathering dust! So many people can use them for so many different and very good reasons! (And, it could mean a substantial tax deduction for you!)

## FRENCH AND INDIAN CONNECTION

Book Review: Unredeemed Captive by John Demos Knopf, New York, 1994

Many Franco-Americans like myself find an Indian connection in their family history. Two of my seventeenth century ancestors were supposedly stolen by Indians. Thus John Demos' book was particularly facinating for me and may be of interest to many others.

Demos, a Yale professor has chronicled and documented through letters and journals the strange and adventuresome saga of Eunice Williams. This seven year old daughter of a Puritan minister, John Williuams, was captured with several members of her family and numerous (more than a hundred) Deerfield, Massachusetts townspeople in 1704 during the Oueen Ann's War. Captives were marched to Montreal. Some of the prisoners were indentured to French households, whereas others like Eunice were adopted by Indian families. Her captors belonged to the Jesuit mission-fort at La Prairie near Montreal. Two and a half years after his abduction, John Williams was released and he returned to Massachusetts. His sons were also reunited to their family. Mrs. Williams, however, had been murdered on the long arduous journey to Canada. Eunice continued to live in the Indian society.

Despite many decades and repeated attempts to "redeem" Eunice from her Indian kidnappers, Minister John Williams and later his son, Stephen, met only frustration. Yet it was not merely frustration, fear and disappointment which the Williams clan had to bear. There was a devastating truth about Eunice which the Puritan family was reluctant to accept, but which reality finally made clear.

This scholarly but very readable book is both engrossing and informative. Although the author, I believe, minimizes the roles of Catholicism and feminism in the outcome of this story, his documentation, narrations and explanations are helpful and interesting. The Providence Journal called it one of the better non-fiction books of 1994.

#### **AUTHORS' GUIDELINES**

Subject Matter: JMS publishes articles of interest to people of French Canadian descent. Articles dealing with history and genealogy are of primary interest, although articles on related topics will be considered. Especially desirable are articles dealing with sources and techniques, i.e. "how-to guides."

Length: Length of your article should be determined by the scope of your topic. Unusually long articles should be written in such a way that they can be broken down into two or more parts. Surnames should be capitalized.

Style: A clear, direct conversational style is preferred. Keep in mind that most of our readers have average education and intelligence. An article written above that level will not be well received.

Manuscripts: This publication is produced on an IBM-compatible computer, using state of the art desktop publishing software. While this software has the capability to import text from most word-processing programs, we prefer that you submit your article in straight ASCII text on either 5.25" or 3.5" floppy disk. If you do not use an IBM-compatible computer, or do not have access to a computer, your manuscript should be typewritten on 8.5" x 11" paper. It should be double-spaced with a 2-inch margin all around. If notes must be used, endnotes are preferable over footnotes. A bibliography is desirable and preferred over notes.

Illustrations: Our software is capable of importing graphics in most IBM-compatible formats. Vector graphics (PIC, PLT, WMF, WMT, CGM, DRW, or EPS) are preferred over bit-mapped graphics (BMP, MSP, PCX, PNT, or TIF). Scanned images can also be used. We prefer the Tagged Image File Format (TIF) for scanned photos. You may also submit printed black-and white photographs. We will have them scanned if, in our opinion, the photo adds enough to the article to justify the cost.

Other Considerations: Authors are responsible for the accuracy of all material submitted. All material published in *Je Me Souviens* is copyrighted and becomes the property of the AFGS. All material submitted for publication must be original. Previously published material will be rejected. Articles that promote a specific product or service, or whose subject matter is inappropriate, will also be rejected.

## PARTING SHOTS

#### Paul P. Delisle, Editor

A new member wrote to us recently to express her disappointment that the Society's focus appeared to be limited to French-Canadian, in spite of the diversity implied by our name. While it is true that we have always leaned toward the Canadian French, a quick tour of our library will uncover some volumes on Huguenot refugees, Acadians, and non-Canadian French; and our civil records cover all ethnic groups. In addition, we exchange periodicals with some societies in France. Our librarians over the years have always been on the lookout for French sources.

The hard truth is that the vast majority of reference sources available to us come from Quebec; and from New England, which is heavily populated with Canadian immigrants and their descendants.

We have one article in this issue that, we hope, will help to alleviate this problem. The Woonsocket area, along with other textile-producing areas of the northeast, was rich with French and Belgian immigrants. More than 1500 were uncovered in Woonsocket from 1845 to 1945, and very little has been written about them. We hope that this article will provide encouragement for other members to research in this area.

Je Me Souviens depends on member contributions to fill its pages. Without steady input from our membership, this publication could not exist. As we send this issue to the printer, we are left wondering where the material for the next issue will come from, since our backlog has pretty well dried up.

Finally, the Society's cemetery project has recently been expanded to include Blackstone and Millville, MA. We are looking to expand this even further by including cities and towns out of this area that have a significant French population. If you are interested in participating in this project, let us know. We will provide a computer program, and the expertise; and you will receive full credit upon publication.
